Minutes Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 1970

1. The seventy-eighth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting convened

August 11, 1970, in Newberg, Oregon, at 10:15 a.m.

It seems there has never been a time in history when so many internal problems confront our society. But as a church, this is no time to decry our nation's ills. Far better to be doing something to help shape the affairs of men by a positive declaration of the Gospel and relevant service to humanity. May God's direction be ours during these 1970 sessions of Yearly Meeting.

Harold Clark led the congregation in singing "Rejoice Ye Pure in Heart." Clifton Ross led in prayer asking God's leading during these days. With the presence of the Young People's Yearly Meeting, we appreciated

a full house for the opening session.

■ 2. Jack L. Willcuts, superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting, presented his annual keynote address as follows:

"The recent death of Dean Gregory is fresh in my mind as I stand here today. For 15 years Dean gave this report and had an influence on the others given since. His homegoing last May leaves us all a little lonely, especially this morning, and I wish we might pause to honor the memory of his ministry and to thank the Lord, whom we love more because of His work in the life of this man of God.

"Most of the time Geraldine and I were on the Bolivian mission field, we lived in the La Paz mission home. Written on a granite plaque near the front door of this home was a message describing it as the "Chester A. Hadley Memorial," constantly reminding all of this man whose vision and leadership were so helpful in the founding of our mission field 40 years ago. This building, no longer a missionary residence, now serves as the center for the Friends Bible school and headquarter offices for the Bolivian Friends Church.

"A recommendation is being made today that our own Yearly Meeting headquarters building, which houses our offices and the Barclay Press, be dedicated as the Dean Gregory Memorial with an appropriate plaque placed to honor his vision and leadership. While no formal or other written request is made concerning this, it is simply left with this session for consideration.

"Not all religious leaders are remembered. If I understand the report, one of the most popular committee chairmen of his day is a forgotten man. His name is Shammua, who is described in the book of Numbers, chapter 13, verse four, as the son of Zaccur and of the tribe of Reuben. Shammua headed the task force group for Moses that toured the land of Canaan making a feasibility study on the wisdom of crossing the border. Caleb and Joshua brought a minority report, but Shammua—safe, sound, sensible Shammua—held the status quo. Caleb and Joshua pled, shouted, and literally "rent their clothes," but Shammua declared the sense of the meeting was to wait awhile in the wilderness. Committee chairmen, you see, do have an influence.

"The land of Canaan has been compared to many places, causes, and religious experiences, and the concerns suggested in today's message may also be giant infested and formidable. But gazing in the mirror at ourselves through the hard reflections of statistics and reports will probably reveal both shaken Shammuas and courageous Calebs. Every Yearly Meeting time brings us to a new edge of decision-making. Some of these decisions are personal as Bible preaching in these days comes through to us. Other thresholds of spiritual advance will be exposed in board deliberation and shared in the meetings. The Shammuas and the Calebs are also in the 1970 Yearly Meeting, and these contemporary types both know what *Time* magazine calls the 'wilderness situation of our first summer in the seventies.'

"Yet, even symbolisms, like everything else just now, cannot be neatly defined. The wilderness outside the church, like creeping ivy, has edged inside the limits of Oregon Yearly Meeting until the distinctions of Quakerism and evangelical faith are hardly discernible. The characteristics of the Calebs and the Shammuas are also blended and homogenized in our regimented society, and it is difficult to distinguish true Christian or Quaker identities. Some come to Yearly Meeting insisting they have already moved into Canaan, but they are empty-handed with fruits to prove it. Others come with glowing reports of milk and honey and fruitladen statistics but still call Oregon Yearly Meeting a wilderness. The giants are forcing more pastoral dropouts than Caleb's call for volunteers can replace. A wilderness mood prevails side by side with Calebs in the same congregation. Boldly insisting Canaan is filled with population explosion opportunities, the Shammuas hear the voices of murmuring that spiritual conquest is not possible here and now, that we must wait awhile longer. The discouraged of today are the encouraged of yesterday, and the encouraged of today are the discouraged of last year. One could wish for a consistent character-a Shammua or a Caleb-but all the social, cultural, and religious gaps of the time make even the wilderness and mountains an out-of-focus picture.

"Both Shammua and Caleb came back to 'tell it like it is,' and ironically, they were both accurate. Not dishonesty but discernment was the problem, and this, I believe, is ours. We are not here to test each others' integrity but to measure priorities and values under the power and call of God. My prayer, more than any other, I suppose, is for wisdom. And wisdom, we are told, is the proper use of knowledge. Without facts and information, man's wisdom is merely a sophisticated form of preju-

dice, and without the moving of the Holy Spirit, discernment is only guesswork. Prayer, good reading, clean hearts, clear heads, disciplined living, dedication, and proper decision-making procedures—these are the time-proven tools God uses for getting us out and keeping us out of the wilderness. History in this instance shows, of course, that most people prefer the familiarity of wilderness living to the uncertainties of conquest. It should also be noted that the manna, which once was sweet, became bitter. The blessing of other days in Oregon Yearly Meeting will no longer have its flavor if we at any point fail to 'wholly follow the Lord.'

"Forty years in Aymara highlands is being highlighted this year. Traveling our mission fields last December with Gerald Dillon and Harley Adams was challenging. It is reassuring to see God at work in such evident ways. The growth of a Friends church in the Andes and the dedication of our hard-pressed missionaries should inspire and encourage us all. Sometime during the coming year, a special 40th anniversary observance should be held in every church. We hope a large crowd will participate in the service planned for Sunday evening of Yearly Meeting. If it is true that results more than needs move people today, Oregon Yearly Meeting has a demonstrated success in foreign mission endeavors. Lives are being changed, souls won; every offering, prayer, and sacrifice on our part brings remarkable results in the Indian community. This abundant, ready harvest field is to us a sacred trust we dare not neglect. This does not mean a problem-free mission program. The education of missionary children, altitude living, and dangerously overworked staff are constant concerns to our Board of Missions. The prayer and support of Oregon Yearly Meeting is desperately needed, and more effective ways must be found to keep before all our members this urgent situation. Discernment, again, is needed in determining priorities in our missionary giving lest needed funds are lost to less productive, even parasite missions who depend on the church but are not part of it or building it.

"Not all of us are to go to foreign fields, but many are faithfully obeying the Lord in dedicated service here displaying a variety of gifts. Visiting the parsonages and working with our pastors is always an inspiration. The mutual respect and Christian love evident in our pastoral corps in Oregon Yearly Meeting is a continual source of blessing. From the standpoint of doctrine or biblical teaching, it would be possible for any pulpit exchange to occur without damage. The selflessness and lack of status seeking that has characterized Friends pastors in the Northwest distinguishes our leadership today. There have been 11 pastoral changes this year with all arranged except for the New Meadows, Idaho, meeting,

"This dedication is matched by the efficient team of administrators and faculty at George Fox College, the staff at Barclay Press, and the Yearly Meeting office personnel. Marilyn Richey began this year as our office secretary and is a capable, conscientious Christian whose work makes it possible for the responsibilities of the headquarters office to be carried out. Beatrice Goldsmith's work as business secretary is such that words are inadequate to express our profound appreciation for her service. Working with our clerk, Dorwin Smith, and my pastor, Fred Littlefield, and all the board and committee leaders who form our Yearly Meeting administrative team is a pleasure, for they are close personal friends as well as fellow workers.

"A number of encouraging developments occurred this year, some of them new, that merit mention: the first Christian Writers' Conference was held with 40 registered; a new Church Library Manual has been

prepared for local meetings by our Board of Moral Action; the comprehensive total stewardship program introduced by the Board of Stewardship called 'Let Love Guide You' is excellent. The fall revival at George Fox College brought unusual blessing with a significant impact upon the entire Yearly Meeting. The new buildings completed at Olympic View (Tacoma), Boise, and Reedwood (formerly First Friends, Portland), and the new parsonage at Greenleaf have greatly improved the appearance and potential of these churches.

"In this report different corporate objectives will be identified in the broad spectrum of issues that reflect the breadth of the church's concerns. None of these concerns is unimportant. All require attention. Nevertheless the limits of the Yearly Meeting resources—human, material, and financial—require that we concentrate at any given time upon those that are most urgent and seem to be the leading of the Holy Spirit. To break these down into units for better understanding and hopefully to provide guidelines for establishing Yearly Meeting program priorities, we shall focus on five specific issues. The first of these, as you might guess, pertains to church growth progress.

"The genuine enthusiasm with which Oregon Yearly Meeting has responded to the concern for church growth is encouraging. Certain initial misconceptions as to what church growth actually implies are becoming apparent, which is to be expected, of course. Spiritual conquest, even when couched in the safe terminology of evangélism or revival, when it actually begins, brings simultaneous painful and joyful reactions. Reading the pastoral reports for this year and checking my own informal 'Gallup Poll' among other Yearly Meeting leaders indicate a serious attempt is being made for conquest in this Canaan land of church growth. Our understanding of the Scriptures and the nature of the Gospel, including the doctrines held by Friends, is surely convincing proof that church growth should be expected. Whether or not it is popular or easy has very little bearing on it. When confronted with unexpected implications of discipleship, some followers have always turned away or returned to the wilderness. But Canaan is still there to be entered with all the denominational and eternal consequences involved. As the church growth study, Friends in the Soaring '70s: A Church Growth Era, introduced a year ago points out, there is a difference between holding to correct beliefs and using effective methods to build the church. This thought is spoken by a sincere but baffled elder who asks, 'How can we as Friends be so good and yet remain so small?' We have been willing, you see, to define a good church without consideration of effectiveness in evangelism and Christian education, and we have erred by just that much. Every church has within it good Christians, but any church in our part of the world that is not growing is not a good church. Let me confess, however, that the past four years have convinced me that the problem of growth or nongrowth is much more complex and deeper than I thought. Every effort made has been worthwhile and nothing so far recommended or observed has proven inaccurate, but the problems involved in bringing about a growth curve on a Yearly Meeting level are simply staggering. Growth, however, is happening; when we follow the Lord's leading we always move in the right direction. It doesn't give the picture just to cite net membership gain figures; for example, the net gain figure from 1966 through 1969 was 371. Adding to this the membership increase this year of 44 gives a four-year gain of 415, which brings the total membership to 6,387. Another statistic may be more instructive in terms of consistency

and total ministry. Year before last, 1967-68, of the churches showing increase in the three categories of membership, Sunday school, and morning worship, there were only 12. Last year there was 15, and this year there are 22 with measurable growth in all three categories. Thirty-three churches this year showed a membership increase—the largest number of individual meetings to do so for at least a decade. Twenty-seven churches showed gains this year in Sunday school and morning worship, although not always the same churches. This suggests that growth comes not across the Yearly Meeting but only in local situations when growth factors seem to approximate the conditions that permit God to work. This also means that in a few years from now our Yearly Meeting may have a far larger total membership with fewer churches. It is interesting that only six churches have had a consistent three-year growth pattern in all three categories of membership, Sunday school, and morning worship. It would appear, then, that much of the growth we do find is actually more coincidental, even accidental, rather than the results of revival, careful preparation, or a long-range program of goals set and reached. Let me quickly say there are exceptions, but these serve to support the view that while denominational growth is almost impossible, yet local church growth is always possible. To break it down even further, growth comes when a pastor, one concerned group, or even one Christian is led and used of the Holy Spirit to reach out. This places the burden of responsibility squarely on your heart and mine, as individual Christians-not only upon a program or board.

"The books we read, the conferences we attend, the goals we set, the visions that grip us as individuals-these are what determine the direction we move. The bringing of men like McGavran, Jones, and Rees to our area and reading the material produced by them and others, or getting involved in programs like Campus Crusade and various pastors' seminars is a beginning step to greater vision. Until this is done, or some experience kindles a flame of vision, desire, and expectancy, little will be attempted. But long-range, local goals must then be implemented to make use of these materials. Until there arises in our constituency and schools leaders who are trained in personal evangelism and who are evangelizing with success under the Holy Spirit's anointing, we will not have pastors or people who are producers of church growth. It is just that simple. It is so natural for Friends to emphasize other things, from social concerns to doctrinal purity, that too often not only our expectancy but also our desire for reaching out are nonexistent. When the church does not find ways to be good stewards of the Gospel, its young activists will either leave or become accustomed to mediocre results. Kenneth Strachan was right in saying, 'The growth of any movement is in direct proportion to the success of that movement in mobilizing its total membership in the constant propagation of its beliefs.'

"There rings in my ears the testimony of the valiant young Christian in Bolivia who last December said he was a Quaker only because the fire of the Holy Spirit was upon the Friends and they were reaching out. Let our church reach out with the good news we have about forgiveness, joy, and love. Let us proclaim the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ by whose death we are forgiven, by whose resurrection we are given eternal life, and by whose promised Holy Spirit we are empowered to live above sin. This is a call for conquest; what we have prayed for and worked toward is happening. Quakers are being quickened by the Holy Spirit to renew the church. Traditions are questioned, and I am glad; doctrine is

being restated, heritage examined, organization scrutinized, priorities weighed. These are steps to be taken to find the movement of God in our day. It is my plan to give more time to church growth efforts among local churches this year. Lon Fendall will be involved on a part-time basis in the Yearly Meeting office to assist and to liberate us for more concentration on the efforts already begun. Cooperatively with the college, the Yearly Meeting Board of Christian Education is bringing Hugh Salisbury as a consultant and conference leader who will be visiting every area of our Northwest. This is another dimension to the spiritual conquest to be entered, and further announcement of these programs will be made.

"The new Yearly Meeting Constitution and Discipline has brought several changes in our operation the past year. It is doubtful if disciplinary changes will bring spiritual revival. The Discipline Revision Committee is to be commended for the many, many hours given to writing and refining this document, which is really only an attempt to interpret what has seemed to be the leading of the Lord in procedural developments. The Unified Budget, the different manner for naming Yearly Meeting representatives and the members of the Executive Council, the area rallies, the more thorough steps in the recording of ministers-all of these changes have taken place as the result of conscientious study as recommendations from various boards and churches have been carefully considered. Let there now be more specialists of the Earl Barker caliber to make this workable in the organization of our church. If these various structural changes are viewed as streamlining efforts to release the local meeting and the Yearly Meeting to do the Lord's work better, rather than viewing them as a threat to some personal position or different methods too difficult to master, I believe it will be helpful. We have not seen the last of changes, or of problems. But we do need a uniform plan of procedure to guide us, and I believe the various improvements will make for a more functional organization.

"Moving to another issue to be resolved, I am impressed with a statement given by Ohio Superintendent Russell Myers at the First General Conference of the Evangelical Friends Alliance in Wichita last month: 'One of the real tests of the church is not in the magnitude of the problems she faces but in her ability and agility to adjust herself to the strategy changes that are constantly necessary because of changing times.' Coupled with this is another word from Paul Rees when he says, 'If you are centrally sound in message and motive, you can afford to be unorthodox in your methodology. You can afford to break with old patterns. You can afford to innovate.'

"Reappraisal of our patterns and programs is not always pleasant. We acutely need to put an end to the unbiblical artificiality of certain distinctions of which we have made much in the past. The push of conscience and conditions today urges us to a common submission to God. Although large numbers of younger Christians find conventional church meetings irrelevant while other younger families almost angrily reply this is not true for them, newer forms such as small groups, Bible study, and prayer cells bring vitality. New forms of music crowd into our attention. Criticism of the church may be a sign of love, not defection. In asking questions, our youth may be agents of revival. Something is happening among our youth now, and we should be alert lest we miss the voice of God in it all. Twin Rocks Conference just held, the EFA Youth Conference, and other such gatherings are displaying reassuring signs.

Criticism of the program of the church need not drive us into an entrenched conservatism regarding modes of worship, evangelism, ministry, mission, or personal discipline. Instead of reacting into a more severe legalism or isolation, let us look for the beauty of the Holy Spirit. Paul voiced this principle when he wrote Romans: 'No longer do we serve in the old way of a written law, but in the new way of the Spirit.' (7:6 Good News)

"Maybe we have overplayed distinctives. Saving souls is spiritual—we know this—but we have therefore implied that ministering to bodies is less spiritual. So we have thought and so we have acted. Concern for individuals is evangelical; concern over the social situations of which individuals are inescapably a part is probably 'liberal' or only something the liberals talk about, so we leave it alone, or try to.

"Meanwhile, the biblical concept of man has suffered serious distortion and damage. 'Man as man is neither body nor soul,' Paul Rees again has written, 'he is both in a living synthesis.' Therefore, if we are authentically Christian, nothing that is authentically human is beyond the pale of our concern. Writing in Christianity Today, Dr. Carl F. H. Henry quotes E. Stanley Jones' book, Abundant Living, 'The early Christains did not say in dismay, "Look what the world has come to," but in delight, "Look what has come to the world." They saw not merely the ruin, but the resources for the reconstruction of that ruin. They saw not merely that sin did abound, but that grace did much more abound . . . That same sense of confidence must possess you if you are to pass from an anemic, noncreative, nay-saying type of person to one who is master of himself and his circumstances and his destiny. But this confidence and faith must not be based on a self-hypnosis, a mental and spiritual fool's paradise . . . The whole secret of abundant living can be summed up in this sentence: "Not your responsibility, but your response to God's ability."1

"The dangerous trend among some evangelical Friends has been to habitually catalog the faults of and dislike for the so-called hippy type, the new music lovers, the nonconformists who have either grown up among us or make their appearance in meetings or who at least surround us in society. This is a situation that needs careful attention. We are talking about people, those who are different from our past and our index of belonging-members of the church. But they are people. And contempt for a human being is an affront to God almost as grave as idolatry, for while idolatry is disrespect for God Himself, as Emily Moore points out in her Adult Friend quarterly commentary, contempt for any man is disrespect for the being God made in His own image. One must reverence the humanity of every man, however degraded or different, out of appreciation for his divine origin. To esteem anyone worthless who wears the form of a man is to be guilty of an affront to the Son of Man. This is a doctrine we as Friends have lifted high, and we dare not despise it even in our fervor for a holy exclusivism. 'Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer.' (1 John 3:15) We speak of generation and cultural gaps; let us be sure these gaps are not of our own making in lack of love and understanding or in prejudice with more political overtones than Christian compassion.

"It was disappointing to me to encounter the shocked reaction of some when our Young Friends Conference at Menucha invited individuals of different life-styles and background in order to learn how to minister and evangelize in our world today in a better way. The conference therefore was boycotted by some of our Yearly Meeting, and various pastors counseled younger Friends to avoid this type of confrontation. Motives were commendable, perhaps, but the results have a direct bearing on our usefulness in a burdened, sinful world. Let us pray for and try to create a climate within the church that welcomes persons of diverse cultures, needs, and environment as sources of positive and creative vitality and encourage individual and corporate commitment to Jesus Christ as Lord. Our missionary community is greater than the narrow spectrum of a foreign land. To put it bluntly, living with Aymaras is also a cultural shock, but missionaries have been given a love and special grace to meet this problem although there is the constant temptation to minister even there from the lofty position of assumed white superiority or while wearing the cloak of American citizenship.

"To put this point in another way, there is a place in the life of the church for open debate of controversial issues. We must recognize the difference between destructive polarization and creative tensions. It is the right and responsibility of every Christian, especially every Quaker, not only to hold views consistent with his understanding of the will of God, but also to share and discuss them with fellow Christians who differ. Constructive results can come from discussion of controversial issues. The new generation is schooled in this way of thinking, and it involves the attitude toward preaching, lectures, and methods of Sunday school teaching. It is also a scriptural method as demonstrated in the Gospels and the book of Acts. For one like myself who from childhood has battled the problem of insecurity and shyness, it is not an easy procedure, but I am praying for God's grace to meet this present world in its need and opportunity.

"Although committed to the ideal of a racially integrated church in a racially integrated society, Oregon Yearly Meeting continues to be predominately white with little demonstrated concern to abolish racism or to invite people without regard to ethnic origin and bring them into membership and to positions of leadership. 'Oh, we have no race problem here,' one elder remarked as Aaron Hamlin, the field director of the National Negro Evangelistic Association, and I toured the Yearly Meeting last May to try to instruct and encourage Friends to become missionaries at home. It was true, they had no observable race problem because there were none of another race in the church. It was learned during the few days we were in this particular community, however, that several hundred Mexican-Americans and Negroes felt very keenly the religious barriers surrounding all the churches, including the Friends. To quote a Negro leader of the same community, he said, 'Every racial discrimination and problem existing in Chicago exists here, just on a smaller scale because we are yet fewer in number.' Another teen-age Negro in a government labor camp said he would be afraid to walk down the street of the closest small town in broad daylight because of the attitude and comments he had experienced. Maybe he had acted in a way to earn this-I have no way of knowing-but how fine it would be if Friends could again be the ones to build the bridges or provide a new underground railway of at least crossing the barriers of social and spiritual slavery to freedom in the church.

"How this can be done is not an easy course, but it must surely begin by acknowledging before God, on our knees, our own deeply rooted racism and determine to be cleansed of it. Then we can develop a denominational strategy including every congregation to be open for outreach, not just to Mexican-Americans and the Negroes of our neighborhood but to all who, like ourselves, are looking for inner peace, self-fulfillment, and hope found only in Christ. As Christians we must not be a part of any form of social alienation that makes barriers to the presentation of the Gospel and of Christian fellowship.

"We welcome Ralph and Lucille Greenidge to our Yearly Meeting as fellow Christians and pastors at Holly Park in Seattle. They are invited not just because they are Negroes but because being Negroes we believe they may be able to do a better job than anyone else to minister to the community where God has led them to serve. Piedmont Friends are also to be commended for their deep concern to remain in their community as a church to minister in any way they can to the people surrounding the Piedmont church. We will be hearing from both Ralph Greenidge and Fred Gregory this week describing the concern and plans they have for an enlarged outreach for Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting to share Christ. We have crossed Canaan's border at another point; there are many giants to be conquered, but we must be in conquest in this area of need. Lest we merely shift our responsibility to those on the scene, as we so easily do in our foreign mission program, let us realize that the climate of concern is needed now in every meeting, indeed, in every heart.

"There is another issue. This also has wilderness and Canaan connotations. A communication will be coming to these sessions of Yearly Meeting from the Coordinating Council of the Evangelical Friends Alliance urging a study to be made to allow a closer organizational and working relationship between the four EFA yearly meetings and possible realignments of evangelical Friends across America. Our Executive Council will also be recommending five delegates be sent to a conference called in October in St. Louis to be chaired by David Le Shana. The purpose of this meeting is to consider the possibility of forming a Friends Church in North America.

"Before waying the red flags, some of which are a little weatherworn with the years, let us consider some of the underlying reasons for a restudy of this matter. We are crucially in need of some first steps in the direction of manifest Christian unity. We should be bold enough and discerning enough to ignore the extremism of the one-big-church enthusiasts and yet set about to form actual connections with other Friends wherever there are already present those marked affinities of doctrine, history, and practice that would make such a union a 'natural.' The Weslevan Methodist and Pilgrim Holiness denominations have recently done this, to their credit. When we begin to rub elbows with other Friends across the iron curtain of our Yearly Meeting borders, we suddenly find ourselves on the spot whether we are aware of it or not. Let us be terribly certain that the tendency to escalate fancied theological differences to the level of barriers has indeed justification in fact. With the rarest of exceptions, further proliferation and division are not only a mistake, they are a scandal. Cooperation, correlation, and, beyond either of these, actual union would immensely improve the image of our Lord's body in the eyes of a critical, cynical world, especially when Friends-all Friends-are still but a small minority.

"There are some red flags that I am waving. We must be careful our strategy is not merely the establishment of a Friends ecclesiastical hierarchy. Our people in our local churches rightly fear the establishment of a super organization that moves the action away from the local believers

and places it in a central office, far removed from the grass roots. They fear being taxed to support a top-heavy organization that in a few years loses touch with the heartbeat of the local congregation. They justly fear an organization that becomes so engrossed in a complicated, wordy program that it forgets that its mission is primarily concerned with people who have names and who live in our community. In the establishment of a national Evangelical Friends Church administrative structure, we must never forget that its purpose is to enable the Friends Church to become more effective in the local meeting where the church grows-if it does grow. We have no personal interest in an Evangelical Friends Church administrative profile that loses interest in and for Christ's work on the local level. We are not interested in organizational bigness that, to maintain its life, must bleed the local treasury. Much of the comment now heard as we travel the Yearly Meeting indicates there is too much of that already! But some compelling reasons we must not shrug aside include these purposes (as stated in essence by Russell Myers):

(1) To deepen and to extend into a united fellowship all of our evangelical Friends churches across America.

(2) To encourage a steadfast, biblical witness of truth that we hold and that holds us, by all the churches in the fellowship.

(3) To facilitate cooperation and counsel among our churches with regard to evangelism, worship, Christian education, scriptural stewardship of life, missions beginning at Jerusalem and to the uttermost part of the earth, Christian action in a suffering society, youth activities, the pastoral ministry, and other related concerns. Can the maintenance of four separate yearly meeting headquarters and almost totally unrelated denominational programs continue to be duplicated with the strain it places upon finances and leadership if by structural realignment and cooperation we could do the job more effectively and less expensively? With the constant need for specialists in the missionary executive role, Christian education directors, and other such departmental personnel-whom none of our yearly meetings alone can find or afford-could we not by closer cooperation strengthen the quality and force of our ministries? If Oregon Yearly Meeting is doing a better job, then let us share this good thing with others. If we are doing a poorer job, then we need all the help we can get to be a better witness for our Lord.

(4) Another purpose is to preserve and promote the scriptural principles of the autonomy of the local church and of the freedom of the local believer in Christ

(5) Another is to develop a national image of evangelical Friends that we will be justly proud to own as our church and Christ's, too.

"God can lead us. The deep, old convictions that have controlled our posture as a Yearly Meeting are respected and precious. But is it possible that the issues and reasons that led Edward Mott and others to give themselves so strenuously to a separate yearly meeting need to at least be reviewed? I do not believe we have done wrongly in the past, as I read the Minutes and the history of Oregon Yearly Meeting. But I am also trying to read the present and the future, and I am pleading for the same trust in leadership and the same thoroughness of examination that characterized the actions taken in those earlier days. After nearly 35 years, maybe we have made our point, if we remember what the point is. At any rate, let us pray earnestly for Dorwin Smith, Ralph Beebe, Norman Winters, Donald Lamm, Milo Ross, David Le Shana, Arthur Roberts, and me as we journey to St. Louis next October 5 to 7.

"Just to be as clear as possible, let it be said there is no thought of joining the Friends United Meeting or Conservative Friends as organizations. But there is much thought given to strengthening the evangelical Friends cause across America in whatever way we can, and at this Yearly Meeting time we will consider ways of strengthening the Evangelical Friends Alliance.

* * * *

"Upon concluding this wordy report, it must be confessed that it is still somewhat of a puzzle to me just what should be said here in this hour. Traveling in the Yearly Meeting one hears various comments about what the superintendent is supposed to say or do. One is, 'Please don't just give us a promotion pitch on the church. Just give us a gospel message.' Another report reached me (after I had spoken), 'Well, all he did was preach; we wanted to hear about the work of the church.' I notice that in California Yearly Meeting this year the keynote message was given by a college student. That may be a good idea.

"Next year I am hoping our sessions can again be held in Idaho. Further, I am hoping we might reconsider the possibility of renaming ourselves the Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends rather than Oregon

Yearly Meeting.

"It is a joy to serve the Lord, to know His daily care and strength. It is only in Him that we have any opportunity to minister. The Scriptures are so clear and yet so neglected:

"'Ye are my friends, if ye do whatsoever I command you.' (John

15:14)

"'If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed; and ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.' (John 8:31, 32)

"'Owe no man anything, but to love one another: for he that loveth another hath fulfilled the law. For this, Thou shalt not commit adultery, Thou shalt not kill, Thou shalt not bear false witness, Thou shalt not covet; and if there be any other commandment, it is briefly comprehended in this saying, namely, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself.' (Romans 13:8, 9)

"'But of the times and the seasons, brethren, ye have no need that I write unto you. For yourselves know perfectly that the day of the Lord so cometh as a thief in the night. For when they shall say, Peace and safety; then sudden destruction cometh upon them, as travail upon a woman with child; and they shall not escape. But ye, brethren, are not in darkness, that that day should overtake you as a thief. Ye are all the children of light, and the children of the day: we are not of the night, nor of darkness. Therefore let us not sleep, as do others; but let us watch and be sober.' (1 Thessalonians 5:1-6)

"'Wherefore we receiving a kingdom which cannot be moved, let us have grace, whereby we may serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear: for our God is a consuming fire.' (Hebrews 12:28, 29)

"Now we turn once more to the book of Numbers, chapter 13, beginning with verse 30: 'And Caleb stilled the people . . . and said, Let us go up at once, and possess it; for we are well able to overcome it. But the men that went with him said, We be not able to go up against the people; for they are stronger than we . . . we saw the giants . . . and we were in our own sight as grasshoppers.'

"And all the congregation lifted up their voice, and cried; and the

people wept that night.""

(Copies of the message were made available to individuals.)

A brief time of meditation upon the challenge of our superintendent followed his presentation. Appreciation was expressed, and various admonitions given that we act on our superintendent's challenge. The attitude was summed up in the prayer, "Breathe on us, breath of God, fill us with strength anew; that we may love what thou hast loved, and do what thou wouldst do."

■ 3. Superintendent Jack L. Willcuts and several others voiced the desire that we name our Yearly Meeting headquarters building in honor of our former superintendent, Dean Gregory, who served in this capacity for 15 years and so recently passed away.

This was referred to the Executive Council.

- 4. A suggestion of changing the name of Oregon Yearly Meeting to more accurately correspond to our geographical area was presented.

 This was referred to the representatives.
- 5. Kathryn Eichenberger, chairman of the caretakers, presented the names of those serving, with additions to be made as needed. This was approved, and the full list and report will appear later. (See minute 116.)
- 6. Because of removal to another yearly meeting, the office of assistant recording clerk is vacant.

This vacancy was referred to the representatives for nomination.

- 7. The resignation of Beatrice Goldsmith as business secretary and treasurer was read. This was accepted regretfully and referred to the Executive Council for a job evaluation and recommendation. A communication was ordered sent to Beatrice Goldsmith expressing our deep appreciation for her years of dedicated service.
- 8. The Memorial Committee was named as follows: R. Ethol George, Robert Morrill, Wanda Beebe. Approved.
- 9. The following were named to the Committee for Returning Minutes: Cornelia Holmes, Adelaide Barker, Raymond Haworth. Approved.

They also were glad for Harley Adams' presence with them. They felt these visitors were of much help in solving problems and making plans for the future.
- 13. A letter of greeting was read from Arthur Roberts, who with his wife Fern is on a trip in Europe combining Christian concern and sight-seeing. In closing, he admonished us: "May God renew our faith together! May He free us from narrowness of vision, from discouragement, from hardness of heart, from materialism, and lead us forward together!"

- 18. The representatives nominated Eilene Mack for assistant recording clerk.

■ 19. Beatrice Goldsmith, retiring Yearly Meeting treasurer, presented the annual report, which appears in the appendix.

A standing ovation was given Beatrice Goldsmith in appreciation for her years of work for the Yearly Meeting.

■ 20. The following communication was received from the Coordinating Council of the Evangelical Friends Alliance:

The Coordinating Council of the Evangelical Friends Alliance in session, July 18, 1970, in Wichita, Kansas, approved the following action, which is presented for approval of each of the four Yearly Meetings composing the EFA.

"It was approved that a Commission for Friends Action or Social Concerns be established. It was approved that this recommendation be

sent to each Yearly Meeting for approval."

The guidelines are prepared to allow cooperative development of educational materials dealing with drugs, sex education from a Christian viewpoint, gambling, and use of leisure time. Alternative service programs, relief ministries, audiovisual library materials covering these and other areas of responsibility and concern are planned by this commission. Two members from each of the four EFA Yearly Meetings will be named to form this commission.

With the approval of each Yearly Meeting, the new Social Action Commission will be established.

After a number of favorable comments, this was forwarded to the Boards of Moral Action and Peace and Service meeting in joint session to send recommendation back to these sessions.

■ 21. A communication was received from the Evangelical Friends Alliance Coordinating Council as follows:

The following recommendations were approved at the July 18, 1970, session of the Evangelical Friends Alliance Coordinating Council, at the first EFA General Conference held in Wichita, Kansas, July 16 to 19,

1970. While work will continue during the year on these proposals, approval from each of the four Yearly Meetings of the Evangelical Friends Alliance will be necessary before they can be implemented. It is hoped these concerns may be considered by Oregon Yearly Meeting in session in August 1970 with recommendations and reactions forwarded to the Executive Committee of the EFA as soon as possible.

Recommendation 1: To simply organize a superstructure above our present four yearly meetings will be unwarranted expense and deeply frustrating if it merely shepherds our present smallness and weakness. We must continue to move ahead in further steps in strengthening our mutual concerns, streamline our structure for simplicity and effectiveness, and capture a new enthusiasm for growth as priority emphasis.

The Executive Committee recommends that the Coordinating Council of the EFA authorize the Executive Committee to nominate a person to serve as executive secretary. This nomination will be sent by mail to the Coordinating Council members who were officially appointed by their Yearly Meetings. Upon approval of three-fourths of the Coordinating Council members, the individual shall be elected. The term of office shall be one, two, or three years as recommended by the Executive Committee. He shall have office headquarters in the midwest region to facilitate travel and accessibility. We propose a target date as early as possible in 1971 to begin this assignment.

Responsibilities of the executive secretary may include the following:

- Serve as a coordinator of EFA programs. He will be an ex officio member of each commission and be directly accountable to the Executive Committee.
- 2. He shall carry out specific assignments given him by the Coordinating Council through the Executive Committee. These will include handling of arrangements for EFA sessions, general or special conferences, press releases and publicity for EFA activities, follow-up and general supervision of commission programs, keeping of official records.
- 3. He shall work with the Executive Committee to provide leadership in cooperative ventures (such as Mexico Mission, church extension projects, the George Fox Press, etc.) assumed jointly by the four yearly meetings. This will involve interyearly meeting visitation to explain and develop the ministries of EFA.

4. He will be our denominational representative in interdenomina-

tional relationships.

5. He shall be responsible for implementing a restructuring of the local and yearly meeting organizations in cooperation with committees named for this purpose.

We further recommend that he be given adequate secretarial assistance, office and travel expense to permit the proper functioning of his office.

Financing possibilities for this office:

- (a) A percentage administrative allowance from each commission budget;
- (b) Limiting full EFA coordinating council sessions from one year to every second or third year, thus reducing heavy travel and conference costs. Individual commissions should meet only when necessary and should make full use of the executive secretary to implement programs. This saving would be transferred to an administrative salary thereby streamlining our organizational structure and permit more "grass roots" contact:
- (c) Arrange allocations from each Yearly Meeting on the prorata basis of existing budget divisions;
- (d) Appeal to concerned Friends moved to thus assist in the development of the Evangelical Friends Alliance.

The founding of the Evangelical Friends Alliance grew out of concerns believed to be born of the Holy Spirit. One was a general desire for a wider fellowship and cooperation with those of like faith. Another was a concern for greater growth through a more effective, united witness. Many expressed the hope that the alliance of four independent yearly meetings would be a stepping-stone to a more unified church structure among Friends of like faith.

Recommendation II: In accordance with the action already taken in this conference in proposing the naming of an executive secretary of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, with specific responsibility to "implement a restructure of the local and yearly meeting organizations, in cooperation with a committee named for this purpose," and in light of the evident growing concern of this General Conference for more definite progress in the development of a national Friends Church of North America, it is proposed that this conference, through the EFA Coordinating Council, authorize:

- 1. A feasibility study to be made by a task force committee to prepare a restructuring plan of the church now represented by our four yearly meetings with the specific goal of forming a Friends Church of North America.
- 2. This committee to report back to the Coordinating Council at its next meeting within one year or less, and that this task force give consideration to (a) more efficient organization to avoid administrative and program duplication and expense; (b) to consider geographical divisions and types of leadership that might strengthen departmental ministries of the existing commissions and the total thrust of evangelism; (c) review membership policies of the EFA that might allow the inclusion of other

Friends including possible dialogue with other yearly meetings who espouse the doctrines as stated in the EFA constitution.

3. It is further proposed that the task force committee include the presiding or assistant presiding clerks of the four yearly meetings in attendance at the General Conference with their respective general superintendents, and that this committee be empowered to engage the assistance of consultants and secretaries as needed for a prompt and thorough completion of their assignment.

We as a Yearly Meeting are interested in this step of progress. After discussion, the second recommendation was approved, and the financial involvements incurred will be referred to the Yearly Meeting Board of Finance for recommendation.

In light of the fact that the task force study is being made, it was directed that section I be placed in the hands of our Executive Council with the responsibility to consider and present back to the Yearly Meeting in 1971.

Approved.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

■ 23. The Board of Publication president, Earl P. Barker, introduced board member Harlow Ankeny, who made the presentation of Barclay Press.

He expressed appreciation for the various individuals who are of vital importance to the work of the Board of Publication. He especially paid tribute to the late Dean Gregory, whose contribution to the work of this board was of inestimable value.

He listed the large number of publications produced for our church by the Barclay Press, reaching into every avenue of our church and service.

Harlow Ankeny also expressed the need for added space in order that their work may efficiently operate and expand.

The Barclay Press treasurer's report was presented and appears in the appendix.

The new Constitution and Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting is now ready for distribution to the churches.

The report of the Board of Publication was approved.

- 24. In the opening of the afternoon session, Roy Clark led in worship playing "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing" on the piano. Robert Morse led in prayer.
- 25. The following resignation was received:

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

■ 26. Charlotte Macy, president of the Board of Evangelism, presented the following report:

These are great days for the Church of the Lord Jesus Christ! It is the privilege of the Board of Evangelism to sponsor, support, and implement various programs in which God is blessing.

The board has continued to support our general superintendent in the Church Growth program, which has opened new windows of light and doors of outreach in many meetings, as they reported this year.

To encourage our youth in areas of Christian ministry we have sponsored the Youth Ambassador program, which fielded eight young people across our Yearly Meeting this summer. The second High Calling Conference was held this spring for college and seminary students concerned with Christian vocations.

The new Share Program contributed over \$2,500 to the beautiful and much-needed new church edifice at Boise, Idaho.

Dedication services were held this spring for the new Olympic View Church in Northeast Tacoma. This was the culmination of many months of prayer, labor, and giving across our Yearly Meeting as well as locally. We will have a more complete report of God's faithfulness at Olympic View on Sunday afternoon when the pastor, Dan Nolta, shares with us.

We are also glad to report that a nucleus of Friends has been able to continuously meet in Klamath Falls, with Evert Tuning as minister. This work has been officially designated an an extension point of our Yearly Meeting. Kenneth Magee will give us a personal report from there today.

Oregon Yearly Meeting also has a share in the ministry of Friends in mid-USA at Omaha, Nebraska, in the work started and supported by Evangelical Friends Alliance. Harry Dillon has been the founding pastor and has served there three years. Mahlon Macy became pastor there in July of this year. Official dedication of the new church building will be held next November.

Closer to home, North Valley Friends Church has been organized this past year with Friends from Chehalem Center, Springbrook, and Newberg areas. A local committee from the Board of Evangelism has worked closely with this new group, and there is great anticipation among them in the prospect of building a new church plant on the acquired property on the corner of the Hillsboro highway and Bell road. Roger Knox is giving pastoral leadership and reports to us personally today.

For the coming year the board is committed to the support of Eugene McDonald in the Kent, Washington, area, in the establishment of a new Friends work through the extensive use of home Bible studies and personal evangelism.

We rejoice that many of our meetings have caught new vision in methods of serving and sharing Christ.

We rejoice in the new church facility at Reedwood in Portland. This is doubtless one of the finest church buildings in the city of Portland and among Friends in the world. Let us thank God for making this possible and pray for great glory to His name through its use in ministering the Gospel.

Great doors are opened to us as Friends in the Northwest. May we trust God for the "giants" and claim the land He has called us to possess for Him!

Kenneth Magee, physician from Klamath Falls, spoke of the progress of the new extension church there, in which he is deeply involved. He spoke of conversions and growth in the work, where Evert Tuning is pastor.

Roger Smith reported on the progress of the Omaha Friends Church, our joint venture with the Evangelical Friends Alliance, where Mahlon Macy is pastor.

The newly organized North Valley church, near Newberg, was presented by the pastor, Roger Knox. The work started with Chehalem Center church and members from Springbrook and Newberg, and the impact of prayer groups formed in the community. He is thrilled with the dedication of the group there as they move forward.

The Board of Evangelism report was approved.

- 27. Wilmer N. Brown, northwest director of the National Association of Evangelicals, presented their work. He appreciates the interest and contribution of the Friends churches in this organization.
- 28. The State of the Church reports were read from Salem, Newberg, Southwest Washington, Puget Sound, and Greenleaf Areas.

Their reports were approved, and the summary appears below:

It seems a little presumptuous to try to evaluate and report on the composite condition of a group of churches operating under different leadership, since the type of leadership can drastically affect the emphasis in a church.

However, reports from the churches show that there is conscious effort to follow guidelines suggested by the Friends Constitution and Discipline.

Most churches speak well of the spiritual life of their groups and especially appreciate the faithfulness of their pastors in proclaiming the Gospel and in nurturing the church.

Some churches are enjoying definite growth and advancement.

A widespread concern in many churches is the drop in attendance in evening services, including the midweek service. This seems due, in a large part, in the increased mobility of our congregations and in the working conditions their members face.

There seems to be a new feeling of responsibility among our many churches to make their outreach and ministry relevant to the needs and conditions of the communities in which they serve; along with the preaching of the Gospel of Christ, they are ministering to the material and social needs of their areas.

The forward look in our churches could be summed up in the closing paragraph of one of the area reports, which stated: "There is a healthy optimism expressed toward the future of the churches in their communities. We are looking confidently ahead with the realization that only as our individual members are challenged to promote the growth of the church will our full potential be realized."

■ 29. The Ministerial Association presented the following nomination to the governing committee of the Ministers Retirement Fund: J. Russel Stands.

Approved.

■ 30. Beatrice Benham, president of the Women's Missionary Union, presented the following report:

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance." (Galatians 5:22-23)

Oregon Yearly Meeting Women's Missionary Union is made up of 74 missionary unions. The members of these local unions total 922 women according to the treasurer's report of dues paid in. This counts one new union.

These women through the past year have learned in their study of the devotions, prepared by Geraldine Morse and based on the above two verses, that love is described by the eight words that follow it. They have shown their love in many ways. Some of this has been reported to us, and I will try to pass it on to you.

We believe that prayer is vital to the work of the Lord, and so we have prayer chairmen and prayer units to help encourage this. Reports are very inadequate in this area because we do not look into the "closets," but there are 36 of the unions reporting who have an organized effort in

this area.

The total receipts this year were \$12,145.32. Of this amount, \$2,640 went to pay the basic salary of the Thomases in Bolivia. Maplewood and Olympic View churches received \$100 a month each. The banquet offering in 1969 went for medicine for the nationals of Bolivia and Peru. This was \$922.92. Almost \$800 was raised as a love offering to help the Maurers with their outfittling and many other items too numerous to mention here. This just shows how the love of the women shows up materially.

At the annual Retreat in Pendleton last fall, over 100 women were blessed and helped spiritually as Charlotte Macy led in an inspirational Bible study. From a financial viewpoint, the Retreat is not completely self-supporting, but we feel it is still a needed service, and we are glad to be able to help the women in this way. The inspiration received at Retreat always pays off in added prayer concern and interest in the need of the Lord's work. For instance, last fall we became so concerned for a new couple to be sent to Peru that we started the "Passion for Peru" fund.

Spring rallies were held in each of nine areas. Alice Maurer was frequently the main speaker. The offerings from these rallies went to the "Passion for Peru" fund. The total amount, according to Agnes Tish, who has been treasurer for ten years, is the largest ever received. One union had such a deep concern that they made a special money-raising effort and sent in \$400. The banquet offering this year also will go to that fund, and we anticipate the fund will be over \$2,000. This is all over and above what is in the budget.

Our study programs are not the least of our efforts. We have been very grateful to Cornelia Holmes, who for the past three years has been preparing our program material. Now for the second year this is a study in depth of the missionary work of the four Yearly Meetings of the EFA. Other WMUs of the four Yearly Meetings are using this material and are so pleased with it that she has been elected program chairman on the EFA level.

We have worked with the EFA in a small financial project and anticipate more support in this area in the future. The president and another delegate were sent to the EFA General Conference in July 1970 at Wichita.

Paul tells us to "look on whatsoever is of good report," and that is what we are doing, we hope. He would not have said this, I am sure, if he had not realized that there is a bad side to the "report." We don't

want to leave the impression there is no room for improvement, for there is much room for that, but we will continue as a WMU to bear "the fruit of the Spirit."

Approved, and appreciation was expressed for the work of our women's organization.

■ 31. Robert Morrill presented the Yearly Meeting Memorial Hour. He read the Scripture, Psalm 116:15 and John 14:1-4.

Harlow and Gertrude Ankeny sang the duet, "Some Day the Silver Cord Will Break."

Special mention was made of the passing of our former superintendent, Dean Gregory, and his life and profound influence on our many pastors and laymen.

The names of the deceased members were read and appear in the

appendix.

Memorials were read for M. Ethel Cowgill, for many years a minister in the Friends Church, and for Myrtle Brown Mardock. These will be placed on file.

Many expressions were given regarding the contributions these 56

individuals have made to the church and to individual lives.

Robert Morrill led in prayer in closing the Memorial Hour and dismissing the afternoon session.

BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

■ 42. The report of the Board of Peace and Service by Walter P. Lee, president, was presented as follows:

Amid the confused clamor regarding the present military involvements of the United States, Friends have a remarkable opportunity to present a clear testimony and exhibit a vital witness to the spirit and teaching of Christ against Christian involvement in violence and war.

The Christian principles upon which our Quaker forefathers established their testimony and witness have not been altered, and Friends today are called to restudy these and renew their convictions and witness for Christ.

The actions of the extremists confront Friends with dangers that can only be avoided by sincere reliance upon the Holy Spirit. On the one hand, there is the danger of being swept along in radical demonstrations for peace that may deny by actions the cause espoused. On the other hand is the danger of reacting against such demonstrations to the point that we accept the violence of war as the alternative. Nor do we dare abandon our witness because many other Christian bodies have no clear testimony against participation in armed conflict.

It is the responsibility of Friends to present the inseparable truth of "peace and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord."

The Board of Peace and Service urges pastors and churches to present this important facet of the Gospel of Christ with renewed emphasis at this most opportune time in history.

This board has endeavored to encourage such a Christian witness in a number of ways during the year. The alternate service program overseas has continued in a cooperative relationship with the World Relief Commission of the National Association of Evangelicals. Dorlan and Eunice Bales are performing outstanding service in the Hoa Khanh Children's Hospital in Vietnam. Gary Black suffered a serious eye injury in Vietnam and was sent in October 1969 to San Francisco for treatment by specialists. The sight in one eye was in grave danger, but God answered prayer, and the recovery is a testimony to God's power. Gary returned to Vietnam in April 1970 and plans to continue work there with WRC after his two-year period of service concludes in September. Robert and Melinda Newell did not feel they could conscientiously work under the conditions to which they were assigned in Vietnam, so they returned to the States, and Robert is in Portland on the administrative staff of FISH, an emergency aid program.

James and Garyanna Linhart went to Chile, South America, soon after the first of January 1970 to represent World Relief Commission in its relief program in that country. They feel a real sense of mission for Christ and are performing excellently.

The challenge of contributing financially to foreign relief programs was greatly aided by the appearance in several area meetings of Dr. Everett S. Graffam, executive vice-president of World Relief Commission. The Board of Peace and Service arranged these rallies, which were held the latter half of September 1969. Dr. Graffam presented an audiovisual program concerning the WRC relief programs in different areas of the world and spoke appreciatively of the work of our alternate service young people who work with WRC.

Your board again promoted the observance of November 23, 1969, as World Relief Sunday in conjunction with the other Yearly Meetings of the Evangelical Friends Alliance. The World Relief Commission reported receiving from Oregon Yearly Meeting for relief an amount of \$4,934.23 and for personnel support \$1,710 for a total of \$6,644.23. This amount includes offerings and paid pledges connected with the Graffam rallies. Of the 43 churches making an annual report, 35 participated in the relief program.

Plans are being formulated for World Relief Sunday just preceding Thanksgiving, and the four Yearly Meetings in the Evangelical Friends Alliance will be participating. Another very important interest of the Board of Peace and Service is the charitable assistance fund of Friendsview Manor, which constitutes a large item in the board's budget. This fund is used to assist, when needed, retired ministers and missionaries to live at the Manor and is greatly appreciated by the recipients.

We regret that only 43 meetings prepared an annual report, for undoubtedly some significant reports are missing.

Reports received indicated 256 young men between the ages of 18 and 26. Of these, 38 are serving in the armed forces, National Guard, or Reserves, and two are serving as noncombatants. Of the 182 registrants reported, 83 have received 1-O classification (subject to alternate service), ten have received 1-AO (noncombatant) classification, and seven are presently performing alternate service. On the basis of reports, it appears that 50 percent of the registrants were opposed to armed conflict, and 45 percent chose alternate service work to membership in the armed forces.

Churches indicated in general that the emphasis upon the peace testimony was not vigorous, but at least 16 churches indicated financial support for the overseas alternate service program in addition to the United Budget.

In addition to participating in the World Relief program reported above, 15 churches contributed clothing and four food for foreign relief. In community service, Thanksgiving baskets were given by 15 churches, Christmas baskets by 15; disaster aid was rendered by 13, and rescue missions received food from seven and clothing from ten. Other projects were reported, including a heroin treatment program, a rehabilitation fund for use by released prisoners, promotion of Blood Bank drawings, support of children through World Vision, and care of bereaved families.

Child welfare continues to concern Friends. Eighteen churches reported 35 foster homes caring for 83 children. There were also eight new adoptions of unrelated children during the year.

While the newly formed Friends Action Board is independent of the Board of Peace and Service for legal reasons, its work is closely related. Twelve churches reported financial contributions to the Friends Action Board.

We believe that Friends are endeavoring to relate their spiritual concern to the physical and mental needs of the world.

Approved.

(See report of evening services, page 56.)

■ 43. The Executive Council sent the following communication from Superintendent Jack L. Willcuts:

"After due deliberation, prayer, and searching for the leading of the Lord, I am submitting my resignation as general superintendent of the Yearly Meeting. According to the call given me and the instructions of the Constitution and Discipline, this resignation will be effective one year hence, which in this case will be June 30, 1971. If, for some reason, it becomes helpful to continue on a few weeks or months in the progress of the Yearly Meeting, I will be open to the recommendation of the Executive Council as plans are made for the transfer of the duties of this office.

"It has been a great privilege for me to serve the Lord through our church in this office, and I especially appreciate the fine cooperation of all the members of the Executive Council and of our presiding clerk, Dorwin Smith. Be assured of my cooperation in any way possible in the selection of another superintendent. And, I shall give my best to the work during the remaining months of my term of service.

"The report shared with the Yearly Meeting is the most up-to-date

resumé possible regarding the development of the church.

"In Christian love and gratitude."

In view of the fact that this conclusion has been reached by our superintendent after much prayer and deliberation, the meeting regretfully accepts this decision, to become effective at the close of this church year.

■ 44. The Executive Council presented the following recommendation:

After careful study of the need for a church growth secretary as approved by the Yearly Meeting and upon being unsuccessful in finding one whom the committee believed to be the one to fill this position or who felt clear to accept it, no one was named.

The recommendation of the Church Growth Committee and of our general superintendent is to hire for the next 11 months (September 15, 1970, to August 15, 1971) Lonny Fendall on a part-time assignment.

His duties would be to assist Jack Willcuts in the Yearly Meeting office as editor of the Northwest Supplement, director of the Youth Ambassador program, Share secretary, and to give particular attention to the Friends Youth organization as an advisor and "Sponsor Coordinator." By his handling some of the Yearly Meeting work including other detail responsibilities, Jack Willcuts would be able to concentrate more time on church growth implementation, particularly in the local meeting level. Working together, Jack and Lonny will schedule Christian Education Conferences with Hugh Salisbury, arranging these to coincide, when possible, also with missionary deputation and 40th anniversary programs and other departmental emphases.

Lonny and Raelene Fendall will live in Pennington Hall next year as house parents, and Lonny will also be writing his doctoral dissertation. Therefore, he will be able to give approximately half time to the Yearly

Meeting work.

A salary of \$4,400 for the 11 months plus \$1,000 for travel and office expense is recommended. With a reduced salary anticipated for the business secretary, also part-time rather than full-time next year, and with Lonny assuming some of these duties, this will not add substantially to the total salary budget beyond that anticipated in the church growth program this year.

Approved.

■ 45. The Executive Council made the following nominations to the Friends Action Board: for three years-Ralph Beebe, Maurice Magee; for two years-David Mirgon.

Approved.

■ 46. The Executive Council unanimously recommended that the Yearly Meeting headquarters building be named the Dean Gregory Memorial Building.

The following committee has been named by the Executive Council to prepare plans for implementation and dedication: Jack L. Willcuts and Frank Cole.

Approved.

■ 47. The report of the Evangelical Friends Alliance was presented by Jack L. Willcuts, president of the Coordinating Council. A brief resumé was given of the recent conference in Wichita. A total of over 700 attended, with 96 present from Oregon Yearly Meeting, and also 35 young people from our group. He then opened the meeting for questions from the audience. These discussions brought out the great need for cooperation among evangelical Friends nationally and the vast opportunities for greater efficiency and outreach for a more united Friends Church.

The report was approved.

■ 48. The Friends Action Board was presented by Sheldon Newkirk. Jack Willcuts then spoke, reading the introductory paragraph in the new Constitution and Discipline regarding the Friends Action Board. Notable among churches attempting to especially minister to a changing community where interracial groups are prevalent are Piedmont church in Portland and Holly Park in Seattle. Donald Edmundson of Piedmont spoke of that church's efforts to meet the need of the Albina district. Sheldon Newkirk is pulpit minister there. Fred Gregory, their Christian social minister, spoke further of their work. Ralph Greenidge, formerly of the Bronx, New York, spoke. He emphasized the need of prayer on the part of the whole Yearly Meeting as they minister in the Holly Park area of Seattle.

Ralph Greenidge will speak further in the 8:00 a.m. service Friday morning.

Thursday, 2:30 p.m.

- 49. The afternoon session opened as Gene Mulkey led in prayer.
- 50. The Board of Peace and Service recommended that Jerald Magee be named to the board of Friendsview Manor for a three-year term. Approved.
- 51. The Friends Action Board nominated for three-year terms on the Friends Action Board the following: Glenn Koch, Charles Williams, Kent Thornburg, Myron Goldsmith.

Approved.

■ 52. The Board of Finance nominated Clyde Miller to the Evangelical Friends Pension-Insurance Plan committee for a term of two years.

They nominated Roger Minthorne to the Ministers' Retirement Fund for a one-year term.

Approved.

■ 53. The following was received from the Committee on Discipline Revision:

In the course of the proofreading of the new Constitution and Discipline, it was discovered that the third paragraph under 3. EXTENSION CHURCHES, page 35, is unclear with regard to the reception of members by an extension church. The Committee on Discipline Revision offers the following rewording, beginning with the second sentence of that para-

"The board shall petition a monthly meeting, preferably the initiating body, to share in the sponsorship of the congregation, with or without financial obligation. Friends and others may become members of the extension church through regular procedure (see pp. 64-66). They shall enjoy dual membership, being listed separately as dual nonresident members by the parent meeting (but not included in the statistical report) and as resident by the extension church. The clerk of the extension church shall notify the clerk of the parent meeting concerning reception of members and transfer of members to other meetings."

The committee recommends that this reading be given preliminary approval, to be held over one year for final action.

Approved and referred back to the Discipline Revision Committee.

- 54. David Le Shana spoke regarding the plan and purpose of the upcoming conference of evangelical Friends of America to be held in St. Louis this fall.
- 55. The following visitors were introduced: Jeff Mathis of LaVerne College, Church of the Brethren, and Richard Tusant of Bible Literature International.
- 56. The following was presented by the Discipline Revision Committee: At the request of the Yearly Meeting Board of Publication, the Committee on Discipline Revision has prepared and offers for consideration an amended wording of paragraph h. PUBLICATION, page 49 of the new Constitution and Discipline, to read as follows:

h. PUBLICATION

(1) The Yearly Meeting Board. The board shall consist of one member appointed annually by each area of the Yearly Meeting, plus six members-at-large appointed by the Yearly Meeting on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, the terms of two members expiring each year; selection of these shall not be restricted to area representation; the manager of Barclay Press shall serve as an additional member ex officio. The board shall organize by the appointment of a president, vicepresident, and secretary and shall select three additional members with the press manager included to serve with these as an executive committee, authorized to act on behalf of the board on matters which require attention between regular board meetings.

The board shall cooperate with other Yearly Meetings of the Evangelical Friends Alliance in the publication of the Evangelical Friend and shall appoint two of its members as its representatives on the Publications

Commission of the Alliance. It is further authorized to build and administer a publication fund and to publish books, pamphlets, and other literature as needs may arise. The Barclay Press, with its editorial and financial policies, shall be under its supervision and management.

(2) Representation in the subordinate meetings. The area representatives, each appointed as area publications secretary and a member of the board, shall be individuals with literary concern, ready to promote the interests of the board and the sale of its publications. Each meeting shall appoint a reporter to release items of local interest. Area superintendents shall be responsible for reporting items of area interest.

The committee recommends that this reading be given preliminary

approval, to be held over one year for final action.

Approved and referred back to the Discipline Revision Committee.

■ 57. Through inadvertent error no provision was incorporated in the new Constitution and Discipline by which a meeting might be dissolved. This was formerly a function of the "quarterly meeting at large," which no longer exists.

The Discipline Revision Committee submits the following changes to remedy this error: after paragraph 5. UNION OF MEETINGS, page 36 in the new Constitution and Discipline, insert a new paragraph-6. DIS-CONTINUANCE OF MEETINGS. Renumber existing paragraphs 6.7. 8, 9 to 7, 8, 9, 10.

6. DISCONTINUANCE OF MEETINGS. The Yearly Meeting board of evangelism and church extension shall have authority, when cases of irregularity of procedure or deterioration of status appear in the affairs of a monthly meeting or extension church, to make careful investigation through its officers or an appointed committee. It shall advise in cases of difficulty, endeavoring to help the meeting to maintain its active relationship with the Yearly Meeting and with its community. When such a meeting is judged by the board to be no longer effective and its continuance unwarranted, it shall have authority to dissolve or discontinue the monthly meeting or extension church or, when feasible, to effect its union with another meeting; or, in the case of a monthly meeting, to reduce its status to that of an extension church.

The committee recommends that, in case this paragraph is given preliminary approval as an amendment to the Constitution and Discipline, the Board of Evangelism and Church Extension be authorized to act in accordance with its terms when advisable without delay, with regular procedure followed for final action after one year.

Approved, and referred back to the Discipline Revision Committee to be held over for one year.

■ 58. The work of Western Evangelical Seminary was presented by Leo Thornton, vice-president. He stated that 84 young people are preparing for various phases of Christian ministry, including several Friends students. In contrast to training a professional ministry, they are emphasizing a practicing ministry.

BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

■ 59. The Board of Moral Action presented the following report:

The Board of Moral Action, through its departments of Legislation, Literature, and Public Morals, has tried to provide leadership and promote the work of its concerns in the local churches through the local committees and chairmen. This has been done through direct mailings, by suggesting helpful educational materials, and by encouraging efforts by the churches in the area of Christian citizenship. The board was represented at the GFC Conference on Social Mores and on the *ad hoc* committee for an EFA Social Action Commission.

The LITERATURE department, under the leadership of Lois Tish, reports as follows:

"Give attendance to reading." (1 Timothy 4:13) This command by Paul is the theme of a poster submitted this year. What one reads and

what one refuses to read has great influence on character.

"Attendance to reading" has been the concern of 44 of our churches who reported their activities in encouraging reading and providing good literature for their people. There are 43 church libraries, though some were not actively promoted this year. In addition to their church libraries, 30 churches reported other library resources such as the pastor's library and the public library. Reedwood has a wonderful library area in their new church. Greenleaf has moved their church library into the academy library.

Twenty-nine keep more or less complete records, and 24 have a regularly appointed librarian. There were 431 books added to libraries.

This is about half as many as were added last year.

The Moral Action Board has sensed a need for strengthening the literature program and aiding the churches in activating their libraries. Several churches have asked for a simplified method for organizing the church library. With this in mind, we have prepared a "Church Library Handbook." This has been printed, and a copy is available for each church.

In 24 churches Bible reading has been promoted through Bible study programs and the use of the *Fruit of the Vine*. The reading of good literature and the use of the church library were encouraged in 28 meetings. Obscene literature and its easy availability continue to be a concern, and 18 churches reported their activities in combating it.

In order to provide additional Quaker materials for the Western Evangelical Seminary library, we have purchased a number of books and six doctrinal dissertations dealing with Quakers, their history, doctrine, and

achievements, on microfilm. Others are being ordered.

The PUBLIC MORALS department, with Virginia Helm as chairman, reports as follows:

There were 146 presentations of moral action concern reported by 43 churches. Only one area reported having a presentation of public morals issues.

The poster and essay contest continues to be popular in some areas of the Yearly Meeting. Seventy-five made posters, and 29 individuals wrote essays. Thirty-seven other posters were displayed as well. We feel these are effective ways of publicizing information and promoting individual study of moral action problems.

Much information has been given out through 2,524 tracts distributed, 65 books added to church libraries about public morals issues, bulletin board and book displays, and providing material for youth group discussions, Sunday school classes, and sermons.

Commitment Sunday was observed by 17 meetings with 233 total abstinence pledges given out. Seven meetings combined the observance

for Commitment Sunday and Youth Temperance Education Week the third week of April.

About two dozen churches are legislation-minded, as shown by their presentations, announcements, letters, and petitions on moral issues. Drug abuse has been a special concern in some areas where meetings have ordered films, arranged for a PTA program aided in the planning of a large high school meeting on the subject, and several have been volunteers in drug treatment programs.

Several churches have programs with juveniles who are underprivileged. Time will tell how effective these important programs are. Police-

men have been asked to speak to Sunday schools.

Three sets of records or filmstrips have been purchased to add to the Moral Action Library at the Oregon Yearly Meeting headquarters. These are: Worth Waiting For (Sex Education) by Rose and Abram Dyck, Marijuana and Goofballs and Pep Pills, and Alcohol or Highway Safety and Alcohol, Your Blood and Your Brain.

The film entitled *The Choice Is Yours* was presented. The board report was approved.

■ 60. The afternoon session adjourned to meet Friday at 9:15 a.m.

■ 61. In opening the morning session, Clerk Dorwin Smith read Psalm 6:9: "The Lord hath heard my supplication; the Lord will receive my prayer."

Virginia Helm and Dorwin Smith led in prayer for guidance in our day's activities.

■ 62. The minutes were read and, with corrections, approved.

BOARD OF GENERAL EDUCATION

■ 63. The report of the Board of General Education, Richard H. Beebe, president, presented in the Thursday 7:00 p.m. service was approved and appears below (see also evening services, page 56):

Reference in the Scriptures to the need for someone to "stand in the gap," to be the "salt of the earth," "a light on a hill" give strength to the concept that the right quality of dedicated Christian leadership will accomplish much for God and our fellowman. The following is a summary of what has been done this past year and some of the potential within our churches under the category of General Education.

STATISTICS

Students—Our churches have under their care approximately 1,200 junior and senior high school students. Currently 246 are engaged in pursuit of a baccalaureate degree with 137 of these at George Fox College this past year. Another 32 are receiving special training in vocational schools. Thirty-five indicated they are in preparation for full-time Christian service.

Educators—Perhaps one of the greatest single potentials we have as a Yearly Meeting is the fact that there are nearly 350 teachers and administrators from among us working in our public and private schools. Take a moment to reflect on the day-to-day contacts of these 350 people. Sixteen have joined the National Educators Fellowship, an interdenomi-

national organization of Christian teachers. Eighty-two persons are in various stages of completion of work toward an advanced degree. The General Education Board is attempting to help each educator to recognize his or her potential for Christian leadership within the schools.

Scholarships—Salem and Puget Sound provide area scholarships to George Fox College, while Star, Newberg, Sherwood, Reedwood, Emmett, Vancouver First Friends, and Rose Valley each reported scholarships or grants-in-aid to students from their individual churches.

Education—Holly Park, Seattle Memorial, Olympic View, and Clackamas Park churches each reported Day Care Centers. Metolius has classes for migrant workers during harvest season. Piedmont has started a "Friends for Kids" program.

MINISTERIAL FINANCIAL AID

A joint committee from the Boards of Evangelism and General Education have administered the Ministerial Financial Aid Program. Seven students received tuition support in the total amount of \$3,566.20. This has proven a good investment in leadership development in that several past recipients are now serving as pastors in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Appreciation is expressed for the dedicated leadership of President David Le Shana and the faculty at George Fox College and for the excellent work of the staff at Greenleaf Academy. These schools need our increased financial and prayer support as individuals, local congregations, and as a Yearly Meeting. Through the United Budget, \$3,600 was given to George Fox College for partial support of the position of director of spiritual life held by Ronald Crecelius. Reports indicate this has been a fruitful ministry this past year providing counseling for students, Spirit-filled chapels, and helping develop a deep spiritual tone on the campus. It is our concern that this support be increased substantially.

As we look to the future, let us pray for divine guidance that we not be guilty of dissipating our energies but that we will have the wisdom to channel our efforts in areas that will be spiritually productive.

The following report on George Fox College was submitted by David C. Le Shana:

This past year has been a good year at George Fox College. In almost every area of the college interest there has been growth, improvement, or development. As you read this, I'm sure you will sense the blessing of God upon our campus during the 1969-70 school year. My annual report is an endeavor to show that our college, in the midst of a world of revolution and identity crisis, has indeed moved ahead. Institutional self-studies, curriculum changes, faculty improvement, responsible student involvement, effective communication, administrative strengthening—all of these have contributed to the attainment of our objectives, both on campus and in the larger Christian community of which we are a part.

Academic Affairs

The heart of a college is its faculty and curriculum, and George Fox is no exception. I am particularly delighted with the vitality and growth our faculty has shown this year. Under the direction of Dean Arthur O. Roberts, strides have been taken toward making a good college a great college. I am pleased to report a good year academically with a high sense of purpose among the faculty and a reasonable amount of diligence and motivation on the part of the students. Education is the name of our

game; accordingly, we look for evidence that learning occurs and are satisfied that this occurs in many different ways. Perhaps not until several years later do we receive sufficient feedback from students to know how successful we have been in the educational process involving four years of their lives.

We were pleased by the reception accorded our institutional self-study report by the accrediting team that visited us March 4 and 5. The official results of this visit will be known June 23 when the report is acted upon by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools. [It was reported later by President Le Shana that the college has been granted a 10-year extension of full accreditation.]

We are continually strengthening our academic program. Curriculum revision, the growing concern for a Division of Communications, the work of Christian education, library improvement, student involvement in the decision making process, the continued development of the faculty—these are a few of the indicators of strength that should be noted.

Our student enrollment continues to climb. The enrollment for 1969-70 is as follows:

We appreciate the fact of an upward trend in the face of mounting difficulties encountered by private colleges. Most of them are fighting to maintain the status quo.

Religious Life and Student Affairs

George Fox College is setting its goal to become one of the leading evangelical Christian colleges of our time. This must be a campus where the Holy Spirit has reign and where a distinctive Christian witness can be made to a society. This is our reason for existence—to combine excellence in scholarship with excellence in things spiritual.

We are committed to the concept of a residential campus. Sensitivity to student needs must be maintained, and an adequate student affairs program prayerfully administered. We must be so endowed by the fullness of the Holy Spirit that we cannot only know what we should do, but have the divinely bestowed ability to do it.

Development

During the past year, George Fox has made excellent advances in the broad areas of development, public relations, alumni affairs, and publicity. The college is making an impact upon the Northwest—an impact that is producing results! As Oregon Governor Tom McCall said, the word is getting out that here is a college that is "unashamedly Christian"!

A number of projects are underway: a potential Newberg civic fund drive, an academic-industrial interface, increased foundation support, a major drive to liquidate our cumulative cash deficit problem, the Great Teachers program, the development of a regional office in southern California, increased publicity—these are just a few of our projects.

I believe that George Fox merits the active support of the Lord's people. Let this next year, therefore, be a year in which the faith and commitment of each of us responds as fully as possible to the great promises of the Word of God.

Property and Finance

The advice of our architect to increase the property holdings of the college should be followed as is feasible. A fine arts center, a gymnasium, increased dining hall capacity, housing—these are some of the construction priorities. The Wood-Mar renovating project must also be completed.

In order to more clearly facilitate the development and funding of total academic and campus needs, we are inaugurating definitive long-range planning. Based on a five-year cycle, planning will become part of the fabric of our academic life. The essence of planning is really quite simple. Planning is a process for deciding on a course of action. Simply, planning is deciding where we want to go and taking steps to move rationally in that direction. With the help of God's people, we are endeavoring to balance our budget for the second time in a row. Trustees at their annual meeting approved a record budget of \$1,300,000 compared to \$1,022,156 this year. It will continue our goal of academic advancement.

George Fox College has set its objectives clearly. I believe that the establishment of its identity in higher education is directly related to the

will and purpose of God as disclosed in the Scriptures.

Our objective is to encompass the finest elements of a liberal arts curriculum, a concern for students as a vital significance to the work of the institution, a challenge to integrate the information furnished from scholarly and scientific investigation with the truth of the Scripture and the rounding out of such education through meaningful experiences both on and off campus.

The functioning of such an academic community is possible only as the Holy Spirit is able freely to fulfill His gracious ministry of illumina-

tion and enablement.

George Fox College will exist as an effective Christian college and will attract students and faculty of commitment and quality only if it continues to articulate a clearly established identity as a distinctively Christian college.

Oliver Wendell Holmes once said, "I find the great thing in this world is not so much where we stand as in what direction we are moving . . . we must sail sometimes with the wind and sometimes against it, but we must sail and not drift nor lie at anchor." George Fox College has indeed moved ahead in the last year.

But the task still ahead of us is great and almost overwhelming. It will require from all an uncommon degree of consecration, understanding, determination, and faith. If we continue to grow in the grace and wisdom of God—George Fox College will be adequate to meet the challenge of our time and be of effective service to the Friends Church.

- 1. Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, a ministry of Quakers in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho, in session at Newberg, Oregon, August 11-16, 1970, opposes any efforts to legalize the sale and use of marijuana.
- 2. Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, a ministry of Quakers in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho, in session at Newberg, Oregon, August 11-16, 1970, is concerned that the use of alcoholic beverages is an extremely serious problem in traffic safety whether on the city streets, highways, waterways, or airways. Therefore, we urge all state governments to emulate those states that recognize an alcohol blood level of .10 percent or less as the degree of intoxication constituting "driving under the influence of alcohol."
- 3. Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, a ministry of Quakers in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho, in session at Newberg, Oregon, August 11-16, 1970, urges the Surgeon General of the United States to conduct an impartial and scientific study of the relationship of beverage alcohol to health similar to the research reported in 1964 regarding tobacco.

The Yearly Meeting approved each of these three statements.

- 73. Jack L. Willcuts gave the report of the National Association of Evangelicals. He announced that there will be a state NAE convention on the campus of George Fox College in the spring, which Friends are urged to attend.
- 74. The following recommendation was received from the Executive Council:

The Executive Council recommends that Oregon Yearly Meeting become a member of the National Negro Evangelistic Association. This is an interdenominational, racially integrated organization of denominations, churches, and individual Christians with the same statement of faith as used by the National Association of Evangelicals. The annual membership dues are \$25. This will allow the participation of Oregon Yearly Meeting in objectives and goals of the National Negro Evangelistic Association. Annual conventions are held to which all members of our church would be invited.

Approved.

■ 75. A concern was expressed from the floor of the meeting that our Yearly Meeting take a recorded stand on the subject of abortion, which is an outstanding issue in some of our areas.

This was referred to the Board of Moral Action for study and future recommendation, (See minute 85.)

■ 76. Gerald and Edith Haynes, members of First Friends, Whittier, California, were introduced to the meeting. They with their two children are attending our services.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

■ 77. Gerald Dillon, president of the board, presented Quentin Nordyke, missionary on furlough from Juli, Peru. He spoke of the newly established Extension Bible School, which has a steadily growing enrollment. He stated that this type of Bible school is important because 94 percent of the men students are married and 76 percent are from rural areas and have farm responsibilities. This is a steadily growing project, as over 90 students are enrolled this term.

Ronald Stansell, on furlough from Bolivia, presented the challenge of the rapidly growing National Bolivian Friends Church. They are seeing a 10 percent growth each year. This presents some challenging problems in the National Church. Their Bible school is producing capable leadership but not rapidly enough. They are considering establishing extension schools as well. He challenged us to a *new* interest in our Bolivian brethren.

The presentation of the Board of Missions was approved, and the report appears below:

Forty years in Aymaraland, years filled with miracles of God's power in transforming people, building His Church in the midst of persecution, and lifting up a glorious witness to His name, are celebrated this year by Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends. The Board of Missions is happy to serve you in caring for this great work God has given us and to report that the work continues to expand and develop with even greater challenge for the future.

In Bolivia, Peru, and among the Koreans of Portland, the work continues to expand. Bolivia reports approximately 125 congregations with an estimated 10 percent growth each year recently. This means that at the present rate the work will double in another ten years. In Peru, the work is also growing rapidly with over 24 congregations meeting and new ones being added constantly. The missionaries in Peru are directly involved in helping evangelize the new field. The Korean work has grown to an average attendance of 56 for the year.

However, the major problem of training and developing the new members, and church leaders, is a crucial one. Bolivia's Patmos Bible Institute administered by the national church under the direction of Francisco Mamani has seen an enrollment of 54 students with extension Bible classes offered in Frontera Quarterly Meeting, where 13 were registered. Our missionaries have cooperated fully in this work. Peru has witnessed a record number of 94 enrollees in the Extension Bible School this summer. Due to the shortage of missionaries on the field, the board sent Paul Cammack to assist Ed Cammack and Nick Maurer in this big job. National leaders in Peru are giving able assistance to the missionaries as helpers in teaching.

A most important aspect of this development is the further nationalization of the churches. In Bolivia the mission has been busy transferring legal titles of properties to the National Church. This has included the historic center of Max Paredes Church in La Paz, a property already used by the National Church at a maximum level. Although this center has served Oregon Yearly Meeting mission well in the past, it is destined now to have an even greater ministry under the leadership of the National Church. Although Oregon Yearly Meeting ably assisted in roofing the huge 5,000 capacity tabernacle, it must be remembered that the nationals have supplied the labor and much of the materials for the rest of the building. Missionaries have also helped the developing church by giving able counsel to the Mesa Directiva and teaching the future leaders in the Bible school.

In Peru the most significant step toward a fully indigenous church was the official organizing of the National Church. During the visit of Jack Willcuts, Harley Adams, and Gerald Dillon in December of 1969, an official constitution was prepared with the Mesa Directiva. This thrust upon them the responsibility of the National Church although the mission pledged its continued cooperation with them for the future,

Increasingly, the nationals of Peru are assuming the stature of an indigenous group. Both in evangelism and education, they show remarkable development for such a young church. The Extension Bible School, under the capable leadership of our missionaries, must receive credit for this growth.

The Korean work under Pastor Kwan Kyu Kim's leadership continues to develop and share a vital ministry to Korean residents of Portland, Korean sailors visiting the port, and students in the greater Portland area. This work has been further organized with the appointment of deacons and deaconesses. This year the Korean people have given over \$2,000 towards the support of the work.

Commendation must go to our missionaries in Bolivia and Peru. Both fields are understaffed. Three missionary families-David and Florence Thomas, Gene and Betty Comfort, and Ronald and Carolyn Stansellcontinue to serve the Bolivian field. Three missionary families have served the Peruvian field-Quentin and Florene Nordyke, Nicholas and Alice Maurer, and Edwin and Marie Cammack. The tragedy of understaffed field missionaries means (1) overworked and frustrated missionaries who often try to do the impossible and (2) failure to adequately take care of the harvest. This has meant inability to answer many calls for the development of new work and a failure to care for new congregations that need encouragement. The result has been in some cases new congregations withering away, and some individuals have turned to other groups. Cults are always ready to pounce on the weak and straying. Both Mormons and Jehovah's Witnesses have been busy.

The missionary board, believing that OYM wants us to go ahead in the evangelization of the Aymara people and nurture of the emerging church, have put Duane and Sherrill Comfort under appointment. We are trusting God through you to supply the funds. Our budget has been significantly increased for this year in the face of a present deficit of over \$11,000. In addition, candidates for appointment are attending Missionary Intern School, Farmington, Michigan. The future level of giving by the people of OYM will determine future appointments by your board. In addition to these new missionaries and active candidates, additional young couples in Oregon Yearly Meeting have answered God's call and

are preparing for service abroad.

Priorities for the future of the work include:

(1) A missionary staff of at least nine families—four for Bolivia and five for Peru;

(2) Major increased level of missionary giving by Oregon Yearly

Meeting; (3) Better communication to the people of Oregon Yearly Meeting

concerning the Aymara work:

(4) Total mobilization of the Yearly Meeting in proper financial

support.

Appreciation must be voiced for the work of the board members. Four have visited the field, two at their own expense. Harley Adams has done a commendable job telling the story of Aymaraland throughout the Yearly Meeting. Ralph Chapman, in charge of Friends Missionary Literature Service, continues to produce and supply literature. John Fankhauser, business manager, has put literally hours of donated labor into the work. Appreciation must be voiced for each member of Oregon Yearly Meeting, whose prayers, sacrificial giving, and missionary dedication have made it another great year.

■ 85. The Moral Action Board shares the concern of those who asked for a statement regarding abortion. However, in view of the varying viewpoints and necessary research, we do not feel that time will permit the formation or discussion of such a statement at this meeting.

We ask the privilege of an extension of time for research and discussion at midvear board meetings with the hope that some statement might

be brought to the 1971 Yearly Meeting.

Meanwhile, we will try to get information on this and other moral and legislative issues to the meetings. Please feel free to communicate with the board expressing your concerns during the church year.

For your information, we have already begun a study of social dancing. (See minute 75.)

■ 86. The following communication was received:

The Ministry and Counsel requested that the matter of disciplinary change relative to the name of the Ministry and Counsel be presented to the Yearly Meeting again for a second reading in accordance with proper disciplinary change.

The Yearly Meeting goes on record as approving the disciplinary change (see minute 56, 1969 Minutes) changing the name of the former Meeting on Ministry and Oversight to henceforth be called the Ministry and Counsel.

■ 87. The representatives recommended that the name of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church be changed to Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

BRIEF:

1. The change from Oregon to Northwest tends to clarify the scope of the Yearly Meeting, and any confusion with states of the early "North-

west Territory" is no longer a problem.

2. The term evangelical was researched and discussed. Along with its definitions relating to sound doctrine, we find a growing interpretation of the term in national and local press trending toward classifying evangelical with ultra-conservative and fundamentalist, and in turn linking these labels with extreme right, militant Christian movements in a political connotation. We are evangelical—no more nor less than that—in the tradition of "The Valiant Sixty." We trust that adding or omitting the term has no bearing on the quality of our calling in the world. It would, however, have bearing on how we are "pigeonholed" with other groups by the oversimplifying press.

Friends of the Northwest are a church. This has meaningful connotations across Quakerdom. We have already taken our stand as a separated Bible-believing organization for the spreading of the Gospel under this name. Elongating the name is not in keeping with our belief in simple, direct language. Our reputation—among other yearly meetings and in the world—continues to define us as the church that sees Christ's redemption of the individual as the key to redemption of society and the

resolving of its devastating problems.

3. George Layman, Newberg attorney, and Oliver Weesner were consulted relative to the legal aspects of this change. Corporations can change their names with no particular legal difficulty. Our Yearly Meeting, which has the power to act on these matters, can change its official name. It does not require the consent of every member of our Yearly Meeting, simply the approval of the Meeting in official session. Oliver Weesner suggested that a properly attested letter from the Yearly Meeting stating the action taken would have to be sent to the State Office that deals with corporation matters, where it would be recorded. George Layman said there would be no difficulty in the matter of property ownership in any of our three states.

Approved, and referred to the Executive Council to implement as they deem feasible or to bring back to the Yearly Meeting next year.

■ 88. The meeting adjourned to meet Saturday at 9:15 a.m.

■ 94. The Board of Finance nominated Ronald Willcuts to a one-year term on the Evangelical Friends Pension Committee. This is to fulfill the unexpired term of Gerald Lemmons, who is no longer a member of the Board of Finance.

■ 95. The Yearly Meeting Ministry and Counsel recommended to Oregon Yearly Meeting that Roger Knox be recorded as a minister of the Gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

■ 96. The Yearly Meeting Ministry and Counsel recommended to Oregon Yearly Meeting that Harold Antrim be recorded as a minister of the Gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Approved.

■ 97. The following was presented by the Discipline Revision Committee:

At the request of the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Counsel, the Discipline Revision Committee submits the following material approved by the Yearly Meeting in 1963, for inclusion in the Constitution and Discipline, to be inserted after the first paragraph 8. TRANSFER OF MINISTERS, which begins on page 56 of the new Constitution and Discipline.

An outline of procedure:

a. The certificate of membership sent to the monthly meeting where the minister will be in membership must be accompanied by all necessary

papers or certificate showing his/her ministerial standing.

b. The monthly meeting clerk, immediately upon receipt of this transfer, is directed to send this biographical information relating to his ministerial status, along with a recommendation from the local meeting on ministry and counsel, to the chairman of the committee on training and recording of ministers of Oregon Yearly Meeting with a request for immediate action by the Yearly Meeting committee. This should be done prior to monthly meeting action.

c. The Yearly Meeting committee on training and recording of ministers and the Yearly Meeting Superintendent should be notified immediately by the chairman regarding the request and the status of the minister. In normal cases, an immediate reply by mail will suffice to give the sense of the committee in regard to the question. In some cases, a special called meeting may be necessary. When the decision has been reached by the committee, the monthly meeting clerk should be notified immediately. It should be borne in mind that unnecessary delay in processing this matter may be an embarrassment and a hindrance to both the new minister and the church receiving his membership. Therefore. attention should be given promptly to this matter. However, it should be recognized by all that the committee on training and recording of ministers has every right to be fully satisfied in the matter before making a decision.

d. The monthly meeting clerk, upon receipt of a letter from the Yearly Meeting committee on training and recording of ministers, may then present to the monthly meeting both the transfer of membership and ministerial status with the above letter for official action by the monthly meeting. Upon favorable action, the minister in question is then officially recognized as a recorded minister of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Notification of this action should be sent to the meeting sending the transfer of membership and ministerial standing in order that the minister's name may be removed from its list.

This constitutes the second reading, to be included in the Constitution and Discipline.

Approved.

■ 98. The following report and recommendations were received from the Board of Finance:

On July 1, 1970, Oregon Yearly Meeting began operating under its new financial structure, the Unified Budget, which presents in one budget the anticipated expenditures that formerly appeared in the Fixed Expense and the United Budget.

The total requested budget was \$224,593, against which there was an anticipated income aside from church pledging of \$23,775, leaving the net total of requests of \$200,818.

The total response in pledges by the church was \$141,939 as of the

date of the Yearly Meeting sessions.

Since the items that formerly constituted the Fixed Expense along with the Yearly Meeting share of costs for publishing the Evangelical Friend are basic costs, if the Yearly Meeting office and the magazine are maintained, it has been necessary to give priority to such items and prorate the remainder of the pledged income to the other boards. Thus the pledging was sufficient to cover only 60 percent of the askings of these boards.

Because two of the boards enter the new church year with sizable deficits, the Board of Finance recommends that the 1970-71 budget be based on the pledges received without extension upon the basis of expected income in excess of the pledges.

This, then, will be reviewed at the following Yearly Meeting sessions for consideration for a two-year term.

■ 101. The Board of Evangelism proposed the name of J. Earl Geil for a two-year term to the Evangelism and Church Extension Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance.

■ 102. The Board of Missions presented the name of Donald Lamm as a member of the Evangelical Friends Alliance Missions Commission for a term of two years.

■ 103. The Board of Christian Education made the following nominations:

To the Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends for two years—Harold Antrim; representative to the Evangelical Friends Alliance Christian Education Commission for two years—Howard E. Harmon; representative to the Evangelical Friends Alliance Youth Commission for two years—Harold Antrim.

■ 104. The following report was presented from Greenleaf Academy:

Greenleaf Friends Academy graduated 12 seniors at commencement exercises May 26, 1970. Twenty-one 8th grade students were promoted to the 9th grade in exercises on May 24, 1970.

Total enrollment for the year was 105 students-73 high school stu-

dents and 32 junior highers.

Activities: Two students represented the Academy at the annual Boys' State and Girls' State Conventions this year. The Academy was also represented at the YMCA Youth Legislature sessions in Boise. The Key Club was extremely active this year with several projects, including welcome signs at each end of Greenleaf. They were also named Key Club of the year for this region.

Music: The music department was well represented with a large choir and band. Concerts were presented in many churches in the Boise Valley area. The choir received a 2 rating in the district music festival, and although they did compete locally Greenleaf was not represented this year in Seattle at the Northwest Fellowship of Christian Schools Musicale.

Drama: Under the direction of Dianna Kennison, the Junior Class

presented the play, Room for One More.

Athletics: As member of the Snake River Valley Conference, the Academy played eight football games and 25 basketball games, taking second place in the District Basketball Tournament. Students have become quite enthused with the track program, and it is hoped that a good track and facilities can be developed in the very near future.

Staff: The Academy was under the direction this past year of Ray Link, who served as principal. Ray Link resigned to pursue some personal interests. Also resigning at the end of this past year was Mark Roberts. The staff for this coming year includes the following: Ken Smitherman, principal; Karen Smitherman, coordinator public relations and activities; Calvin Wilkins, bookkeeper; Samuel Drinnon, Bible, science, junior high; Esther Hardinger, language arts; Ruthellen Johnson, home economics; Dianna Kennison, English, social science; Clara Pumphrey, English, physical education; Anna Mills, commercial, Spanish; John Johnson, mathematics, science, athletics; Eugene Pumphrey, social science, music, athletics; Cornelia Holmes, library; Howard Fuller, custodian.

We are anticipating the opening of school with registration day on

Monday, August 31.

Special Meetings: Special meetings were held with Don Lamm last fall. His messages were a great inspiration and blessing to the students and faculty.

Incorporation: Final stages are being completed in the process of incorporating the Academy. Under the new plan of organization, the board of managers will be represented by various Friends churches in the Boise Valley. We are looking forward to broader support and interest among Friends in the area, as we feel that the concern for a Christian academy at Greenleaf is important and has in the past been instrumental in helping develop fine Christian leaders. We feel that the Academy has a tremendous potential and much to offer the junior high and high school student desiring a Christian secondary education.

In summary, we would request your prayerful support of the Academy as we step upon the threshold of a new year. It is our desire to present a quality educational program in a Christian setting with dedicated and qualified Christian teachers and to help develop the quality Christian young people with the potential of being the best leaders and citizens in our church, community, and country. Your continued prayer and support are most sincerely enlisted.

Approved, and a standing vote of appreciation was given for the work of Greenleaf Academy.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

■ 105. The report of the Board of Christian Education presented in the Friday evening service was approved. Appreciation was expressed for the work of this board and especially for the response of the youth during this Yearly Meeting. (See evening services, page 56, 57.) A summary of the report, prepared by the board president, follows:

Exciting reports have come in from many areas of the Yearly Meeting in all phases of the Christian education program. A revival spirit has been sweeping through our young people. The youth who traveled to Wichita, Kansas, for the Evangelical Friends Alliance conference came home with fresh testimonies of the Lord working in their lives. Many more found victory in their hearts while attending camp. Those who are involved with these young people agree that the future looks bright for the Lord's work among Friends in the Northwest.

A renewed spirit of optimism has gripped some congregations as attendance has increased and plans have been laid for continual growth. Each local church has been encouraged to establish goals they anticipate can be reached with total involvement of the Sunday school and church.

On the Sunday school scene, "Friends Alive! Project 50-50" is the church growth theme for the coming year, sponsored by the Evangelical Friends Alliance Christian Education Commission, with emphasis being 50 percent attendance, 50 percent on goals. The five Sunday school with the largest numerical increase were Newberg, Second Friends Port

land, Olympic View, Boise, and North Valley.

Camping experiences have been varied. Trail camping has been a exciting event in the lives of many of our youth. Ken VandenHoek trail camp coordinator has given leadership in this area. Five trail camp included 88 young people. Twin Rocks and Quaker Hill added a variet of activities to their camping program with back packing, horsemanship water skiing, hiking, and motorcycling being some of the attractions. It the San Juan Islands, Island Hopping Camp was again held this summer with sailing, water skiing, and island exploring as part of the activities Over 1,500 individuals took part in camping in Oregon Yearly Meeting this past year.

The Evangelical Friends Alliance Christian Education Commission selected Dorothy Barratt as full-time consultant. Her duties will include representing the George Fox Press in all interdenominational meetings. promotion of materials, and visitation among the churches of the Alliance.

The Aldersgate graded curriculum for Sunday schools has been received enthusiastically by the majority of Friends churches throughout

the Alliance.

Junior Yearly Meeting set a new pace this summer with sessions held at Baker's Acres, a wooded setting made available to the Yearly Meeting by Russell Baker near Newberg. The first through sixth graders were bussed to the day camp site daily. Nursery care was provided throughout the sessions of Yearly Meeting.

The Board of Christian Education desires to assist in every way possible each local congregation in achieving great things for the Lord in the months ahead. Hugh Salisbury has been contracted to assist in Christian education conferences across the Yearly Meeting during the coming

church year.

■ 110. The Executive Council recommended to the Yearly Meeting that the Executive Council be given the responsibility of filling the office of business secretary as personnel is available. Approved.

■ 111. Supplemental report of nominating committee of Executive Council:

The Executive Council recommended that John Roberts serve as financial secretary in addition to his duties as president of the Board of Finance until the midwinter meeting of the Executive Council, at which time action will be taken with regard to the occupant of this office for the balance of the church year.

Approved.

■ 112. The Executive Council recommended to the Yearly Meeting that one member of the Friends Action Board be designated by that board to serve on the Executive Council.

Approved.

■ 113. The Executive Council recommended to the Yearly Meeting that the Yearly Meeting treasurer's books be audited by the Yearly Meeting auditors this year and that these auditors investigate the cost of a full professional audit and report to the Executive Council at midyear meeting. Approved.

■ 114. The report of the Church Music Committee submitted by Sheldon Louthan, chairman, was read as follows:

This report is based on 43 replies to questionnaires sent to the Music Committee chairmen of each of the churches of OYM.

Most of the music effort in our churches is designed to provide music and leadership for the worship services, and for half or more of our churches this involves some type of choir participation. Six to eight churches have choirs that regularly participate in Sunday morning worship, while another 20 to 25 function at Christmas and Easter only. The small size of many of our meetings continues to be a major limiting factor, since few churches nationally can sustain an adult choir program involving more than 10 percent of their average Sunday morning attendance.

The committee organized and held a choir conference to which all choirs within commuting distance of Portland were invited. This was held on the campus of Lewis and Clark College in Portland February 28, 1970 with Dr. L. Stanley Glarum as guest conductor. Four church choirs participated along with individuals from four to five other churches. A public program ended the conference in which each choir sang a group of numbers followed by all choirs joining together for a closing group of selections under the direction of Dr. Glarum. Attendance at the public

program was low and a disappointment to the committee.

Several churches have tried special musical activities worthy of mention in this report. Clackamas Park Friends held a quartet festival last May. Newberg Friends has had several unusual musical programs under the direction of Dennis and Janet Hagen. The best known of these is the production of "Tell It Like It Is," which they have given in Newberg and other churches in the area. Silverton Friends youth choir-"God Squad" by name—has given a number of programs in other churches. Church music history classes were given by Phillip and Konita Morrill at Portland Second Friends during the year.

A songwriting contest was held again this year with 14 entries received. An independent judge awarded first prizes in each of five categories as follows: Gospel Song-Arlene Zeller, Hymns-Arlene Zeller, Chorus-Arlene Zeller, Anthem-Arlene Zeller, Instrumental-Ruth

Corbin.

The committee has secured new copies of a church musicians' handbook for distribution to all church music committee chairmen. A study of recent trends in church music has been launched, and more choir conference type activities at Yearly Meeting time are under current considera-

We are grateful to George Fox College for allowing us housing in Pennington, Edwards, Weesner, and Sherman Arms, where 177 guests were so nicely accommodated at a minimum fee.

Fourteen trailers and campers were accommodated on Yearly Meeting property near the church. In addition, many members of Newberg area

opened their homes to our guests.

Saga Food Service at Heacock Commons, George Fox College, served 1,995 tasty meals to our Yearly Meeting guests at a minimum cost. There were 74 pastors and missionaries and their families entertained on a halfprice meal ticket.

Approved.

- 118. Superintendent Jack L. Willcuts introduced to the meeting William D. Kent, member of Walnut Creek Friends Church, California Yearly Meeting. He is director of personnel relations for South America of Braniff International Airlines.
- 119. The Epistle Committee submitted the following report:

We have received communications from 22 other yearly meetings, 15 of these from the United States and seven from foreign countries. Some items of interest follow:

Jamaica Yearly Meeting-"Be Still and Know That I Am God," the theme for the sessions, is as relevant today as it was to the psalmist, and our task must be to convey this stillness and knowledge to a troubled world.

Norway Yearly Meeting-We have also had lively reminders that even if our convictions have been arrived at in different ways and we express them differently, we have something to learn from one another, and by faithfulness and willingness to serve we can help and strengthen one another along the way.

New England Yearly Meeting-At the first meeting of our 310th session, Friends were called to join in the company of the committed who will make a major contribution to the building of the Kingdom of God at this critical time in the history of man.

North Carolina Yearly Meeting ... let us remember that our Lord committed to the Church the regeneration of the world. May we as members of the Society of Friends become the instrument of spiritual birth for many and the source of strength for scores of people in this world.

Ohio Yearly Meeting-An outstanding message was given by Princess Alice Siwundhla of South Africa, who pointed out that "God's ways are not our ways" and that in time of trial and difficulty we should learn to trust our kind and loving Heavenly Father. The Yearly Meeting is presently in the midst of a Decade of Advance. "As Christian citizens we believe that respect for and obedience to authority must be preserved in these days of war, riots, and social injustice. We reject actions which tend to stir up discord, rebellion, and mob rule."

Central Yearly Meeting-We were made glad as we witnessed souls seeking the Lord for forgiveness of sins as well as the infilling of the Holy

Spirit.

Western Yearly Meeting-Hope lies in the fact that the crises of history have been times of religious renewal. The Bible, the greatest guide to renewal, bears witness to this for it points to the two-dimensional relationship between God and man and between man and man-a relationship which was bridged by the coming of Jesus Christ.

Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting-The messages of Ohio Yearly Meeting Superintendent Russell Myers have challenged us with the work of Jesus Christ as imparted by the Holy Spirit. He has urged us to "Go and Grow," as did the early church, in the power of the imparted Christ.

Nebraska Yearly Meeting-Change is a part of life. We would not stop it if we could for it is through change that we have both growth and progress. We do feel a concern for the direction of change. Each of us can work to change fear and pride and hate to Christian love and service to our fellowmen.

Philadelphia Yearly Meeting-Concern was expressed lest, becoming too absorbed in social issues, we may suffer loss or lessening of our religious and spiritual centering. Historically, Quakers have been followers of both Martha and Mary, and we have been hard pressed to remain mindful of both these strands in us.

Wilmington Yearly Meeting-The Team Ministry has become an active force within our Yearly Meeting and answers the need in many ways to the problem of the pastoral shortage. In this effort four ministers are serving seven monthly meetings.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

■ 120. The written report of the Board of Stewardship, submitted by Keith Baker, president, was read as follows:

For years most people have considered stewardship to mainly involve money and not involving many other areas of Christian responsibility.

Along with the coming last year of Edward Hales to our Yearly Meeting sessions, our board has started to come to grips with better ways we can help the local church teach and live Christian stewardship. We have left the era behind where we had only the poster and essay contests. We must begin to reach and gain dedication in our young church families. As you saw Tuesday evening, we are trying a variety of methods and sound new materials to present the message that only through the love of God can we be guided to find a stable balance in our lives as well as be of service to our Lord.

We continue to urge special emphasis in November but do not limit it to then. A stewardship emphasis in the spring, before the budget and nomination procedure, is of real merit. We also feel some churches can benefit from a year-round regular emphasis. We continue to strongly endorse the new stewardship materials of the Louis Neibauer Company. They are attractive, practical, and thorough.

Concerning the program of the Yearly Meeting board for the coming year, we want to get the message of the broad areas of stewardship to as many area rallies as possible this year. At the same time we will go to many of the local churches. We hope to use presentations of the quality

of the Tuesday evening dramatization.

We also believe in the great benefit of the one-to-one approach of a concerned adult or youth in a church who decides to give himself to God with no strings attached.

In the midst of a world of revolution, many serious internal problems and seemingly insurmountable difficulties face our society. However, we in Oregon Yearly Meeting continue to be full of hope. We join with one of old who sang:

> A mighty fortress is our God, A bulwark never failing; Our helper He, amid the flood Of mortal ills prevailing: Dost ask who that may be? Christ Jesus, it is He.

The year has been one of growth in many areas of our Yearly Meeting. The church has moved forward. Some important actions of the 78th session of Oregon Yearly Meeting were the reception of a new Constitution and Discipline and a celebration of 40 years of expanding missionary work in Aymaraland in Bolivia. These years in Aymaraland were filled with miracles of God's power in transforming people, building the church in the midst of persecution, and lifting up a glorious witness to His name. The indigenous church reports that now there are approximately 125 congregations with 7,000 believers. In Peru, where the work is less than ten years old, there are 24 congregations with 500 believers. The official organization of the indigenous national church was set up during this past year.

Our own spirits were lifted by our guest devotional speaker, Dr. Eldon R. Fuhrman from the Western Evangelical Seminary. He preached at the morning inspirational hours and most of the evening services. In several messages from Philippians, he emphasized the work of the Holy Spirit. There were many people who responded seeking a closer walk with God. We enjoyed a tender spirit during those hours.

George Fox College has moved ahead during this last year. Excellent advances have been made in the broad areas of development, public relations, and the fine reception of the institutional self-study report by the Northwest accrediting team. In the face of mounting difficulties encountered by private colleges, the enrollment in the college continues to climb.

A lively group of Friends Youth, 150 strong, enjoyed its own Yearly Meeting. Prayer groups, classes for study, and action filled the days. Many responded to the call of God and made commitments for life.

Junior Yearly Meeting met at Baker's Acres. About 60 boarded a bus each morning to travel eight miles. A quiet, wooded atmosphere helped greatly in the learning and recreational sessions.
