Minutes Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church

1964

• 1. The seventy-second session of Oregon Yearly Meeting convenes at Newberg, Oregon, August 11, 1964. We acknowledge our inadequacy to carry out God's highest purposes for His Church without the guidance of God's presence in the midst, and our wills yielded to Christ our Lord. As we meet in business sessions, board meetings and meetings for worship, let our deepest desire be to crown Him Lord of all.

Wayne Piersall led the congregation in singing 'The Church's One

Foundation Is Jesus Christ Our Lord."

The assistant clerk, Glen Rinard, led in prayer.

• 2. Dean Gregory, Yearly Meeting General Superintendent, brought the keynote address, "The More Excellent Way," based on 1 Corinthians 13. A summary follows:

These inspired words by the apostle Paul are like searchlights—wherever the light of truth finds a response in human hearts there is a witness to the Light. Thank God for men and women constrained by

Christ's love who bear witness (around the world) today.

Clare Willcuts and I enjoyed the privilege of visiting our fields in Bolivia and Peru as well as a brief visit in Colombia and a week of ministry in Guatemala. Our experiences with the brethren of the National Friends Church of Bolivia, and the ensuing events, appear to us now as chapters out of an inspired book of Acts, 1964. It appears that God has raised up men who are bearing the heavy load of spiritual leadership, leaders among the Aymaras. Christ is building His Church among them as surely as He did in Macedonia and Caesarea. Our field is much larger than we can occupy with our present task force—we need more missionaries.

We have a concern for the image of the church and public relations. A baptism in the love of God would bring a spiritual renewal that would take care of our public image, for the world would see Jesus through us. Hot spots in the world are not confined to Viet Nam and Laos. We have our shameful share of the world's hatred and violence in our own loved land. Peace marches and sit-ins are not the answer, but it is Christ shown and preached by people whose lives are filled with faith, hope and love.

Thank God many of our youth are challenged with the militant theme of world-wide evangelism. Our emphasis on evangelism, church extension and missions is bearing fruit. This summer Charles Mylander was sent, as our first Youth Ambassador abroad, to Bolivia. Next summer, the Lord willing, Lonny Fendall will follow his year of study in Ghana with service under our Youth Ambassador program in visitation of Friends missions in Africa. Will we be able to provide a challenge big enough for the faith of scores of our dedicated youth?

We must advance on every line rather than retreat in any department. According to Clynton Crisman's study of 20 years' growth, the 23 new churches started since 1943 contributed around \$20,000 to our Yearly Meeting program according to the last annual report, and account for an average Sunday School attendance of 1,683 out of a total of 5,809 this past year. To discourage church extension is to discourage evangelism. However, there is little evidence that our total membership is busy at the job. This past year we have just been able to keep a small margin of increase in all services. There are many distractions, the main oneself-centeredness. Nearly 100 pastors have left the pulpits of Oregon Yearly Meeting during the past 13 years. Only 16 of our present pastors were in the work 13 years ago. Of the 11 pastoral changes this year, only 3 pastors are remaining in pastoral work. There must be a renewed sense of urgency for the preaching of the Gospel. We are neither challenging our youth to the ministry nor demanding very much of them in significant service if they do enter the ministry. Where are Friends youth sponsors? How many Sunday School teachers feel responsibility for teaching only one hour a week? Where is the discipline in the home that characterized Quaker homes a generation ago? It is time to rise to the demands of our day. Our society is rapidly becoming pagan even though 116,000,000 claim membership in some church or synagogue. For every dollar spent on churches we spend \$12,000 on crime. I would call Oregon Quakers back to the old rugged Gospel of the cross. Jesus said, "He that taketh not his cross, and followeth after me, is not worthy of me."

Dorwin Smith expressed the hope that the spirit, concern and challenge of this message would carry through the sessions of the Yearly Meeting.

Joseph Reece, former General Superintendent, led in prayer.

• 3. A letter was read from Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting expressing appreciation of Dean Gregory's timely messages during their 1963 sessions.

• 4. The following visitors were welcomed: Russell Myers, pastor of the Friends Church in Bell, California—our guest minister for these sessions; Bob Hawkins, representing the Better Book and Bible House of Portland, Oregon; Clarence Kearns of San Jose, California, who attended Pacific Academy at one time; Wilbur and Esther Brandenberg, recently moved to Newberg from Iowa Yearly Meeting.

Dean Gregory introduced several new pastors in our Yearly Meeting—William Meehan of Nampa, Dan and Judi Nolta of Svensen, Paul Baker of Pringle, Roy Dunagan of Forest Home, and Marion Clarkson of Springbrook. He also introduced Pastor Kim of Portland, recently married, working among Koreans and Japanese in that area; and David and Catherine Liu, working in Portland among the American Chinese people, both couples serving in Oregon Yearly Meeting. Levi Pennington announced the recent residence at Friendsview Manor of Gervas A. Carey, former clerk of this Yearly Meeting. A letter of greeting and appreciation will be sent to him from this Meeting.

• 5. The resignation of Lyle Love as announcing clerk was read. Naming a replacement was referred to the representatives.

• 6. A letter was read from Woodland Monthly Meeting expressing appreciation for the check sent by the Yearly Meeting to help on their parsonage improvement project.

- 9. Named to the memorial committee were Adelaide Barker, Mary Butler, May Wallace.
- $\bullet\,$ 10. Named to write letters to aged Friends were Walter Cook, Marie Haines.
- 11. The following request from Newberg Monthly Meeting was read:
 The Newberg Monthly Meeting finds some uncertainty as to the proper procedure for selecting the chairman of the Board of Trustees. If the Trustees constitute a regular church committee, the chairman should be chosen by the nominating committee—see "The Constitution and Discipline," page 46, paragraph 4. But if the listing of Board of Trustees on page 45, paragraph 1, implies a difference from the regular committees, the paragraph might also state how the chairman shall be selected.

At our regular Monthly Meeting on May 6, 1964, it was decided to send a request to the Yearly Meeting asking that this point be made clear. We ask that the Quarterly Meeting forward this request to the Yearly Meeting.

This was referred to the representatives. (See minutes 36, 95)

• 12. The following resolution from Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting was read:

Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting recommends that Oregon Yearly Meeting urge support in the building of a chapel on George Fox College campus.

This was referred to the Board of General Education.

• 13. The following concern from Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting was read:

Standards for Monthly Meetings—Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting suggests that Monthly Meetings be required to meet certain standards in order to maintain their status as such. Suggested standards might include self-support, self-government, and self-extension, as established by Oregon Yearly Meeting.

We feel that improvements in this area may possibly strengthen the work of the Lord in our churches.

This was referred to the representatives.

- 14. A certificate of service, wherever the door may open, granted by First Friends Monthly Meeting of Spokane, Washington, to Everett and Ann Puckett, was read and approved by the meeting. Dorwin Smith said that since this was written, Everett Puckett had suffered a heart attack and should be remembered in prayer.
- 15. A certificate of service for Lonny Fendallas he studies in Ghana and visits Friends in different parts of the world, written by West Chehalem Monthly Meeting, was read and approved by the meeting.
- 16. A concern was expressed from the floor that the concern of Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting regarding standards for monthly meetings be referred to the Board of Evangelism instead of to the representatives. Some favored keeping the former action; others suggested referring the matter to the representatives with members of the Board of Evangelism present to make available studies already made. After discussion, the meeting approved letting the action taken in minute No. 11 stand.
- 17. Meeting adjourned to meet Wednesday at 9:15 a.m.

- 18. The session opened with a period of prayer and meditation.
- 19. The minutes of the previous session were read, corrected and approved.
- 20. The representatives nominate William Meehan to serve as announcing clerk for the remaining sessions of this Yearly Meeting.
 Approved.
- 21. The treasurer's report was read. This report appears in the appendix. Dean Gregory expressed appreciation for the time and care given the books of the Yearly Meeting by Roger and Mildred Minthorne for the past thirteen years.

Approved with a minor correction suggested by Roger Minthorne.

- 22. Permission to submit the treasurer's books to the auditing committee immediately following Yearly Meeting, with their report to be forwarded to the clerk, was requested by Roger Minthorne.

 Approved.
- 23. The reports of the state of the churches were read and approved. The following is a summary:

The common denominator of these reports is encouragement in the forward progress of the spiritual condition of our congregations. Many reported, further, a unity of fellowship among members and a right attitude toward and concern for those outside the church. Special meetings have brought growth and deepening interest to all ages in several meetings. Increased attendance has been encouraging in some areas. The quality of pastoral ministry is widely appreciated. As a whole,

care is taken to uphold Friends' doctrines and to see that those appointed to church and Sunday School responsibilities are in agreement with these standards.

Concern for the spiritual development of children and young people has influenced program planning in some meetings. Faithfulness in the practice of family devotions is reported by most groups. The "Fruit of the Vine" is being used in many homes.

Problems that need prayer and thoughtful consideration include attendance at Sunday evening services and prayer meeting. Also, it is reported that while the majority of our members are walking in the light, some are lax, rebellious, or are resisting a deeper experience. There is a need for more instruction in Friends' doctrines.

There were several expressions of desire that there be a "hungering and thirsting after righteousness" and the pursuit of the presence of the Holy Spirit among us all.

• 24. The Discipline Revision committee submits the following amendment by request of the Board of Trustees of George Fox College:

For paragraph 5, page 110, relation to George Fox College, substitute the following wording: "All trustees of the college are elected by the Yearly Meeting. Of the total of forty-two, not more than fourteen are elected each year for terms of three years. These are nominated as follows: not more than six by Oregon Yearly Meeting; not more than six by the college board of trustees; not more than two by the college alumni association. Members to fill vacancies occurring otherwise than by expiration of term are nominated by the group entitled to representation by the original nomination."

Milo Ross, president of the college, made clarifying remarks.

Approved to be handed back to the Discipline Revision committee to be brought back to the floor at next year's sessions.

• 25. A resignation from the Board of Missions was read from Glen Rinard. He feels the Lord is leading him to a field of service in another area.

Approved.

• 26. A resignation was read from Robert L. Morrill from the Board of Missions due to an appointment in Inland Quarterly Meeting which places him on the Board of Finance.

Approved.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

• 27. Joseph G. Reece, president of the board, presented a brief report as follows:

First and foremost may I say that we have as fine a corps of dedicated workers as you will find anywhere. In spite of this we had to face some situations which hindered us in meeting some of our deadlines. This was due in large measure to three things:

- 1. Our very competent compositor, Arlene Fiscus, was ill several weeks.
 - 2. We were slowed down by obsolete and worn equipment.
- Our small working force finds it hard at times to do all that needs to be done.

Our manager will tell you some of the plans we have in mind for next year.

On page 19, minute 69, of last year's minutes you will find that the Board of Publication was asked to initiate plans for the observance of the 75th anniversary of Oregon Yearly Meeting in 1968. Harold Antrim and Jack Willcuts were appointed to set plans in operation.

Harlow Ankeny was asked to represent this board at a gathering of representatives from the four independent yearly meetings, which was held at Haviland, Kansas, last September 12 and 13. Out of this conference emerged the Evangelical Friends Alliance with a department on publications. Harlow Ankeny was appointed vice-chairman of the new Commission on Publications. Jack Willcuts was appointed a member of this commission.

Last April Jack Willcuts and Harlow Ankeny represented us at a meeting of the new Evangelical Friends Alliance which met in Chicago, Illinois. They visited several places selling printing equipment and came home full of ideas.

This board met seven times during the year to prayerfully consider the work you appointed us to do.

Harlow Ankeny, manager of Barclay Press, gave a summary of his year's work, and goals for the new year. He commented on the effectiveness of each staff member.

Appreciation from the floor was expressed for the growth of Barclay Press, the work of the Board of Publication, and the staff.

The financial statement will appear in the appendix. Approved.

- 28. Gene Hockett, alumnus of Western Evangelical Seminary, summarized the value of seminary training in his ten years of pastoral work. Glenn Armstrong, currently training at W. E. S., added his testimony. Paul Petticord, president of W. E. S., introduced Kenneth Eichenberger, present business manager, and then spoke briefly.
- 29. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p.m.

Inspirational Hour, 10:45 a.m.

Russell Myers, guest speaker for the Yearly Meeting sessions, spoke during this period from 1 John 4:19, "We love Him because He first loved us." Why do multitudes of people love Him? Why did the disciples follow Him unto death and some of them until death? Because He has so many lovely qualities about His personality—goodness, pure and unsulied; unselfishness, courage, tenderness, humility, faith, compassion, and sinlessness. Also our love for Him comes as a result of His first loving us. Jesus never met a man He didn't love. When we were sinful and had no capacity to love Him, He loved us. Further, He is such a wonderful friend. A definition of a friend is "one who comes in when the whole world goes out." Henry Ford wrote that one's best friend is he who brings out the best within you. We love Christ because when we meet Him, best things begin to happen, the best part of us begins to be seen. He shows us that we're not as we ought to be but that we can be different—we can become what we ought to be.

Wednesday, 2:30 p.m.

- 30. The meeting opened with prayer by Paul Cammack.
- 31. Levi Pennington introduced two visitors: Robert J. Rumsey, peace secretary, and Hugh Cummings, college secretary, of the Portland office of the American Friends Service Committee.

BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

• 32. Merle Green, president of the board, presented the following report:

As the moral, ethical and spiritual cameras view our globe today from a comprehensive distance, there can be seen many spots of internal eruption. Large craters of unrest are evident, and cloudy seas of militarism lay over many areas of our globe. Valleys of hunger and starvation can be seen.

To relieve these spots of suffering and heartache and to implement peace among men and good will on earth, 48 churches of our Yearly Meeting report the following:

Three churches shipped a total of 210 pounds of clothing overseas.

Twenty-six meetings participated in raising \$1112.05 to ship food overseas for relief. Two car loads have been shipped, and the third as soon as the balance is in. \$189.85 in cash gifts was given to other overseas relief.

For home relief, 20 churches gave 32 Thanksgiving boxes, and 29 churches gave 117 Christmas boxes.

Seven churches gave food and money to city missions.

Ten churches helped families who had loss by fire.

Twenty-nine churches gave relief in other forms and through other channels. A total of \$972.01 in cash gifts was reported given by 14 churches. Three other meetings reported giving, but no amount was stated.

To promote PEACE-

Nineteen churches reported using peace literature.

Two churches used filmstrips on peace.

Twelve churches had peace presentations in their Sunday Schools.

Five churches had special promotion on peace in their church services.

Nineteen churches observed "Peace Emphasis Week."

Fifty-one sermons on peace were preached.

Eighteen classes on peace were taught.

Twenty discussion groups on peace were held.

Thirty-nine young men are in the armed services.

Fifty young men are registered as C. O. 's (1-0).

Sixteen young men have been and are doing their C. O. civilian work.

We thank the Lord for these churches which have promoted peace and have showed mercy to the needy of our world. John's record of our Lord's message to the church at Thyatira was, "I know thy works, and charity, and service, and faith, and thy patience. . ."

As the Lord looks upon our works, charity and service, will He say,

"well done"?

Stanley Perisho, chairman of service, spoke of the problem of homeless children, and suggested that the need for homes for adoption and for care of infants waiting to be adopted offers a challenge to provide Christian homes for these homeless children.

We exceeded our service project goal last year. The goal for this

year is four carloads of food.

Clark Smith, chairman of peace, spoke on the Friends' basis of a

testimony for peace in the Scriptures.

Dean Gregory gave a brief report of contact with the Mennonite Central Committee regarding cooperation in the field of placing conscientious objectors in foreign service. Specific recommendations may come later.

Merle Green suggested that the Yearly Meeting send a letter to President Johnson indicating our prayers on behalf of any effort of his to promote peace.

The report was approved. The meeting approved that the suggested letter be written by the Board of Peace and Service and brought back to the floor. (See minutes 94, 113)

• 33. The Business Committee recommends the following report:

The minutes of liberation which were issued to Dean Gregory and Clare Willcuts before their visitation in Central and South America have been returned to us. Words of appreciation from the annual meeting in Central America have been appended, and a lengthy letter received from the Bolivian brethren on behalf of the Cordillera Quarterly Meeting and the National Church.

We have also the minute issued to Gordon St. George, with notes appended by the clerks of Ireland Yearly Meeting, East Africa Yearly Meeting, Mweya Bible Institute in Burundi, and a meeting in Jordan.

The minute issued to Paul Mills has been returned with similar notations.

These returning minutes were read.

• 34. The following recommendations from Southwest Washington Quarterly Meeting was referred to the Yearly Meeting by the Executive Council:

That the pastor's salary be not lower than the starting salary of a beginning public school teacher of that local area.

After discussion, which revealed that the Ministry and Oversight body is studying monthly meeting standards, it was decided to refer the recommendation to that body.

• 35. The Music committee's report was read as follows:

Your Music committee has carried on the following activities this year, with a growing conviction that more needs to be done to aid the individual churches in carrying on a more adequate music program. We are seeking to find other ways to encourage local meetings and to expand the activities that are already being carried.

The Music Box column has appeared periodically in THE NORTHWEST FRIEND this year, giving reports, information and aids as well as inspiration for the music leaders of the churches.

March was observed by 15 churches as Music Month.

A film strip and record, "Stories of Great Hymns," was loaned to nine churches for use in their services.

A song-writing contest was again sponsored by the committee with 15 fine entries. More categories were represented this year, and the general quality of the entries was higher.

One music conference was held at Portland First Friends Church with the help of the music committee of that church.

Ruth Corbin helped in a music leadership conference at Ashland in September, involving Ashland, Talent and Medford churches, and spoke at Camas on church music during a regular evening service in March.

SUMMARY OF THE QUESTIONNAIRE: There were 46 meetings reporting; 11 of these had not reported last year. Ten who reported last year did not report this year. In order to get as complete a picture as possible, I have used data from last year's report for these 10 meetings. Thus, this report covers 56 meetings.

Regular choirs - 25, with 416 singers

Seasonal choirs - 12, with 157 singers

This makes a total of 37 choirs with approximately 573 singers.

There were 16 children's or youth choirs reported with about 357 singers. This is not an increase in the number of choirs, but is a very substantial increase in the number of singers. It almost doubles the number of singers reported two years ago.

Twenty-six churches now have some kind of electric organ as compared to 19 last year and 12 the year before. Incidentally, four meetings report still using reed pump organs.

Sixteen choirs sang 13 different cantatas or oratorios. Seven choirs report singing seasonal programs of miscellaneous numbers.

Fifteen churches have used the CHURCH MUSICIAN'S HANDBOOK.

Levi Pennington pointed out how far Friends have come in the use of music for worship of God and urged that we use appropriate music to express our faith and praise.

The report was approved.

• 36. The following recommendation from the representatives was read:

In consideration of the communication from Newberg Quarterly Meeting, the representatives propose to the Yearly Meeting that the monthly meeting trustees be classified as a board rather than a committee. We further recommend that the nominating committee of the monthly meeting propose to the monthly meeting the chairman. If the Yearly Meeting concurs in this proposal an addition to the Discipline will be necessary. and we further recommend that this be referred to the Discipline Revision committee for the proper wording. All quarterly meetings have approved to amend the constitution by changing the name. We hereby request the approval of Oregon Yearly Meeting for this name change and that the Discipline be changed to read accordingly.

The change of name was approved. It was suggested that a typographical change in the Discipline be made, changing the name every place it appears.

Approved.

• 52. The Executive Council recommends to the Yearly Meeting that, in reviewing the responsibility of the Executive Council as given in the Discipline, p. 58, par. h, the Yearly Meeting need not appoint the Committee on Doctrinal Reference.

This was held over until the afternoon session.

BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

• 53. The annual report of the Board of Moral Action was presented as follows:

It is quite evident that Oregon Yearly Meeting Quakers feel that moral action concerns are important. About half of our Queries and one-third of the Declaration of Faith and other statements included in the Discipline refer to the issues under consideration of this board. Even so, there were fewer temperance presentations, including films, flannelgraphs and object lessons given than in the past several years, and tract distribution declined considerably also. There were a goodly number of posters displayed, and many books about public morals were added to church libraries. Better family life was promoted through good reading and the giving of Christian literature as gifts. Board members all received reprints of Family Checklists for TV viewing and also suggestions of things people could do about obscene literature in a community.

Pastors seemed very conscious of moral conditions and increased the pastors seemed very conscious to these problems. Quarterly Meetnumber of sermons and references to books helpful to pastors who find it necessary to counsel with alcoholics or their families. Several committee members attended classes or participated in panel discussions on alcohol problems. There were about nine quarterly meeting presenta-

tions, and a conference held in the southern part of Oregon.

Commitment Day, though newly introduced this year, was observed by about one-third of the meetings with talks in various Sunday School departments, speech contests, films, sermons, counselling and 896 or departments, speech contests, and one meeting felt that pledges more total abstinence pledges given out. One meeting felt that pledges more total abstinence product is already planning for the coming Commitment Day.

Youth were not forgotten. Youth Temperance Education Week was ob-Youth were not longotten. The students observed in some churches and material was given to the students observed in some churches and speech contests. The students of one science projects, essay and speech contests. The students of Greenleaf Academy made a valuable contribution in these areas. Several leaf Academy made a variable of Youth Temperance Council camps in the states of Idaho and Oregon, and more than a dozen young people attended as enthusiastic campers. The children were not forgotten. A Loyal Temperance Legion was organized to meet monthly in a primary church, and a temperance day camp was held. Several children learned and reand a temperative day camp the cited recitations. Christian Endeavor and Sunday School lessons were presented at all age levels.

Legislation and Christian citizenship was of greater interest this year, especially in the fields of prayer and Bible reading in the schools, obscene literature, liquor, tobacco and gambling. The Yearly Meeting was represented at a hearing after which a license was refused the restaurant at the Medford airport. One meeting prepared a list of eating places where liquor is not served.

The meeting reported cooperation and support to the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, Allied Civic Forces, Oregon Council on Alcohol Problems, and Alcohol Problems Association in the three states.

Department of Literature

Literature and reading have always been important to Quakers. Of 53 churches reporting, all have church libraries with a total of 9048 14

books and magazines. One-hundred forty-eight volumes were added this year, and 41 have regularly appointed librarians. Many individuals have loaned their own books to supplement the Christian literature available through the church libraries. Medford, Seattle Memorial and First Friends, Portland, have moved their libraries to new locations, adding new shelving. Pringle has started a new library.

First Friends Church in Portland is reorganizing its library, listing their visual aids and beginning a cross file of all educational materials. Seattle Memorial Friends Church observed National Library Week in April by a church library dinner with 62 people present and nearly that many books added to the library. One of their members attended a sixweeks church library course.

Thirteen churches have actively combatted obscene literature and horror comics found on the news stands and elsewhere. The dangers of this literature were pointed out through presentations in Sunday School, youth meetings and adult groups. Good books have been provided and promoted through discussion and book reviews; Bible reading was encouraged; and the importance of good literature in the home was empha-

A few churches have been vigilant in discovering news stands selling obscene material and protesting to the dealers, writing letters of protest to government officials, and cooperating with local groups such as WCTU and PTA active in getting this material off of the news stands. Two pastors preached sermons challenging their members to action.

The menace of obscene literature is increasing with its consequent lowering of moral standards. The churches who are ignoring this problem are failing to be realistic if they feel that there is no danger from obscene literature. Certainly no city church is free from this problem, and even churches in communities where little of this material is sold cannot ignore its effects upon their members.

Every Friend should inform himself by reading such articles as "Poison in Print-and How to Get Rid of It" (Reader's Digest, May, 1964) and "Is Nothing Obscene Anymore?" (Time, p. 45, July 10, 1964), and then take positive action by protesting against it and by educating our

children to its potential dangers.

Myron Goldsmith, president of the board, introduced Virginia Helm, chairman of the Department of Moral Action, who discussed the seriousness of teenage drinking, its relationship to crime, and the responsibility of the churches, especially Friends. On the brighter side, there are outstanding young athletes in the news and young people in our churches who are speaking out against these evils. This has been a good year for temperance work among our youth. Marilyn Latham won a silver medal in a speech contest. Gay Clifton won first place in an essay contest, Marilyn Binford taking second place. Another avenue of teaching temperance truth is the WCTU youth camp program. Cheryl Timson and Karen Ince reported attending the Idaho camp. David Strait told about his experience in the Oregon camp. The Moral Action Board allows scholarships to camps in all the states in response to letters—"Why I want to go to camp."

Observance of Youth Temperance Education Week by our churches is urged. The handbook contains suggestions.

Myron Goldsmith emphasized the collection of Friends books for the library of Western Evangelical Seminary. Also, Friends should be alert to the increasing presence of obscene literature in many communities and take action to eliminate it.

The report was approved.

• 54. Arthold Latham, principal of Greenleaf Friends Academy, presented a report of the year's activity and progress. (A copy of this report may be obtained upon request from the academy.)

• 55. Dorwin Smith expressed appreciation for the valuable service of our assistant superintendent, Clynton Crisman, and his wife Marjorie. He asked them to come to the platform, where Dean and Kathleen Gregory joined them, pinning a corsage on Marjorie and a boutonniere on Clynton in honor of their 20th wedding anniversary today.

Dean Gregory added a surprise announcement that the clerk, Dorwin Smith, and his wife Marita, recently celebrated their 25th wedding anniversary. A gift was presented, and opened by Dorwin since Marita was

unable to attend Yearly Meeting this year.

• 56. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p.m.

Inspirational Hour, 11:25 a.m.

We have heard that the Word of God is relevant to our day. Our message today is 2,000-plus years old from a contemporary of Confucius, Haggai, whose burden was to encourage the people to resume the build-

ing of the temple after 15 years of no progress.

There are four main sections of Haggai, each recording a divine message. The first, written in September, 520 B.C., reproves the Jews for building their own sealed homes and letting the Temple building go, thus revealing their false contentment. "Prophets" today also say "this is no time to be building. Now is not the time." Dubious men are seldom men of action. Great men of faith are men of action. The time to do God's work is now!

The second section, written October 21, 520 B.C., reproves the people's false discontent. They looked at their building in the light of the old days. "Today is not to be compared with the past." You can't unlock today's problems with the rusty, old key of the past. God is looking for men who don't wait and then work, but who work first and then wait. Those who do something for God roll up their sleeves and pitch in.

The third section reveals the people's false expectations which were unwarranted because of evil in their midst. There must be obedience without barter or bargaining with God. He has a way—it may not be our way but He will bless us - His way - if we are obedient. Our job is to be strong and believe and honor Him.

The fourth section deals with false fear.

• 57. The meeting opened with a period of quiet waiting in the presence of God. Prayer was offered by Dan Nolta and Dorwin Smith for guidance to God's will by the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

• 58. The recommendation by the Executive Council presented in minute 52 was discussed. The meeting did not approve the recommendation. The action of 1963, minute 119, was again approved to stand as is.

• 59. Dorwin Smith announced the engagement of Beth Hockett, secretary to the Yearly Meeting since 1950, to Vernon Bagley of Astoria. Appreciation was expressed for her years of sacrificial service for the Yearly Meeting.

• 60. The Executive Council recommends to the Yearly Meeting, in order to reduce Fixed Expense, that each local church pre-order Yearly Meeting minutes at the rate of 50 cents per copy.

Approved to begin next year.

• 61. The following report of the committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations was read.

The committee met six times during the year to accomplish its tasks. These tasks were set forth in a general way when in 1961 Oregon Yearly Meeting first approved these principles for the recovery of denominational vision: (1) to strengthen such bonds of unity as we now have. (2) to define our doctrines, and (3) to work toward the establishment of a Friends

church, world-wide in scope and evangelical in nature.

Subsequently certain cooperative efforts by the independent, evangelical yearly meetings resulted in a Coordinating Council to implement these efforts, and the work of this Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations was defined in 1963 as follows: (1) to advise Oregon's members of the Coordinating Council, (2) to encourage and to coordinate a ministry of visitation, and (3) to formulate ideas on church polity in anticipation of

an eventually established Friends church.

We have given considerable attention to the activities of cooperation among Oregon, Kansas, Rocky Mountain and Ohio Yearly Meetings which have eventuated in the formation of an Evangelical Friends Alliance with cooperation in areas of missions, publication, church extension, and youth work. Dean Gregory and Gerald Dillon, Oregon's representatives on the Coordinating Council, presented to us the general plans for the Evangelical Friends Alliance, with specific recommendations with which we concur and recommend to the Yearly Meeting. Full presentation of a constitution awaits agreement as to its form; but the following actions will establish our wishes in regard to the nature of the organization.

We recommend that:

- (1) The name 'Evangelical Friends Alliance" be given to the cooperative efforts now inaugurated among the several independent yearly meet-
 - (2) that the Evangelical Friends Alliance be incorporated.

(3) Oregon Yearly Meeting accept a proportionate share of the financial responsibilities and participate in the travel pool, through expense ac-

counts already in existence.

(4) Oregon Yearly Meeting favor a constitutional provision to the effect that any yearly meeting of Friends may apply to join the Evangelical Friends Alliance and may be accepted providing there is official agreement with the doctrines and policies of the E. F. A. The Coordinating Council may refer such applications to the member yearly meetings. These shall be accepted as members providing dissent is registered by no more than one member yearly meeting.

(5) Oregon Yearly Meeting favor a constitutional provision that any other yearly meeting which desires may send observer delegates to

E. F. A. workshop conferences.

(6) the name "Friends Youth" replace "Christian Endeavor." We report the following organization of the E. F. A.:

> President - Dean Gregory Vice-president - Walter P. Lee Secretary-treasurer - Chester Stanley

An E. F. A. conference and workshop is scheduled to meet at Colorado Springs on January 12-14, 1965.

Concerning the second of our tasks, we have reviewed the visitations of Paul Mills, Gordon St. George and Fred Newkirk. It is gratifying to our concern to have noted the minutes of service returned by these and by our general superintendent, reflecting a consciousness of responsibility for Friends around the world and a desire for an enlarged vision of the Friends church.

We have discussed opportunities for a ministry of visitation with one of our members during the past year, Lonny Fendall. He will be studying in Ghana next year on a Rotary International fellowship, and hopes to visit among Friends enroute. We plan to assist him financially and would like for the boards of Missions and Christian Education to consider this also.

We lent our encouragement and some funds to the ministerial association to make plans for a joint conference with California ministers. We are glad to report that this conference will take place next spring. We feel that our relationship with California Yearly Meeting is a fine evidence of inter-yearly meeting unity and hope that this relationship may be maintained at various levels of cooperation.

We have not done much on our third appointed task, the formulation of ideas on church polity. We should do more and hope to this next year. Gerald Dillon and Milo Ross did, however, attend and give leadership to a national conference on evangelism this summer called by Eugene Coffin, secretary for the Board of Evangelism of the Five Years Meet-

ing of Friends.

BOARD OF GENERAL EDUCATION

• 62. Kenneth M. Williams, president of the board, commented on the following report in the hands of the congregation:

Six hundred and thirty-one junior high and 487 senior high school students who attend churches in Oregon Yearly Meeting comprise a vast field of responsibility and service for the members of our church. Together with those in college and graduate schools, approximately 1500 people in our Yearly Meeting are in the process of being educated in formal schooling. It is certainly time that we as a church give serious consideration to the kind of education these are receiving.

Of the 487 reported to be in senior high schools, 88 are definitely planning to attend George Fox College. It is not known how many of these do not plan to attend college, nor how many have not yet made a decision about college, but here is an opportunity to sell the merits of our college to a thousand young people in our constituency. It is imperative that pastors and influential leaders in every church become acquainted with the excellent program and influence of our college and actively present this and the great need for Christian higher education to our youth.

Fourteen grants-in-aid and scholarships have been provided by the churches to aid students attending George Fox College. The total dollar value of these grants is \$2,786.57, with approximately \$350.00 being pro-

vided to help students attending other schools.

The college has been presented at least once in every church which reported, with a total of 120 presentations having been made in the Yearly Meeting. Our records indicate that a total of \$15,478.00 has been contributed to the college through the churches; this is about half of the figure reported received by the college. Newberg Monthly Meeting contributed approximately \$10,000.00 of this amount.

Greenleaf Academy has been presented about 73 times in the Yearly Meeting, with 50 of these presentations being made to the Greenleaf meeting, as they receive a weekly report from the academy authorities. The Greenleaf Meeting contributed \$32,000 to the work of the academy, and still was high in its contributions to George Fox College. This meeting is to be commended for the tremendous support it gives to Christian education.

Almost every church reported that there is consistent prayer support for the college, with a number indicating that their support in prayer should be increased. Each church should surely make full use of the prayer bulletins furnished by the college and give definite time to upholding this work in prayer.

The report of the College Cooperating Committee is as follows:

Members of the Board of General Education met with officials at the college during the past year, and individual members from the cooperating committee of the board visited the campus. All members were very favorably impressed with the tone and atmosphere of our college. The members of the faculty appear to be dedicated to their particular phase of instruction and to the whole development of the students. The students appeared to be enthusiastic about the college and had a real sense of purpose generally. The student body leadership is provided by dedicated Christian young men and women who seem to be cooperative and vitally interested in the growth of the college.

The activities and instruction provide adequate opportunities for the

students to develop spiritually, intellectually and socially.

It is regrettable that there is not at present a suitable place for the college chapel, although the work done to provide these facilities in the gymnasium is commendable. The building of a suitable chapel and auditorium may be a fitting project for Oregon Yearly Meeting.

The buildings already built and now in the process of being built make one want to shout for joy. May God grant the sponsoring church the

vision and wisdom to keep pace with our expanding college.

Gene Mulkey, chairman During the past year the board has corresponded with quarterly meeting chairmen, encouraging each of them to get materials to their local monthly meeting chairmen, so that the work of the board could be made known in each meeting. The board is still in the formative stages, and much refining of the scope of its work yet needs to be done. A majority

of the board members were able to meet in Pendleton in April for an all

day workshop. The statement for the yearly meeting handbook was prepared, the annual report form was set up, and information concerning the publicizing of scholarships was distributed. Monthly and quarterly meeting chairmen of the board distributed and forwarded to the college applications and information concerning the Heacock Family scholarships, so that these were awarded to the students from the various quarterly meetings.

Members of the Board of General Education feel there is need for further refining of the definition, purposes and aims of the board. In view of this the following recommendation is submitted to the Yearly

Meeting for its action:

Definition: The Board of General Education shall concern itself with the formal education of the individuals within Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends.

Purpose: The purpose of the board shall be the advancement of a God-centered philosophy of education from kindergarten through graduate schools.

Specific Aims: To aid our constituency to develop a God-centered philosophy of education.

To encourage the participation of all Friends in all phases of public education.

To support and encourage teachers in public and private educational institutions and to encourage qualified young people to enter the teaching profession.

To promote attendance at George Fox College.

To encourage the support of George Fox College.

To provide financial aid for students:

A. Encourage the establishment of new means of financial aids.

B. Publicize existing financial aids.

C. Encourage long range family planning for children's education. To encourage the support of Greenleaf Academy in suitable ways.

To support and encourage advanced education for qualified students.

The Board of General Education submits the following recommendation

for the action of the Yearly Meeting:

Because we believe that George Fox College is so vital to the continued growth of our church and is so desperately needed as a Christian college, and because it is and must continue to be such an integral part of Oregon Yearly Meeting, we recommend that the churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting give concrete evidence of their support of George Fox College by including the work of the college in the budget of each local monthly meeting.

We further recommend that the giving be designated as a sub-item under the Board of General Education to be included in the askings of the United Budget.

Members should be encouraged to give to the college through the budget of their church, but each should also assume an individual responsibility to continue his contribution to the college directly through

the living endowment fund.

Kenneth Williams introduced George Moore, Dean of Faculty of George Fox College, who spoke on the value of the minds of our youth. Many place Christian education at the bottom of their list of giving. There is a tremendous difference between secular information learned in secular schools and in Christian schools. We short change our youth when we have more concern over the feed for our animals, the lubrication for our cars, or the decor for our living rooms than the quality of ideas that are fed to our children. The ideological warfare in today's world is very real.

There are three ways to arrive at truth: through the senses, through the intellect and through the revealed Truth of God. We believe that apart from God there is no truth.

The Board of General Education has a philosophy of education-plus. Parents are urged to consider these values when making choices for their children's education.

The report was approved.

Gerald Dillon urged that because of the pertinency of George Moore's message, it should reach our constituency. The board might consider ways to implement their program to include getting this message to our members.

Kenneth Williams read the recommendations from the board in the report given above.

Discussion was held over till Friday morning. (See minute 71)

• 63. Wilmer Brown, northwest field representative of the National Association of Evangelicals, spoke. A brief summary follows:

Your N. A. E. is still your voice in the world. The problems today are increasing in complexity. It is impossible to be expert on issues. We can be a listening post and feed back to you the issues as we see them. We must keep our purposes the same as the central purpose of the church—the presentation of the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

The report was approved.

• 64. The meeting adjourned to meet Friday morning, August 14, at 9:15.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

• 68. Presentation of the Board of Evangelism by Charles Beals, president, on Wednesday evening was approved with expressions of appreciation by Milo Ross and Dan Nolta for the specific goals and policies outlined in the report. There were other expressions of commendation and support. The report follows:

The Board of Evangelism has conscientiously attempted to fulfill the responsibility charged us by the Discipline and the Yearly Meeting.

We have maintained oversight of the eight outposts, making certain that all have monthly meeting sponsors and arranging pastoral care for each. Effort has been made to give encouragement and guidance both to the meetings and to their pastors. Fastoral appointments in Idaho are: Allen Cole at Emmett and Dorwin Smith at Meridian; in Washington: Donald Lamm at Quincy, May Wallace at Agnew, and in Oregon: Dan Nolta at Svensen, Zenas Perisho at Timber, Bernice Mardock and Elsie Gehrke

at Nehalem, with Ashland yet to be supplied. Funds have been allocated to subsidize these meetings and pastors to the extent allowable by the United Budget.

The board, aided by the capable administration of Clynton Crisman, has continued another year with three worthwhile programs, namely: The Share Call, Youth Ambassador, and the Campus Conference.

The Share program, as most of you know, is a method of securing money for church construction by each voluntary contributor agreeing to pay \$2.00 per share pledged whenever an appeal is made for a specific church, with the number of calls limited to three a year. Three calls went out this year through which, as of July 15, Vancouver First Friends received \$2850.00, Hayden Lake \$4070.00, and Seattle Friends Memorial \$1500.00. We are glad to report that all three of these meetings have completed their construction projects and commemorated the occasions by dedication services.

The Youth Ambassador program, suggested by the youth themselves, offers an opportunity for college-age people to spend their summers, following an intensive orientation course, in voluntary work in the various churches of the Yearly Meeting. This summer there are 19 youth ambassadors, namely: Charles Mylander serving in Bolivia and Peru; M. Alice Hampton, Highland Avenue; Barbara Baker, Whitney; Jerold Shields, Meridian; Barbara Berg, Lynwood; Carolyn Hampton, Holly Park; Larry Houston, Ashland; Jim Linhart, Metolius; Ron Stansell, Newberg; Nick Maurer, Meadows; Shirley Mewhinney, Medford; Joan Mewhinney, Marion; Robert Schneiter, Forest Home; Merlin Glanzman, West Chehalem; Steven LeBaron, Entiat; Gilbert George, Friends Memorial; Suzanne Harmon, Sherwood; Mary Lou Gillen, Sherwood; Kent Thornburg, Rosemere.

The Campus Conference is a joint project with certain other Yearly Meeting boards, conducted on the George Fox College campus, whereby through public ministry and personal counselling an effort is made to prepare students for Christian vocations. Another was held this year, which proved to be profitable to all concerned.

which proved to be promised as the Monthly Meeting in Seattle, due to a defection from the Friends church, was necessarily discontinued by Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting. Title to the property, in accordance with the Discipline, has been transferred to Oregon Yearly Meeting, and the disposition of the property is in the hands of the Trustees.

Turning again to the encouraging aspects of our report, the board has made conscientious effort to fulfill the directive of the Discipline which reads, "Special attention shall be given to the discovery of needy fields . . and effort shall be made to meet the requirements of these by such gospel service as may, under Divine blessing, bring sinners to repentance. . ., strengthen believers," etc. Special effort shall be put forth to gather the scattered membership and to establish new work wherever practicable.

In fairness to the Yearly Meeting, to which our board is subordinant, and to the Yearly Meeting membership who contribute the money of which our board is merely a steward, we state herewith some of the principles, learned through observation and the experience of ourselves and other denominations, which have guided us in our actions.

1. Our objective must ever be the evangelization of the unsaved. Jesus came to seek and to save the lost. Therefore, our board consistently reminds itself of the fact that any new work and the building of edifices must be as a means to that end. We think of new locations as primarily "sites for souls" rather than "sites for buildings."

2. That the pattern for extension is to be found in the New Testament Church in that it is the Holy Spirit who gives leadership to the church by 22

controlling the movements of believers, directing in the selection of Christian leaders, and choosing the fields of operation.

3. That a determining factor in the decision as to where a new church is to be located should not be primarily for the convenience of Quaker families living in a given area, as important as that is, but where there is obvious need for community evangelization.

4. That the successful establishment of new churches is normally to be found where populations are in movement. This brings a challenge to our board in that thirty million Americans each year do move—to the cities, to the suburbs, and to the West. That to minister to the rapidly increasing population of our land more than 5000 Protestant churches per year should be established. That to share in this responsibility, the Friends of the Pacific Northwest should start a work in at least two

places a year.

5. That strong churches cannot be built upon congregations of children or even of women alone. It requires entire families. We have learned that young congregations must have attractive buildings in order to reach adults in new communities. Basements, private dwellings, and cheap tabernacles simply will not do as sanctuaries for worship.

6. We are aware that there are at least five ingredients essential to the surety of a growing and thriving church. The first is the leading and empowering by the Holy Spirit. The others are a field of needy people who are as sheep without a shepherd, a nucleus of dedicated Christians who have a deep concern for the lost, a capable, experienced pastor who has the heart of the Shepherd, and finally an attractive and functional building equipped for evangelization, worship, and Christian education.

7. That it is wisdom in planned church extension work to anticipate the direction of the population movement and to have church buildings built and in readiness ahead of or simultaneously with intensive house development in the respective areas.

8. That in an ideal church extension work it is better to carry on a crash program of major financial assistance from the Yearly Meeting to a mission church in order for it to get on its feet and become self supporting in a relatively short time so that attention may be given to another, rather than to pass out inconsequential subsidies in dribbling amounts to many outposts for years without end.

Continuing our report in the light of the principles stated, at the direction of the Executive Council the Trustees have entered into contract to purchase a certain 3 3/4 acres in the Kent, Washington, area, not far from Seattle, with funds provided by both the Board of Evangelism and Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting. With the population mushrooming in the direction of this site, we are anticipating the establishment of an outpost within the next two years.

We are happy to report that the Meridian church under the pastoral leadership of Dorwin Smith is progressing nicely. Although they are still worshipping in a rented American Legion Hall, which is fairly adequate, they are nearing the attainment of the \$6,000.00 goal to be matched by our board, and are in full anticipation of beginning on their sanctuary construction this fall.

The outpost at Emmett, Idaho, with Allen Cole as pastor, has come under special Divine favor in that an individual of that area has made a gift of property and sizeable pledge toward the cost of constructing a modest church building. We have high hopes that from a humble beginning this outpost will enlarge its borders to become a strong influence in the salvation of many souls to Christ and to the church.

We are glad to report a recent development which has great promise for a thriving church and which started through a concern by an indigenous group of Friends active in church work. We are speaking of the Milwaukie-Oak Grove area near Portland. Careful study has been made of this matter. This has included field surveys, meetings and interviews with Friends in that area, and conferences with representatives of certain Portland churches—all resulting in the belief that such a project is feasible and possible. George Palmer, who was instrumental in organizing the Lynwood church, has agreed to assume organizational leadership. First Friends church is the sponsoring Monthly Meeting. More information will be forthcoming to you—perhaps in later sessions of this Yearly Meeting.

For the record, the status of the Silverton meeting has been changed from a Preparative to a Monthly Meeting.

Our statistical report of church attendance, pastoral calls, etc., will

appear in the appendix of the printed Minutes.

Since no place has been given in the Yearly Meeting agenda for the Friends Church Extension Foundation, which is an offspring of our board, we hereby submit and place in your hands their financial statement as prepared by Floyd Watson, their treasurer. It reveals that their assets were increased by nearly \$17,000 in the past year. Currently they have loans outstanding to seven churches. Brochures explaining their program are available at the tables in the rear of this room.

This report is respectfully submitted on behalf of the Board of Evan-

BOARD OF MISSIONS

• 69. The Board of Missions report presented Thursday evening by Clare Willcuts, president, was approved. Many expressions of appreciation from the floor supported the "advance and go" policy of the board. The report follows:

To report the activities of the Board of Missions is not as simple as a few years ago. For 30 years we were concerned almost exclusively with the one field in Bolivia. In 1960 the supervision of a ministry to the American Indians at Sprague River was turned to this board. Then three years ago last May, the Paul Cammack family was directed to move into Peru to start a Friends work among the Aymaras living on the west coast of Lake Titicaca. And, beginning last August a project to minister to the vast number of Orientals living in the Northwest was launched; at the same time the Yearly Meeting approved the recommendation of the board that we share in the support of a family from Ohio Yearly Meeting that is working in the United Missions to Nepal.

Bolivia — A significant development during the year was the decision reached with the leaders of the National Friends Church of Bolivia to alter its relationship with the Board of Missions. This took place in October, 1963, at a joint meeting between some 75 pastors and representatives from the churches throughout our Bolivian field, the men missionaries on the field and your official representatives. For more details of the team trip and the actions in October and later developments refer to the Bolivian field report below.

However, I wish to state, that while there were anxious days in this transition period, the monthly reports from the Mission Council have confirmed the decision, and there is abundant evidence that God is leading. The National Friends Church of Bolivia has accepted the new responsibility in a remarkable manner; the church is growing. In January, 1964, the representatives met officially and reorganized the National Friends Church of Bolivia. Carmelo Aspi, a former Bible School student, was named president; his able leadership has been discerning and 24

dynamic. Ralph Chapman has written repeatedly, "To God be the glory, great things He has done."

As a consequence of this decision our missionary staff has been adjusted. Three families—the Browns, Comforts, and Roberts—came home within a few weeks after the October meeting. Two families—Chapmans and Pucketts—remain in La Paz. The Comforts expect to return to the Alto Beni next summer. After several months in deputation in Oregon Yearly Meeting, Gene has been released to teach school this coming year. They announced the birth of their fourth son, Dennis Eric, June 30. The Browns and Roberts have also been busy in deputation and will not be returning to the field now. Starting September 1, Oscar and Ruth Brown will become pastors of the Friends Memorial church in Seattle, and Mark Roberts will teach in Greenleaf Friends Academy. The board sincerely appreciates the splendid service of these two families.

Peru — The openings in Peru continue to increase. The Nordykes have been there since November, 1963, and their letters telling of the many new opportunities and the need for more missionaries have caused the board to feel that our greatest thrust for the immediate future must be in Peru. The Knights, who carried the work there alone for a little more than two years, have recently returned to the States for their regular furlough. Under their capable leadership a stable Friends church has been established in Peru. God has entrusted this needy field to Oregon Yearly Meeting; we must not fail.

We are happy to announce that Everett and Alda Clarkson were able to return to missionary service after extended furlough for health reasons; they arrived in Juli, Peru, August 6, 1964.

Sprague River — The opportunities at Sprague River are greater than many people realize. It is not an easy field, but the Tunings are faithful and diligent in their witnessing, and report several victories for the Lord. Remember to pray for this work.

Nepal — Dr. Ezra DeVol, the Quaker doctor heading the entire medical center for the United Missions to Nepal, reports that in spite of severe laws to prevent the spread of Christianity, there are Christian churches carrying on.

Oriental Center — Pastor Kim has been active visiting Korean students in university and college centers, as well as Korean families. He has also had regular contacts with seamen from the Orient. He has engaged frequently in missionary conferences and deputation work in local churches. Pastor Kim and Miss Jung Hun Hyun were married July 31, 1964, in the First Friends church in Portland. Congratulations!

<u>Literature</u> — With more people of the world learning to read, the church is certainly obligated to help provide the right kind of reading material. Your support of the missionary literature program may be as rewarding as any type of missionary service.

Youth Ambassador — Inasmuch as our mission fields were blessed this year by the excellent ministry of Charles Mylander, youth ambassador, we are happy to report that we feel this was a worthwhile adventure. His presence and preaching were most encouraging to the missionaries and nationals; his comprehensive analysis of the mission and review to the board have been both enlightening and enriching.

We hope that this new type of missionary ministry will be a continuing thing. We are pleased to be one of the sponsoring boards for his services and trust that as he visits throughout Oregon Yearly Meeting this coming year, many young people will be challenged to answer God's call to the many "in the regions beyond."

Personal — As president I made the trip early last fall to South and Central America, attended the annual convention of the National Association of Evangelicals, the meeting of the Evangelical Foreign Missions Association, the Evangelical Friends Alliance. I presided at board and committee meetings, ministered with missionary messages in two quarterly meetings, and mailed 450 pieces of mail. Your prayers and financial support during the past years are deeply appreciated. Only as you continue to give and to pray will it be possible for the work to go forward.

The above from "La Voz de la Iglesia Nacional Evangelica Los Amigos" (The Voice of the Bolivian Friends Church), official bimonthly publication of the INELA, presents, in part, a statistical picture of the Bolivian work. This, however, does not reveal the metamorphosis of the Bolivian Friends Church in the six months prior to this report.

The period of suspension of activities by the former Mesa Directiva culminated in a meeting of church representatives with Dean Gregory, OYM General Superintendent, and Clare Willcuts, president of the Board of Missions, in October, 1963. When no tangible basis for cooperation between the mission and the Bolivian Church could be reached at that meeting, there remained no other recourse than to accept the alternative of withdrawing as a mission with a fervent prayer that this most drastic move would not result in chaos but rather provide an additional stepping stone in the effort to see a National Church established. Browns, Comforts and Roberts returned to the States for furlough periods, leaving two families—Pucketts and Chapmans, as liaison between the nationals and the mission.

Toward the latter part of December, 1963, it became evident that God was answering the faith and prayers of Christians throughout Oregon Yearly Meeting as well as Bolivia. Under the leadership of Carmelo Aspi, plans were formulated and carried out for the January, 1964, sessions of the Bolivian Friends Junta Anual. Major actions of that meeting included: (1) Reorganization of the INELA, with corresponding election of a new Mesa Directiva with Carmelo Aspi as president, (2) Acceptance of the eight-point program of evangelism and teaching offered by the mission to assist the INELA; whereby official INELA action reinstated a harmonious relationship between it and the Oregon Friends Bolivian Mission, and (3) Adoption of suggested methods for government and finances under the National Church program.

The months following the Junta Anual in January have been filled with activity. Two major events were the large Annual Conference conducted during Easter week at the tabernacle in Alto La Paz with Marshal Cavit as evangelist, and the Pastors'-Teachers' Conference held in the Max Paredes church, June 16-21, with an average attendance of 60. Quarterly meetings, quarterly meeting conferences and other visitation activities have provided a full calendar. The Mesa Directiva has assumed complete control of the entire church program, has sought counsel of the missionaries, and has endeavored to work in close harmony with us wherein missionary collaboration is desired.

We wish to express appreciation for the visit of Dean Gregory and Clare Willcuts and for their leadership and counsel during a most critical period of the work here in Bolivia. Missionaries and brethren alike were 26

enriched by the visits of John and Ione Fankhauser, Carroll Tamplin, James Raymond and Charles Mylander. We express our gratitude to the Friends Youth of OYM who provided opportunity for Charles Mylander to minister to the Aymara youth of both Bolivia and Peru.

As we review God's undeniable answers to prayer for the Bolivian Church itself and for a Spirit-filled leadership, we find no words more adequate to express our praise than these of the prophet Isaiah: "Then shalt thou call, and the Lord will answer; thou shalt cry, and He shall say, Here I am. . . ."

Mark Roberts, who was chairman of the Council prior to his leaving the field, adds: Perhaps this is the most significant decision to have been made since Oregon Yearly Meeting accepted the challenge of missionary responsibility to Bolivia some 34 years ago. This puts to the test all the work of the past years. This must prove whether it is of the Lord or not. If we have worked the works of man, then we must stand with apprehension to view the result. But if it is the work of the Lord, let us rejoice that the Holy Spirit is able to fashion the Church from lively brown Indian stones built up into a spiritual house unto the Lord.

Peruvian Field Report

Stability and growth are the key words which describe the Peruvian work this past year. The Peruvian Friends Church is now an established work that is bringing honor to our God.

This year has been one of heavy trial and great blessing since we have seen many converts, new church groups arising as well as seeing a falling away of some who were too weak to stand. But the overall picture is one of much growth and a church that is becoming stable, strong and organized. The number of church groups has doubled since last year, giving a total of 18 groups or churches. I he sitate to use the term "church," since some of these are quite new, meeting only when a missionary or worker visits them. However, in each place there are those who definitely profess salvation and are seemingly walking in all the light they have. Many of the "older" churches are now well established with regular services and strong believers. Each of these has a local pastor or worker to lead the services. Total attendance in the churches is difficult to calculate, as so many are new, but an estimated 250-300 gives an idea. How these people need your prayers that they may withstand the attacks of the enemy.

During the past year we have had two sessions of short term Bible Schools for the men and one for the women. These are times of definite strengthening and stabilizing of these new Christians. One happy result of these classes has been a renewed vision with action on the part of many. Different workers are now going to communities other than their own and are preaching in the new churches, thus causing a more rapid growth on the field. For this we truly thank the Lord as we are convinced that this is His method for church expansion.

Weekend conferences and tent meetings have been held in different parts with the highlight being the second Junta Anual, or Yearly Meeting, which was held in Juli Friends Church with an attendance of over 150. John Fankhauser was speaker for some of these services. His visit, with his wife Ione, proved to be a real blessing to the brethren and missionaries alike.

Missionaries on the field have been Quentin and Florene Nordyke, who moved to Peru in November, and Roscoe and Tina Knight, who have continued in the work throughout the year.

We thank God for opening this new field of Peru to Oregon Yearly Meeting and are extremely thankful to see His evident blessings on the work. Our expectations are in the One who said, "I have chosen you and ordained you, that ye should go forth and bring forth fruit, and that your fruit should remain. . ."

Sprague River Mission Report

Regular services, Sunday School, morning worship, evening services and prayer meeting have been maintained during the year with average attendance respectively, 26, 13.8, 9.7, 6. We felt the community was not ready for a revival meeting this year. DVBS in July, 1963, had 48 enrolled with average of 44 attending. This included a teenage class of eight, all of whom professed conversion, and several conversions in the younger classes. We took five juniors to Junior Camp, three white boys, one Indian boy and one Indian girl. Three attended Senior Camp—one white girl and two Indian girls. Most of these in both camps received spiritual help.

Visitors on separate occasions were Dean and Kathleen Gregory, and Forrest and Orpha Cammack. The conditions and problems of the mission were discussed with these Friends; this was helpful and encouraging. Mark and Wilma Roberts were with us for a service in June. This was most encouraging to us.

Two groups from Pringle WMU visited us in June. Deputation teams from Marion, Talent, Eugene and Newberg conducted services for us while we were on vacation. We feel these contacts are very wholesome for the work here and the home churches.

Some surveying has been done in Klamath Falls and Chiloquin regarding church property. No conclusions but definite possibilities of establishing churches here. We continue to appreciate the help of the McIntyres. They are giving a definite Christian witness in Chiloquin as well as helping in the services here.

We feel that God still has use for this mission in this area. We appreciate the desire of the board to lend help, and we are especially encouraged by the appointment of the special committee.

• 70. The recommendations in the report of the Committee on Friends Ecumenical Relations held over from Thursday were read. Authur Roberts, Dean Gregory and Gerald Dillon made clarifying explanations.

Levi Pennington expressed regret for the presence of division in Quakerdom at large and also for past expressions indicating lack of faith in each other and hoped that these recommendations would not be divisive. Arthur Roberts explained that the Evangelical Friends Alliance hopes to prove a healing rather than a divisive force and is so considered by leaders of other Friends groups, such as the Five Years Meeting. This committee is concerned about cooperation among Friends and is seeking at various levels to promote a united Friends Evangelical Church. (See minute 61)

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

• 72. Charles Morgan, president, gave the report of this board. He introduced Marie Haines, who presented checks to the winners in the poster contest. Junior division: 1st prize, Richard Moon; 2nd prize, Kathy Haisch. High school division: 1st prize, Marlene Witt; 2nd prize, Pat Crosse.

A panel on stewardship led by Willard Kennon, presented three areas of dollar response—John Roberts gave his personal concern about tithing; John Fankhauser related an experience of sacrificial giving, and Ruth Corbin shared a personal experience of faith giving.

The report follows:

The Board of Stewardship enteredinto the opportunities of a new year, challenged by two thoughts—1. of encouraging local stewardship committees to use the media of films, filmstrips, skits, flannelgraphs, the poster contest, the spoken message, etc., to remind those of their responsibility that we are to be faithful administrators of the time, abilities, and money entrusted to our care; 2. of challenging our churches by means of the witness of those who have personally experienced the blessing of having their lives opened up to be channels of God's boundless resources.

To implement this desire, three emphases were made—1. The poster contest was continued with an adult division being included. Perhaps the greatest degree of interest yet was evidenced, with participation indicating the expenditure of considerable thought in pondering the truth that we are to be faithful stewards; 2. The stewardship bulletin was issued periodically with the purpose of maintaining communication between the board and the local committee, by providing a flow of ideas and plans; 3. The stewardship teams visited and gave their testimonies in at least 23 of our churches. Churches reported that these who shared their experiences were an inspiration and challenge.

Arranging of the schedules of the teams proved to be a major undertaking, with considerable written correspondence, and telephone communication being necessary. All churches of Boise Valley, Newberg, and Puget Sound Quarterly Meetings were visited with four exceptions. Arrangements had been made for each of the Greenleaf churches to have a team when icy road conditions forced cancellation. We are sorry for those who were unable to have teams who seemed so eager to receive them; we are thankful for those meetings which were so evidently blessed of God.

The board feels an increasing opportunity for ministry in the area of the promotion of Biblical stewardship. During the coming year, the poster contest and the stewardship bulletin will be continued; additional filmstrips for the library are to be purchased for your use. Particularly are we anticipating the ministry of C. Earle and Esther I. Turner among our churches. The schedule of the Turners has been arranged and they are to be with us to hold services in each of our churches beginning September 9. These Friends have ministered extensively among the churches of Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting and come highly recommended.

I would like for you to meditate upon this observation that comes from a perusal of financial statistics of the Yearly Meeting Minutes—there is

an extremely high correlation between those churches that have a stronger financial position and those that have a more active stewardship committee. It pays to take this area of our responsibility seriously.

- 95. The Discipline Revision Committee made the following report on the matter referred to it by the Yearly Meeting in the session of August 12, with reference to the classification of monthly meeting trustees and the method of selection of their chairman: (see minute 36)

The committee recognizes the fact that the term "board of trustees"

is so universally used that it would seem very strange to use another term. It is true that in outlining the organization of the Yearly Meeting departments the term "board" is reserved for use at the Yearly Meeting level. Trustees, however, because of their relationship to legal matters pertaining to the meetings, appear to be in a class by themselves and and not answerable to the rules which apply to the committees.

Moreover, the statement as it now stands in the Constitution and Discipline permits each meeting to follow its own plan with regard to the naming of the chairman. In the fellowship of Friends it is unseemly to prescribe with exactitude every move that is to be made in the meeting. In those cases where exact procedure is established, it is for the sake

desirable uniformity.

In view of these facts the committee recommends that the paragram in the Constitution and Discipline remain unchanged, but that the Year Meeting take action to favor a strong recommendation that the chairma of the trustees be nominated by the monthly meeting nominating commit tee except in cases where such procedure would be in violation of th Articles of Incorporation of the meeting involved.

Discussion of this report was deferred until Saturday morning. (Se

minute 11, 36, 101)

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

• 100. The report of the Board of Christian Education, presented by its president, Howard Harmon, Friday evening, was approved with expressions of appreciation from the floor for the evident vision, enthusiasm and devotion which underlies the work of this board. The report follows:

Sunday School -- Sunday School attendance is climbing. This past year

our average attendance reached 5785, a gain of 71.

During the year two leadership training conferences were held. The conference was geared to training the leadership of our churches. One hundred sixty-one attended in Portland and 150 in Caldwell.

A Sunday School attendance emphasis, "Sunday School Roundup," was enthusiastically supported by many of the churches. Rose Valley and

Silverton Sunday Schools won the two divisions of the contest.

The filmstrip library is growing, thanks to the help of many of the Sunday Schools who have sent in 25 cents per member. Two hundred and twenty-one filmstrips were used by our Sunday Schools from the library, which now totals 94 filmstrips. Forty-one new filmstrips with records were added this year and nine teaching records.

South Salem, Pringle, and Silverton won the Blue ribbon awards as being the top Sunday Schools in the Yearly Meeting. These three fulfilled the standards in the "Achievement Goals" to the greatest degree.

Youth--The youth committee has worked actively with the Christian Endeavor, now Friends Youth, executive council. The yearly meeting Christian Endeavor officers led by president Charles Mylander visited 15 of the churches.

Mid-winter convention was a highlight for the 200 young people that attended. The convention finances were in the black. Appreciation is expressed to each church that helped counselors attend by paying their expenses. Two testified to definitely being called to the mission field during the convention.

Our youth leaders have been active in the youth commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. The new youth magazine "Accent" is now being published through the cooperation of those in the Evangelical Friends Alliance.

Eighteen youth ambassadors are serving in churches this summer. Charles Mylander served in Bolivia and Peru, South America.

Youth activities for junior high and high school young people at the yearly meeting sessions have been extensive this year. The young people had sessions on Quaker worship, soul winning, the work of the church boards, Christian vocations, plus many other vital topics. Their social life included swim times, a trip to the beach, after-service get-togethers, and the annual Christian Endeavor banquet.

Camping -- The camping program of the Yearly Meeting has continued to be a major evangelistic arm of the church. Sixteen hundred seventeen campers attended our camps this summer with approximately 350 work-

A study guide, "What Friends Believe," was published and sent to each of our camp leaders and churches. The booklet is a study guide for

the junior high age group on basic Friends belief.

Vacation Bible School--Vacation Bible School enrollment totaled 5180 pupils with 786 workers. Through the board, outpost and preparative meetings received financial assistance in conducting their Vacation Bible School programs.

Junior Yearly Meeting -- An expanded Junior Yearly Meeting was enjoyed this year by approximately 100 children daily. Twenty workers were involved in the program.

A nursery was held caring for about 35 babies.

A Friday evening and Sunday afternoon rally were held for the young people of Junior Yearly Meeting.

Plans for the coming year

Goal! That every Sunday School, YOUR Sunday School, will advance in 1964-1965. Over 6,000 for Oregon Yearly Meeting this year.

Plans to reach this goal:

1. Encourage many to attend the National Sunday School Convention in Portlandthis coming October 7,8,9. All Friends coming will be housed in the homes of Friends of this area.

Mass Rally for Friends at First Friends Church in Portland the night preceding the convention. Joseph Bayly, author of The Gospel Blimp will

speak on the topic, "Winning the Family for Christ."

- 2. Visitation conferences by our assistant superintendent, Clynton Crisman, and board members. Every Sunday School will be visited within the next two years. This will be a time of sharing between the pastor, Sunday School superintendent, Christian Education chairman and guest counselor on the Christian Education program of the meeting.
- 3. Emphasis upon ACHIEVEMENT GOALS. The church that prays, visits, trains workers will be used of the Lord and have a constantly enlarging Sunday School and church.
- 4. As an encouragement to Sunday School growth the Board of Christian Education will award monthly honor ribbons to each Sunday School

showing an attendance increase over the same(corresponding) month 2 year ago. Awards will be sent beginning with October, 1964. Ten per cent or above, blue ribbon; five to nine per cent, red ribbon, one to four per cent, white ribbon. Compete with yourself for a better Sunday School!

- 101. The report of the Discipline Revision committee concerning the classification of monthly meeting trustees and the method of selection of their chairman, held over from Friday was reread. The report and the recommendation contained therein was approved. (See minutes 11, 36,
- 102. The clerk made the announcement which had just come to the desk that Edwin Clarkson had suffered several heart seizures but is improved this morning. He has been advised to remain quiet. Your prayers will be appreciated.

• 103. The Discipline committee presents for final action three pro-

posed amendments which were referred to it a year ago:

The first of these, found in Minute 31, page 11, would make it mandatory for the Committee on Ministry or someone authorized by them to have a personal interview with anyone being considered for recording-This committee recommends favorable action.

The second, found in Minute 32, page 11, provides for a public recognition service during the Yearly Meeting sessions for those newly recorded. This has met with general approval; final action favoring it is

The third, found in Minutes 30 and 62, pages 10 and 18, lists all recommended. changes necessary for setting up the office of Assistant Superintendent, including a statement outlining his functions and duties. Final approval of this proposed amendment is favored by the committee.

All proposed amendments were approved. • 104. The representatives offered the following alternate proposition to the proposal by Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting for standards required

by monthly meetings: (see minutes 13, 16) "that the Board of Evangelism take greater initiative in helping quarterly meetings deal with weak or troubled churches, both by setting up realistic standards for measuring monthly meeting status and by recommending specific plans of action in particular cases.'

In supporting this proposition we remind the Yearly Meeting here in

session and its monthly meetings severally the following: 1. Our Friends' system of church government vests authority in quarrily and yearly many reservoirs. terly and yearly meetings -- we are not congregational, but representative

in polity, although this is a popular misconception. 2. Our Discipline now gives quarterly meetings certain jurisdiction over the monthly meetings, including power to establish, divide, or discontinues monthly meetings (see continue a monthly meeting or to unite two or more monthly meetings (see p. 51.)

3. Our Discipline now provides yearly meeting direction over weak, newer, or disorderly churches through its Board of Evangelism, which often in practice gives financial support to outposts and preparative meet-

ings. (See pp. 51, 61.)

4. For many reasons which need not here be detailed, quarterly meetings do not function as importantly as once they did; consequently on this important issue of the care of monthly meetings they need greater direction from the Yearly Meeting through its Board of Evangelism.

5. It is widely recognized that new congregations enjoy great spiritual and financial benefits from outpost and preparative meeting status, benefits which enable them to grow and become self-sustaining. It seems logical to assume that an older meeting which has become seriously 34

weakened for any reason might likewise profit from being made essentially a mission church in order to receive needed assistance and guidance. The proposition was approved with the addition of the words "but representative" after the word "congregational" in No. 1.

• 105. The clerk introduced Rev. Harley F. Bailey, Oregon representative of the Bible Meditation League, visitor in the session today.

• 106. The reply of the Board of General Education to the resolution of Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting that the Yearly Meeting support the erection of a chapel on the campus of George Fox College (see minute 12) follows:

The Board of General Education has considered the resolution from Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting and wishes to commend this quarterly meeting for the keen interest and concern expressed. The board concurs in the recognition for the need of an auditorium to be built on the George Fox College campus. However, our investigation of the feasibility of the Yearly Meeting undertaking such an enormous project leads us to recommend that now is not the appropriate time for the Yearly Meeting to initiate a program of building a college auditorium. Surely the Yearly Meeting and/or quarterly meetings and local meetings could establish funds for this purpose. But it appears that the initiation of such a building program would best begin with the planning of the college board and administration.

An adequate auditorium such as is needed would cost something more than \$500,000.00 as it should be a structure suitable for the use of the fine arts department, chapel services, community and professional meetings, yearly meeting sessions, and many additional uses. Seating capacity should be close to 1000, and the stage should be large and suitable for major productions.

In addition to establishing funds for such a project, every member of the Yearly Meeting should make this need a matter of prayer, for it will be necessary to find outside financial support to be able to erect the kind of building which is so vitally needed.

This was approved.

• 107. Jack Willcuts proposed that the financial report of George Fox Press be printed in the appendix of the minutes.

This was approved.

BOARD OF FINANCE

• 108. The report of the Board of Finance was read, as follows:

Fourth Street in Newberg south of the church property is to be paved. The property will be assessed for 326 feet of paving and curb at a cost of from \$2000 to about \$2500. It is the recommendation of the board that Oregon Yearly Meeting pay one-half of the assessment and Newberg Monthly Meeting pay one-half of the assessment, and they further recommend that \$250 be placed in the budget for the current year and that the Trustees be authorized to arrange for the payment of the balance in installments.

• 111. The statistical report prepared by Margaret Weesner, statistitian, was read. Expressions of concern were made relating to the drop in membership during the past year. The report appears in the appendix.

Approved.

• 112. The Board of Moral Action presented the following reaffirmation of the Constitution and Discipline statement on race relations which was approved:

RACE RELATIONS

"We consider these teachings on race relations as basic:

- 1. The universality of sin precludes any claim to native superiority on the part of any class or caste.
- 2. The providences of God, in providing material blessings indiscriminately, evidence a world which shows no regard for color or cultural position.
- 3. The universality of the atonement in Christ shows that all men are able, through Christ, to be partakers of the divine nature, and hence entitled to respect and dignity.
- 4. The teaching and example of Jesus is a rebuke to both prejudice and discrimination. Witness His gracious dealings with the Samaritan woman. We seek to follow Him in this respect.
- 5. The early church swept across barriers of class and caste, breaking down by the force of love the discrimination of slavery and exclusive citizenship.
- 6. In regard to racial intermarriage, we recognize the social problems involved and would counsel our youth accordingly. We would, however, seek by our Christian fellowship to allay the burden society often lays upon interracial families.

In view of these principles, we may not exclude any from worship or membership on the basis of race. Although we recognize that social tensions will always exist among those who seek selfish advantage, we believe the Church ought ever to lift up a Christian conscience and bear witness to the truth of the dignity and worth of all men before God."

It was suggested that all meetings in Oregon Yearly Meeting be sent this reaffirmation, that suitably prepared statements be given to the press, and that all be issued from the Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

• 113. A revised draft of the letter to President Johnson from the Board of Peace and Service was read: (see minutes 32, 94)

Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends, with churches in Oregon, Idaho and Washington, is meeting is session August 10-16, 1964, at Newberg, Oregon.

As Quakers of Oregon Yearly Meeting, we pray that in these troublesome times you may have wisdom from God in maintaining peace.

Approved.

• 114. Adelaide Barker conducted the memorial hour. She read the list of 64 members deceased during the past year. The list appears in the appendix. Many vocal memorials were given from the floor.

115. The session adjourned to meet at 2:30 p.m.

Inspirational Hour 11:35 a.m.

"Teaching with a towel" was Russell Myers' topic, using Luke 22:19-

26 and John 13:1, as a Scriptural basis.

It was a solemn occasion prior to the departure of Jesus when He wanted to teach them great truths. But they came into His presence bickering and striving over who would be first among them. How could He get their attention away from their superficial, selfish absorption. He took a towel and showed them a principle they should have already seen, since they hadn't the humor to see how ridiculous their attitude was.

There are three lessons of the towel: 1. His "stooping down" culminated when he offered Himself to be nailed to the cross. They must have remembered all their lives that the Holy One stooped to do something they should have had the courtesy to do themselves. 2. Small men trying to be big cannot afford to stoop. We're never bigger than when we are big enough to stoop—even before our enemies. 3. Love—Jesus stooped at Judas' feet too. If he was to be reclaimed, it would be by love that stooped to serve. 4. Cleansing comes before communion. We can't achieve communion with God with unholy hearts and souls—no matter how pious and holy we look or how correct the form of our worship and procedure. Cleansing must be daily—it is a continuous experience.

Saturday, 2:30 p.m.

- 116. The session opened with a time of waiting in the presence of the Lord. Dean Gregory led in prayer, especially remembering Edwin Clarkson.
- 117. The minutes of the morning session were read, corrected and approved.
- 118. The summary of epistles received from other yearly meetings was read. The summary follows:

It is a joy to receive the letters of greeting from those who love our

Lord in other yearly meetings.

Lugula Friends of Kenya East Africa request the prayer support of Oregon Yearly Meeting because of the severe trials of worldliness and nationalism facing the church. They also expressed appreciation of the visit of Fred and Mardella Newkirk, pastors of Vancouver First Friends to their meeting.

Central Yearly Meeting sensed the presence of the blessed Holy Spir-

it in both their meetings for worship and for business.

Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting, under the direction of their new clerk, Clyde Jacobson, and Walter P. Lee, superintendent, challenged Friends in that area with the vision "to evangelize the unchurched is to accomplish great work for God."

This past year Ohio Yearly Meeting challenged their members to ten per cent increase in nine areas of endeavor. Many made a ten per cent increase in one or more areas, but three churches made a ten per cent increase in all nine areas. Major emphasis for the coming year is the concentration of desire for continued visitation of the Holy Spirit.

In the epistle from $\underline{\text{Iowa Yearly Meeting}}$ Friends reported that in their 38

Centennial sessions they considered the theme, "Vision for Growth." They acknowledged their indebtedness to those friends who built out of the wilderness and prairies the homes, meetings, and schools, that have given nurture to hundreds of persons and laid foundations for others to build upon.

The Young Friends from Iowa Yearly Meeting closed their epistle with the following words: They wished "to express their witness as a Christian group, interested in exalting Christ and praising His name through personal life and witness." They are concerned that all men know Christ personally and experience His salvation.

The membership in California Yearly Meeting exceeds more than 7500 persons with 35 ministers in active service. "We differ," they wrote, "in methods of evangelism and in procedures, but we are closely united

in dedication to Christian principles."

Kansas Yearly Meeting was challenged with the messages of Paul Shugart, pastor of the Friends Church at Garden Grove, California, on Christ as the Head of the Church. Their earnest prayer was expressed in the following Scripture: "Christ also loved the church and gave Himself for it, that He might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word that He might present it to Himself, a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle or any such thing: but that it should be holy and without blemish."

In the <u>Indiana Yearly Meeting</u> epistle, they declared: "We have been made aware of the mercy of God and the patience and tenderness of the Holy Spirit as He continues to call us to a full commitment."

Approved.

• 119. The epistle committee presented the following to be sent to other yearly meetings:

Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends, servants of Jesus Christ, "to them that have obtained like precious faith with us through the righteousness of God and our Saviour Jesus Christ: Grace and peace be multiplied unto you through the knowledge of our Saviour Jesus Christ."

Friends from 61 meetings in Idaho, Washington and Oregon met at Newberg, Oregon, August 11-16, 1964, for our sixty-second session of

Oregon Yearly Meeting.

In his keynote address our General Superintendent, Dean Gregory, brought his deep concern which was challenging and informative relative to our responsibilities and opportunities for Christian service in our northwest states and in our mission fields in Bolivia and Peru. From his recent visit to those South American countries he brought back an encouraging picture of advances made by the newly organized National Friends Church of Bolivia.

We were highly favored in having with us as guest speaker, Russell Myers, pastor of the Friends Church of Bell, California. Each day he brought very fitting, inspiring and evangelistic messages.

We were delighted with the number of young people in attendance this year. Over 100 were counted, who under the direction of Friends Youth and the Board of Christian Education made a real contribution. A Junior Yearly Meeting, with an attendance of over 100, was directed by a group of over 25 workers.

We are much pleased with the large number of over 1700 young people we have in our meetings who attended our summer camps this year. They are developing in Christian experience and preparing for places of leadership. Contributing to this training is the Youth Ambassador program under joint direction of Board of Evangelism and Friends Youth. Eighteen young people are serving in local churches during the summer months in various capacities; one has ministered on our mission fields in Bolivia and Peru.

Our Academy at Greenleaf, Idaho, also is making a great contribution to our youth where they receive a high school education under the instruction of dedicated Christian teachers.

One of our early sessions was given over to George Fox College, where Friends present were thrilled at the great advance that is being made on the campus with a number of new buildings and others in the process of construction. Our youth are finding it an ideal place to receive their higher education and preparation for lives of Christian service.

The work of our publishing house, known as Barclay Press, was brought to our attention with the report that over 400,000 pieces of literature were printed during the past year. This included various periodicals for the different departments of the church and missionary literature printed in the Spanish and Aymara languages.

During the year a number of our people made visits with Friends of other Yearly Meetings to strengthen the ties that bind us as evangelical Friends. Among these travelers were some who went around the world visiting various meetings and missions operated by Friends and other groups.

One of our meetings has been sponsoring a mission work among orientals in the City of Portland, Oregon.

During the sessions we were challenged by the vision of service presented by the members of various boards. We felt that our Yearly Meeting had been inspiring and God honoring, and if the Lord tarries we trust for still greater things next year under the blessing of the Lord.

The meeting approved the letter but referred it back to the epistle committee for suggested additions.

• 120. The Board of Evangelism presents the name of Clynton Crisman in nomination to the Board of Directors of the Friends Church Extension Foundation for a three-year term.

Approved.

• 121. It is recommended by the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight that the procedure for the recording of candidates for ministry be reviewed; and if the Yearly Meeting concurs, that this matter be referred to the Executive Council.

• 122. The Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight recommends that Damon B. Heinrich be recorded a minister of the Gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

• 123. The Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight recommends that Marshal Cavit be recorded a minister of the Gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

• 124. The Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight recommends that Elsie Gehrke be recorded a minister of the Gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

• 125. The Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight recommends that Bruce Hicks be recorded a minister of the Gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

• 126. The report of the Trustees was read as follows:

The Trustees have executed the following instruments which have been authorized by either the Yearly Meeting or the Executive Council:

A deed to Frederick B. Baker for a small tract of land, a part of the Hillsboro Church property, to correct property lines.

A deed to Multnomah County for a small parcel of land for road purposes.

Transferred the Quilcene property to Philip Harmon and Ted Eichenberger.

A Contract of Sale of some church property of Quincy Meeting.

A contract for the purchase of a tract of land at Kent, Washington, for the Board of Evangelism.

The board has under negotiation the Bethany Church property and the

purchase of a house in Quincy for a parsonage.

Payments are being received regularly on the contract of sale of Quaker Apartment Building. The balance of principal of the contract as of July 10, 1964, is \$19,464.09.

Rent from Barclay Press has been paid to July 1, 1964.

Money received from these transactions has been sent to the yearly meeting treasurer as shown in his report.

• 127. The report of the Executive Council was read as follows:

By direction of the Discipline, the Executive Council is to act on behalf of the Yearly Meeting in cases where the interest or reputation of Friends may render it necessary. All such proceedings shall be reported to the Yearly Meeting in session.

The Executive Council for some time has had under study the matter of comparative salaries for Yearly Meeting employees. They have agreed that boards and/or others responsible for the hiring of personnel and the setting of salaries, whether provided in full or in part from the Yearly Meeting budget, should give careful consideration with a view to uniformity.

At the mid-year meeting of your council, Dr. Myron Goldsmith was approved as the professor to teach the course in Friends Doctrine at Western Evangelical Seminary for the spring term.

The council received and approved nominations from the Board of Missions, Christian Education, Board of Evangelism and Board of Publication to the respective commissions of the Evangelical Friends Alliance.

A study is being made by a committee of the council as to the advisability of having a uniform fire insurance program for the churches of the Yearly Meeting, anticipating the possibility of reducing premium rates.

Concern has been expressed in the council and directions given to the Board of Evangelism to collect copies of official documents as well as draw up Articles of incorporation and by-laws to serve as patterns that may be used by churches and organizations to protect property interests of the Yearly Meeting. The Board of Evangelism is also giving further thought to securing copies of all articles of incorporation, deeds, debentures, and other official documents relating to church-owned property for the purpose of filing said papers in the Yearly Meeting vault.

A recommendation from the Board of Peace and Service that Yearly Meeting become the legal sponsor of a retirement home in Idaho was approved with the condition that there will be no liabilities against the Yearly Meeting and final acceptance be made by the Yearly Meeting.

A change in insurance coverage for the Ministers Group Insurance gave coverage to employees' children up to 24 years of age with only 6 cents per month cost per dependent unit.

Approved.

• 128. The following recommendations from the committee named last year to consider the proposition received then from Portland Quarterly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight were read:

1. Pastors' Salaries --

A. We recommend that the base cash salary of the pastor of any meeting should be \$3600 per year, housing and utilities to be provided above this amount.

B. We recommend that the local meetings are to be encouraged to cooperate with the Board of Stewardship in an intensive educational program to help implement this goal, and to seek the aid of the Board of Evangelism in event such aid is necessary.

C. We recommend that the pastor's salary be given first consideration in any enlargement of the budget and before any expansion or rebuilding program be undertaken.

2. Ministerial Preparation --

We recommend that a loan fund be established to be administered by the Board of General Education for the purpose of providing tuitional assistance for ministers in training at any Yearly Meeting approved seminary or graduate school.

Approved by the Meeting on Ministry and Oversight and directed sent

to the Yearly Meeting.

After considerable thoughtful discussion, the recommendations were approved.

• 129. The report of the Junior Yearly Meeting was read as follows:

The following activities were provided for children in the sixth grade

and under during this week of Yearly Meeting:

NURSERY care for babies and toddlers was supervised by the Newberg Friends Church Mothers' Club for the morning and afternoon sessions each day. The Dundee Women's Club was contracted by the Christian Education Board for the care of children five years old and under during the evening services excepting Saturday. This group numbered 30 or

more each evening.

JUNIOR YEARLY MEETING was held daily nine to twelve o'clock with Velda Harmon as director. One hundred fourteen children between the ages of four and those in the sixth grade were enrolled in the three departments. Imagene Arndt and Ruthanna Hampton directed activities for forty-some pre-schoolers. Primaries and juniors joined together in group worship each day, with each class participating. Mrs. Russell Myers gave two presentations of evangelistic and missionary emphasis to this group each day as well as one presentation to the beginners. A junior choir, directed by Ruth Corbin, was a highlight of each morning. Regular business sessions were held with Gene Hockett in charge. Clerks were: David Hampton, presiding clerk; Jannelle Willcuts, recording clerk; and Janice Piersall, reading clerk. A missionary offering was taken for literature. Vacation Bible School material was used in the individual classes for the Bible lesson. There were 19 workers engaged for these sessions.

A CHILDREN'S SERVICE was conducted Friday evening with Elsie Gehrke and Bernice Mardock in charge.

A special CHILDREN'S MISSIONARY RALLY was scheduled for Sunday afternoon under the direction of the Mission Board.

The report was approved with many expressions of appreciation for the staff who have supervised this excellent program.

Evening Services

Tuesday evening. Christian Education, Isaiah 33:2-5; Ecclesiastes 7:25. The world is like a great exposition. Heaven will garner the best for Divine preservation. Will Quakers have a contribution in the field of Christian Education worth being preserved?

The role of the Christian colleges is not easy—they work against great odds. George Fox College is the result of blood, sweat and tears of a dedicated minority. It is not on a dead-end street but is at the cross-roads of a great area. The campus is destined as a highway of adventure. I congratulate you for your stick-to-iveness, for your living faith, for your campus and academic improvements, for the interest and enthusiasm that brings you here tonight.

I caution you not to make the college a church. The purpose of higher education is to train students to think for themselves. The college should not be dominated by the church organization, but by the living, dynamic presence of the Holy Spirit. I caution you against the fear of higher ed-

ucation, because it results in students' ability to comprehend standards, to make holy and clean choices, to develop disciplined, awakened imaginations. Education is not optional but necessary.

I challenge the board, faculty, and constituents of George Fox College to aim for higher quality, for educational excellence. The college is a workshop—training for life stewardship. I challenge you to maintain a positive Christian climate—of faith in the living Savior. It is as important to know how to live as to make a living. The key to life's meaning is Jesus Christ as Lord and Master.

Wednesday evening. Treasures that money cannot buy. Matthew 6:19 -20, Acts 8:18-20, Isaiah 55:1. Jesus had much to say about money and cautioned against seeking after material things. Simon is not the only one who thought he could buy anything—even the power of the Holy Spirit. It is good to have some of the things money can buy, but it is good to check up and see if we have the things money cannot buy—things that can make you what you ought to be, a passport to heaven, inner resources of spiritual grace and power in your soul to protect against the world, victory over sin, cheering hope of life to come, faith to pass from death unto life—the grace that saves us—faith for you.

Thursday evening. Acts 2:37. Is the church today becoming a monument or a movement; a monument to great leaders and traditions of the past or a wide-awake, dynamic, virile movement bent on evangelizing the world? The Friends Church must be more than a monument to George Fox—as great a man as he was. I do not want to be part of a dying church—but of a living movement filled with God-fearing men and women who have a passion for lost people.

We must be concerned with Christian Education. Quakers used to start schools. Are our provisions for children perpetuating a dynamic movement?

We must be more than a monument to evangelical Christianity. We need the power of our forefathers who made inroads in a pagan world—to make us dynamic enough to do that today.

We must be part of a missionary movement. Oregon Yearly Meeting's program is a monument to the faithfulness of past leaders, but we are living today. There is talk in some areas of Christianity of cutting down mission programs. This is not the spirit of a dynamic movement.

We must be more than a monument to the passion of our Lord to win publicans and sinners. We need a new dimension of stewardship. We need active laymen with get-up-and-go.

We must be a movement using as our weapon the word of God so publicans and sinners will be changed by the power of God. They must be brought in—they do not come themselves today.

We will be a movement when we let ourselves become a going, visiting people, if we remain dedicated to our God-given commission but gear our battle strategy for the needs of our day. We need courage to look at ourselves and do some creative thinking. We need an up-to-date organization of procedure and chosen qualified leaders to chart the course.

Friday evening. Four planks in my program to peace—guaranteed if followed. Romans 5. (1) Conviction. John 16:8, Acts 2:37 "They were pricked in their hearts." This is a real stab wound of heart, spirit and soul. We can't have real peace till the Holy Spirit convicts us of sin through some channel. (2) Desire. Mark 8:34. "If any man will..." It has to be our desire and decision. God creates the "hungering and thirsting after righteousness." (3) Restitution. Matt. 5:23, 24. Making right of specific sins God has talked about to us. Zaccheus knew he was crooked when he cried in Jesus' presence, "I will restore four-fold." 4. Repentance. Sin is an insult to God. Repentance is to turn around and

go the other way—to come to hate sin and want desperately to be rid of it—to be free from its bondage—to not be a slave any longer.

Saturday evening. John 15:1. Jesus teaches with a vine. He and His disciples were to form a whole, neither would be complete without the other. (1) He left His work in their hands—an awesome assignment. "Ye are the branches"—doing what He is unable to do. (2) The unity of the vine is formed by the unity of life in the vine. Cut off a branch and it is as useless as an arm severed from our bodies. When we are cut off from the life He gives, we are done for. This calls for the renunciation of selfishness. Successful selfishness is impossible—it must diminish. (3) The result of this relationship is fruit bearing. People judge the church by its fruit. The devil plants sour apples on the edge of the orchard. The world sees them and doesn't cross over into the center where the good fruit is-those members whose lives are centered in Him. The two kinds of fruit are—the fruit of character and the fruit of service. All have some share in the variety of gifts. (4) "If a man abide not in the vine..." Saving faith is not only an act of the movement but a continuous act for life-requiring us to keep alive our relationship daily. Eternal life is only shared with men by God. It cannot be possessed apart from a living union day by day-continually abiding in Him. Let us maintain this relationship with the true vine.

Digest of Meetings of Ministry and Oversight Body

The Committee on Ministry presented several recommendations which were approved. A form for use in recording ministers, the purpose of which is to facilitate the orderly procedure from the originating meeting on Ministry and Oversight to the final step at Yearly Meeting, is to be printed for use throughout the Yearly Meeting. The following were recommended to be recorded ministers of the Gospel: Elsie Gehrke, Marshal Cavit, Damon D. Heinrich, Bruce Hicks. William Murphy is transferring his membership from California Yearly Meeting and has been accepted as a minister in Oregon Yearly Meeting. A revised read-

ing list for ministerial candidates, an outline of procedure for issuing of ministerial cards and two form letters for use in responding to annual letters from ministers not in pastoral service were adopted. A proposal from the floor that the whole procedure for recording candidates for the ministry be reviewed was forwarded to the Yearly Meeting with the recommendation that it be referred to the Executive Council. By his request, W. Keith Macy was discontinued as a minister in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

The committee on doctrinal reference reported reviewing a study course prepared by the Board of Christian Education, "What Friends Believe," and approving the material with some suggestions for revision.

The following is a summary of the Quarterly Meeting reports of the meetings on Ministry and Oversight on the state of the meetings: All meetings report faithfulness on the part of their members and families in church attendance, and in the leading of upright lives. Family worship, the study of the Scriptures and much prayer are vital to the spiritual growth of each of the meetings. A spirit of unity is felt generally, but if any differences arise, these are overcome by the grace that comes from above through the exercise of the leading of the Holy Spirit. Spiritual gifts are received and used, but two meetings felt the need to improve in the use of gifts. Those in Christian service are held in loving regard and efforts made to encourage them.
