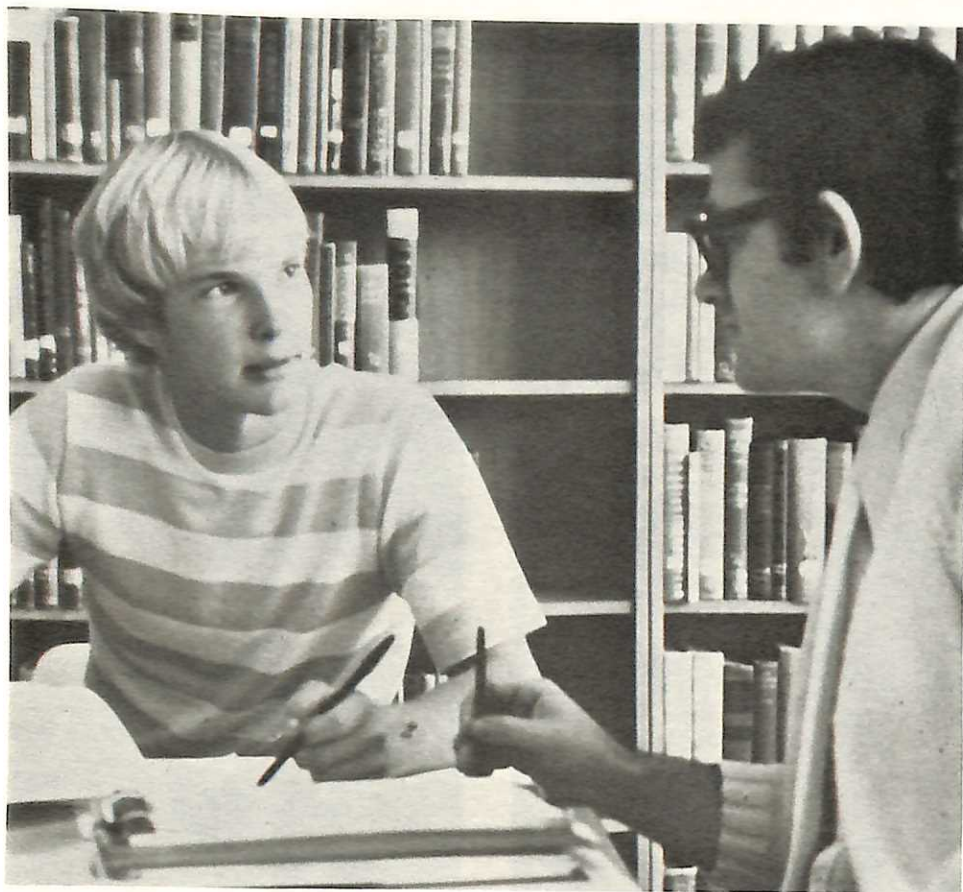

## Enrollment Establishes Record; New Students Increase by 12%

George Fox College enrollment is at an all-time record of 481 students. Total enrollment is up 4 percent from 463 a year ago and tops the previous record of 472 set in 1971.

The 481-enrollment figure does not include persons registered for first-term classes at George Fox's Kotzebue, Alaska, Center established two years ago.

The largest increase in students is at the freshman level, where there's a 10

percent jump from 177 to 193. There are 121 sophomores, 76 juniors, 84 seniors and seven part-time students.

A nearly 12 percent growth is reported in the number of new students. Freshmen and transfer students totaled 211, up from 188 fall term last year.

The enrollment growth has filled all campus residence halls with many students living in college-owned housing near the campus.

## National Faculty Development Film Produced on George Fox Campus

A program to aid faculty development at colleges around the nation was videotaped on the George Fox campus Oct. 16.

Guest participant was Dr. Harold I. Hodgkinson, research educator at the Center for Research and Development in Higher Education, University of California at Berkeley. He delivered a paper, "Psychological Development of Men in Early Adulthood and Mid-Life Transition."

Following his address George Fox faculty and staff members were taped as they participated in a question and answer session with Hodgkinson.

The faculty professional develop-

ment project was sponsored by the national Christian College Consortium based in Washington, D.C. On hand for the project was the organization's executive director, Gordon Werkema.

The professionally produced film is to be edited and circulated to members of the consortium and the national Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges.

Hodgkinson's paper concerned the developmental stages of man leaving his family (16-24), getting into the adult world (22-29), settling down (30-38), midlife transition (39-43) and restabilization and flowering (43-50).

## Financial Aid Program Enables Education for Many

How do so many students find they can pay the tuition costs at private colleges today?

With tuition now at about \$1,800, from where does the money come to keep a record number of students at George Fox?

Part of the answer is in the amount of financial aid available to students. That aid ranges from scholarships to grants, loans and promises of employment.

"Virtually every student in the college who can demonstrate need for assistance is awarded the amount of aid that will enable him to attend the college," is the way Harold Ankeny, financial aids director at GFC puts it.

The college this year will financially aid nearly 75 percent of its 481 students. And those students will share in a financial "pot" containing more than \$429,000 this academic year.

How can a college afford the cost of helping? The answer lies in the

variety of state, Federal and individual gifts, grants and loans available.

George Fox this year will give nearly a quarter of its total, more than \$100,000, in direct scholarships. That aid comes to the student depending on his or her academic, music, athletic or extracurricular activities and abilities. Many of the scholarships are named for individuals who back the fund, and the awards range from \$200 to \$600 with \$21,500 given in this manner.

In addition, the college will super-serve more than \$70,000 in National Direct Student Loan funds. The Federal loan program allows parents and students to borrow from their local bank for educational purposes, based on eligibility, with the government backing the loan.

"The college encourages students and their parents to use loan funds because these, unlike scholarship grant funds, do not subtract from the resources that support the program of the college," Ankeny says.

## Consortium Director Opens George Fox's 84th Year

"God's creation is the foundation, the beginning, the end and the subject and the object of Christian higher education," is the way Dr. Gordon Werkema puts it.

And he ought to know, for Werkema is executive director of the national Christian College Consortium. Werkema made the remarks as guest speaker at the Oct. 16 Fall Convocation program formally starting George Fox College's 84th year.

"How we look at God's creation and what we do with it and how we deal with our fellow image bearers, how we look at God's world are the most essential components of education which is integrally Christian," Werkema said.

"This is our Father's world, and we have a task to do in it. That thought should dominate our mind-shaping efforts," Werkema told the audience of more than 500. Werkema became head of the 12-member Washington, D.C., based college association in July.

Werkema said education that is truly Christian involves the investigation of all of the world. "All of the disciplines are worthy of intense scrutiny and re-shaping by the Christian mind."

Explaining Christian college concepts followed by George Fox and others in the consortium, Werkema said that it "begins with God, rather than man . . . the whole unfolding of the Scriptures provides a biblical subject and direction for our educational endeavors."

The former president of the national Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges said God told man to subdue the earth, "a scientific and educational charge."

"Our investigations and study about man in God's world take on a new significance as we realize that we are looking at man as an image bearer of

God who went away—but now has endless possibilities of service as a new creature," Werkema said.

He said there are no limits to what those Christianly educated can study, although prudence and wisdom and the exercise of priorities will require some choices.

"The world needs Christian education today because we have lost our direction as we have become directed manward rather than Godward," Werkema told the audience.

George Fox became a member of the Christian College Consortium in January, the only Oregon college chosen, and the third on the West Coast.

sis of a Parents Confidential Statement (PCS), a questionnaire about finances provided by the CSS.

"Every student is urged to choose the college that offers him the best opportunity to develop his interests and abilities," Ankeny says.

Freshmen at George Fox are eligible for a \$10,000 honors awards fund, based on grade average, with individual amounts ranging from \$300 to \$700. Students continuing on the honors program share in another \$31,000.

As with most colleges, athletic achievements do not just happen. George Fox this year will award \$22,000 to 32 men and women (an average of \$687 each) for competing in basketball, baseball, track, hockey, softball and volleyball.

Another \$4,000 is awarded to top students in music with 21 receiving grants ranging from \$150 to \$200.

# Fourteen Positions Filled On GFC Board of Trustees

Fourteen positions on the 42-member George Fox College Board of Trustees have been filled by the Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, the college's founding body.

Of the positions, 11 are reappointments and three persons will be new to the board. With three-year terms, a third of the board positions are filled each year.

New members are James Miller, Beaverton, the former owner of Cascadia Lumber Co., whose son Paul is a 1969 graduate; Dick Beebe, a 1951 GFC graduate, who is principal of the Crow-Applegate-Lorane Elementary Schools near Eugene; and Kara Cole, Portland, director of corporate communications for ICN United Medical Laboratory, Portland.

Miller was nominated by the college board itself as one of its 18 representatives, and Mrs. Cole, a 1958 GFC graduate, was picked by the Yearly Meeting as one of its 18 representatives.

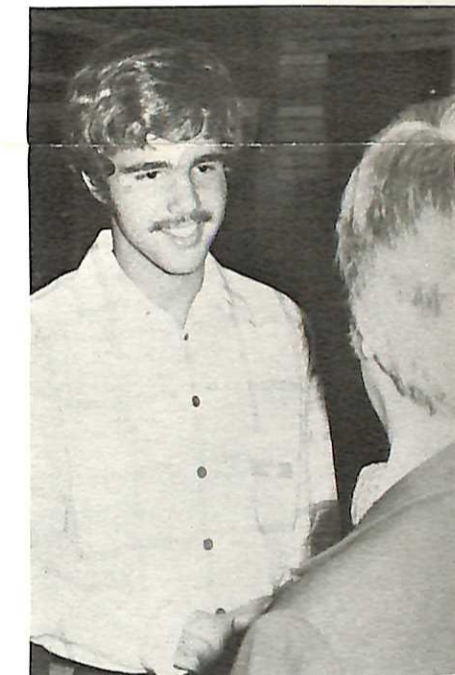
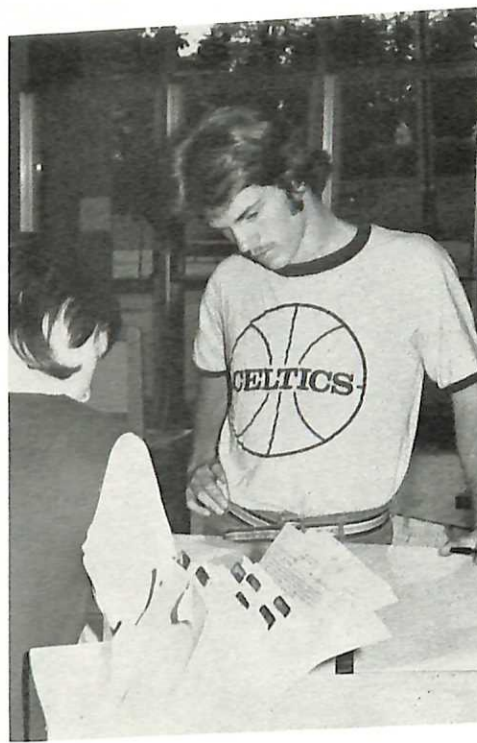
Returned to the board after one year absence was Thelma Martin, a Caldwell, Idaho, businesswoman who previously served seven years on the board. Also reconfirmed were Eliza-

beth Edwards, a Newberg homemaker and the wife of Gerald Edwards, president of Willamina Clay Products; Dr. Stanley Kern, a Newberg physician; David Leach, pastor of the Seattle Memorial Friends Church, and Floyd Watson, a Eugene bank executive.

The alumni representative returning is Norman Winters, a member of the GFC class of 1953, who is superintendent of the Melba, Idaho, School District.

Reappointed by the Yearly Meeting are Ivan Adams, a Portland banking official; Wilbert Eichenberger, executive director of the Robert H. Schuller Institute of Successful Church Leadership in Garden Grove, California; Philip Harmon, an insurance broker in Seattle; Jack Willcuts, pastor of the Reedwood Friends Church in Portland, and Keith Sarver, general superintendent of California Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, Whittier, California.

Board member ratification was made at the 92nd annual conference of the organization of 59 churches and 7,500 members in Oregon, Washington and Idaho. Sessions were held on the college campus.



## Administrative Staffs and Offices Change Places in Building Shuffle

Like a game of musical chairs but with everyone coming out a little better at the end, the offices and staffs of many administrative departments at George Fox College have been re-located.

Students returning to campus this fall have found a major reshuffling of offices in the administration building, Wood-Mar Hall. Changes started in midsummer and finished in October with the opening of a new office for financial aids director, Harold Ankeny, who also serves as director of institutional research. His is the only new office; it is located on the bottom floor of the building in an area formerly used as a print shop.

Ankeny moved from his position and office as dean of student affairs. That space, along with the former office of Chaplain Ron Crecelius, is now occupied by the college's Admissions Office headed by Jim Settle. Crecelius has moved to a new headquarters one floor lower in space formerly occupied by the religion de-

partment. The other former religion department offices are now used by new Dean of Student Affairs Gene Habecker and his staff.

The religion department has been moved down the hall on the same lower level into space formerly occupied by the institutional research director.

Former Admissions Office space has been taken over by an expansion of the Registrar's Office and a new office for Roy Clark, director of the college's continuing education division. The registrar's old office is now used as a faculty conference and reading room.

In the multioffice changeover, improvements also have been made to the basement floor of Wood-Mar Hall, constructed in 1911. New restrooms have been created and the lower hallway refinished.

Students and visitors are being advised to read door signs before stepping in to be sure if that is really the office they want.

## College to Share in \$100,000 Grant

A \$100,000 Federal grant has been awarded to George Fox in a cooperative program with Warner Pacific College in Portland.

The colleges will share the Federal Title Three funds through their cooperation in the Associated Christian Colleges of Oregon.

The Federal funding is awarded to assist developing colleges make a more significant contribution to the needs of society.

Five programs at George Fox will benefit from the grant, according to President David Le Shana. The grant will be used to support an expanded program of recruitment of minority students, will fund a media instruction, and will back a visiting scholar program in which a professor is brought to campus to develop programs.

It also will support personnel for a business-economics major at George Fox and will provide continued funding for a program of research.

## Auxiliary Plans Lighting Project

Help on a \$2,000 project for new lighting for the college's main auditorium will be this year's project for the George Fox College Women's Auxiliary.

Organization members hope to raise \$1,000 by next spring on the project, which will include a new dimming system for the Wood-Mar Auditorium stage.

The project was announced at the auxiliary's first meeting of the new school year.

Money is raised through a Christmas Bazaar sponsored this year on Dec. 6 and 7. The sale, now the city's largest, features handcrafted clothing, toys, decorations and food for Christmas giving.

Theme for the auxiliary this year is "Getting to Know You," and each meeting will feature a different division of the college with faculty members spotlighted to show them as "real people," according to auxiliary program chairman, Darlene Graves.

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# PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

**GEORGE FOX COLLEGE**  
Newberg, Oregon

A year of successes! That may be the best way to describe the 1973-74 fiscal year for George Fox College. A complete report of the achievements during the college's 83rd year would be a lengthy one and a testimony of a team of committed persons—from the trustees to the administrators, the faculty, staff and students—but most of all it would be a testimony to God's leadership and faithfulness.

Many of the highlights and achievements have been recorded in the various issues of *LIFE!* you have received during the period and need not be repeated. But these stand out as specific high points during the year:

## Academic Affairs

The academic year was noted for the college's acceptance in January as the 12th member of the national Christian College Consortium. George Fox is only the third college on the West Coast selected for membership, which is expected to enhance the future effectiveness of the college through its cooperation with other leading evangelical Christian liberal arts colleges in the nation with emphasis upon the integration of faith and learning.

Countering the national trend, George Fox during the last year continued on its upward enrollment climb, with a 7.5 percent increase to 463. Altogether 30 denominations were represented on campus with students coming from 17 states and eight foreign countries.

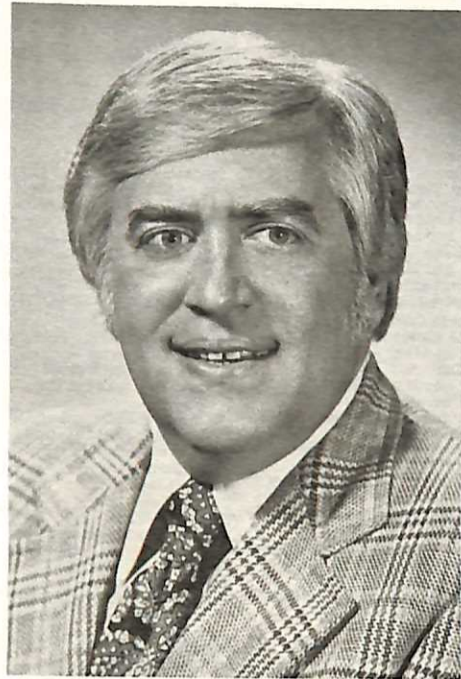
An initial offering of eight courses fall term launched the college's new Continuing Education Program of evening courses for Newberg area adults. Special lower fees were established, registration procedures were made easier, and courses were selected with the adult part-time student in mind, using GFC professors and expert professionals in various fields for specific courses.

In the spring George Fox was awarded complete approval to its teacher education programs by the Oregon Teachers Standards and Practices Commission. Approval enables GFC graduates from the 12 programs to teach in secondary schools. All programs requested were approved.

Extensive travel and three weeks in the Holy Land was the theme for the fourth annual GFC summer tour. Open for those interested in college credit or those just sight-seeing, the tour schedule included London, Rome, Athens, Tel Aviv, Zurich, Copenhagen, and the special three-week Holy Land study stop.

In June the academic year ended with the awarding of degrees to 82 seniors.

The heart of the academic area, of course, is the faculty, and George Fox students are taught by dedicated in-



dividuals, more than half with earned doctorates. Their individual and collective commitment to the concepts of Christian higher education has helped set a pace for Christian colleges.

## Religious Life and Student Affairs

Where do you begin in describing a George Fox student and his daily life? Perhaps it's with the commitment and concern shown throughout the year in many ways.

In January, the Missions Conference featured a dozen missions representatives, and students in a concluding program pledged and later raised more than \$2,000 to send seven George Fox students around the world as summer missionaries.

Students have also become widely known for their helping activity; during the year they organized blood drives, spontaneously helped "winterize" the home of a nearby elderly couple unable to do so, participated in a program to teach music to grade schoolers, counseled students at camps, held a Christmas party for mentally retarded students in local schools and spent hundreds of hours on weekends traveling as deputation teams to churches and organizations throughout the Northwest.

All of that in addition to normal collegiate events ranging from sold-out musicals and drama performances, to championship-caliber ball teams with the basketball squad coming within one point of a second straight national championship tournament berth in NAIA action! In May the band performed for the World's Fair in Spokane, and

in early June the choir, with students raising their own money, toured in Europe to present sacred concerts to military bases, churches and schools.

## Development/Property and Finance

Exciting is the word to describe the last fiscal year as George Fox continued to go against national trends by operating soundly in the black. Liabilities were reduced by nearly \$125,000, and total assets of the college rose nearly \$400,000. The college finished the year with \$32,000 to the good out of a budget of more than \$1.7 million.

Excitement also comes from the continued financial support of George Fox College by its many friends. A \$200,000 gift in March has been designated for helping in the start of a drive for a new Chapel-Fine Arts building, to be a recycling of the present gymnasium through its expansion and remodeling.

With funds from a \$620,000 gift a year ago, a new campus master plan was compiled by a professional firm with input from students, faculty, administration, alumni and board members. It outlines plans for campus growth and improvement to handle an eventual student body of 800 to 1,000

students. That same gift also has launched a drive for a new Sports-Physical Education center, and noted architect Pietro Belluschi, renowned for his work in wood designs, has prepared designs for the new complex for which fund raising is now underway.

Although only a brief summary, I hope you have caught a glimpse of George Fox College during our last year. It has been one of people, programs and planning. But in a far more specific way, we must acknowledge the leadership of the Lord Jesus Christ. He has worked through people; He has manifested Himself in the programs; He has superintended the planning. We are grateful for the faithfulness of our Lord as we have endeavored to serve Him. Jesus Christ is not the primary reason for the existence of George Fox College—He is the solitary reason.

The individual and organized financial and prayer support of George Fox College by its many friends noted in the following Honor Roll is appreciated greatly.

Your continued support in this work of the Lord is encouraged.

## GFC's Arthur Roberts Authors New Poem Collection Volume

A collection of 78 poems, many of them referring to Newberg and Oregon persons and places, is now in print by George Fox College professor, Arthur O. Roberts.

The 112-page book is the collection of six years of writings by Roberts, a professor of religion and philosophy at the college. The volume is titled *Listen to the Lord* and is published by Barclay Press, Newberg.

Included in the volume are works previously accepted for publishing in such national magazines as *Christianity Today*, *The Banner*, *Evangelical Friend*, *Friends Journal* and *Quaker Life*.

Four sections compose the book: "Ecstasy Interpreted," "Love Tributes," "The Age of Metal," and "Listen to the Lord."

The foreword to the book is written by Dr. Michael Graves, George Fox associate professor of communication arts, who says, "These poems by Arthur Roberts recall and give fresh impetus to the Renaissance dictum that poetry should both teach and delight."

A 1974 GFC graduate, Hiroshi Iwaya, Tokyo, Japan, provided pictures for the book.

The new volume is the fourth for Roberts, a 1944 GFC graduate who has been a George Fox faculty member since 1953, the last two years as the Charles Replogle Memorial Professor. Previous books have been *Through Flaming Sword*, a spiritual biography of George Fox; *Move Over, Elijah*, sermons in poetry and prose; and *Early Quaker Writings*, which he coauthored with Hugh Barbour.

## Alaskan Robert Sheldon First On Both George Fox Campuses

Robert Sheldon is making George Fox his home this winter, but he's a little unhappy about having to give up his hunting.

It's not that the Newberg area is too far from deer, but that's not Sheldon's normal game. Sheldon, 18, is more used to bagging white whales, seals and caribou.

Sheldon also is experiencing some other major changes while getting used to life in Newberg—weather, the pace of life, and the number of young persons.

A resident of Kotzebue, Alaska, all his life, Sheldon is the first student to come to George Fox College from its three-year-old Alaskan branch in the far north city of 1,740.

The son of full-blooded Eskimo parents, Sheldon is one of nine children in his family. He hopes to see them again at Christmas time during class break, but in the meantime he's enjoying his new-found surroundings.

The extended fall weather, also admired by many Oregonians, was particularly unusual to Sheldon, who says his homeland was at the same time snow-covered and the ocean beginning to freeze on the beach fronts.

This winter Sheldon will be missing temperatures that frequently fall to 40

below zero and at times have slid to a wind-chill factor of 120 below. He is not missing that, but he is missing a hobby and also a job—hunting. That's been one of his jobs for years and helped earn him college funds this summer, in addition to serving as a tourist guide to the isolated village.

Sheldon also admits the whale, seal and caribou meat is missed as a food. "I could get tired of hamburgers pretty quick," Sheldon replies to the all-American favorite in the lower 48 states.

A 3.3 grade average student in high school in Kotzebue, Sheldon became acquainted with the college 3,000 miles from home through its Kotzebue center where he took a course in music fundamentals taught by program director Roy Clark.

Now majoring in music education Sheldon says he picked George Fox because of its "strong music program and Christian emphasis" and has found another bonus here—young people his age.

In Kotzebue where his father is a power plant operator and his family helps hunt and fish for food, Sheldon did not have the company of as many friends his age as he is finding now where he is surrounded by 480 nearly his age.

Despite the changes Sheldon is right at home with another of his favorite hobbies. Like many young Americans, he plays the guitar and finds it fits in both cultures.

## Dr. Michael Graves Tabbed for Award

George Fox professor Michael Graves has been named an Outstanding Educator of America for 1974.

Graves, associate professor of speech communication, has been at George Fox for the last two years, teaching basic speech courses and classes in communication and assisting with the college's speech and drama organizations.

He received his bachelor's and master's degrees from California State College at Los Angeles and received his doctorate from the University of Southern California in 1972.

A writer of poetry and songs, Graves has had works published by *Christian Century*, *Faith at Work*, and *Quaker Life*.

Graves was selected for the national honors publication on basis of talents in classroom, contributions to research, administrative abilities, civic service and professional recognition.

# Bruin Basketballers Ready For 29-Game Schedule

George Fox College, NAIA District 2's top basketball independent, will strive for its fifth straight playoff appearance in a 29-game slate of the state's independents, Northwest Conference and Evergreen Conference schools.

Athletic director and basketball coach, Lorin Miller, announced the schedule. Practice for the 74-75 season started October 15.

The Bruins will meet four Northwest Conference teams (Willamette, Linfield, Pacific and Whitworth) in the regular season for eight home-and-home contests, will compete with three Evergreen schools (Eastern Oregon, Southern Oregon, and Oregon Tech) in six contests, and will challenge three other independents (Northwest Nazarene, Warner Pacific and Western Baptist) in six games. In addition the Bruins will have six games against four nondistrict schools.

In the schedule for the first time is the University of Redlands. The Bruins will meet the California team Feb. 4 in Newberg. In addition Miller's crew will reengage the NCAA University of Puget Sound Loggers in a contest in Tacoma Jan. 11.

The Bruins will travel north Jan. 24 and 25 for a pair of games with the University of Alaska in Fairbanks, and also tangle again with District 1 Lewis and Clark State College of Lewiston, Idaho, for a home-and-home series.

George Fox will have 12 home games and 17 on the road in 13 cities in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Alaska. All home games will start at 7:30 p.m. with the exception of the Homecoming game with Northwest Nazarene at 8 p.m. Feb. 15.

The Bruins were district champions in 1973 and last spring lost by one point in the championship game with Oregon Tech in their bid for a second straight trip to Kansas City for the NAIA nationals.

Last season the Bruins were 19-11, winning 11 of their last 13 outings, including one stretch of eight wins in a row.

Prospects for this season are equally as good, according to Miller.

## Home Ec Women Visit Area Homes

A plan to give Newberg home-makers a chance to show their expertise in home skills is being launched this fall by George Fox College home economics professor, Virginia King.

Under the plan Newberg women with skills or ideas for better home management are being invited to participate in a program to pass their knowledge to college coeds in home economics classes.

The volunteers will be invited to show the girls, in their own homes, how they operate their households. Newberg homes, in effect, would become "classrooms" for the coeds.

The program is part of the home economics department training that emphasizes methods of simplifying everyday chores for more efficiency and faster completion of work.

Being studied in the home management course under Miss King are the management of space (how objects can be better used and located); motion (how physical movements can be coordinated and conserved); time (how it can be best used); and money (how to make it do the most).

Although the home management course is a spring term offering, Miss King says families will be used beginning this fall to share their knowledge with the students. "We think this can be a mutual learning experience," Miss King says.

Drama students are similarly awarded financial aid.

Other students have assignments and duties to complete to be eligible for their financial help. Student assistants to professors in the various divisions earn from \$250 to \$500 for their help, and "resident assistants," students in charge of specific dormitory living groups, are paid \$350 to \$450 for their services.

Those funds come out of a total of \$93,000 the college will spend to provide campus jobs for students who carry out tasks ranging from lawn mowing and janitorial duties to mimeographing and kitchen help.

Government funds play a big role. Oregon students at George Fox this year will be helped to the tune of nearly \$50,000 through the Oregon State Scholarship Commission.

Federal participation is even greater. Up to \$48,000 will be made available through the Federal-sponsored Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, and another \$65,000 through Basic Educational Opportunity Grants.

And that's why, even though the financial costs compared to tax-supported public and community colleges are higher at George Fox, enrollment is still climbing.
