The fact that it is new, and further that it is manned by our own workers would naturally call forth a generous response. But the fine wel-come accorded these workers by the native church, the splendid interest shown and the calls for extension could not but be a means of exciting a great degree of concern for the prosecution of the work. The program of exten-sion was undoubtedly generally and generously supported; a warmth of feel-ing was developed that augurs well for

the future of this work. The reports from the home field showed a splendid response to the financial appeals. The missionary program is well supported and will continue to awaken interest. The next feature of outstanding in-terest is the work of our band of con-secrated young people, not only those belonging to the Workers League who are consecrated to God for life service and who very naturally make a strong appeal, but those who are just as de-voted but who are called to secular as

are consecrated to God for life service and who very naturally make a strong appeal, but those who are just as de-voted but who are called to secular as well as ministerial service. There must be some to support those who devote to spiritual service exclusively their entire time. These must be included in our appreciation and of them we have a goodly rumber. Aggression must be, new fields must be opened, new meetings established and the work of the Gospel extended. For such a program these young people are splen-didly fitted. The Yearly Meeting will stand by them we do not doubt from the attitude taken. Other matters of interest might be mentioned, the regular lines of service which have occupied our attention for years, and to these the Yearly Meeting gives its attention as a matter of course. And perhaps too much so. They are taken for granted for the most part and consequently there is a danger that those at the head of these departments may feel that there is a lack of appreciation. These we have always with us and we pass them over hurriedly, not because we depreciate them, but because we assume that the work will progress without our giving any especial attention to them. But too much should not be assumed, there must needs be some manifestation of concern or we will fail to develop initia-tive and the work will lag. Those who have these responsibilities must be made to feel that we are whole-heart-edly back of them. Is it that we do not care? I hardly think so; it must be that we feel that the subject is sufficiently covered in other ways though the queries make in-quiries on matters touched upon in no other way. Here again too much may be taken for granted. The subjects presented are vital and should be taken into sufficient consideration to cause increased attention to their proper carrying on.

## A LETTER FROM OUR SUPERIN-TENDENT

To Oregon Yearly Meeting-Dear Friends:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting— Dear Friends: Many interesting things might be said about the recent Yearly Meeting, but this morning I am impressed that one or two important actions taken should be explained more fully. In a short time you will receive your min-utes and I urge you to read them carefully. Some very radical changes were made in some of our time hon-ored "traditions." Yearly Meeting Stock "Yearly Meeting Stock" received a severe jolt, and was sentenced to be executed at next Yearly Meeting. For those who have not liked that kind of "stock" it should be a source of com-fort to know that it will not be neces-sary to consider it as such any more. A proposition was presented to the Yearly Meeting from Newberg Quar-terly Meeting asking for a change in the present manner of raising our Year-ly Meeting money. It was referred to the Representatives for their consider-ation and they appointed a committee to formulate a plan in keeping with the request. After much consideration the committee presented a plan which was adopted by the Yearly Meeting and which becomes effective during this year in connection with the finances of next year. It is as follows: That this year the Quarterly Meet-ing treasurers and the Superintendent of the Evangelistic Board compose a committee that shall meet early in January of 1932 with the heads of every Department. These Department-al heads are to present their askings to the Quarterly Meeting treasurers and he Superintendent for their con-sideration. After passing upon the ask-ings the total amount will be forwarded to the monthly meetings for their con-sideration and voluntary pledges. When this information is received by the Superintendent, he is to inform the various Boards of the response and they are to gage their work in ac-cordance with the returns. After this year there will be a per-manent Finance Committee which will function in the place of the Superin-tures. A study of this change will show at once that the order of procedure is re-

urers.

A study of this change will show at once that the order of procedure is re-versed. Instead of the Yearly Meet-ing telling the Quarterly Meetings what their monthly meetings should raise, the monthly meetings will tell the Yearly Meeting what they will do

in the matter. The responsibility of the work rests on the monthly meet-ings. If their vision of the program is high enough and their interest deep enough, there will be little difficulty; if on the other hand they fail to share the concern of the departments and "lay down" on the job, the entire pr gram will suffer.

In order to keep this plan in suc-cessful operation the Yearly Meeting must have a vital and challenging program, it must have objectives in each department that will appeal. Pray department that will appeal. Fray much that this change will be honored of the Lord and that it will afford the relief that seemed to be desired on the part of those requesting it.

Now a word as to the program for this year. Yearly Meeting Stock will have to be considered this year and it is vital to the success of the work that we bring up our back Stock. The askings of the Evangelistic Board is askings of the Evangelistic Board is not enough to carry on its work and it is depending on the payment of the back portion of the assessment to each monthly meeting to supplement the ap-propriation. So the Superintendent will visit each meeting again this year in the interest of the Board and will urge that this obligation be met. At the same time he will explain the new plan and set it up for next year's operation.

### Our Missionary Program

Another important action was the ap-proval of the recommendation of the Missionary Board which asked for the privilege of raising \$4000 or more for their work this year. The expansion of our fields in Bolivia is imperative and of our fields in Bolivia is imperative and to meet this demand the committee felt that nothing short of that amount, would be adequate. Above this amount of \$4000 the C. E. will raise their \$300 and the Central America native church will add their portion of their receipts and we carried a cash balance of \$469 over from last year. This will of \$469 over from last year. This will give us total resources of \$4769 or more against a needed \$5000, leaving us to raise from two to three hundred dollars beyond our asking of the Yearly Meeting and our outside resources. This amount should come easy for everyone present at Yearly Meeting on Mission-ary Day remembers the high peak of vision which we received when we heard Carroll's report of the work and its needs. Among the items which were included in the budget this year were included in the badget this year were two things that might be made the objectives of any monthly meet-ing. The motorcycle and side car at an estimated cost of \$300 might easily be underwritten by some meeting or class. If we could feel sure about this and go ahead and secure it and send it on so that they could have the benefit of it at once, what a pleasure it would be! Pray about it and let us know at once whether you can help on

it. The printing press estimated to cost \$100 is another needed item. Informa-tion about the field is necessary in order to keep up the interest; this amount should be very easy for a class to undertake. Remember if you do decide to do this SEND YOUR MONEY THROUGH YOUR REGULAR CHAN-NEL for it is a part of our regular budget and your meeting will receive credit for your gift.

Our hearts should rejoice in this op-portunity. God has been good to Oregon Yearly Meeting. Let us respond to His goodness. Precious souls in Bolivia are waiting for us to act; will we fail? No! But rather we will do "abundantly' Amen.

With Chester A. Hadley leading, the Yearly Meeting as a body stood to pledge its support to these God-called young people. With freedom and marked blessing a liberal offering was given to the League work. A high peak of vision! Yes, but the
