The church of tomorrow is the Sunday School and Young People's society of today and her greatest hope and gravest danger lies in them. The standard of Christian Endeavor today will in a large measure be the standards of the church of tomorrow and the gathering of the harvest will tell of the sowing time. The subject of this paper is of vital importance because our consecration is THE necessary thing in Christian Endeavor.

The purpose of every Christian organization, if it is truly Christian is to reveal Christ as the Savior of the world and to render effectual in the lives of men His full salvation. The Christian Endeavorer who wants to have a share in this work must be empowered from on High and Consecration is the human side of the linking up with the power house of Glory. Someone has said that Consecration is doing now the thing you would do if this were your last day. Consecration is once for all. Youth Yielded means a whole life yielded. Our so-called consecrationmeetings are unscriptural and misleading. Our talents, our money, our loved ones, our hopes, in fact our whole lives with all that future years may bring forth, all given into the hands of an allwise, all powerful, and Holy Captain to be used as He directs without reserve. There is a legal term of reserved right. If I owned 1000 acres of land and should sell 999 acres and retain one in the center I should have a right to go across the land that I sold to reach that which I reserved. If we reserve a room in our heart it belongs to Satan and he remembers and uses the right of way.

Consecration places us where we can be equipped to meet the multitude of temptations of this present evil age. It enables us to successfully meet the Prince of this world. A consecrated negress was asked whether she claimed to have the mastery over the Devil. No suh, she said, I has got the Master of the Devil.

Youth Yielded. Let us look back and examine some of the lives of the yielded youth of the past. PRAYER POWER.

The Christian Endeavor should be a training school for the new convert. Very few young people when converted have ever prayed in public. There is no better place to learn to pray in public than in the Endeavor.

A person can not become strong in the Christian life until he has learned to pray. The life of prayer is a life of continuous discovery. First, the Heavenly Father is discovered and they become acquainted. All the men of the Kingdom who have most fully revealed God to other men have reached the heights here, for prayer clarifies all of our thinking about God. It was Isaiah worshipping in the temple who saw the Lord high and lifted up. Paul states this truth in clearcut words in Acts 22:17-18.

It was after much prayer, as recorded in Acts, that the new disciple was chosen to take the place of Judas. That was the beginning of a new era and the first Christians depended as never before on prayer and the Holy Spirit. It was the habit of the early church to introduce new disciples at once to the life of prayer, with the result that when they were all scattered abroad in the persecutions that followed, each disciple was a beacon light preaching the Word with power. Martin Luther says, "I judge that my prayer is more than the Devil himself. If it were otherwise I would have fared differently long before this. If I should neglect prayer for a single day I should lose a great deal of the fire of faith."

A life that keeps in touch with God thru prayer is a life of deepening devotion. It shrivels and dies without a steady growth in the things of the Kingdom. It is no cheap thing. The power that comes with prayer cannot be had for the mere asking, it expands with a more perfect understanding of and yielding to the calls of Christ. It deepens with the bearing on one's heart the burdens of the lost. It widens with the joy of lifting. It strengthens with the vision of the Kingdom.

To master the secret of prayer there must be an uncompromising surrender, and no hesitation in uncovering our hearts to Christ. Richard Newton, "The principal cause of my leanness and unfruitfulness is owing to an unaccountable backwardness to pray. My power must come from prayer."

If we as Endeavorers want to help shorten the time when Christ will come in all His glory we must become more devoted Christians, more fervent in prayer. Never was there greater need for saintly men and women. The world moves with gigantic strides. Satan has his hold and rule on the world and labors to make all its movements subserve his ends. Religion must do its best work, present its most attractive and perfect models. No amount of money, genius, or culture, can move things for God. Holiness energizing the soul, the whole man aflame with love, with desire for more faith, more prayer, more zeal, more consecrationthis is the secret of power.
