## Word From Africa

Kisumu, Kenya Colony, East Africa,  
November 7, 1927.

Dear Friends of Oregon:

Many times we have intended writing to you but we find it difficult to do anything only that that must be done. We often think of you and appreciate your co-operation with us in the work of bringing the Gospel to these people.

Two important events have passed into history during the last few months. The first was our Missionary Prayer Conference, held at Kaimosi, in July. Not quite so many attended this year because of sickness, furloughs, etc., but we had a very good Conference and our hearts were greatly blessed and enriched. A Mr. Pit-Pitts, who is Chaplain to the Bishop of Mombasa, was with us and brought splendid heart-searching messages each day. He is truly a man of God and believes that Jesus is "the same yesterday, today and forever."

The last of September and first Sunday of October, the Native Prayer Conference was held at Kaimosi. The native church, where the Conference is held, feeds and cares for the delegates from the other Stations. Each Station was allowed twenty-two delegates besides the native pastor, so this gave the Kaimosi church many guests. Others, not delegates, were fed because a native does not feel ashamed to invite himself to eat food prepared for others. Of course any who wished were free to attend the Conference, and the attendance was splendid.

But the food was only a small part of the Conference. Each year, for some time, the Conferences have grown in interest and blessing, but this year, we feel, was better than all. The Holy Ghost came upon us in mighty power in one of the beginning services and throughout the meetings hearts were melted and bowed low before God. Sins hidden for years were confessed. Crimes had been covered up and yet the offenders have gone on professing to be Christians. Difficulties between Christians were straightened up. One young man—a teacher and preacher—stood and told of an unpleasant affair that had taken place between him and another Christian, and how hard feelings and lack of love had come in. He walked manfully from the back of the large crowd saying he wanted to shake hands with the other man and ask forgiveness. Someone on the platform said, "Tell us his name. We will call him and see if he is here." He replied, "If he is present, he knows who I mean." Down the aisle he came and a man stood and met him and they clasped hands and asked forgiveness. We were reminded of things we have seen in Friends' meetings in years gone by. Some of our leaders were blessed and made confessions. People were weeping and praying all over the house; some stood to speak and were so broken in spirit they could not voice their heart's desire. God was good to us and the Holy Ghost is working in our midst. The work does

not stop from Conference to Conference, but goes on. Everywhere hearts are burdened for sin and many Christians are seeking for or receiving the baptism with the Holy Ghost. We praise God for what our eyes are seeing and our ears are hearing. We have prayed for years for this thing we are seeing and and rejoice that we are permitted to see the beginning of such a movement among these people, both young and old; to see the natives weep over their sins; not able to sleep because of the burden.

At our last Monthly Meeting, during the time of worship, many made confessions and wanted to be prayed for.

The Holy Ghost is speaking to hearts these days and many are listening to His voice.

We have opened a Preparative Meeting, for the native church felt that that would give more time for worship in Monthly Meeting and also help them finish with the business in better time.

At this last Monthly Meeting a suggestion came from the Preparative Meeting that all Christian men and their wives should eat together at a table instead of the husband eating alone at a

table and the wife and children on the  
floor out of sight. This caused some  
discussion as to where they could all get  
tables. One boy offered to plane from  
logs, here in the Malava forest, boards  
for tables at the small price of about  
fifty American cents. Some suggested  
that the men do without hats, shoes,  
socks etc. and use the money to buy  
tables from the Manual School at  
Kaimosi. Being in America, you may  
not fully appreciate this move among  
these native Christians—for it is a  
movement among only the Christians—  
but it is a thing for which to praise  
God. For men and women to eat  
together, walk together on the road—  
we mean husbands with their wives—  
for the men to offer women chairs, all  
of this means a great change in the  
spiritual and mental attitude of both  
men and women. We rejoice when we  
read of the way women in Turkey and  
other lands are breaking the yoke of  
custom and superstition. So we rejoice  
for this wonderful move that is begin-  
ning here among these African Christians.

The Monthly Meeting asked if we  
would send Esther and Rachel home for  
school and we stay on in Africa, if they  
would give us Sh. 1000 with which to  
send our daughters home. They dread  
so to have us leave. They do not  
realize the problem before us of choos-  
ing a college for our daughters, the long  
voyage home through foreign lands and  
other problems that might arise on the  
way. But we all wish—Esther and  
Rachel with us—that it was not  
necessary for us to leave just now. A  
great responsibility rests on Friends of  
America to see that workers are sent  
out soon, who can help guide and teach  
these hungry, seeking people. With such  
a movement as we are seeing, blessed  
are those who can help them into the  
light, but woe to those who put  
stumbling blocks in their way.

We need your prayers that we may be  
wise in all we do and that the native  
church may increase in power and the  
knowledge of Jesus Christ; that people  
may walk in the light that comes to  
them and have strength to make things  
right as the Holy Ghost reveals them to  
them, and that many more may receive  
the baptism with the Holy Ghost.
