HOW IT LOOKS FOR 1980

A year ago George Fox College literally ran away with the NAIA District 2 track title, with the Bruins claiming the title by the largest margin ever.

The GFC squad rolled up 201½ points, besting their nearest competitor by 79½. The Bruins took first in 9 of 23 events after not losing to a district opponent all season.

With that background Coach Rich Allen says he doesn't intend to ease off in the district battle this year.

"We've been at the top and we certainly will not attempt anything less," says Allen, GFC track boss for 10 years.

"We have an ability to compete and are demonstrating that early," he says. "We expect to compete at the highest level."

When he says the Bruins are demonstrating early, he has proof. In a preseason tuneup at the Linfield Icebreaker the Bruins qualified 15 men in 13 events for the district championships in late May.

Allen says he doesn't expect a runaway as last year for the track title, but he's still confident of the Bruins' chances for a repeat title.

"We have some good kids; we graduated some really fine seniors and the new ones will have to come through, but I expect them all to do well," he says.

There will be some changes for the Bruins, who finished second in the district twice in a row before earning the crown last spring. The Bruins have lost some sprint strength via the graduation of Gregg Griffin, district champion for three straight years in the 100 and 200. And missing also will be national steeplechase champion Steve Blikstad.

But that's not despair for Allen. "We'll be better in the pole vault, javelin, long jump, and as good or better in the hurdles," Allen predicts.

And he's not looking down in the sprints, either. "We just have a lack of proven sprinters," he says, with the emphasis on the proven.

Some of the Bruins' hope is in junior Wendell Otto, who last spring was eighth in the nation in the 1,500 meters and is expected to come back even stronger. "I think he can run there [NAIA Nationals] and really produce."

Allen begins his 1980 track campaigning with a record 27 athletes.



THE BRUINS—AS INDIVIDUALS

MONTE ANDERS

Coholder of the GFC 1,600-meter relay record at 3:18.8, Anders helped the Bruins to first in the district last spring in the event and also to a first finish in the 440 relay at 41.6. He was second in the district in the 400 at 49.0. Born 3-28-56. A religion major.

ALLEN ADDS: "I expect a really fine year; he's running stronger and he has a demonstrated leadership"



JIM BRIGHT

A transfer from Umpqua Community where he earned All-Conference honors, Bright was second in the conference in the 10,000 (32:51) and steeple (9:39) as a freshman. Also a cross-country competitor. Born 7-27-59. A PE major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Jim doesn't really realize how talented he is; when he realizes it and feels more confident he could be one of the best in the district"



TONY CARSON

A javelin thrower for four years in high school, Carson had a best of 186-10, but injuries the last two years before state competition interfered with full competition. Has triple jumped 41-0 and long jumped 20-6. Born 10-25-60. A PE major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Tony has a lot of athletic ability and we're working on techniques"



SCOTT CELLEY

A cross-country runner, Celley was fourth in the district last fall, an All-District designation, running in the NAIA nationals. Last spring he was fifth in the district in the 1,500 at 3:57.8, fifth in the steeplechase at 9:26.8. He has the best of 15:27.6 in the 5,000 and 32:23.2 in the 10,000. Last year's Most Inspirational Player. Born 9-4-60. A business-economics sociology-history major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Scott is a fine competitor and one of our strengths"



ROBERT CLOUD

A freshman, Cloud comes to the Bruins with state finishes in jumping and sprint events. He was third in Oregon AA competition in the long jump at 22-4. He was fourth in the 100 at 11.1 and fifth in the 200 at 22.6. Born 9-1-61. A liberal arts major.

ALLEN ADDS: "I'm looking for good things from Robert; he comes with good marks and good ability and is improving all the time"



JOHN COLE

The district champion for Canby High in 1978, Cole had a 1:58 clocking in the 800 meters. He also helped his team to the district title in the 400 relay. He has a 4:07.7 clocking in the 1,500 meters, a 9:16 in the 3,000 meters, and was a four-year cross-country letterman. Born 3-16-61. A business major.

ALLEN ADDS: "A stress fracture kept him out of cross-country for us, but he's progressing well, and if he gets in good condition I expect him to do very well"



STEVE CURTIS

One of the best hammer throwers in the district, Curtis was third last spring in the event at 141-2, behind two seniors who have graduated. He also has a 134-10 in the discus, and is at 41-3 in the shot. Born 7-28-59. A PE major.

ALLEN ADDS: "He's one of the best in the district in the hammer and is stronger this year with his technique continuing to improve; he's working hard on the shot"



RICK FRISK

One of the outstanding newcomers, Frisk was the Washington State A champion in both the 180 low hurdles (20.2) and 120 high hurdles (15.0). He also has a 10.4 time in the 100 and has long jumped 21-3½. He was his school's MVP in track and last spring was named Male Athlete of the Year. Born 6-10-61. A business major.

ALLEN ADDS: "He's strong; has great tenacity; is very competitive and will contribute to this team"



BRENT HEYDEL

A pole vaulter, Heydel has a 12-6 best, which earned him a seventh place in his high school district last spring. Born 5-5-61. A business major.

ALLEN ADDS: "He's way ahead of where he was last year and should develop into a good vaulter; we're working on his techniques and he's a hard worker who will do well"



LARRY HOLBROOK

With a best of 190-7 in the javelin, Holbrook will compete exclusively in that event for the Bruins. He's only been throwing 1½ years. Born 9-11-61. A biology major.

ALLEN ADDS: "I expect Larry to make up part of a good javelin crew; he'll be a factor to be reckoned with"



CHARLIE KEERAN

With a lifetime best of 167-8 in the discus, Keeran holds the GFC record in the event at 154-11. He missed first in NAIA District 2 last spring by just one inch. In 1978 he was third in the National Junior College Athletic Association with a 164 toss. A transfer a year ago from Lane Community. Born 8-8-58. A PE (Athletic Training) major.

ALLEN ADDS: "He's one of the best around and may also help us in the shot. He's spending a lot of time in the weight room and is getting even stronger"

ROGER MILLER

A potential helper in the discus and shot, Miller had high school bests of 145 in the discus and 41 in the shot. Born 10-2-61. A religion major.

ALLEN ADDS: "A kind of a comer; not great high school marks, but not bad either; has a natural strength and quickness; when his strength is channeled to techniques he'll help us"

BRUCE OBERST

The Bruins' number one vaulter, Oberst was at 13-6 last spring, but had a 14-0 mark in high school. His 11-6 was fourth in the district last year. He's also the team's top decathlon prospect with a 50.8 in the 400, a 172-foot javelin throw, a 55.3 clocking in the 400 hurdles and a 4:15 timing in the 1,500. A team cocaptain. Born 12-16-57. A music/PE major.

ALLEN ADDS: "I expect Bruce to continue to improve; staying healthy is a problem; he's assuming a leadership role for us"

TIM OLDS

Sixth in the district last spring in the 800, Olds has a best of 1:57.3 in the event. He comes from a strong high school background, leading in his district and placing in state in both 400 and 800 runs. Last year was "plagued" with accidents and incidents to keep him from his peak. He was named the cross-country team's Most Inspirational last fall. Born 4-20-60. A liberal arts major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Tim has loads of ability and a lot of speed, and we'll try to extract that from him"



WENDELL OTTO

Probably the Bruins' best hope at national recognition, Otto already has experience at that level of competition. Otto is reigning District 2 champion in both the 800 and 1,500, where he has best times of 1:52.7 and 3:49.7 respectively, both GFC records. The 1,500 timing is equivalent to the District record. The versatile athlete also can triple jump 45 feet and high jump 6-4 and has clocked the 440 in 50.2. But he'll not be in the decathlon in order to concentrate on running. He's also a three-year cross-country runner. Born 10-17-59. A PE major.

ALLEN ADDS: "He may be one of the most gifted athletes in ability that we've ever had; I expect him to represent us well"

KEITH PEARSON

Action for Pearson will be in the 800 and 1,500 distances. Although not new to campus, it'll be his first collegiate competition. He has high school times of 4:24.0 in the mile and 1:56.9 in the 880, bringing State A championship titles in both. Born 6-18-58. A secondary education major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Because he's not competed for such a while, we're still experimenting to see what's his best"

BOB QUIRING

The holder of the GFC high jump record at 6-7 (set last year), Quiring also led the team in the long jump at 21-9. But in both cases he has greater personal bests—23 in the long jump and 6-9¹/₄ in the high jump, both set in high school competition. He's also a high hurdler with a college best of 15.3. Although he did not produce marks as high last year, he was more consistent. Born 2-20-60. A liberal arts major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Bob's a very gifted athlete and I feel one of the best jumpers in the district"

KELLY REYNOLDS

The javelin and shot will be the events for Reynolds, who joins older brother Mark with the Bruins. Kelly brings a 199-6 javelin best from high school and now is learning the techniques of the shot. Born 9-20-61. A psychology major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Kelly is getting bigger and stronger and doing very well; he has a real enthusiasm that pumps everybody up"



MARK REYNOLDS

One of the best sprint men in the district, Reynolds holds the GFC 110 high hurdles record at 14.5 and shares in the 400 relay record (41.3). He comes from a strong high school background where he had a 14.0 time in the high hurdles, second in state AAA competition. Born 11-8-59. A PE (Athletic Training) major.

ALLEN ADDS: "We may use Mark more this year in the sprints than before, although the intermediate hurdles are potentially his best event"



TIM ROCHHOLZ

A distance runner, Rochholz is one of the team's cocaptains. Last year he was third in the district marathon (2:34), fourth in the 10,000 meters (31:43) and seventh in the 5,000 (15:03). He'll see action in the 1,500 and up. Also a cross-country runner. Born 4-12-57. A PE/Health/Teaching major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Tim's a leader of the team, a hard worker and I expect he'll finish higher than last year"



TIM SHERMAN

With best times of 11.1 in the 100 meters and 22.5 in the 200, Sherman will see action in those distances and also the short relay. A two-sport man, he also was captain of the Bruin soccer squad. Is recovering from leg problems. Born 12-5-57. A PE major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Tim has a natural quickness; he's improved every year and I expect he will continue to do so this year"



NOLAN SMITH

Although he won't be giving up triple jump competition, where he has a best of 43-0, Smith will this year be trying the hammer as well. But it will be the 10,000 walk for which Smith will be long remembered. Last year, with less than a week of practice and in his first walk ever, he finished third in the district—on sheer determination. Born 12-30-59. A liberal arts major.

ALLEN ADDS: "He's one of the finest athletes around—remember the walk—and he gives it everything"



STEVE STUART

Back for his senior year, Stuart shares in the GFC 1,600 meter relay record at 3:18.8. He'll run that again, as well as the 800 to 5,000 distances. A four-year cross-country runner, he was the Bruin captain last fall. Born 6-13-57. An interdisciplinary major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Steve has good speed and is regaining the confidence he formerly had and I expect him to be a solid runner this spring"



DUANE SWAFFORD

A speedy hurdler, Swafford was third in the district last spring at 14.7 in the high hurdles, and fifth in the intermediate hurdles at 54.2, leading the team in the event. He also has high jumped 6-1 and will add back-up support there. Born 1-28-58. A PE/Christian Ministries major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Duane is picking up where he left off last year; maturity has added much to his ability and I expect him to place high in both hurdles in the district"



TOM VAN WINKLE

A runner and jumper, Van Winkle will do both for the Bruins. He helped GFC to the 1,600 meter relay title last spring, and to a new school record. He has a best of 1:57.5 in the 800. In high school he long jumped 21-1 and triple jumped 43, but physical problems hampered him last spring. Born 1-25-60. A Math Education major.

ALLEN ADDS: "A tough-luck kid last year, but running well now; he can do a lot of different things and we will allow him to do so"



DAVE WILKINSON

The best triple jumper on the team last year at 44-6, Wilkinson is back in that event exclusively. His 44-10 effort was ninth in Oregon AAA competition two years ago. The sophomore class president at GFC. Born 2-22-60. A liberal arts major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Dave is a real leader and helps us in that respect as well as physically"



JACK WINTER

A distance runner, Winter specializes in the 5,000 and 10,000 distances. A transfer from Umpqua Community, he's also a cross-country runner. Born 6-1-54. A PE teaching major.

ALLEN ADDS: "Jack will give us depth in the distances"

COACH RICH ALLEN

Rich Allen, 1979 NAIA District 2 Track Coach of the Year, is in his 13th season with the Bruins, and it's been an era of success for George Fox College.

From his start in the 1970 season Allen has built up a track program that rivals the best among Northwest small colleges. In his career at George Fox, Allen has produced 16 national competitors in track on the NAIA national level—6 who have won national All-American designation. Two of his thinclads have been named District 2 Athlete of the Year.

And it's more than just individuals that Allen has guided. The George Fox track TEAM last year was the district champion—by the largest margin ever. The Bruins, with 201½ points, bested the second-place finisher by 79½ points. It was a meet and domination that had sportswriters grasping for superlatives for the Bruins. George Fox finished 15th in the nation in the nationals. In the two previous years the Bruins were close runners-up for the district crown.

Allen himself has won honors. In 1978 he was named NAIA District 2 Coach of the Year; the same year he also was named cross-country Coach of the Year and track Coach of the Year.

Allen, associate professor of physical education, has been just as successful with cross-country as track. In 1977 his Bruins won the District 2 title with six men running in the national competition. The last two years the Bruins have been third in the district.

In his GFC career Allen served seven seasons as assistant basketball coach, helping Lorin Miller establish the Bruins as a strong Northwest contender in that sport—going to the district playoffs six of those seven years.

A 1960 graduate of Seattle Pacific, Allen, 40, began his teaching and coaching in Seattle public schools, where he stayed two years before being named athletic director and head football and basketball coach at Salem (Ore.) Academy. He also was track coach during his five-year span and at the same time found time to earn a master's degree from the University of Oregon, received in 1968.

Allen and his wife Flora, a member of the George Fox home economics faculty, are members of the Newberg Free Methodist Church. They have two sons, Mike 15 and Gregg 14.



ABOUT GEORGE FOX COLLEGE

George Fox College is the outgrowth of a desire by early Willamette Valley Quaker settlers who established Pacific Academy in 1885 for the Christian education of their children. The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction for students. In 1949, because of the many colleges in the Northwest with Pacific in their name, the college was renamed George Fox in honor of the founder of the Friends (Quaker) Church. The college is governed by a 42-member Board of Trustees elected by Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, which comprises more than 8,300 members in 57 churches in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho.

Today the 60-acre rural, tree-shaded campus a half-hour drive from Portland is undergoing a major expansion with seven new buildings completed in the last three years with total investment of more than \$6.5 million. The new facilities include a \$2.6 million sports complex, an \$800,000 academic building, two new residence halls in a \$1.25 million project, a \$1.3 million fine arts/religion center, a \$170,000 television center, and a \$520,000 dining commons/student center expansion. A new \$100,000 all-weather track was completed this fall. A new athletic field complex, including baseball field, two softball fields, hockey field, and archery range, is being readied to open for first use this spring.

College enrollment is at a record 734. The college has grown for eight consecutive years, increasing by two-thirds in that span.

Accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, the college offers 20 majors in six divisions: Education, Fine and Applied Arts, Language Arts, Natural Science, Religion, and Social Science. George Fox is one of 13 members of the national Christian College Consortium. The college has a student-faculty ratio of 17/1, with nearly 60 percent of faculty members having doctorates.

George Fox students come from 24 states and 4 foreign countries. Nearly 40 religious denominations are represented on campus.

Alumni of George Fox are primarily in service-oriented vocations of Christian ministries, education, social work, and medical fields. The college's most prominent alumnus is the late President Herbert Hoover, who attended Pacific Academy.

NAIA DISTRICT 2

George Fox College men's athletic teams compete in District 2 of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). Eighteen teams currently make up the district, all but six within the state of Oregon. They include the four members of the Northwest Conference, four members of the Evergreen Conference, and 10 independent schools, including George Fox.

Members of NAIA District 2 are Brigham Young—Hawaii, Chaminade University, College of Idaho, Concordia College, Eastern Oregon State, George Fox, Hawaii Pacific College, Lewis and Clark, Linfield, Northwest Nazarene, Oregon College of Education, Oregon Institute of Technology, Pacific, Southern Oregon, University of Hawaii—Hilo, Warner Pacific, Western Baptist, and Willamette.

GFC ATHLETICS

Intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the overall education program at George Fox. Men's varsity athletic teams represent the college in baseball, basketball, track, soccer, and cross-country.

George Fox College competes as an independent on the varsity level. Its schedules are coordinated with both the Evergreen Conference and the Northwest Conference and with other independents in the Northwest. George Fox is a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), District 2.

Women students compete in field hockey, volleyball, cross-country, basketball, tennis, track, and softball. The college is a member of the Women's Conference of Independent Colleges and the Northwest College Women's Sports Association.

For students not participating in the varsity program, GFC has a complete intramural program including flag football, basketball, volleyball, softball, and tennis.

Athletic facilities include the new Coleman H. Wheeler Center for Sports and Physical Education; Colcord Field, which includes a football/soccer field and new all-weather rubberized track; and tennis courts. A new athletic field complex containing baseball diamond, two softball fields, hockey field, and archery range is under construction, to be completed this school year.

Wheeler Center, completed in 1977 in a \$2.6 million project, includes the James and Lila Miller Gymnasium with three basketball courts and seating for up to 2,700; multipurpose, class, and weight rooms; faculty and administrative offices; handball courts; dressing and therapy rooms.

THE BRUIN NICKNAME

George Fox College is represented by the nickname and mascot "Bruin." But it's not always been so, even though it should have been.

The nickname comes from a real bear captured in 1887 just two years after Pacific Academy (the college's predecessor) was established. The small cub was captured in the coast range foothills west of Carlton when its mother was shot. The young cub was brought to campus by a student and later lived with a faculty member. When it grew to adulthood it was kept in a pit in what is now known as Hess Creek Canyon south of the campus. It escaped one too many times and was turned into steak for the dining table and the hide preserved on a frame and displayed in an early campus museum. When it deteriorated several years later, it was taken to a campus furnace room to be destroyed, but the framework proved a problem in dismantling, so it was left sitting in a corner. Students found the old Bruin skin later and began skirmishes over ownership, a tradition that continued 85 years later. "Bruin Junior," a replica, under a set of guidelines passed down for years, was fought over periodically in class competition with the class able to physically drag the Bruin replica off campus declared the rightful owner until next "flashed."

Even with the Bruin tradition, somewhere along the line, the "Quaker" tag to athletic teams came into popularity with sports-writers because of the college's church affiliation, and that nickname was used, along with a mascot "Foxy George," a little fox with a Quaker hat. Both gained acceptance for a period in the 1950s and 1960s until a vote of faculty, students, and administration in 1970 reinstated the Bruin nickname to its rightful place.

THIS IS WHERE MEETS ARE HELD

George Fox College this year initiates a brand-new \$100,000 all-weather track facility.

The construction project, completed over a nine-month span, has converted the quarter-mile cinder-finish oval of Colcord Field to a metric distance track with rubberized surface.

Lanes have been expanded from six to eight, race starts have been relocated to the northwest corner of the oval from the previous southeast, and a new javelin runway has been provided, along with additional drainage.

The project also gives the college its first steeplechase course. The Bruins' Steve Blikstad last spring won the national NAIA small college steeplechase title, giving the college its first-ever national champion—and he never ran a race at home.

Funds for the new track were raised through a "jog-a-thon" by students, faculty and staff, by direct contributions, and through the college's general budget.

The new track surface is of "C-Trak," an asphalt-bound material designed to meet an extreme of temperatures and moistures. The new track meets all NAIA, AAU and Olympic specifications.

George Fox track Coach Rich Allen calls the new finish "the fastest surface available." Existing pole vault, high jump and long jump areas, with rubberized surfaces previously, have not been changed.

The track project nearly completes a total sports/athletic project started in 1976 and costing more than \$2.5 million. The Coleman Wheeler Sports Center adjacent to the track was opened in 1977. And also being completed this year is a new athletic field complex of two softball diamonds, baseball field, hockey field and archery range.

Colcord Field is named for the late Frank C. Colcord, a former two-term mayor of Newberg and for 35 years a member of the George Fox College Board of Trustees. He was treasurer of the college at the time of his death in 1968.

An alumnus of the college (class of 1921), Colcord was an outstanding basketball player (all-conference) on a team that in 1917 twice defeated Oregon State. He was student body treasurer, president of the Men's Athletic Association, and associate editor of the student newspaper, *The Crescent*. From 1922 to 1963 Colcord was manager of the Newberg office of Portland General Electric.
