# Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends 1943

"Inasmuch as Oregon Yearly Meeting includes the three states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, it would seem more practical that Oregon Yearly Meeting be named Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends for the following reasons:

(1) It would give a better impression in publicity and business dealings of the denomination.

- (2) It would suggest definitely that more territory was embraced than just the state of Oregon.
  - (3) It would line up with the name of the church paper.
- (4) It would be encouraging to churches in Washington and Idaho."

10. The following concern from Newberg Quarterly Meeting was referred to the Representatives:

The meeting entered into a deep concern for our young people, especially our young men, who are eager to help relieve the great suffering that war has caused, and to do a more adequate service than that which is thus far provided by the Civilian Public Service program, and for the Japanese, most of them American citizens, who have been deprived of their liberty, property and other privileges "without due process of law." We are glad that the Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting are providing for the maintenance of our own members in Civilian Public Sevice Camps, but we feel keenly that we are not by any means measuring up to our responsibility in the matter of help and encouragemet to our own members who wish to serve more adequately, and in aid of our Japanese fellow citizens who are suffering such hardships and are in such need of Christian sympathy and help. We wish to place our concern before Oregon Yearly Meeting, with the hope that that Gody will recommend its Northwest Friends Service Committee to find way of accomplishing the service suggested for our own members, for the Japanese people, and for other needy peoples in other parts of the world.

Newberg Monthly Meeting held at Newberg, Oregon, 5th month 5th, 1943, directed the clerks of the meeting to forward the above concern to the Quarterly Meeting with a request that it be forwarded to Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Portland—The tract of the month club has become very popular. Six meetings have subscribed to that form of religious literature. They have one new library in their quarter—in the Vancouver First Friends Meeting.

Tacoma—Reports that their main interest has been in disdistributing 24 booklets of a religious nature.

Boise Valley—Has varied interest. They have sent the little devotional pamphlet known as the Quiet Hour to their local service men, have bought several New Testaments to send the Federal prisoners.

They produced one skit in the interest of Literature, gave out 75 Scripture calendars, are buying Bibles for the outposts work and have raised a fund for the Gideon Bible work.

Greenleaf—Sends all the used S. S. papers to the outposts. They have given many scripture—texts, pencils, mottoes and plaques.

They are also placing about 150 daily devotion books per year.

Their next interest is in purchasing a new book case.

Newberg—Divides its interest between the C. P. S. camps and the Sunday School Union. They have loaned many books and magazines to both.

Salem-Has many literatura interests. They promote good reading by giving several object lessons throughout the year. They send their used S. S. papers out to the Children's Farm Home.

They report a reading period, in which 22 books on Quakerism were read and reported 21 other religious books were read.

Salem also reports a new library this year in their Medford Outpost.

### WEDNESDAY 2:00 P.M.

22. After a period of devotion the state of the church from the various Quarterly Meetings was considered. A summary of which appears below:

All quarters reported good attendance at the morning meetings, but some meetings regretted smaller attendance at the evening meetings and at prayer meetings. One reported the thinning ing of their ranks by the absence of young people who had answered the call for workers, while another reported that the attendance of young people had been especially good. One reported a marked increase in attendance at Monthly Meetings after its appointed time was changed to Sunday afternoon. Family worship is observed in many homes but in some, family worship has been crowded out, with great spiritual loss to the membership.

Some meetings reported spiritual gifts among their young peo-

ple and such individuals have been encouraged to work in various activities of the church in outposts and pastoral work.

Pastors have been faithful in preaching the Gospel and special meetings under the leadership of pastors and evangelists have been a blessing. One meeting reported that the enemy had caused some who took advance ground to fall away quickly.

Parents are for the most part faithful in guarding their children against harmful reading and associates. One meeting reported an increased concern for Bible study and for the instruction of their children.

It appears that members live in harmony with each other and are careful of their business relations.

Peace and temperance have been taught in the meetings. Some meetings report that there are some of their members in active military service, but many are in C. P. S. camps and some in noncombatant service. All members are reported as abstaining from intexicating liquors but some do not abstain from tobacco.

The meetings are careful in making appointments of pastors, teachers and evangelists, that they may be in accordance with our standards of faith.

One Meeting reported that evangelistic visitation campaigns has been conducted in their meetings, resulting in true spiritual

Junior churches have proven a blessing in some meetings.

A number spoke on these reports, expressing a desire that the meetings should be careful to make accurate and honest reports.

23. A question in regard to filling a vacancy on the Finance Committee was considered. It was decided that according to Discipline, a member of the Finance Committee should be from the representative body. Therefore Carey Jessup, who had been selected as a representative should also take the place of the absent representatives on the Finance Commitee.

The Superintendent suggested the adoption of the following proposition:

Oregon Yearly Meeting regards the total prohibition of the liquod traffic as vital to the welfare of the nation and therefore requests that the delegations in Congress from Oregon, Washington, and Idaho urge the passage of the Bryson Bill in the House of Representatives which provides for the prohibition of the liquor traffic during the period of conscription.

Since the conscription of women for industrial purposes would be detrimental to the moral welfare of the nation, and especially to the children, we therefore request the Senators from Oregon, Washington, and Idaho to oppose the passage of Senate Bill No. 666. known as the Austin-Wadsworth Bill.

These suggestions were approved by the Meeting:

Frederick B. Baker spoke on the effective propagand; that is being carried on in Clark County, Washington against the liquor advertising.

### REMARKS ON PUBLIC MORALS

From the reports at hand, it appears that most of the work done during the past year in behalf of Public Morals has been of an educational character. Committees, generally are conscious of the fact that it is of the utmost importance to instruct children about the evil effects of alcohol and tobacco on the human body. Hence, the wisdom of giving such instruction in the Sunday School. All churches reporting, except one, indicate that such teaching is regular on each temperance Sunday, and in some schools oftener.

The Greenleaf Superintendent of Public Morals has supplied Daily Vacation Bible Schools with scientific material on the subject and thus reached over 200 children. She has also made demonstrations and shown films and slides to some 2000 high school students setting forth the seriousness of indulgence in the use of narcotic poisons.

The Piedmont Church sponsored pictures on Public Morals at the church night gathering in that community.

Newberg reports that instruction on this subject both in chapel and classes is given in Pacific College. The Melba Chairman gave a thorough review of Senator O'Daniel's speech in the United States Senate on prohibition.

Portland reports that a strong increase of interest and activities is manifest throughout the Quarter. Your Superintendent gave 5 addresses within our own field and 2 before other denominations. Two of our pastors took the lead in combatting "Old Judge" liquor advertising campaign in Clark County Washington.

They raised money and bought space in four County papers and used the American Businessmen's mats to refute the liquor ads.

The pastor at Ridgeview put up temperance posters and cartoons. He has stressed the evils of alcohol, tobacco, and trashy literature on several occasions. Chehalem Junior Church presented two temperance programs.

If work of the character just noted were carried on throughout the year in every religious center in the United States, we might hope for total prohibition of the liquor traffic in less than a generation.

Middleton suggests that we need a greater concern for conditions around us. When you see smoking so generally indulged in by young women, when you see excessive drinking on trains the e days, when you hear about the many young women suddenly dropping out of sight, when you think of the three million men and women engaged in the liquor business-a non-essential, when we know of the millions of pounds of food stuffs wasted in the manufacture of alcohol at a time when multitudes of the World's population are starving, when we know of the metals, rubber and fuel put to a non-essential use, and above all, when we learn of the Executive of this Republic providing whiskey for the delegates to the food congress in Virginia in violation of State law, it certainly is time to be concerned about the conditions around us.

The eradication of these evils of which we speak lies at the door of American public opinion. This fact has been proven recently in two instances. The management of the Pathfinder Company admitted liquor ads in two issues of that paper this spring. This precedure was met with a storm of protest by long-time readers of the paper on account of which the stockholders of the company voted unanimously that such ads should henceforth be excluded from the columns of the paper. Similar action has been taken by the

Newberg Graphic and its readers.

"The power of public opinion. The power of the folks in the cities and towns, and country, and in the forks of the creek, on the deserts and in the mountains, yes, the power when they sit down and take pen in hand." This is what banned brewers ads from these papers. When all Christian people everywhere make known to their newspapers, to their congressmen, and to the Presidentnot just two or three but everyone of us-that we are tired of this evil business, then under the blessing of God the liquor traffic will be banished from our fair land.

- 27. The Meeting adjourned to meet Thursday at 9:30 o'clock.
- 28. After a period of devotion, the minutes were read, corrected and approved.
- 29. Dr. Homer Hester presented his resignation as Custodian of Documents and as a Trustee of Oregon Yearly Meeting because he is serving in the United States Navy

His resignation was accepted.

30. The Nominating Committee sent in the following request:

"In view of the fact that the work of the Yearly Meeting. Superintendent of Bible School so overlaps the work of the Teachers Training Superintendent, the nominating committee recommends that the office of the Teachers' training Superintendent be eliminated.

The recommendation was approved and the office of Teachers' Training Superintendent was eliminated.

- 31. A letter was read from the Clerk of the California Yearly Meeting, Allen U. Tomlinson, in which he expressed appreciation for the presence of Levi and Rebecca Pennington and sent greetings to the Oregon Yearly Meeting.
- 32. The following communication from the Executive Committee was approved by the meeting:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends, held June 8-13, 1943:

The Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting submits the

following report:

In the sessions of 1941 the Yearly Meeting referred to the Executive committee a recommendation from the Evangelistic and Church Extension Board that a Yearly Meeting parsonage be built on the Yearly Meeting grounds, with the instruction that building "should be undertaken as soon as seemed advisable." (Minute 61.) A committee was appointed to have the matter in charge. The deeding of a lot was requested, and letters were sent to thirty representative persons in the Yearly Meeting requesting contributions. The sum of \$80 was received. Because there was no greater response it was felt that the time was not propitious for the undertaking. (Minutes of January, 1942.) The General Superintendent occupied the Sunnyside varsorage through the year 1941-42, but the coming of a new pastor to the First Friends Church terminated that arrangement. In the meantime war conditions had made it impossible to secure materials for building, and renting had become out of the question.

In August, 1942, the Evangelistic and Church Extension Board referred to the Executive committee the question of the advisability of buying a residence for the General Superintendent. The Committee met August 11, and after some discussion a proposition was submitted that the Committee negotiate to buy a combined Yearly Meeting headquarters and parsonage in Portland. The proposition was approved and became the action of the Committee. A group of the members was then appointed, with Gerves Carey as chairman, to take charge of the actual locating and choosing of the property. This committee, realizing that this was an emergency action subject to review by the Yearly Meeting, kept two objectives in mind in selecting the house: first, that if the place chosen should not be approved as permanent, it be of such

unquestioned value and desirability as to be readily salable without loss; second, that if it be approved as permanent, the location, arrangement and facilities be such as to make it suitable for the needs, especially with reference to the number of rooms, the convenience of office space, and accessibility by city transportation. It is believed that both of these objectives were realized in the selection of the property now occupied by our General Superintendent at 2904 N. E. 50th Avenue in Portland.

The Executive Committee now submits the entire matter to the Yearly Meeting for its consideration and action.

### EVANGELISTIC AND CHURCH EXTENSION

34. Joseph Reece, our General Superintendent, presented the annual report which appears below:

As we celebrate this the fiftieth anniversary of Oregon Yearly Meeting, it is encouraging to note that we close the first half century of our work with the highest membership on record and thus begin the second half century with a good start. Oregon Yearly Meeting was organized in 1893 with 993 members. Except for a slight loss in the year 1902 there was a steady increase in membership till 1922. During these 29 years we increased our membership to 3,423. It was in the year 1923 that we entered a 'membership depression era,' which reached its lowest point in 1929 with 3,088. It was not until 1941, after 18 years of 'membership depression that we were able to surpass the record set in 1922. Starting with 1936 our membership has been on the increase and for the last three years we have passed the preceding year's record. If each of us will faithfully live up to our discipline we could have a membership of over 4000 to report next year. We challenge each meeting to make a 10 per cent increase in membership this year.

The apostle Paul in referring to the elders and overseers of the church at Ephesus said, "——wherefore, Take heed to yourselves, and to all the flock, over which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with His own blood." Acts 20:28. It was a tremendous task which was laid upon these leaders of the church at Ephesus.

Today I am speaking to the leaders of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Most of you would not be here if you did not have some responsibility. We have less than 10 per cent of our membership present to do the work of the whole. I would say to you in the words of Paul, "Take heed to yourselves." You are responsible under the Hoiy Ghost to the church at home. You may have come here a bit

discouraged with conditions and difficulties at home, so I call your attention to the value and worth of the church at home as Paul says further, "which he hath purchased with his own blood." Let us go back with new vision and zeal to minister humbly to those who could not come. In the degree that we if faithful to this divine commission will we be successful in Bolivia, in our out-posts and in our meetings.

We are living in a troubled world. The days ahead are uncertain. In the midst of despair, disaster and ruin, are we going to fumble our task as a Yearly Meeting? I humbly pray God to give us such a conviction of our task that we can say with Paul. "Nay — in all these things" (to what things does he refer? He names them.) Tribulation, distress persecution, famine, nakedness, peace or sword, —we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us." This doesn't mean to endeavor, attempt and struggle to do His will. It means that we can do it, with plenty to spare and enough more to help our neighbors and shout hallelujah in the face of the enemy.

Since last Yearly Meeting several new fields have been opened and entered. Medford, Oregon, where Milo and Helen Ross felt called of God to go. God has blessed their step of faith and now plans are being made to set up a monthly meeting with 22 charter members.

Evert and Virena Tuning felt a clear call of God to go to Sprague River and work among the Indians in and around there. The field is difficult but the need is great. William add Victoria Watson are leaving Marion Meeting and are moving on to a farm near Sprague River where they can help Evert Tuning. This will be a real impetus to the work.

Last December, William and Shirley Relphs were called to Pierce, Idaho, to give pastoral care to a group of 25 Quakers who had moved there. The outlook is good for a substantial meeting.

The work at Rim Rock, Hayden Lake, Idaho, which has been under the care of Reuben and Rayma Cogswell, is making good progress. They have sent over \$100.00 for our missionary work aside from other gifts. About two months ago they bought a lot and deeded it to the Yearly Meeting with all expenses paid. They have also bought an abandoned building which they plan to tear down and use the lumber to build a church.

Rose Valley has been making steady growth under the able leadership of Carey and Ivy Jessup. A well has been dug near the house and the grounds have been graded and planted.

A number of our meetings have been improving and beautifying their buildings and grounds. Paint and shrubs and flowers make church and parsonage more desirable.

The Yearly Meeting should be gratified to see how many of our meetings are getting out of debt. Second Church, Portland, cleared the mortgage off of both the church and parsonage. First Church, Portland First Church, Vancouver; McKinley Ave. Church in Tacoma and Highland Ave. Church in Salem, paid off the debts on their parsonages. The Piedmont Meeting bought a parsoage this year and will have it clear of debt next month. Edgar and Mary Sims have made it a most attractive place. The meeting at Woodland has almost finished their building and new benches were recently installed. They plan to have a dedication service this summer. At Ridgeview they are building a parsonage out of red stone. Ridgeview is an out-post of Greenleaf and William Thomas is their pastor. Plans are in process to set them up as a monthly

meeting. Prune Hill paid off the mortgage on their church just last month.

As far as information has come to us the following pastoral changes will take place. Merle and Thelma Green are leaving Woodland. James and Mildred Raymond are leaving Rosemere. Dillon and Fern Mills are leaving South Salem. Calvin and Louie Choate are leaving McKinley Ave., Tacoma, and Inez Batchelor is leaving Ontario Heights. No definite information has come from any of these meetings as to their pastoral relations for the coming year.

Three of our pastors finished their college work and received their degrees, Dorwin Smith, pastor at Chehalem Center; Oral Tish was pastor at Prune Hill and supplying this summer at Nampa, and Ralph Chapman, missionary under appointment to Bolivia and who is serving the meeting at Entiat. Carroll Tamplin also finished his college work and received his degree. Edward Harmon finished his graduate work and received his B.D. degree. We are glad to see our pastors and missionaries preparing themselves to be of greater service.

From the Yearly Meeting office at 2904 N.E. 50th Ave., Portland. Oregon we have tried to be faithful in issuing the monthly News Flashes and care for all correspondence. One duty which is very insistent each month has been the addressing and mailing of the Northwest Friend. We have brought messages to many of our meetings, preaching 36 times. I brought 11 Quarterly Meeting messages, showed the missionary pictures 10 times and the out-post pictures 9 times. The moving pictures of our different conferences were shown five times. We have a fine new set of missionary pictures. As soon as possible I intend to complete a set of colored pictures of each meeting house and parsonage with the pastors. In spite of the hindrances to travel I have traveled nearly 15,000 miles by auto and 4500 miles by train. Travel by train or auto is becoming more difficult and it is possible I will not be able to visit over the Yearly Meeting as heretofore. I must express my sincere appreciation to our Quarterly Meeting superintendents. They have been faithful to their task and have many times gone out of their way and given freely of their time to take me around when my car was laid up for lack of gas or poor tires.

Oregon Yearly Meeting is to be congratulated for the fine group of pastors and their wives who are ministering faithfully under the evident blessing of God. I believe that without exception our pastors are men of God, men of prayer with a sincere desire to do God's will. Many of our meetings have raised the salary of their pastors but some of our meetings who are able to pay more are still expecting their pastor to carry on as usual. May I urge our meetings not to pay off debts by keeping the pastor on a low salary.

In most of our Quarterly meetings the pastors have been meeting one day each month for fellowship and prayer. This has been a time of uplift and encouragement.

This has been a good year as we have labored together for God and the church. I could speak at length about our work in Bolivia, our outposts, the work of our meetings and our departments and committees, but I will close by urging us to go forward into this new year under a sure sense of God's presence and anointing, to preach by life and word the unsearchable riches of love in Christ Jesus.

Evert Tuming gave an account of the work at Sprague River and Milo Ross of the work at Medford. Both of these speakers asked for the prayers of the Yearly Meeting for their work.

Everett Craven told of the work at Whitney and how it was growing.

Leonard Craven spoke of the six outposts from Greenleaf Meeting.

Jack Willcuts gave an account of his work at Rockaway.

Two new superintendents were announced: Ethel Cowgill of Tacoma Quarterly Meeting and Frederick Baker of Portland Quarterly Meeting.

A number of outpost workers were introduced to the meeting.

35. The following recommendations from Loyde Osburne, the statistical secretary, was approved.

TO: Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends

I present the Statistical Report for Oregon Yearly Meeting for the year ending April 30, 1943, with a recommendation that the wording TOTAL GAIN and TOTAL LOSS be changed back to NET GAIN and NET LOSS and that in the Quarterly Meeting and Yearly Meeting columns instead of entering on each of these two lines a figure which is the sum of the NET GAINS or NET LOSSES of the Monthly Meetings there shall be entered on only one line a figure which is the actual NET GAIN or NET LOSS of each Quarterly Meeting and of the Yearly Meeting. I have followed this plan in making up the accompanying report

Full report of other work done in this department. 30 dozen eggs given, 115 letters and cards to shut-ins and sick, four Gospel messages sent, N. W. Friends Service Committee \$25.00, Cascade College \$21.00, Red Cross \$13.00, Miscellaneous \$9.00. Many books and magazines given, much help give to afflicted in body and soul, \$31.50 given to Social Organizations. Some members helped care for sick. Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting gave special offering to Zenas Perisho family, \$16.48. They gave Riverside \$4.71. Homedale \$5.00. Women exchanged more than 200 quarts of fruit and vegetables for sugar and empty jars. Fresh fruit and vegetables were given where they could not be raised. A shower

of linen, clothing, bedding, food and utensils given to fire victims. One circulating heater given to Outpost workers, 118 dozen cookies and eighty hours work of sewing for soldiers at Y. M. C. A. Patched garments for Gowen Base Hospital. Small plants and shrubs sent to Japanese Internment camp. Offerings were taken for Gideons Leper Mission, Red Cross, Allied Air Forces, Sunday School Union, and Hebrew Mission.

One Meeting reported a Home Mission Report at every Missionary Meeting. Scripture plaques insead of flowers for the ill and aged persons, many greeting were sent to the aged at Christmas. 31 hours of house work for a neighbor was donated. 25 garments were given to the Red Cross. 40 hours work for the Red Cross, one Sunday School Class gave Monthly collection to Mrs. Hinkle for Teacher Training. One Community, shower of money was given for a burned-out family. Also furniture and other articles were given them. Many gifts were given on various occations. Much money not listed has helped with gifts of quilts and furniture. \$4.00 for material for Vacation Bible School was sent to Homedale. Other money not listed has been sent to outpost workers. \$95.00 was given to Social Service work. American Sunday School Union was given \$83.61.

Money given for Jewish work \$195.91. Addresses for Jewish work, several. Help was given in Jewish Missions. Three churches helped in Christmas Service Center—spent \$282.56. One family who were burned out were helped with \$27.00 and 1 comfort and 46 articles for the home. Thanksgiving baskets were given, four boxes were sent to boys in service, sent two boxes of household articles to Ontario Heights. C. O. kits were given, boxes of toys and games. A set of dishes were sent to Rose Valley. The same meeting furnishes cookies one day per month for service men at Y. M. C. A. Another sent 12 coats and 2 pair of shoes to C. P. S. Camp. Testaments were given to men in the Service Center work and they have had one boy definitely converted. \$19.50 was given to Charles Fuller's radio work. Sewing has been done for Japanese cabies in Camps. \$7.00 was spent for books for Japanese pastor. \$3.00 was given Kentucky Hills Missionaries. Garments have been given to Red Cross.

Esther White spoke of Home Mission work she had carried on—House to house visitation, Visits to Rescue Homes etc.

Many words of appreciation were expressed for the lives of those who have been so faithful. They have made such a contribution that we are debtors for they have labored and we have entered into their labors.

# 44. The following recommendations from the Executive Committee were approved:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends, held June 8-13, 1943:

The Publication Board of the NORTHWEST FRIEND requests that its functions be enlarged to include authorization to build up a revolving publication fund and to publish books, pamphlets, and other church and Sunday school literature as need may arise and the Board may deem wise.

Reasons for the request are explained as follows: materials which would be very helpful to our membership have been coming to the attention of the Board, and negotiations have been entered into with authorities in two other Yearly Meetings with reference to joint activity in the publication of Sunday School literature. The Board feels that it can serve the interests of the Yearly Meeting more efficiently if authorized to act in such matters.

The Executive Committee recommends that the Yearly Meeting grant this request.

The Executive Committe of the Yearly Meeting recommends unanimously that Joseph G. Reece be called as General Superintendent for the year 1943-44.

It further recommends that he receive a salary of \$1800 and the use of the Yearly Meeting headquarters without charge, and an allowance of \$500 for traveling expense.

The Executive Committee recommends that the Yearly Meeting continue to employ a Yearly Meeting secretary at a salary of \$400, of which \$220 is to be appropriated from the fixed expense and \$180 is already provided in the budgets of the Missionary and Evangelistic and Church Extension Boards.

45. The meeting adjourned to meet Friday at 9:30 A.M.

46. After a devotional period the minutes were read and approved.

47. The Permanent Board made the following report:

### REPORT OF THE PERMANENT BOARD

The Permanent Board met in its regular session at 7:00 p. m., June 9, 1943.

A quorum was present. After a few moments of silent devo-

tion and prayer the business before it was considered.

The request from Portland Quarterly Meeting for information concerning the "exact relationship existing between the Yearly Meeting and Pacific College" was referred to Seth Mills and Esther H. White with instructions to make the necessary research and report to next meeting.

The Board then considered the disciplinary action referred to

the Board in Minute 87, 1942 Minutes, as follows:

"Inasmuch as recording or men and women in the ministry is a matter which the Quarterly Meeting must face from time to time we very much feel the need of a ruling from the Yearly Meeting which will help us in this important matter.

"We therefore recommend that a statement be issued where y an individual may not be recorded until he has rendered at least

two years of accepted ministry.

After due deliberation the Board recommends that the following statement be inserted in the Discipline at the beginning of paragraph 2, Section 1, of Chapter VII. page 51, making it read as follows: "When a member has rendered at least two years of acceptable service in the ministry and the Local Meeting on Ministry and Oversight is satisfied that the said member has received a gift in the ministry, etc."

Memorials for Preston Mills, Nate Lorenzo Wiley, Frank W. Michener, and Charles W. Parker were presented to the Board, and after being read were directed to be read in the Yearly Meeting

and filed with the Yearly Meeting documents.

Chas. C. Haworth was appointed clerk for the coming year.

The meeting adjourned to meet June 10th at 7:00 p. m. June 10th, 7:00 p. m.

The Board met according to adjournment. Seth Mills and Esther H. White presented extracts from the minutes of a called meeting of the stockholders of Pacific College held in the office of the College, April 4th, 1908, showing their action as follows:

"In order to secure the hearty cooperation of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church a half interest in the re-organized Corroration, and the power of veto as to the admission of new mem-

bers is to be granted."

The following additions to the By Laws were also adopted: "Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, in lieu of its stock and other rights in the management of the College may elect at its next annual meeting or any regular meeting thereafter a number equal to the sum of the number of stockholders who become members and those elected from nominations made by the Alumni Association."

"The names of all new members shall be submitted to Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church for approval."

In the Minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church

held in 1908 we find Minute 27 as follows:

The Permanent Board made the following report relative to the proposition made by the Board of Trustees of Pacific College which was accepted.

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church: The Permanent Board of Oregon Yearly Meeting met in regular session July 8, 1908, at 7:15 p. m., eleven members being present. Aaron M. Bray was appointed clerk.

The proposition made to the Yearly Meeting relative to the management of Pacific College and referred to us has been carefully considered, and we are united in the belief that the proposition should be adopted by the Yearly Meeting.

Minute 52. The Committee named in minute No. 28 reported as follows and the persons nominated were satisfactory to this meeting.

We, your committee, appointed to propose names for the College Corporation, are united upon the following names: (there follow the names of some fifty-two Friends who were at that time appointed members of the College Corporation).

The Permanent Board Nominates the ollowing named persons to serve as members of the Pacific College Broad of Trustees to serve fo rthree years, to succeed themselves, Frank Cole and Joseph G. Reece.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned t meet at the call of the Clerk.

All the report was approved except the portion which dealt with disciplinary action in regard to the recording of ministers. This part was referred to the committee on revision of the discipline for re-wording which will conform with the thought expressed in the meeting of Ministry and Oversight.

From the report it seemed necessary for the Yearly Meeting to appoint a number of its members to attend the College Corporation. This matter was referred to the Nominating Committee with the recommendation that the names should be submitted in the afternoon session.

48. The chairman of the Northwest Friends Service Committee, Earl P. Barker, presented the following report:

### REPORT OF THE NORTHWEST FRIENDS SERVICE COMMITTEE 1942-43

This Committee was set up two years ago with two specific functions: that of financing the proper care of the conscientious objectors in our Yearly Meeting, and that of cooperating with the other peace churches in the establishment and operation of camps for C. O.s in the Northwest.

The latter function has been fulfilled so far as we have been able to assume responsibility. The fact that we could not carry our share financially in any joint endeavor in the administration of camps has made our cooperation more or less nominal; we have lent our influence and offered advice as there have been need and opportunity.

The former of the two functions has been carried out to the letter, as the treasurer's report will show. We have not failed to meet all responsibilities for our own members thus far. We have wished for a more nearly unanimous support from our membership, and believe that we would receive it if there were complete and perfect understanding on the part of all. Some have de lined to help on the ground that they would thus be supporting camps in which communism, atheism, and other unchristian movements are present. It is true that these elements are in the camps to which our boys are being sent, and in come cases to an alarming degree. Young men who know Christ as Savior are a small minority. Some of our own men have suffered severe persecution from their fellows on account of their evangelical faith. One lad had his Bible snatched from him and trampled under foot by unbelieving associates. He still feels, however, that he has an opportunity in that camp, and a moral obligation to remain there. It has not at any time been the funcion or aspiration of this committee to tell our young men what type of work they should choose: military, noncombatant, or Civilian Public Service. It has been our aim to advise them as they have sought for advice, to help them to make decisions when they have expressed the need for help, and then to support them morally and financially in the kind of work which they have chosen. We feel that no one need hesitate to support them on account of their antichristian associations. We have a responsibility for them regardless of their environment. Many of them are doing a definite service as they bear a consistent Christian testimony in such surroundings.

The same can be said of a number who have gone into the army for noncombatant service. They feel that in the medical work in the camps to which they have been assigned they have not only an opportunity for significant service, but also the privilege of vital witnessing among those who need such an influence.

A year ago we reported eight men in C. P. S. camps, and another in prospect. For all or part of the past twelve-month period we have had fifteen men in camp. Kenneth Hull was the ninth, and Milton Pressnall, Keith Williams, James Armstrong, William Laughlin, Loyde Osborn, and Willis Repp have followed. During the year Denton Darrow was accidentally drowned while helping to search for the bodies of lost fliers. Melvin Wilkins was transferred to a dairy farm in California. Elvett Brown was sent as leader of a unit to do detached service at the Utah State Hospital at Provo. Loyde Osborn was taken from the camp at Elkton, Oregon, to assist in the administrative offices of the supervising agency in Portland. Ellis Roberts and William Laughlin have gone to Montana to work in fire control.

The Committee is glad to report six visits by the members to camps where our men are serving. We are sorry not to report more. In the latter part of June last year the Chairman made a trip up the Columbia River, speaking Sunday morning at the Cascade Locks camp and Sunday evening at the Larch Mountain spike camp. On April 18 a trip sponsored by Portland Quarterly Meeting was made to the Cascade Locks camp ,with Joseph Reece giving the morning message and your chairman speaking at an evening vesper service. There were fine contacts and pleasant associations on each of these occasions, though the number of men interested in such services was noticeably small. Three of our ministers, two being members of the Committee, went recently to the camp at Elkton, and included an overnight stay in their visit. They did not have opportunity for a religious service. Two other members made visits to Cascade Locks.

Your chairman has done everything possible in an effort to secure in the State of Oregon the recognition of the purchase of C. P. S. certificates as an acceptable substitute for the purchase of war bonds. He made approaches, both by interview and by correspondence, to the War Savings Administrator for Oregon. The latter finally sent all of the correspondence to the Treasury Department office in Washington, instructing us to have someone there take up the matter for us. Information came not long ago from the office of Friends Civilian Public Service to the effect that it had been impossible to secure any action, and that apparently to apply additional pressure for decision in regard to Oregon might endanged the results already secured for other states. The chairman reports also that he has written some 150 letters in the conuct of his office. Many of these have been necessary official correspondence with Civilian Public Service officials. Many others have been letters of advice and encouragement to our young men. It has been a real pleasure to keep in touch with them, and to share their problems and their pleasures from time to time.

As we look into another year, we are ready to carry out the will of the Yearly Meeting as best we way, with divine help and guidance. We shall need continued contributions from those who have been giving nobly in the past. We need funds from others who have not been giving thus far, if we are to keep pace with the needs before us. Pray for us, that we may be led and strengthened for our task.

We, your auditing committee, have examined the records and accounts of the Treasurer of the Northwest Friends Service Committee, and find them correct and kept in a very satisfactory man-

This was satisfactory and accepted by the meeting.

Philip Jacob spoke on the work of the Civilian Public Service

He said one of the great problems is trying to live in two worlds at the same time. One a world of materialism and one the world of the spirit.

The government has turned over to the peace churches the administration of the camps and it is the opportunity of the churches to accept this responsibility.

The government is to start July 1st, government directed camps which will take from the Civilian Public camps those who are not in the camps because of religious convictions.

It is extremely important that individuals maintain their per-

sonal integrity.

Louis Schneider, director of the Civilian Public Service Camp at Elkton, told how important it is to feel that this time in camp is not lost but is an opportunity for young men to show their love for their fellow men and for God.

Keith Williams, one of the young men from Elkton Camp, asked the prayers of the Yearly Meeting that the young men continue with their peace testimony.

### PEACE DEPARTMENT

49. The Superintendent of Peace, Earl P. Barker, read the following report.

As he entered into the work of this department a year ago, the superintendent realized that peace agitation in such times as these must be very restricted and judicious. It would be all too easy to antagonize the general public and to present the appearance of disloyalty and unpatriotic action. It was felt, nevertheless, that the appearance of compromise or of forsaking this time-honored principle for which we stand would be equally disastrous. We cannot expect others to respect us if we play fast and loose,

changing with the changing times.

It is my view that the function of this department in times such as these is to encourage the evangelization and spiritual training of the young, particularly through the medium of the Sunday school, but using all means possible to instill the full Christian conception which we hold. If children are thoroughly saved under the influence of Friends, it should then be practical to direct their minds along the lines of our beliefs concerning the value of human life. We cannot now hope to shape the convictoins of young men of draft age, but we shall be able to realize some measure of success if we give due attention and effort toward the training of those who are younger. With the approval of the Ministerial Association of the Yearly Meeting convened in its mid-year conference, this department has adopted as a motto the words of Jesus, "Not to destroy men's lives, but to save them." Let us hold this ideal before our little ones, placing rightful emphasis on both its negative and its positive phases. May the glorious Prince of Peace help us to instill His very spirit of selfsacrifice, to the end that many may be brought up consistently to show that spirit in all their relationships with others.

The response of the meetings in the matter of reports was far from complete. Important items are left blank on many of those received. It was suggested that each meeting display a peace motto, and that efforts be made to secure pledges to live peaceably and helpfully in accordance with this motto. Woodland meeting reported having a motto, and Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting indicated the use of mottos and the signing of 200 pledges. This has been encouraging, even though no other meetings reported on these matters. Thirty-seven peace sermons were reported, and the distribution of several hundred copies of peace literature and periodicals. Nearly 1000 copies of Edward Mott's pamphlet, "The Basis of our Peace," are in circulation among our members. The num-

ber of communications sent to officials was four. A few meetings reported talks and programs in connection with the Sunday school, but many had done nothing in this line. We feel that surely these reports do not indicate the sum of peace sentiment in those meetings, but we wish for a greater unanimity of thought and action.

It is humbling, in a way, to find from the reports that of the young men from our meetings in government service fifteen have been in C. P. S., twenty in noncombatant service in the army, and forty-four in regular military service. These facts should stir us to greater persistence in leading the coming generation into a clearer conception of this fundamental of our Quaker faith. We do not wish to compel the consciences of our youth, but if we have clear convictions and uphold them they will appeal to these under our instruction as they have appealed to us.

The reports show further that sixteen kits were made and sent to the C. P. S. camps, and that \$245 has been expended for the cause other than for the support of young men in camp. The amounts contributed directly for C. P. S. will appear in the report

of our Service Committee treasurer.

Let me say again that it is our purpose to continue as judiciously and tactfully as we may, and yet persistently, the insistence that the true way of Christ is not to destroy men's lives, but to save them, and that by every deed of kindness and mercy which we are capable of performing.

The Board has received no application during the past year.

We are happy that we have been able to give \$10.00 a month each to Marietta Cope and to Ida J. Lee.

The Board has been laboring to create a retirement fund so that in the future we shall be able to give respectable aid to our aged ministers and missionaries on their retirement. To help this, the Board will be glad to receive any gifts or bequests.

Only \$12.00 was paid into the ministers retirement this year by the ministers of the Yearly Meeting. We trust the ministers will note this and thus profit by cooperating in a greater way or

Do you feel that your Meeting is losing in Missionary zeal? 1 yes, 14 no.

Do you have a Missionary project? 13 yes, 16 no.

# THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FRIENDS BOLIVIAN MISSIONARY FIELD

### 1942-1943

It is with an humble spirit we look back and contemplate God's wonderful working in our midst this past year. The devil has been very active this year trying to disrupt our work and has brought as many trials and much sadness, but Christ has conquered and we look forward to a year of brighter prospects. The following verse has been very precious to us knowing that He is able for ALL things if we trust Him. "Commit thy way unto the Lord, trust also in him, and he shall bring it to pass." Ps. 37:5. All through our difficulties the Lord has been most precious and has done "abundantly above what we could ask or think."

The only adjectives we can use for our several conferences this year are, "bigger," "most spiritual" and "most blessed." Without exception ,throughout the field, we can use these words without stint. All our congregations and districts have grown

not only in numbers but spiritually as well. Our theme for last year, "Go and Preach," was literally adopted. I shall report the districts and work as follows:

#### AMACARI

This Meeting, pastored by Cipriano Mamani, was organized this last year into a regular Monthly Meeting by request of the congregation. This was the cause of considerable blessing, for some found that they had some difficulties to clear away before they could become members; some hidden things that no one knew about except those concerned. Some of these were cleared away and we had a small revival. Our regulations for membership are much more strict than at home, made so by themselves. During this year they have taken over more of the support of their pastor and since their organization there has been a healthy surplus in their treasury. Their conference in November was larger, more spiritual and with more blessing than ever before. It was proven that their chapel is becoming too small, for one-third of the audience had to stand because there was not room to sit. They plan on making it into an L shape building, putting the pulpit in the corner looking both ways, as it cannot be extended or widened easily. Seventeen long trips of evangelization were made, some extended into Peru, thirteen new members were taken in and over sixty dol'ars were given outside the pastor's salary. Also a great amount of products were given both for the conference and for the pastor's use. One family travels all day Saturday to get to the Sunday meetings and stays until Monday morning and travels all day Mnday to get home again, taking three days out of every week. The husband and wife take turns in coming, one on one Saturday, the other the following, sometimes taking their two children along. Surely there is some reward in heaven for such faithfulness. Another thing that interested me was that no work in the whole valley is now being done on Sunday. The unbelievers noted that the believers did not work on Sunday, got as much done and had good harvests, as well or better than they, so the whole valley lays off on Sunday. Cipriano Mamani is faithful in preaching the full gospel of salvation and sanctification, is full of the Holy Spirit, a very lovable man and gets results. His work is growing daily, many new faces greet us as we visit from time to time.

### COROCORO

This is a mining town and is hard and indifferent to the gospel, yet the work of the pastor, Mariano Medrano, shows an increase of seven new members. More are have family worship and reading the Bible daily than ever before, 10,648 tracts were distributed being the most distributed by any district. 8 Bibles, 18 Testaments and 65 portions of the Bible were sold. Most of the testaments and portions were of the new Aymara edition. Over twenty dollars were taken in and a considerable amount of food was given for the conference this year which again was larger than last year, more spiritual and with more blessing. Sunday morning a count was taken and about sixty responded. The church was edified and all were contented with the blessing they had received. Santo Tomas, which is in the Corocoro District, is a live church where from fifteen to twenty gather weekly on Wednesdays to have services. They are now in the process of building a school and church combined for their children and services. A brother from the U. S. is providing the windows and doors. We would that some brother would provide benches for this place. We need sixteen at five dollars each. The evangelistic trips made by the pastor, Mariano Medrano, were thirty-seven. These were long trips not counting the trips made to Santo Tomas which is six miles to and from Corocoro. Some of these trips amounted to several days away from home, even to the border of Chile. Our brother in Corocoro is very active and leaves a trail of believers wherever he goes, always preaching salvation from sin and sanctification for the believer.

### PONGON HUYO

A wonderful work is being done by our young pastor, Felix Guanca, here in Pongon Huyo . His capacity for work and making others work and his vision for the lost seems unlimited. Family worship is celebrated in twelve homes. Sixty-eight persons out of his congregation have gone on various evangelization trips. They have kept track of the number of people talked to and report 457 individual evangelistic conversations. The pastor himself made eighteen evangelistic trips not counting scores made by the congregation. This pastor's report should be kept for posterity in the archives. It includes every trip, every person evangelized, every bit of food given the pastor and for the conference and down to every nail and screw used in their new church. Their fine new church, seating about 200 if they had benches, was finished enough to use and dedicated at their last conference in August. They had figured that it would be large enough to last many years before they had need to enlarge it, but to the consternation and delight it was well filled at the last conference. This again was the largest they had ever had, the most spiritual and most blessed of any before. A brother has given eight benches but twenty-four more are needed at five dollars each. The church still needs plastering Outside and in, and calsomining. They have also built a new home for the pastor at the side of the church which is large and ample for his needs. The work continues to grow at Guarina, where the pastor walks every Sunday about twenty mile to and from Pongon Huyo. They have about 20 members there, which is a small increase over the year before. Another "son" as we call it is at the mine "Fabulous" situated in the Cordillera which has a small but faithful group and its "son" at Uma Palca has also a small group and we might call this a "grandson" of Pongon Huyo. Both of these meetings are faithful in preaching the full gospel and our pastor at Pongon Huyo visits them all occasionally, although two days away by mule from there. The Lord is blessing the work and advance on all lines has been made.

### LA PAZ

We have been contending with the "leaven" of the devil in this church for some time until we took drastic steps to rid ourselves of it and dismissed three members from the church for rebellion at church authority, for carnality and for causing dissensions. This difficulty has been a blessing in disguise for it has unified and purified the church as nothing else could have done. Hearts have been more tender and after the step was taken we began to fill our altars and people began to cry to God as they had not done before. The church became more fervent in prayer and more tender hearted. The spirit of revival has been in our midst and broke out at our Annual Conference. Every Sunday lately there have been large altar services either in the morning or after-

noon. Sixteen new members were taken in, ten active and six provisional. We have about twenty more eligible but the church is very careful and felt we ought to wait a little longer because they are so new. All these new ones were gained in the last few months. 5.65' tracts were distributed, ten Bibles, twenty-nine testaments and many books were sold. Twenty-five families hold family worship and the average attendance at the Sunday School is around one hundred sixty. The meetings at Viacha and the mine Kelluani continue with blessing and we have opened a new work at Cohoni with believers there and at Palomar. Helen Cammack has opened work again at Puerto Perez from where she makes trips to Iquiaca and Pucarani. The work is growing in all these places. Thirty-five evangelistic trips were made by the brethren and over five hundred dollars was raised for the support of the work which is more than double the amount for the year before. Fifty dollars was raised in twenty minutes one Sunday morning without any effort whatever. This was to buy food for the Annual Conference. Tomasa de Ayllon, the pastor, is faithful in her duties, is capable and preaches, as do the others in this district, full salvation and sanctification. She is filled with the Holy Spirit and results are gratifying. Increase in attendance and spirituality have been notable. The Annual Conference held here reported separately.

### MISSION HOME

A new gasoline stove and sink have been purchased and installed in the mission home. The skylight and fire-place have been repaired. There is still considerable yet to be done in the way of built-ins all over the house, especially in the kitchen. Considerable painting is necessary also before the house will be complete.

### SCHOOLS

These have been in charge of Helen Cammack again this year. In La Paz there has been an increase in students, about 54 having enrolled. Juanito and Dorcas Ayllon have again been the teachers. These are the children of Juan Ayllon, 17 and 19 years old respectively. As the years pass and the students get accustomed to their teachers and to the art of studying we note a considerable advance in their ability to learn. We also note a great advance in their knowledge. The schools in Pongon Huyo and Amacari are progressing nicely with added attendance. Santo Tomas now has a school of about ten pupils, this year. We attended the closing examinations in Pongon Huyo this year and found that they, too, are learning the three R's. Helen as usual is furnishing a course of study for the four schools. There is a night school for adults in La Paz as well. We praise the Lord for our schools and also for patient and capable teachers.

### AUTOMOBILE

The auto is an active agent for the evangelization of the field. We don't know what we did without one. There is a curtailment of gasoline but not sufficient to keep us off the roads. We averaged two long trips a month last year in spite of the gasoline shortage and the rains. We have gotten stuck in the mud many times but have always managed to get home eventually. Never a week goes by without taking some body to the hospital or doc-

tor. We have attended many funerals also in the car. As the work gets larger it is more necessary than ever to keep in touch with the outstaions. For the coming year we plan on reaching each outstation once each quarter and the preaching points in between. The closest outstation is over fifty miles away with much population in between.

### SOUL CRY OF THE AYMARA

The "Soul Cry of the Aymara" has been revived! Two issues have gone out and we plan on mailing it in the future every quarter. It is put out in a new form but we trust it will bring blessing as much as the old edition.

#### BIBLE CLASSES

While the Bible Classes in July do not take the place of a Bible School, we find that they are a great help to the pastors and workers and a real blessing to the missionaries. They were held as usual last year with some 15 in attendance. We thought perhaps if we condensed them into two weeks, more could take advantage of them. Upon taking the matter up with the Yearly Meeting Council, they asked that we hold them this year as usual for the four weeks. They appreciate the classes and want to take advantage of them.

### ANNUAL CONFERENCE OR YEARLY MEETING

Again we have to say that we have just held the largest conference that the Bolivian Mission has ever held. Not only was it Outstanding in numbers, but it reached the highest tone of spirituality and of blessing. The attendance kept up well right from the peginning and we averaged around 300 in all the services. 314 were counted in the Sunday morning service and from 38 different places and the church seating about 350, was about packed every night. 118 were from out of town. 1,200 or more separate meals were served, six sacks of potatoes were used, four sheep and 12 lbs. of beef, besides a sack of sugar, rice and many other products. The missionaries with the help of Tomasa de Ayllon took the class work and the Sunday afternoon missionary service. The morning holiness preaching was done by Juan Ayllon and the evening evangelistic services were by John Carlson, a very fine evangelist and superintendent of the Lutheron Norwegian Mission of La Paz. A generous offering of twelve dollars was given him for his services, an offering of love and the people did like him. Both brought especially fine messages to the salvation and sanctification of many souls. Sunday morning there were over a hundred at the altar, being seven rows deep in front of the altar and at night 50 to 80 were the customary numbers. At the close of the Sunday morning hour the service contined long after in testimonies and pardon asking and thanksgiving for answered prayer. Sunday night's service lasted well along toward 11 o'clock with prayers and testimonies and at the close all left the church singing "Glory to His Name" at the tops of their lungs which could be heard for blocks around.

As the workers and pastors gave their reports in the business session there were many "praise the Lords," "halleluyas" and "amens." As each report was given it was noted that an increase

was made in every district in numbers, blessing and preaching points. The theme of the conference was "Be Ye Sanctified Today" and this theme was developed throughout the days. A new wrinkle introduced at this conference which had been tried before but never accomplished was the "Yearly Meeting Council." The council was composed of the councils of the organzed churches and the pastors and workers of all. Pongon Huyo brought a request to this council, which forwarded it to the Yearly Meeting, that their church he organized along the lines that the Amacari church was organized this last year. A committee was formed from the Yearly Meeting at large to accomplish this in their August Conferences. We praise God for this step forward. For months the missionaries have been working on a discipline to govern the Yearly Meeting and this was finally accomplished and adopted at this Yearly Meeting. It was read to the Yearly Meeting Council. In the Sunday afternoon service about twenty-five young men went to the altar to dedicate their lives to whatever service the Lord calls them. Oh! that we had a Bible School to train these young lives for all time service for their Master! What opportunities we have! We should strike while the iron is hot! With new workers added each year, it will soon be necessary to extend our conference for eight days and over two Sundays. We are thinking of doing it this coming year for the people are asking for it and we need a whole afternoon for each district and the regular business. As it was we held till almost six o'clock one afternoon.

### SUPERINTENDENCY

We have journeyed much during the year and visited many places for the evangelization of the field. The auto has been a blessing in helping us to travel quickly and in comfort, for this we give thanks to God. We have visited all sections and districts many times and have evangelized many other places. We have averaged two long trips a month during the year and with the Lord's help we will travel more this coming year.

We have written many letters to the pastors and workers, averaging six or eight a month, trying to keep in touch with all

our workers all the time.

We have sold a great deal of medicines and treated many of the people for various kinds of diseases even to the vaccination of many children. We sell the medicines for less than we pay for them and many times giving them outright.

During the month of July we had our part in the Bible Classes for the pastors and workers. This was a joy to us as well as a

blessing to the workers.

The mission has given out 26,793 tracts and given away 675 portions of the Gospel in Spanish. We have sold the following:

36 Bibles in Spanish

58 Testaments in Spanish

209 Testaments in Aymara

271 portions in Aymara

50 Calendars in Spanish

196 Song Books in Aymara and Spanish

26 Other books.

We have preached and given classes many times during the past year both in La Poz, on our trips and in the outstations in the conferences. We cannot give a complete report of our activities in this report so perhaps these few thing will be sufficient.

As we look forward to the coming year the sun rises over better prospects and we appreciate more than ever the promise, "But my God shall supply all your need according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus." Also, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me."

### REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF PACIFIC COLLEGE

### 1942-43

Fifty-two years of continuous service have just been completed by Pacific College.

Those sturdy Quarker pioneers who founded our College, left the imprint of their virile characters upon this institution. We have labored under great handicaps. Perhaps the testing which now faces us is the most difficult. All boys of eighteen years old and older are subject to Selective Service and those classified in I-A or IV-E have, for the most part been called. Only those boys under eighteen, those who are taking ministerial training and those physically unfit, will be left in school.

Increased cost of operation has added to our difficulties. Be-

cause we have been unable to compete in salary, we have been unable to secure a janitor for the past year. Although the cost of living has gone up more than thirty per cent, the faculty still gets only the meagre salary of depression days. Buildings are badly in need of repair and additional financial support is urgent.

### COMMENCEMENT 1943

The Commencement Concert was given on Friday evening, June 4th this year, under the direction of Prof. Emory Hobson. The Girls Chorus presented a full evening of enjoyable music.

The Baccalaureate sermon was given by the President of the College on Sunday afternoon. Following this service an informal reception in honor of the graduating class was given by the President and his wife. Sunday evening, June 6th, the Christian Associations of the College held their closing public meeting with an address by Clark Smith. Monday evening the usual class day exercises were presented by the class of 1943.

In the evening, the Annual Alumni Banquet was held honoring both this year's graduating class and the first graduating class of fifty years ago. That class consisted of only two members and both were present.

### FACULTY CHANGES

Thomas Jones resigned early in February and Randolph Hutchins was secured to fill out the year. He, however, is subject to the draft and will be sent to a C. P. S. camp at an early date. Lois M. Harmon has resigned as has Mark Daniels, teacher of voice, and Hilda Cooper, teacher of typing and shorthand. Hulda Winslow has resigned as cook at the dormitory. In all probability other changes will be necessary before the next school year starts. Lewis M. Hoskins has been elected to the faculty and will assume his responsibilities when school opens in the fall.

### OTHER CHANGES

The Board of Managers authorized the discontinuance of the typing and shorthand department for the coming year. An additional year of Bible work was authorized leading to the degree of Th. B.

The College keenly feels the passing of Cecil F. Hinshaw and Dr. Thomas W. Hester. Cecil had served for ten years on the College Board as Chairman of the Finance Committee. Dr. Hester had been president of the Board for ten years and had been a member for twenty-six years. Both were extremely active in the affairs of the College and carried heavy responsibility.

#### ACTIVITIES

Two series of meetings were sponsored by the College this year. The first one, held in the fall, was led by Lloyd Cressman. The second was led by Moses Mendenhall of Los Angeles. Both series were times of blessings, both to the College and church.

Again a large per cent of this year's student body were Friends; sixty per cent to be exact, belong to Friends.

All of the student organizations functioned successfully during this year, although inter-collegiate sports had to be curtailed somewhat because of war conditions.

The Christian Associations were active in promoting Christian work, both on and off the campus. Deputation teams were sent out to nearby churches and active support was given to special services at the College.

The College Annual was published in a creditable manner and shows many pictures of campus life.

One of the outstanding new college organizations on the campus this year, is the Christian Service Club, consisting of those students who expect to go into full time Christian Service.

Noteworthy, also is the organization of a Young Women's branch of the Pacific College Auxiliary in Portland. This group is made up of young women who have attended Pacific College.

Pacific College is trying to cooperate with our young men and women to help them prepare themselves for the tasks which they must face. Reconstruction classes have been organized for those who are called to that service. Although original plans for training those who otherwise would go to C. P. S. Camps were disrupted by a change of orders by Selective Service, the College still is offering these training courses for both men and Women who feel led to participate in the reconstruction service.

### AWARDS

Each year an award is offered to the member of each class who in scholarship and character ranks highest in his class. This: year awards went to Beverly Lambert of the Senior Class, Arthur Roberts and David Thomas divided honors with the Juniors; Wilma Archambeau was awarded the Sophomore award and the Freshman award was won by Mildred Haworth and Heinie Seidel.

Scholarships were again offered to each Quarterly Meeting

but those awards have not yet been completed.

#### FINANCES

It is obvious to everyone that war conditions affect the student enrollment and financial income, of not only our College, but every church related college. Repairs to our buildings are imperative to continue operations. Our campaign for Living Endowment has been responded to Ioyally by some. About thirtyeight hundred dollars have been given this year by Friends and others. This is not enough to insure efficient operation. Additional support must be found.

On behalf of the faculty and Board, I wish to express our appreciation for your interest, prayers and support. We look confidently to the future, trusting in God and believing that He will

lead the way.

The Greenleaf Academy report was not available at Yearly Meeting time but was received later and appears below:

To the Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends:

We are pleased to report that the 1942-43 school year has

been another profitable term for Greenleaf Academy. In practically every phase of school life progress has been evident. Throughout the year fifty-one students enrolled for instruction. In May a class of fifteen seniors received their diplomas.

Progress in the improvement and modernizing of the school plant has been more than usual this year. The basement of the Academy has been completely remodeled in such a way as to give us a roomy and cozy social hall which already has been used much not only by the organizations of the school, but also by varius community groups. This hall also provides a modern home economics room which already is equipped with stoves, cupboards, utensils, dishes, water heater, sewing machines, and wardrobes. Another part of the basement has been remodeled to provide an adequate shop room for the boys. Late in the spring the men of the community and the boys of the school rallied together to completely seal the interior of the gymnasium with celotex. Both the gymnasium and the Academy building are newly painted. We thank God for these physical gains which have been made possible by fully paid tuitions, the loyal support of the church, and the generous contributions of friends.

We feel that we have made scholastic progress this year in that the curriculum has been broadened to more adequately meet the needs and ambitions of the students. Although the tension and restlessness produced by the war times hindered to some extent, we feel that the spiritual progress of the school has been good. One period each day was given to religious activities such as Bible instruction, chapel services, Christian music, and prayer meetings. During the winter an Academy revival campaign was held. At that time every student in the school found spiritual victory. Many of these have remained established in their Christian

experience.

We are indeed thankful for the contribution that Christian education has made to the world, and we are convinced that there is a place for religious training and education in a spiritual atmosphere now as never before. We pledge ourselves to the task of carrying on this noble enterprise, and we solicit your prayers that God's richest blessings might rest upon Greenleaf Academy that she might fulfill the mission for which she has been established and maintained.

# THE REPORT OF THE YEARLY MEETING FINANCIAL SECRETARY FOR 1942-43

This has been an unusual year. There has been no financial pressure exerted and yet the financial income of the Yearly Meeting and of the Meetings of the Yearly Meeting has been the largest it has been for many years.

This is due not alone to the income of our members, but also

to the vision which they have concerning the Lord's work.

The meetings have followed a sound policy during the year and almost all if not all, of their old debts have been liquidated. The Yearly Meeting likewise retired the old debt which had been hanging over it for years. Some meetings as well as the Yearly Meeting have made careful investments in parsonages during the year. At the present time these are worth more than the purchase price and constitute good security for the indebtedness against them.

It is very gratifying to note that much more money has been sent in to the Yearly Meeting Treasurer than the amount called for in the United Budget. This is an excellent situation.

However, we need to guard ouselves againts limiting our vision to a budget of the depression years. An increased income should be paralleled by an equivalent increase in giving lest we be deluded by an increased giving which might be a decreased sacrifice.

The financial secretary would like to appeal to our meetings that if we have confidence in the boards which we appoint we should send our contributions to be distributed by boards as the Lord presents the needs. The practice of sending in designated gifts at times places the boards in the embarrassing position of thus being forced to distribute the funds as directed when there are much more pressing needs elsewhere. The United Budget was designed for the purpose of permitting a distribution of funds according to the askings of the boards. May we fervently urge that Friends make their contributions through the United Budget.

Let us look to God for guidance in the properous years for they are dangerous years.

The children have taken an active part in the meetings by leading in prayer and by giving their testimonies.

During the year just past, Christian Endeavor has faced many problems which are concurrent with the war situation. Many of societies have laid down their Young Peoples groups. There have been at least four changes in Quarterly Meeting Superintendents during the year. Many individual societies have changed officers numerous times. In some formerly strong societies the whole group has moved away. However, it is encouraging to see some of these groups buckle in and meet the situation. The intermediate groups are taking up the responsibility which has been left to them.

The Lesson helps have been published, both the regular helps and the Intermediate Helps. Helen Willcuts has served as the editor for the Regular Lesson Helps and Lois Harmon, for the Intermediates. Their work is much appreciated.

Because of the confusion of the different societies the money for the pledges has not been sent in full. Some societies, which disbanded in the middle of the year failed to send their quota in. The credit for this would seem to lie in the confusion and disorganization rather than upon the ability of members to pay.

Two conferences were held last year, Quaker Hill and Twin Rocks, with the semi-annual business meeting held at Quaker Hill. Wanna Mer conference was not held.

Although travel was greatly curtailed, I managed to visit 17 different societies and several Quarterly Meeting Rallies, traveling some 900 miles in Christian Endeavor interests. More than 200 letters were written.

The Executive Committee met seven times. They are to be

commended for their fine work.

I am sure that Christian Endeavor work has meant much to the Church and despite discouragements, has held its spiritual life high. Many young people found Christ at the conferences. Many lives were strengthened and consecrated.

A few societies have sponsored revivals. Three or four have written telling of pageants, plays and programs which they have

presented.

In all the societies which I visited, I found an eagerness to follow the Christian Endeavor motto, "Christ and the Church." I believe this spirit will become greater in following years.
