Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church

1973

■ 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting convened in its eighty-first session August 15, 1973, at 9:15 a.m. on the campus of George Fox College in Newberg, Oregon.

As we see God's working during the past year, we rejoice with the songwriter in saying, "To God be the glory, great things He hath done!" And now with a forward look, we pray that our deliberations and decisions during these sessions may be made with the goal in view that God has set for us to accomplish.

Joseph Gilmore led the congregation in singing, "They'll Know We Are Christians by Our Love."

The New Life quartet from Hillsboro church sang, "I Came to Praise the Lord."

Walter Cook led in prayer.

Appreciation was expressed for the large group of young people present in the opening session of our Yearly Meeting.

■ 2. General Superintendent Norval Hadley was introduced and presented his keynote message as follows:

KEYNOTE MESSAGE

I believe I have received, by faith, a message from God and from His Word. The message is for you today, and for the entire church for the coming year. But before I deliver that message let me give my State of the Church report.

Last year our pastors reported a total of 500 people won to Christ in our churches. Admittedly this probably is not a complete report, but it gives us some sense of what is happening in our evangelistic program. There was a total of 399 people added to the membership of the Friends Church during the year, and 82 were lost from membership, so our net gain was 317. This is down from last year, which was the highest in

history, when our total net membership gain was 351. The year before our net gain was 240. The three churches reporting the greatest gains are Reedwood 40, Greater Seattle Friends Ministries 39, Cherry Grove 30. This brings the total membership of Northwest Yearly Meeting now to 7,294. The average Sunday morning worship attendance was 5,512, up 409 from last year. This compares with a net increase the year before of 238. The Sunday school attendance was a net gain of 72 compared with a net gain last year of 33. Giving to the Unified Budget totaled \$189,346. We thank God and each of you for your generous contributions to carry on the mission work, outreach programs, and total ministries of Northwest Yearly Meeting. This total giving was down from the amount we gave last year of \$196,544. I am sorry I cannot explain the decrease. Pledging to the Unified Budget for the coming year is \$166,260. Last year it was \$142,000.

The Unified Budget goal for the coming year is \$220,000, which means there will need to be considerable giving above the pledges by the churches if we are to complete the program believed by the boards to be God's program for the coming year.

During the last year we have successfully launched the Friends Fund, a deferred giving program to channel funds to all the boards and agencies of Northwest Yearly Meeting. By giving through the Friends Fund, people now can remember one or all of our ministries in their wills and can draw up trust agreements by which they can receive a higher lifetime income from their money, avoid probate costs and long delays on taking care of their own loved ones, and also remember the Lord's work. There will be a seminar Thursday afternoon at 3:30 explaining in further detail how this can be done and how you may be able to save thousands of dollars in taxes.

Last year new buildings were erected at Kent and at North Valley, and in both places there are strong evidences of health and growth.

I see an encouraging trend in the Evangelical Friends Alliance toward a sensible and strengthening fellowship of evangelical Quakers nationwide with an emphasis on service to the local church at a minimum of cost. During our business sessions this week we will be considering a proposal that membership in the Evangelical Friends Alliance be opened to individual congregations who agree with our doctrines and policies even though their entire yearly meeting does not become a member. Many of us still feel the only adequate way the Evangelical Friends Alliance can serve the local church is with a director of communications at the national level. Since this appointment and budget have not yet been approved by all the membership of EFA, the superintendents will be doing intervisitation this year with each of us spending about a month in the other yearly meetings. There will be a more complete report on the Evangelical Friends Alliance on Thursday morning during the 9:15 business session.

This past year has been one of fantastic growth and renewal in our churches in Bolivia and Peru. At least 15 new congregations were started last year in Bolivia and probably a similar number in Peru. On both fields there were encouraging signs of spiritual vitality and productive evangelistic activity with nationals taking the predominate role.

This has been a year of evangelism at home also as Northwest Yearly Meeting has encouraged participation in Key 73 activities.

As we look to the future, the Board of Evangelism has an exciting plan for establishing Friends fellowships in new communities. This plan will be implemented with the help of Friends Ministries, a group com-

mitted to encouraging fellowship, headed by Arthur Pruitt, president, and Ben Brantingham, director.

Our Ministers Conference will be held jointly with the ministers of California Yearly Meeting next spring at Richardson Springs just out of Chico, California. Next July the entire Evangelical Friends Alliance is planning a general conference in Newberg, Oregon, at George Fox College with an emphasis on fellowship and inspiration.

I have been well aware of the need for better service from the Yearly Meeting to the local church and of my own limitations as I've tried to meet the needs of 60 congregations. We are taking three innovative steps in an effort to do a better job.

(1) We are seeking to activate the area superintendents as eyes, ears, and spokesmen for the Yearly Meeting to the churches in their areas. We want them to actually become extensions of the general superintendent's office.

(2) I plan to visit each of the churches, not just as a speaker for an outreach conference or some other meeting but as an outside consultant. We'll review together the entire ministry and work of your local church in an effort to encourage and counsel. In this connection I am planning a survey that will show all of us where you have been, where you are, and where you are going. I may not get to all the churches in one year, but I'll get around as fast as I can.

(3) If satisfactory arrangements can be made, Mary and I are planning to live in Idaho for two months this year, probably in the spring. I'll have my office and phone there, and we hope to more adequately minister to the eastern part of the Yearly Meeting in this way. My able Administrative Secretary Beth Bagley, Assistant John Fankhauser, and Treasurer Arlene Moore will keep the office humming in Newberg, and we will retain liaison with each other through correspondence, tape recordings, and telephone, but for two months I will be close to churches in the East.

My message to you today is entitled "Wholeness." *For my emphasis this year I want to try to encourage the church to engage in a whole ministry by whole people to meet the needs of the whole man in the whole world.*

To do this I want to talk about (1) whole people, (2) the needs of the whole man, and (3) the whole world.

What are whole people? The dictionary says something that is whole is healthy and in sound condition, free from defects, well and intact, having all its proper parts or elements, not scattered or divided. By the dictionary definition, whole people would be people fitting or working together as one. A whole person has been completed, he has been fulfilled, he has been purged of defects. He is no longer a double-minded person but is pure-hearted. He is not only whole; he is also what the Scriptures call holy.

Richard Taylor opens his book, *Life in the Spirit*, with the story about a clerk who asked J. G. Morrison, "How little religion can a man have and still get to heaven?" The preacher looked at his questioner in a piercing way and replied, "Just enough to make him comfortable in the presence of Jesus." That's a good question. How much religion does it take to get to heaven? What would it take to make you feel comfortable in the presence of Jesus? What does God require of all who have light and opportunity? The Bible answers that question with a very simple statement in Hebrews 12:14. Without holiness "no man shall see the Lord." That's not a command; it's simply a statement of fact.

Whatever you think of holiness people or whatever you think of this or that holiness movement or organization, the Bible says without holiness "no man shall see the Lord." Across the Yearly Meeting I have heard critical and negative statements about holiness or holiness people. I want to deal with two reasons why these come. (1) Some have interpreted holiness as a commission to be critical of anything they interpret as being unholy. Their religion has become a lot of "thou shalt not's." Some in the name of holiness are on a kind of witch hunt for faults in other people. There are problems with this. They daily become more and more like what they hunt. Their religion becomes unattractive, and they lose the positive witness that wins other people to Christ.

Let me tell you something from experience: keep finding imaginary faults in your pastor and pretty soon he'll show you some that aren't so imaginary. But keep encouraging him, praying for him, praising God for him, and talking him up to others, and he'll make you proud of him. And incidentally, one way to encourage him is to pay him enough salary so that he and his family can be happy and he can feel free to serve you enthusiastically.

Holiness is not just a lot of thou shalt not's. Jesus wasn't negative about holiness at all. He was very positive. In the sermon on the mount He said, if you want to be happy, enviably fortunate, spiritually prosperous, have God's favor, and if you want to see God, be pure in heart (Matthew 5:8 *Amplified Bible*). He said "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength: this is the first commandment. And the second is like, namely this, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself." (Mark 12:30-31) When you love God and neighbor like this, there is no room for anything that is inconsistent with love. That's holiness. There is nothing wrong with perfect love for God. And loving your neighbor as yourself fulfills all the law. Stop for a minute and think, "How do I love myself?" You respect yourself, or at least you should, and so you dress and conduct yourself as a lady or a gentleman. You protect yourself from cold and hunger and poverty and danger. You provide for yourself so you won't be in want. You preserve yourself from disease and untimely death by getting proper food and rest, and hopefully you work even harder to preserve your good name and reputation. Above all you seek the highest welfare for yourself, and that means salvation and spiritual health. Holiness is loving other people the same way: respecting them, protecting them, providing for them, preserving them, and seeking their highest welfare—being as concerned about their salvation as you are about your own.

(2) Some have been critical of holiness because they feel some holiness people think they are perfect when they're not. One of our churches was having a Lay Witness Mission, and the director said when they were asked to chart their Christian experience many people pictured their spiritual lives in up and down lines until they got to the time of their sanctification, then they ran the line up to the top of the page and stopped. They had arrived. People with that view of Christian perfection don't know how to cope with their own imperfections. So some ignore them, hoping, I suppose, that others will, but they don't. Some call them mistakes instead of sin, but renaming them doesn't suffice.

Holiness is not a condition of absolute perfection in which there is no further development. Rather it removes the hindrances to growth so that greater and faster development is possible. Some have erred along this

line and implied an impossible standard that has made young people feel they didn't want anything to do with holiness. Some think when one is cleansed from all sin it is then impossible for him to sin. Not at all. Rather it is possible for him not to sin. In seminary I wrote my thesis on "A New Testament Study of the Problem of Sin after Sanctification." I concluded that Satan can sow the seeds of sin in a holy heart just like he did in the perfect heart of Eve. Some, not understanding this, have been unwilling to admit sin after they were sanctified. They fail to confess it and get it cleansed. The Bible says holiness is both an instantaneous cleansing of the heart and a continual cleansing. If we walk in the light (continually) as God is in the light, we have fellowship one with another and the blood of Jesus Christ (continually) cleanses us from all sin (1 John 1:7). We live in a sin-polluted moral atmosphere just like smog pollutes the Southern California sky. And just as the tear duct continually washes the eye, so the blood of Jesus Christ continually cleanses the heart.

Jesus said, "You, therefore, must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect," that is, be complete and mature and godly in mind and character, virtue and integrity (Matthew 5:48 *Amplified Bible*). I believe that means you are to be as perfect as you can be perfect just as God is as perfect as He can be perfect. Now it's impossible for you to be perfect physically. You can't have perfect memory. You can't have perfect knowledge. Therefore, you'll have imperfect judgment. There are just two areas where the Scriptures indicate it's possible for a human being to be perfect. You can have a pure heart, and you can have perfect love. This is what scriptural holiness is. It is being so perfectly in love with God that there is "a happy inward affinity with the will of God as well as an outward conformity to it." (Richard Taylor, page 15)

You who have been critical of holiness, be careful. Paul says he who despises God's call to holiness despises not man but God (1 Thessalonians 4:8). Pastors, if we're going to develop completed, whole, fulfilled people in our Yearly Meeting, we need to preach scriptural holiness. You become a whole person when the Holy Spirit, in response to your faith and complete commitment, cleanses your heart from sin and fills you with perfect love.

Not only is there nothing wrong with scriptural holiness, but it is right and it is essential. Without holiness "no man shall see the Lord."

Engage in a whole ministry by whole people to meet the needs of the whole man. What do we mean by a ministry to meet the needs of the whole man? To answer that question I would like to draw attention to some concepts and philosophies expressed by Ben Brantingham and Friends Ministries and to point out some exciting things that are happening where people are applying those concepts. Ben has written a booklet entitled "The Church in Action"—a message from Friends Mobilization Fellowship, which has now become Friends Ministries. Ben says, "The contemporary church which possesses Life will attempt to answer whatever conditions of need it finds . . . Jesus asked, in effect, 'What is your need? I want to solve it.' We say ' . . . I'll tell you what your need is,' and then we proceed to try to meet that need . . . Is it any wonder the world says, 'You answer questions no one is asking.'"

Ben calls the church to begin saying, "We are here to meet your deepest need, whatever it is; to help you realize the fulfillment of your God-given dreams."

"Peter was a businessman, a fisherman. His livelihood depended on his ability and success in catching fish . . . one of Peter's fondest dreams was to catch a lot of fish." Jesus first met his need and fulfilled his dream. He made him a booming success. His nets were so full they began to tear. Then Jesus called him to leave his nets and catch men. Applying this Ben gets in a few licks for the pastor. He writes, "The church all too often lacks the creativity and resourcefulness, even honesty, to adequately care for those we supposedly liberate to serve full time. Our approach to ministry leads not to freedom, but to slavery. Too often, we extend a call to a man only after the previous pastor fails. We bring him at poverty wages and ask him to perform a job that takes the competency of a \$50,000 a year business executive. Then we demand that he make an organization succeed that at its best can happen only if all the members share equal responsibility. Most ministers assume a pastorate knowing that if he succeeds they may keep him and if he fails they will get rid of him!"

"How alien this procedure is to the spirit of Christ. Instead of testing members of the fellowship to see how strong they are spiritually, the true church takes the responsibility of making all its members a success, including the pastor. What a different atmosphere prevails when all accept as much care for the pastor's success as for their own."

Evangelism is easy and exciting if it follows a demonstration of love. But apparently demonstrating love has not been so easy for Friends. Many of us are more willing, for instance, to quote Scripture to a "sinner" than to help him as a brother to fix his leaky roof. Roy Clark tells how in one community every year when the Quaker church was in a revival emphasis people would get concerned about the soul of the town sinner. They would all go out and express their concern and witness to him, but the rest of the year they ignored him. Finally the poor guy said to one of them, "I wish you people were less concerned about my soul and more concerned about me." Roy used to encourage us to take a man out to coffee or even buy him a steak dinner. Become his friend. Learn about his wants and dreams and needs, and then we would be much more able to lead him to Christ. Friends Ministries is applying this principle in breakfast meetings and fellowship lunches.

In Jesus' high priestly prayer He asked that His disciples "may be made perfect in one; and that the world may know that thou hast sent me, and hast loved them, as thou hast loved me." (John 17:23) The world's clearest view of Jesus comes when they see two Christians in fellowship together . . . That truth should revolutionize our witnessing. In fact, the best way to introduce people to Jesus is to introduce them to Christians in unity.

Ben calls us to outstrip engineers, business, and industry in producing creative ideas on how to meet people's needs, because we are nearest the source. "Let us awaken out of our sleep and ask God's spirit to excite our minds. He will do it through the fellowship because one mind excites another mind as one log makes the other log burn."

A top business executive, Irwin Miller, said, "The role of the corporation, now as in the future, is to survive . . . How does a corporation survive? Clearly by serving effectively and well some current need of the society in which it exists." Helping people to become fulfilled, helping to make their dreams come true serves a current need in the society in which the church exists. That product is marketable. This is what has excited me about Ben Brantingham's concepts and the work of Friends Ministries.

Who is better qualified to meet this need in society than the church? I still feel as I did when I spoke here two years ago, that every church should have a vital fellowship committed to meeting the physical, human, and social needs of the people that church is called to serve. In the book of Acts they called them deacons. This could be happening out of a breakfast fellowship meeting. Or as in the case at the Reedwood church, much of it can happen right out of an encouraging fellowship sharing time in the evening service.

And while we are talking about the needs of the whole man, let me hasten to say you will encounter needs you aren't capable of meeting in your own strength. But remember, Jesus said, "Anyone believing in me shall do the same miracles I have done, and even greater ones, because I am going to be with the Father." (John 14:12 *Living Bible*) Ron Crecelius, chaplain at George Fox College, was speaking in the annual conference of another denomination when one of the "hard cases" surprised everyone and came down to the altar. For the first part of the altar service he just knelt there and cursed God. Seasoned Christian workers were white as a sheet as they struggled unsuccessfully to help him. Finally Ron and several of the ministers laid hands on him and prayed boldly in Jesus' name for the demon to come out of him. After crying out a couple of times the boy went limp and simply said, "Thank you, God." So fierce had been the spiritual battle, it took him an hour to recoup his physical strength. Increasingly these days we need to have faith and courage for that kind of ministry.

Since the early days of our church, Quakers have had a deep concern for the physical and social needs of man, as well as the spiritual. In this we are simply following Christ's example. I say to our shame that evangelical Friends have been in danger of losing that emphasis. This is why we encourage giving to ministries like that of World Relief Commission and World Vision, as well as a complete ministry at home.

Jesus said in Matthew 25:31, 32 that when He comes again as Messiah all the nations will be gathered before Him and He will separate people as a shepherd separates sheep from goats. And He will say to those on the right hand, "'Come, blessed of my Father, into the Kingdom prepared for you from the founding of the world. For I was hungry and you fed me; I was thirsty and you gave me water; I was a stranger and you invited me into your homes; naked and you clothed me; sick and in prison, and you visited me.'

"Then these righteous ones will reply, 'Sir, when did we ever see you hungry and feed you? Or thirsty and give you anything to drink? Or a stranger, and help you? Or naked, and clothed you? When did we ever see you sick or in prison, and visit you?'

"And I, the King, will tell them, 'When you did it to these my brothers you were doing it to me!'" In the rest of the story Jesus explained that to those who refused to feed the hungry, entertain the stranger, clothe the naked, and visit the sick and in prison, He will say, "Away with you, you cursed ones, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his demons." (*Living Bible*)

Dear friends, some have supposed ministry to the nonspiritual needs of man to be just a take-it-or-leave-it frill, an optional activity to be engaged in by the few who are not spiritual enough to be evangelistic so they satisfy their souls through social service. But just as holiness is not optional, ministry to the whole man is not optional.

A whole ministry by whole people to meet the needs of a whole man in the whole world.

Jesus commissioned us, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." (Mark 16:15) Admittedly you as one person cannot physically go to the whole world, but I believe we do ourselves disservice and we miss the point of Jesus' great commission when our entire missionary vision consists of an interest in only Bolivia, Peru, and Mexico City. Many of us believe we are living in the last days. Jesus said the Gospel would be preached to all nations and then the end would come. As a church leader, I believe I owe it to you to help you lift up your eyes unto the harvest fields of the world. I want to help you keep abreast of the progress toward the fulfilling of prophecy that will bring about the return of our King.

For this reason I will be encouraging the effort across the Evangelical Friends Alliance toward a more united missions thrust on the part of evangelical Friends. At the present time I don't see any change in the administration of our various mission programs. The Eastern Region will still be responsible for administering the work in Taiwan and India, Kansas for Burundi, Rocky Mountain for the Rough Rock Indian mission, and we will still administer the work in Bolivia and Peru. But by the exchange of missionaries in deputation, by a more general flow of information and prayer concerns, and perhaps by a central treasury all of us should lift our missionary concern to embrace more nearly the whole world.

In spite of the fact that some who are not paying their share of the Unified Budget are saying to me, "How can we grow at home if we have to give so much to others?" I still believe one secret to success in the local church is a strong outreach emphasis. I agree with my friend C. W. Perry, pastor of Rose Drive Friends Church at Yorba Linda, California "The church God blesses gets outside itself."

This kind of missionary vision again is not optional but is part of being a whole Christian. Jesus said, "Ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." (Acts 1:8) Emil Brunner said, "The church exists by mission as fire exists by burning."

Dr. Richard Halverson, pastor of Fourth Presbyterian of Washington D.C., and head of International Christian Leadership, said some time ago "The saddest fact in the church today is that the world is unimpressed with Christians." Judging just from the tangible evidence we have, I am afraid that could still be said of some of the communities where Friends minister.

In closing, let me illustrate how this ministry by whole people to the whole man works in real life experience to impress the world. I was visiting a large hospital in the outskirts of Saigon in Vietnam. It was built to take care of 700 patients, and when I was there 1,900 had been crowded in. It was the third anniversary of the beginning of the Christian ministry in that Buddhist hospital. Those who could come on crutches and in wheel chairs to the large theater where chapel services are now held. Others were brought by missionaries in panel trucks and vans. The Vietnamese man who was speaking was not a chaplain or a missionary, and as far as I know was not even a Christian. He was the hospital psychologist. A missionary translated for me. He said, "I visited a patient the other day who had both an arm and a leg blown off by a land mine. When he regained consciousness in the hospital, his first impression was to commit suicide. Many in his condition are rejected by family and friends. Then he noticed he had clean bedsheets. His hair was combed. Someone was caring for him. And he learned it was the Christians."

Then the psychologist added, "I have watched these Christians. I have seen them when they pray for men who are about to lose their breath. They act as though they would like to give them their own breath."

In that setting the world was impressed with Christians. And I was proud to be a part of what was happening in the name of Jesus Christ in that hospital. Christians didn't have to force their message on anyone. Time after time the evangelistic conversation began when someone asked, "Why do you Christians do what you do?" Demonstrating and expressing Christian love will work just as well right here in Newberg, or in Caldwell, or in Medford, or Seattle. Whole Christians filled with the Holy Spirit, loving God with all their heart, soul, mind, and strength, and really loving neighbors as themselves can demonstrate that love by their actions. Then they will be witnesses in Newberg, in Portland, all through the Northwest, and unto the uttermost parts of the world.

Are we really holy Christians, ministering with a world vision to the needs of the whole man?

A standing vote of appreciation was given for this presentation and for the leadership of our superintendent during the past year.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

■ 13. Roger Smith, president of the Board of Evangelism, gave the following report:

The Board of Evangelism never lacks for work to do. In fact, there are more possibilities and needs than we can ever effectively accomplish. The following items comprised our major efforts this past year.

Last year during Yearly Meeting, we announced the pouring of the footings for the Kent church building. On June 3, 1973, over 200 persons filled the new building for the dedication of a unique and attractive worship-training center in Kent. Although all the work was done with volunteers, it is an excellently constructed building with professional quality workmanship. Despite rising materials cost, the 5,400 square foot building was completed with parking and services provided for \$66,000. During this year of construction, the program of evangelism continued with ten adults professing Christ in home Bible study classes. The first VBS was held in July with 78 attending. An evangelism training program will be launched this fall with eight participants expected. David and Denise Robinson have come to assist in music and youth work. Eugene McDonald has given superb leadership to this ministry.

Olympic View Extension Church continues to receive our support. This church has shown growth in attendance, finances, and strength every year since it came under our board's direction. Outstanding planning by the church leadership is the key to this growth as well as Dan Nolta's pastoral care.

This last year we also entered into a two-year program of assistance in order to allow Gilbert George at Entiat to be released to full-time ministry. This has resulted in a new growth pattern at Entiat.

We conducted Key 73 seminars in various locations of our Yearly Meeting last fall. Although we did not produce specific Key 73 programs, many of our churches have given leadership in united community programs.

Two Share Calls have been issued—for North Valley and Kent.

We discover that there are many patterns for evangelism and growth. The church needs to find the pattern that fits its particular needs. Vancouver First and Caldwell have successful busing ministries. Other churches are also beginning to bus. At least 18 have evangelism training programs; 32 or more use home Bible study programs effectively. Many churches have successfully held Lay Witness Missions.

This fall we plan to launch a new program of church development in many communities within our borders where there are no Friends churches. There are 60 cities of 10,000 population or more in this category. We will use the skills and resources of Friends Ministries, led by Ben Brantingham, to develop informal Friends fellowships in as many areas as possible. The emphasis will be upon small groups and the use of the gifts of all persons involved. Milo Ross will serve as liaison with the Board of Evangelism. We expect many of these fellowships will emerge into churches. Pray for this ambitious but Spirit-directed venture.

■ 14. Verl Lindley of Granada Heights Friends Church, California Yearly Meeting, was introduced as our Yearly Meeting speaker. Applause was given for the presence of Verl and his wife, Lois, and their anticipated ministry among us.

■ 15. A resignation of A. Eldon Helm from the Board of Peace and Service was read.

Accepted, and referred to Portland Area to be filled. His position on the Social Action Commission of the Evangelical Friends Alliance is to be cared for by the Board of Peace and Service.

■ 16. The resignation of Berthamay Roberts from the Board of Christian Education was presented.

Accepted, and referred to the representatives.

■ 17. A resignation from the Board of Peace and Service by Duane R. Noel was read.

Accepted, and referred to the representatives.

■ 18. A resignation of Ruth Washburn from the Board of Stewardship was presented.

Accepted, and referred to the representatives.

■ 19. Milo Ross, chairman of the Reorganizational Study Committee commented on the work of the committee during the past year. He presented the following changes approved by the reorganization committee after the January 1973 printing:

In paragraph G 1, page 32, add a new fourth paragraph to read: "They are authorized to initiate action on concerns forwarded from the local churches, and to present it to the Yearly Meeting in session."

In paragraph D 1, page 17, in the middle of line six, change the word "boards" to "areas."

In paragraph (5), page 25, change the second sentence to read: Transfer within the limits of the Evangelical Friends Alliance carries both membership and position to the church receiving it." In the following sentence change to read: "One who transfers from any other yearly meeting of Friends"

In paragraph c, page 21, omit the phrase that reads thus: "and when the candidate has rendered (or shall have rendered by the time the Yearly Meeting sessions are next to convene) two years of definite service in the ministry," leaving the remainder of the paragraph unchanged.

In paragraph 1, page 9, after the title, SPIRITUAL LIFE COMMITTEE, change the first clause to read: "The committee is composed of three or more active members of the local church, appointed for terms of three years"

In paragraph 1. f., page 9, change the last sentence to read: "A subcommittee of mature members with quick discernment and tender sympathy, who may be called elders, are given these crucial responsibilities."

A diagram of the practical outworkings of the new system of reorganization on the local level was presented by means of overhead projector and appears in the appendix on page 106.

Helpful discussion followed this presentation, to be continued at another time.

■ 20. Joe Ryan, Northwest representative for World Vision, International, was introduced and welcomed as a visitor in our Yearly Meeting sessions.

■ 21. A resignation was read from Elenita Bales from the Board of Peace and Service as Yearly Meeting appointee, being now automatically on that board as area secretary.

Thursday, 9:15 a.m.

■ 22. As the Thursday morning session opened, Willard Kennon led in prayer.

■ 23. The minutes of the previous day were read and accepted as corrected.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

■ 24. Earl P. Barker, vice-president of the Board of Publication introduced the work of that board and gave a background in the art of printing and its importance to us today.

Harlow Ankeny introduced the staff of The Barclay Press and spoke appreciation for their contributions to the work of publication in our Yearly Meeting.

The Barclay Press financial report was presented and appears in the appendix.

The Board of Publication has a concern to establish a capital fund for their use to help ease the financial pressures as they arise from time to time from increasing costs in materials and services. Our prayers and interest are solicited that the needs may be met.

Approved.

■ 25. The Yearly Meeting treasurer's report was presented by the treasurer, Arlene Moore.

This appears in the appendix. (page 84)

Appreciation was manifested by the spontaneous applause given by the meeting for the efficient and laborious work of our treasurer.

Approved.

BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE

■ 26. The report of the Board of Peace and Service, William Rourke, president, given in the Wednesday evening service was approved. A summary follows:

The following report is compiled from the reports of 37 of the 60 churches in Northwest Yearly Meeting:

1. Just under 30 percent of draft age men are registered as conscientious objectors (I-O or I-AO).

2. On a scale from 1 (none) to 5 (continual), these churches made a peace emphasis of about 2.5.

3. Eighty-one percent of the churches reported financial support of the World Relief Commission, and 35 percent gave financial support to the Friends Action Board.

Observations:

1. For a "peace" church it seems we have a relatively low percentage of conscientious objectors. This may be partially related to the uncertain status of the draft. The draft law is intact, and registrants should realize that draft calls may be issued at any time.

This response may, however, be partially related to the lack of emphasis on Christ's teaching of Christian love, which logically leads to pacifism. Fourteen percent of our churches, according to the reports, have none of these teachings through the Sunday school, from the pulpit, or through any other means. If these statistics are accurate, where will our young people learn this Christian doctrine?

The popularity of war has been decreasing, and it seems that this is, at the very least, an inappropriate time to underemphasize this basic Christian doctrine.

2. The response of our churches in meeting the physical needs of the community continues to be excellent. A variety of home relief projects and the excellent response to foreign relief projects through the World Relief Commission are examples.

Goals:

1. To encourage the churches to present Christ's teaching of peace at all levels.

2. To continue to emphasize foreign relief projects through the World Relief Commission.

3. To raise an emergency relief fund of \$3,000 (\$500 has already been pledged by seven members of the Board of Peace and Service).

4. To provide resource information for people interested in the following projects:

a. Adoption of foreign orphans

b. Foster care

c. Various local service projects.

5. To give assistance in establishing "Friends in Volunteer Service," a broad-based program for placing volunteers of any age in meaningful service roles at home or abroad.

■ 27. The report of the Evangelical Friends Alliance was presented by Superintendent Norval Hadley.

He announced the upcoming EFA convention July 10-14, 1974, to be held on the campus of George Fox College.

He feels the trend in EFA is toward a maximum of service to the Friends Church at a minimum cost, as services and ministries are coordinated from the various areas.

Milo Ross then spoke of two crisis spots in Africa where chaotic conditions exist. In Burundi thousands are having to flee the country. In Uganda also many are fleeing for their lives, and all Friends churches have been ordered closed. Our prayers are solicited for our brethren in these intense situations.

Jack Willcuts explained the action of the Coordinating Council of EFA recommending that individual churches in nonaffiliated yearly meetings be permitted to become members of the EFA. This is not with the purpose of creating a "superchurch" but of providing a means of coordinating our efforts and avenues of service.

Jack Willcuts also presented the work of the National Association of Evangelicals, stating that the state convention of NAE will be held in Salem in October. Wilmer Brown, director of the World Relief Commission of the Northwest under NAE, spoke of the great work being done among the needy of the world.

Several of our Friends young people are serving in various parts of the world with WRC.

Approved.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

■ 28. During the 11 a.m. Inspirational Hour, the Board of Stewardship made the following presentation:

The congregation joined in singing, "Take My Life and Let It Be." Donald Lamm sang, "He Won My Heart."

David Brown, president of the board, introduced Les Nelson, field representative for the Lee Bernard Company, a deferred giving counseling agency retained by the Friends Fund, who stressed the importance of the making of wills for the benefit of our families. Everything we have belongs to God. How beautiful if we can make Him a beneficiary, also! In closing his remarks he read Philippians 4:15-20.

Malcolm MacGregor presented his concern for the holding of financial seminars in the churches, using Luke 12:16-21. He stated there are four fatal mistakes in individual finances:

1. He didn't prepare for abundance.
2. He was mistaken about ownership of his goods.
3. He placed his security in material things.
4. He did not provide for distribution of his goods upon his death.

The report of the board was approved.

Thursday, 2:15 p.m.

■ 29. The afternoon session opened with Joseph Gilmore leading the congregation in singing, "Jesus Saves." Iverna Hibbs led in prayer.

■ 30. A resignation was received from Lon Fendall from the Board of Christian Education. This was accepted, and referred to the representatives.

■ 31. The Women's Missionary Union presented a skit, depicting their work and concerns in the various avenues of missionary endeavor and their work in our own Yearly Meeting.

The annual report of the WMU by Agnes Tish, president, is as follows:

The women of Northwest Yearly Meeting have had a wonderful year. We seek to minister to needs at home, in our church, in our community, and across many miles to our brethren in other states as well as in Mexico, Bolivia, and Peru.

Some of our financial projects have been:

\$250 per month toward salaries of Duane and Sherrill Comfort

\$100 per month to Olympic View

\$100 per month to Kent.

Our Spring Rallies yielded \$902.64 for a typewriter and adding machine for Bolivia. The offering at our banquet has already totaled over \$1,200 to be used for purchase of a tent for Bolivia. Through the Evangelical Friends Alliance we have contributed toward the support of the work in Mexico City.

But our activities have not been confined to financial projects. With love and concern our women have endeavored to minister to many other needs around them. Members of several unions visit regularly in local nursing homes. A helping hand has been extended to needs in our churches—everything from painting Sunday school classrooms to contributing books to church libraries. We have welcomed three new missionary babies this year with gifts of needed supplies.

A project that is new this year is the printing of a small paper, "Quaker Waggins," which disseminates information, news, and encouragement among our women. This has helped to unify our work and is a means of sharing ideas and information.

The fall Retreat held at Pendleton, Oregon, continues to be a time of inspiration, challenge, and renewal of spiritual strength. We are looking forward to a wonderful time together this October when Mrs. Armin Gesswein will be with us as our guest speaker.

The reading of good books is encouraged, and the women are recognized for their participation in this program.

We should not pass lightly over the reports of the many hours of prayer that have gone up from our women for needs on our mission fields. Our strength lies not in feverish activity but in simple, constant faith in a God who can change hearts, lives, and when necessary, circumstances. And then as we surrender our time and talents completely to the Lord, He will use and bless them, and His name will receive the glory.

"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my . . . [sisters], ye have done it unto me."

Approved.

- 32. The Board of Peace and Service nominated Jerald Magee for a three-year term on the Friendsview Manor Board.

- 33. The Board of Moral Action sent to Northwest Yearly Meeting the following statement of concern to be included in the *Minutes*:

Because the Watergate investigations have underscored the vital need for integrity in officials on all levels of public service, we urge a rededication of all Christians to positive and continuing prayer for local, state, and national leaders in accordance with the scriptural admonition in 1 Timothy 2:1, 2 to pray for all who are in authority over us, pleading and giving thanks for all God is going to do for them.

BOARD OF GENERAL EDUCATION

■ 47. Philip Fendall, board president, introduced the presentation of the Board of General Education.

Kendall Smitherman, principal of Greenleaf Friends Academy, was introduced. He showed an informative film-slide presentation of the academy program during "First Week" of the last academic year.

Richard Beebe told of the National Educators Fellowship Northwest Conference held at George Fox College March 16-18, 1973. He stated that 396 of our members are involved as educators.

The annual report of the board follows:

The goals of the Board of General Education for 1972-73 were as follows:

- A. Administer the Ministerial Education Financial Aid Program.
- B. Contribute \$500 toward Greenleaf Friends Academy's First Week Program.
- C. Send a representative to the National Educators Fellowship Conference.
- D. Encourage members of each church to become more involved in promoting high standards in public and private schools in their respective communities.
- E. Urge churches and individuals to participate in scholarship programs to enable young people to attend George Fox College.

Five young men in ministerial training at George Fox College received funds from our board for a total of \$3,203.

Five hundred dollars were sent to Friends Academy for their First Week Program. Ken Smitherman, principal, reported that it was a very successful week.

Richard Beebe, vice-president of the board, attended the National Educators Fellowship Conference held at George Fox College this past spring.

Seventy-eight percent of the churches returned their annual report forms, and the results are listed below.

I. Seventy-nine people in Northwest Yearly Meeting are actively involved in promoting high standards in public and private education by serving as members of school boards and officers of Parent-Teacher Associations.

II. Most of our churches encourage 11th and 12th grade students to attend George Fox College with these activities:

- A. Messages by Dr. Le Shana, college president
- B. Presentations by other staff members
- C. College choir presentations
- D. Promoting Future Freshman Day
- E. Promoting May Day
- F. Church banquets
- G. Personal contacts with youth.

III. Twenty-nine young people from our churches attending George Fox College are in preparation for full-time church supported vocations. Six-

teen attend other colleges for the same purpose. Nine are attending seminaries.

IV. Three hundred and ninety-six teachers attend our churches. They need our prayers to maintain a strong Christian witness before the thousands of young people they work with.

V. Sixteen churches are aiding youth at George Fox College by participating in scholarships and grants-in-aid programs. A number of churches budget money for George Fox College, and many individuals give designated monies.

VI. Some of our churches promote Friends Academy in the following ways:

- A. Entertain the choir
- B. Special offerings
- C. Sponsor ads in school annual
- D. Auctions, dinners, ice cream socials to raise funds
- E. Personal contacts with youth.

VII. Some of our churches have done much to promote quality education in their communities. Most frequently mentioned are:

- A. Day care centers
- B. Kindergarten
- C. Sponsor release time Bible classes
- D. Tuition paid for those going to Sunday school conventions
- E. Teacher workshops
- F. Christian Day School by Springbrook Friends Church
- G. Urging people to vote
- H. Youth counselors in Outdoor School
- I. Support for foreign students
- J. Promoting strong church libraries
- K. Promoting *Fruit of the Vine*
- L. Promoting *Christian Reader*
- M. Giving New Testaments to school children
- N. Distribution of literature on creation story.

The information in this report may be helpful to the Committee of General Education in each church. Someone in each church should see that a copy is given to them.

The Board of General Education strongly urges each church education committee to follow these general guidelines:

- A. Establish meaningful goals.
- B. List ways to accomplish the goals.
- C. Work until the goals are achieved, then set new goals.

George Fox made a major calendar adjustment with the start of the school year in a plan to allow a four-month span for student summer employment. The change was made by dropping the formal finals weeks

and incorporating them into the term schedule and by conducting classes Thanksgiving week. Regular Christmas and spring breaks were maintained, and with the change students ended classes May 25, nearly two weeks earlier than before.

Perhaps the most important academic project was the establishment of an extension campus in Kotzebue, Alaska, to teach Eskimo natives in the Arctic Circle. The program was developed through Federal funding and cooperation with Alaska Yearly Meeting of Friends Church and California Yearly Meeting. A six-week short term was held in the fall and a three-week term in March. There was a total class registration of 124, plus 26 young people enrolled in a preparatory music instruction course. Sixty-five percent were native students. About a third enrolled for college credit, and we had an equivalent of 27 full-time students at the center, which offered 11 courses with a total of 23 term-hours of credit.

Fall term enrollment on the Newberg campus was 431, and with the Kotzebue campus attendance added, George Fox had a record enrollment of 472 students. Of our Newberg campus students, 44.2 percent are Friends—the highest percentage of any Quaker college in the country. Altogether 31 denominations are represented on campus. Students come from 15 states and nine foreign countries with 88 percent from the States of Oregon, Washington, California, and Idaho.

In February the college hosted a visiting team from the Oregon Department of Education, and in May it came back with a report granting full extension of approval for three secondary teaching norm programs in language arts, physical science, and social studies. They were first approved in 1971 for a two-year period.

During the year, students were exposed to a wide variety of visiting guest speakers and artists. Among those on campus were China authority David Wang, economist Kenneth Boulding, operatic singer Edward Pierson, and representatives of the leading evangelistic and missions organizations.

Seventy-seven seniors ended their college careers May 20 with graduation ceremonies featuring black evangelist and author, Tom Skinner. Baccalaureate speaker was William Wagner, superintendent of Indiana Yearly Meeting of Friends.

Students continue to be taught by a dedicated, top-notch faculty with more than 50 percent having earned doctorates. Guiding the faculty is our new dean of the college, William D. Green, who is providing new insights and capable direction through his strong background in Christian higher education.

RELIGIOUS LIFE AND STUDENT AFFAIRS

This has been an excellent year from several standpoints—a championship basketball team, top musical and drama groups, and a high spiritual tone.

Students are practicing their faith and putting it into practical use. In December, 22 students gave up part of their Christmas vacation to help the Centro de Amparo orphanage in Mexico. An even larger missions project has involved the entire student body. As a result of the February Missions Conference students organized a "faith-promise" giving project and raised more than \$4,300 to send 10 student summer missionaries to five nations in North and South America. They are now on the field with established missions organizations. Students took on extra jobs, saved from allowances, and simply did without some things to raise their personal goals in faith promises. In the closing meeting of the Missions Conference

over 200 young people responded to the invitation to full-time service for the Lord.

The Rev. Bob Harrison, a former associate with the Billy Graham Crusade, was guest speaker for the fall Christian Emphasis series, and Dr. Arthur M. Climenhaga, dean of Western Evangelical Seminary, was on campus for the successful spring Deeper Life Conference.

The George Fox Bruins established themselves in the sports world as the basketball team captured the NAIA District II championship and a spot in the national championships in Kansas City in March. The Bruins were not only the best independent squad but topped the best teams in two leagues to gain their position. In track, GFC's Curt Ankeny was voted both Track Athlete of the Year and Athlete of the Year in all sports in the district. Ankeny was the best in the district in the marathon (26 miles), cross-country, and six-mile run.

DEVELOPMENT/PROPERTY AND FINANCE

George Fox College is growing. During the year the campus was enlarged with the purchase of an additional 28 acres to bring the campus to nearly 90 acres. New lands will allow for future expansion.

At the same time, liabilities have been reduced by nearly \$60,000, and total assets of the college have gone up nearly \$600,000. The college has been operating with a balanced budget.

With the success of our modern bookstore and its appeal to the general public, the college this spring opened a branch store in downtown Newberg and is meeting the needs of supplying Christian books and materials.

Expansion of the development staff at the college takes place this summer with the creation of the new position of associate director of development. Filling the post will be Bruce Huffman, formerly director of annual and corporate support at the University of Redlands. He will be responsible for the annual and general fund program of the college.

As you have read this brief report, I trust you have sensed the evidence of God's blessing. This is His work and all glory is given to Him for what has been accomplished.

But what of tomorrow and the days ahead? I am confident in the leadership of our God and believe George Fox College is just now entering into its most productive years. If we are committed to the concept of Christian higher education and to the role of George Fox College, there is no limit to what God can do. God's work done in God's way will not lack God's supply.

The individual and organized support of the Yearly Meeting through financial and prayer support is appreciated greatly. Your continued support in this work of the Lord is encouraged.

■ 51. Aaron Hamlin, field director, presented the work of the National Black Evangelical Association.

After many years of earnest prayer and careful planning, prominent Negro evangelicals from across the nation met on April 18, 1963, and organized the National Negro Evangelical Association, thus writing significant history by doing what some thought could not be done.

In its brief span, the NNEA has registered itself as the most significant religious development among American Negroes in this generation. It has commanded the respect and admiration of the nation's religious forces.

The NNEA has now been renamed the National Black Evangelical Association and as such is not a denomination or a church but a voluntary association of evangelical individuals, groups, churches, and organizations and includes whites as well as blacks. It seeks to represent and promote the evangelical witness to blacks across the nation.

Ralph Greenidge reported on the program and inspiration of the Pittsburgh Convention in promoting ministry among blacks. He also spoke of the effective and practical outworking of the NBEA across the nation.

■ 53. Milo Ross, chairman of the Reorganizational Study Committee, presented the outworking of the new church reorganization plan on the Yearly Meeting level. The chart of this plan was presented by means of overhead projector and is reproduced in the appendix, page 107. He elaborated extensively on this and then responded helpfully to questions and comments from the audience.

The following changes are recommended by the Reorganizational Study Committee after the January 1973 printing:

Page 9—3. QUALIFICATIONS. All officers and committee chairmen are to be active members of the church. (Omit remainder of phrase.)

Page 9—1. SPIRITUAL LIFE COMMITTEE. The committee is composed of three or more active members of the church, appointed for terms . . . (no further changes here)

Page 9—f. Counseling members . . . (No changes made in first sentence.) (Second sentence changed to read:) A subcommittee of mature members with quick discernment and tender sympathy, who may be called elders, is given these crucial responsibilities.

Page 12—6. NOMINATING COMMITTEE. This committee, composed of six active members of the church, is appointed annually . . . (no more change)

Page 17—1. COMPOSITION. (In line 5, change phrase to read:) additional members appointed, one by each of the areas . . .

Page 20—(2) Music and the Arts. This area of activity and worship is under the direction of the board. (Change numbers of following paragraphs to conform.)

Page 21—c' Report to the Church. (Beginning at middle of line 5, strike out the following phrase:) and when the candidate has rendered (or shall have rendered by the time the Yearly Meeting sessions are next to convene) two years of definite service in the ministry . . .

Page 21—e' Report to the Committee on Training and Recording of Ministers. The chairman of the local spiritual life committee then sends

the report of the actions of the committee and the church to the chairman of the Yearly Meeting committee on training and recording of ministers. (All other phraseology to be omitted.)

Page 22—f' Action of the Committee on Training and Recording of Ministers. (On page 22 change next to last sentence to read:) It continues him under its instruction and guidance for a minimum of two years, until fully satisfied that he is qualified to be recorded as a minister of the Gospel by the authority of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

Page 25—(5) Transfer of Ministers. (Change second sentence to read:) Transfer within the limits of the Evangelical Friends Alliance carries both membership and position to the church receiving it. Next sentence, change to "any other."

Page 28—Additional areas of concern—add after "human hearts"—"moral and social testimonies;"

Page 32—FURTHER RESPONSIBILITIES. (Add a new sentence to read:) They are authorized to initiate action on concerns forwarded from the churches, and to present such action for consideration to the Yearly Meeting in session.

BOARD OF MORAL ACTION

■ 54. During the 11 a.m. Inspirational Hour, the Board of Moral Action made the following presentation, with Mildred Minthorne, president, presiding.

The Newberg church trio sang, "Redeeming Love."

Winners of the Moral Action Poster Contest were announced as follows:

Junior Division—first place, Sheryl Taffin of Boise Friends Church, "Don't Get Caught"; second place, Larry Choate, Jr., of Olympic View Friends Church, "Your Choice"; tie—Becky Krone of Agnew Friends, "Why So Sad?"

Junior High Division—first place, Debbie Roberts of Boise Friends Church, "Which Trip?"; second place, April Steinback of Olympic View Friends Church, "Your Choice"; honorable mention, Michael Elmer of Cherry Grove Friends Church, "Don't Wash Yourself Down the Drain."

Senior High Division—first place, Arlyn Finlay of Greenleaf Friends Church, "On the Road."

Adult Division—honorable mention, Marlene Born of Agnew Friends Church, "Read about God"; honorable mention, Dee Choate of Olympic View Friends Church, "Amazing Grace."

Harold Clark spoke, telling of Family Life Seminars that are available in series of taped messages for use in the churches.

Johnny Bullock presented a film, *Johnny Lingo*, based on the book of Ephesians, allegorically stressing the importance of individual worth in God's sight and His love for us, even when unlovely. Therefore, we have the same responsibility to love and help others recognize their worth.

The report of the Board of Moral Action follows:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC MORALS

Forty churches reported 165 presentations on public morals issues with only one at an area rally. Legislative concern was emphasized by over half the meetings, using bulletins and public announcements.

There were 1,766 tracts distributed, and 51 posters were displayed, of which 32 were made by our own members. Twenty-five total abstinence

pledges were given out, and 17 books on moral issues were added to church libraries. Along with the usual counseling and sermons on family life and preparation for marriage, tapes and records were presented, and there were several series of classes on these important subjects. A poster contest was held.

The board has felt a deepening concern this year for the need of strengthening of family structure, believing that many of the social problems we deal with could be eliminated if family life were in a healthy state. In accordance with this concern, the board has prepared a list of suggested resources on family life and has purchased two excellent sets of tapes, which will be in the Film and Record Library in the Yearly Meeting office. These are 11 tapes on "The Christian Family" by Larry Christenson and 6 tapes on "Spirit-Controlled Temperament" by Dr. Tim La Haye.

DEPARTMENT OF LEGISLATION

Nine bulletins were sent out during the Oregon legislative session. While we are disappointed that liquor will be allowed in public auditoriums, fines will be allowed instead of license suspension for dealer licensees, and 8 percent beer and 14 percent wine can be sold in more places, we rejoice that 16 or more undesirable liquor bills were tabled. The age for purchasing liquor is still 21 and cannot be voted on without more legislative action. An obscenity bill to curb touching in live sex shows was passed, and smoking will be prohibited in public meetings in state-owned and leased buildings. Although 11 good traffic safety bills were tabled, 5 excellent ones passed, so "Praise the Lord Anyway!" These five prohibit open bottles in a car, require revocation of license if driving under the influence while license is suspended, and mandatory jail sentences for driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Only one of the many lottery bills passed, allowing games and lotteries for charity. We will have to watch this as purposes can be misconstrued by those wishing to exploit the law. Marijuana was decriminalized, that is, first offenders will not have the entire book thrown at them for possession of one ounce or less. They can be fined up to \$100. This is for possession, not pushing, and does not legalize marijuana. It just gives the youthful experimenter who gets caught a chance to reform.

In Idaho, our members worked in a constructive way when the legislature was in session. We felt that equal rights for women would not be of benefit here in Idaho the way the bill was written. We continued to object to letting 19-year-olds have legal rights, especially with the consumption of alcoholic beverages. The State Board of Education turned down a request in June to allow the youth on Idaho college and university campuses to have beer and wine in their rooms. The pornography bill went into effect July 1, 1973, and we hope that the Supreme Court doesn't relent on the strictness of the bill. This has closed up some of the "adult" bookstores, and it may keep the dirty movies from being shown in the local theaters. Some of the bookstores are converting to mail order houses since they can't be open to the public. —Margaret Winters, Idaho chairman

Washington legislators passed two bills of concern to those involved in the field of moral action. The gambling laws have been considerably relaxed. In addition, the legal drinking age was lowered to 19. A referendum will put the lowered drinking age on the fall ballot.

DEPARTMENT OF LITERATURE

Forty-two churches reported being active in this department by encouraging Bible reading, promoting the reading of good literature, developing their libraries, and participating in other literature-related activities. All have libraries and added 1,654 books, making a total of 14,836. Twenty-six have librarians, and two added assistant librarians. Ways of promoting Bible reading included printed reading lists or outlines in weekly bulletins. These were correlated with the pastors' sermons in three churches. At least six churches cooperated with Key 73 programs in distributing Scriptures in their communities.

These churches should have special mention in promoting their libraries this year: Melba's heroic efforts in replacing their library and circulating books after their church fire in December 1972; Hillsboro's reorganization of their entire library, weeding out books and purchasing \$200 worth of new books; Hayden Lake's method of promoting reading of periodicals; Tigard's "Chain Gang Book Club," and Metolius' similar program.

Seven churches reported writing letters or sending petitions to TV or radio stations protesting X-rated movies and other questionable material or commending worthwhile programs.

We sense a lively interest in libraries and reading across our Yearly Meeting.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

■ 65. The report of the Board of Christian Education presented by Lloyd Melhorn, president, in the Friday evening service was approved as follows:

The Sunday schools showing the greatest numerical growth this year were: Vancouver First with a gain of 99, North Valley 34, Reedwood 20, Eugene 20, Caldwell 19, West Chehalem 18, and Lents 15. Vancouver First and Caldwell have initiated an effective bus ministry, which has contributed to their rapid growth this past year.

The Sunday school Easter offering for Mexico totaled \$2,578.19. This was a good response, and we are anticipating doing this again this year.

Approximately 300 people attended the Christian Education Growth Seminars sponsored by the Evangelical Friends Alliance Christian Education Commission, April 23-27, in five areas of Northwest Yearly Meeting. Four of our Friends editors led age-level workshops: Betty Hockett, preschool; Marjorie Landwert, primary and junior; Harold Antrim, youth; and Dorothy Barratt, adult teachers, Sunday school superintendents, and Christian Education Committee chairmen. The sessions included creative teaching methods, displays, demonstrations, and class involvement.

Two churches, Medford and Star, were chosen as pilot churches in Christian education for one year. The program was launched in January 1973 and will continue until January 1974. There is no preplanned program, but special guidance is given to each church in evaluating their own strengths and weaknesses and in developing their own program. Dorothy Barratt, our EFA Christian education consultant, has directed this ministry.

Medford began by reviewing their Christian education facilities and planning better ways to utilize their building. Walls were torn out, rooms carpeted, and classes and departments rearranged. They also initiated a Prayer Partner Program and began the preparation of a Christian education handbook. A new young adult class was added, and training classes were held for teachers of various age levels. A fall Christian education staff retreat is being planned.

The Star church also initiated the Christian education Prayer Partner Program and began working toward building higher staff morale through training and more adequate communications. The Christian Education Committee participated in an evaluation of the total Christian education ministry and prepared goals for the new year. A Christian education staff retreat was held in July with excellent response and enthusiasm. The Sunday school has been reorganized and is anticipating a great year ahead.

Area Christian education breakfasts (or dinners) were held in three areas—Southwest Washington, Salem, and Newberg. The area Christian education secretaries arranged these complimentary meals and meetings to encourage local Christian education chairmen in their work. These were times of inspiration and sharing of ideas and resources.

Camping: Day camping is camping during the day—reaching out to people and helping them to reach out to others. By the end of the summer Tilikum will have conducted 11 day camps for almost 400 campers. Campers sleep at home and eat morning and evening meals there—but spend all day at camp.

Tilikum's increasingly popular program of activities provides fun, adventure, spiritual growth, and new experiences in the out-of-doors. Tilikum's site has both the seclusion and natural resources for a successful outdoor living experience.

Perhaps the most exciting aspect of the day camping program is the possibility of learning-follow-up. As the campers go home each evening, they put into practice the lesson of the day through directed home assignments. In developing further day camp curriculum, we believe that this can be the key advantage of a day camping ministry.

For some churches, Tilikum has run a day camp in place of their regular VBS—for others it has been in addition to their VBS. Most camps have been five days and have ranged in size from 13 campers to over 100. Ages have included primary, junior, junior high, grades 1-6 together, and senior adults up to 92 years of age.

What can Tilikum do for your church?

1. We will program a day camp at Tilikum for your young people.
 2. We offer assistance in setting up your own day camp in a park or nearby farm—training of counselors, giving aid in programing and Bible curriculum.
 3. On March 15-16, 1974, Tilikum will sponsor a workshop on day camping. More details will appear later in the *Evangelical Friend*.

■ 78. The Board of Peace and Service nominated William Rourke to a one-year term on the EFA Social Concerns Commission in place of Eldon Helm, who has resigned.

■ 79. The report of the Board of Trustees, submitted by Oliver Weesner, president, was presented as follows:

A note for \$36,000 in favor of the National Bank of Commerce, Seattle, Washington, the proceeds of which were used in the construction of the Kent, Washington, church building, was signed for Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

Multnomah County during March issued a notice of intention to foreclose for delinquent taxes on Lot 9, Block 1, Colonial Heights, Portland, Oregon (former Quaker Apartments Building). The trustees secured a loan of \$680, which was paid to the Yearly Meeting treasurer and was used by her to pay sufficient taxes to stop foreclosure by the county for approximately one year. The buyer of the property has repaid the Yearly Meeting the amount of taxes it paid, and the loan to the Yearly Meeting of \$680 with interest has been paid. The buyer has agreed to pay all remaining delinquent and current taxes by designated dates. He has paid to the Yearly Meeting all installments due to July 10, 1973. The balance on the contract of sale as of July 10, 1973, is \$13,272.64. The trustees will continue to give this situation the proper attention as may be needed.

The Yearly Meeting and Barclay Press parking lot has been paved at a cost of \$3,700. The Yearly Meeting treasurer has received \$890 in designated gifts for the paving project and has paid one-third of the cost of the paving. The Board of Finance has authorized the securing of a loan of \$3,000 for two years, interest to be paid during the first year and during the second year interest and principal to be paid. The trustees have arranged for the loan.

Dwight C. Minthorne has made a study of the ownership of properties of the various meetings that compose the Yearly Meeting and of loans on these properties, many of which have been guaranteed by the Yearly Meeting, and of other items of interest to the Yearly Meeting concerning the various meetings. He has furnished a copy of his studies to the trustees. The trustees express their appreciation to Dwight Minthorne for the report he has made.

Adequate fire, extended coverage, and vandalism insurance is being carried on a joint insurance policy for the Newberg Friends Church and the Headquarters and Barclay Press building and their contents.

Approved.

■ 80. The report of the treasurer of the Ministerial Association was presented and appears in the appendix. (See page 98.)

■ 81. Discussion was resumed on the Reorganizational Study Plan, led by Milo Ross, chairman of the committee. After much helpful discussion, the meeting approved the changes recommended by the committee after the January 1973 printing. (See minute 53.)

It was suggested that these changes, together with the revision that was approved in Yearly Meeting 1973, be incorporated in our *Constitution*

and Discipline, with liberty granted the Reorganizational Study Committee to clarify wording where they deem it necessary before final printing.

The proposed *Revised Constitution and Discipline*, with these clarifications, is adopted together with unchanged portions of the former *Discipline* as the new *Constitution and Discipline*.

Approved.

■ 82. The Executive Council approved the following recommendation from the Evangelical Friends Alliance Coordinating Council to be presented to Northwest Yearly Meeting:

The Coordinating Council of the Evangelical Friends Alliance has approved recommending to the four constituent Yearly Meetings the following changes in the constitution of the Evangelical Friends Alliance regarding membership policies:

Article V—Membership—Add a second paragraph to read, "Any local meeting of Friends may apply for membership in the Evangelical Friends Alliance, provided there is official agreement with the doctrines and policies of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, and will be accepted upon approval of the Coordinating Council of the Evangelical Friends Alliance."

Article VI—Organization—Add a third paragraph to read, "The Executive Committee may nominate up to nine representatives from any of the Evangelical Friends Alliance member congregations who are not members of member Yearly Meetings, to serve on the Coordinating Council for three-year terms. These representatives are to be approved by the Coordinating Council."

If the above constitution change proposals are adopted, other criteria for assessing budget participation will need to become incorporated in the bylaws.

—From the Membership Committee

Approved, with the recommendation to the Coordinating Council that the words "any of" in Article VI, first sentence, be removed.

■ 83. The Executive Council recommended that the following from the Board of Missions be approved:

The Board of Missions of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends on behalf of the Mesa Directiva of Bolivia Yearly Meeting and through the recommendation of our missionaries—the Bolivian Friends Missionary Council—requests Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church meeting at Newberg, Oregon, 1973, to give due consideration to the official recognition of the INELA (National Evangelical Friends Church of Bolivia) as a Yearly Meeting.

The Bolivian Friends Church has gradually and consistently developed under the leadership and organization of the INELA and has for some time functioned as an independent Yearly Meeting with a high degree of self-direction, self-support, and self-propagation. Although the organizational pattern is somewhat indigenous to the Aymara people and needs further development in the light of growth, the time has come, we feel, to give recognition to them as a Yearly Meeting.

Recognizing this development as the work of the Holy Spirit and a confirmation of God's blessing upon Friends in Bolivia will be a significant witness to other yearly meetings.

It should be recognized that this will not change our present relationship with Bolivia Yearly Meeting. Our missionaries are still needed to

assist this young but vigorous church. Our relationship is one of assistance and cooperation rather than control and dominance.

The Board of Missions further requests that Northwest Yearly Meeting consider the missionaries on the field as our agents in extending this recognition on our behalf as they feel is most judicious.

Approved.

■ 84. The report of Greenleaf Friends Academy was presented by means of an outstanding film-slide presentation depicting the progress and program of that school. The written report, prepared by Kendall Smitherman, principal, follows:

First Week '72 provided a most unique learning experience for Friends Academy students this past year. With special emphasis in several academic areas and a real spiritual emphasis the year began. Special consultants for the week included Dr. Russell Platz, Wheaton College, and Wally Johnson, Treasure Valley Community College. The week provided a new means of becoming acquainted with students and the development of a pupil-teacher relationship unique in the Christian school.

Faculty members participated in the annual Northwest Fellowship of Christian Schools (NFCS) Teachers' Conference held at Salem Academy, Salem, Oregon, in October. This year's conference will be at Warm Beach in Washington.

Our annual Christmas Dinner was highlighted by the student response in purchasing a complete video tape setup for the school. The students promoted and secured the funds for the entire project, making their formal presentation at the Christmas Dinner. Pledges at the dinner exceeded \$10,000.

The concert choir and band participated in the NFCS Musicale at Salem then performed several concerts prior to returning home. GFA will be hosting the regional Musicale this coming spring.

A number of new developments were begun and are currently in progress at the academy. We have just opened our totally new development office under the direction of Larry A. Wilhite, a 1963 graduate of GFA. Larry comes to us from Lynchburg, Virginia, where he has been serving as director of development for *The Old Time Gospel Hour*, a multimillion dollar radio and television ministry throughout the world.

We are anticipating a great future for the academy and feel that with a full-time development staff this area will now receive the attention required in the operation of a Christian institution such as GFA.

The new athletic field is partially completed with plans for it being finished prior to the 73-74 track season.

John and Ruthellen Johnson resigned from the faculty following seven years of service to the academy. Bill and Patricia Curtright of Monmouth, Oregon, will be joining the faculty fulfilling the positions formerly held by the Johnsons.

A new 60-passenger bus has been ordered with delivery anticipated later in the fall.

In April we were saddened by the sudden death of Daniel Jaquith, a senior who had attended GFA throughout his junior and senior high school years.

Eighteen seniors graduated May 21. Dr. Ford, academic vice-president of Northwest Nazarene College, was commencement speaker.

Plans for First Week '73 have been completed with a total program developed that should provide a most outstanding opening to school.

Again as in years past we continue to request prayerful support for the ministry of Greenleaf Friends Academy as it continues to influence the lives of its many students.

FRIENDS ACTION BOARD

■ 85. During the Inspirational Hour, the Friends Action Board made the following presentation:

Robert Gilmore sang, "Give Me a Vision."

Sheldon Newkirk reminded us that the theme of FAB the past year has been "Love in Action" in alleviating human needs along with sharing Christ's message.

Jack L. Willcuts spoke on "Christian Sharing," seeing needs as people, and people as needs. We must have the capacity of being interrupted. The disciples were not interested in the blind beggar until they felt the love of Jesus for him.

The ministry of caring is more than taking offerings, holding committee meetings, and offering platitudes; it is being sensitive to people and the needs that touch the heart of God. Every Christian should be a part of the ministry of helps and caring. Is it possible that God has given to evangelical Friends the ministry of the *whole* Gospel to the *whole* man in a way greater than we have ever experienced?

Aaron Hamlin spoke on the importance that our attitudes be purely Christian toward other ethnic groups and individuals. As a nation we are still living largely under a dual system. Let us have a real vision for sharing the Gospel with all men everywhere.

When Jesus "saw the multitudes, he was moved with compassion on them, because they . . . were scattered . . . as sheep having no shepherd." We also must have compassion on *all* men.

As the session convened, LeRoy Benham, newly appointed financial secretary, led in prayer.

Clerk Dorwin E. Smith expressed appreciation for the unity and lack of factions in our Yearly Meeting, even in the face of differing opinions.

■ 87. The minutes were read and approved as corrected.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

■ 88. The following report of the Board of Missions, Gerald Dillon, president, was distributed:

Paul and Barnabas at the end of their first missionary journey gathered the congregation at Antioch together and "reported all that God had

helped them to do, and how he had thrown open the gates of faith to the Gentiles." (Acts 14:27 NEB) New Testament evangelism embraced a strong cross-cultural emphasis in which God worked through His church to open the gates of faith to the heathen. The report centered not on what man was doing but on what God was accomplishing. So it is today. We, on behalf of your missionaries, report to you what God is doing through you and those you have commissioned to the foreign field.

Evangelism: Perhaps the most dramatic developments occurred in the area of church growth. Over 30 new congregations have developed this past year with 15 reported in Bolivia and approximately 20 "new places" in Peru. More significant was the formation of a voluntary missionary society within the Bolivian Friends Church with the support of national workers in two areas remote from established INELA churches—Beren-guela and Ambana. Both show promise of developing into future quarterly meetings. A third project includes work in the distant city of Santa Cruz among the Spanish. Church growth also showed itself at the Yearly Meeting sessions in La Paz, where over 15 barrels of soup were consumed on Sunday—an indication of approximately 4,500 people in attendance. The increase in Bolivia is estimated at 15-20 percent over one year ago, an approximate estimate good for both fields.

Education: Although not so dramatic but perhaps even more significant are the developments in education. Peru reports 153 presently enrolled in theological education by extension classes, the source of trained leaders for the multiplying churches of the present and future. Bolivia Friends have enrolled 82 students in extension classes, while inaugurating a new San Pablo Theological Seminary, an interdenominational school sponsored by four denominations and their churches. Ron Stansell has served as the director of this school with 16 of the students coming from the Friends churches.

Mission-INELA Relationships: In both fields—Bolivia and Peru—the relationship between the mission and the established church is excellent. The missionaries seek to cooperate with and assist the national church while studiously avoiding a dominant role as "organizational authorities." God has given a unity of the Spirit, and in this "bond of peace" the church has gone forward in tremendous strides.

Miracles in Mexico: God has done great things in Mexico City—a "numerical adult growth of about 100 percent this past year"; increasing spiritual maturity of the older believers with some personal involvement in evangelism; miraculous conversions of individuals with the consequent dramatic change in personal and domestic lives; and a spirit of hope and optimism for the future. With the anticipated growth within and cooperation of the Evangelical Friends Alliance, we expect great things for Mexico City this coming year.

Korean Church: Pastor Kim continues to minister most effectively to the Korean people of Portland, with a congregation of 71 people. This ministry includes "ship visiting," in which Korean sailors visiting the Port of Portland are ministered to both spiritually and socially by the church; a ministry of counsel and help to all Korean students possible; and a pastoral ministry to the growing group of Korean residents in the Greater Portland area.

Friends Missionary Literature Service: Ralph Chapman continues his ministry of writing programmed textbooks in Spanish, supplying the rapidly increasing demand for literature on our fields, and giving valuable counsel to the board in a variety of concerns. FMLS has furnished almost 75,000

pieces of literature for the fields this year. This literature has figured prominently in the new surge of church growth in Peru and promises to be a continuing word of hope for thousands of Aymaras.

Yearly Meeting Board of Missions: The Yearly Meeting has responded well to the work of missions giving \$103,239.07 to our Friends mission work and over \$35,000 to mission work in general. The work of the WMU, the leadership of pastors, and the spiritual concern of each congregation encourage the missionaries and the Board of Missions. The board has met three different times this year, with the Administrative Committee meeting on numerous occasions. The efforts of the Yearly Meeting office in the person of John Fankhauser deserve special commendation for the generous spirit of sacrifice, hard work, and concern. Our missionaries—Ron and Carolyn Stansell, Quentin and Florene Nordyke, Harold and Nancy Thomas, and Gene and Betty Comfort (on furlough) in Bolivia; Duane and Sherrill Comfort, Ed and Marie Cammack, Mary Bel Cammack, Barbara Morse, and Nick and Alice Maurer (on furlough) in Peru; Pastor Kwan Kyu Kim of Portland; Roscoe and Tina Knight of Mexico City; and Ralph Chapman in Friends Missionary Literature Service all deserve our special recognition and thanks to God. They have been greatly used as a team in the Holy Spirit.

A great door has been opened to us in each of our fields. The work is moving forward rapidly. We could well be on the verge of phenomenal church growth. Let us as a Yearly Meeting continue to *pray, give, and send*. The harvest truly is plenteous! Christ is building His church! Let us thank God for His works!

■ 89. The report of the Church Music Committee submitted by Joseph E. Gilmore, chairman, was presented as follows:

Based on the information reported from 38 churches, we are pleased to report that there are at least 25 choirs in the churches, 17 of which sing on a regular basis. This is an increase in musical activity over last year, a trend we hope to see continue.

Our committee this past year helped to sponsor two choir festivals, one at Reedwood with eight churches participating and one at Star with six churches. These were both highly successful and showed an increase in participation of ten choirs over the previous year.

The Songwriting Contest was held again this year with 21 entries being received. The winners are as follows:

Music Committee goals for 1973-74, as set forth by the committee, are:

1. Continuation of the choir festivals in the Newberg-Portland and Boise Valley Areas and added festivals in the Puget Sound, Inland, and Salem Areas.

2. A Yearly Meeting Talent Contest with each area holding a preliminary contest in April or May and the finals scheduled for Yearly Meeting time.

3. Some sort of musicians newsletter or a column in the *Evangelical Friend* to encourage and give help and ideas to our church musicians.

4. Music Month activities in the form of suggested musical worship services and perhaps even a newly-composed hymn that all our congregations could use on the same Sunday during the month of March.

5. General encouragement to individual churches in their use of music and in their musical programs. We would like to see as many churches as possible move toward the establishment of a graded choir program, realizing that in order to build a good tradition in music in our churches we must begin by training the children.

Approved.

■ 90. The representatives nominated the following persons to serve on the Music Committee for three-year terms: Dennis Hagen, Marilyn Antrim, Martha Beck, Esther May Thomas, Philip R. Morrill.

Approved.

■ 91. Dorwin Smith presented a report of actions and decisions made by the Executive Council during the past year. This is being presented as itemized statements and not as a written essay report.

Your Executive Council has taken the following actions at a called session on November 8, 1972:

1. A resolution from the Board of Evangelism was approved to enable the Kent Friends Church to borrow money for the building of their new church.

2. The trustees were asked to make a study to determine how much of the indebtedness on local church properties the Yearly Meeting might be considered liable for.

The following are actions that were taken by your Executive Council at the midyear meeting in February 1973:

1. Frank Cole was appointed legal representative for the State of Oregon to replace Arthur Winters.

2. Due to an oversight at Yearly Meeting last year, Eldon Helm was appointed by the Executive Council to the EFA Social Concerns Commission.

3. A Faith and Life Conference with North Pacific Yearly Meeting was approved. The dates for this meeting have been set for October 12, 13, 14 at Camp Tilikum with 10 conferees being appointed from each yearly meeting. Your Executive Council is following through on the details.

4. Approval was given to a resolution for the Sherwood church to arrange refinancing with the Benj Franklin Savings and Loan Association, making it possible to finance the building of their new parsonage. This was not to exceed \$20,000.

6. A new policy was adopted regarding traveling expense incurred when board members go to local churches to speak, hold workshops, etc. It was recommended by the Administrative Committee that board members

and board-sponsored consultants who visit local churches should be reimbursed out of funds from their board askings for travel. Boards should anticipate needs for travel budget. The church being visited should take an offering for that fund, and travelers by private auto should be paid 10 cents per mile. Yearly Meeting headquarters staff would not require offerings for their visits.

7. A communication came to the Executive Council to appropriate adequate funds to support Northwest Yearly Meeting participation in conferences among Friends aimed at bringing higher level of unity, that any national conference of Quakers include women and young Friends as participants, and we encourage our Yearly Meeting to take leadership in the Friends movement worldwide. It was concluded that we can send representatives as we are able to world Friends conferences as observers but not as delegates. It was suggested representatives be sent to the FWCC Triennial Conference at Sydney, Australia, with funds being raised by designated gifts.

8. It was suggested that a study be made of fire insurance rates for Yearly Meeting churches. This was referred to the trustees.

To the best of my knowledge this reports the action of your Executive Council with the exception of matters that will be brought directly to the floor of the Yearly Meeting for consideration.

■ 93. State of the Church reports were read from Greenleaf, Newberg, Salem, and Southwest Washington Areas, and from Reedwood church, Portland Area, and Spokane church of the Inland Area. Following is a summary of these reports:

In general with few exceptions the churches have seen growth this past church year. Souls have been won and membership increased.

Some stress a new awareness of spiritual gifts. All express appreciation of pastoral leadership. The increases in service seeking to alleviate human needs, together with meeting spiritual needs, have been outstanding.

Churches are implementing their former traditional forms of service with home Bible studies, coffee house ministries, group prayer meetings, shepherding programs, Lay Witness Missions, Key 73 cooperation, nursing home ministries—all these and others to minister to the whole man and win souls to Christ.

A number of churches are enthusiastic over the activities and spiritual progress of their youth.

The doctrine of Friends is emphasized as a scriptural message.

While the church may seem to be in a transitional period, it is evident that God is blessing, and His Spirit is leading on.

■ 94. The representatives presented the following nominations to the Board of Trustees: for five years—George B. Palmer; for four years—Brian Beals.

■ 95. The representatives nominated George B. Palmer to serve for two years on the Pension Committee.

■ 96. The representatives nominated Paul Mills to serve on the Ecumenical Relations Committee for a three-year term.

■ 97. The representatives nominated Clynton Crisman for a two-year term on the Board of Christian Education.

Approved.

■ 98. The representatives nominated Dean Repp for a three-year term on the Board of Finance.

Approved.

■ 99. The representatives presented the following nominations for three-year terms on the Epistle Committee: Cornelia Holmes, Phyllis Cammack.

Approved.

■ 100. The representatives nominated the following persons for one-year terms on the Auditing Committee: Don Millage, chairman; Wayne Antrim, Michael Emert.

Approved.

■ 101. Those who have participated as caretakers for the 1973 sessions have been Ellouise Chandler, Alice Maurer, Mary Meireis, Virginia Millage, Marilyn Richey, Linnea Stahlnecker, and Kathryn Eichenberger, chairman.

Approved, and applause was given in appreciation for the diligent work of the caretakers during these sessions.

■ 102. Appreciation was expressed by Meredith Morse for the work of the Board of Christian Education and especially their work with the Junior Yearly Meeting during the week. It has been a vital work and loved by the children.

■ 103. Epistles received during the past year came from 32 yearly meetings, with 15 coming from foreign countries. Among these were Central America, Ireland, London, Australia, Canada, New Zealand, Norway, Japan, Germany, France, Denmark, Near East, Netherlands, and Jamaica.

Friends in *Ireland* wrote: This is the fifth year that we have met in the shadow of violence in North Ireland and all the sorrow and distress that this has brought. We have considered in what ways we can support and further the constructive efforts of all sections of the community that continue quietly behind the violent scenes reported by the news media.

In the epistle from *Near East Yearly Meeting* the Ramallah Boys School was mentioned and the robbery that had taken place. A tragic situation prevails in the entire area. The epistle from *Central America Yearly Meeting* at Chiquimula expressed a keen desire, for their greatest concern was the salvation of souls and the baptism of believers with the Holy Spirit. *Central Yearly Meeting* had been inspired to take positive action to sponsor a work among the American Indians.

Norway Yearly Meeting stated that George Fox saw an ocean of darkness but he also saw an ocean of light that prevailed over the darkness. *Germany Yearly Meeting* declared that we can see and experience God best when we go back to Jesus.

Indiana Yearly Meeting has used "Communicating Christ to the World" as the central theme of their 152nd sessions. *Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region* stated: "We feel an urgency to do something more vital to meet the need of our inner cities with a definite evangelistic and social program. Recognizing that youth normally make their important decisions within the peer group, we are enlarging our church camp programs."

Friends in other parts of the world are concerned with some of the inequities that exist in society: the unequal distribution of natural resources, wealth for some but poverty for others, the ravages of war felt by so many. They ask how Friends, who seek the uncluttered way of life, can speak to these conditions.

From the human standpoint there seems to be no easy answer to these problems. One is driven to the only place where help is available, to God's Word, where Christ declares, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you."

- 104. The following epistle, to be sent to other yearly meetings, was read:

Greetings to all faithful Christian Friends throughout the world:

Northwest Yearly Meeting opened its 81st session with singing,

We are one in the Spirit, We are one in the Lord.

We will walk with each other, We will walk hand in hand.

We will work with each other, We will work side by side.

All praise to the Father from whom all blessings come.

All praise to Christ Jesus, His only Son,

And all praise to the Spirit who makes us one.

In the intercessory prayer of Jesus, He prayed, "I am not praying for these alone but also for the future believers who will come to me . . . My prayer for all is that they will be of one heart and mind . . . and the world will believe that you sent me."

The world will know we are Christians by our love. Behold, how they love one another!

In the keynote message of our general superintendent, Norval Hadley, he encouraged the church to a whole ministry by whole people to meet the needs of the whole man in the whole world.

In the Sermon on the Mount Jesus declared that if you want to be happy, enviably fortunate, spiritually prosperous, have God's favor, and if you want to see God, be pure in heart (Matthew 5:8 *Amplified Bible*). You become a whole person when the Holy Spirit, in response to your faith and complete commitment, cleanses your heart from sin and fills you with perfect love.

The world's clearest view of Jesus comes when they see Christians in fellowship together. The best way to introduce people to Jesus is to introduce them to Christians in unity. To fulfill God's commission to the church it must meet the physical, human, and social needs of the people. A noted Christian leader wrote, "The saddest fact in the church today is that the world is unimpressed with Christians." In Vietnam a patient in a hospital where Christians serve was impressed because he had clean sheets, his hair was combed; he knew someone cared. At that time a Vietnamese psychologist remarked, "I have watched these Christians [he was not one]; I have seen them when they pray for men who are about to lose their

breath. They act as though they would like to give them their own breath."

God uses the whole man to meet the needs of man in the whole world.

During the past year 500 people were won to Christ in our churches. For this we praise God. Our Yearly Meeting had a healthy growth in its membership, an increase in the number of Sunday morning worshipers, and a gain in Sunday school attendance. All this creates within us a gratitude to God for His blessings and causes to to gird ourselves anew for the year ahead. Over 30 new congregations have been started in Bolivia and Peru. This work is supported from our Unified Budget and supplemented from our Women's Missionary Union. A tent for evangelism was the project for the WMU banquet. Four hundred twenty-eight women brought their offerings; \$1,240 was the total.

George Fox College has just closed a momentous year. More than 174 youth were in attendance at our Yearly Meeting. Over 1,500 have attended our camps this year. Again, the children's yearly meeting enjoyed daily activities at nearby Camp Tilikum.

Our devotional leader, Verl D. Lindley from California Yearly Meeting, made it clear that "Christ Is the Answer." Our response to the question, What think ye of Christ? determines not only our happiness now but also our eternal destiny. Through him the Holy Spirit led us to new heights of joy, to a greater appreciation of the authenticity of the Scriptures, and to an extraordinary challenge to vital faith for life's impossibilities.

- 108. We deeply appreciate the facilities offered us this week by George Fox College. Special thanks is expressed to Robert Gilmore and the college for the public address system they have so efficiently made available to us for our 1973 Yearly Meeting sessions.

- 109. Dorwin Smith, outgoing clerk, expressed his appreciation for the help and cooperation of the Yearly Meeting during the 21 years (22 sessions) he has served as Yearly Meeting clerk. He gave his best wishes

and his assurance of his prayer and support as Richard Beebe takes over the reins as clerk.

■ 110. Richard Beebe responded with words of appreciation for Dorwin Smith in his example and leadership during these years.

He recapitulated the many new avenues of service and outreach that have been instituted during the past 21 years of Dorwin's service.

As Elisha accepted Elijah's mantel, so Richard Beebe accepts the position with trust for God's help and guidance.

■ 111. A number of members of the congregation expressed their sincere appreciation for Dorwin Smith's leadership and guidance as clerk during the past 21 years. A standing ovation was given, expressing to him our deep feeling of appreciation.

A strong vote of confidence was expressed to our new clerk, Richard Beebe.

Digest of Meetings of Ministry and Counsel

The Committee on Training and Recording of Ministers reported the recognition of Willard Mendenhall from Iowa Yearly Meeting, William D. Green, Evangelical Friends Church—Eastern Region, and Merle Green, Iowa Yearly Meeting, as ministers in Northwest Yearly Meeting. The Committee on Training and Recording of Ministers recommended the recording of Robert Schneiter, Hayden Lake, Idaho, as a minister of the Gospel in Northwest Yearly Meeting.

A special committee consisting of Myron Goldsmith, chairman; Dorothy Barratt, Gerald Dillon, and Lela Morrill, named one year ago to study various translations and paraphrases of the Scriptures, made the following report, which was approved by Ministry and Counsel:

At this time of many competing translations and paraphrases, the general recommendation of evangelical Christian scholarship is against authorizing any particular Bible.

Nevertheless, the immense popularity of paraphrases in thoroughly modern idiom is a testimony to the hunger of people for the Bible in the tongue they readily understand.

It is sometimes hard to distinguish between a translation and a paraphrase. A paraphrase may introduce considerable subjective opinion into the version that is not present in the original language. A version calling itself a translation may actually paraphrase quite arbitrarily in certain key passages. Also, a paraphrase may translate quite literally for a time.

Versions of the Bible that are produced by a committee of translators are usually the more dependable. Occasionally, what appears to be bias may appear in these nonetheless.

Every pastor should possess four or five good translations and several of the better paraphrases, such as the *Living Bible*, and use them in reading from the pulpit according to the suitability and clarity of the rendering of a given passage.

Since paraphrases sometimes depart considerably from literal translations of the original languages, we recommend they be used in comparison with such recent translations as the *New American Standard Bible*, the *Revised Standard Version*, or the *New English Bible*.

We recommend that for memorization purposes, translations of the Bible be used rather than paraphrases.

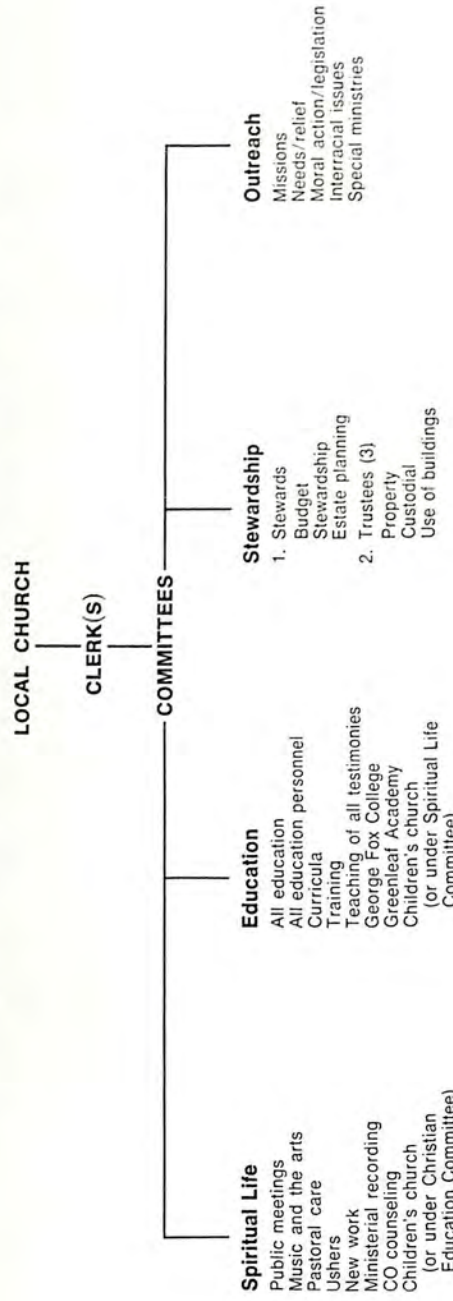

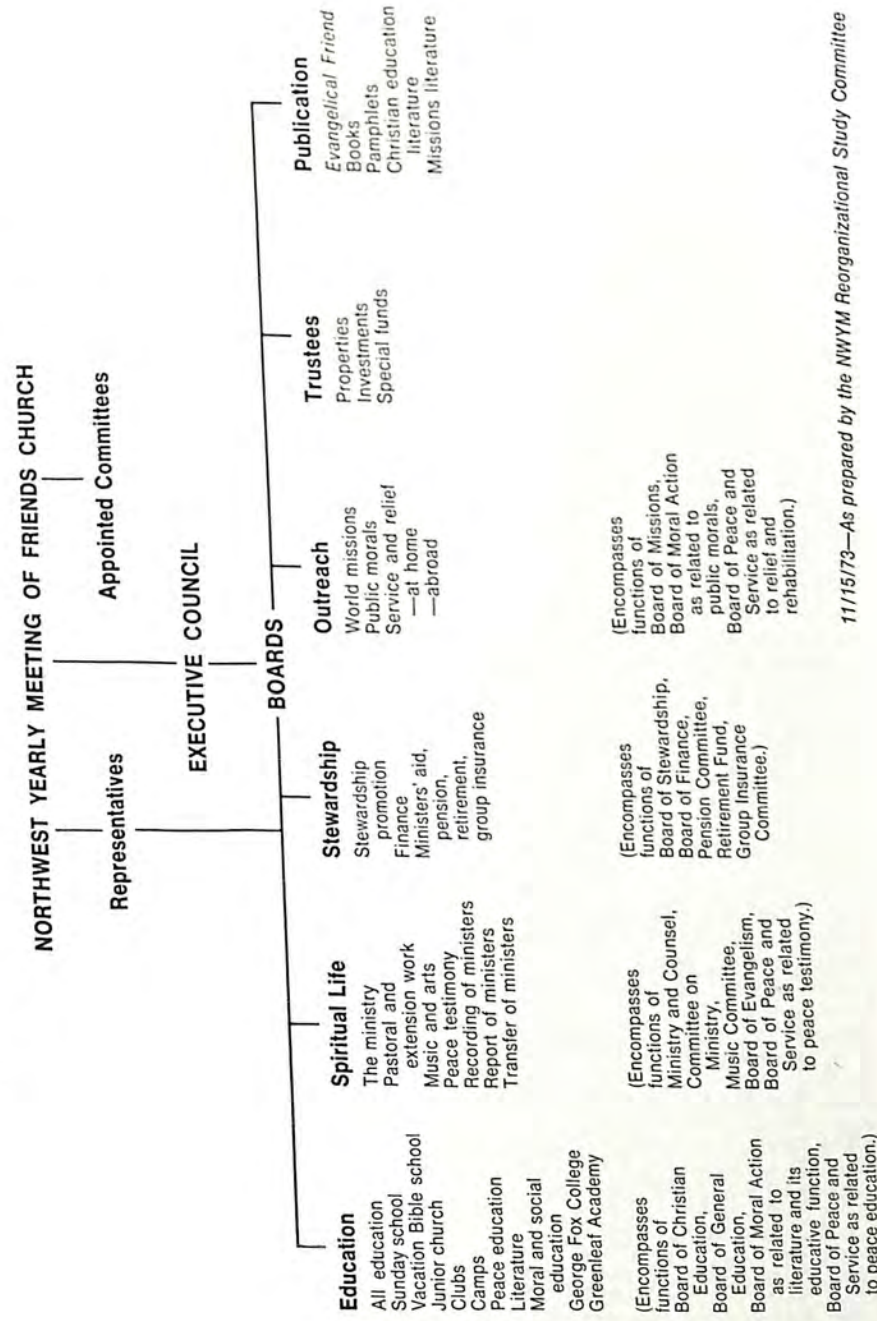
