CONTAINING THE JAMES AND LILA MILLER GYMNASIUM



George Fox College this season will welcome eight of NAIA District 2's teams to its new sports home—The Coleman H. Wheeler Center for Sports and Physical Education containing the James and Lila Miller Gymnasium. The \$2.4 million, 51,000-square-foot complex was inaugurated during the 1977 District 2 Tip-Off as the Bruins hosted Pacific University in the 7:00 p.m. opener. The gym was also the site of the Tip-Off Championship games Saturday, December 3.

The 116 by 174 foot gymnasium with three basketball courts and seating for up to 2,700 spectators in its 20,184 square feet features all hardwood maple flooring and also provides three volleyball courts and five badminton courts.

Wheeler Center, designed by noted architect Pietro Belluschi to fit with its wooded canyon setting, features athletic administration and faculty offices, a staff room, class, weight and multipurpose rooms on the upper level. On the lower level are concession and ticket areas, dressing rooms, six team rooms, and equipment and storage areas. The building also has upper and lower lobbies and two handball courts.

Constructed over a period of 10 months, the building is now George Fox's largest and one of its most used facilities. The entire center is three times larger than Hester Gym, which it replaced, and is the fourth gymnasium in the college's 86 years. It is named for Coleman H. Wheeler, former chairman of the board of Willamette Industries and a long-time friend of the college. The gymnasium is named for James Miller, a George Fox board member and former owner of Cascadia Lumber Company, and his wife Lila. They were the original donors to the capital campaign that provided the new center, which was formally dedicated Oct. 17 along with three other new campus buildings.

ABOUT GEORGE FOX COLLEGE

George Fox College is the outgrowth of a desire by early Willamette Valley Quaker settlers who established Pacific Academy in 1885 for the Christian education of their children. The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction for students. In 1949, because of the many colleges in the Northwest with Pacific in their name, the college was renamed George Fox in honor of the founder of the Friends (Quaker) Church. The college is governed by a 42-member Board of Trustees elected by Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, which comprises more than 8,300 members in 56 churches in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho.

Today the 60-acre rural, tree-shaded campus a half-hour drive from Portland is undergoing a major expansion with four new buildings completed this year, including a new \$2.4 million sports complex, an \$800,000 academic building, and two new residence halls in a \$1.25 million project. A new \$1.3 million Fine Arts Center currently is under construction. Enrollment is at a record 706, George Fox this year being one of Oregon's fastest growing colleges with a 12 percent enrollment increase.

Accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, the college offers 20 majors in six divisions: Education, Fine and Applied Arts, Language Arts, Natural Science, Religion, and Social Science. George Fox is one of 14 members of the national Christian College Consortium. The college has a student-faculty ratio of 16/1, with more than 60 percent of faculty members having doctorates.

George Fox students come from 20 states and 7 foreign countries. Nearly 40 religious denominations are represented on campus.

Alumni of George Fox are primarily in service-oriented vocations of Christian ministries, education, social work, and medical fields. The college's most prominent alumnus is the late President Herbert Hoover, who attended Pacific Academy.

GFC ATHLETICS

Intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the overall education program at George Fox. Men's varsity athletic teams represent the college in baseball, basketball, track, soccer, and cross country.

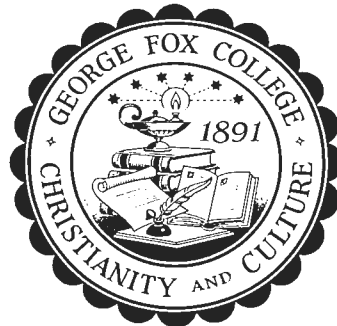
George Fox College competes as an independent on the varsity level. Its schedules are coordinated with both the Evergreen Conference and the Northwest Conference and with other independents in the Northwest. George Fox is a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), District 2, and the National Christian College Athletic Association.

Women students compete in field hockey, volleyball, basketball, tennis, track, and softball. The college is a member of the Women's Conference of Independent Colleges and the Northwest College Women's Sports Association.

For students not participating in the varsity program, GFC has a complete intramural program including flag football, basketball, volleyball, softball, and tennis.

Athletic facilities include the new Coleman H. Wheeler Center for Sports and Physical Education; Colcord Field, which includes a football-soccer field and track; a baseball field; and tennis courts.

Wheeler Center, completed this summer in a \$2.4 million project, includes the James and Lila Miller Gymnasium with three basketball courts and seating for up to 2,700; multi-purpose, class, and weight rooms; faculty and administrative offices; handball courts; dressing and therapy rooms, and saunas.

TONIGHT: BRUINS SEEK NINTH STRAIGHT AGAINST MOUNTIES

Tonight's game brings the first Evergreen Conference opponent of the season to Miller Gymnasium. The game is the first of a pair of contests between George Fox and Eastern Oregon State. Monday night George Fox travels to La Grande to meet the Mountaineers on their own court.

Tonight the Bruins will try to continue a win string of eight games over EOSC. The Bruins have not lost to the Mountaineers in the last four years and have won 10 of the last 11 contests, but Eastern Oregon still holds the all-time series lead 22-13.

George Fox brings a 3-3 record into tonight's game following an 82-72 win Monday night over visiting Willamette University. That victory broke a three-game loss string that included the NAIA District 2 Tip-Off championship game loss to Hawaii-Hilo, then back-to-back losses to Northwest Conference Pacific University (85-79) and Linfield (99-87) last Saturday in McMinnville. The Linfield win was the first in the last five matchups between the Yamhill County rivals. George Fox downed the Wildcats 95-93 earlier in the second round of the District Tip-Off and earlier also tripped Pacific 103-88 in the opening round.

"It's not as dismal as some may think," Coach Sam Willard says of the Bruins' early season start. "We're a young group, and we need to be tried in the furnace," he says. "We're going to be all right."

Some of the comparison has come to George Fox's super start a year ago when they dropped their season opener then won 11 straight and did not lose their third game of the season until Jan. 13.

After their first six games this year the Bruins—as expected—are being led by senior center Paul Cozens who has

improved his already high career averages in both scoring and rebounding. Cozens, a 6-6 NAIA All-American last season, is averaging 19.3 points a game and 14.0 rebounds. His career average to this year was 17.8 in scoring and 9.3 in rebounding.

Cozens also leads the team in steals with 14, and is the top free-throw shooter with a .933 accuracy on 28 of 30 attempts. He's .483 from the floor on 44 of 91 attempts. In the matchup with the district's other All-American, Linfield's Mark Wickman, Cozens produced 26 points and 18 rebounds, Wickman 18 points and nine rebounds.

Close behind Cozens in scoring is junior guard Gary Chenault with a 19.2 average with a .535 accuracy (38/71) from the field and .875 at the charity stripe (22/24).

Others in double figure scoring are junior forward Dave Adrian at 14.3 and senior forward Kirk Burgess at 12.16. As a team the Bruins are outscoring opponents—barely—87.8 to 87.3. They are on the short end of the rebounding, 46.5 to 45.0.

Although Christmas break starts tonight for most George Fox students and faculty, for the basketball Bruins it's work as usual on the basketball court. Following the Monday night game with Eastern Oregon, the Bruins Wednesday and Thursday (Dec. 21 and 22) participate in the John Lewis Classic hosted by Willamette. George Fox takes on NCAA Seattle Pacific in a 3:15 p.m. game Wednesday while Willamette meets Western Baptist in a 9 p.m. encounter. The winners of the two games play at 9 p.m. Thursday night and the losers at 7 p.m. The Bruins are defending Lewis Classic champions, last year beating host Willamette 89-75 for the title.



THE BRUIN NICKNAME



George Fox College is represented by the nickname and mascot "Bruin." But it's not always been so, even though it should have been.

The nickname comes from a real live bear captured in 1887 just two years after Pacific Academy (the college's predecessor) was established. The small cub was captured in the coast range foothills west of Carlton when its mother was shot. The young cub was brought to campus by a student and later lived with a faculty member. When it grew to adulthood it was kept in a pit in what is now known as Hess Creek Canyon south of the campus. It escaped one too many times and was turned into steak for the dining table and the hide preserved on a frame and displayed in an early campus museum. When it deteriorated several years later, it was taken to a campus furnace room to be destroyed, but the framework proved a problem in dismantling, so it was left sitting in a corner. Students found the old Bruin skin later and began skirmishes over ownership, a tradition that continued 85 years later. "Bruin Junior," under a set of guidelines passed down for years, was fought over periodically in class competition with the class able to physically drag the Bruin replica off campus declared the rightful owner until next "flashed."

Even with the Bruin tradition, somewhere along the line, the "Quaker" tag to athletic teams came into popularity with sportswriters because of the college's church affiliation, and that nickname was used, along with a mascot "Foxy George," a little fox with a Quaker hat. Both gained acceptance for a period in the 1950s and 1960s until a vote of faculty, students, and administration in 1970 reinstated the Bruin nickname to its rightful place.

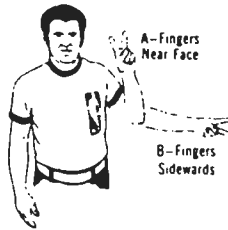

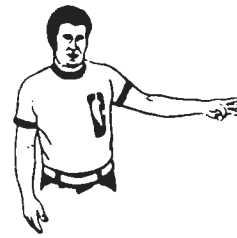

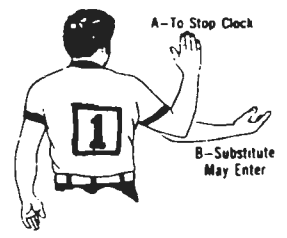
**A. SCORE COUNTS AND

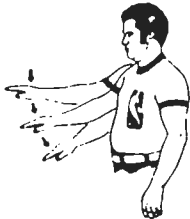

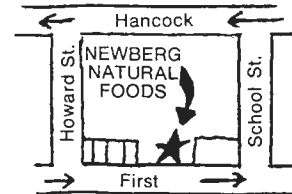

COACHING STAFF



CRAIG TAYLOR is in his seventh year under Coach Sam Willard, serving in a variety of situations. Taylor, 26, played basketball for five years with Willard as his coach: three years at Caldwell High School in Idaho, then following him to Big Bend Community College for another two years. Now they're together again for a second year with Taylor as the chief assistant for the Bruin effort.

A 1974 George Fox graduate, earning both Outstanding Man in Teacher Education and Outstanding PE Major honors, Taylor is a member of the physical education staff with assignments as instructor of volleyball, bowling, and water sports, as Bruin baseball boss (7-19 last spring), as intramural director and sports center building coordinator, and as freshman basketball coach. For two seasons Taylor served as a graduate assistant to previous basketball coach Lorin Miller, then last season was named by Willard as the chief assistant.

Taylor was a member and captain of GFC's national-contending 1972-73 basketball squad in the NAIA championships. For the Bruins he averaged 10 points a game, among the best among all-time Bruin NAIA scorers. He averaged 4.96 rebounds a game on his way to both district tip-off and all-district honors as a senior.

Under Willard at Big Bend, Taylor, a 6-6 forward, was the leading scorer and rebounder for two years, earning honors as team captain and an All-Northwest Community College League pick. He was an All-Conference and All-State basketball star in Idaho under Willard.

Taylor completed a master's degree in education in 1976, and last year was named to *Outstanding Young Men of America*. He and his wife Cheryl have a daughter, Leah, 3.



MARK VERNON ran out his playing eligibility last season, but he's still a Bruin, this year as a graduate assistant to Taylor and Willard.

Vernon went into the Bruin record book last season as the best playmaker ever. For the season he dished out 155 assists for a 5.34 per game average, to bring his career per game average to a 3.94, the highest ever achieved.

In his two seasons as a Bruin, Vernon, 24, averaged 2.5 points a game, last year shooting at a .486 pace from the field.

Vernon's duties this year include assisting coaches Willard and Taylor with the varsity team and serving as assistant coach for the frosh squad.

Another product of the West Seattle-Highline Community College pipeline, Vernon at Highline received both Best Defense and Hustle awards. A spring George Fox graduate, Vernon did his practice teaching at Newberg High this fall and currently is a substitute public school teacher in the Newberg area.

ASSISTANTS



FRANK KYTE is a "pro" in his own area. Back for his sixth year as Bruin trainer, Kyte this year completed a sports medicine program on the master's degree level at Portland State University and is a Certified Athletic Trainer. He is the first to hold a paid trainer post at the college (created this fall), and the college is one of the first small colleges in Oregon with such a position. Kyte is a native of

Albuquerque, New Mexico, and is a 1975 George Fox graduate in physical education. His duties, in addition to a strong role of moral support, include keeping the Bruins together physically, with professional assistance and quick first aid for injuries.



MIKE WIRTA is the team statistician, heading a crew of student assistants. A member of the college's food service staff, Wirta is a 1974 George Fox graduate and perhaps one of the most loyal Bruin fans—at one time with the only BRUIN license plate in the state. A Newberg native, Wirta devotes many volunteer hours of compiling facts and figures on the players and the team, both home and away, and in

maintaining historical records. He holds down the statistician role for the seventh year.
