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

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ABOUT GEORGE FOX COLLEGE

George Fox College is the outgrowth of a desire by early Willamette Valley Quaker settlers who established Pacific Academy in 1885 for the Christian education of their children. The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced work for students. In 1949 because of the many colleges in the Northwest with "Pacific" in their name, the college was renamed George Fox in honor of the founder of the Friends Church.

Today the 90-acre campus boasts \$5 million in facilities including 19 buildings, of which 13 are new or remodeled in the last 11 years. Enrollment is currently at a record 472.

Accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, the college offers 23 majors in six divisions of education, fine and applied arts, language arts, natural science, religion, and social science. GFC has a student-teacher ratio of 1:12 with 50 percent of faculty members having doctorates.

George Fox students come from 15 states, 9 foreign countries. Thirty-two religious denominations are represented on the Newberg campus. GFC this year has established a branch campus in Kotzebue, Alaska, with 72 students enrolled in one of the closest U.S. educational institutions to Russia. Alumni of GFC are primarily in service-oriented vocations of Christian ministries, education, social work, and medical fields. The college's most famous alumnus is former President Herbert Hoover.

GFC ATHLETICS

Intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the overall educational program at George Fox College. Varsity athletic teams represent the college in baseball, basketball, track, soccer, and tennis. Women students compete in field hockey, volleyball, basketball, tennis, track, and softball. For those not participating in the varsity program, GFC has a complete intramural program including flag football, basketball, volleyball, and softball.

Athletic facilities include Hester Gym, which seats 1,000 and has facilities for wrestling and weight training; Colcord Field, which includes a football-soccer field and track; a baseball field; tennis courts; and nearby indoor swimming pool facilities of the Chehalem Park and Rec-

reation District.

George Fox College competes as an independent on the varsity level. Its schedules are coordinated with both the Evergreen Conference and the Northwest Conference. GFC is a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

LORIN MILLER



LORIN MILLER, as George Fox College athletic director and head basketball coach, has twice in the last two years led Bruin basketball teams to post-season NAIA District II playoff spots as Oregon's top independent team. He has a 28-23 regular season record.

But more than that he has given GFC a winning atmosphere and recognition in Oregon sports for a remarkable change

from doormat to title contender. "I came to George Fox with a clear picture of what I thought could happen, and now it is happening," Miller says. "We're in year number three of what we're trying to do. It's a great situation to be in, and it can get better yet."

At George Fox since August 1970, Miller, 37, previously coached at Seattle Pacific College, where he compiled a 45-22 record in guiding freshmen basketball teams over three years. His diamond teams compiled a 56-36 record

over the same span.

Prior to his college career, Miller was a high school coach in Kansas for five years with his football teams running up a 36-9 record, including 18 consecutive wins, and track teams winning four straight conference titles.

A 1960 graduate of Sterling College in Kansas, Miller also holds a masters degree from the University of Washington.

RICH ALLEN

RICH ALLEN, assistant basketball coach, came to George Fox from Salem Academy in 1969 to assume duties as Bruin head track coach and to assist in the basketball program.

Since his arrival Allen has produced four national competitors in track—Dave McDonald, the nation's third best pole vaulter in 1971; Mark Halland, a current Bruin in the high jump ranks; and two distance runners



in Ken Bell, and Curt Ankeny, who was 17th out of 320 cross-country runners in the NAIA nationals this fall.

Allen's track squad, which had a 3-3 meet record last spring, was third in NAIA District II championships. In 1971 the Bruins had a 4-2 season mark and were fourth in the district.

Allen, defensive coach for the Bruins in the cage sport, is a vital element in the Bruin's improving basketball campaigns. He is a 1960 graduate of Seattle Pacific College and has a masters degree from the University of Oregon.

HOW IT LOOKS FOR 1972-73

Coach Lorin Miller begins his third year at the Bruin helm with a good start. Having reversed a GFC losing trend in the two years before his arrival (7 wins, 44 losses) to a winning atmosphere with 28-23 record in two years, Miller begins the 1972-73 campaign with five men returning who provided more than 60 percent of the starting action last year.

The building Bruin basketball efforts under Miller twice in two years have taken George Fox College to the NAIA District II playoffs as the district's top independent.

And Miller hopes to continue and improve that status, anchoring around five returning players—two guards and three forwards. But there will be holes to fill. Gone is the team's leading scorer a year ago, 6-5 Gary Berg, and the leading rebounder, 6-6 Gordy Loewen. Berg, with a year of eligibility remaining, decided to finish his career at California State College at Fullerton. Miller faces a major problem in finding a replacement for Loewen, who broke all individual and career rebounding records at GFC. In addition to Loewen, three others from last year were lost by graduation—Larry Herrick, Dave Morgan, and Roger Curtis. Morgan received district mention as a junior and started regularly during his junior and senior years. Herrick and Curtis were used mostly in reserve roles, although both started at various times.

The heir to Loewen's position in center is contested by two new Bruins, 6-7 Jim Blake, a transfer from Eastern Arizona Junior College, and Rob Wunder, 6-5, from Highline Community College in Seattle. Both are juniors.

Returning lettermen at the forward slots are seniors Eddie Fields, 6-4, and 6-6 Craig Taylor, and 6-5 sophomore Del Dittus. Fields, a co-captain this year with Taylor, claims the single season assist mark with 71 recorded last year. Taylor played more minutes than any other player during the 1971-72 season and was second in rebounding and third in scoring. Dittus is a fine rebounder and will provide depth at the post.

Sophomore transfer 6-5 Ray Willis from Kansas State Junior College can play guard or forward and joins 6-2 freshman Steve Strutz and seniors Ken Greenman, 6-1, and Sammy Ibarra, 5-10, to form a potent group of guards. Greenman and Ibarra are likely starters. Senior Phil Varce, a 5-11 Oregon City product, has returned to the squad after a year's absence and will offer depth at guard.

With this selection of players to utilize on the hard court, Miller says "for the first time in my 13 years of coaching I can honestly say I'm happy with every guy on the team. It's really a pleasure to coach these guys."

That rapport will be needed as the Bruins embark on perhaps the college's most ambitious schedule yet, and as an independent every game is a "league" game. The schedule includes two tournaments. The Bruins open with the NAIA Dirstrict II Tip-off Tournament and join an eight-team holiday tournament in Los Angeles to add spice to the 28-game schedule the Bruins hope to master well enough for post season play.

During the season GFC will play eight games with Northwest Conference schools, four with Evergreen Conference teams, and six with other District II independents, in addition to seven with other teams from California to

Idaho and to Victoria, B.C.

THE BRUINS—AS INDIVIDUALS



JIM BLAKE, a transfer from Eastern Arizona Junior College, at 6-7 is the tallest member on the squad and will add strength to the center position this year. Blake, a junior, is a product of Sahauro High School in Tucson, Ariz. His team was state AAA champion his senior year and Blake shot at a .760 field goal percentage and a .750 free throw level.



DEL DITTUS, a sophomore from Quincy, Wash., is starting his second season with the Bruins as a forward. He saw limited action last season on the varsity squad, but for the Bruin Jayvees he averaged 14.6 points a game. He also had an impressive 12.6 rebound average. Ditus in high school was named the Most Improved Player during his senior year and was selected to the honorable men-

ing his senior year and was selected to the honorable mention all-Washington team. Dittus, an honors student, also lettered in football and track while in high school.



ED FIELDS starts his third year of cage action with the Bruins and is a co-captain this year. Fields, playing the center and forward positions, last year was the top playmaker with 71 assists recorded. He swiped 140 rebounds from the opposition, and carried an 8.0 scoring average. Fields has proved a versatile asset to Bruin sports in both baseball and basketball. The

Sunnyside, Wash., senior who Valuable Player Award for baseball, was selected as one of the winners of the Most Inspirational trophy in basket-ball, and was named honorary captain of the cage sport. A top baseball pitcher drafted out of high school by the eligibility, will serve as assistant baseball coach this year.



KEN GREENMAN brought with him a winning tradition last year, and it helped the Bruins to a winning season. In two years of high school ball (Mt. Miguel, San Diego) his teams won 64 out of 65, including all 32 played his senior year. He had a personal high of 40 points in a single game. Greenman, before becoming a Bruin, played for a Mesa Junior College team that won 22 while losing only 7. He

averaged 13.6 points a game while leading the team in assists. He set a school shooting percent record of .580. Last year Greenman, a guard for the Bruins, scored an average of 6.8 points a game with a .478 shooting average.



SAMMY IBARRA, a native of El Paso, Texas, and a transfer from Arizona Western, will be playing his third season for the Bruins. Short on height, Ibarra is long on point production, leading the team in scoring two years ago with an average of 14.7 points a game and finishing second in the scoring column last year with an 11.1 average. Ibarra, a guard, led the Bruins in ball interceptions last year with

39, shot at a .420 clip from the floor and .697 at the charity line. Ibarra, with a 3.30 grade average, was named to "Outstanding Athletes of America" last spring and also was named as an NAIA District II scholar-athlete.



STEVE STRUTZ is a freshman from Billings (Montana) Senior High School, where he was an all-city first team selection, picked to the all-conference team by opposing coaches, and was his team's Most Inspirational Player. Playing at the guard position, he averaged 7.0 points a game with a shooting percentage of .350. Strutz, expected to be a Bruin guard, was a member of his high school honor society

and president of the Montana Evangelical Church of North America youth group. He also lettered in football and track.



CRAIG TAYLOR, team cocaptain, averaged 10.3 points a game for the Bruins last season and is back again at the forward position. A transfer a year ago from Big Bend Community College, where he carried a 16.8 scoring average and collected 10 rebounds a game, Taylor immediately went to work for the Bruins, bringing down 161 rebounds during the season and assisting on 48 buckets. He was

an all-conference choice and team captain at Big Bend. Taylor, from Caldwell, Idaho, also is a top baseball player, and the left-hander will be the team's top hope on the mound.



PHIL VARCE returns to the court after a year of resting a bad knee. He started the 1970-71 season on both the jayvee and varsity squads before his injury. Varce brings an impressive high school record from Oregon City High School. He was captain and leading scorer his senior year, averaging 14.0 points a game with a .500 shooting eye. His efforts earned him a slot on the all-league team.

Varce scored a personal high of 40 points in his first Bruin jayvee game of the 1970-71 season. A senior, Varce has been a shortstop for the Bruin baseball team for the past three seasons.



RAY WILLIS, a sophomore transfer from Kansas State Junior College, will add strength to both the forward and guard positions. Willis, a 6-5 native of Los Angeles, will provide some flashy ball handling and excellent outside shooting. As a senior at Fremont High School in Los Angeles, Willis carried a 16.2 per game scoring average along with 11 rebounds and won triple awards for his achievements:

Most Inspirational, Most Improved, and Most Valuable.



ROB WUNDER, a transfer from Highline Community College in Seattle this year, brings with him a .520 field goal shooting percentage and a .730 charity stripe percentage. Wunder last season averaged 13.2 points a game and 8.0 rebounds at the center position. The Seattle junior was elected to the second team all-metro squad and was given honorable mention on the all-state tournament team in

high school. He helped his West Seattle High School team amass a winning streak of 21 games while winning the league championship and placing fourth in the Washington state tournament.



Trainer for this year's Bruin squad is FRANK KYTE, a 1971 graduate of Highland High School in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Kyte, a sophomore, is a Bible-Christian Education major who spent the last summer learning his new duties, which include keeping the Bruins together physically with many hours and yards of taping.



Manager for the team is HOWIE LOEWEN, a native of Upland, Indiana. Loewen, a sophomore and a liberal arts major, played jayvee ball last year and is out this year with a knee injury. As an Air Force player, Loewen was selected in 1968-69 to the USAF all-star team, averaging 21 points and 16 rebounds a game. His duties include seeing that Bruin equipment arrives safely, intact, and on time for all games.
