# Minutes Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1968

- 1. The seventy-sixth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting convened August 13, 1968, at 10:15 a.m. in Newberg, Oregon.

Having now concluded seventy-five years of our existence as Oregon Yearly Meeting, we find ourselves living in paradoxical times. While violence and moral decay seem at an all time high, never has the church had greater media, spiritually and materially, for the dissemination of the Gospel to those in need. Let us be challenged by the responsibilities and opportunities that are ours, looking unto Christ, who alone can lead us on into ever greater accomplishments. May we especially sense His presence during these sessions.

Roy Clark led the meeting in singing, "To God Be the Glory, Great Things He Hath Done." Scott Clark led in prayer. Harold and Sharon Clark sang a duet, "He Touched Me and Made Me Whole."

- 2. Jack L. Willcuts, superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting, presented the following keynote address: (Condensation—a copy of the complete message may be secured from the office of the superintendent.)

"A practice introduced in Acts 14:27 says, And when they were come, and had gathered the church together, they rehearsed all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith. . . . In starting another Yearly Meeting session this morning, we are doing something scriptural. *We* do well to gather, to rehearse what God has done and see what doors God has opened.

"The writing of God's finger is cast in retrospect as another church year moves into eternity. Seventy-five books of Yearly Meeting *Minutes* now line our library shelves. A review of these records shows an earnest attempt by Friends in these years to be faithful to a heavenly vision. Describing this vision as long ago as 1876, Quaker pioneer, William Hobson, wrote, 'I hope now, our dear Friends will form a settlement here [in Oregon] and make it a garden of the Lord.' *A Garden of the Lord* is the title of Ralph Beebe's 300-page history of Oregon Yearly Meeting released by the Barclay Press this week. Viewing this garden through the pages of this well-written book, Myron Goldsmith in his introduction calls it a 'Garden of the West' and therefore not always well trimmed but quite

informal with 'several gardeners heatedly discussing what should go here and what should go there.'

"With the foundations of our world community shaken and various church structures falling away, we do well to reflect on God's care and God's call across these years. Some things are eternal and strong. For 75 years certain men of our church in each succeeding generation have found and followed God. Measured by many standards Friends of the Northwest are not a large church. Yet, because of the faithful Christians always among us, it is much greater than it might have been.

"It is unfortunate that 75 years have not brought 600 churches rather than 60 into being, but from another point of view the challenge of Friends in 1968 is so overwhelmingly greater than to any other Yearly Meeting before gathered that we must waste no time with the wrong issues or interests. We must ask how to make the best use of more than 60 places of worship as points of penetration with the Gospel of hope and peace. Some things can be done through these 60 churches and 6,000 Christians that no other group, under the providences of God, is able to accomplish in the building of the kingdom. Rather than despising the one talent simply because more numerous Christian bodies appear to have ten, the real question we cannot avoid is, What kind of Christians must we be now to be found faithful?

"Certain comments in a recent *Decision* magazine editorial, slightly paraphrased and placed alongside the 75 years' history of Oregon Yearly Meeting, give an uncomfortable picture of ourselves.

"We have placed emphasis on sound doctrine, and rightly, for there is no compromising between truth and error. But we have not always proclaimed the truth or contended for the faith in a loving manner.

"We have warned about judgment, because we are aware with every passing hour that our world is on a collision course bound for destruction. Yet our admonitions have not always been watered with the tears of genuine affection.

"We have insisted to people that they must be born again, but our attitudes toward them have not always made it seem that being born again is such a wonderful thing after all.

"We have made much of the fact that Jesus went among publicans and sinners, but we have made no bones about preferring our own company.

"We have tried to draw people into the kingdom of God by words, by good works, and have said both wistfully and vehemently, 'Our doors are wide open! People know they are welcome; if they want to come, all they have to do is walk in . . .' All of this has not always shown love. Lack of successful evangelism is producing more spiritual callouses than broken hearts.

"We have told today's young people that they need to be saved, and after they were saved, we have many times lacked the patience and planning to lead them. Some of them have decided, without quite realizing it, that they are not wanted after all. Others have been disappointed by inconsistent church members, and this disappointment with the church quickly turns to disgust when mutual understanding is not there.

"We have insisted on being justified by grace alone and on sanctification as the true baptism, but have sometimes subtly managed to infer that this was some kind of achievement on our part, an end in itself rather than giving God the glory and thus releasing God's power through and in us.

"While this is not a popular thing to do, nor an easy thing to say, it is my deep belief that if Oregon Yearly Meeting is to respond to the contemporary call to true discipleship and to the mobs of people moving in upon us, with real love and effective Christian concern, we must with care as never before give ourselves to the Lord in these sessions before us with burdened hearts and true repentance.

"There is a proven formula for honest Christians seeking God's will

and anointing: 'If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land.' (2 Chronicles 7:14)

"Furthermore, I am bold to believe the following verses of 2 Chronicles 7 are for us too: 'Now mine eyes shall be open, and mine ears attent unto the prayer that is made in this place. For now have I chosen and sanctified this house, that my name may be there for ever. . . .'

"May this, then, be the spirit of our 75th Anniversary observance."

"Fewer journeys have been made this year outside the Yearly Meeting. New openings for additional alternate service opportunities are possible for our young men qualifying for overseas work with the World Relief Commission of the National Association of Evangelicals. It is possible more than 40 percent of our male church membership of draft age wish meaningful alternate service work of one type or another. This situation, however, lays upon the entire Yearly Meeting a serious spiritual responsibility of prayer and financial support. Our Christian concern should be as great, of course, for *all* our young men as for those conscientiously seeking military alternatives.

"The annual meetings of the Evangelical Friends Alliance were held in Omaha in January. With the *newness* of the Alliance gone and the fast-changing development in overall church organizational alignments taking place about us, we do well to keep in mind the purposes of the EFA. Advantages gained by working together with other evangelical Friends are as important as ever, and the EFA offers these opportunities in missions, Christian education, church extension, youth ministries and the sharing of concerns and activities through the *Evangelical Friend* magazine. New opportunities for fellowship with other Friends are opening for us which should be welcomed. There is a distinguishing difference between fraternal and organizational unity. The saving grace of Christ is the basic answer to man's need. This does not mean, however, we are to ignore the many social problems of our immediate world; the theological base from which we try to meet these problems is critically important.

"The word 'relevance' has become rather threadbare, but what really can be more relevant than the doctrines of our church. One young Friend's observation merits comment on this point. He said, 'Making ourselves relevant to the church is really as important as making the church relevant to us.'

"An effort early in the fall to bring all the pastors together in area Evangelism Seminars met with almost 100 percent participation. While increased membership and worship attendance is reported, those expecting news of great numerical growth this year will be disappointed. The painfully slow progress generally, with only isolated instances of measurable increase, does not mean, however, that we are not moving in the right direction.

"Four new church buildings were dedicated this year: Eugene, Maplewood, Emmett and Star. Real progress is being made in the goal expressed last year of increased financial capital through the preparation of individual investment programs for church extension. Roger Smith, Beatrice Goldsmith and Charles Beals are to be commended for their work in developing this much needed program.

"The Youth Ambassador program enjoys a new surge of interest among our college-age young people. Nine are serving this summer across the Yearly Meeting with splendid reports received of their work.

"The second conference called for younger Friends was well attended. One conclusion of the conference was that 'easy Christianity' that characterizes so much of the life of the church today is totally inadequate for the

kind of world we are facing. God came upon us in those meetings with deep personal renewal and blessing. The contacts and subsequent correspondence with many of these capable younger Christians of our church in these conferences indicate a number of them are eager for greater local church involvement and service and are loyal to Oregon Yearly Meeting. Another conclusion of the younger Friends Conference is that this Yearly Meeting fellowship does not depend so much upon new structures as upon new life within the structures we already have. The church in its present condition has many faults, but it still offers our best hope of salvation in a broken world. The greatest need, whatever the shape of the church to come, is for members who know, as Titus tells us, 'the washing of regeneration and renewal in the Holy Spirit.' (Titus 3:5 RSV) Another conference open to all 35 and younger is planned.

"An energetic effort to strengthen the Quaker Men's organization was launched this year under their president, Charles Lamm, and vice-president, Duane Noel. A new manual for organizing a local men's unit has been prepared and well-accepted. Their vision for a vital core of Christian men in each meeting gathering twice annually for a spiritual life conference and a Yearly Meeting banquet uniting in a common mission cause is a practical program.

"The Women's Missionary Union under the leadership of Julia Pearson continues to contribute significantly to our missionary effort financially and in service. This is mentioned not just to be courteous but to exclaim over the fine work of this arm of the church. As long as these groups—Friends Men, WMU and Friends Youth—feel themselves a part of the church and not competitive or exclusive, they broaden our Christian influence and testimony.

"One of the great challenges before us is not only taking the Gospel to those about us, but the majority of our churches today face the task of conserving and enlisting the people who do come or are won to Christ. First, we do not know how to conserve the results of our evangelistic fervor and outreach efforts. Second, we are not willing to pay the price of a dedicated and thorough follow-up with new people. This year, for example, 387 total additions were reported but only a net gain of 22! We are losing too many.

"For this problem new approaches and methods are needed. This has nothing to do with doctrine or theology, conservatism or liberalism. It is a matter of reaching and holding tender Christians for Christ and the church. The word 'new' in relation to church life brings one of two extreme reactions. There are those who instantly support any new idea simply because it is new. There are also those who instantly oppose any new idea simply because it is new.

"There is very little that can be done for a people unwilling to change. Jesus was talking about more than wine when He said, 'And no one after drinking old wine, desires new; for he says, the old is good.' Was He talking about being mired in the same old rut for so long that it actually seemed good to be there? He was scoring the unwillingness to change. This is one extreme. There is another just as devastating to the ongoing of our church, and this is the constant moving about of God's people from place to place for reasons other than the clear direction of the Holy Spirit.

"The early Christians were a mobile people also, not out of choice but because of persecution. Early American Quakers also migrated at one time in history to avoid involvement in the slave business. Others moved for lesser cause. Oregon Yearly Meeting was founded 75 years ago by a few hardy mobile Friends. And aren't we glad they moved?

"But mobility has now become a way of life, and it is, in part, a rootless life. There are many reasons people move and some of them are legitimate. But Christians ought to be governed by the leading of the Holy Spirit in where they live and work. It is just as important for the man in

the pew to know where God wants him to live as it is for the pastor. Yet, it appears at times as though our church is being decimated by those who move here and there, failing to realize the devastating effect their departure has on the church they leave, or after making arrangements to move only then make inquiry as to whether there is a Friends church near where they could serve. There are some shining examples of Friends families who have considered the church and God's leading first in these matters, and their children have become stalwart Christian leaders among us as a result.

"The matter of pastoral moves merits some attention. There are pastors who are completely open to divine direction, and there are church bodies that cooperate. But not all pastoral changes are of the Spirit. Some come as the result of what Paul called carnality. There are a few influential Friends who act as though they think the church is their own private property and they can shuttle pastors in and out like migrant workers. There are pastors who are hungry for just one word of commendation and encouragement from the prominent and established Quakers in their congregations who appear at times less congenial than the newcomers and younger Christians whom they have won to the Lord. It is this kind of church internal triangle that limits church growth in too many situations.

"Just as unfortunate, perhaps, is the naive view that a pastoral move will solve problems which may possibly be due to the pastor's own attitudes or work habits.

"In this connection a recommendation is earnestly given to all the churches and pastors. This is to encourage our pastors to take advantage of conferences, classes, courses and other opportunities for self-improvement in the ministry. Churches willing to release their pastors and financially support such efforts by their pastors will find great dividends in terms of fresh, new energetic leadership. All professions today have taken cognizance of the value of such workshops, vocational conferences and studies. Pastors who have attended the NAE or Sunday school conventions, for instance, invariably return with new enthusiasm and vision. Several churches and pastors are recognizing the value of these. Hayden Lake Friends are to be commended for making it financially possible for their pastor, Wayne Piersall, to attend a pastors' seminar in Washington, D.C.; Tigard and Homedale released their pastors for a counseling seminar course with Dr. Clyde Narramore. We do well to learn from others in these examples. It might be said on this matter that 'the children of this world are in their generation wiser than the children of light.' (Luke 16:8)

"The actual result of our foreign missionary work is perhaps the greatest cause of confidence and rejoicing in the over-view of our Yearly Meeting ministries. There is little doubt but that our Bolivian Friends Church is now larger than our own Yearly Meeting, and it continues to grow. New developments in the field are exciting: the nationally-directed Bible School this year completes a three-year course and is graduating eight more students ready to enter the ministry and teaching in Christian schools. The George Fox School (junior high), also entirely under national direction, continues to grow and brings several students from a distance who have finished work in one of the more than 20 Christian day schools. Our missionaries believe it will not be long until a Christian academy will be started. Property has already been purchased on the outer edge of La Paz to house the new tabernacle and national church headquarters. Mature leadership, increased stewardship, genuine spiritual depth and a clear vision of the mission of the church characterize the Bolivian Friends Church today. God has answered prayer and honored the work of faithful missionaries laboring there. New missionaries entering the ranks this year are Ron and Carolyn Stansell, who are stationed in La Paz with veteran missionaries, David and Florence Thomas.

"Progress in Peru is just as gratifying. Quentin Nordyke has given much assistance in developing a mobile-type Bible school suited to the

needs of young Christians and pastors in Peru. Edwin and Marie Cammack leave in a few days for language school and then will join the Nordykes and Nicholas and Alice Maurer on the Peruvian field.

"To report victories on the mission field does not mean there are no problems or obstacles. Some appear overwhelming, but the promises of God are sure and the proof of these gives us confidence for the future not only for our mission outreach but for God's work here as well. It is no longer to be assumed one is more of a mission field than the other, for more pagans surround us here than in the Andean mountain population. It is now clearly a matter of cultural differences, of Christian obedience and faithfulness wherever the Lord leads.

"How important it is, also, to faithfully pray for our college. It is easy to take for granted or overlook the strategic ministry George Fox College has in the life of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Surely it is proper to express appreciation for the many fine Christian faculty members, the great majority of whom are active members of our church and whose vision and dedication inspire a genuine respect for Christian values. Christian higher education is perhaps the greatest support of the church today; every effort is worthwhile in maintaining the college.

"There are enormous problems faced by George Fox College economically, in providing quality education and in maintaining the Christian campus atmosphere so essential and yet so unusual in our current educational systems. I want to express my confidence in the college and profound gratitude for its influence. Increased enrolments bring additional responsibilities to the school. The administration and instructors as well as the students need our constant prayer and encouragement as well as financial support. Under the pressures on the small colleges today, George Fox College can survive only as we cooperatively work together to make it the kind of school God wants it to be.

"At this point we must plunge into some questions that are in the minds of many. Only those who are totally unaware of the problems besetting the church at large today are satisfied with the status quo. What is the true state of our church? Are the guidelines used from the *Discipline* adequate to measure the state of the church? Are all the answers honest and accurate? An editorial discussing this subject some months ago in *Moody Monthly* by Edward Hayes, a Christian education instructor in a Denver seminary, concluded that three dominant criticisms of our churches have emerged from the current debates: 1. Churches do not seem to know what they are or what their intended mission is in the world. 2. Churches are virtually paralyzed by a crippling 'organizational sclerosis' and introversion. 3. Congregations—the great source of potent witness and ministry in the world—remain largely frozen and immobile. These are brutal charges and hopefully do not entirely fit our situation. The uncomfortable facts are that they do fit in many instances. It is not that our church is not making progress or is not dedicated to God; it is simply that the results are not enough to match the opportunity or the needs and surely God's will is not being fully worked out among us.

"Other questions must be asked. Are our meetings filled with a disproportionate number of people who view the real burden bearing of responsibility and giving as largely a task of the few who are willing to be totally involved? Are there too many who regard the missionary task as largely relegated to the pocketbook only? Again, do we tend to measure spiritual achievement in terms of the success patterns of the world around us? The standard answer to a query as to how the church is progressing is to quote statistics—this year versus last year. Where even moderate numerical success is evident, the tendency is to give credit to the effective program or a dynamic pastor. Ought not the major focus of measurement be upon what is actually happening to the Christians themselves?

"The successful church, contends a professor in one leading seminary,

is often patterned after the 'successful corporation.' Our tendency is to look around at what our competitors are doing. Programs and practices are copied and subjected to the pragmatic of workability. 'If it works it must be good,' we say to ourselves. What results is often a dull 'sameness' in our churches. This procedure when followed over a period of years will ultimately eliminate any distinctives or freshness of the Holy Spirit's leading among Friends. A letter came to my office a few weeks ago from a respected elder in one of our meetings suggesting that this sort of religious blandness is already taking place. 'I think that there is an increasing interest in a more realistic support of the Lord's work in our church,' he wrote. 'Along with this,' he went on, 'I detect a soul-searching on the part of stewards. If we are to survive, let alone grow, we have to have a convincing program. And this is only possible if it is in the long range, and effective. I am "sold" but I have talked to some young Friends who are not too solidly committed any more to our denomination.'

"Included in this year's pastoral report forms were 17 possible reasons to be checked which might be barriers to church growth in your local situation. Of these 17, two were cited more than twice as many times as any other. These two were 'lack of local leadership,' and 'difficulties in getting people to take responsibilities.' What all may be involved in these replies is impossible to say, but the heart of the problem may be what is called on the mission field the 'indigenous principle.' One thing is certain: this is no time for discouragement or despair. While we may be 'success' or 'failure' conscious, we know the Holy Spirit is not backed against the wall. Simply because rapid numerical growth is not found and specific goals and sense of purpose are blurred in the minds of church members does not mean decline is inevitable. With God there is a tomorrow. And that tomorrow will be largely determined by what is set in motion today. Friends need a deeper understanding and conviction of what it means to be the people of God. What the church *is* determines what it *does*.

"A half-truth is at times more misleading than untruth, and we must be cautious lest the conclusion be drawn that all that is needed is just a deeper dedication and harder work. There are many deeply dedicated people of all ages in our churches who are frustrated because this alone is not enough. There are many who are working very hard in the church—perhaps too hard—until sheer spiritual weariness has dulled the capacity for exciting Christian living. There are some who insist all that is needed is more holiness preaching and emphasis, and while this is vitally important, this can hardly be the entire answer. Some other holiness denominations report numerical decline.

"One thing needed is nothing short of a resurgence of the role of priesthood of believers, which is not new but perhaps a neglected doctrine held important by Friends. 'The impact of Christianity upon the secular mind in the next decade,' writes Merrill C. Tenney in *Christianity Today*, 'will be largely determined by the spiritual convictions of the laity. The acceptance or refusal of individual missionary responsibility may be the crucial factor in the perpetuation of vital Christian faith.'

"What are the implications of all this to our church program? Obviously there are many. If the people are to play a more active part, pastors will have to devote more time to mobilizing the congregation if and when the congregation is motivated. This will mean instructing small groups and developing Christian family leadership. Pastors will rejoice to see the Spirit of God working through others. Rather than being jealous, they will delight to see growth of what one refers to as 'many ministers' in the church. This will mean weekend retreats, various types of meetings, a deepening in worship experience, in exploring the difference between guidance and domination. This may mean an updated vocabulary of our doctrines, making the queries correspond in terminology and relevance to the sins and society of our world. This may mean developing life-moving

ethics rather than just holding standards.

"Oregon Yearly Meeting stands in a day of great opportunity. Some of these open doors have been entered successfully, others only partially. It is fine to begin new outpost churches, dedicate new buildings, send out missionaries, concentrate on Christian camping, support a Christian college, gather our families, friends and neighbors week by week to worship. But each of these ministries must be enlarged and accelerated. Dedicated church buildings must become growing churches; outposts must move on to maturity; debts must be paid off; budgets must be enlarged; the college prepare more leaders; our mission fields extended; our youth saved and built up in the faith; the social problems of our contemporary living mastered rather than ignored or overpowering us.

"To tackle all these issues in simple Christian obedience is a difficult thing—not unlike a *Time* magazine description of national affairs is the situation in the church, 'the sheer effort of just holding things together seems to take all one's energy.' Therefore, in attempting to simplify our objective in terms that will cover most of these needs, including worship, evangelism, fellowship, and Christian training, let us speak of 'church growth.'

"Church growth implies more than numbers, but when numbers represent people with never-dying souls, people to be converted and built up in Christ, people for whom Christ died—then enlargement is a wonderful goal.

"Reflection upon the implications and possibilities of church growth in Oregon Yearly Meeting—real growth—justifies our purpose of existence. It puts in positive ways what we have tended to seize negatively. With every church a growing church, we are talking about not only statistics but a state of mind, a temper of will, a quality of imagination, a predominance of courage over timidity, of the appetite for holy adventure over the love of ease.

"Some believe there is nothing one man or one woman can do against the enormous array of the world's ills. Some think a small church is somehow destined to stay small—they even fear it becoming larger. Yet many of the world's great movements under God, of thought and action, revival and growth, have flowed from the work of one Spirit-anointed man with a God-given idea. Sixty churches and 6,000 Christians under the power of God can surely grow if we can open our hearts, our minds, and our ways of doing, to the creative energy of the God of history. All of us will ultimately be judged; we are not playing games or casually tossing interesting possibilities about like optional merchandise in a supermarket. The future does not belong to those who are content with things as they are, or weakened by frustrations, or who are apathetic toward common problems and who are fearful and timid in the face of new ideas and promises of God. If it has not been done, some doubt that it can be done, but surely it is the will of God for us to reach out and reach up for God this day. Church growth belongs to those who blend vision, reason, courage and faith in personal commitment. *Church growth may be beyond our own abilities, but it is not entirely beyond our control.*

"The Executive Council of Oregon Yearly Meeting has authorized a direct study during the coming year in the challenge of church growth. It is the third phase of the Program of Advance. Assisting in this study will be Dr. Myron Goldsmith, professor of religion at George Fox College. He and I will concentrate as much time as possible this year on these four guidelines: statistic gathering, questionnaire evaluation, on-campus study at the Institute of Church Growth, and wide visitation. The task of tabulating, boiling down and prayerfully and earnestly trying to measure ourselves with ourselves, with the New Testament teaching and God's revelation today, will be attempted. An implementation of these various possibilities in practical application is our goal. We shall be ruthless in searching for truth

in attempting great growth for God, even among Friends of the Northwest. Surely there is justification for such an effort in scriptural and practical motivation. We dare not continue coming out of the harvest field almost empty-handed when the fields are ripe unto harvest. How can we lift our expectations to God's level as we press forward to disciple the great Pacific Northwest?

"Those who are weary and worried about our smallness and our failures, who are inwardly torn by the contradictions and inconsistencies of our generation, who see and hear the daily results of hate and hunger and the awful scenes of a careening war—these are the ones in desperate danger of losing the sense of spiritual power. Have we forgotten what it means to belong to One who controls history? Can we believe the Friends Church can again experience revival? In 1860 John Henry Douglas, at the age of 28, felt compelled by the Holy Spirit to put aside other tasks and give himself full time to the Christian ministry. He was mighty in the Scriptures, a persuasive speaker who 75 years ago stood on this very platform and pled with a new Yearly Meeting to be a soul-winning church. He had just come from Iowa Yearly Meeting, which he served as superintendent from 1886 to 1890, and during those four years the records show 7,430 conversions and 2,595 persons added to the membership. When has any yearly meeting since added 2,595 members in one year, or 7,500 in four?

"All of us who knew them were shocked and saddened a few weeks back when Melvin and John Hull of Newberg and Greenleaf were lost in what is believed to be an airplane accident. Seldom has our church community rallied with such cooperative concern and effort as it did to search for these lost young men. Literally hundreds of volunteers went out again and again in planes, cars, motorcycles, horseback, on foot—looking, calling, searching—yes, praying that these men would be found and returned to their loved ones. This is as it should be. If this incident, as tragic and hopeless as it seems, could somehow serve to bring us to grips with what is involved in searching for the eternally lost about us, great good could come from this experience. Love, compassion, caring, careful plans, cooperation, specific objectives—this is a time of emergency. Every hour is critical. Few believe we have another 75 years to get the job done. Certainly this generation cannot wait.

"With God there is always a tomorrow, but it is largely under our control. We wish at times it were otherwise. But for the joy that was set before Him, Christ endured the cross."

A time of silent meditation followed the superintendent's presentation. The congregation spontaneously joined in singing, "A Charge to Keep I Have."

Roy Clark directed the congregation in singing, "Whosoever Will," after which Dean Gregory, former superintendent, led in prayer. Presiding Clerk Dorwin Smith expressed for all deep appreciation for the concern and challenge of the Yearly Meeting superintendent.

■ 3. A resignation was read from Donald H. Lindgren as assistant clerk of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

This was accepted and forwarded to the representatives.

■ 11. Earl P. Barker, chairman of the Discipline Revision Committee, made a presentation regarding a reediting of our doctrinal statement of Oregon Yearly Meeting. (See minute 18.)

This was held over until the Wednesday a.m. session.

■ 12. The following communication was forwarded from Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting:

The change listed below was recommended to the Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting by Nampa Monthly Meeting. It was approved at the January Quarterly Meeting and is being sent on to you for your consideration.

That Chapter II, Section IV, sub-section D, Paragraph 1 (Page 56) of the Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting be changed to read—

1. COMPOSITION. The Executive Council of the Yearly Meeting shall consist of the presiding clerk, who shall be its chairman; the assistant clerk, who shall serve as its vice-chairman; the general superintendent, the financial secretary; the treasurer; the clerk of the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight; one member from each Yearly Meeting board; nine members elected by the Yearly Meeting on nomination by the representatives; such others as may be designated for membership by the Yearly Meeting. The nine elected members shall be elected for terms of three years with one third expiring each year.

This was tabled until after a further presentation by the Discipline Revision Committee.

■ 13. The meeting adjourned to meet Wednesday at 9:15 a.m.

### Wednesday, 9:15 a.m.

■ 14. Harold Clark directed the meeting in singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" as the morning session opened. Clifton Ross led in prayer.

■ 15. The minutes were read and, with additions, approved.

■ 16. The representatives presented the name of Richard H. Beebe to serve as assistant clerk of the Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

■ 17. The treasurer's report was presented and appears in the Appendix. This was approved and a standing expression of appreciation was given for the work of the treasurer.

■ 18. Earl P. Barker, chairman of the Discipline Revision Committee, presented the proposed editing of Part I of the *Constitution and Discipline* of Oregon Yearly Meeting. (See minute 11.)

Approved, to be held over until Yearly Meeting of 1969 by the Discipline Revision Committee [mimeographed copies available].

■ 19. Earl P. Barker presented proposed changes in the *Constitution and Discipline* of Oregon Yearly Meeting. After explanation this was held over until Thursday afternoon. (See minutes 50, 60, 64 and 95.)

■ 20. Adelaide Barker, chairman of the Memorial Committee, read Revelation 7:13-17. Stanley Perisho sang "When They Ring the Golden Bells."

The names of the 58 members deceased the past year were read and appear in the Appendix.

Stanley Perisho then sang "The Eastern Gate," following which many expressions of appreciation were voiced.

## BOARD OF PUBLICATION

■ 21. Harold Antrim, president of the Board of Publication, introduced the work of that board.

Harlow Ankeny, manager of Barclay Press, presented their statement of income and expense, which appears in the Appendix. He also presented various publications of the board. Especially featured was the new book, *A Garden of the Lord*, a history of Oregon Yearly Meeting, authored by Ralph K. Beebe. Various processes of this production were depicted, from the actual writing on through a graphic description of the intricate mechanical processes of completing such a work. This 300-page book will be presented Friday evening of this Yearly Meeting.

Expression of appreciation was given for the work of LeRoy Benham, who will soon be leaving Barclay Press.

Approved.

■ 22. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p.m.

### Wednesday, 2:30 p.m.

■ 23. After a time of quiet waiting before the Lord, Presiding Clerk Dorwin Smith led in prayer.

## BOARD OF EVANGELISM

■ 24. Charles Beals, president of the Board of Evangelism, presented the work of the Board of Evangelism in report form, as follows:

*PUGET SOUND*—In the field of church extension and development, your board has given its major attention to the Puget Sound area. Factors determining this decision were twofold: first and primarily because this is the fastest growing region in the entire United States. It is phenomenal. Seventy thousand workers are moving to Everett to manufacture a gigantic airplane. Boeing is bringing additional thousands from 50 states to Seattle. Industries of all descriptions are locating there. Extensive housing developments incorporating thousands and thousands of homes are seen on every hand. To the board, this situation calls for not just one new church but scores of them. The second reason for settling on this area for church development emphasis is that we have promoted Meridian and Emmett in Idaho, Clackamas Park in Oregon. Now it is Washington's turn.

In last year's report we announced that Roger Smith, under the board's sponsorship, was residing in the Kent area to lay the groundwork toward the hopeful establishment of a new church there. Since that time some unforeseen and complicated developments have changed the picture. First, because of a crucial need for an interim pastor at Tacoma, we "loaned" him to that church to work half time to fill this position, thus reducing his effectiveness in our board's extension thrust.

Second, in the course of the year it has seemed feasible to the Holly Park church to move their location to a new site not far distant from our Kent property. To this end they are proceeding. Also, Northeast Tacoma's relocation program has entered into the picture.

The third unforeseen development is that the critical shortage of experienced pastoral leadership over the Yearly Meeting has made it highly advisable for Roger to answer the call to pastor an established church in Oregon. It was intended by both the board and Roger that he stay in Puget Sound to follow through on the organization of a new church—if not in Kent, perhaps east of Seattle or in the Everett vicinity. However, both the board and our general superintendent are agreed that the pastoral need elsewhere is more important for this year.

However, the board is maintaining its emphasis in the Puget Sound area. We are continuing our support of Holly Park and Northeast Tacoma in our effort to help them become strong meetings while at the same time considering what new strategy we should take for starting a new church.

*NORTHEAST TACOMA*—This board has set up an administrative organization consisting of representatives from the Board of Evangelism, Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting, Seattle Memorial Church, and Northeast Tacoma to guide Northeast Tacoma into a reorganization and a relocation project. At their request, Northeast Tacoma's status has been changed from a monthly meeting to what is technically an outpost status—but which we choose to term extension church. This gives the administrative committee greater freedom in its work with Northeast Tacoma.

Northeast Tacoma is purchasing a three-acre site a mile from their present location nearer to the housing development areas. They are negotiating the sale of their present buildings and grounds. Plans for a new sanctuary and educational unit on the new site have been approved. Builder Howard Rand, brother-in-law to Forrest, Albert, and Paul Cammack, will start construction as soon as the total financing can be arranged—hopefully this fall.

The big financing problem is that in the Puget Sound region money is tight, interest rates high, and discounts large. However, we are hopeful the project will be brought to fruition by matching-fund assistance from the Yearly Meeting along with the Friends Church Extension Foundation acquiring sufficient money through its newly established Investment Certificate program to meet the borrowing needs of this church.

*INVESTMENT CERTIFICATE*—The Friends Church Extension Foundation, which is a protege of the Board of Evangelism, has now set up an Investment Certificate Plan which is fully registered with the Oregon Corporation Commissioner under Oregon's "Blue Sky" law. It is hoped that promotion of this investment program throughout the Yearly Meeting will bring in a good response to meet initially the needs of Northeast Tacoma and later the borrowing needs of other churches.

*PARKROSE-LYNWOOD MERGER*—Some churches start as infant outposts and grow quickly into thriving monthly meetings. Others move to new locations to gain strength, while yet others merge to attain that purpose. This is the case of Parkrose and Lynwood in Portland, which are planning for a complete merger the first of September. They intend to worship in the Lynwood church while the Parkrose property is to be sold.

*DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES FOR ESTABLISHING NEW CHURCHES*—The board is in full accord with the proposal coming to

this Yearly Meeting from the Discipline Revision Committee relating to the establishment and organization of outposts and churches.

*SHARE CALL*—There was only one Share Call this year, and that for Maplewood. The board is taking a new look at our Share program with the thought that we should challenge our people to a repledging at \$5 a share rather than the \$2 which we have at present.

*CONCLUSION*—The items above reveal the major work of the board this past year. However, we have continued sponsorship of the Youth Ambassador program. We have followed through with routine matters associated with the normal functioning and have attempted to fulfill all assignments given us by the Yearly Meeting.

Charles Beals also explained the workings of the Friends Church Extension Foundation, with its new Investment Certificate Plan and its opportunities for individuals and churches.

Approved.

■ 25. M. Gene Hockett was appointed reading clerk pro tem.

■ 26. The Executive Council recommended Gerald Lemmons to the Business Committee for a two-year term.

Approved.

■ 27. The Committee on Discipline Revision was instructed by the Yearly Meeting a year ago to send copies of the proposed change which would make the pastoral year begin July 1 and end June 30, with explanation, to the monthly meetings for their consideration. This was done, and a number of replies have been received. These have been uniformly favorable. The committee recommended final approval of this amendment.

Approved.

■ 28. The State of the Church reports from the various quarterly meetings were read and approved, and are summarized as follows:

“Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended: but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.” So opens the report from one of the quarterly meetings, and applies to all our reports on the state of the churches.

The spiritual life of the churches for the most part is commendable, but several express a desire for revival. Attendance has not increased as desired, but in most places Sunday morning attendance has been good.

Churches express appreciation for the good ministry of their pastors. One church comments particularly on the spiritual growth and contribution of their youth. Family devotions, we find, are often hindered by divided homes—homes where working hours divide the family life, or where one parent is not interested. Christian education and Friends doctrine have been stressed in many meetings. In one quarterly meeting several young men are doing their alternate service in hospitals. One report stresses the concern that Friends become more involved in community affairs. One quarterly meeting reports a great increase in their quarterly meeting sessions since change to the rally type service rather than the conventional sessions.

The closing paragraph from one of the reports fittingly climaxes the sentiment of all: “Many very important points are left unreported. The

real ‘counting things with Christ’ may not be reflected here. We have not arrived. There is room for advancement on every front, but we feel the general direction of the church is toward the top. To this end we work; to this end we pray. May the Lord add His blessing to our efforts.”

■ 29. The Executive Council unanimously recommended to the Yearly Meeting the calling of Jack L. Willcuts as general superintendent for the period July 1, 1969 through the superintendent’s year 1970. (See minute 30.)

Approved, and a rising vote of appreciation and confidence was given him.

■ 30. The Executive Council recommended to the Yearly Meeting the following salary arrangement for our general superintendent for the 12-month period beginning September 1, 1968, and ending August 31, 1969:

[An adjustment of the Fixed Expense Budget due to the change in the superintendent’s year may be clarified by the financial secretary and the churches notified as necessary.]

■ 31. The Executive Council recommended the following as office personnel: Eilene Nordyke as administrative secretary, Beatrice Goldsmith as business secretary, and also recommended the salary arrangements be \$4,500 each.

Approved, with appreciation expressed for the work of this staff the past year.

■ 32. The following communication was received from LeRoy Benham, custodian of documents:

Serving as custodian of documents for the past two years, I have observed an apparent natural evolution of function within the Yearly Meeting office. It seems that the position of business secretary ought to be vested with the responsibilities of the custodian of documents. As by far the largest volume of business regarding documents comes through the business secretary, this move would greatly increase the efficiency of the office staff.

Perhaps certain items of antiquity in the vault should be made the charge of the Yearly Meeting archivist.

Referred to the representatives. (See minute 116.)

■ 33. The following recommendation came from the Executive Council:

During the 1966 Yearly Meeting sessions, the Executive Council was asked to consider a recommendation from Inland Quarterly Meeting concerning the revision or clarification of the annual Statistical Report (minutes 31 and 50, 1966). The Executive Council submitted a mimeographed revision for consideration by the Yearly Meeting.

Tabled. (See minute 39.)

■ 34. Julia Pearson presented the following report:

The program and outreach of our Women’s Missionary Union of Oregon Yearly Meeting continues to operate successfully. The president

has been amazed many times at the accomplishments of our women as she has read the reports of the various local unions and as she has listened and looked in on their respective business meetings. She is constrained to say, surely "this is the Lord's doing."

We have over 900 paid members in 76 unions this year. Two unions have been discontinued and four new unions organized. Our budget calls for \$1 a year as membership dues and \$6 per member for our home and foreign projects. Besides this many of our unions also give to other home and foreign needs outside of our Yearly Meeting. Over \$13,000 were handled this year by our treasurer, Agnes Tish. We supported Gene and Betty Comfort again this year in Bolivia at \$220 a month. We also gave \$200 each month to our home work—\$100 to East Wenatchee and \$100 to Svensen. Besides these two obligations we gave the Yearly Meeting Board of Missions:

1. \$300 toward outfitting our newest missionaries, the Edwin Camacks,
2. \$865 for power plants for Peru and Bolivia,
3. \$756 for Marie Chapman's fare to and from Bolivia,
4. \$197 for Spanish literature.

Money has also been sent in for missionaries' Christmas, for the Mexican work, and for freight on missionary outfitting.

One of our big projects of the Yearly Meeting WMU was supplying three tons of used clothing for an orphanage and an independent work in Korea. We also gave \$327 to pay the freight on this.

Another big project of the four quarterly meetings whose young folk use Twin Rocks camp ground was the redecorating and furnishing of nine rooms and cabins there. Many women put in long hours painting rooms and furniture, installing floor tile, making curtains and bedspreads. In addition, our women gave over \$500 to buy new mattresses, paint, floor tile, and furniture for the rooms.

Each spring we hold rallies in each quarterly meeting, at which time besides special speakers and times of fellowship we take offerings for a project—this year for Marie Chapman's fare.

Two highlights of each year are our yearly meeting banquet and our yearly Women's Retreat. This last year we added a Business Women's Retreat held the weekend after our regular retreat. It proved to be such a blessing to our business women that we plan to continue this policy.

It was the president's great pleasure to be sent by the Yearly Meeting WMU to the Evangelical Friends Alliance Commission meeting in Omaha, Nebraska, in January.

The treasurer's report was given and appears in the Appendix.

Following this, Julia Pearson and Mildred Beals presented a skit, giving the many reasons for the existence of the Women's Missionary Union.

Approved.

## BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

- 38. The report of the Board of Christian Education, presented by Dorothy Barratt, president, at the Wednesday evening service, follows:

The work of the Board of Christian Education covers many areas. All of these areas are vital to the life of a full-orbed church. Subcommittees of the board include Sunday School, Camping, Youth, Vacation Bible School, Children's Church, Clubs and Junior Yearly Meeting. Each phase of the work is a constant challenge to members of the board to develop creative and workable programs which will be of help to the local church.

SUNDAY SCHOOL, David Myton, chairman

A. The new Evangelical Friends Alliance Achievement Goals include all areas of Christian Education rather than the one department, Sunday school. The goals are divided into two main areas. One area is Sunday school, and the other deals with interests such as camping, youth, Vacation Bible School, clubs and Children's Church. With 900 points or more a *Sunday school* may receive a "Gold Star" on the certificate and with 750 points or more a church may receive a Gold Star for the *Other Areas*. To receive a Gold Crown Certificate for the total program a church must have at least 1600 points.

This first year in this program we have no Gold Crown winners; however, some churches made notable strides toward these goals.

B. LEADERSHIP TRAINING—A Leadership Training program is now available through the Evangelical Friends Alliance. A sample of this booklet was sent to each church early in the year. This is an excellent program with suggested texts and levels of achievement. Emily Moore of Ohio Yearly Meeting is the director of leadership training.

C. ANOTHER KORO CRUSADE—Another Evangelical Friends Alliance KORO (Kansas, Ohio, Rocky Mountain and Oregon Yearly Meetings) Crusade is planned for the fall of 1968—September 29 to October 27. This year the crusade will include the attendance totals for both Sunday school and church.

The KORO Crusade last fall was the first EFA cooperative venture of this type and stimulated a great deal of interest. Rose Valley and Newberg were winners from our Yearly Meeting.

We would encourage every church to join in the crusade for this fall. Every church must be registered to share in this program.

#### OTHER AREAS

*Children's Church*—A particular emphasis has been placed on Children's Church this year, and a number of churches have started a Children's Church program or have added another age group. Churches are encouraged to use the EFA Children's Church material for primary and junior church groups.

*Filmstrips*—A number of new filmstrips have been added to the Yearly Meeting filmstrip library, and churches are making good use of these throughout the year.

*Junior Yearly Meeting*—Junior Yearly Meeting has had an attendance of over 100 this year (1968). A very excellent program continues to be enlarged each year. Nursery care has been provided during all of the sessions of the Yearly Meeting.

YOUTH COMMITTEE, Charles Mylander, chairman

A. Howard Macy and Gary Macy have led Friends Youth as field secretary and president respectively for this year. Their leadership and diligent labor are deeply appreciated.

B. Nine young people have served as Youth Ambassadors this year: Charlene Campbell at South Salem; Cyril Carr at Homedale; Lois Harmon at Greenleaf; Kathy Jensen at Springbrook; Keith Jensen at Ashland; Gary Macy at Spokane; Nancy Phillips at Svensen; Joan Sandoz at Highland Avenue, Salem; Frank Roberts at Friends Memorial, Seattle.

C. The Friends Youth have purchased and provided a slide series and tape in Spanish demonstrating our youth work here in the United States. In addition they are also sending flannelgraph material for youth in Bolivia and Peru. The sum of \$200 has been raised for this project.

D. A new mimeograph and a new typewriter were purchased for the Friends Youth office this year. It was a cooperative project between the Friends Youth and the Board of Christian Education.

E. Midwinter and Yearly Meeting (1968) continue to be outstanding highlights of the year. Attendance, spiritual fervor and many activities of training, fun and fellowship were held on each occasion.

F. Approximately 200 Junior Hi'ers attended three jamborees in the spring.

In accordance with minutes of the George Fox College Board of Trustees dated June 1, 1968, we would like to present the following proposed amendment to the bylaws:

Article III, Section 1, paragraph a, to read:

"The Board of Trustees (hereinafter also referred to as the "Board") shall consist of not more than *forty-two members*, and ex officio the President of the college and the General Superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church. Any vacancy occurring shall not be filled until the next annual meeting of the Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church."

(The only change is adding the Yearly Meeting Superintendent to the Board.)

Approved.

■ 42. General Superintendent Jack L. Willcuts reported on the work of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, composed of Kansas, Ohio, Rocky Mountain, and Oregon Yearly Meetings. He has visited the new Omaha meeting and noted their fine progress. He also spoke of the mission in Mexico carried on by Roscoe and Tina Knight. Both of these enterprises are projects of the Alliance.

Dean Gregory, editor of the *Evangelical Friend*, reported that the first year has been completed in publication of that magazine. This has had an excellent reception in all of the four yearly meetings of the Alliance.

## BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

■ 43. Mildred Minthorne, president of the Board of Moral Action, presented her report. Andrew G. Hanners, executive director of Oregon Council on Alcohol Problems, spoke on the problems, moral and social, which face us. He spoke of the terrible impact that alcohol is having on our country today and said that it isn't the skid row alcoholic who is our real problem; it is the addict who is higher in society. We must all be

concerned in being active Christians. Then we must let others know our stand. Our problem is that we have a tendency to "get used to the dark."

The report, in mimeographed form, was distributed as follows:

#### PUBLIC MORALS DEPARTMENT

Each state in the Yearly Meeting has had particular reason for working hard this year: the proposed dropping of the temperance provision in the Idaho State Constitution, the hearing on advertising by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission, and Washington's Sunday law to prohibit the selling of liquor. These and other matters of legislation have been before us. There have been several victories and a disappointment or two. Many letters of concern have gone from our membership, and some have attended hearings and called on officials in person.

Commitment Sunday and Youth Temperance Education Week were observed by some churches. Many gave opportunities for the signing of abstinence pledges, and some distributed the alcohol education brochures in the Sunday bulletin.

Two mailings have been made to the local meeting chairmen and pastors, which included letters, a newly-revised handbook, National Highway Safety Sunday materials, commitment pledge samples, and other materials. Films were recommended, and some were arranged for with the board's help. Virginia Helm was asked to write a skit for children about tobacco, and this was favorably received by the Oregon State Board of Health. Mildred Minthorne had opportunity to speak to Bible club teachers of western Oregon and Washington, offering helps for teaching temperance to boys and girls.

A study has been made of the Moral Action statements in the *Discipline* and suggestions sent to the Discipline Revision Committee.

Public Morals education has been given to our people through 24 programs of various kinds, the showing of 62 films, an estimated 3,500 tracts distributed, 74 flannelgraph or object lessons, 67 special speakers, more than 165 references in sermons, and seven quarterly meeting presentations. During March Greenleaf and Boise Valley Quarterly Meetings jointly sponsored a public forum on social problems. Ninety essays were written, 132 posters displayed; 538 total abstinence pledges were given out, and 15 books on public morals were added to church libraries. Eleven young people attended a temperance camp, and many more received temperance teaching in our Friends camps. As many as eight adults helped in temperance camps. The sacredness of sex and marriage has been taught our young people through books, discussion in Sunday school classes, special counselors, academy chapel programs, Friends Youth lessons and discussions, messages and counsel by the pastors, and a study for young married people on the Christian home.

Poster and essay contests were held, with the results to be announced at Yearly Meeting. Last year's winning adult essay was printed in the *Evangelical Friend*.

LITERATURE DEPARTMENT, Lois Tish, chairman

"The person who does not read has no advantage over the person who cannot read."

Forty-two churches reported that they have church libraries, and 28 of these have additional library resources, such as the pastor's library, Sunday school materials, and WMU libraries. Including 11 other churches reporting in previous years, Oregon Yearly Meeting libraries now contain

11,862 books. Last year 25 churches added from one to 110 new books to their libraries, making a total of 548 books added. In several churches, individuals exchanged books from their personal libraries. Twenty-five churches have a regular appointed librarian and 25 keep library records. Books for the church libraries were secured through budgeted funds of the church, donations, or special projects.

Many of the churches have encouraged the reading of the *Fruit of the Vine* and *The Christian Reader*. Some Idaho churches promoted subscriptions to the *Idaho Challenge*.

During this past year the Board of Moral Action has emphasized Bible reading, supplying lists of good recent translations and suggested ways for reading and studying the Bible.

Obscene literature is being combated by instruction through sermons and Sunday school classes, books and magazines on public morals, posters, and protests to dealers, senators and publishers of salacious material. Individuals are encouraged to be constantly "on guard" at newsstands and carefully screen materials which come into the home.

Eight books on Quakerism have been purchased and added to the Quaker collection in Western Evangelical Seminary Library.

The Moral Action Board arranged with Kenneth Eichenberger of WES Bookstore to have books for sale at Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

■ 44. It was requested that copies of the keynote address of our general superintendent be made available in mimeographed form.

Approved.

■ 45. It was brought to the attention of the meeting that the office of Custodian of Blanks has become obsolete, and it was recommended that this office be discontinued.

Approved.

■ 46. In the opening time of devotion, Everett Craven and Presiding Clerk Dorwin Smith led in prayer.

■ 49. The Friends Church Extension Foundation Corporation presented the name of Donald Edmundson to succeed himself as a Foundation director for a three-year term.

Approved.

■ 50. Earl P. Barker, chairman of the Discipline Revision Committee, presented the proposed changes in the *Constitution and Discipline*. (See minutes 19, 60, 64 and 95.)

After considerable discussion, this was tabled.

## BOARD OF GENERAL EDUCATION

■ 51. The work of the Board of General Education was presented by President Kenneth Williams as follows:

A vision of the opportunities and anxieties facing more than 1200 junior high, high school and college age youth in Oregon Yearly Meeting presents a tremendous challenge for this board to provide the very best we can in the education of these young people. In a time of changing moral principles, young people are confronted with temptations and questions which most of us as their parents never encountered. An affluent society whose values are based primarily on materialistic standards challenges the church to make the Christian experience so meaningful and vital in our own adult lives that our youth can find direction and meaning in the values upheld by the church. Changing Christian moral principles cause young people to question whether values held sacred by the church are truly Christian. Where are they to find the answers? We cannot expect the public school or the secular college to give adequate direction in spiritual values. There are agencies within the church that are charged with the responsibility for finding the answers and communicating these to our youth.

The Board of General Education is faced with the task of providing the best possible formal education outside the home and the church for these searching, questioning students. We are not yet able to give the assistance we feel is needed by our youth in public schools. We encourage Christian teachers to put forth their testimony as to the sufficiency of the Christian faith as actively and as aggressively as possible without overstepping highest Christian ethics in their positions. There are more than 250 active Christian teachers in Oregon Yearly Meeting. We can expect that some miraculous conversions will result if each teacher is faithful to the Holy Spirit's leading. Because education involves such a large segment of young people's time and because youth are so strongly influenced by the schools, Christian teachers who stand for their belief are in a most effective position to render service. We parents must concern ourselves with the kind of schools in which our children are enrolled.

Of about 250 students working toward college degrees only 125, or half, are attending one of the most academically sound, fastest growing, and most truly Christian colleges in the Northwest, our own George Fox College. Some may be attending other Christian colleges; others may be attending colleges or universities where they can specialize in a particular area. But there is apparently something wrong with our vision of the need for Christ-centered education for our youth at the college level. Who is failing in this area? Is the philosophy of parents regarding higher education at fault? Is there something wrong with our own college? Are parents

really unable to afford the privilege of sending their students to George Fox? Are students and parents consistently, carefully and sincerely seeking God's will in the higher education of our youth? In spite of genuine effort spent in helping our people realize the great need for Christian education, we are missing many students who could find the answers to their questions by coming to George Fox College. It is imperative for the future of our young people, for the future of our church, and for the future of our college that Oregon Yearly Meeting awaken to the great opportunity we have in George Fox College.

Forty-four of our members are preparing for full-time Christian service at the college or seminary level. Twelve of these are in George Fox College, according to our reports; nine are in seminary. Where are the other individuals who constitute the second half of this group securing their preparation? This should be a matter of concern to us.

Of 16 scholarships or grants-in-aid being provided by our churches, 10 are provided for students attending GFC. If lack of funds deters students from attending GFC, perhaps our churches should evidence real concern for Christian education by providing financial aid for students to attend our own college. All but two monthly meetings reported that there is consistent prayer support for the college in their meetings. The college has been presented in the churches 99 times in formal presentations. We believe our people are deeply concerned about our college and desire to support it, but in these trying days for private colleges we absolutely must provide greater support and pray more diligently than we have ever prayed before.

One thousand, five hundred and fifty-eight dollars were used to provide tuition support for five young men in ministerial education last year. All but one of these were in seminary training. In the coming school year we expect to help at least seven young men in college and seminary in their education for full-time pastoral or missionary ministry. It was necessary to reject some requests for financial aid last year because we had used all our funds. According to the askings of the seven men who are to be helped in the coming year, we shall use about \$3,000. It is the hope of the committee that there might always be some surplus funds to meet the aid that often must be administered during the school year. Two of these students we shall aid this year are planning to pastor churches which are too small to provide adequate support. Another is doing voluntary service now in Kentucky with youth in the ghettos. He plans to serve in a Negro church, possibly in the coming year. This is a great advance in the education program of our church. These funds are administered by a joint committee chosen from the Boards of Evangelism and General Education.

The Savings Investment Plan is still being considered, and it is hoped that this plan can become effective during this year. (See *Minutes* 1967, page 27, minute 54.)

There is strong feeling that parents, particularly young married people, need help in knowing how to rear their children for these days. A manual based on the Bible principles for rearing children is now in the process of being edited. There will be 12 lessons dealing with Bible concepts of the father's responsibility in the home, the need for unity between mother and father, the choices confronting parents, the need for consistent living before our children, examples of the success and failure of families in the Bible, the needs of children, concepts of discipline, and

the sanctity and sacredness of human life.

During this year there have been questions by some concerning the direction George Fox College is taking in regard to Christian moral principles. Concerns have been expressed to members of this board. The board has dealt with these concerns and has conferred with college personnel in very frank discussions. It is our feeling that these questions have been answered very satisfactorily and the General Education Board believes that Oregon Yearly Meeting can have perfect confidence in the administration and Christian moral principles on the campus in the coming year.

Our own youth are honestly and deeply questioning and searching for meaningful and honest principles by which to govern their lives in a day when honesty, respect for authority, and adherence to traditions are being challenged. This is not an open rebellion, but we believe it is an attitude of honest questioning to determine what are the principles and standards by which students can live in this day.

Our board is unanimous in the belief that the entire administration, faculty, and staff of the college are doing all in their power and wisdom to establish and uphold the highest Christian moral principles in conformity with the standards of our church. There is a very definite concern that continued emphasis be given to the spiritual life of students and to an aggressive effort to bring about the conversion of those who do not know Christ as Lord. Acting President David Le Shana stated that just having Christian standards, Christian professors, Christian students, or even Christian actions does not make a Christian college. Only when the Holy Spirit is allowed to work in all phases of its life can the college be truly Christian.

These college leaders who are giving sacrificially and to the fullest extent of their time and talent need prayer support for wisdom and guidance to educate our youth. They hold the key to the answers of a searching, questioning young generation seeking to know, perhaps more honestly than any other—not what tradition sets forth—but what is the mind of Christ for each of them.

■ 52. Paul P. Petticord, president of Western Evangelical Seminary, spoke on behalf of the seminary. Oregon Yearly Meeting has a trustee relationship with this institution. Thirteen Friends students were enrolled this past year, with more expected the coming school year.

Appreciation was expressed for the work of the seminary by Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

## BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

■ 53. Ira L. Craven introduced the work of the Board of Stewardship as follows:

If I were to ask you the question, What does the word STEWARDSHIP mean to you, there would very likely be a variety of answers.

The *New Collegiate Dictionary* (1953) defines steward as (1) "an officer or employee in a large family, or on a large estate, to manage the domestic concerns, supervise servants, keep accounts." (2) "An administrator supervisor; a manager." Thus the word is used to translate the Greek *Oikonomes*, which literally means "The administrator of a house." The three root ideas behind both the Greek and the English concepts are (1) a

responsible servant (2) an ultimate authority and (3) a final accounting.

The use of the term in Christian tradition is rooted not only in the Bible, but in the necessity of human language, using analogies to understand the divine-human encounter. To the more familiar figures, father-son, shepherd-sheep, must be added the master-steward relationship.

Christian stewardship is the practice of systematic and proportionate giving of time, abilities and material possessions based on the conviction that these are a trust from God to be used in His service for the benefit of all mankind in grateful acknowledgment of Christ's redeeming love.

Christian stewardship is the ordering of the whole of life in accordance with the will of God revealed in Jesus Christ.

But how do you evaluate a stewardship program? By comparing statistics with the previous years? Statistics sometimes give a vague picture of what is really taking place. Last year 48 reports were received from the various church stewardship chairmen; this year there were 53. Last year 29 meetings reported observing November Stewardship Month, this year 43.

Other emphasis to stewardship was given through sermons by the pastors or guest speakers, prayer meetings, bulletins and inserts, use of bulletin boards, readings, object lessons, personal testimony, poster and essay contests, tracts and personal contacts, and stewardship letters. There were 49 persons who entered the poster contest in the Junior division. In the essay contest, two pastors, ten adults and three from Junior High entered. There were 168 specific stewardship presentations made during the year.

However, most reports generally agreed that the pastors' messages were the most effective. Panels of outside speakers, stewardship seminars, faith promise presentations, story illustrations, object lessons, home talent skits, and personal testimonies are other means found to be effective.

In answer to the question regarding new converts to the generally accepted concept of tithing, there were 13 individuals and 16 families.

Eighteen meetings have participated in missionary conferences, 13 in "faith promise" phase of the conference, and amounts promised were from \$263 up to \$5,000 in 12 meetings and one meeting \$17,208 over a three-year period. Three meetings had stewardship seminars; only a very few report purchasing additional stewardship supplies.

Let us all work at the task of being stewards—Christian stewards.

Approved.

Ruth Washburn presented the winning stewardship poster. Winners were Gregg Lamm, first, and Connie McFadden, second.

Winners of the adult division of the stewardship essay contest were Maxine Ball, first, and Louise George, second.

Winners of the ministers' division were Charles Ball, first, and Randall Emry, second. Charles Ball's essay was read to the meeting.

■ 54. The meeting adjourned to meet Friday at 9:15 a.m.

■ 57. Fred and Lois Johnson from Cass City, Michigan, were introduced to the meeting. They will be serving the East Wenatchee church as pastors.

## BOARD OF MISSIONS

■ 58. The report of the Board of Missions, presented in the Thursday evening service by Charles Ball, president, was approved as follows:

To care for their work, the Board of Missions met at Redmond, Oregon, November 7-9, with all members present, and at the Midyear Board Meetings at Newberg in February. The Administrative Committee had seven meetings. Members of the board have given generously of their time and thought to the work. Developments this year have not been spectacular, but it is our feeling that the work of planting the Gospel and encouraging the growth of the National Church in Bolivia and Peru has progressed well.

MISSIONARY COMMITTEE REPORTS—Fifty-six local committees have reported on their activities for the year. Their work and prayer support cannot adequately be measured from these brief reports. A summary of the information submitted is as follows:

### BOLIVIA

#### A. Missionary Staff:

Our missionaries have given excellent personal reports, which have been duplicated, and it is hoped that these will be read.

B. The National Church: The field report for Bolivia indicates that there are 106 meetings being held regularly in Bolivia, of which 31 are monthly meetings, and 75 are dependent meetings in six different quarterly meetings. The National Church sponsors 24 grade schools and Patmos Bible Institute, which this year completed its third year of operation under the National Church, with 26 students enrolled and a graduating class of eight. Carmelo Aspi, the director of the Bible Institute, held ten-day short courses in five different quarterly meetings. These were supported by fees paid by those enrolled. These courses made a lasting impression on the church and are a beginning of what is hoped will develop into a Christian Education Extension Program. At the Yearly Meeting in April a unified young people's organization was established. They now plan for special efforts at their quarterly meetings and a youth conference in October.

Last year the Mission Board allocated \$2,085 from the Farm Fund for the purchase of new property on which to relocate the tabernacle in La Paz. The National Church was asked to be responsible for all other

expenses involved in its relocation. This year a company in La Paz bought the old tabernacle property, and the National Church has received settlement for their land and an offer from the new owner to help them dismantle and move the tabernacle to the new property. Apparently this transition is being made successfully.

### PERU

#### A. Missionary Staff:

B. The National Church: The annual report from the Peruvian Mission indicates that there were three phases of the work which were of special significance to the National Church this year. The first was an effective Evangelism-in-Depth Campaign, which included local involvements and house-to-house visitation. The second was the Bible School course which was held for church leaders in November and December, with an enrolment of 23, of which 11 satisfactorily completed the classroom work. Carmelo Aspi from Bolivia helped for the first week as a teacher, and Paz Lopez served as the evangelist. The third highlight was the Yearly Meeting with 277 registered during three days. Manuel Poma from Bolivia was the guest speaker. There were classes for every age, testimonies, inspirational messages, business meetings, baby dedications, short dramas, and games. This was truly a highlight in the life of the National Church.

### SHORT TERM PROJECTS

A. Ralph and Marie Chapman—Ralph Chapman went to Bolivia the first of February to teach in the Bible School, replacing Marshal Cavit who came home on furlough at that time. Marie and Wayne joined Ralph June 1. Upon arrival, Marie has taught in the Bible School, replacing Betty Comfort. This experience for Ralph has helped him to appraise the needs in missionary literature. The Chapmans left Bolivia August 11, stopping over in Mexico City to visit Roscoe and Tina Knight.

B. Paul and Daniel Cammack—Paul and Daniel Cammack left Portland about the middle of June for a three-month term to be spent mostly in Peru. Upon their arrival, missionaries from both fields gathered at Urmiri, Bolivia, for an inspirational study conference at which the Cammacks and Chapmans served as resource persons. Immediately afterwards the Cammacks went to Peru, where they have been holding special meetings and classes in several outlying areas. This trip was approved by the Mission Board and travel financed by Forrest and Orpha Cammack. We are grateful to the Cammack family for making this project possible.

SPRAGUE RIVER—After having spent at least 25 years and considerable money on the Indian work at Sprague River, it was the feeling of the Mission Board that other arrangements should be made for the continuance of this work after Evert and Virena Tuning retired September 1, 1967. James Rahenkamp, a Friends minister from Florida, gave leadership to the mission from September to July, which proved to be very helpful. The future of the work at Sprague River is now in the hands of the Executive Council of the Yearly Meeting.

MEXICO—This has been the second year of our cooperation in the

Evangelical Friends Mexican Mission for which our Board has acted as the sending agent. Roscoe and Tina Knight went to Mexico City September 1. They have found it difficult to establish a beachhead for evangelical work in the area to which they have felt led to go, but they report some encouraging results from their first year's labor. Our board contributes \$2,500 annually to this project, which has an annual budget of \$7,500.

FINANCES—The board is thankful for the good support of Oregon Yearly Meeting though the receipts have not been equal to that of last year. However, the board has operated within its budget. A summary of finances is given below, and a full report of receipts and disbursements is given in the Yearly Meeting Treasurer's report.

In conclusion we thank God for the faithful and effective service of our missionaries and for their protection and good health throughout the year. We are grateful for the interest, prayers, and support of our constituency, and for God's blessing upon our united efforts for outreach and the advancement of Christ's kingdom on our mission fields.

■ 59. Arthur Climenhaga, guest speaker for Yearly Meeting sessions, reported regarding the work of the National Association of Evangelicals. He stressed the advantages that are ours in being able to unite in a larger front of fundamental evangelical thrust.

He admonished us that we must be "stedfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord."

■ 60. Earl P. Barker, chairman of the Discipline Revision Committee, reintroduced the proposed changes in the *Constitution and Discipline* of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends. Much discussion was carried on regarding the revamping of the quarterly meeting setup which is contained in this document. Because of lack of time, the discussion was suspended, and the matter tabled until later. (See minutes 19, 50, 64 and 95.)

■ 61. David Le Shana, acting president of George Fox College, presented the annual report of the college.

He spoke of the development of education among Friends, from that of children on through the development of academies and colleges. We have a rich heritage. In our own college there has been a growth: in student body, in faculty, in spiritual impact, and in budget; also in expenditures and in buildings.

He urged that we pray definitely that we may immediately raise the final fund needed to consummate the renovation of Wood-Mar Hall that it may again be put into use as an auditorium for George Fox College.

We were challenged that the gift of God's grace and the work of the Holy Spirit are of utmost importance in the efficiency of our college. He stated that "We are in a race between Christian education and human catastrophe. How will this race be won?" Also, he reassured us that "The future is as bright as the promises of God."

The president's annual printed report in pamphlet form was distributed and will be sent out to all the churches.

■ 62. Kenneth Fendall led in prayer in the opening of the afternoon session.

■ 63. The minutes were read and approved.

■ 64. The matter of proposed changes in the *Constitution and Discipline* was again introduced. (See minutes 19, 50, 60 and 95.)

It was recommended that those sections of the proposed Discipline revision concerning the change from quarterly meetings to area rallies be adopted for a period of one year. During this year each area meeting would be encouraged to adopt the new approach as much as possible to meet the needs in its area.

This recommendation was adopted.

■ 67. The meeting was opened as Dean Gregory led in prayer. Roy P. Clark led the congregation in singing "He Leadeth Me."

■ 68. The minutes were read and approved as corrected.

■ 69. Clair Lund, missionary on furlough from the American Indian field of World Gospel Mission, was introduced.

■ 70. The Unified Budget, as explained in the "Proposed Changes in the Constitution and Discipline," was introduced to the meeting. After lengthy discussion and explanation, it was approved by the meeting to be held over for one year by the Discipline Revision Committee.

This constitutes the first reading of this change.

Much appreciation was expressed for the work of the Finance Committee in preparing this explanation.

■ 71. The Executive Council recommended the creation of the office of an archivist. It shall be his duty to gather, evaluate, and preserve documents of all sorts which record events of the past, and to make them conveniently available for any who wish to study or write on historical themes. The Yearly Meeting should provide for a depository suitably located, with optimum conditions for preservation of perishable materials.

■ 74. The following projected plan of Church Growth Studies was presented to the meeting:

Two quotations taken from State of the Churches at Yearly Meeting, "We cannot be content with just holding our own," and "We desire to more effectively reach the community around the area of our church," are added

incentives to our church growth studies. Church growth implies more than numbers; it is the development of Christians in total Christian growth. Reflection upon the implications and possibilities of church growth in Oregon Yearly Meeting—real growth—justifies our purpose of existence. It puts in positive ways what we have tended to seize negatively. With every church a growing church, we are talking about not only statistics but a state of mind, a temper of will, a quality of imagination, predominance of courage over timidity, the appetite for holy adventure over the love of ease.

The Church Growth Study is the third phase of the Program of Advance. Before additional staff members or innovative programs are introduced in the Yearly Meeting, it is felt that as thorough a study of church growth procedures as possible should be made. To develop this plan a committee chaired by Howard E. Harmon, composed of Arthur O. Roberts, Mahlon Macy, Richard H. Beebe, Dorwin Smith and Jack L. Willcuts, began a discussion series of studies on procedures in church growth. This committee has met several times and has proposed the following steps:

First, to gather statistics which would be instructive over the past ten years in particular among all our churches. Graphs will be charted pinpointing local instances of noticeable growth and nongrowth. Finding these, an attempt to learn why will be made.

A second area of interest will be the use of questionnaires. The wide range of factors relating to church growth including statistics of Sunday school and worship attendance, budgets, pastoral leadership, church organizations, community attitudes and all of the categories that can be practically considered will be covered.

A third step in church growth studies will involve personal interviews with Dr. Donald McGavran of the Institute of Church Growth in Pasadena, California. A reading program as well as individual guidance from Dr. McGavran will be sought. A bibliography of books and case history studies of church growth will be a part of this phase of the work.

The fourth area of exploration will be in visitation with different churches and pastors across the United States where significant church growth is occurring.

Myron Goldsmith is a professor of religion at George Fox College with his Ph.D. earned in church history. With his background and interest in this subject along with his influence on the college campus with ministerial students, it is felt that he is the strategic person to engage in this study with our superintendent.

Our proposed budget is as follows:

It is assumed that this budget will be cared for partially through the United Budget, partially through the superintendent's expense account, and the remainder from other boards or through individual solicitation. The Board of Evangelism has earmarked \$900 for the coming year, and \$1,300 has been designated from the Board of Christian Education. It is assumed that \$1,500 can be taken from the superintendent's expense account, inasmuch as half his time for the year will be directed in these studies.

It is assumed that the first four months of the year the superintendent will give his time to this study and delegate responsibilities of his office to the office staff, to quarterly meeting superintendents, and other area

directors, and to our yearly meeting clerk. Another period of time during the summer of 1969 will be taken in writing and developing a manuscript based upon the statistics and observations of the four areas of research.

As the third phase of the Program of Advance of Oregon Yearly Meeting, this will be a major interest of the Board of Christian Education and the Board of Evangelism for the coming year.

The Executive Council recommends this plan for Church Growth Study, to be made by Jack L. Willcuts and Myron Goldsmith, to the Yearly Meeting.

■ 86. Norman Winters, principal, presented the Greenleaf Friends Academy annual report for the school year ended May 31, 1968, as follows:

Greenleaf Academy completed its fifty-ninth school year May 31, 1968, with commencement exercises on May 27 for 17 seniors and a commencement service on May 26 for 18 eighth-grade students. The maximum enrolment for the year was 110—31 in the Junior High and 79 in the High School.

**JUNIOR HIGH**—The anticipated enrolment for the coming year shows quite an increase. One major change in the instructional program will be to separate the two grades according to subject area, which will utilize more instructors on the staff and will provide for a larger total enrolment without additional staff. After two years for the Junior High we are well satisfied that a Christian environment for this age is most important.

**HIGH SCHOOL**—The Academy is again approved by the State Department of Education.

*Activities*: Two students represented the Academy at the annual Boys' State and Girls' State Convention in Nampa and Boise. Three students attended the YMCA Youth Legislature session in Boise during the school year. Three boys attended the state Key Club convention in Pocatello during the year.

*Music*: The 48-voice choir presented 23 concerts this spring in all of the Boise Valley Friends Churches and many other churches in the area. In addition, a small musical group prepared the program for two churches in Jordan Valley, Oregon. One weekend, another musical group presented six concerts in several churches in Enterprise, Oregon, area. The choir received a 2 rating in the district music festival and competed in the Northwest Christian Schools musicale in Nampa, in which we were co-hosts. Several students were selected to the all-state choir and band and the Snake River Valley honor choir and honor band.

*Drama*: Under the direction of Barbara Baker, the Academy presented three drama productions: *Pride and Prejudice* by the Junior Class, *The Sisters McIntosh*, a one-act play, and the student body religious classic, *Servant in the House*. The cast of the student body play participated in a drama workshop in Moscow, Idaho, at the University.

*Athletics*: As members in the new SRV conference, our football and basketball teams faced good competition. New coaching staff, new team personnel, and a new conference proved that some years are for rebuilding and other years are for winning. The prospects for basketball and track look good for next year, and with added experience, football should improve. We found that some seasons are longer than others.

**STAFF**: The fine spirit of cooperation and unity was very evident with the entire staff. The hard work and dedication on the part of all is most appreciated. It is the faculty and staff, though not in the limelight, but who work day after day in direct contact with the students and the many school problems, who should receive all the credit for the success of the year. Last fall the faculty enjoyed workshops with other Christian schools' staffs at Warm Lake, Washington. We plan to attend again this fall in like sessions. We are most grateful that the entire teaching staff will be at the school again for the coming year. The only changes to be made are that a cook was hired to replace one, and a custodian was hired.

The faculty consists of the following: Norman D. Winters, administrator; John Johnson, math, science, coach; Ruthellen Johnson, home economics; Jesse Kennison, social science, coach; Fred Neumann, music, coach, science; Mark Roberts, Spanish, biology, Bible; Anna Mills, business education; Esther Hardinger, librarian, English; Barbara Baker, English, drama.

Staff members are Calvin Wilkins, bookkeeper; Jane Harris, cook; Virginia Wilkins, cook; Sam Hiskey, bus driver.

**EQUIPMENT**: Several items of equipment were purchased this year; included were two typewriters for the commercial department, two type-

writers for the office, a sewing machine for the home economics department, and a balance, microscope, and spectroscope for the science department.

**FINANCES:** The total receipts for the year in the general fund were \$66,328.37. Expenditures were \$67,708.40, with an overdraft of \$1,380. In addition, a loan of \$3,000 needs to be repaid to the special funds. We are thankful to the Greenleaf Monthly Meeting and the many friends throughout the Yearly Meeting who have given and supported us in many ways.

**SUMMARY:** Two special programs were given in honor of the 60th anniversary year. A charge of \$.06 was made for the first musical program in November, then a \$.60 charge was made for the open house and drama and musical program in April, and a \$6 banquet is being planned for the fall of 1968.

Two special meetings with Marvin Root and Mahlon Macy proved to be most rewarding and inspirational for the student body. Pray with us that the coming year may be one of great spiritual achievement, and pray with thanksgiving for the many past blessings.

## **BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE**

- 90. The report of the Board of Peace and Service, which was presented by the president, Walter P. Lee, in the Friday evening meeting, is as follows:

In this hour of bitter antagonisms, strife, bloodshed and extremes to the right and to the left on both the international and national fronts, evangelical Friends have an unparalleled opportunity to demonstrate the love of Christ in the areas of tension and need. In the face of the radical extremes concerning the war in Vietnam, Friends should recognize the remarkable climate in which to reveal the Christian alternative to all war, not simply an unpopular conflict. It will be most unfortunate for us if we react to the extremes by espousing one or the other. Now is the time for every Friend, not simply the Yearly Meeting Board of Peace and Service, to commit himself to Christ's spirit, teachings, and example concerning peace and service. This is the hour to reveal the true meaning of Christ-honoring repudiation of war and peaceful, constructive service.

The Board of Peace and Service has been delegated by the Yearly Meeting to develop, promote and administer a program in the peace and service phase of Friends witness for Christ, but the local meetings and Friends as individuals are the ones who can most effectively support, apply, and demonstrate such a Christian message and service.

As stated in its 1966-67 report, this board has a five-point program:

1. Preaching and Promotion of Peace
2. Alternate Service

3. Foreign Relief
4. Foster Homes and Child Adoption
5. Disaster Program

The present confusion and the radical views and actions of individuals and groups relative to the Vietnam war should not create in us a fear to witness to Christ's spirit and teaching concerning all war. This is part of Christ's message and calls for commitment within the local churches. We urge that Friends take a positive stand on the Christian alternative to war and present the teachings of Christ to our youth that they may have a Christian basis upon which to develop their convictions.

Your Board of Peace and Service designated May 26 of this past year as Peace and Service Sunday in the churches and sent a letter of information regarding this to pastors and chairmen of local committees well in advance of that date. Then a packet containing brochures on War and Peace, Relief, Foster Homes, Adoption and information concerning Friendsview Manor, with covering letter, was sent to each church soon after May 1. A bulletin insert folder entitled "An Open Door for Service" was also sent to the churches for distribution on Peace and Service Sunday. A number of churches used this material either on May 26 or on a more convenient Sunday for the local congregation.

The board has also designated November 24, 1968, as World Relief Sunday and plans for all churches to have brochures from the World Relief Commission for distribution in advance of that date. We urge all churches to plan for a special offering for overseas relief.

The board's responsibilities include arranging for financial assistance that is used to help some retired ministers, missionaries and their spouses at Friendsview Manor. This is a pressing need, and Friends are urged to respond to this through the United Budget and by special gifts.

A set of colored slides has been assembled to present phases of the work of the board, and a Carrousel slide projector has been purchased to present this story both for an automatic display and for use in the local churches. Churches may obtain the slides and projector from the Yearly Meeting Headquarters for 50 cents handling charges plus two-way shipping costs. Churches with projectors may obtain the slides alone.

The alternate service program of the board has been handled most effectively by the Alternate Service Committee of the board and has been a major emphasis of the board. A number of young men are in foreign alternate service, and others have been processed and plan service soon. Since Oregon Yearly Meeting is the only member of the Evangelical Friends Alliance which has an organized alternate service plan, the other members of the EFA have been invited to work through our Alternate Service Committee.

The young men in alternate service are making a significant contribution to society, and many are giving a clear witness to the love of Christ. Terryl Hibbs and Jamie Sandoz completed their foreign alternate service work during the year, and both were recommended by the agencies under which they served. Jamie Sandoz is available for more services in our churches, in which he presents slides and tells of his work in Nepal. Terryl Hibbs had services in some churches before going to California to work in the aircraft industry.

Other young men who have been in foreign alternate service this year are Fred Gregory, Jerry Sandoz and Jon Newkirk in Vietnam; David Strait and Ronald Palmer in Bolivia. All of these young men are giving

excellent and vital service. Financial support for these men comes from relatives, friends, and churches. It is the concern of the board that more of the churches become involved in this support. There are prospects of sending three more into this type of service in the near future.

Because of the emphasis on the first four phases of the program, the board has not felt it feasible at present to develop a Disaster Program as has been proposed.

Forty-three churches reported on their Peace and Service activities, so the statistics are incomplete for the Yearly Meeting as a whole. These reports indicated that there are 322 young men in our churches ages 18-26. Of these, 63 are serving in the armed forces, National Guard or reserves; 16 are registered as noncombatant, and two of these are now serving in the armed forces; 77 have received 1-O classification (subject to alternate service), and 22 of these are now engaged in alternate service work. Of the number reported registered for conscription, about 50 percent are registered as conscientious objectors and willing to accept alternate service.

The peace message was mentioned or stressed in 49 sermons, taught 23 times in Sunday school classes, presented 19 times in discussion groups, portrayed in film strips nine times and given in special presentations 17 times. We believe this emphasis should be given in all of our churches.

In service work our churches reported shipping 1,130 pounds of clothing for foreign relief. The sum of \$211.27 was given for foreign relief, and \$38.43 was given for service in our country (not local community). The Yearly Meeting treasurer reported receipts of \$3,069.35 for alternate service support and \$214.44 for the World Relief Commission.

In home service, Thanksgiving boxes were distributed by 15 meetings and Christmas boxes by 19 meetings. Six meetings gave aid to families suffering disaster.

There has been continued concern regarding child welfare, and the reports indicated 19 foster homes caring for 49 children. There were also six new adoptions of unrelated children during the year.

Approved.

■ 91. The Statistical Report was read and accepted and appears in the Appendix.

■ 92. The following communication was received:

The Ministry and Oversight of Oregon Yearly Meeting in session August 16, 1968, recommends that—

1. Oregon Yearly Meeting reaffirm its separation from and noncooperation with the American Friends Service Committee.

2. That in the press release sent to local papers in communities where we have churches, there be included a statement to the effect that Oregon Yearly Meeting is not associated with the AFSC and that their speakers do not represent us.

3. That communication be sent to our monthly meetings informing them of our action under number one above and exhorting members to abstain from activities of the AFSC.

Approved.

■ 93. The chairman of the Executive Council, Dorwin Smith, presented the following report:

The *Discipline* provides for a report from the Executive Council regarding decisions and activities carried on between sessions of the Yearly

Meeting.

It is my purpose to report such items that will not be or have not been reported to the Yearly Meeting in some other manner.

Two items will be mentioned, the first of which is an invitation from Rev. Paul Kindschi, president of the National Holiness Association, inviting the Yearly Meeting to become a member of NHA. After thorough discussion it was approved that the matter be referred to the Evangelical Friends Alliance with the suggestion that someone be appointed from EFA, instead of each yearly meeting having a representative.

Second, the Executive Council authorized the purchase of a car for the general superintendent. The financing was to be arranged through private donations and pledges. The car was secured for \$2,572.02.

Cash received to date has been \$1,346. Some money was borrowed from the Mission Board with the agreement that regular monthly payments be made. At present sufficient donations have been given to care for this item. However, with only about \$75 due from pledges, it may be necessary to make some payment from the superintendent's expense account. A total of \$850 is yet due the Mission Board. Anyone wishing to make a donation to this project is encouraged to contact the yearly meeting treasurer.

It appears there has been a savings to the Yearly Meeting because of this purchase.

Approved.

■ 94. Following is the report of the Church Music Committee, prepared by Ruth Corbin, chairman:

Our committee has been quite gratified to note through the years distinct increase in music interest, activities and standards among many of the churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting. The following figures give unmistakable evidence of this:

In 1962, 19 churches reported adult choirs, with 254 singers. This year there were 43 choirs, with 621 singers. About one fourth of these were seasonal choirs; the rest are maintained at least nine months of the year.

There has been increased but fluctuating progress in children's choirs.

In 1962, ten churches were using electronic organs. This year there are at least 41 churches that have installed some kind of organ.

Twenty different cantatas of good quality were presented by 25 choirs, besides several special programs.

The churches are urged to observe March as music month, to participate in choir conferences and workshops as they are made available, and to avail themselves of the help which the Church Music Committee is able to provide.

Our major accomplishment this year is the publication of *The Singing Friend No. 1*. David encourages us to "Compose new songs of praise to Him, accompanied skillfully on the harp; sing joyfully." (Psalm 33:3 *Living Psalms*) Not all the songs in the book will survive, but if a few catch on and prove a blessing to people in helping them to express praise to God in a refreshingly new way, it will have been worth the effort.

We encourage the musicians in the churches to be faithful in their musical stewardship, and with God's help to accomplish even more this year for His praise and glory.

Approved.

■ 95. The Proposed Changes in the *Constitution and Discipline* were read and discussed at length. This document was approved with minor changes. (See minutes 19, 50, 60, 64 and 71.)

We have received 21 communications from other yearly meetings, 12 of these from America and nine from foreign countries. Some items of interest follow:

*East Africa Yearly Meeting*—"Gathered in the open air, under the friendly shade of trees, singing hymns, listening to speakers and choirs, from time to time caught by the voice of prayer, we became mindful of the Spirit of Jesus Christ in our midst. One of the most encouraging features of the session was the participation and contribution of our youth."

*Japan Yearly Meeting*—"During the period of worship many messages which derived from a deep, spiritual standpoint, brought up the tasks we now face. It has been our constant desire to match our Faith and Practice. It is gratifying to know that we are now clearer in our attitude to grapple with the concrete problems that confront us."

*Western Yearly Meeting*—"We have been much aware of the violence and lawlessness of our time, but we are reminded that Friends have something to say about the uniqueness of man, which coupled with a commitment to Jesus Christ and His teachings can speak to these conditions."

*Indiana Yearly Meeting*—"We have met with the intense feeling of discouragement and sorrow because of the troubles and sufferings in our world, and with the yearning in our hearts to find the resources of God to

help us not only to overcome the discouragements, but also to face the evils with spiritual power and discernment."

*Kansas Yearly Meeting*—"Our hearts were warmed by the Holy Spirit as we accepted the challenge to 'Entire Evangelism' through more visitation and soul winning. An expressed hope is that each meeting will try and work towards a ten percent increase in membership during the coming year.

"Approval was given to convene Yearly Meeting sessions the second week of August, as of 1968, in Wichita, Kansas, thus enabling teachers and students to attend."

*Ohio Yearly Meeting*—"We have been richly blessed indeed in the speakers God has given us. Dr. Charles DeVol, beloved veteran missionary just returned from Taiwan, truly led us into heavenly places in Christ in the morning expository hour. Dean Gregory, former superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting and now editor of the new *Evangelical Friend*, has blessed our hearts and extended our horizons in the evening evangelistic hour."

*Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting*—"The spiritual leading of the meeting seems to be of one accord, blended into the one sweet note of salvation for all. Our hearts have been blessed as we have listened to the stirring messages which have been presented with a definite challenge to increase our labors to the point of self-denial. Our church extension work is progressing well."

*California Yearly Meeting*—"Glen Rinard of Sunnyside was appointed clerk of the Yearly Meeting and Keith Sarver as general superintendent. Three young men were recorded as ministers of the Gospel and nine others are reported under the care of the Committee on Ministry in view of their recording."

Approved.

■ 99. The epistle to be sent out to other yearly meetings was read as follows:

Greetings from Oregon Yearly Meeting:

"Grace to you, and peace, from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ."

"The writing of God's finger is cast in retrospect as another church year moves into eternity. Seventy-five books of Yearly Meeting *Minutes* now line our library shelves. A review of these records shows an earnest attempt by Friends in these years to be faithful to a heavenly vision." With these words, Jack L. Willcuts, our general superintendent, opened his keynote address. He continued, "Describing this vision as long ago as 1876, Quaker pioneer, William Hobson, wrote, 'I hope now our dear Friends will form a settlement here [in Oregon] and make it a garden of the Lord.' *A Garden of the Lord* is the title of Ralph Beebe's 300-page history of Oregon Yearly Meeting just released by Barclay Press."

A pageant portraying the growth of Oregon Yearly Meeting through its seventy-five years of work was presented on Friday evening. It depicted our outreach on both the home and foreign fronts, the birth of Friends Men and Women's Missionary Union organizations, the Quaker Hour broadcasts, Greenleaf Academy and George Fox College, youth camps, and other pertinent projects.

Arthur M. Climenhaga, bishop of the Brethren in Christ Church and formerly executive director of the National Association of Evangelicals, was our guest speaker. His powerful messages on St. John and his writings were



wonderfully blessed of the Lord as we sat together in heavenly places.

Around 2,000 young people and adults attended our 1968 summer youth camps over the Yearly Meeting. Many made life commitments and many others were saved, sanctified, or reclaimed. Vacation Bible Schools were held in many churches and these also were times of blessing to children and workers.

Our Youth Ambassador summer program affords dedicated young people an opportunity for service. They give themselves for the summer months in fields assigned to them.

High school young people held their own Yearly Meeting activities, joining in some of the adult sessions. A sizable group of juniors also enjoyed learning Friends' ways and having their own meetings for worship, recreation, and handwork.

Encouraging reports of growth and blessing were noted from Greenleaf Academy and George Fox College.

Referring to a recent tragedy occurring in our Yearly Meeting, our superintendent in his address gave the example in stressing our evangelistic concern: "All of us who knew them were shocked and saddened a few weeks ago when Melvin and John Hull were lost in what is believed to have been an airplane accident. Seldom has our church community rallied with such cooperative concern and effort as it did to search for these lost young men. Nearly \$2,000 was raised spontaneously to help in the searching operations. Literally hundreds of volunteers went out again and again in planes, cars, motorcycles, on horseback, on foot—looking, calling, searching—yes, praying that these men would be found and returned to their loved ones. Thousands of miles of intensive search effort have been covered.

"This shows what can be done and to what lengths we will go when a specific need tugs at our heart strings. Love moved us; compassion and all the finest human and spiritual qualities were brought to bear—along with tears and heartbreak. Let this incident, tragic and hopeless as it seems, serve to bring us to grips with what is involved in searching for the eternally lost about us. Let love, compassion, cooperation, specific objectives possess us."

This is a time of emergency. This is a dark day in our land. Does the message of salvation burn within our hearts? Many are waiting to hear of hope and release. Are we full of compassion, love, and understanding for those who are burdened with sin and searching for God? Every hour is critical. Certainly this generation cannot wait. Let us arise and grasp the opportunities to tell others of the redeeming love of Christ.

Approved.

The Yearly Meeting Ministry and Oversight body reviewed the statements of faith which had been received and referred to the Committee on Ministry and approved the recommendation made by the committee that Nicholas Maurer, Alice Maurer, Stanley Perisho, Daniel Stahlnecker, Gilbert George, and Marvin Hall be recorded as ministers of the Gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends.

The meeting on Ministry and Oversight also approved the recommendation to recognize Clio and Marva Brown, Ronald Crecelius, David Myton, and Earl Tyksen as ministers of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

The clerk, Paul Mills, was instructed to confer with the general superintendent, Jack L. Willcuts, in planning a recognition service for the new ministers.

The clerks were also instructed to write a minute of service for Carroll and Doris Tamplin who feel led to return to South America to engage in evangelistic work and have asked for such a minute.

All meetings on Ministry and Oversight report good attendance at all meetings for worship and business. They all expressed a deep concern for the conversion of sinners and the sanctification and upbuilding of believers. All reported a real interest in those engaged in Christian service and a sincere effort to be good examples of right living. No one reported any instances of subversive teachings.

## Morning Inspirational Hour

Dr. Arthur Climenhaga, bishop of the Brethren in Christ Church, former president of the National Association of Evangelicals, and missionary, was guest speaker for the Yearly Meeting sessions.

WEDNESDAY: The morning inspirational hours will be taken from the Johannine writings. A certain light shines through all the writings of the Apostle John.

Scripture—John 1:1-14. The sweep of the compass of the first verse introduces "the Word"—God's divine communication to man. He outlined the message as follows:

- I. The Purpose of Communication, v. 4
  1. Life and Light
- II. The Product of the Communication, v. 12
  1. Sons of God
- III. The Portrait of the Communication, v. 14
  1. The Word . . . flesh . . . among us
- IV. The Problem of Communication

We cannot fathom the beginning of God. How can God communicate to man? Only through Jesus Christ, His Word. Our problems of communication will disappear when Christ comes, and dwells within.

THURSDAY: Redd Harper, prominent in Billy Graham films, was present and sang "Christ Living in Me," and told of his personal experience of conversion. A time of testimony followed. Roy, Harold, and Priscilla Clark sang "The Wonder of it All."

Arthur Climenhaga spoke briefly concerning personal burdens. He read 1 Corinthians 1. When burdens come we should not be in resentment, nor rebellion, but sometimes we are in wonderment.

Just because some things don't make sense to us doesn't mean they don't make sense at all. Just because things don't make sense now doesn't mean they won't make sense later. Just because we don't understand with our human understanding doesn't mean we can't understand with our spiritual understanding. The imponderables of life are with us, but our confidence is in God, who makes all things "work together for good."

FRIDAY: Dr. Arthur Climenhaga spoke from John 12, the chapter depicting "The Shadow of the Cross."

- I. The Confrontation of the Cross, vv. 1-11
- II. The Cry of the Cross, v. 23
- III. The Conquest of the Cross, vv. 31-36
- IV. The Crisis of the Cross—unbelief, vv. 37-50
- V. The Commandment of the Cross, chapter 13.
  1. Love
  2. Surrender
  3. Service

In closing, the congregation sang "Amazing Grace."

SATURDAY: In the opening of the inspirational hour, the Junior Yearly Meeting group sang a number of selections, directed by Ruth Corbin.

Dr. Arthur Climenhaga spoke on "The Program of Illumination," from 1 John 1 through 1 John 2:2. The Bible tells us of three beginnings, as found in Genesis 1:1, John 1 and 1 John 1.

Christ came to illumine us, telling us

1. That God is Light,
2. That your joy may be full,
3. That ye might have fellowship,
4. That ye have joy,
5. That ye sin not.

Our lack of illumination may be a result of lack of communication. If there are any problems of communication, they can be bridged through fellowship with Christ.

## Evening Services

TUESDAY: Dr. Climenhaga's subject was "Urgency." 1 Corinthians 1:1-9

I. Paul speaks from an administrative aspect on the following:

1. Urgency of offerings
2. Missionary emphasis
3. I will tarry.
4. There are many adversaries
  - a. Lack of Holy Spirit in the church
  - b. Erroneous spirits
  - c. Materialism
  - d. Cults, in opposition to the Gospel
  - e. Divisions.

II. "I will tarry." No one can effectively face his adversaries until he dies out to self. Then the Spirit fills.

"A great and effectual door is opened."

WEDNESDAY: Dr. Climenhaga spoke on Mark 10:35-45, John 20:19-23.

The world is a mission field, whether across the ocean or right at home. "As my Father hath sent me"; "Not to be ministered unto, but to minister." This involves

- I. Surrender
- II. Service
- III. Sacrifice.

God created man for fellowship. Man had the power of choice, and fell. Redemption was offered. God saw humanity lost and sent His Son, born of woman. Christ surrendered to God; He surrendered to His parents. God's Holy Spirit descending on Him at Jordan consummated His surrender for service. Service always leads to sacrifice.

"As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you."

THURSDAY: "The Harvest" Luke 10:1-20

I. The Dimension of the Harvest

1. Not only a statistical dimension,
2. "One World" dimension,
3. We have fantastic tools to help reap the harvest. Every major language group could have the Gospel in its own language by 1970.

II. The Dilemma of the Harvest

Face to face with the unprecedented dimensions and opportunities is the unprecedented dilemma. There is no one in sight to fill many of the thousands of places being vacated on the mission field. Many pulpits are empty. Many Sunday school teachers are lacking. Our neighbors need Christ.

III. The Demand of the Harvest

1. Pray ye therefore . . . to send laborers.
2. Our prayers may boomerang right back to ourselves.
3. Are we ready and willing?

FRIDAY: 75th Anniversary service.

At the Friday evening service, the completion of 75 years of Oregon Yearly Meeting was celebrated and graphically portrayed in a skit, the script of which was taken from a book written last year by Marie Haines.

Individuals portraying our history from the beginning of our Yearly Meeting, our work on the mission field, and our present outreach at home and abroad, graphically depicted the progress made during this three-quarters of a century. Accompanying this was a visual presentation of slides, illustrating many angles of our present-day work.

Immediately following the service, all in attendance were invited to the social hall downstairs for a reception and autograph party in honor of Ralph and Wanda Beebe on the occasion of the release of Ralph's book, *A Garden of the Lord*, a history of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

SATURDAY: Dr. Arthur Climenhaga spoke on "The Power of the Lord." Acts 1:1-8; 2:1-4; 3:1-10; 4:23-34

- I. Power is dependent on prayer.
- II. Power produces witnessing.
- III. Power produces generosity "Such as I have give I thee."
- IV. Power removes cowardice.
- V. Power insures progress.

## Sunday Services

Dr. Arthur Climenhaga speaking at the morning service.

*1 Thessalonians 5:12-23*

The Apostle Paul specifically admonishes us in three things—to know (v. 12), to esteem (v. 13), and to be at peace (v. 14).

Communication is all important. First, communication with God. Moses, though a university graduate going about the mundane things of life, was strangely moved when God communicated to him from the burning bush. It is fire that attracts. In verse 19 Paul admonishes us to communicate our faith to others.

Dr. Climenhaga warned the congregation: 1. Don't let the witness flame be quenched. 2. Don't let the prayer flame be extinguished. 3. Don't let the love flame go out. Quench not the Spirit!

The afternoon missionary rally, 2:30 p.m.

Dr. Arthur Climenhaga

*Scripture reading, Psalm 2*

Dr. Climenhaga admonished the large Sunday afternoon crowd that there are three necessary areas of missionary consideration: first, one must see a picture of the world; second, we must recognize the statement concerning the word; third, we must have a vision for the enlarging work.

In the closing of the service, outgoing Mission Board President Charles Ball presented new missionaries Edwin and Marie Cammack, with their children Daniel and Betty, who are under appointment to Peru. They will be leaving immediately for language school in Costa Rica. Retiring board member, Forrest Cammack, father of Edwin, prayed the dedicatory prayer.

Sunday evening, 7:00 p.m. Board of Evangelism in charge.

A recognition and dedication service for newly recorded ministers Gilbert George, Marvin Hall, Alice Maurer, Nicholas Maurer, Stanley Perisho, and Daniel Stahlnecker, was conducted.

The Friends Extension program was presented by Clynton Crisman. A solo, "It's Real," by Homer L. Cox, was sung by Donald Lamm. The prayer was given by Charlotte Macy, newly appointed president of the Board of Evangelism.

Sermon: David Le Shana, 2 Chronicles 25:5-9

*"The Lord is able to give thee much more than this."*

Amaziah loved God, but was planning his strategy in his own strength, and secured the best of men and equipment. But the man of God came telling him that God could give him the victory without all this. "The Lord is able to give thee much more than this."

As we come to this concluding session, the question that comes to us is, With what mind do we as a Yearly Meeting look to the future? Will there be material loss or gain? Will there be spiritual loss or gain? God says to the church, "I want you to step out." Young people are wrestling with being obedient to God, wondering about the future. The Holy Spirit does not reveal a need without an answer. Like Amaziah, many Christians today are serving God, but not with a perfect heart.

Here is the key to larger vision: The Lord is able to give you much more than this. Step out on faith, and dare to take God at His Word as an individual, as a church, and as a Yearly Meeting.
