First Annual Summer Conference under Auspices of the Christian Endeavor of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends, to be Held at Ocean Lake Park, Tillamook Beach, August 21-30, 1918.

AS TO THE COST

The cost of any vacation varies so very much according to the financial ability of the party taking the vacation, that it is impossible to estimate accurately what is likely to be the average cost. A few facts will be of assistance in enabling individuals to figure out the cost for themselves.

The railroad fare, round trip from Portland, is \$5.15, but the auto road is good and undoubtedly very many will go via that route.

A tent, including a cot and mattress, can be rented for \$5.00 for the ten days.

The matter of board is perhaps the most difficult to determine, but arrangements have been made for an experienced cook, and opportunity will be given for all who desire to leave their cooking apparatus at home and board in together on a co-operative plan such as is used in the dining room of Pacific College and other places. Estimates of the cost per meal vary from 9c to 20c, and the actual choice lies with those who eat and who agree how simple the meals may be allowed to be. Nothing can be definitely ascertained until the close of Conference. It would be fine if all who came united in this plan, as eating together undoubtedly aids materially in a better acquaintance, but the management want it plainly understood that all are at perfect liberty to make whatever arrangements are most convenient for their own conditions. Every effort will be made to run the boarding establishment with little or no overhead, so that the actual cost of the food will almost represent the outlay. Children under three will be entertained free; three to six half rate, parents to accompany them, of course.

Let us pray that God will open the way financially for us individually and that we get faith enough to take this opportunity of studying to show ourselves approved unto God, workmen that need not to be ashamed.

THE PROGRAM

We reproduce herewith the same provisional program as appeared in last month's paper, but are glad to announce one very important and pleasing change. The definite hour for this change has not

yet been decided upon, consequently it seems impossible to print a correction.

At the time the provisional program was arranged strenuous efforts had been made to have President Levi T. Pennington, of Pacific College, on the program for an hour a day straight through the conference. At that time it seemed impossible to him to accept such a place, but we are delighted to be able to state that he has now promised us that he will undertake a daily lecture on the Life of Christ. Those who have had the privilege of listening to President Pennington in his men's class on Yearly Meeting Sundays, or who have taken extension work under his leadership, will need no urging to make all arrangements not to miss this opportunity. He is a delightful leader, a magnificent scholar, and a close and humble follower of Him whose life he endeavors to study. This lecture hour will be a real feast. It is not certain as we go to press just what hour of the day this will occupy, but it may very likely take the place of the 10:20-12:15 period, or possibly an evening hour, whichever seems most likely to be convenient for a large and enthusiastic attendance.

There may, of course, be other changes on the program, and it is feared that possibly Miss Spann's health may prevent her attendance, but enough is certain for us to guarantee confidently that the program will be excellent, and well worth a trip to the coast to participate in it.

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NEWS AND UNITY

Paul exhorted the Ephesians to walk worthy of their vocation, "endeavoring to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace." With the common starting point that our vocation is that of a Christian Endeavorer, may we not feel that the mission of "A Friendly Endea-or" is to encourage more unity among us who already have a common bond of peace?

Let us see to it, then, that reports of our activities may not only be aimed to unite our scattered societies by making us better acquainted with the names and doings of our individual Christian Endeavorers, but may also inspire and encourage us in our endeavors to be Christians and to grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

News in our columns should be either personal and intimate, or educationally inspiring, preferably both. Vague references to numbers being absent or present or to good times being had would scarcely fill the bill. Detailed reports of the conduct of a meeting which had direct inspirational results, especially if combined with the names of participants, elections of officers, new ideas, new members, or reports of good committee work, if attractively reported, should help much in keeping our Christian Endeavor spirit united for Quakerism.

PRACTICAL PROBLEMS

"A Friendly Endeavor" is either needed or it is not. If it is needed, we cannot afford to be without it whatever the cost; if not needed, time and effort used in keeping it going is more than wasteful. The only possible criterion is the reception it receives. In some places there was considerable delay in getting the July number distributed and we have heard of some who have never even heard of it, and yet they are C. E. members in good standing. We hope this month's distribution may be bettered. In spite of obstacles, however, paid subscriptions have been coming steadily in, and make us feel that at least some feel that the us fort is worth while. The real burden of the paper does not fall upon the editor, of the is only an employe (?) of the

Yearly Meeting Christian Endeavorers. The real burden falls upon the Yearly Meeting Superintendent, Chester A. Hadley. He in turn distributes it among his four Quarterly Meeting Superintendents, and they look to the local society presidents to push the matter. This from an inspirational and educational standpoint only, however. The real support, the real burden, lies with the individual young people, for only as they actually subscribe and pay their 50c a year subscription can the paper be sustained. In setting the price at 50c it was calculated that each meeting could secure as many subscriptions as their total active and associate membership, and only by actually reaching this quota can the expense of the paper be met. In all societies there are several members in one family, consequently one subscription per family would not fill the quota, and we shall have to go outside the ranks of our Christian Endeavor members to look for help; we shall have to appeal to the other members and attenders of our Monthly Meetings at large. What is the combined total of your membership? That is your minimum quota of subscriptions. Who will be the first to go over the top?

THE CONFERENCE

The one supreme topic of conversation among our young people now is the Summer Conference to be held at Ocean Lake Park, August 21 to 30. With no reserve whatever we recommend to our readers attendance at this First Annual Summer Conference. The expense will not be great, certainly no greater than the average vacation, probably much less. The enjoyment, we anticipate, could hardly be greater, while the opportunity to get closer together and better acquainted will be unparalleled. Greater than them all, however, we believe will be the spiritual uplift, educational opportunities, and mental inspiration to be derived from the course arranged for the morning hours.
