MINUTES Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church 2003

Monday, July 21, 8:15 a.m.

■ 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church convened its 111th annual sessions on Saturday, July 19, on the campus of George Fox University with the meeting of the Council of Representatives. The theme for this year's sessions is "In Christ we who are many, form one body" Romans 12:5.

■ 2. Mauri Macy opened the session on Monday morning with singing. Bruce Bishop, field secretary for leadership development, led us in a reflective reading of our seven Core Values: 1) Jesus Christ is present; 2) Scripture calls us to account and helps us know God's will; 3) God is the source of life, and all human life is sacred; 4) The Holy Spirit transforms and empowers us; 5) We are called to be and to make followers of Christ; 6) We are called to live out Christ's love; and 7) We are called to be agents of God's peace and love to everyone. We will use these statements throughout the week as we meet together for worship and business. Bruce then shared suggestions and language for us to use as we practice group spiritual discernment and consensus together this week.

3. The representatives who were not present on Saturday were seated.

■ 4. Mark Ankeny, presiding clerk, opened the business session. He called for visitors to be introduced. Nancy Yarnall, from Corvallis, Oregon, of Friends World Committee on Consultation (FWCC), was recognized. Margaret Fraser, from Philadelphia Yearly Meeting and Executive Secretary of FWCC Section of the Americas, gave greetings. Greetings were also received from Melissa Elliott, Chestnut Hill Meeting in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on behalf of American Friends Service Committee and Steve Spyker from Richmond, Indiana, on behalf of Earlham School of Religion.

■ 5. ■ 7. Mark Ankeny announced that the minutes from each day would be made available at the back table. The expected agenda for the week discussed by the Council of Representatives on Saturday was distributed. Mark affirmed the Ministry Fair, including "The Hoot!" sponsored by the Commission on Fine Arts and the silent and oral auctions put on by the Commission on Family Life. The auction proceeds go to the Richard Beebe Memorial Pastoral Counseling Fund, which is used to help with counseling services for those in ministry in our yearly meeting. Individual contributions to the memorial fund are encouraged. Mark also affirmed Sunday's Mission Rally and our evening service of celebration last night and the message brought by Joe Gerick. Mark Ankeny expressed thanks to all of those who worked behind the scenes to make the weekend events meaningful for all of us.

■ 8. Mark Ankeny reported on the business conducted by the Council of Representatives on Saturday. The Nominating Committee report for the Council of Representatives, Leann Williams, Clerk, is as follows: Officers:

mittee would be working throughout the week to fill the open positions and that the committee would report later in the week.

9. Lon Fendall, assistant presiding clerk, reported on the result of the Council of Representatives' extended discussion of the request from Hayden Lake Friends Church that we in some way add the word "evangelical" to the our yearly meeting name. 1) We all agree that the work of the church is to invite people into relationship with Jesus Christ. As such we are Friends of Jesus. 2) Affirmed Hayden Lake Friends in bringing this concern to our attention. Many entered into the discussion of how to represent ourselves to others in the world and affirmed the use of the term "evangelical" in Hayden Lake Friends name. The Council of Representatives approved a plan to facilitate the discussion of this issue in a number of ways, but not to place it on the business agenda this week. The representatives from Hayden Lake Friends made it clear that they did not expect immediate action, but they wanted to foster discussion about our corporate identity. 3) Many affirmed that a word does not accurately describe who we are, rather it is our actions that represent Christ to the world and to one another. However, there is a desire to discuss more openly the question, "How do we express who we are?" Thus, there will be a meeting at 3:00 on Wednesday afternoon in Bauman Auditorium to discuss more fully how we can better communicate to others what it means to be the people of God.

10. Ron Mulkey, a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.

■ 11. David Hampton, Yearly Meeting treasurer, presented the financial summary for the year 2002. He also provided information regarding the income and expenses of the Yearly Meeting sessions. Detailed information packets were made available.

■ 12. The report of the Council of Elders was given by Clerk Dave Woolsey. He is thankful for the good news that has been reported this year. The Council of Elders will be working to fulfill the charge given them in the *Faith and Practice* to reflect prayerfully about the needs of the churches and the Yearly Meeting. Dave challenged us to consider the following questions for all aspects of the work of our churches: 1) "Is what we're about to discuss right now worth the death of Jesus on the cross? 2) Did Jesus die on the cross so that we could be this kind of church?" He concluded by encouraging us to find out what God is doing and to join in. Mark Ankeny followed this report by providing individuals an opportunity to share more of the good news that is happening in our yearly meeting.

13. Mauri Macy led us in song to close this session at 10:00 a.m.

Monday, July 21, 10:30 a.m.

■ 14. The meeting opened with singing.

■ 15. Alivia Biko, clerk of the Commission on Fine Arts, introduced Aletha McKennon and Virgil Voth who presented a "Lifetime Service Recognition" plaque to Herschel and Esther Thornburg, thanking them for their many years in evangelistic ministry.

■ 16. Garth Mickelson, a candidate for recording as a minister, gave his testimony.

■ 17. Mark Ankeny presented the work of the NYWM Structure and Review Task Force that was formed as a result of concerns expressed during our 2002 Yearly Meeting sessions. On February 8, 2003, an initial report from this task force was presented to the Executive Council. The Executive Council responded to the report with the following minute read to the business meeting by Mark Ankeny:

The Executive Council has received and discussed the summary of the responses from the NWYM Structure and Leadership Task Force. It is clear that major issues regarding staff assignments for 2003-2004 need to be addressed in the context of budgetary concerns. The Executive Council has asked the task force to continue studying those issues and consult with the Yearly Meeting staff during March 2003. The task force will present its recommendations to a called meeting of the Executive Council on April 5. Included in that recommendation will be a proposed action regarding Joe Gerick's ministry within NWYM for 2003-2004.

Meanwhile, the Executive Council recommends to Northwest Yearly Meeting members that Joe Gerick's call as general superintendent not be extended beyond June 30, 2004. Presiding Clerk Mark Ankeny met with the Yearly Meeting staff members on Monday, February 10, clarifying the Executive Council's actions.

As a result of this action by the Executive Council, Joe Gerick wrote a letter of resignation on May 16, 2003; resignation effective June 30, 2004. The task force report that the Executive Council approved at a called meeting on April 5, 2003, was presented by Mark Ankeny. The report includes a ministry plan for 2003-2004.

■ 18. As part of this discussion regarding the ministry plan, Lon Fendall read the following minute approved by the Executive Council on February 8, 2003: Upon recommendation from Joe Gerick, the Executive Council of Northwest Yearly Meeting recommends that Paul Bock's appointment as youth superintendent be extended through June 30, 2005. Approved.

■ 19. A significant amount of time was taken for questions and concerns. Several spoke to the concern regarding the impact of the 2003-2004 ministry plan on our ministry to children and youth. These ministry changes for the next church year are the result of working to balance the budget. Mark expressed that the Executive Council has the same concerns and encouraged us to pray and think about our priorities. We will wait to approve this plan until after we have approved the 2004 budget.

■ 20. We closed this session with the song, "I'm Gonna Live So God Can Use Me."

Tuesday, July 22, 8:15 a.m.

■ 21. The session opened with singing led by Mauri Macy. Lynn Clouser Holt, a member of the worship and business planning team, read the last four Core Values (included in Addendum) with a time of quiet between each one as we worshipped and prepared for business. This was followed by Lynn teaching on finding the mind of Christ as we make decisions using group discernment.

■ 22. Representatives who were not present on Saturday or Monday were seated.

■ 23. Richard Sartwell, director of Friends Center at George Fox Evangelical Seminary, shared his passion for the work he began in January 2003. Richard reminded us that the formal education and training of ministry leaders combined with a personal experience with Christ is a powerful tool in the spreading of the Gospel. (The Friends Center Board report is in the Addendum.)

■ 24. Clerk Mark Ankeny reported that the Executive Council approved the Communications Commission recommendations for representatives to the Friends World Committee on Consultation (FWCC). The following will represent NWYM at FWCC – Section of the Americas: Sharon Hayden, Kayla Walker, Anna Baker, Patti Federighi, Arthur Roberts, and Fern Roberts. The first four people will also serve as representatives at the Triennial Session in New Zealand in January of 2004. Representatives are responsible for all of their expenses to attend the gatherings, but there will be a designated fund for anyone to make contributions toward those costs.

■ 25. Assistant Clerk Lon Fendall will chair the Search Committee for General Superintendent of Northwest Yearly Meeting. He presented the proposed plan for the search process. The committee will have seven members including Lon. He called us all to prayer and emphasized the searching aspect of the work to be done by the committee. The plan was approved.

■ 26. Assistant Clerk Lon Fendall presented a recommendation from the Executive Council that a change to the *Faith and Practice* be made regarding the length of appointment for the general superintendent. The essence of the change is to move from a two- to three-year appointment with the consideration of extending the call being made every two years. Several suggestions were made regarding the specific wording of the proposed change to the *Faith and Practice* and the Executive Council will incorporate those changes into a revised draft.

■ 27. Ron Stansell, clerk of the Board of Missions, highlighted some of the significant connections that exist within our affiliation with Evangelical Friends International as we do ministry together. He reminded us that we have three approaches for financially supporting our mission efforts: 1) Great Commission giving by local meetings, 2) missionaries raising portions of own support, and 3) direct designated giving to the Yearly Meeting. The most recent missionary appointees are being asked to raise 75% of their support through shares due to reductions in the Great Commission budget. Ron clarified that we have not severed our ties with Bolivia and Peru and continue to be in contact with those yearly meetings. (The full report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 28. Clerk Mark Ankeny had us close the session with an affirmation of one another by offering a handshake or a hug.

Tuesday, July 22, 10:30 a.m.

■ 29. The session opened with a time of singing led by Mauri Macy. Lynn Clouser Holt read a scripture passage from the book of John, which was followed by more singing and a time of quiet reflection.

■ 30. Ron Stansell, EFI Council director, gave the report for the Evangelical Friends International Council. We are one of six yearly meetings that make up EFI/North America. The triennial meeting of EFI/Latin America took place in July 2003, in Santa Cruz, Bolivia, with 370 pastors in attendance and approximately 500 attending the evening sessions. Ron talked about the large numbers

of international Friends and that North America is clearly in the minority and represents just a small portion of Evangelical Friends around the world.

■ 31. The Epistle Committee's written summary of epistles sent to us during 2003 from other yearly meetings around the world was distributed.

■ 32. David Hampton, Yearly Meeting treasurer, presented the proposed Great Commission Budget for 2004 in the amount of \$619,800. He began by presenting comparison data from 1996 through 2002 which shows the decline of general fund giving at the local level when adjusted for inflation. The percentage of local meeting general fund giving to the Yearly Meeting Great Commission Budget has decreased from 12.2% to 10.8%.

David clarified that the \$10,000 for the Friends Center is money reallocated from the Board of Education. Concern for the loss of youth and children ministry positions continued to be expressed. Discussion and concerns focused on restricted funds that are not reflected in the Great Commission Budget. Details regarding restricted fund spending are reported in the addendum.

Clerk Mark Ankeny discerned that we are not ready to make a decision on the budget and called us all to prayer as we hold this decision over to tomorrow.

■ 33. We adjourned with the singing of "Great is Thy Faithfulness."

Wednesday, July 23, 8:15 a.m.

■ 34. Mauri Macy opened the session by leading us in song. Bruce Bishop followed this by reading passages from the Bible where Jesus described himself. Many spoke out of the silence in response to the Scriptures. Bruce then taught briefly on how we listen to each other as we do business.

■ 35. Clerk Mark Ankeny gave a summary of the budget process and shared that even though positions are being cut, the proposed budget still provides support for the youth and children's programs. He then allowed time for individuals to respond to the same budget that was presented yesterday in the amount of \$619,800. After many shared the challenges of this difficult decision the Clerk requested a time of quiet before calling for approval. The 2004 Great Commission Budget was approved.

■ 36. David Brandt, president of George Fox University, reported for the university. Board members in attendance were asked to stand. He introduced Kent Thornburg, chairman of the Board of Trustees, Robin Baker, provost, Dana Miller, vice president for marketing and advancement, and Mike Goins, vice president for financial affairs. A pictorial presentation was shown depicting undergraduate student life at George Fox University. President Brandt highlighted the annual Serve Day held in September, Christian Emphasis Week, Quaker Heritage Week, and the faculty attention to both scholarship and teaching. (A written report is included in the Addendum.)

■ 37. Phil McLain, coclerk of the Commission on Family Life, showed clips from the videos "I Do" and "Bringing Up Boys" to highlight the resource library available to local churches. He then read the list of couples the commission was aware of who have celebrated their 50th anniversary since our last Yearly Meeting sessions: Vern and Ellen Martin, Ralph and Wanda Beebe, and Dick and Kathryn Eichenberger. Couples who were in attendance came forward and Phil offered a prayer for them. They were presented with cards and flowers.

Wednesday, July 23, 10:30 a.m.

■ 38. After a break, Mauri Macy led us in singing. Bruce Bishop welcomed Youth Yearly Meeting to this session. He then read through our seven Core Values and asked us to spend time in prayerful reflection. He directed us to think about which of the values God is bringing to our attention and prompted us to share that value with a neighbor. Bruce then talked about discernment and stated that a discernment packet to help individuals grow in their awareness of how God speaks to them is available.

■ 39. Arden Kinser, clerk of the Board of Evangelism, gave a report. This was followed by brief reports from Bruce Bishop, field secretary for Leadership Development and Harold Behr, director of New Works. Harold defined a "New Work" as a new meeting gathered to worship. He reported that there are currently 34 different worship groups. Only two have leaders that are not required to fully support themselves financially as tentmakers. (Report is in the addendum)

■ 40. Paul Bock, youth superintendent, gave his report. Paul reported that the YCEW (Youth Challenged to Expand their Worldview) trip to Russia went very well and was grateful for the financial support that poured in for the youth for this experience. He announced that a Young Adult Friends Executive Committee (YAF Exec.) has been formed. Paul explained that the Youth Department has worked hard to plan how to move forward with the loss of the youth program coordinator position. The Youth Department created a new job description for the youth workers who have approached him and volunteered to help him as his responsibilities grow. Paul concluded his remarks with expressions of deep gratitude for the four years he has worked with Sheila Hoyer, youth program coordinator. The youth had opportunity to share tributes to Sheila last night. Her heart for youth and young adults has been evident in her work and Paul has felt honored and blessed by her.

■ 41. The officers of Youth Yearly Meeting for the current year and the coming year introduced themselves. The officers for the coming year are: Senior High: Presiding Clerk—Laura Fodge; Assistant Presiding Clerk—Anna Knierim; Recording Clerk—Aimee Jury; Conference Coordinator—Gabriel Goecks; Youth Representative—Jesse Lamm. Junior High: Presiding Clerk—Della Anderson; Assistant Presiding Clerk—Ethan McCracken; Recording Clerk—Rachel Cox; Conference Coordinator—Aaron Comfort. They also read the epistles they had prepared:

Becca Roberts read the following minute from the junior high youth:

We as junior high youth have been considering the peace stance during the past couple days of Youth Yearly Meeting 2003. As we work through this issue, we considered the following: Although we realize that conflict is inevitable, we strive to find godly solutions to life's difficult situations. We feel called to respect our leaders, as we exercise our freedom to our own opinion. As we continue to explore this issue, it is imperative that we remain, in the words of Bill Jolliff, "in an attitude of love and humility always."

Greetings!

Northwest Yearly Meeting met for the 111th year. We came together at George Fox University in Newberg, Oregon, on Saturday, July 19, 2003. That evening we drove to Camp Tilikum, where we ate an awesome barbeque. From there we got into family groups which are used for open discussion on workshops and such.

Sunday morning the youth, as well as some adults, attended Newberg Friends Church. As the message unfolded we found that the Bible stresses making others more important than yourself. Philippians 2:1-11.

Monday the junior high did a service project for Friendsview Manor (a retirement home). We did a car wash and raised \$253.00 for the health facility of the Manor. We also collected pop cans and made about \$18.00 in that.

On Tuesday we appointed the officers for the next year. We were undecided for the Recording Clerk and brought it up again in Wednesday's business meeting. During the evening service on Wednesday the youth led, focusing on putting others before yourself. We also heard personal testimonies. After the service we loaded up for the beach.

Friends around the world,

Hello from Northwest Yearly Meeting! This year, as always, we have come together on the campus of George Fox University in Newberg, Oregon. This week is an important one for many of the youth here. It represents the opportunity to see God's leading in our peers and in ourselves. Our theme for the sessions this year was, "In Christ, we who are many... form one body" Romans 25:5. The evening services are based around this. Speakers such as Joe Gerick, Shawn McConaughey, Arthur Roberts, Bob Schnieter and Jan Wood led us in thinking about what our part was in the body of this Yearly Meeting, and how important every single part is.

As many years before this one, the youth hosted an Ice Cream Social. It is an awesome way to draw in both youth and adults to get to know one another over an ice cream bar and a game of NWYM bingo. Also this gets the youth familiar with faces they will see in adult workshops and business meetings soon to come.

This summer a ministry team, YCEW (Youth Challenged to Expand their Worldview), was sent to Russia on a short-term missions trip. They were anxious to share with us what God has been doing over in Russia. YC teams share at Yearly Meeting in hopes to spark interest and to let kids in on how amazing these ministries are.

This year we also tried something new. We led a discussion based on the idea of the NWYM *Faith and Practice* statement and the Iraq war situation. We discussed where we, as youth, felt we were in all of this. With many different ideas and points of view, it was great to share our thoughts with one another knowing they were heard with trust and acceptance.

This year our service project was through Interfaith Volunteer Caregivers, a service providing volunteers to help people do yard work, laundry, dishes... and sometimes just someone to talk to. We split up and half of us went to Rex Hill to work on a nursery in need of some upkeep, and the other half went around the community to do some work in homes. We sweated, mowed, washed and clipped in God's name for the afternoon.

Following tradition, we headed out Wednesday after the evening service to spend the night at the beach and the next day there. This is our time to celebrate God's work in the week and our hard work in the business meetings. God is truly at work in the youth of NWYM.

In Christ, Assistant Presiding Clerk Haley Thornburg High School Youth Yearly Meeting ■ 42. Clerk Mark Ankeny asked that the proposed change to the *Faith and Prac*tice regarding the length of appointment for the general superintendent that was presented yesterday be considered a first reading and that tomorrow the updated proposal be presented as a second reading. Approved.

■ 43. Rachel Hampton, clerk of the Board of Peace of Social Concerns, gave a report. She gave examples of peace and social concern activities taking place at the local level. She reported that the annual Thanksgiving offering this year will go the Victory Center of Kelso, Washington. Victory Center recently opened under the leadership of Doug and Teri Moore of Rose Valley Friends Church with the desire to serve the many needs of the youth in that area.

■ 44. A proposed minute from the Board of Peace and Social Concerns was read by Assistant Clerk Lon Fendall: Christ our Lord and the whole spirit of the Gospel call us to live at peace with all people; therefore we consider war and violence incompatible with the holiness we profess. Because our national leaders continue to use war and other military action as a solution to conflict, we affirm our support for conscientious objection to war among members of this Yearly Meeting and in this country. We encourage each monthly meeting to provide information and spiritual guidance regarding conscientious objection to young people within their membership. In addition, we support the fundamental right of members of the military to have a change of heart and to seek an honorable discharge as a conscientious objector. Approved.

■ 45. We adjourned with a song led by Mauri Macy.

Thursday, July 24, 8:15 a.m.

■ 46. We opened the session with singing led by Mauri Macy. Bruce Bishop read the first four Core Values and invited us to stand and share ways in which we have seen any of those values come to life this week.

■ 47. Tom Stave, clerk of the Faith and Practice Revision Committee, brought updates on the work of the committee. The committee hopes to bring a first reading next year on revisions to the Historical Section. He presented for second reading on behalf of the Board of Ministerial Service revisions that creates three departments within the structure of that board (see minute 47 of 2002). The only change from the first reading is the underlined portion: Specific responsibilities may be assigned to subordinate departments as follows: Approved as second reading.

Tom then reported on the progress of changing the language about the area structure of our yearly meeting. They did do that, but felt it impacted other sections and did not feel clear to present a first reading. Instead, they propose meeting with someone from the original task force for area restructuring to work on some broader language and bring it back for a first reading next year. Approved.

The revised wording from the first reading on Tuesday (see minute 26) regarding the length of the appointment for the General Superintendent was presented as a second reading. After changing the word contract to appointment this was approved as second reading. ■ 48. Steve Gulley, chair of the Friendsview Manor Board, reported on the activities of the manor. The 14 million dollar expansion will increase the population of the facility to 340 residents. They are also renovating the original building. They are currently 100 percent full and plan to have everyone moved in to the new buildings by Thanksgiving. They have been working during the last five years to return to providing low-cost housing for retired Friends pastors and missionaries. They have established criteria for this program.

■ 49. Assistant Clerk Lon Fendall provided a summary of yesterday's forum that discussed questions around how we identify ourselves to each other and the world. The goal of the meeting was to listen to each other. Many spoke during the two-hour session to both issues around a name change for the Yearly Meeting as well as the broader discussion of how we live out our beliefs.

■ 50. Recording Clerk Don Staples summarized the Statistical Report. The full report appears in the Appendix of the Minutes.

■ 51. Ron Mulkey, clerk of the Board of Education and Youth, gave a report. The challenge for the Education Board is how to allocate the resources of time. He challenged us to use our resource of time to minister to children and youth. Ron invited all those interested in children's ministry to attend their fall retreat at Twin Rocks, November 21-23. In response to an expressed concern, Clerk Mark Ankeny announced that the desire to support youth programs will be sent to the Executive Council as they set priorities for future budgets.

■ 58. Mauri Macy led us in song. Bruce Bishop read the last three Core Values and encouraged us to think about how we have seen these at work this week.

■ 59. Caryl Menkhus, candidate for recording as a minister, gave her testimony.

■ 60. Assistant Clerk Lon Fendall asked that the qualities and experiences that we think would be appropriate for our next superintendent be submitted to the clerks. Names of potential candidates would also be welcome. Lon then presented the names for the general superintendent search committee. Bob Schneiter, Cleta Crisman, Ron Woodward, Lorraine Watson, Ken Beebe, Karen Folwell, with Lynn Clouser Holt as an alternate should anyone not be able to continue. He noted that these are Spirit-filled people who are good at listening and discerning. Approved.

■ 68. Jackie Hausinger presented the Epistle that is to be sent to other yearly meetings. This was approved with minor corrections.

To Friends Everywhere:

Greetings from the 111th sessions of Northwest Yearly Meeting gathered on the George Fox University campus in Newberg, Oregon, USA held July 19 - 25, 2003. "Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ!" (I Corinthians 1:3 NIV).

"In Christ, we who are many, form one Body." This quote from Romans 12:5 was our theme for the week. Shawn McConaughey, Jan Wood, Arthur Roberts, and Bob Schneiter each spoke on aspects of this theme. The uniqueness of our personality and call is designed to create a smoothly functioning incarnation of God's values on earth. We need each other. We need to each contribute to leading and following. We need to put aside anything that would hinder our obedience, both personally and corporately, to celebrate Christ's body and further discover how God wants to use us.

Joe Gerick, general superintendent of NWYM, gave our keynote address and spoke of all the good progress that has been made this year with Prayer and Healing workshops, "Alpha" groups, and the Journey to Wholeness. Then he opened the microphones so that any who wanted to give testimonies about what God has done in their lives could share, and it was a time of great joy as we were all able to celebrate the blessings and miracles.

Our meetings for worship and business were focused by considering our Core Values of the Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends' Community of Believers (adopted in 1998):

Jesus Christ is present Scripture calls us to account and helps us to know God's will God is the source of life, and all human life is sacred The Holy Spirit transforms and empowers us We are called to be and to make followers of Christ We are called to live out Christ's love We are called to be agents of God's peace and love to everyone

Challenges faced us as we looked at financial matters and realized that we cannot continue to fund worthwhile and valuable staff. Discussion was lively and it was very painful to realize that difficult economic times are causing meetings to be unable to cover their pledges to the Great Commission Budget of the YM, and the investments of the YM have lost value as well. We wrestled with the grim facts and can only pray for creative and new insights for God's leading as we pass through these difficult times that could bring serious division between Friends over funding priorities. It was helpful to consider queries put forward by the clerk of Elders in his report, as we struggled with unpleasant realities, "Is what we are about to discuss right now worth the death of Jesus on the cross?" and "Did Jesus die on the cross so that we could be this kind of church?"

We had a number of visitors this year, from FWCC: Nancy Yarnall, Western Field Staff and Margaret Fraser, executive secretary, Section of the Americas. Melissa Elliot from Chestnut Hill Meeting, Pennsylvania, represented AFSC. Steve Spyker, director of Information Technology for Earlham School of Religion, was here to answer questions. Vicki Hinshaw from Evangelical Friends Mission (EFM), and Mel and Sandy Harrold from Rough Rock, Arizona, who work with the Navajo spent the week and shared with us in workshops also.

In a spirit of thanksgiving, we heard the testimonies of three persons who have completed the recording process with the Board of Ministerial Service and recorded them as ministers of the Gospel: Caryl Menkhus, Garth Mickelson, and Ron Mulkey.

One hundred eighty-five children and youth attended our Yearly Meeting. Age appropriate programs were offered from nursery care through senior high school. Activities included worship, ecology classes, crafts, sports and leadership training. Tilikum Day Camp was used by the grade school groups. The junior and senior high school groups completed this week with an overnight trip to the Oregon beach.

We will be going through a year of transition with the resignation of General Superintendent Joe Gerick as of June 30, 2004. Joe's work among us has opened up new avenues of ministry during the past eleven years and he will be sorely missed. A search committee has been formed and an active search has begun for his replacement. Also this is the last year Mark Ankeny, our faithful presiding clerk of 14 years, will be serving in that position. Lon Fendall served as the assistant clerk during these sessions and will become the new presiding clerk.

Our missions rally inspired us with a parade of flags representing NWYM's wide outreach in proclaiming the Gospel of Christ through word and example in an ever-increasing number of countries. Along with English teachers abroad, Patrick and Christy Neifert were introduced as EFM missionary recruits preparing for service in Russia, administered by Northwest Yearly Meeting. Willard and Doris Ferguson, retiring EFM missionaries, were recognized for their 40 years of service in Burundi and Rwanda. We want to see the world as God sees

it and to meet needs to which He leads us. Scripture verses like Psalms 46:10 emphasize God's plan for the world as it reads, "Be still and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth." It is important that we not only proclaim this message at home but do our part to see that His name is exalted around the world as well.

New Works within our Yearly Meeting number 34 home meetings and increasing, operating from 16 New Works centers. The Lord is leading us away from the business model approach to a more organic process or "Simple Church." Growing these churches takes more time initially and we are following Paul as he followed Christ in tentmaking. (Most of our long-time established meetings were bi-vocational start-ups.)

Heartfelt sympathy goes out to all who have lost loved ones as a result of recent conflicts. This time of war has claimed many victims, those who suffer the wounds... and those who inflict them. There is not a single battlefield, but a multitude of war-torn peoples, longing for some hiding place from the violence and upheaval in their lives. As we read epistles from other yearly meetings, we see that all Friends are struggling to be faithful to our common peace testimony, trying to find ways to minister healing. A minute submitted by the Board of Peace and Social Concerns stating our position was approved and accompanies this epistle.

Our hearts were shocked and saddened by the unexpected passing of our Yearly Meeting Coordinator Lyle Wilson on Monday afternoon, July 21, in Bauman Auditorium building while attenders were at workshops elsewhere on campus. He was 66 years old and a faithful servant of our Lord. Along with many unsung projects of servanthood, Lyle and his wife, Naomi, have served as Yearly Meeting Coordinators since 1989. Lyle's love for Christ was exemplified in his friendly, constant, and unselfish personality. His memorial service was held on Thursday afternoon at Newberg Friends Church. We were reminded that this life can end suddenly for any of us, and we must make the most of our opportunities to share the love of Jesus, knowing that Lyle is included in the "great cloud of witnesses."

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the Author and Perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. Consider Him who endured such opposition from sinful men, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart." Hebrews 12:1-3 (NIV)

- Ministry that reflects a sensitivity to the culture around us that needs the Lord. This is seen in both New Works and some established churches.


Areas of concern:

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL EDUCATON

The department supervises educational assistance programs for Northwest Yearly Meeting. We currently have one student working on a master's level program. This year we also supported one person in his Doctor of Ministry program.

The department has developed programs for supporting continuing education for ministers, some requiring years of service before a pastor can access the funds. We are continuing the Sabbatical Assistance Program for the remainder of 2003 and all of 2004 (see below). We were happy to have one pastor in Northwest Yearly Meeting approved for this program last year. This pastor took extended time away to study and to reflect on the direction of his ministry.

Friends Center at George Fox Evangelical Seminary came into existence this year with the appointment of Richard Sartwell as director. We have provided monetary support to make this happen.

The Department of General Education feels that our efforts primarily support the Northwest Yearly Meeting core value that "We are to be and make followers of Christ." This is expressed through the work we do to assist people in exploring their leadings from God educationally. We also have experiential mentoring and training for those in ministry, as well as continuing education for pastors who have served in ministry in Northwest Yearly Meeting

Sabbatical Program 2003-2004

Requirements:

- The person applying must have served in the Friends ministry for a minimum of ten years and served in his/her current position for over five years.
- 2) A priority will be given to a person serving in a church with an average Sunday morning worship attendance under 200.
- 3) The person needs to write a proposal for a sabbatical that includes:
 - a) Description of your years of service in Friends ministry including the size of the church you currently serve.
 - b) A plan for study and explanation for how it will:
 - i) Benefit your current church
 - ii) Accomplish future ministry goals
 - iii) Enhance a ministry skill
 - c) A statement of total costs including training, travel, and increased living expense.
 - d) Letter of approval by your Meeting's elders supporting the training and their willingness to release you from your duties for a minimum of a month while continuing to pay your salary.
 - e) There should be aspects of study, reflection and growth that enhance your ability to serve as a pastor in NWYM. Examples include:
 - i) Trip abroad for study
 - ii) Retreat for reflection and personal study
 - iii) A conference or series of conferences

iv) A writing project

f) The money given must be placed in the church's 2003-2004 budget listed as "Pastoral Sabbatical Expenses" for the money given to the pastor and for the rest of the "Church Sabbatical Expenses." The pastoral expenses must be accounted for in writing, according to IRS rules, by the church's treasurer. A copy of the pastor's accounting needs to be sent to the department, along with a report on how the church used its expense money. All department money will be sent to the church at the end of 2003, with the church treasurer distributing the funds as needed.

Support:

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Local Church: \$750 to cover related costs while pastor is away.

Person: Up to \$2000 to cover cost of training

Application must be received by September 15, 2003. Selection will be made based on funds available at Department of General Education Fall Retreat.

DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH

Board of Evangelism

Ojibwe Church Plant During this last year we entered into a three-way support arrangement to release Bruce and Jewel Martin to do cross-cultural church planting among the Ojibwe Indians of Minnesota. Funds are now being provided by the Board of Missions, the Board of Evangelism and Evangelical Friends Missions.

These Native Americans have suffered the lack of many things – including evangelical ministry that is culturally sensitive to their people and way of life. We are grateful that God is providing such capable and passionate people like the Martins to pioneer this ministry to a people and area which has lacked a Friends witness.

Natural Church Development Many of you have heard about Natural Church Development. It has two components. It is an evaluation tool which helps each congregation evaluate their progress and health in eight facets of church life. Natural Church Development is also a process that aids each local church in planning for growth and improvement in at least one of those essential qualities.

This ministry of the Board of Evangelism is growing. It began with about three churches six years ago. Now we are close to having half our churches involved.

During this past year, Ron Woodward assumed responsibility for directing this ministry. If you are interested in Natural Church Development, please contact Ron Woodward. He, along with our new coaches, is taking Natural Church Development to a whole new level.

In the past we have been able to provide only limited support to our churches as they began to use this exceptional tool. It became clear to us how important it was to have resource people who could help our churches. Each group had questions about surveying their leaders, analyzing the survey results, developing helpful and Spirit-led goals for the next year, and evaluating what they had accomplished. We have also been impressed with the wisdom of having someone with both specific training and a fresh outside perspective to provide support to each local church. During this last year we sought out and provided training for five people to be coaches for our pastors and churches. They include: Jonathan Fodge, Gil and Louise George, Lynn Clouser Holt, and Ron Woodward. Gil and Louise have been supporting churches in Idaho. The rest are planning to help churches in Oregon and Washington. Please note in your programs that there are two seminars scheduled for this Yearly Meeting's sessions. The first is an introductory workshop. The second is devoted to developing teams of people in your local church who implement Natural church Development.

Friends Center Funding Request It has been a hope of many in our Yearly Meeting to establish a Friends Center within George Fox University. Our board was asked to consider helping fund the establishment of the Friends Center. We agreed to help fund this ministry of Northwest Yearly Meeting by contributing \$5,000 per year.

Funding Request for Yearly Meeting Retirement and Medical Programs The Board of Evangelism was asked during this year to help offset losses suffered by the Yearly Meeting retirement and medical insurance programs. We approved drawing on our ParkCenter funds for this purpose.

Rebirth of Churches through Church Planting Harold Behr has also been an invaluable resource in helping churches who find themselves at the end of a ministry cycle. He has helped them celebrate their ministries in years past and look with hope beyond their closure to new and exciting ministries. Two examples of the rebirth of new congregations are mentioned in Harold's report to you. They are New Life Friends in Vancouver and River of Life Friends in Post Falls. He has been working with another church to determine if this approach meets that church's assessment of their ministry situation.

Funding Reductions The Board of Evangelism has had to consider a number of budget reductions. Like other boards, our portion of the Great Commission Budget is modest compared to what we would like to do. The rest of our budget has been based on endowments which are market related. Probably everyone here has felt the impact of these market changes through shrinking retirement accounts and investment portfolios. Our board is moving toward a point where our church planters will have to be bi-vocational. We can no longer subsidize the start up salaries of our church planters.

This has forced changes in the way we place our church planters. It is also cause for adjustment in the way we launch these new ministries. Harold's report alludes to the "Organic" or "House Church" approach to church planting. I would encourage you to talk with him more about this exciting approach which we are employing along with many other church-planting denominations. It offers great potential for seeing the body of Christ expand infinitely while market performance is poor, or when real estate or church buildings are cost prohibitive.

Review of Board of Evangelism Ministries Let me briefly review some of the ministries sponsored in part or whole by the Board of Evangelism. These ministries were designed either to benefit each local church or to be an extension of the local church's ministry. Church planting falls into the latter category. It is through our combined efforts that we have been able to hire a director of church planting and see the establishment of these new works. Your church's contribution to the Great Commission Budget helps toward our efforts to plant new churches in communities that are under-churched and without a Friends' presence.

There are other ministries focused on helping your local church and pastor. The Sabbath Series Retreats are a way we invest in the spiritual life of the leaders of local churches. I have mentioned Natural Church Development as a wonderful tool and process devoted to helping each church become a healthy church. Bruce Bishop's work under the Board of Evangelism has produced a number of ministries which are meant to benefit each local church. He has offered discernment seminars designed to strengthen your congregation's ability to discern the desires and directions of God. This is a training event that helps you to discern God's movements in your life personally as well as teach leaders, clerks and congregations about being led by Christ as a congregation. Bruce has also designed and conducts a training event for worship leaders. Its aim is to help your worship leaders draw people into a corporate awareness of Christ, and then respond to that Presence. Harold Behr, our church planting director, has also been available to provide training so that your church can begin Life Transformation Groups. This is a simple way to challenge people to walk more deeply with Christ.

It is our hope that these ministries meet real needs in your home church – that they "scratch where you have an itch." I know the new clerk of the Board of Evangelism, Ken Redford, is interested in hearing how these efforts address your felt needs.

"New Works" Activity Report

1) Overview

Looking over the last year's activities, Wendy and I continue to be busy in supporting the existing New Works. Travels took us through the Idaho Treasure Valley to speak at an Area Rally in Caldwell, and meet with and worship with the Mortons in Meridian. November had us speaking and meeting as well as worshipping with the Morans, Slothowers, Landts, Bralleys, Marstons and each of the New Works they are leading. In addition, we had a "Welcome to the Yearly Meeting" lunch with Deborah Suess, the new pastor at Spokane Friends. As we entered December, I was active in Vancouver with New Life Friends facility plans, McMinnville planning meeting with McKinneys, and Dundee with the Fieldhouses. In addition, this spring we spent an elongated stay at Quincy while visiting the other New Works from Davenport to Post Falls. We have been doing leadership development meetings weekly with the Bergolds in Eugene, and my almost weekly meetings in different regions of the YM including last month in Greenleaf and Post Falls, resulting in new planters added to the "farm system."

2) Major Activity

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A major portion of my time involves training, coaching and meeting with interested candidates with vision for a New Work. It is interesting that we are attracting increasing numbers of young adult Friends who have been outside of our yearly meeting, who are returning with vision and are making excellent leaders. Examples include Pat and Mandy Schmidt, Tom and Jaymi Fieldhouse, and Trevor and Betsy Smith.

A significant portion of my time is spent coaching the successful planters, where growth is in the 200- 300-fold annual rates. Personnel issues, traps to avoid, facility issues, interpersonal conflicts are all difficult for these folks to walk through alone and require some help on my part.

Because of reduced financial support I am working on a scaled down approach to funding the Matchmaker program. The Lord is leading us away from the business model approach to a more organic process or "Simple Church." Growing these churches takes more time initially. So we are following Paul as he followed Christ in tentmaking. (Most of our now 50 year old meetings were bivocational startups). It's our objective to decrease the financial investment in New Works startups while multiplying new meetings.

3) Short-Range Plans

I am working with John Macy to team lead the "Greenhouse" (Organic Church Planting methodology) workshops that we hope to use as a template for planting new Friends' works. We hope to conduct more of these two-day events throughout the Yearly Meeting. We have completed three. Quincy Friends has asked to become a mission point so we are looking for a planter/pastor to take up the work there. I have a few invitations around the Yearly Meeting to speak, camps etc., and Yearly Meeting workshops will consume most of my time not spent recruiting.

4. Thanksgiving and Joy!

Watching River of Life Friends in Post Falls grow from 25 to over a hundred in attendance within one year, with nine solid home groups and fresh testimonies of people being "saved" makes us weep for joy. Watching New Life Friends in Vancouver grow from four faithful praying souls to over 200, (400 if all were there at one time) mostly newly saved, seeing God orchestrate the building expansion and relocation to a 15,000 sq ft facility, and seeing how this will be only "adequate" for a couple of years is part of our reward here on earth! Likewise, watching The River Ministries in Central Oregon continue to launch more neighborhood-based house churches, being able to meet with the core team that John and Karen Macy oversee makes us want to relocate to Redmond! Such purity, love and life! Both of these groups have incorporated the LTG (Life Transformation Group) approach to discipling with great results. (I'll be doing a workshop on this during YM week.)

This Yearly Meeting with its rich heritage, strong vital monthly meetings, fine leadership and continuous encouragement from all quarters makes my position of service pure joy. There is no shortage in my life of thanksgivings and praise each morning. This includes the wonderful Yearly Meeting staff, the pastors that faithfully participate in our New Works activities and the growing sense of unity in our Yearly Meeting.

Friend's House, Craig and Karla Morton, Nampa/Meridian, ID. A ministry focusing on a network of simple churches throughout the valley designed for those who are inactive in a traditional church.

Destiny Friends Church, Dan and Mindy Burns, Wheeler, OR. Building a core group.

Northwest Portland Project, Trey and Stephanie Doty, Portland, OR. Building a core group, starting occasional meetings open for public worship.

McMinnville Project, Steve and Phyllis McKinney, McMinnville, OR. Building a core group.

La Grande Meeting, David and Karla Arnold, La Grande, OR. Core team established, with two simple churches meeting weekly. Combined meetings attempt to engage their community.

Cheney Friends, Ed and Lois Marston, Cheney, WA. The core group has expanded to 14 people.

Art House Friends, Trevor and Betsy Smith, Cottage Grove, OR. They have successfully transitioned in leadership from Dan Gilliam to the Smiths.

Dundee Community, Tom and Jaymi Fieldhouse, Dundee, OR. A newly commissioned work and couple with a core team of about a dozen adults meeting weekly.

Congregation of the First Born, Rick and Gina Moran, Spokane, WA. A wonderful spirit-filled core of about 30 adults rediscovering the Jerusalem Church experience. This is a Messianic-like group desiring to affiliate with us as a mis-

sion point, *currently under assessment*. Saturday worship now approaches 80-100, mostly recent conversions.

Friends Church of the Valley, Al and Lori Franks, Cave Junction, OR. A work that continues to grow at a steady pace with new families being added. Any source of funds as offerings to the Lord for the poor and homeless (you would not believe some of the living conditions) are welcome, just to help cover building expenses.

Household of Faith, Jay and Lori Haines, LaConnor, WA. A group following the Multiplying House Church model. Jay works with native men on the reservation, about 15 people meeting in their home on Sunday. Many of these are teens from the reservation, evangelized by the Haines kids.

New Life Friends, Dave and Renée White, Vancouver, WA. This new work averages about 200 people for worship and has regular contact with about 400 people, offering many support groups.

River of Life Friends, Mike and Carmen Slothower, Post Falls, ID. A new work begun after Post Falls Friends completed an effective life cycle of ministry. Now averaging over 100 people.

The River-Central Oregon, John and Karen Macy, Redmond, OR. A new work meeting in a variety of locations with multiple ministries.

The Springs, Vern and Carol Landt, Davenport, WA. A home-based ministry meeting weekly with ministry of prayer, healing, counseling and encouragement. Most recently they hosted a team of praying Indians visiting on mission from Alaska. The Landts took them to all of the reservations wherein they prayed for open doors for the Gospel.

Hispanic Work, Jorge and Elida Sileoni, Greenleaf, ID. A new work involving a Sunday gathering of about 30 Hispanic people.

It's been another good year of following God's direction among the people of God known as Northwest Yearly Meeting. I've had so many good conversations with you exploring God's activity in you. I end this year with a renewed sense that God is *not* finished with us yet, and I can attest to that with my own eyes. It is good to be part of this Body of Christ.

The Board of Evangelism is committed to the health of our churches. I've pulled together a **"Healthy Church Project Menu"** that lists all the elements available to our established churches for encouragement and growth. These have been handed out to our pastors and elders and are available online.

A growing portion of our energy is committed to the **Natural Church Development Program**, a project that assists a local meeting in determining their strengths and weaknesses, helping them capitalize on their strengths and address the weaker areas. The premise is that a healthy church ministers better to its community and becomes attractive to those seeking Truth. Increasing numbers of our churches are benefiting from this program, and the coaching support that goes with it. I encourage you to check into it! There are two NCD workshops scheduled during Yearly Meeting.

The **Quaker Leaders Program** continues to be an excellent opportunity for Friends students at George Fox University to deepen their commitment to their faith and NWYM. Eighteen students received a \$1,000 scholarship to be involved in a ministry expression, mentoring relationship, a special seminar and regular meetings as a group. The Friends Church Extension Foundation funds this program. The graduates of this six-year-old program are found in leadership roles and ministries inside and outside of NWYM.

Seven churches or areas have invited me to facilitate **Spiritual Discernment Seminars** with Lon Fendall and Jan Wood. These three-hour workshops cover the theology and mechanics of Spirit-led decision making, equipping us to better recognize the voice of God in our corporate and individual lives. As Christcentered Friends, our ability to hear God is crucial to our health. We are bankrupt without this skill! It's been exciting for me to see NWYM deepening our abilities to hear God through Scripture, our faith communities, and our personal experience. Scripture is the standard which we use to weigh our leadings, and the Holy Spirit speaks to us in many different ways. Your stories have been thrilling for me to hear! Board of Missions

The Board of Missions of Northwest Yearly Meeting continues to work to expand the Gospel of the Kingdom to places around the world. We are successfully moving ahead on several fronts, as you will read in the following paragraphs. The emphasis of focusing on world outreach is an important function for our board and the Yearly Meeting, to keep us thinking on the needs of others in a day when so much of our culture is drawing back and focusing on "us" and "ours," resulting in the loss of emphasis on reaching the world for Christ.

We are also seeing a need for change in the way we communicate with churches and individuals. As we send workers into areas where it is more dangerous for them to live and work, we must carefully communicate about where they are and what they are accomplishing. Communication must be more guarded and controlled than we have been accustomed to, making it more difficult to communicate details as we have in our work with the Aymara people.

As new opportunities open, we are striving to represent the Yearly Meeting adequately. We want to attempt to see the world as God sees it and to meet needs that He leads us to. Scripture verses like Psalm 46:10 emphasize God's plan for the world as it reads, "Be still and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth." It is important that we not only proclaim this message at home but do our part to see that His name is exalted around the world as well. Following are some specific reports of our activities.

Russia: The invitation to work in Russia to teach Bible and to disciple interested people still exists. Progress has been made this year in moving toward the goals of sending people to visit on a short-term basis and in recruiting of personnel for future work in Russia.

Elizabeth (Liz) Sugden, an applicant with the Mission Board, spent two months in Elektrostal and Moscow in October and November 2002 on a fact-finding trip. She was aided by Johan Maurer, pastor of Reedwood Friends Church. She is excited about the opportunities she saw there and is interested in working there in the future. Liz also returned to Russia in June 2003 as one of the leaders of the YCEW team, where she was able to renew acquaintances and experience life in a Christian camp. The group just returned from that trip a few days ago so Liz is again active in the candidating process.

The Lord has also called Patrick and Christy Neifert and their two children, Ethan (7) and Megan (4), to candidate with NWYM to work in Russia. The Neiferts have experience in youth ministry and cross-cultural experience in Romania, where they have done several short-term ministry trips, as well as spending the last two years working full-time with Friendship International in Romania. They are proceeding well through the candidating process and are present at this Yearly Meeting. We anticipate that they will be formally commissioned during these meetings and will start raising support this fall. It is feasible that they will be on their way to language school before next Yearly Meeting.

Teaching Abroad: In August of 2002 we sent ten teachers of English to Asia, five of whom were returning teachers. For the year of 2003-2004, we have a total of seven teachers preparing to go; three of them are returning teachers. One disturbing aspect of the recruiting this year has been the fact that only one of the new teachers actually comes from a Northwest Yearly Meeting Friends church background. All of the new teachers are female and most are recent college graduates.

Chuck Scott, clerk of the Teaching Abroad Task Force, and Mission Administrator Duane Comfort, visited the teachers in March of 2003. While in Asia, they met with teachers and students, university leaders and officials. They especially enjoyed active participation in English classes as well as opportunities to converse with students at "English Corner." The wide-open invitation for Teaching Abroad personnel continues to be amazing. God is at work in this huge nation and there is an ongoing need for American Christians with a college degree, an aptitude for or experience in teaching, and an interest in influencing individuals around the world.

Teaching Abroad is expanding its influence this next year by sending a teacher/ curriculum development specialist, Karen Swenson, to International Christian School – Budapest, Hungary in August 2003. We are also hoping to provide teaching opportunities in North Africa and Russia in the near future. The board feels this is a very good program which can allow our people to experience cross-cultural ministry in a wide variety of opportunities.

North Africa: Plans have developed rapidly in our effort to send people to North Africa since last Yearly Meeting. Last year we announced that we had two candidates interested in North Africa. We now have two families in North Africa studying the Arabic language. Bill, Betty, Joel, Mark and Faith Kelley left the States in January; and Paul and Meredith Morse in left in March 2003. God has been good to them and they are progressing very well. They report feeling safe in their new culture and are eagerly looking for ways to serve the people with whom they live and study.

Bolivia and Peru Yearly Meetings: Ron and Carolyn Stansell completed fraternal visits to our two sister yearly meetings in South America in June 2003 from which missionary presence was essentially withdrawn in 2002. We hope such interaction might be repeated annually or every other year to maintain ties and to avoid any sense of abandonment. We want to experience mutual encouragement in Christ and to be sensitive to specific capital projects that might be appropriate. Our goals will always be to avoid dependency, to encourage local initiative, and to extend the gospel through leadership training and fresh evangelistic outreach. In the meantime, leaders in both yearly meetings are feeling their way, seeing both success and challenge.

Bolivia: On June 19 the Stansells and other NWYM visitors (David and Susan Hampton and Alice Maurer) visited with the Bolivia Yearly Meeting Mesa Directiva (Executive Council) in La Paz, and on June 22 took a day's tour of an impressive array of worship facilities in the Alto La Paz area. Several of these congregations profited from an earlier land purchase program, with NWYM paying 80% on some original land purchases. Senkata, Villa Tunari, Golgota and Sinai churches are four congregations with relatively recent building projects, with worship areas for 200 to 500 people, and with "conference space" for much larger gatherings common in the Aymara culture. The positive side of this is the healthy adaptation being made by Bolivia Yearly Meeting (INELA) as they follow population movements to the new urban area of Alto La Paz, a city of one million or more. (La Paz District consists of yet other churches in the "bowl" of La Paz and in the river valley below.) These large buildings on the Alto have been entirely financed by local funding and two of the congregations host large social service activities administered by Compassion, International. The negative side, from the perspective of Yearly Meeting leadership, is that funds from the "moneyed" portion of the Bolivian Friends church have been channeled into local needs only, leaving little support for missions or leadership education. Alto La Paz District is now second in size in the Bolivian INELA (Bolivia Yearly Meeting). Only the rural Cordillera District has more churches. Given the huge population shift of Aymara speakers to urban areas, this should be no surprise, but it is heartening to see the adaptations made to meet these new challenges. Planting new, urban churches in this area is not automatic.

Of concern are reports of small, struggling rural congregations. However, in general it seems the traditional District (Quarterly Meeting) structure provides accountability and spiritual nurture. Yearly Meeting leaders visit regularly among the approximately 13 districts, 11 of which are located in the Department (state) of La Paz. Santa Cruz District with seven congregations and Sucre District with three congregations are in far distant Departments as are single congregations in Cochabamba and Oruro. Yearly Meeting leaders envision a truly nationwide denomination in contrast with the present concentration mostly in La Paz state. Leaders report 102 monthly meetings, 125 dependent congregations (organized but under the supervision of a stronger congregation) for a total of 227 organized meetings. Another 20 or 30 groups are in less formal stages. It seemed to the visitors that the Bolivian INELA is growing without missionary presence and we rejoice with them.

Silver Ramos is in his second year as Bolivia Yearly Meeting President, similar to a superintendent role. Several other Mesa Directiva (Executive Council) members, also new to Yearly Meeting leadership, have had prior experience only on the local or District levels. They are seeking both a global vision and concrete answers to complex problems. A group of Bolivian leaders planned and executed an EFI International Hispanic Friends Pastors Conference in Santa Cruz with attenders coming from Mexico, Central America, the United States, Bolivia and Peru (held July 8-13, 2003).

NWYM Board of Missions has a responsibility to listen and discern what role we might have in financial needs in three categories: (1) educational services; (2) national missionary subsidies; and (3) development of national multipurpose centers in Max Paredes (La Paz), the Alto (the former tabernacle property) and Cochabamba.

ISETA (a Spanish acronym for Friends Theological Institute) has functioned for the past four years with some level of government recognition, now with 15 residency students and as many as 200 extension students. Leaders seem to take pride in the 18 Friends students enrolled in the Theology Department of the Bolivian Evangelical University (BEU) in Santa Cruz. Leaders would like to see educational grants continue for one or two more years both to BEU and ISETA students. They view this as strategically important for INELA leadership training. Friends Center leadership at BEU is in process of transition from Diego Chuyma to Esteban Ajnota as director. Several BEU students have secured independent foundation scholarships, and others are being encouraged to do likewise. CCCCCCCCCCCCCCCC

Dionisio Lucasi, INELA Secretary of Missions, requests reconsideration of subsidy for national missionaries, also planned to be discontinued shortly. Some Districts are supporting their own regional missionaries in new church planting, but more significant funding is needed to advance to new Departments like Sucre, Cochabamba, Oruro and Potosi. They have saved some funds for one more year, but they would like more help.

The newest idea was the development of city centers for a variety of uses. It seems they would like to combine commercial enterprises with social, youth and conference services. The commercial aspect may sound troubling and perhaps a cause for legal and spiritual difficulties, although leaders talk exclusively of channeling funds to INELA missions and educational scholarships. These centers would be located in densely populated areas. The Max Paredes property and the Alto tabernacle property are already owned by the INELA. If funds could be made available, they would be used for further development of these properties.

A revolving loan fund was discussed as a possible solution. Although one executive council member acknowledged the risks involved in really understanding the difference between a loan and a donation, others felt there has been a shift in cultural understanding that could make it work. A revolving loan fund might work well for local congregations. Would it work for a large INELA project not attached to one congregation?

Peru: The Stansells, Hamptons and Alice Maurer also made a five-hour visit with the Peruvian Yearly Meeting leadership at the Yearly Meeting headquarters in Ilave, Peru on June 25. The visitors were received with grace and kindness and enjoyed a time of prayer and sharing. As in Bolivia, the visitors presented a report from NWYM as well as listening to reports and concerns from Peru. An unusual balance was observed between younger and older leadership on the Mesa Directiva. Some of the observations of the Bolivian church can be made of Peru, with population shifts, seeking of vision, and struggles with funding for national missionaries and educational programs. Other issues are unique to Peru. About 53 congregations are functioning in eight Districts. The newer Alto Andino (Ancomarca) District seems the most lively with recent growth. President Francisco Maquera reported recent visits to older meetings for encouragement and reconciliation. Younger leaders Martin Quispe, Calixto Cane, and Simon Garcia

were articulate about plans and programs. La Union Church in Arequipa, the Tacna churches and the Tarata church, all part of the Coastal District, seem to be doing well. INELA leaders have sought to mend rifts between highland and coastal churches.

Calixto Cane reported on the IBEC program, a short-term high school level Bible school that meets in Ilave. Fifteen students were enrolled for the period of study, and despite some major challenges, the program appears to have been quite successful. A visiting Bolivian teacher financed by NWYM funds worked along-side Peruvian instructors and the director. Ruben Chino heads the IBLA (theological education by extension) program and reported several other students who worked on individual courses. The George Fox Technical School (secondary level institution) functions in Ilave and a George Fox Colegio (School) functions in nearby Juli. Both of these last two institutions have received financial grants from outside sources.

Both the Bolivian and Peruvian leaders presented several formal project requests to NWYM. It is hoped that study committees can be formed to consider these requests carefully to determine the Lord's direction in what might be a relatively small but important financial involvement with the Bolivian and Peruvian yearly meetings.

Hal and Nancy Thomas: Hal and Nancy Thomas serve the Bolivian Evangelical University's Masters of Intercultural Studies (Missions) program with occasional contact with local and national Friends leaders. Essentially they work interdenominationally outside the framework of the INELA (Bolivia Yearly Meeting) leadership. Hal and Nancy both received their official doctoral degrees at the School of World Missions of Fuller Theology Seminary in early June in Pasadena, California, with final touches now complete on Hal's thesis. Hal received recognition for his work in providing a fresh and unique understanding of the conversion process, and tools for analyzing worldview. There are clear indications that this will be a useful tool for missionaries in other cultures around the world. Nancy's thesis was completed earlier and focused on the development of indigenous writers and literature. These doctoral studies mesh directly with the instruction they give to Latin American missionaries for work inside and outside of Latin America. "A Pair of Docs" may seem a "paradox" to some, but it is working well for the Thomases. Their ministry is fruitful and much appreciated and admired by their students, the university, and the Board of Missions! Hal and Nancy led a writers' workshop in La Paz in June with over 60 students and with excellent results. While administrative difficulties at BEU have meant a general decline in registration, including in the Masters program, significant achievements have been made. Guidance is needed for the future.

Financial Summary: Although the Board of Missions has been careful in their budgeting process to avoid deficit spending, it has been necessary, in recent years, to draw from available reserve funds at a rate that is not sustainable. This was to be expected during the transition from work in South America to new fields while the Yearly Meeting developed vision and commitment to new fields but we hope that interest in prayer and giving will pick up around the Yearly Meeting to keep these new fields supplied. The financial needs remain great, even to establish a modest witness in these new fields.

As new workers for North Africa have raised support, we have been encouraged by the excellent response from the constituency of Northwest Yearly Meeting in pledging financial support for them. At the same time we rejoice in significant giving to other Friends missions administered by Evangelical Friends Mission in such diverse nations as Nepal, Rwanda, Burundi, Ireland, India and Mexico.

This past year several people have expressed concern that our new missionaries are being required to raise such a large part of their own support. Your board is concerned about that as well and we have tried to soften the impact on those candidates by supplying up to 50% of their support package. This year churches and individuals have responded well in helping new missionaries raise their 50% but as the number of new workers increases, the board is struggling to find the funds to provide the 50% we have promised to them. If the budget crunch at the Yearly Meeting level worsens, the board is seriously looking at the possibility that we may not be able to continue to fund even the 50% for newer candidates. Your prayers and your faithful contributions are really important to the success of the mission program of Northwest Yearly Meeting.

D.K. Sarkar in Kolkata (Calcutta), India.

Among the regions/yearly meetings—Northwest sent two new couples to Morocco, Southwest is sending a new couple this summer to Cambodia, Eastern Region is expanding into Kosovo and Croatia in Europe and into the Dominican Republic that adjoins to Haiti.

NEW MISSIONARY

Dr. Samson Retnaraj, surgeon and anesthesiologist from India, to Nepal.

NEW(?) PART TIME MISSIONARIES

Carl and Peggy Hunerwadel, with Carl making three visits per year to the Garhwal people of North India.

BIGGEST BREAKTHROUGH

Groups of Garhwal people coming to Christ from three different areas of North India near Musoorie—Kanatal, New Teri, and Pokhal. Also, Eastern Region now has 35 Gypsy (Roma) churches since 1995 in Hungary, Romania, Croatia and Kosovo.

BIGGEST SURPRISE

Growth of the Friends Church in Bhutan in spite of threats of severe persecution. John Vanlahriata spearheads this ministry.

BIGGEST GROWTH

The Friends churches in Nepal.

BIGGEST CHALLENGE/OPPORTUNITY

Replacing several missionaries leaving EFM or going to part-time status; but, this opens up new possibilities for new missionaries.

BIGGEST THREAT

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The Maoists in Nepal, currently occupying the Adhikarys' house in Sisautiya, holding people's court, extorting money, threatening the Maithilee people to join their political party or else! However, threats and upheavals open up people to the gospel as never before. Pray for continued growth among the Maithilee people.

BIGGEST FINANCIAL BLESSINGS

A \$25,000 estate gift and an \$18,800 grant.

BIGGEST CELEBRATION

The 100th Anniversary of Friends in Guatemala (Evangelical Friends Church Southwest mission field). Up to 10,000 were present in some evening events. The church is strong and growing in Guatemala.

MOST NEW LEADERS EMERGING

With Jaime Tabingo in the Philippines.

MOST ANTICPATED EVENT

The first graduating class of the Great Lakes School of Theology, June 2003, in Bujumbura, Burundi.

MOST EXCITING MOVEMENT

Evangelical Friends (EFM and regions or yearly meetings) now serves in 40 ministry sites around the world, and worship in 34 languages!

Board of Peace and Social Concerns

The Board of Peace and Social Concerns emphasizes that we, in Northwest Yearly Meeting, are called to live out Christ's love, and that we are called to be agents of God's peace and love to everyone. We also emphasize that God is the source of life and all human life is sacred.

During the past year, our peace education coordinators, Ralph Beebe and Dwight Burton, have been spreading Christ's peace throughout the Yearly Meeting by visiting approximately 15 churches and teaching youth and adults about peace. Dwight Burton toured Israel and Palestine, visiting Friends and other Christians. He saw firsthand the conflicts in that area. Peggy Hansen from Newberg will be the next peace education coordinator. We look forward to her organizational expertise.

The Board of Peace and Social Concerns has also been busy with many other things:

- Two editions of *The Concern* have been published on the Yearly Meeting website. We will continue to publish four times a year.
- The Board of Peace and Social Concerns has several members on the Friendsview Manor Board. Friendsview continues to do well, and their building projects are shaping up.
- We sent out peace education packets to all the high school juniors in the Yearly Meeting.
- We have several workshops during Yearly Meeting sessions this year, including one on conscientious objection.
- Eight members of the Yearly Meeting attended the Friends World Committee for Consultation (FWCC) conference in North Carolina in January. The board assisted some attendees financially.
- The board released Matt Chandler from Newberg to travel to Israel and Palestine with the Christian Peacemakers teams (CPT). Tricia Brown and her daughter, Madison Sturdivant, from North Valley were also released to travel with the CPT to Canada. Peggy Parsons will be traveling to Africa in August to work with post-traumatic stress disorder people in Burundi with David Niyonzima, Burundi Yearly Meeting superintendent.

Board of Stewardship

The Board of Stewardship takes seriously our understanding that everything we have belongs to our Creator and that God calls us to be faithful stewards of all our resources. The Yearly Meeting has been blessed with resources from churches and individuals and it is the Steward's responsibility to manage them in a manner that brings honor and glory to God and benefits the entire Yearly Meeting. This past year has brought both joy and challenges in the following areas:

Great Commission Budget – A primary responsibility of the Stewards is forecasting the income for the Great Commission Budget and then monitoring the budget throughout the year. The full Stewardship Board reviews the budget twice a year at midyear board meetings and again during Yearly Meeting sessions. In addition the administrative committee of the Stewards meets monthly to review Yearly Meeting finances. Income is projected a year in advance, long before the local meetings submit their commitment to the Great Commission Budget so careful monitoring is particularly important. The Stewards are committed to spending only the resources that are available. This past year it became evident that the decline in giving to the local church observed across the nation has impacted the churches of Northwest Yearly Meeting. This resulted in reduced funding for the Great Commission Budget in 2003 which necessitated cuts in spending for 2003. These reduced resources are expected to continue into 2004 which will continue to impact the budget next year.

Department of Benefits - This department has two primary responsibilities, to give oversight to the Yearly Meeting pension plan and to provide group insurance benefits for the pastors and church workers throughout the Yearly Meeting. We sponsor a 401(k) defined benefit plan that allows the individual to allocate their own investments among a group of mutual funds selected by the department. Many participants are struggling to understand the impact of the third straight year of negative returns in the stock market. The department is responsible to educate participants in proper allocation of investments to minimize the impact of fluctuations in market conditions and to realize that pension plans are long-term investment and periodic changes in valuation are to be expected. This past year also included another difficult transition in health insurance. In late 2001 we moved to an insurance plan offered by Mennonite Mutual Aid (MMA). Last year, three factors converged to cause an unacceptably high premium rate to renew the MMA policy. These factors were; 1) Overly optimistic projections in 2001 of the actual plan cost, 2) Extraordinary increases in the cost of health care across the country, and 3) Higher than anticipated utilization of insurance benefits. As a result, in March of 2003 the Yearly Meeting-wide group for health insurance was disbanded and each individual church, or group of churches, sought their own coverage. Everyone was able to obtain coverage and in most every case, at rates lower than were offered by MMA; but the loss of a group policy covering the entire Yearly Meeting was a disappointment for the department.

Department of Development (Friends Fund) – Friends Fund is responsible for encouraging members to consider deferred gifts and estate gifts in their estate plans as well as administer such gifts. The department continues to make good progress in improving its financial condition. Friends Fund operated in the black for the third straight year at the same time reducing interest expense and notes outstanding. This improvement has come in spite of a nearly 24% drop in management fee income over the past two years. This drop in fee income which accounts for almost all of the Fund's operating income is due to three straight years of declining stock values in the funds under management. Friends Fund charges each fund they manage a fixed percentage of the fund's value, so declining values have not only impacted the clients, but the Friends Fund operations as well. Following are financial highlights:

TREASURER'S REPORT

Last year marked the tenth straight year that the Great Commission Budget has operated in the black. This has come about by careful budgeting, only spending available resources, and adjusting budgets when necessary in light of reduced resources. For 2002 this meant that only \$606,175 was spent out of the original Great Commission Budget of \$645,263. The challenge for the Great Commission Budget is that following four straight years of increased church support, 2002 support was down from the year before. This downward trend in church support is continuing into 2003 necessitating further budget cuts. In 1996 local churches on the average contributed 12.2% of their general fund income to the Great Commission Budget. By 2002 this figure has dropped to 10.8%. In the late '90's when general fund giving was increasing five to six percent a year, Great Commission support increased in real dollars even though the percentage was declining. In the past two years, however, local church general fund giving has remained relatively flat which has resulted in declining dollars for the Great Commission Budget. When adjusted for inflation, it appears even more dismal. Between 1996 and 2002, local church general fund giving increased an inflation adjusted 6.9% while Great Commission support declined 4.9% during the same

period. These are the challenges facing the Stewards and Executive Council as budgets are being set for the coming years.

One of the strengths of Yearly Meeting finances are the significant reserves that have been accumulated over the years. These reserves are primarily the result of sales of surplus church properties and large estate gifts. Our ability to maintain many of the Yearly Meeting programs in light of declining Great Commission funds is the availability of reserve funds to draw upon. In 2002 total reserves declined \$381,000 or 16.8%. Of this decline \$176,000 or 7.7% resulted from loss in value in the investment portfolio. The balance of \$206,000 represented actual spending of reserves. We recognize that this rate of spending reserves is not sustainable in the long term and plans are currently in place to reduce the pace of drawing on reserves.

Overall, the finances of the Yearly Meeting remain sound. As adjustments are made in response to current conditions, they sometimes are painful but they insure the long term viability of the Yearly Meeting. Your continued prayer for wisdom for the Stewards and Executive Council as they deal with these tough financial conditions is greatly appreciated.

Northwest Yearly Meeting Trustees

Since Yearly Meeting in July 2002, the Northwest Yearly Meeting Trustees have dealt with the following things.

1. Transfer of Property Title to Eugene Friends Church. We executed a deed in favor of Eugene Friends Church ("EFC") transferring title of two parcels of real property from Northwest Yearly Meeting ("NWYM") to EFC. EFC already owned one of its parcels. EFC needed to consolidate the three parcels into one under common ownership. This was needed so it could proceed with a building permit application to replace the facilities destroyed in a windstorm in February 2002 and make other improvements.

2. Washington Property Tax Exemption Reports. Washington property tax exemption reports have been prepared for six Washington church properties where title is in the name of NWYM. This involves our getting a report from the individual churches regarding their use of the property and then preparing and submitting the reports to the Washington Department of Revenue. These reports are required annually by March 31. We also submitted an application for exemption from property taxes for the portion of the newly acquired property which is being used by New Life Friends Church. (See 4 below.)

3. Transfer of McMinnville Property to NWYM. We worked with Board of Evangelism representatives to obtain a deed from McMinnville Friends Church transferring title of its real property to NWYM. This was because of its change to "Mission Point" status.

4. Purchase of Vancouver Property for Use by New Life Friends Church. At the request of the Board of Evangelism and the Executive Council, we worked with Dave Hampton to complete the purchase of a former church facility at 2410 Grand Blvd. in Vancouver. This was repaired and is used by New Life FC which had outgrown its previous facility, the former Rosemere FC property. The purchase and repairs were financed by a \$425,000 loan from Friends Church Extension Foundation for which we signed loan documents. The former Rosemere/ New Life church property and parsonage were to be sold to apply on the loan. (Also, see 7 and 8 below.) As of July 1, the loan balance is \$302,031.

5. Subordination of Deed of Trust. We executed a subordination agreement subordinating a deed of trust securing a note payable to NWYM so that the owner could refinance a home loan with a bank at a lower interest rate.

6. Loan for Payment of Health Insurance Obligation. At the request of the Board of Stewardship, we signed a note and mortgage on the NWYM Headquarters Building for \$90,000 to Friends Church Extension Foundation to provide funds for NWYM to complete the funding of the health insurance trust fund under the MMA insurance plan. This will be paid from the sale of presently owned securities on a more orderly basis than if sold immediately to pay the obligation.

7. Sale of Former Rosemere Friends Church Property. We completed the sale of the former Rosemere Friends Church property in Vancouver to The Way To Salvation Community Church for \$166,000 with \$136,000 cash down and the \$30,000 balance on a note and mortgage payable monthly. The proceeds of the sale were applied to the obligation owing on the new New Life Friends Church property. (Also see 4 above.)

8. Sale of Former Rosemere Friends Church Parsonage. We have accepted an offer for our sale of the former Rosemere Friends Church parsonage for \$99,500 cash. Closing is expected in July 2003. The proceeds will also be applied to the New Life Friends Church obligation. (Also see 4 above.)

The NWYM website is found at: <u>www.nwfriends.org</u>. Gerald Lemmons is our webmaster and is currently in the process of completing a major revision of the site's appearance. The web page highlights ministries, boards, commissions and resources within the Yearly Meeting as well as links to local churches and other Evangelical Friends organizations. Many documents of special interest include: *Faith and Practice, Yearly Meeting Minutes, NWYM Connection*, Roberts Reflections, G.O., Volunteers on Wheels (VOW), New Works, Young Adult Friends, and peacemaking. New additions include: *Quaker Waggins* (FWMF newsletter), missions information, *Concern* (newsletter for the Peace and Social Concerns Board), Mennonite Mutual Aid's *Top Drawer*, Commission on Family Life's catalog of available resource materials, and FWCC information. Entities of the Yearly Meeting that are not yet represented on the website or local meeting (churches) that have not linked to the web page are encouraged to send the information to <u>gmlemmons@juno.com</u>. We would encourage all churches to list the website on their Sunday bulletins and other official documents to help direct new "friends" with interest or questions to the NWYM site.

The commission continues to value "unofficial" relationships of encouragement and support with several important aspects of the Yearly Meeting. The NWYM Archives are located at George Fox University and managed by Dick Votaw. The Archives are the appropriate place to bring historical documents of local meetings, and boards and commissions. Dick will help with questions to determine what and how to place documents in the archives. He may be contacted at <u>dvotaw@georgefox.edu</u>.

Barclay Press, directed by Dan McCracken, continues to be important work that we support and encourage. Barclay Press continues to publish books (but not print them) of special interest to Friends. Please check their report and website: (http://www.barclaypress.com) for more specific information.

This last year we welcomed the Epistle Committee, allowing it to consider the Commission on Communication its unofficial "home." Each year the Epistle Committee, clerked by Jackie Hausinger, writes a brief summary of our YM Sessions to send to other yearly meetings across the United States. She also receives similar epistles from other yearly meetings and reports on them during a business session. Jackie will lead two workshops again this year: one to read the epistles received during the year from other yearly meetings, and a second to write the epistle from our YM Sessions.

The commission sends a representative to EFI-North America each year to represent NWYM. EFI projects that we work on include: *The Friends Voice* and the Publishers of Truth essay contest.

This past year the commission was asked by the NWYM to develop an application process for representatives to Friends World Committee for Consultation (FWCC). We will make recommendations to the floor of business meeting this year (2003) for representation to the national meetings of FWCC as well as the international meeting in New Zealand in 2004. Information on FWCC and the application can be found on the YM website.

This year two workshops are being sponsored by the Commission on Communications: "Quaker Writings and Resources" by Howard Macy and "Improving Interpersonal Communication Skills" by Jim Fields.

The commission is always to open to hear ideas and concerns about how we can better facilitate communication and information within NWYM.

Commission on Ethnic Ministries

In May, an e-mail was sent to the pastors asking about the different countries people are from who attend their churches. Pastors responded from the following churches:

From the above information, we learned that there are 23 countries (nations, ethnic groups) represented in our churches. This includes people who were born in their country, children of parents living in the USA, and adopted children.

The following countries are represented: England, Philippines, Japan, China, Kenya, Cambodia, Peru, African-American, Mexico, Russia, Guatemala, Thailand, India, Vietnam, Basque, Korea, Haiti, Ethiopia, Belarus, Native American, Arab and Brazil.

That's an amazing diversity of peoples from these countries of the world worshiping and fellowshipping in the churches in NWYM. This list of countries will expand as other pastors respond. Making disciples of all nations of the world is taking place right in NWYM churches.

As written in the *Faith and Practice* of NWYM, the "Purposes and Functions" of the Commission on Ethnic Ministries is to interact with and draw together various cultures in NWYM with the goal of Christian fellowship and mutual ministry. The commission is responsible to:

1. Be a source to the Yearly Meeting churches, boards, and commissions in areas specific to cross-cultural work such as communication, expectations, and understanding.

- 2. Encourage and facilitate healthy race relations within the Yearly Meeting.
- 3. Encourage new and self-sufficient ethnic congregations in the Yearly Meeting.
- 4. Educate and inspire Friends of all ages to develop and exhibit Christlike attitudes with regard to race.
- 5. Witness to the world in word and action that all persons have equal value.

These responsibilities are a tremendous opportunity for doing the mission of the church among all ethnic peoples already attending NWYM churches, and will be in the future as new ones come and accept Jesus as their Savior. If you feel God speaking to you to be involved in this ministry of the Commission on Ethnic Ministries, please express that to Ed Cammack.

The commission budgeted \$7,000 to the Piedmont Peace Place After-School Program in 2003. This is a program for African-American school children. Reedwood Friends Church also participates in this program. The children are taught good Christian values and that they are important to God, their families and friends.

The Hispanic church at Newberg has been busy doing the mission of the church by planting a new congregation at Lynwood Friends. The Greenleaf Hispanic church just recently committed themselves to plant a new congregation. Praise the Lord for their vision and commitment to make disciples.

The commission budgeted \$500 for camp scholarships for 2003. The requirement is that two campers of different ethnic groups buddy-up and go together to give each other support. If you're interested in camp scholarships, see Ed Cammack for the list of requirements.

In these times when a child's home can be a place of crisis, the CASA (<u>Court Appointed Special Advocate</u>) volunteer can help bring a safe and loving environment. In addition, during Yearly Meeting sessions there will be a resource room (Minthorn 200) open during the workshop times. You are invited to come and browse the many books and videos that we have available for borrowing.

The Family Fun Day and silent and oral auctions have not only provided fun times for the whole family, but also financial support for the Richard Beebe Memorial Fund which assists pastors and their families with personal counseling when they are experiencing problems. In addition, the Commission on Family Life has provided a counselor at Twin Rocks Family Camp and at Pastors Conference, and many families have been helped by that service.

We continue to provide financial assistance for the "Mother-Daughter Retreat" that is held in the fall. This event is growing in popularity as mothers and their pre-teen daughters spend a weekend bonding together.

To encourage marital commitment, we honor couples who have reached their 50th wedding anniversary since Yearly Meeting last year. They are recognized and presented with flowers and a card during one of the business sessions.

But, for the Commission on Family Life and the entire NWYM, it was the "worst of times," for this spring we lost a valued member of the commission – Norma Beebe Piersall. Norma was part of the group before it became a commission. In 1984 the Board of Spiritual Life began the Department of Family Life, and Norma was there. In 1984, the Commission on Family Life was developed, and Norma was there. She served as clerk from 1994 to 1999 and continued to serve as a

member until her death. She began the Richard Beebe Memorial Counseling Fund in 1990 and created the Family Fun Day and auction to help finance it. She also initiated the "Traveling Trunk" – a box full of resources for churches to use to help families which was used by many churches throughout the Yearly Meeting. Her enthusiasm and leadership capabilities were like the spark plug for the commission. We will miss her greatly.

COMMENTS FROM PRAYER AND HEALING SEMINARS

- Loved the time in prayer.
- I was tremendously blessed by this seminar series and am excited to implement the training in our church body. I am also looking forward to meeting needs of those outside the church body as I feel more prepared to pray for needs both physical and spiritual.

- I've done more praying for other people since we started, (not just in class) in fact, almost nonstop. It is so exciting and gives great hope of God's blessings and answered prayer.
- It was truly helpful to me. To be able to learn to experience the needs of others – to honestly realize that God is available to be in every part of our lives.
- I think this seminar radically changed my concepts of healing and therefore my ability to pray for healing underwent a dramatic change as well. I've always believed God <u>could</u> heal, but generally chose not to. Now I believe He chooses to heal more often than not and pray with greater expectation and faith.
- I liked the premise that healing is something God <u>wants</u> to do for us <u>today</u>, and when we pray for healing it gives opportunity to see Him work and give Him glory. It reinforced my conviction that with God <u>all</u> things are possible. I also appreciated the emphasis that God is sovereign and we do not impose <u>our</u> will on Him.
- These sessions exceeded my expectations for helpful information to begin feeling more confident in my ability to pray for others as well as feeling closer to Jesus as I have experienced inner healing and invited the Holy Spirit to totally immerse me in His presence and filling me with His power. It's been very empowering to see so many changes in my attitudes, too!
- I grew up in church and knew Jesus Christ had power to heal others, but never really thought of my prayers as being powerful enough to effect that change in a person. I realize now that Jesus' power is present in my prayers. I feel bolder and more confident now; I also am beginning to realize the importance of aligning my will with God's.
- This has jolted me into a fuller belief of healing...I'm ready to be praying with people after church.
- I believe this seminar is going to change our church. I believe our ministry to those who are hurting will be enlarged and far more effective.

Friends Women's Missionary Fellowship

Evangelical Friends International Council

Northwest Yearly Meeting is one of six member yearly meetings of the North America Region of Evangelical Friends International. Counterpart regions exist in Africa, Asia, and Latin America. With the raising up of groups of evangelical and programmed Friends in Ireland, Hungary, Romania, and elsewhere in Europe, it is hoped that a Europe Region can be officially constituted soon. Because of leadership and organizational developments in Hungary, the largest of Friends groups in Europe, an official organization of EFI/Europe Region has been delayed for the present.

The Great Lakes School of Theology in Bujumbura, Burundi, graduated its first class of 10 graduates in late June. What is felt to be significant progress was made at that time toward stabilization of the institution. Persons from Northwest Yearly Meeting who participated in this event included Lon Fendall, Dawn Todd, and EFM missionary David Thomas. EFM Director Chuck Mylander and a number from Evangelical Friends Church-Mid-America played critical roles. This Bible college project is clearly an inter-yearly meeting effort, involving several North American yearly meetings and three African yearly meetings and is officially sponsored by EFI/Africa Region.

July 2003 was the month for the triennial meeting of EFI/Latin American delegates which took place in Santa Cruz, Bolivia, in conjunction with the second International Friends Pastors' Conference, held on the campus of the Bolivian Evangelical University, July 8-13. NWYM personnel Hal and Nancy Thomas and Ron Stansell gave major presentations as did David Byrne (Coalition for Hispanic Ministries) and Chuck Mylander (EFM Director). Thirteen other speakers and workshop leaders were Latin Americans, coming from Central and South America. About 30 Peruvians, 22 Central Americans, several North American Hispanics, and one Cuban joined the much larger group from Bolivia, with roughly 250 in attendance. Klamath Fall Friends encouraged a contact from Venezuela to attend, but that became impossible at the last minute because of visa difficulties, but it reflects the possibility of raising up a Friends group in Venezuela as well. This Pastors' Conference was by far the largest such international administrative undertaking completed by the Bolivian Friends Church and they are to be commended for their faithfulness. EFI/Latin America is by far the largest of the EFI regions. About six non-EFI affiliated Friends yearly meetings in Bolivia, some of them of a sizeable number, sent representatives to the pastors' conference as well, lending a new air of ecumenicity and variety to the meetings. If all of such groups are tallied together, the people called Friends who hold evangelical faith in Latin America may be approaching 100,000 strong. This is highly significant to Friends and only supports the thesis of writer Philip Jenkins in his book <u>The Next Christendom:</u> <u>The Coming of Global Christianity</u>, that the demographics of world Christianity now strongly favor the southern parts of the globe. North American Christians, says Jenkins, will increasingly find themselves influenced and interacting with Southern worship styles, thought processes, and theological formulations. I believe this is already true of Friends Christians.

The EFI regional gathering for 2004 will be in Asia Region, now scheduled to meet in mid-May in Mussoorie, North India, in the area where new ethnic Garhwali congregations have been planted by EFM. An executive committee for Asia Region, headed by Filipino Jaime Tabingo met in Delhi in April and laid plans that will invite a small group of Friends leaders from twelve different locations in south Asia (Taiwan, Philippines, Indonesia, Cambodia, Myanmar, Bhutan, two places in Nepal, and four locations in India). While Asia has the smallest numbers of any EFI region, the potential, of course, is far larger. Many declare this to be the "Century of Asia" in reference to world economics, global forming events—and for Christian ministry! To symbolize this shift toward Asia and the southern hemisphere, the five-person EFI Council, composed of a director from each continent, the EFI Director and the EFM Director as an observer, has scheduled its triennial meeting to coincide with the India meetings in May 2004.

Please pray for Evangelical Friends International. It is clearly on the move. These are amazing, complex and exciting times for the organization. What is happening in matters of Christian faith in Africa, Asia and Latin America is being felt in North America now and will be felt more so with the passing of each year.

Barclay Press

Barclay Press has served the Friends Church through the publication of books, pamphlets, curriculum, and periodicals since 1959. With a focus on the great commission, spirituality, and social responsibility, Barclay Press seeks to deliver publications that stimulate positive change in the life of the reader. A concern for effective communication has been part of the Friends movement from its beginning. As an expansive ministry, it shares our Christian message with both believers and seekers.

A new, dynamic website launched in April 2003 features the following sections:

- Conversation Café
- Bookstore
- Writers' Lounge
- · Information Desk

This communication venture recognizes that publishing is not limited to creating product with paper and ink. It offers a way to connect with more people in new ways.

The **Conversation Café** includes magazine-length articles with the opportunity to respond; "a daily journal"—entries every weekday from a designated writer sharing personal reflections, ideas, prayers; reviews and recommendations of books; and an excerpt each week from *Fruit of the Vine*.

Titles in the **Bookstore** include Barclay Press publications and selected works from other publishers. Online shoppers can search for books by author, title, or keyword, or browse in the following categories: spirituality, social responsibility, outreach, and Friends.

The Writers' Lounge offers a place to become better acquainted with book authors and also with the people who have written articles and journal entries on the Barclay Press website.

The new online communication does not replace print publications currently being produced. Publications such as the *Adult Friend* Sunday school curriculum (used by approximately 7,000 individuals each week) will continue to play a vital role in the ministry of Barclay Press. Also, approximately 2,500 households use the daily devotional readings from *Fruit of the Vine*.

Pamphlets such as The People Called Quakers by Arthur O. Roberts, Meet the Friends by Paul Anderson, Waging Peace by Ralph Beebe and John Lamoreau, and A Family of Friends by Jack L. Willcuts are used widely. The Barclay Press books most in demand are the ten-book missionary biography series by Betty Hockett, followed by Why Friends Are Friends by Jack L. Willcuts, Barclay's Apology in Modern English, and Robert Barclay's Catechism and Confession of Faith. Other books in the Barclay Press "top 10" include Unlocking Horns (David Niyonzima and Lon Fendall), Rich Heritage of Quakerism (Walter Williams), More Energy for Your Day (Chuck Mylander), Messengers of God (Arthur O. Roberts), Christians in the Crossfire (Mark McMinn and James Foster), and The Jekyll/Hyde Syndrome (Mark McMinn).

Barclay Press is releasing its newest book, *Prayers at Twilight* by Arthur O. Roberts, at the same time HarperSanFrancisco is releasing Arthur's *Exploring Heaven: What Great Christian Thinkers Tell Us about Our Afterlife with God.*

The ministry of Barclay Press would not be as effective without its committed staff—Dan McCracken, publisher (manages the overall operation of Barclay Press including editorial oversight, marketing, and finance); Liz Allen (Sunday school curriculum, *Fruit of the Vine* subscriptions, book orders, and general office tasks); Dan Cammack (nurtures two-way communication between churches and Barclay Press); Susan Fawver (copyediting and proofreading for all publications including *Adult Friend*, *Fruit of the Vine*, and book manuscripts); Paula Hampton (handles contact with *Fruit of the Vine* writers and edits devotionals); Katharine Matchette (editor of *Adult Friend* and *Adult Friend*—Leader); Kati Voth (financial accounting and assisting with general office tasks); and Ron Woodward (editor for online communication). Others such as Sherry Macy, Phil Baisley, Donna Allison, and C.G. White provide editorial and page layout services on a contract or freelance basis.

Barclay Press is located at 211 N. Meridian St., #101 in Newberg, Oregon—near the Northwest Yearly Meeting headquarters office and the campus of George Fox University. It is governed by a board of directors with broad geographic representation from evangelical Friends.

George Fox University

George Fox University has existed throughout its history to "demonstrate the meaning of Jesus Christ by offering a caring educational community in which each individual may achieve the highest intellectual and personal growth, and by participating responsibly in our world's concerns." The nature of this commitment makes us partners with the church.

A George Fox education is designed to be more than knowledge transfer. It seeks to provide a process of change during which students grow personally, intellectually, and spiritually. George Fox faculty and staff members support this distinct mission of preparing students who will be leaders with Christian values for today's society — alumni ready to set the moral compass for our culture. We continue this mission for the sake of the church and the world in which we live.

This report shares some highlights from the past academic year.


Strategic Plan to Guide Vision Planning for George Fox University's future took a significant step forward with the adoption of a six-goal Strategic Plan for George Fox University. The plan was approved by the Board of Trustees at a three-day October planning retreat. The goals were guided by a vision statement that addressed the question: What does it mean that George Fox University is Christ-centered and how will we know that we are?

The goals, in brief:

- · Establish and improve the financial health of the university
- Develop an operational definition of quality
- Complete several important current initiatives
- · Bring health care programs to the university
- Investigate possible acquisition of the property belonging to Providence Newberg Hospital, adjacent to the campus
- Prepare a master plan for campus facilities

Gift of Land for Athletics Fields A gift of 23.8 acres of land valued at \$2.7 million will allow George Fox to begin planning for future athletics fields north of the campus. The gift by Ken and Joan Austin, Newberg, gives the university opportunity to free up current athletics fields for other uses. The donated land is bound by Crestview Drive, Villa Road, and Mountainview Drive. It is being given in conjunction with the donation of an adjacent 11.8 acres to the Newberg School District for construction of a new elementary school, to be named for Joan. Ken is a member of the George Fox Board of Trustees. Planning for field development is under way, with the timeline determined by fund raising.

One of "America's Best Colleges" Again George Fox continues its ranking as a first-tier university by U.S. News & World Report in its annual listing of "America's Best Colleges." In the Universities-Master's category, west region, George Fox ranked 19th of 33 institutions. Nationally, the Carnegie classification category includes 572 universities — 126 in the West — that provide a full range of undergraduate and master's level programs, but few doctoral programs. This was the second year George Fox has been listed in the Universities-Master's category. Before stepping up, George Fox was first in academic reputation in the western region of Comprehensive Colleges-Bachelor's.



Wood-Mar Hall Renovation Completed The final step in the renovation of historic Wood-Mar Hall was completed mid-spring with the culmination of a \$1.2 million project. After a 12-year absence, the Office of the President is back in its traditional home in the landmark building. The project also added engineering classrooms, labs, and offices on the lower two floors of the building. The president's office is back in the space that served seven presidents from 1911 to 1991.

Once destined for razing, the building has made a comeback in dramatic fashion. Renovation has kept the period look of the building and restored the original west main entrance with a new two-story-high portico. Renovation began in 1994 when third-floor Wood-Mar Auditorium was gutted and replaced with a new updated auditorium.

Salem Center Added George Fox now has another "official" home. In addition to the founding Newberg campus, the Portland Center, and the Boise Center, a Salem Center was opened spring semester. Located at 2600 Pringle Road, S.E., it has classrooms, offices, computer lab, counseling rooms, and a student lounge. It houses classes and programs for about 110 students in two graduate and two undergraduate programs.

George Fox also began offering degree-completion classes in Redmond in Central Oregon. Classes for management and organizational leadership began in April. The 15-month program involves evening and weekend classes for working adults.

Enrollment Highlights Strong graduate program growth boosted George Fox University's fall semester enrollment to a record 2,745 students, a four percent increase over the prior year. Graduate student enrollment rose 17 percent to 939 — including 202 seminary students. For the first time, graduate and non-traditional enrollment topped the traditional undergraduate total (1,314).

It was the 16th consecutive year for enrollment growth. Spring semester enrollment was even higher — 2,792, up another two percent.

Remembering, Responding on Serve Day George Fox's fourth annual Serve Day took on special meaning. The usual second Wednesday of September scheduling coincided with the anniversary of the September 11 terrorist attack on New York City and Washington, D.C. In keeping with that, and bolstered by President Bush's calling for Americans to respond with service, the theme was "Remember, Reflect, Respond."

An estimated 1,500 students, staff, and faculty participated in more than 50 service projects as the Newberg and Portland campuses closed for the day. Projects included help at youth and adult care centers, a library, senior citizen housing, parks, service agencies, churches, and schools.

Serving Beyond the Community The end of classes between semesters, for spring break, and at the end of the school year didn't mean relaxation for nearly 200 students who participated in Winter Serve, Spring Serve, and May Serve programs. Students traveled to 13 sites in five states, British Columbia, Cuba, Jamaica, and Brazil. Their efforts in the West took them from inner cities to help the homeless to mountain camps to help children with disabilities, and from work projects at a coastal camp to an urban church to help in outreach ministries. In Jamaica they helped at an orphanage. In Cuba they did work projects for a church. In Brazil they helped at a school. Students raise their own support and in each case assist in the work of sponsoring organizations.

Friends Center Founded In cooperation with Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends, George Fox established a new Friends Center as part of the seminary. The purpose, outlined in the vision statement, is to "create a center for leader-ship formation, training, education, clarification of call, and preparation for ministry of evangelical Friends in the Northwest and beyond."

The university is providing office space and classroom facilities at its Portland Center and is providing seminary faculty and administrative support. Northwest Yearly Meeting is funding salaries and operating expenses, providing Friends instructors, and naming a board of directors. Named as the center's first director is Richard Sartwell, former pastor of Newberg Friends Church and a member of the George Fox Board of Trustees.

Four Graduations Add 750 Alumni More than 750 students became alumni in four separate ceremonies during the year. The largest number — more than 500 — graduated in two ceremonies May 3. Included were 267 receiving bachelor's degrees and 244 receiving graduate degrees. The guest speaker was David Rawson, former United States ambassador to Rwanda and Mali, and a member of the Friends Church. Fifty-six graduated with bachelor's or master's degrees in Boise Center ceremonies June 7. The speaker was Phil Eastman II, partner in the Boise-based consulting firm, Leadership Advisor Group. In midyear commencement ceremonies December 21, nearly 200 graduates received diplomas. The speaker was Bill Essig, vice president of international programs for Northwest Medical Teams International, Inc.



Friends Center at George Fox University

"Beginnings" are a wonderful mix of hope, excitement, fun...and a whole lot of work! At last year's Yearly Meeting sessions, the concept of a Friends Center was approved as an idea and a goal. Now the Friends Center has a director, a board, an office, and even stationery!

The heartery of our Yearly Meeting is vibrant lives of faith lived out in our churches in a way that brings more and more people into a growing relationship with Jesus Christ. One of the key elements in bringing that about is strong leadership development of those among us who will serve not only in pastoral roles, but also as clerks and ministry team leaders. The Friends Center was established to find, develop, and equip women and men to minister effectively as Friends in Northwest Yearly Meeting. The vision is much broader than simply providing graduate level classes:

The vision for a Friends Center at George Fox University is to create a Center for leadership formation, training, education, clarification of call, and the preparation for ministry of Evangelical Friends in the Northwest and beyond. We envision the Center impacting the world with some of the testimonies Friends have embraced. We desire to maximize the resources of the seminary and under-



Dick Sartwell has been serving as Friends Center Director, giving around halftime hours to this position since last fall—which is a real act of service, considering he has only been released financially since January at quarter time pay! Dick clearly is called and definitely gifted for this role, and it is a privilege for us to have him on the ground floor of developing Friends Center. In this first half year, Dick has built relationships with current Friends students at the seminary, met with a myriad of Yearly Meeting (NWYM) and George Fox University (GFU) boards, established an office at the seminary in Portland, finalized details of the arrangement between George Fox Evangelical Seminary (GFES) and NWYM, worked with Colin Saxton to develop presentations on leadership issues to NWYM pastors, and prepared to teach a seminar course this fall on "Quaker Pastoral Ministry," open to graduate and undergraduate students and other interested persons.

The Friends Center Board has been organized and had its first meeting on March 19, 2003. One of the great joys of that meeting was to brainstorm the potential of the Friends Center in benefiting our entire Yearly Meeting. GFES has tremendous resources that will be at our disposal. As classes and other workshops are developed, we will have opportunities to distribute them in various ways and make them available to local churches all over the broad geographical region of NWYM. Interactive CDs, interactive web technology, and even live interaction between a class at GFES and people taking the same course in Entiat, WA or Klamath Falls, OR are possibilities as time goes on. The Friends Center will truly be a benefit to our whole Yearly Meeting, not just for students who can move to Portland to attend classes.

Obviously, many challenges face the fledgling Friends Center. Finding ways to connect with seminary students one-on-one in the "commuter" environment, raising significant scholarship and operating funds, and finding specific ways to serve local congregations in their own context with leadership training are just a few of the major ones.

For those considering seminary education within our NWYM churches, it is worthwhile to strongly consider attending GFES through the Friends Center. The seminary does an excellent job of preparing people for ministry, and the Friends Center adds the mentoring, fellowship, and training to more effectively prepare for ministry among Friends. In addition, if we increase the number of Friends students at GFES, we will receive a rebate of up to 75% of those additional tuition hours from GFES. It's a win/win situation!

I'm personally very excited about the future of Friends Center. Please do pray for Dick Sartwell, the board, and the students at GFES. Feel free to talk with Dick Sartwell or myself if you have further questions.

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT

We have reviewed the accompanying statement of financial position of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church (a not-for-profit organization) as of December 31, 2002 and the related statements of activities and changes in net assets, and cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. All information included in these financial statements is the representation of the management of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

A review consists principally of inquiries of Organization personnel and analytical procedures applied to financial data. It is substantially less in scope than an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements taken as a whole. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

Based on our review, with the exception of the matter described in the following paragraph, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

As disclosed in Note 6 to the financial statements, management has informed us that the Organization has not determined the cost of its defined benefit pension plan in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, which require the cost of employees' pensions to be recognized over the employees' respective service periods and a liability to be recognized when the accumulated benefit obligation exceeds the fair value of plan assets. The effects of this departure from generally accepted accounting principles on financial position, changes in net assets, and cash flows are not reasonably determinable.

Our review was made for the purpose of expressing limited assurance that there are no material modifications that should be made to the financial statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. The information included in the accompanying supplemental schedule, as listed in the table of contents, is presented only for supplementary analysis purposes. Such information has been subjected to the inquiry and analytical procedures applied in the review of the basic financial statements and we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made thereto.




