GOD'S CALL INTO SERVICE.

(By Rev. Carl F. Miller, Springbrook.)

Dean Church says: "One great part of the history of the Bible is the history of calls."

The call from God comes through Jesus Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit to men who are saved and walking in all the light that God sheds upon their paths. Jesus said: "Follow me and I will make you fishers of men." Their becoming successful fishers of men depended upon a close walk with Jesus. A vital factor in the service of God is that the one called must know the Gospel by experience.

Samuel P. Spreng says: "Angels could not preach effectively because they have no experience, and cannot have, of sin and salvation." It takes a saved sinner to tell the story of Jesus and his power to keep men from sin.

First comes the call to salvation then the call to service.

The writer agrees with other ministers who have said, in most prominent cases the men who are called to preach the Gospel were intended for the ministry from their birth. The cases of Moses, Samuel, Isaiah, Jeremiah and Ezekiel, of John the Baptist and Paul are conspicuous examples and proofs of this. Paul testifies to this in a remarkable passage: Gal. 1:15, 16. "It pleased God, who separated me from my mother's womb, and called me by his Grace, to reveal his son in me, that I might preach him among the heathen."

If the true ministers of the Gospel knew the story of their own infancy, or if their mothers had told them all they knew, they would discover that many, if not all of them, were mentally and perhaps prenatally chosen for the special calling of the Gospel Ministry.

The knowledge of the call belongs to the deep, vital experiences which group themselves around conversion. Moses knew not of his call till at the burning bush. Isaiah kew it first through his vision at the temple. Paul knew it first in the moment of his conversion on the road to Damascus.

The God who changes not calls in the same way today. The call comes to the listening ear and the attentive heart. As a rule the call comes to the young. Of course there is no hard and fast rule on this point. Moses was eighty years old when the Lord met him at the burning bush. Paul must have been past thirty when he saw Jesus on the road to

Damascus. On the other hand Samuel was but a child when the Lord called him. Isaiah was a young man in the twenties when he had his vision. Jeremiah and Ezekiel were youths when they began their prophetic careers.

George Fox says: "In my very young years I had a gravity and stayedness of mind and spirit not usual in children," and "The work of the Lord was begun and gradually carried on in me even from my childhood." George Fox was from twenty-two to twenty-five years old when he began to preach that no one can come to Christ but as the spirit of God leads him, so those who teach or seek to help others in spiritual things can only do so as they are taught and directed by the Holy Spirit.

No man has a right in the ministry who is not called and chosen of God, the great head of the church. No church has a right to lay hands upon any man who has not the divine sanction, and no man can be expected to succeed in the ministry who is not in it by divine appointment. He may succeed as an orator, or as an oragnizer; he may be able to draw the crowds; but he must have higher credentials than that. Newton has well said: "None but He who made the world can make a minister of the Gospel." Success in life depends upon one being in his Godappointed place. To enter the ministry without being divinely called is as grave a mistake as to refuse to enter when you are called.

Jesus said: "Pray ye the Lord of the harvest that he will thrust forth more laborers." I wonder sometimes if the church has not forgotten her part and is sending forth the laborers instead of praying the Lord to send them forth.

There are none for whom I feel a more profound sympathy than the young people who are passing through the crucial stage of their lives; when they come to the parting of the ways when conflicting interests clamor for their attention; when all of their cherished thoughts and ambitions are challenged.

When God calls to His service and they feel the hand of authority laid upon them; when the sacred call to God's service confronts them and pulls up by the roots all of their plans; if ever they need sympathetic help and the prayer of the church it is then.

It seems increasingly difficult for young men and women in our day to yield to the call of God. Everybody wants the young man and the young woman, especially if they be bright, intelligent and capable. The allurements

of the secular professions, the opportunities of a business life are very strong. They appeal to the young life.

In these days when colossal wealth is so often the reward of a few years of effort, it takes special devotion, a spiritfilled life, to yield to the call to a service that offers absolutely no chance for money making. But I want to say to the noble young men and women of our church who are preparing themselves for life's work, there is something better than gold, and that is to see men and women coming down the isle of the church burdened with a load of sin, kneel at the altar, meet the great burden-bearer, have the load lifted, their sins forgiven, made new creatures in Christ Jesus, all because you were faithful in declaring a full Gospel.

God calls men who have the necessary talent and natural fitness for ministry. He never calls any to preach who cannot learn to preach. The one who is to preach must have the gift of speech in some degree. It may be that the gift which God has bestowed is dormant, undeveloped and therefore unknown, and it will take some Paul who will say "stir up the gift of God that is in thee." I feel that my own experience will bear me out in this statement. One night several years ago, while riding home from camp meeting and talking with Eric Fritz about my work in the future he said "You will preach the Gospel." I felt the same way, but doubted my ability. This man of God encouraged me to stir up the gift of God. If this article is the means, in God's hands, to cause some precious young person to hear His voice calling him into the service of the King my heart will rejoice, because God wants the whole man, the whole life, the whole service.

It is wonderful what God can do with comparatively unpromising talent.

Phillips Brooks stammered so badly that it discouraged him in entering the ministry, yet he overcame that and became a great preacher. Bud Robinson, when converted, could neither read nor write. But in these cases inefficiency was apparent rather than real.

I want to say the final proof of one being called of God, is not popularity not that he holds certain places of authority, but sinners saved through his ministry.

In most cases when a man is called the church will discover it, and that without the young man having to proclaim it from the house top. The same Spirit of God who moves upon his heart operates

Just a word to those who feel called into God's service. The call to preach is a call to preparation. The times demand an educated ministry. The time when men can go from the plow and the shop into the pulpit is past; that is if he is to be a successful minister. God may call men who are ignorant, but He does not send them into the pulpit first, but to school, that school may be in his own home. He calls them first to prepare and qualify themselves by a course of training and study. The man who cannot study or learn, and is not willing to try, I fear he is not called to preach, not fit to preach and never will be. Paul said to Timothy: "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

Working in God's service requires the most consummate skill and power. It enlists the highest intelligence and taxes the trained mind to its unmost. So if the Lord wants a man or woman to preach He also wants them to get ready.

Come a little nearer dear young people, you who feel God calling you and are

afraid you will not be provided for. Listen and you will hear the words of the One who has called you: "I will supply all your need according to my riches in glory by Jesus Christ." Step out on the promises and you will have joy unspeakable and full of glory as you respond to the call into God's service.
