#### Monday, July 23, 8:15 a.m.

■ 1. Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church convened its 115th annual sessions on Monday, July 23, on the campus of George Fox University. The theme for this year's sessions is "Go Light Your World." Attendance was estimated at 190.

■ 2. Presiding Clerk Lon Fendall greeted those in attendance. Traveling minutes were read, brought by Emily Maddison, from Young Friends General Meeting, visiting from Newcastle-upon-Tyne, England; and Susanna Kromberg, from North Pacific YM. Other visiting Friends in attendance include Nancy McLauchlan representing Friends World Committee for Consultation and North Pacific YM; Andrew Esser-Haines from Central Philadelphia Monthly Meeting in Philadelphia Yearly Meeting; Erin McDougall, from Clear Creek Monthly Meeting in Ohio Yearly Meeting; and Tom Ewell and Catherine Whitmire from New England YM.

■ 3. NWYM Superintendent Colin Saxton introduced new pastors in the Yearly Meeting:

unrelated to each other, named Gil George. He proposed keeping them straight by calling the associate pastor at Boise "Gil George the Elder" and the new pastor at McKinley Hill "Gil George the Younger." ■ 4. The meeting worshipped, led by Brian Boyd, Cherice Bock and Bruce Bishop.

5. Bruce Bishop reviewed some principles of Quaker group discernment.

■ 6. Lon introduced Assistant Presiding Clerk Lorraine Watson and Recording Clerk Ron Mock. Lorraine suggested some practical measures to help with the conduct of the meeting. Lon reviewed the week's agenda.

■ 7. Yearly Meeting Director of Finance and Development Dave Hampton brought the finance report. Dave described the work of the Northwest Yearly Meeting Foundation to help Friends develop estate plans that honor God; and the Friends Church Extension Fund, which funds improvements at member churches and in supporting new churches. Dave explained how the various boards' ministry plans support staffing recommendations and the proposed 2008 budget. The Yearly Meeting is still heavily dependant on two sources of income: Great Commission (now "local church support") pledges from local congregations, and designated funds. A review of the designated fund budget showed that only about 20% of these funds had been donated with restrictions. The rest, which came from Yearly Meeting allocations from unrestricted money, has been put into a new Ministry Fund. The balance is left in a Restricted Fund.

Under our new system, as funds come in from local church support, they are directly allocated to various boards on a percentage basis. Additional support for the boards' work comes from transfers from the Ministry Fund, with each board getting an equal amount. As boards undertake projects that fit the restrictions originally placed on them by donors, they receive allocations from the Restricted Funds. As a result there is now only one budget where all funds, from whatever source, are tracked.

Dave reported that individual giving to our local churches has increased 42% over the last 10 years. Local church giving to the Yearly Meeting has increased 20% in 10 years. Thus, the percentage of local church funds going to the Yearly Meeting has dropped from 12.5% to 9.9% in the last 10 years, a decline that represents about \$150,000 a year. Last year the Yearly Meeting received \$644,519 from the local congregations. This year that income was budgeted to be \$678,000, but is projected to amount to \$625,000. The proposed budget for 2008 calls for \$682,500 from local congregations.

Colin reviewed staffing recommendations from the boards. Current staffing is about 7.25 FTE. Original proposals from the various boards added up to a staff totaling 10 full-time-equivalents but that was trimmed to 8.25 FTE for the final proposal to the Yearly Meeting. One major objective of the proposed staffing plan is to provide more field staff to support local churches:

Full-time Staff: Superintendent Director of Finance and Development Associate Superintendent – Youth Ministries Associate Superintendent – Global Ministries and Pastoral Care Associate Superintendent – Local Church Ministries and Pastoral Care Administrative Secretary Part-time Staff: Bookkeeper (.75 FTE) Communication and Resource Director (.50 FTE) (new position) Friends Center Director (.25 FTE)

Hispanic Ministry Coordinator (.25 FTE) (new position)

Ministry Assistant – Young Adult Friends and Peace Education (.50 FTE) (new position)

Lon reported that the Yearly Meeting will discuss the ministry plans, staffing proposal, and budget beginning on Wednesday. He invited questions for clarification.

#### Monday, July 23, 10:46 a.m.

■ 8. The meeting worshipped in song and prayer. The meeting also learned a chorus to be sung after each board report. Attendance was estimated at 210.

■ 9. Judy Woolsey, clerk of the Board of Communication, brought its report. Tim Engle of Newberg Friends won this year's Evangelical Friends International Publishers of Truth essay contest. The board is working on improving the Yearly Meeting's website, making it more interactive and useful, and has two workshops at this year's session to help local congregations enhance their internet presence. Jason Schwanz, who has led the redesign effort, displayed some of the new features available on the site, representing the fruits of hundreds of hours of work. The Yearly Meeting's capabilities will receive a boost from cooperation with George Fox University.

■ 10. Dave Woolsey presented the report of the Board of Elders, which he clerks. The board's focus this year will include updating the Elders' Handbook as a resource for local elders, clarifying the process for recording ministers, improve support for local pastors, and oversight for the superintendent.

■ 11. Bill Moormann, clerk of the Board of Local Outreach, presented its ministry plan. The board plans to be a resource to local congregations to help them pursue the visions they generate. The board is proposing to offer start-up grants to help new ministries. Rather than have the Yearly Meeting start new meetings, the board plans to provide resources and support to local meetings when they feel called to start new works.

■ 12. Noel Carey, representing the Board of Youth and Young Adult Ministry, presented its ministry plan (Clerk Leslie Hodgdon Murray was absent due to giving birth). Noel stressed the new efforts being made to help young adult Friends (YAFs) connect with each other across the Yearly Meeting. The board also encourages youth groups to integrate service and outreach into youth ministry activities. The board is planning to offer training and other resources to youth leaders, including the Kaleo Training Conference at George Fox. Questions were raised from the floor about how to minister to young adults in major university towns like Corvallis, OR, and Pullman, WA, where we do not have a local church, and how Yearly Meeting-sponsored training events can be made available to congregations far from Newberg. The proposal to add a young adult ministry assistant in the Yearly Meeting office is intended, in part, to address these kinds of challenges.

■ 13. Lon reported that some area officer positions are vacant, and efforts will be made to fill them during this week. Each area names a member to the

Nominating Committee which works to make sure the many Yearly Meeting board positions are filled. Nominating Committee Clerk Leann Williams will step down this year. Administrative Council nominated Vickie Wolk-Laniewski to replace Leann. The meeting approved Vickie as the new clerk of the Nominating Committee.

■ 14. Colin Saxton, Yearly Meeting superintendent, reported that, assuming the staffing plan is approved this week, the positions of ministry assistant, communication and resource coordinator, Hispanic ministries coordinator, and the associate superintendents for global ministries and local church ministries would be open, involving a search for candidates.

15. The session closed with worship in prayer and song.

#### Tuesday, July 24, 8:15 a.m.

■ 16. The meeting worshipped in song, sharing, and prayer. Attendance was estimated at 200.

■ 17. Karen McConaughey, clerk of the Board of Congregational Care, introduced the members of the board. She shared the board's priorities: training in discernment, strengthening families (including "love and logic" approaches to parenting), and providing a variety of resources to churches in counseling, traveling ministry, technology, and the arts.

■ 18. Laurie Conant, clerk of the Board of Christian Education and Discipleship, presented its report. The board is developing training resources for those teaching in the churches, including regional training events using Jim Teeters' "Training With Style" approach and workshops at area meetings this fall. The board is planning to continue providing missionary news for young Friends, Christian Education grants for local church Christian education initiatives, and peace education (including conflict resolution and practical peacemaking).

■ 19. Johan Maurer shared ten "commandments" of discernment in groups.

■ 20. Dan Cammack, clerk of the Board of Global Outreach, shared its ministry plan. Dan recognized the members of the board and shared a summary of its vision. The board spent time this year envisioning what it would like to be doing by 2012, emphasizing dramatic increases in local congregations' connection to and involvement in holistic cross-cultural ministries, including evangelism, service, justice, peacemaking and reconciliation, and

■ 21. Chuck Mylander, director of Evangelical Friends Missions, brought a report from that organization. He shared his concerns about persecution of believers in Bangladesh, including a crisis unfolding this week reported by Albert Adhikari. The meeting prayed for the situation there. Chuck shared about several initiatives the yearly meetings are supporting, including leadership training in the Great Lakes of Africa region, and transformational development programs in Rwanda and Nepal. Candidates are preparing for placement in Rough Rock, AZ, Ireland and Mexico.

■ 22. Ron Stansell, Evangelical Friends International council director, brought a

report of EFI activities. EFI is experiencing significant growth, including the creation of a new EFI-Europe region connecting Friends' works in Hungary, Ireland, Russia, Serbia, Croatia and Romania, including work with Muslim groups in Europe. Also, ministries in Asia are multiplying, with a dozen new ministries since 1991.

■ 23. The meeting was urged from the floor to remember to pray for those who persecute believers, as well as those who are being persecuted. A recommendation was made to prepare a minute of solidarity and encouragement for those being persecuted. Lon encouraged those who share this concern to draft a minute for the meeting's consideration.

24. The session closed with worship in song.

# Tuesday, July 24, 10:45 a.m.

■ 25. The meeting worshipped in prayer and song. Attendance was estimated at 205.

■ 26. Trey Doty, clerk of the Leadership Development and Enrichment Board, shared its ministry plan. The board is working with George Fox University to develop a mentoring plan for its candidates. It is also working on enhancing the recording process, including regional recording celebrations. The board's Subcommittee for Pastoral Care is exploring hosting regional retreats for pastors, in addition to the annual Focus Conference. Alarmed by numbers showing a decline in Quaker students enrolling at George Fox (down to 74 in 2006-2007 – the lowest level since the 1950's), the board is working to better support those who are attending and help new students be able to enroll. Partly through the Friends Center, the board is trying to improve its efforts in leadership development.

■ 27. Dick Sartwell, Friends Center director, reported on its work. He thanked Ron Woodward for his service as clerk of the Friends Center Board. The seminary has added six short courses to its Friends curriculum, taught on weekends, which are available through the Center to anyone in the Yearly Meeting for a nominal charge. Dick thanked Friends for donating generously to help increase financial aid for those students who are taking the courses for credit.

■ 28. Leann Williams, clerk of the Nominating Committee, brought its report. The new nominees approved by the meeting include:

Board of Elders - Three-year terms: Rebecca Ankeny, Gilbert George (the elder)

Board of Congregational Care - Three-year term: Arden Kinser

Board of Global Outreach - Three-year term: Maurice Roberts

Faith and Practice Committee - Howard Macy

Finance Committee – Marilee Anglin

Nominating Committee – Vickie Wolk-Laniewski (who was approved on Monday by the Yearly Meeting).

Friendsview Retirement Community – Three-year term: Cindy Johnson; Two-year term: Vicki Stave The committee's nomination of Michele Gore for the Board of Youth and Young Adult Ministry was withdrawn pending clarification of where she is attending.

Leann reported that the Nominating Committee, whose members (other than clerk) are named by the Areas, has openings from the Boise Valley, Greenleaf, and Southwest Washington areas. Gil George reported that Boise Valley and Greenleaf are working toward merging the two areas. Greenleaf Area reported that Veva Longstroth has been appointed to fill its vacant seat.

The following corrections were noted to the printed Nominating Committee report:

Leann encouraged those with a concern for children's Christian education be in prayer to discern whether they are called to serve on the Board of Christian Education and Discipleship next year. She also challenged the Yearly Meeting to be more intentional about developing candidates for the clerk positions and other roles. A member of the meeting urged parents to consider working on the Board of Youth and Young Adult Ministry, which is entirely populated now by young adults and youth leaders, none of whom are parents of youth.

■ 29. Officers of the Yearly Meeting for the coming year were approved as follows:

Presiding Clerk: Lon Fendall Assistant Clerk: Lorraine Watson Recording Clerk: Ron Mock Treasurer: Dave Hampton

■ 30. Colin Saxton, Yearly Meeting superintendent, commented on the implications of the ministry plans submitted by the various boards. Seeing the boards' visions emerge has been exciting and energizing to those involved, especially in how the various plans combine into a coherent vision for the Yearly Meeting. The ministry plans open new opportunities for the Yearly Meeting. On the other hand, they also imply new responsibilities, since they will change the Yearly Meeting. For example, enhanced cross-cultural ministry will change the ethnic and cultural makeup of our membership – are we ready to welcome these people to our family and adapt to help make them comfortable? Members of the meeting were encouraged to talk to members of the various boards to better grasp the scope and inspiration of the ministry plans.

■ 31. Lon noted three opportunities for members to become acquainted with new George Fox University President Robin Baker: a workshop at 1:00 this afternoon; an informal opportunity to meet him and his family this evening; and the official report from the university on Thursday morning.

32. The meeting worshipped in song.

# Wednesday, July 25, 8:18 a.m.

■ 33. The meeting opened in song and prayer. Several Friends shared aloud, so that worship lasted over an hour. Attendance was estimated at 205.

■ 34. Colin Saxton shared with the meeting about how he sees his call to minister as Yearly Meeting superintendent. He highlighted several areas in which he hopes to work in the coming year, including:

- · building connections within the Yearly Meeting
- · helping to clarify and develop visions we have for the Yearly Meeting
- · strengthening the structure of the Yearly Meeting
- · supporting the development of the Yearly Meeting staff
- · nurturing growth in the Yearly Meeting
- improving leadership development, since many key pastors are approaching retirement

Colin then left the room while the meeting considered renewing his call. Assistant Clerk Lorraine Watson reminded the meeting that Colin's call currently expires at the end of December, 2007, and reviewed the process by which Colin has been evaluated by the Administrative Council, which led to the following proposed minute:

The Administrative Council recommends the appointment of Colin Saxton for an additional three years of service as Superintendent of Northwest Yearly Meeting. This service will be until the end of June, 2010. His call will be reviewed for possible extension at the Yearly Meeting Sessions in July, 2009.

This minute was approved.

■ 35. Ken Beebe, representing the Administrative Council, reported on the council's work in the inaugural year of the new Yearly Meeting structure. He also explained how the Administrative Council arrived at the proposed budget, representing an increase in support from local churches of 9.2% over the roughly \$625,000 projected to come in this year. The original ministry plans would have required a 45% increase. The Administrative Council has some fallback options if giving runs slower than budgeted next year, including postponing hiring dates for staff increases, or spending more than 5% of the Ministry Fund (and thereby reducing its ability to serve in the future as an endowment fund). Questions were raised from the floor concerning:

- · how salaries are set.
- how we will know whether part-time employees are performing as well as we hope.
- whether one person can manage both global outreach and pastoral care duties. Colin explained that the intent was to spread pastoral care duties among various positions, pointing out that the Superintendent and the Local Church Ministries Associate Superintendent also have pastoral care duties. The hope is to achieve some efficiency as opportunities for pastoral care arise in conjunction with other work around the Yearly Meeting.
- about whether the budget for global outreach is adequate for peace and social concerns issues, and whether it has the membership to adequately address peace and social concerns. Dave Hampton

explained that the Christian Peacemaker Team support increased this year. Many of the other peace and social concerns activities are under other boards, particularly the Young Adult Friends and Peace Education position.

 how the budget and ministry vision process is open to change. Colin encouraged those who have concerns that fall under the broad scope of various boards to seriously consider whether they are called to serve on those boards. Specifically, the Board of Global Outreach has responsibility for ongoing missions work, but it has room for more members.

■ 36. The meeting was instructed to meet as areas in various sections of the auditorium to discuss the proposal for area gatherings and get acquainted with one another.

#### Wednesday, July 25, 10:45 a.m.

■ 37. The meeting worshipped in song and prayer. Attendance was estimated at 350.

■ 38. Lon welcomed the youth to the Yearly Meeting business session.

■ 39. The meeting continued its consideration of the ministry plans, staffing and budget. Colin encouraged the meeting to avoid thinking of our ministry as being in two categories of missions and peacemaking, or even missions versus peacemaking. He encouraged seeing them in a new way as integrated in holistic ministry. Dave Hampton reported that the amounts in the 2006 budget for peace packets and Christian Peacemaker Teams are maintained in the 2008 budget, as is the Thanksgiving Offering. The peace education coordinator is proposed to continue, now as a permanent position, in the staffing proposal. The only thing not carried over was the \$1,800 budgeted for the old Peace and Social Concerns Board. However \$10,000 is included in the proposed 2008 budget for matching grants to local congregations for social justice/compassion/evangelism ministries, which includes peace and social justice projects.

Concern was raised from the floor that in the future it would be good to have a Yearly Meeting staff person who can focus on children's ministry. Others recognized the challenges of taking on a significant budget increase.

The proposed ministry plans, staffing plans, and budget were approved by the meeting. A copy of the approved budget is included in the Appendix (page 71).

■ 40. Lon introduced a proposed minute in support of our brothers and sisters in Bangladesh. Concerns were raised that the minute didn't mention our love for those suffering in Bangladesh, our prayers for their consolation and restoration in the midst of their suffering, and our hope to continue discerning with them their path in the future. The meeting approved the minute as proposed and authorized Gil George from Tacoma to meet with the group that drafted the minute to consider adding wording to cover these concerns. After revisions, the minute read:

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Bangladesh,

We have heard of your faithfulness and stand with you in the dangers you are facing. We affirm our love for you and also our material support through EFM. While we know you may suffer for your faithfulness, we also believe your witness to Christ, in submission to God, could further His Kingdom in ways beyond our knowing. We have been challenged to be willing to suffer for Christ, if required by the truth, because of your courage and example. May God be glorified in your witness and faithfulness; we stand with you in your time of trial.

As one body we offer first our loving prayers. Though great distance separates us, we are close, even one, through Jesus. You are not alone! We commit our voices, alongside yours, to our Lord Jesus.

Secondly, we would like to encourage you to live Christ's teaching to love your enemies and do good to those who are persecuting you (Matthew 5:44). We will continue to pray for you and your persecutors. Our prayers are that your Christlike example will convict the hearts of your persecutors and that Christ's peace will rest upon you regardless of your current trials. We would also like to remind you of the faithfulness of Jesus to restore us even when we fall, and know that we are praying for your brothers and sisters who have fallen away through this persecution.

As a final word of encouragement, "May the Lord make your love overflow for each other and for everyone else, just as ours does for you. May He strengthen your hearts so that you will be blameless and holy in the presence of our God and Father when our Lord Jesus comes with all His Holy Ones" (I Thessalonians 3:12-13).

We heard epistles from each of the groups, celebrating activities during Yearly Meeting including worship, service in the community, and recreation.

■ 42. Lon introduced a set of proposals for organizing areas within the Yearly Meeting. Lon noted that representatives meeting on Sunday indicated some are concerned that the proposal for handling local minutes was not as ready for approval as the rest of the proposal. He suggested those who had concerns on that point should work today to suggest revisions before the meeting takes the

matter up for decision on Thursday.

■ 43. Lorraine read a note from the Quaker Hill camp staff asking for prayer for God's protection during a land use hearing this evening regarding a neighbor's proposal to build multiple family dwellings adjacent to the camp.

44. The meeting closed with worship in song.

#### Thursday, July 26, 8:17 a.m.

■ 45. The meeting opened with worship in song and prayer. Attendance was estimated at 180.

■ 46. Lon introduced the new president of George Fox University, Robin Baker, and Board of Trustees Chair, Barbara Palmer. Robin briefly shared his testimony. He reported that faith in Jesus Christ continues to be the core of the University. The University now has campuses in Newberg, Portland, Salem, Redmond, and Boise, with a growing variety of undergraduate and graduate degrees. The University will be exploring this fall how to better connect with the Yearly Meeting, and is asking members of the meeting to complete a survey to help in that process. The University has a budget of about \$52,000,000, mostly from student tuition. Colin Saxton asked the Yearly Meeting to pray for Robin and the University. Although the University is dissatisfied with the amount of help it is able to give to Friends students, some endowed scholarships and a modest amount of church matching grants are available for Friends students. The University offers specific Friends course work, and its required Bible and Religion classes are taught primarily by Friends, thus introducing all the students to the Friends perspective.

Concern was raised that something needs to be done to reverse the recent decline in the number of Friends students at the university, and to make the student life experience better reflect Friends' ethos. Robin reported that students who are believers increasingly do not identify with a denomination, and even Friends students seldom attend the unprogrammed chapel which is available as an alternative to the regular required chapel. Paul Anderson reported that new faculty are required to take a course in Friends distinctives. The meeting stood and prayed for the University and its new president. One Friend shared his experience of being mentored as a Friend which stuck with him through his military service and eventually led him to revise his views on war. Another was concerned that the University take more seriously the need for students to have a distinctively Friends experience at George Fox.

■ 47. Lon introduced Barbara Palmer, who brought the nominations of Fred Gregory and Curtis Strauss as new members of the GFU Board of Trustees, along with nine returning members (Carrie Lamm Bishop, Steve Fellows, Keith Galitz, Dale Hadley, Steve Jabusch, Stan Leach, Jim LeShana, Stan Morse, and Victor Peterson). With these nominees, the board will have 21 Friends members, 17 from Northwest Yearly Meeting, out of 33 total members. This satisfies the requirement in the University's charter that four-sevenths of the board be Friends, two-thirds of whom must be from Northwest Yearly Meeting. A Friend asked why Barbara is called a chair rather than a clerk. She reported that she runs the board meetings in the Quaker discernment mode, as a clerk, but the term chair is

more familiar to those outside the University. She explained that nominations are made by a committee of the Trustees, with input from the Yearly Meeting superintendent. Nominees are approved by the board, then the Yearly Meeting Administrative Committee, and finally the Yearly Meeting as a whole. The meeting approved these nominees.

#### Thursday, July 26, 10:17 a.m.

■ 48. Jules Glanzer, dean of George Fox Evangelical Seminary, presented its report. He thanked the Yearly Meeting for its support of the Friends Center. The Seminary's enrollment is increasing, accreditation was extended for 10 years. Jules encouraged Friends to start encouraging gifted young people to consider the ministry as early as middle-school age.

■ 49. Bruce Alford, from the Board of Congregational Care, recognized those who have celebrated their golden wedding anniversary: John and Janet Lyda, and Leroy and Marian Powell.

■ 50. Dennis Russell, executive director, and Frank Engle, marketing director, shared the report on Friendsview Retirement Community. Currently 57% of the residents are Friends, with 45% of the intent list identified as Friends. The community has a more ecumenical flavor than in the past, but still carries a strong Friends ethos. The community has grown from a \$5,000,000 facility a few years ago, to a projected \$45,000,000 when current expansion projects are completed to the new Springbrook Meadows facility being constructed on 8.5 acres in the eastern part of Newberg. Next year \$124,000 will be distributed to assist Friends residents. The goal for 2011 is to increase the assistance fund to \$2,000,000, and to increase to 10% the proportion of residents receiving such assistance. The intent list is growing, with 300 people now on the list, 120 added in 2006 and an anticipated 160 more this year. The waiting period for the main campus is now up to four years. The key attractions are the community's faith based non-profit mission, its connection to George Fox University, and the availability of long-term care on campus. Comments from the floor expressed appreciation for the beauty of the building and grounds.

■ 51. The meeting worshipped in song and testimony. Attendance was estimated at 190.

■ 52. Bruce Bishop presented the following proposal for Sharing Minutes of Concern and Minutes of Support. The intent is to make clear that any local meeting can share its minutes wherever it feels led, but if the intent is to bring something to the floor of the Yearly Meeting, it should be done in good order.

Proposal for Sharing Minutes of Concern and Minutes of Support

Any individual may be moved with a concern or a call to a ministry. This concern should be brought to the local meeting for weighing, to receive seasoning, correction, and support. We encourage monthly meetings to share any Minuted Item of Concern or Support directly with their sister churches of NWYM, with any applicable YM board, and the YM Presiding Clerk.

There will be times when the local meeting is led by Christ to raise

a question or propose a challenge that is beyond the scope of its own meeting. If the meeting is convinced that Christ is calling them to speak to a wider gathering of Friends, the clerk of the local meeting will contact the Area Clerk to gain the Area Gathering's participation in discerning any further steps. The Area Gathering will meet for worship and to seek Christ's direction in responding to the question or challenge. Several possible results may come from the Area:

- 1. The question or concern may be *validated* and given weight, to then be referred via the YM Clerk to the Yearly Meeting Representatives or the appropriate board.
- 2. The question or concern may be *revised*, and then validated and given weight, to then be referred via the YM Clerk to the Yearly Meeting Representatives or the appropriate board.
- 3. Even without agreement at the Area level, the question or concern may seem *a good point of discussion* that the Area wishes the Yearly Meeting to consider. It would then be referred via the YM Clerk to the Yearly Meeting Representatives or the appropriate board.
- 4. The gathered body may discern that the question or challenge is *not to be forwarded at this time* and is returned to the local meeting for their continued consideration and prayer.

This process allows individual or corporate leadings to be checked and affirmed by the local meeting and the Area before coming to the floor of the Yearly Meeting. This builds awareness and ownership on the local level, allows us to experience the support or check of our most immediate faith community, and gives weight to items considered at Yearly Meeting sessions.

Such minutes would be considered at the June Area Gathering, following any monthly meetings that occurred after the YM agenda was released to Representatives in late April. If a concern arises after that time and a specially called Area meeting cannot be arranged, the Representatives, gathered on the first day of Yearly Meeting sessions, would act on behalf of the Area Gathering.

It is important for sound teaching and practice around discerning the leading of Christ corporately and individually to occur at the local and area levels.

Lon also summarized the rest of the proposal for Yearly Meeting area structure, the text of which is reproduced in the Appendix (page 61):

- Designation of the following area officers: Clerk (replacing Area Superintendent), Recording Clerk, and Treasurer. The Area clerks serve as primary organizers of Area gatherings, preside over business and discernment, and connect the Area to the Yearly meeting office and presiding clerk.
- Area officers will be nominated in business session by named Representatives from each local church.

- Designation of a Sunday in early October and another in early June as "Yearly Meeting Sunday," to highlight connection to the Yearly Meeting, and to lead into Area Gatherings on the same or subsequent Sunday.
- Area Gatherings will be opportunities for worship, business, and training. The October meeting would hear reports from Yearly Meeting and emphasize training and other activities. The June meeting would emphasize preparation for Yearly Meeting, including election of officers, recommending a representative for the NWYM Nominating Committee, and consideration for approval of concerns to be forwarded from local meetings to the Yearly Meeting or its boards. Special business sessions can be called by the Yearly Meeting at the request of at least two local congregations.
- Re-invigorating the process adopted in 1998 for minutes proposed by local minutes for the Yearly Meeting.

Concerns from the floor were raised about the Administrative Council's decision to delete the requirement that Nominating Committee membership be approved by the Yearly Meeting as a whole. Committee members' terms are staggered so that roughly one-third will have terms expire each year. The Nominating Committee will work to have its report finished in time for June Area Gatherings.

The meeting approved the revised wording on Sharing Minutes of Concern and Minutes of Support. The meeting discussed at some length whether the Nominating Committee area representatives should be subject to approval by the Yearly Meeting. The proposal was approved as revised.

■ 53. The Board of Elders recommended the following terms of office for the Administrative Council:

One-year term: Cleta Crisman, Brad Holton, Beth Benham Two-year term: JoAnne Magee, Mark Ankeny, Ken Beebe Three-year term: Katrina McConaughey, Mark Kelley, Sharon Hayden

These terms will start this year. The meeting approved the proposal.

■ 54. Patty Federighi, one of our representatives to the Friends World Committee for Consultation, reported that she has been serving the last two years as clerk of the Pacific Northwest Region of FWCC. Activities have included a regional conference on "Poverty, Compassion, and Economic Justice" at Reedwood, with a keynote address from Colin Saxton. The Annual Meeting for the North America Section was at Moses Brown School in Providence, RI. The World Triennial in Dublin, Ireland, will convene in early August under the theme "Finding the Prophetic Voice for Our Time." Our representatives are Elenita Bales, Carole Spencer, Orville Winters, and Julie Peyton, with a keynote address to be given by Ken Comfort.

■55. The Administrative Council brought forward three nominations to serve as representatives to FWCC:

One-year term: Anna Baker Two-year term: Sharon Hayden Three-year term: Julie Peyton The meeting approved these nominations. Three other positions are open, and will be nominated later this year.

■ 56. Julie Peyton brought this year's epistle which was approved by the meeting:

"I saw also that there was an ocean of darkness and death; but an infinite ocean of Light and love, which flowed over the ocean of darkness." – George Fox

"For once you were in darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light." – Ephesians 5:8

#### To Friends Everywhere:

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church (NWYM) is composed of nine area (quarterly) meetings, representing more than 60 churches from Washington, Idaho, and Oregon. We gathered, as we do each year, to worship and to do business; to make new friends and deepen old friendships; to inspire each other and renew our commitment to be children of the Light, to act as daughters and sons of God through our faith in Christ Jesus.

Our theme this year was "Go Light Your World!" and we heard evening keynote addresses from our YM superintendent, Colin Saxton; Jules Glanzer, Dean of George Fox Evangelical Seminary; and special guest David Niyonzima, Coordinator of Trauma Healing and Reconciliation Services (THARS) in Burundi, Africa. They exhorted us to face the darkness fearlessly. צעעעעעעעעעעעעווווו

David Niyonzima told his story of surviving the genocide in Burundi in October, 1993, of the transforming grace of God that resulted in his ability to face the man that had murdered eight of David's students with the words, "I forgive you." He assured us there is a cure for that despair that hides in the darkness, and that a transformed self is required before we can go out and light our world. "The work of Light is not finished."

Colin's talk was based on Ephesians 5:8-10, and he reminded us that the most common exhortation of scripture is not to love others or to have faith, but *have no fear*. He challenged us to stop relying on our past Quaker history, and to start making our own stories. Colin stopped frequently during his message to give Friend Ken Comfort time to interpret the message into Spanish. Our Latino Friends are growing in number, and dozens were present on Sunday evening. It is our deep hope and desire that we can bridge the language barrier and be fully inclusive and welcoming.

There is a verb in Spanish that will help this epistle segue to the report of what happened, of what work was accomplished during these annual sessions: *brotar*. It describes the action of a newly sprouted plant that is breaking out and up from the rich darkness of the earth into the sunlight above. The same verb is used when water actively bubbles up from an artesian spring, or when tears suddenly appear in our eyes. If our new YM logo shows a well-grown tree, then it is a logo of hope and faith that our brand new structure for boards, committees, and budgetary process will indeed germinate and grow into a healthy, fruit-bearing tree in the Kingdom of God. With that metaphor, let us tell you what kind of tilling, planting, and

watering went on during the past twelve months and into this week.

To the casual observer, one who just looks at the program outline, not much changed from last year to this year. We still started our annual sessions with the men's and women's banquets, where we heard from our overseas workers about their efforts, joys, and concerns. Each day we still had our business sessions and board meetings, plenary worship times and keynote speakers. The afternoon workshops continued to demonstrate both the practical and theological aspects of our Christian mission. Our evening worship services this year specifically have encouraged us to shine God's light fearlessly throughout our world. Later, our musicians entertained and inspired us as we chatted and played games at The Hoot late into the night.

So yes, many things were the same, but this year marked some huge changes. The first change most of us noted on arrival was the weather; we asked if it could possibly be Yearly Meeting time if the temperature is below 90° F (low 30's for you Celsius scale users) and there is actually some *rain*? But the weather was just a tiny portent of the changes wrought in our YM structure. Last year, after a careful and prayerful two-year process of study, work, and discernment, we decided to overhaul our committee and administrative structure, and some of our budgeting process.

The changes went much deeper than renaming committees or moving columns in a balance sheet. Many of us sensed a very different atmosphere around the sessions that had nothing to do with the cooler temperatures we enjoyed. If you have read our minutes and epistles from the past few years, you know we were deeply divided over some difficult issues. During the past twelve months, members and clerks of our new boards were "on sabbatical" from new ministries; dreaming and discerning how they could function to help both the YM and the local churches fulfill their callings. This week during the business sessions (and some of the workshops) we heard the results of their prayers and labor, and we witnessed the excitement they are feeling. The work of discernment this week for our representatives was in listening to the new mission statements and discerning if these are, indeed, speaking for us the direction and work we feel God is wanting for us. Periods of worship were interspersed throughout the business meetings in order to keep our hearts in tune with the Spirit. At the end of the week, we gratefully affirmed this season of preparation and the goals set for our future.

Early in the week, we were confronted with the persecution Christians throughout the world are enduring due to their faith in Christ. After hearing about the Evangelical Friends Mission work in Bangladesh and the persecution they are currently experiencing, we rose and prayed for them, and in response to the expressed concern of one Friend we were moved to write a minute of support to our brothers and sisters there.

Another item to note is the hoped-for revitalization of the *area (quarterly) meetings.* The nine areas that make up NWYM will meet two times during the year, in the fall and the spring. The representatives will gather to do YM business such as nomination work and seasoning concerns and minutes brought by individual churches; more general programs and workshops can be provided by the boards to encourage, instruct, and build up the local

churches. Also we expect to introduce Yearly Meeting Sundays in conjunction with those area gatherings, where information about YM business will be made available to local churches at their meetings for worship.

A new addition to this year's annual sessions was the Closing Celebration Banquet. In past years, Friends left at different times as their responsibilities or the general program ended, with the representatives often staying an extra day to finish business. It has been unsatisfying. This final meal together was a fitting last hurrah: two choirs, children and OAFs (older adult Friends), serenaded us; the week was recapped in pictures, including photos of the Youth Car Wash in action; we commissioned and blessed Johan and Judy Maurer who will soon move to work in Russia; we were introduced to our Latino pastors, two of whom work with more than one congregation; we welcomed the newest mission point to join NWYM – RiversWay in Beaverton; and were sent forth with closing words from our beloved superintendent, who was asked and agreed to serve for another three years.

We cannot end this epistle without a mention of our wonderful young people, who had their own parallel annual sessions and who, as usual, led our Wednesday evening worship with joyful music and maturity of Spirit. They also clerk the unprogrammed meetings for worship that follow the dinner hour. Our children give us hope for the future of our meeting; please do read and enjoy their epistles.

If you have read this far, we thank you for your forbearance. Last year in our epistle we asked you to pray for us, that God would comfort our hearts. This year we invite you to rejoice with us, as the tender new plant begins to grow, as we continue our work of faith and labor of love, being salt and light in the world.

- Jake Hess: youth need to take leadership within their own youth groups and adult youth leaders need to be more reliable and responsible; youth groups need to have more "spiritual fire" and help generate spiritual growth; Yearly Meeting needs to do a better job communicating what the events and programs that are available are so that people can get there and participate if they want to.
- Scott Cornwall: curriculum that engages high school youth where they're at in life; area gatherings of multiple youth groups; better communication is needed within the Yearly Meeting; keep teaching and explaining Quaker values within churches; view high school rather than college as the transition time to adulthood.
- Molly: intergenerational events; sister church events; better training for adult youth leaders.
- Ian Lamm: encourage youth and young adults to take adult leadership roles – youth should go to church services; intergenerational events; youth group epistles; Yearly Meeting blog or forum.

- 35. Family groups shared the recommendations that they came up with for the Youth and Young Adult Ministry Board. The meeting then worked on combining and paring down the family groups' recommendations to create final recommendations for the board, which are as follows:

- With the desire to be intergenerational, we would ask that the board communicate with other boards and look into intergenerational mentoring.
- That the board will look into creating a transitional retreat for graduating high school seniors; and that the board would continue to support young adults making a transition into adulthood during and after high school.
- Under the umbrella of a desire for greater communication and community, we recommend the following: sister youth groups; area youth group activities; better communication from the Yearly Meeting to the youth groups; better communication from FYE to the youth groups; a more effective way to keep in touch with one another and keep the NWYM community together, with the internet (forum) specifically in mind as the means for doing so, as well as the possibility of brief epistles from individual youth groups to one another.
- There should be an area regional coordinator for the youth and they should be provided with resources and direction in holding quarterly or periodic events (i.e. area rally).

# ADDENDUM ANNUAL REPORTS July 2007

#### **Board of Elders**

The Board of Elders is one of the Yearly Meeting boards that has continued in similar function during the reorganization process. While our role has generally remained the same, the reorganization process has been very good for us. It has helped us sharpen our focus and plan specifically how we can accomplish those goals.

Plans for the coming year include a major revision of the Elders' Handbook, which is an important resource for local church elders. This is in response to much discussion across the Yearly Meeting about the role of local elders. The general superintendent will help facilitate this revision process.

Another goal is to clarify the processes for recording and licensing of pastors in our yearly meeting. We understand this, at times, has been confusing for local congregations and we hope to encourage ministry, not discourage it.

A high priority in coming months is to evaluate and increase effective yearly meeting support for local pastors. We deeply appreciate the vital role of our pastors and want to provide timely support on an ongoing basis. This is the reason for our request for yearly meeting staff time devoted to this priority.

Along with encouraging and supporting pastors, another responsibility the Board of Elders gladly carries out is ongoing care and support of the superintendent. We are thankful for Colin and the great working relationship we share.

We are making a conscious effort to join you in your local ministry. As a ministry priority, we as elders have committed to "pray diligently for the ministry of NWYM individuals and churches." Won't you join us in that commitment?

#### Board of Christian Education and Discipleship

This year the Board of Christian Education and Discipleship spent time getting to know one another, looking back over ministries NWYM has done in this area in the past and thinking about possible future priorities and ministries. After prayerfully holding our ministry description and the NWYM vision and mission statements, we felt as a group that providing teacher training, materials and resources for Christian education, and peace education were the areas we should focus on first.

One of the ways we hope to provide training is by holding three regional teacher training workshops led by Jim Teeters based on his book, "Teaching with Style." These workshops will also offer a way for everyone to share what is going on in their programs and to connect and build relationships between teachers and churches.

As a board, we were drawn to scripture passages that portrayed the image of brother helping brother, of working in twos, of coming alongside one another to support, encourage and spur one another along. Providing opportunities to help these types of interactions take place will be an important part of our ministry plan.

In addition, some of the things that we would like to continue are:

1. Our support of *Go! Missionary News for Young Friends*. We feel this is a valuable teaching tool and we have noticed an increase in interest and use of this publication. It is available online, to be read or downloaded and printed at: www.nwfriends.org/ministries/children/go/.

2. We would like to continue the Christian Education Enhancement Grants which are matching grants of \$250 to aid local churches in their education programs. You can download a description and request form at: www.nwfriends.org/category/news/opportunities/.

3. Peace Packets – information on peace and alternatives to violence which our board provides to high school juniors. Some resources are available at: www.nwfriends.org/ministries/active-peacemaking/.

4. Peace education is another area that we feel is important. We think it would be good to use the restricted funds that are to be used specifically for peace education to go towards hiring a peace coordinator. This person would provide the information and the venues for peace education, discussions, and ways to respond to war, violence and injustice. We need to be more timely and have a stronger, more active presence on these issues for our youth as well as for adults. We need to be more available and consistent in sharing our message of peace and alternatives to violence.

We also would like to educate our youth on conflict resolution. We would like to provide an avenue where they can be educated and given the opportunity to practice peacemaking. This would be done through facilitated role playing so they can acquire the skills to practice peace in their day-to-day living. To accomplish this we would like a peace coordinator to organize and lead a workshop that would be held in several areas so youth groups could attend and learn together.

#### Board of Congregational Care

#### Board of Global Outreach

This report gives an update on continuing ministries inherited from the old boards of Missions and Peace and Social Concerns. Another report will be given on the floor of the yearly meeting that will focus primarily on the development of the new Board of Global Outreach and its ministry plan for 2008.

#### **Christian Peacemaker Teams (CPT)**

*Matt Chandler* and *Joy Ellison* are in Palestine right now, Matt as a reserve corps member and Joy as a full-time CPTer. Both of them are in the midst of fundraising and will receive some financial assistance from the Board of Global Outreach. Anyone is welcome to send donations for Matt and Joy to the Yearly Meeting office or to CPT's office in Chicago.

#### Latin America

Hal and Nancy Thomas are now based in Newberg, Oregon, but traveling extensively in Latin America. They continue efforts to close down NWYM's mission in Bolivia and will hopefully be able to wind that up by the end of 2007. They also continue to give support to the masters program in intercultural studies which they created at the Bolivian Evangelical University (BEU). That program is now being directed by one of their former students. Hal and Nancy are spending more and more time with the doctor of ministry program (called PRODOLA) that works with students throughout Latin America and is overseen by Latin American Christian Ministries, Inc. (LACM). There is a covenant of partnership between our board and LACM which allows the Thomases to increase their involvement with PRODOLA while giving some ongoing attention to BEU and the Friends work in South America.

#### **Teaching Abroad (TA)**

This year there were five ladies teaching English in Asia and it looks like that number will increase to eight for the next school year. We continue to be excited about the reports we hear of students showing interest in the gospel of Jesus Christ and some that have made decisions to become His disciples. The need is still great for more teachers to be involved in this kind of ministry. We also have a teacher, *Karen Swenson*, in Budapest, Hungary, and an associate of TA in Casablanca, Morocco: *Jeanine Selix (children Abby, Gillian, and Steven)*.

#### Russia

Liz Sugden and Patrick and Christy Neifert (children Ethan and Megan) moved to the city of Elektrostal and have been concentrating on getting to know the people and their needs. There is one Bible study going on right now. Liz is with us during this yearly meeting week and will be returning to Russia in the fall.

Johan and Judy Maurer are getting ready to join Liz and the Neiferts in Elektrostal. They are in the midst of pre-field training and raising financial

and prayer support. They were able to spend about a week in Moscow and Elektrostal during the month of June along with *Ken, Tonya, and Katie Comfort* who are the coaches for the Russia team. While there, they spent parts of three days meeting together as a team and seeking the Lord's direction for the new work in that part of the world.

#### North Africa

Bill and Betty Kelley (children Joel, Mark, and Faith) have been on home assignment in the Pacific Northwest since December and will return to North Africa in September. Joel and Mark will remain in Newberg as students at George Fox University. The Kelleys will be starting their second term of service.

**Paul and Meredith Morse** have just finished their second term of service and have moved back to their home in Tigard, Oregon. The Frontiers team they were supporting in North Africa disbanded, so this seemed like a good time to return to the United States to be close to aging parents and to continue ministry here on the home front. Paul and Meredith will be available for deputation starting in September.

#### Conclusion

We continue to value our involvement with Evangelical Friends Mission (please take time to read EFM's report). Several people from NWYM have found avenues of service through EFM, such as the David Thomas family, the David Howell family, and Chrissy Muhr. Furthermore, our yearly meeting gets to expand our global vision by working together with the other yearly meetings that make up EFM. It is truly a blessing to have these kinds of partnerships in God's Kingdom work.

## **Evangelical Friends Mission Report**

The Lamb's War is underway, and God is on the move. It is exciting to see the victories, and sometimes terrifying when persecution strikes back.

#### Persecution

"Following the Lamb wherever He goes" is a battle, and it sometimes results in injuries and casualties. As I write, word came of some of our workers and wives seriously beaten up in Bangladesh. A rickshaw was smashed; the sole means of livelihood for one man who refused to leave Jesus Christ and return to Islam. Ten believers were beaten, some requiring hospitalization. Our leaders in Nepal and India send reports of persecution as well.

#### **Professions of Faith**

Ever since many of our people started fasting in addition to tpraying for missions, the number of people turning to Christ has greatly increased. By the end of the first five months of 2007 we had nearly as many people reportedly turning to Christ as in all of 2006. The total number may more than double by the end of the year.

What's happening in Asia, and to some degree in other places, runs parallel to the Book of Acts—healings, demons cast out, traveling evangelists, churches planted, extraordinary miracles, good works, and the remarkable ministry of the Holy Spirit. #### **Great Lakes Leadership Training**

Under the leadership of Lon Fendall we are entering the second year of leadership training in the three countries of Burundi, Congo and Rwanda. Each country has its own unique approach for training new Christians, mature Christians, and pastors. Academically, some are taught at a simple level, others at a high school level, and a few at the university level. A number of the teachers are graduates of the Great Lakes School of Theology. In the first year over 100 received training. Our goal is to train 500 by the end of five years. *All of our growing mission fields work hard at leadership training*.

#### **Transformational Development**

The efforts of Dr. Samson Retnaraj in Nepal and Debby and David Thomas in Rwanda, the FARMS micro-loan funds—and many other projects on a smaller scale—are transforming families and sometimes communities in health care, education, animal husbandry, and small businesses. People are learning to read their Bibles, get vaccinations for their children and battle poverty—all in the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

#### **Thirty Year Perspective**

EFM began in 1978. Next year will be our 30<sup>th</sup> birthday. Today our EFM missionaries and national leaders report over 300 churches (including house churches and ministry groups) with an average attendance of 14,000. This includes only the fields directly supervised by EFM and not those led by our regions/yearly meetings.

#### Looking to the future

Since God is on the move sending workers into His harvest field, the need for training centers keeps knocking on our doors. We have them in Rwanda, but feel urgent needs in Nepal and India. Your church can help.

#### **Build Here, Build There**

Some churches such as Hayden Lake Friends in Idaho and Canyon Hills Friends in California have given a tithe of their building funds to missions for buildings and special projects. These capital funds make a huge difference for the Kingdom. Plant the seed in your congregation now for the next renovation or expansion of your facilities.

#### Strategic opportunities for capital funds come up at various times. Right now (May 2007), we have a couple of possibilities.

**Bhaktapur, Nepal (suburb of Kathmandu)** A combination church and headquarters building is under construction. Nearly all the funds have come from the local people but they have borrowed to the limit. An amount of \$18,000 would complete the initial building and another \$10,000 would furnish the present two stories. It would take \$100,000 to complete the five-story building.

**Mussoorie, India** Our thriving Friends church was meeting in the local hospital. However, a major Hindu donor gave a huge grant to remodel the hospital. The new plans left no place for the church to meet. A \$45,000 gift has been given toward a new location but prices have shot up and twice that much (or more) may be needed. Currently the church is jammed in a small room that seats 60 people and it is packed out.

#### **New Candidates**

Joe and Tina Swan, pastors of Buckland Friends Church in Alaska, sixty miles south of Kotzebue, were accepted at our Spring Board meeting as new candidates to the Navajo in Rough Rock, Arizona. They will go as soon as their training seminars are completed and their prayer partners and financial supporters are committed.

#### **Current Candidates**

David and Tricia Howell (Ireland) and Edwin and Maria Giron (Mexico) are both working full time at raising their support.

#### **Quick Notes on EFM Missionaries**

Short-term missionaries Michelle Carpenter and Chrissy Muhr in Rwanda are doing a great job in Kigali teaching missionary children. They each have one more year of service.

Dr. Samson Retnaraj in Nepal purchased a new SUV (Scorpio, an India brand).

Brad Carpenter in Rwanda purchased a 1999 four-door Helix pick-up.

**David and Debby Thomas in Rwanda** are completing a two-room addition that will move their three girls out of the garage bunk beds and into their own rooms.

Sangi Vanlal in Nepal went through major surgery in Kolkata, India, including a plate and some bone inserted into her neck to take pressure off a nerve causing extreme pain and some paralysis in her hand. She is recovering well, the pain is gone, and her hand movement is partially back. She expects to regain full movement.

**Bob and Debbie Adhikary in Nepal** will spend a year on furlough from summer 2008 to summer 2009. This will allow Sarita to spend her senior year in high school here before going on to college.

**D.K. and Choity's daughter, Tani**, has announced her engagement with wedding plans for July 14, 2007, at the Carey Baptist Church in Kolkata (Calcutta). The pulpit that William Carey used is still in the church.

Jeremy and Betty Smuck and Candi Foster in Mexico have their permanent FM-3 visas which allow them to do public missionary ministry. Andrea Byrne has a permanent visa for music since she plays in the Aguascalientes Symphony Orchestra, but now is working hard to get the additional missionary type visa.

Kathi Perry in Ireland moved to Greystones, a half hour away from Dublin with the intent of starting a second *Cairde Christian Fellowship*. *Cairde* is Gaelic for Friends.

God is on the move, and our best days are just ahead.

• Supporting efforts to start new Friends churches in conjunction with local areas by creating a team to encourage and facilitate the work.

• Challenging Friends churches to have an intentional response to the ongoing Iraq war with a real focus on using such a response as outreach.

#### Board of Youth and Young Adult Ministry

We have moved from a spirit of "come one, come all" in our youth department meetings to having a board named by the Nominating Committee of the Yearly Meeting. Andrew Arthur, Noel Carey, Scott Cornwall, Sarah Pruitt, Zac Stallman, Nate Swift, James Tower, Chase Willcuts, Janelle Woods and myself, Leslie Hodgdon Murray, make up the board. We met twice in the spring to develop our ministry plan. We are excited and unified in our vision for youth ministry in the Northwest.

#### Finance Committee Treasurer's Report

Much attention has been given to the reorganization of the Yearly Meeting over this past year. One of key elements is a complete restructuring of Yearly Meeting finances. This report will be the last in the current format. Hopefully the new format will address some of the challenges folks have had with understanding the current report.

The 2006 financial summary included in the Appendix (page 67) highlights all the revenue, expenses and fund balances for last year. On the revenue side, church payments to the Great Commission budget increased a little less than one percent from the prior year. We are grateful for this increase but are still concerned because church giving continues to not keep pace with rising expenses and local church budgets. Designated gifts which combine with church payments to make up nearly 90% of the Yearly Meeting budget, were down from 2005. Investment income and unrealized gain on investments were both significantly higher than last year which enabled total income to come in with an increase of more than three percent.

Great Commission Budget expenses of \$616,665 were \$60,327 less than income as a result of both the additional investment income and reduced expenses, particularly during the second half of the year. Total expenses were 4.7% over the prior year at \$1,397,000. While it is difficult to compare the old and new financial structures, one of the most comparable figures is total expenses. Total expenses for 2007 are budgeted at \$1,377,273 which is 1.5% below 2006 expenses. This reflects a conscious decision to take a sabbatical on some ministries while the new boards were forming. The proposed budget for 2008 is an 8.3% increase over 2007 but the average of the two years works out to about a 3.5% annual increase.

The 2006 designated fund activity indicates a decrease of only \$17,500 or less than one percent. This means that a combination of designated gifts, transfers from the Great Commission budget and investment gain funded nearly all \$1,007,000 of designated fund expenses. The ending fund balance of \$2,542,700 constitutes the beginning balance in the new board structure after the balances were reallocated to the new boards and the ministry fund.

Also included in the appendix on page 70 is a copy of the 2007 Yearly Meeting Annual Budget. Normally, the current year's budget is not a part of the treasurer's report but due to the transition, many have not yet seen it. During last year's annual sessions we approved the local church support portion of the annual budget but authorized the Administrative Council to approve the balance. The report on page 70 represents that approved budget. Also located in the appendix on page 71 is the proposed 2008 Yearly Meeting Annual Budget that will be presented for approval at this year's annual sessions.

**NORTHWEST YEARLY MEETING FOUNDATION:** Formerly known as Friends Fund, the Yearly Meeting Foundation continues it mission of assisting members with their estate plans. The Foundation has two free resources to help with this process. An Estate Inventory Form and the Estate Planning Resource Guide are both available on the Yearly Meeting web site or by contacting the Yearly Meeting office. The Foundation also continues to work with Gene Christian, a professional charitable estate planner, to provide confidential one-on-one estate planning services at no charge to Yearly Meeting members. Contact Dave Hampton at the Yearly Meeting office to set up a time to meet with Gene.

The Foundation has also made good progress on improving its financial stability. Due in large part to several recent estate gifts, total notes outstanding have been reduced from over \$900,000 to a little over \$350,000. In addition, cash reserves now stand at over \$150,000. The resulting reduction in interest expense allows us to provide the estate planning services mentioned above at no charge.

**FRIENDS CHURCH EXTENSION FUND:** The Friends Church Extension Fund (FCEF) is the part of the Yearly Meeting that makes loans available to local churches and other organizations that are part of NWYM to assist with property and building projects. Funds for these projects come primarily from Yearly Meeting members that invest in FCEF certificates which pay a competitive rate of interest. Several new projects within the past year mean that FCEF has a need for additional investments. Interest rates are currently at the highest they have been for a number of years. For more information on FCEF certificates contact Dave Hampton at the Yearly Meeting office for a prospectus and current rate information.

#### Northwest Yearly Meeting Trustees

Since July 2006 the Northwest Yearly Meeting Trustees have dealt with the following things:

1. Sale of part of New Life Friends Church Property closed. The sales transaction between Northwest Yearly Meeting ("NWYM") and Lovelace Properties, LLC, which was reported as being in process in July 2006 was closed on August 22, 2006. This involved the sale of property facing on Fourth Plain Blvd in Vancouver; the elimination of certain agreements executed by a previous owner; and NWYM receiving a parcel of property which "squares out" the New Life FC parking lot. A loan from Friends Church Extension Fund ("FCEF") which had financed the original purchase of the

New Life FC property was paid off and NWYM is holding a note and trust deed from the buyer.

**2.** Sale of other New Life Friends Church Property. The sale of a house in Vancouver, Washington, formerly used by New Life FC in its ministry to men which was reported as in process in July 2006, fell through. Another sale of this property was closed on September 27, 2006. Sales proceeds were applied to a loan from FCEF which had financed the purchase with a small amount going to New Life FC. This was done at the request of New Life FC.

**3.** Agreement for use of New Life Friends Church property for City of Vancouver Recreation. As of February 1, 2007, we entered into a use agreement between Lord's Gym Community Center (a ministry of New Life FC), NWYM (as owner of the property), and the City of Vancouver for use of portions of the New Life FC facility for some City recreational activities during certain hours.

4. Washington Property Tax Exemption Reports. Annual property tax exemption reports were prepared and submitted for six Washington church properties where title is in the name of NWYM.

**5.** Entiat Friends Church Mortgage. On May 14, 2007, we executed a mortgage on the Entiat Friends Church property to secure Entiat's loan from Friends Church Extension Fund to finance a heating and air conditioning system. (This loan has been partially paid by a Share Call.)

# NWYM Superintendent's Report

Three years ago, when I began serving as NWYM Superintendent, I outlined a few significant priorities that I felt needed time and attention. These included some intentional work at re-establishing a healthy sense of connection throughout the Yearly Meeting: greater effort given to identify, equip and release leadership to serve among us; a process for clarifying our sense of mission and vision; and a move to consider and implement organizational changes that would better free us to pursue God's leading for us. We have made significant headway in many of those areas over the last couple of years. Certainly there is still work to do, but I credit the progress we have made to the work of the Holy Spirit among us and the willingness of Friends throughout NWYM to work together in new and creative ways.

Since our last Yearly Meeting sessions, we have seen many transitions occur. Our old board and commission structure has been transformed into eight new boards with some new and exciting visions for what we can do together. This is coupled with a commitment to better focus on assisting our local churches through board ministries. The former Executive Council has become the NWYM Administrative Council. This wonderfully effective and highly motivated circle of Friends is charged with helping us keep focused on God's vision for our Yearly Meeting and in helping us through this period of change. Similarly, the way we allocate our resources has been transformed to insure we are applying them to our ministry priorities. You will hear more about these developments this week as our boards present their recommended ministry plans. I am very grateful to our new board clerks and all the board members for their willingness to labor through this change process with a spirit of grace, patience and sense of adventure.

You will also be looking at a new staffing structure for NWYM, as part of the recommended ministry plans. From the outset of our long-range planning process, we agreed that NWYM staff should be a function of our ministry priorities. By working with the NWYM boards, we believe we have put together a staff model that will help us carry out the ministry of NWYM, provide opportunities for leadership development and training along the way. In the event the ministry plans are approved this week, I will be working diligently with others over the next few months to identify individuals called to serve in any vacant positions.

There have been other good developments in and around NWYM over the last year. We have added RiversWay (Beaverton, OR) as a mission point to our collection of churches. I also have ongoing contact with several other people scattered around the Northwest with interest in beginning other mission points. In addition, our six Hispanic churches are finding a new level of stability, even as we look to plant other churches of this kind. The number of people interested in seminary education is on the rise. This is critical to the future vitality of NWYM as our core of pastoral leaders continues to move toward retirement.

Other good developments are going on, too. Many of our local churches are continuing to reach out to their communities and across the globe in new, creative and redemptive ways. These efforts to both proclaim and demonstrate the Good News of Jesus are resulting in people becoming committed disciples and modest growth in some of our churches.

With expert help from Jason Schwanz, the Board of Communication has launched our new website. This more interactive and updated site should be a valuable resource to those in and out of NWYM. In December, we were able to host a retreat for all new board members. Under Bruce Bishop's good leadership, we spent valuable time learning how to function effectively as board communities, committed to listening to God together. The NWYM Foundation (formerly Friends Fund) Friends Church Extension Fund (FCEF) have both been very active this year, helping individuals prepare estate plans that reflect their values and in providing our local churches with the resources to improve or expand their facilities. Finally, many of our youth activities, programs and camps continue to draw our young people to Christ and, hopefully, prepare them for future leadership within NWYM and service in Jesus' Kingdom.

All this is good news! Yet there remain many challenges in front of us. Though the organizational restructuring has gone very well, there have been bumpy places. Several of our boards would be well served to have additional members who are called and passionate to serve. We are not at all finished. All of the boards are *just beginning* the work of a new vision for ministry. Times of change and regrouping can be (and have been) frustrating for some.

Other things trouble me, too. I'm concerned that we still lose too many of our young people. We need to change this. I don't mind when they are called away... I just don't want to lose them. I am concerned, as well, that a few of our churches continue to struggle with conflict. This is a great sadness to me. I wonder, too, if we Friends will find our prophetic voice again—let our lives and voices speak truth into our world's woes. The world needs that kind of ministry from us—as we call people to Jesus, model lives of simplicity, wage peace, seek justice, and bear witness to the fact that Christ truly is present among us, leading us in the ways of the Kingdom.

Even as we meet this week, we are going to be challenged to approve an annual budget that will stretch us. Frankly, the budget you will consider is A LOT less than our boards requested, but more than last year. Do we have the faith and willingness to give at a level like this? I hope so!

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This is also the year you decide whether or not to extend my call as superintendent. I continue to really love serving among you. I am challenged by you and am really grateful for your support. In addition, it is a joy to work with the NWYM staff. They are a terrific and gifted group of people. I also know, however, that the day will come when it will be right for you and me to make a change. Until that time, I will do my best to be the superintendent NWYM needs.

I will tell you that in the coming year, I intend to focus my energies in the following areas:

1. Getting any new staff members hired and on board. These will be critical selections that come at an important time in our history.

2. Focusing on church planting. My new job description calls for active involvement in helping to start new churches. I am really excited about this. I want to see NWYM grow and expand in influence and ministry across the Northwest.

3. Continuing to help our boards flesh out the vision of NWYM. As I said, we are just beginning this work. It will need the attention of all NWYM staff and board clerks to keep us on track and moving ahead.

4. Developing leadership. In particular, I will be paying attention to pastoral leadership this year. We are going to need a new crop of men and women to serve in pastoral ministry in the next few years. These people will come from within and from outside NWYM. Someone, however, needs to encourage them. One piece of this that is also connected to my new job duties is going to be in raising funds for Friends Center scholarships. I would love to talk to any of you who would be interested in investing in the education and equipping of our future pastoral leaders. At the same time, I am continuing to work on a new scholarship proposal to assist GFU undergrads with their educational expenses. GFU is a great place for our young people to gain the training and worldview they will need to effectively minister in their world.

5. Encouraging our local churches. I continue to be convinced that the most important ministry of NWYM happens in and through our varied local churches. These gatherings are the training ground for discipleship, the laboratory for learning how to love one another, the launching pad for sending ministers (all of you) into the world. They need our best support.



#### **Evangelical Friends International Council**

The past 12 months for Evangelical Friends International have been busy and complicated, but God has been at work in Africa, Asia and Latin America among evangelical Friends.

**History**. Back in 1991, the positions of EFI Council Director and Evangelical Friends Mission Executive Director were delegated to two separate individuals. James Morris continued with EFM, but he had a deep concern that the EFI Council establish an identity as an ecclesial body not directed per se by North American missions interests. With that understanding, I accepted the EFI Council Director position and James continued as EFM Director before his retirement. EFM is a mission agency for EFI-NA. Chuck Mylander is the Executive Director of EFM. EFI Council is the world network of Friends representing both autonomous yearly meetings and mission points under various evangelical Friends agencies. I am the director of the Evangelical Friends International Council.

James Morris foresaw the need for international networking, the encouragement of missionaries from the Global South, and freedom for Friends in the Global South to exercise their own initiatives in a variety of ways outside the framework of Evangelical Friends Mission. A rotation of regional leadership gatherings every three years was established and the five-person International Council has met every three years. The EFM Director has been added as an observer. That has meant Carolyn and I have traveled once most summers either to Asia, Africa or Latin America. There have been four conferences in Asia, four in Africa, and four in Latin America.

**Finances.** A simple program of self-assessment by EFI-NA yearly meetings has provided the bulk of cash to support the work of the International Council. Non-western Friends have contributed substantially by covering some or all of transportation costs for their delegates to Regional meetings in many cases, or by an annual payment in other cases. That provided almost adequate funds until 2007, when it became apparent that growth around the world has meant added conference and Director's travel expenses. In a recent meeting of EFI-NA superintendents, a proposal was drawn up to grant



added funds from EFI-NA and to increase EFI-NA annual financial support by a modest amount, but enough to keep up the regular contact and networking among evangelical Friends worldwide.

**EFI-Asia Region**. The twenty-first century is being hailed worldwide as the "Century of Asia." Yet the 1990s was the "Decade of Asia" for Friends! Since 1991 the number of evangelical Friends ministry locations in Asia has increased from four locations to fifteen. Ministries added include Bangladesh; Bhutan; Burma; Cambodia; Garhwal ministry in north India; Karnataka state, India; Kerala state, India; Kolkata, India; two ministries in Nepal; and two significant unpublished ministries in yet another location. The 2007 Asia Region Conference was hosted by Cambodian Friends in Battambang February 28-March 6.

The number of Friends in Asia is growing substantially, especially in Nepal and the Garhwal, but more important at this point in history is the increase in focal points for prayer and witness. I believe this is a necessary forerunner for far more significant growth that will come in the next twenty-five years. In Battambang, it was evident these Asian leaders love each other, find much in common for spiritual encouragement, are committed to transforming society in their corners of Asia, and are evangelistic missions-minded. They continue to support a missionary together in Burma (Myanmar). The various Indian delegates have called for a meeting of just Indians to share concerns and cooperation in programs, the Taiwanese have extensive mission programs, Cambodians talk of entering neighboring nations, and Bhutan Friends have started a church in Sikkim! John Vanlalhriata of Nepal is regional director, and his executive committee includes Edwin Daliya (Singh), Bob Adhikary, Jaime Tabingo, and a Taiwanese Friend.

**EFI-Africa Region**. Mkoko Boseka of Congo is Africa Region Director. The primary activity drawing member yearly meetings into cooperation has been the Great Lakes Leadership Training initiative now more directly tied to EFM but partnering with pastoral and church leadership programs in Congo, Rwanda and Burundi. The number of persons receiving training has increased greatly and recent graduates of the Great Lakes School of Theology (GLST), which was closed in 2005, have filled a number of key teaching and administrative positions in the new network of education. It is likely that an Africa Region meeting will be held in Congo in summer of 2008.

**EFI-Latin America Region**. More EFI members live in Latin America than any other region. Their last major event was a pastors' conference in Bolivia in 2003 that attracted about 380 attenders. They have chosen to continue their focus upon periodic pastors' conferences, the next one scheduled for Ilo, Peru, January 22-26, 2008. John Williams, Jr., EFI-NA Director, is the featured speaker; David Byrne of Houston is also on the program; and Sabino Chipana of Bolivia is the chair of the organizing committee. Most other speakers and leaders are Latino Friends themselves. Samuel Pinto is region director.

EFI-Europe Region. During the 1990s, Evangelical Friends Church-Eastern Region began supporting ministry in Hungary and EFM began ministry in Ireland. Since then it became increasingly apparent evangelical Friends were once again being called to Europe. In 2001, EFI-NA recommended to the International Council that an EFI-Europe Region be formed and that was finally completed June 5-8, 2007, in Tolna, Hungary. Pastor Antal (Tony) Frei of Hungary was named region director. There were workers and leaders present representing Friends from Ireland, Russia, Serbia, Croatia, Romania and Hungary. EFM contacts with Muslim background believers in Germany and the United Kingdom and Hungarian contacts in Albania were not granted visas in time to attend. Although the numbers are small (except in Hungary where there are approximately 3000 Friends believers), the whole spectrum of EFI-Europe now encompasses nine nations, something unimaginable ten years ago. There are likely pockets elsewhere in Europe of unidentified evangelical Friends that could and should be included in the new EFI-Europe Region.

Reports and worship were enthusiastic and joyful; people joined in prayer for one another in meaningful ways; Hungarians learned for the first time of the work of EFM among Muslims in Europe and of the NWYM work in Russia. A young and highly talented Hungarian woman has felt called to Russia for some time and is now seriously interested in knowing how to join the work of Friends in Elektrostal, Russia. The core of EFI-Europe Region is clearly evangelical and programmed, but some wonder how evangelically-minded Friends from Northern Ireland might be drawn into the fellowship as well.

**EFI Council Meeting.** The next meeting for the International Council is tentatively scheduled for Congo in the summer of 2008, to meet simultaneously with EFI-Africa Region and to allow the Latino, European, and Asian directors to sense the needs and dynamics of Africa. This is the end of the 15<sup>th</sup> year I have served in the position of EFI Council Director. Carolyn and I have immensely enjoyed our world contacts. It has been relatively easy to quietly facilitate gatherings and encourage communication, leaving the real work to others. The small annual contribution by EFI-NA yearly meetings has paid off with a rising tide of interest in missions by Friends in the Global South and now in the "New Europe." We have seen significant continent-wide networking that has produced new missions and new pastoral training programs. We have watched local yearly meetings reflect on their calling to social transformation, letting their lights shining where they are found.

The EFI Council thanks NWYM for its support. My time in this position will not be much longer, I sense, and I will be eager to see the substantial changes that will come in the work of Evangelical Friends International in the next few years.

#### George Fox University

As president, I now look forward to leading the institution in its effort to become one of the premier institutions of Christian higher education in the country. I am proud that the Northwest Yearly Meeting joins us in our mission of transformation.

#### **Brandt Retires**

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H. David Brandt, the 11<sup>th</sup> president of George Fox University, retired June 30 after a four-decade career in Christian higher education. During his nine years at George Fox, Brandt guided the university in the expansion of programs, facilities, and locations. During his tenure, the university grew from 2,345 students to 3,185. George Fox transformed from a primarily undergraduate institution into a university with nearly equal graduate and undergraduate populations. Brandt, 68, oversaw an academic restructuring that created the position of provost and divided the university into six schools, each led by a dean. Fifteen undergraduate programs and nine graduate programs were added.

During the last eight years, George Fox has expanded its outreach beyond its Newberg, Portland, Salem and Boise centers to include a site in Redmond. The Newberg campus, which was 77 acres at Brandt's inauguration, now is approaching 109 acres, with the acquisition of the eight-acre Providence Newberg Hospital site and plans for future development of a 23-acre athletics complex north of the campus.

"We have seen the university grow both in quantity and in quality," Brandt said. "The university mission statement 'to demonstrate the meaning of Jesus Christ' through higher education is clearly being implemented, so the institution is healthy and ready for the next leader."

#### **Baker Named President**

Robin E. Baker, who as provost oversaw a dramatic expansion of academic programs at the university since 1999, became president on July 1.

As provost, Baker supervised all academic programs, institutional technology, intercollegiate athletics, student life, and library services. Baker oversaw the addition of 13 new undergraduate programs and nine graduate programs. He also worked with several academic units to help gain specialized accreditation. During his tenure, the faculty has grown from 80 to 180 and the university has quadrupled institutional funds for academic research. He initiated new efforts in globalization of the curriculum and helped create the university's new Act Six program, which each year will offer 10 full four-year scholarships to multicultural Portland students.

Baker, 49, completed a doctorate in history with honors at Texas A&M University in 1989. He earned a master's degree in history at Hardin-Simmons University and a bachelor's degree from Grand Canyon University. In addition to his work in political history, Baker speaks frequently on the integration of faith and learning in the Christian university.

#### Building A Great University Hoover Renovation

A \$4.3-million expansion of the Hoover Academic Building, originally erected in 1977, was completed last fall. The building was named after former president Herbert Hoover and will display various photos and memorabilia from his life. These artifacts from the university's archives, the Herbert Hoover Presidential Library, and Senator Mark Hatfield's personal collection will be displayed in a Hoover-Hatfield library. Hoover is also honored with a Hoover Symposium, which attracts Hoover historians to campus every other year.

#### LeShana Residence Hall

The new \$7.4 million LeShana Residence Hall opened last fall. The 120-bed apartment-style residence hall houses third- and fourth-year students. The hall is named after president emeritus David LeShana and his wife Rebecca. The 40,150-square-foot building includes 20 furnished apartments, each with three bedrooms, a toilet room, a shower room, and a shared kitchen/living/dining room. Each apartment houses six students. The building features "green" strategies such as natural ventilation and thermal mass cooling, day lighting and sun shading, storm water runoff mitigation and water-efficient landscaping with native, drought-resistant vegetation.

#### Hospital Property: From Healing to Learning

This summer, the university will complete the conversion of the old Providence Newberg Hospital into classrooms and faculty offices. George Fox acquired the eight-acre property in 2006 for \$3 million. Eventually, the structure will be replaced by academic buildings and a grass quad.



#### Enrollment

Enrollment at George Fox last year was the second-largest in school history. The student body consisted of:

- 1,633 traditional undergraduate students
- 240 professional studies undergraduate students
- 1,312 graduate students
- 3,185 total students

#### Honor Roll

#### Men's Golf Launched

George Fox will expand its NCAA Division III intercollegiate athletics program to 15 sports with the addition of a men's golf team this fall. The university added a women's golf team in the fall of 2006.

#### **Baseball Success**

A dozen Bruins earned all-Northwest Conference honors as the baseball team recorded its seventh 30-win season and made its sixth NCAA playoff appearance in the last eight years. The Bruins started 19-1 and were ranked No. 5 in the nation before finishing 30-11. Conference Player of the Year outfielder Dan Wentzell was selected in the 20<sup>th</sup> round of the Major League Baseball draft by the Oakland Athletics.

#### Javelin Champ

Sophomore Joel Krebs gave George Fox its second national men's javelin champion in four years with a winning throw of 198 feet, 8 inches at the NCAA Division III National Track and Field Championships. The men's team finished 18th at the meet.

# Band and Choir Receive Regional Recognition

The university's Symphonic Band and Concert Choir earned the honor to perform at the National Association for Music Education's All-Northwest Division Biennial Conference last February in Portland. Just five colleges representing a six-state region were chosen by a national panel to perform in the event, which drew many of the region's high school choral and band directors.

#### ISI All-American Colleges

George Fox University is one of 50 colleges – joining the University of Chicago, Princeton University, and Whitman College – featured in the inaugural issue of "The Intercollegiate Studies Institute Guide to All-American Colleges."

# U.S. News

The 2007 U.S. News & World Report "America's Best Colleges" rankings named George Fox a top-tier regional university and one of the magazine's "great schools at great prices." The recognition is the 18<sup>th</sup> time George Fox has been named a top-tier school by U.S. News.

# Seen On Campus

#### Top Scholars

George Fox hosted more than a dozen authors and scholars from Stanford, Georgetown, Colgate, Texas Tech, and several other universities to discuss church-state issues at the university's "Religion in the American Founding" conference in March. Hosting the conference was Mark David Hall, the Herbert Hoover Distinguished Professor of Political Science at George Fox and author of numerous works on church-state relations in the founding era.

#### Peace Corps Director Speaks at Commencement

Ronald Tschetter, national director of the United States Peace Corps, spoke at the university's spring commencement ceremonies on April 28. Nearly 5,000 visitors attended the events as George Fox conferred 270 undergraduate degrees and 350 graduate, seminary, and professional studies degrees.

#### Italian Pianist Performs

Italian pianist Gianluca Luisi went from New York's Carnegie Hall to George Fox University's Bauman Auditorium last February, performing the first installment of the university's newly created Bösendorfer Artist Concert Series. Luisi performed on the university's Bösendorfer "Imperial" grand, one of the finest pianos made today and the only concert grand piano in the world with 97 keys. The Imperial arrived at the university from Austria last year.

#### Princeton Review

For the third consecutive year, The Princeton Review honored the university as a "Best in the West" school. It is one of 123 colleges and universities listed from 16 Western states. The Princeton Review rankings consider academics, quality of life, admissions selectivity, and financial aid. George Fox students were invited to voice their opinions about each category in an online survey hosted by the magazine.

# Reaching The Church and the World *Serve Day*

For the eighth consecutive year, George Fox closed school for a day and sent about 1,300 students and employees into the community to do volunteer work. Teams traveled to 64 work sites, including churches, Oregon Zoo, the Shriners Hospital for Children, and the Union Gospel Mission.

#### Act Six

George Fox has selected and this fall will enroll the first nine students in its Act Six leadership and scholarship initiative. The program, designed to bring more diversity and cross-cultural leadership to the Newberg campus, will eventually offer 40 full four-year scholarships to multicultural students from the Portland metro area (portland.actsix.org).

# Seminary Update

Last year, the seminary launched a new MA in ministry leadership created for people in ministry who desire a formal theological education without relocating to Portland. The three-year, 56 credit-hour program combines online interactivity with face-to face intensive sessions.

The seminary also modified its Master of Divinity program, reducing the number of credit hours from 96 to 84, saving students approximately \$4,000 and at least one semester on campus. The goal is to prepare students for pas-

toral ministry without overly burdening them.

The seminary also received a 10-year extension of its accreditation from the Association of Theological Schools.

# Women's Ministry

More than 600 women came to hear Christian author and speaker Lori Salierno last September at the university's annual Selah women's seminar. Artist Mark Demel, counselor Pam Vredevelt, worship leader Bonnie Knopf, radio host Georgene Rice, seminary professor MaryKate Morse, and campus pastor Sarah Thomas Baldwin will be featured at the 2007 Selah on September 29 (selah.georgefox.edu).

# Youth Ministry

Donald Miller, author of Blue Like Jazz, To Own a Dragon and other books, offered advice on mentoring at the university's third annual Kaleo youth ministry conference on February 24. Church groups and individuals throughout the region attended the event (kaleo.georgefox.edu).

#### Friends Center

#### **Special Points of Interest**

#### Students and Scholarships Increase

We continue to see more Friends entering graduate or seminary education to further prepare themselves for ministry. In addition to the 27 Friends who took one or more classes at George Fox Evangelical Seminary this last year, three others from NWYM attended schools in other states.

Seven Friends qualified to receive scholarship assistance this year through Friends Center. The typical scholarship award for these Friends is about 50% of their tuition cost. We anticipate that for the coming academic year as many as 11 Friends will qualify for assistance with awards totaling close to \$30,000.

Where will these scholarship dollars come from? The short answer is from Friends around the northwest and beyond. Currently Friends Center has three endowed scholarships: The Pearl Fund, The Walter Lee Fund, and the Farmer Family Scholarship.

Additional scholarship dollars come from contributions to Friends Center and from commitments of the Yearly Meeting through the annual budget.

Meanwhile, Colin Saxton, Dick Sartwell, Barbara Palmer and Dave Hampton from our board have been working with interested Friends to establish additional endowed funds.

#### MAML Launches This Fall

As planned, the new Master of Arts in Ministry Leadership (MAML) will launch this fall. This new degree will allow those who are already in ministry to work from their home location toward a seminary degree. Called a "hybrid," this program asks students to meet on campus one week each semester, but the rest of their work is done from home online. Over a three-year period, and working with the same cohort of students, they focus on key foundation courses, but also courses focused in their area of interest.

The first cohort includes Brent Bly, pastor at Star Friends in Idaho.

#### New to Friends Ministry

One of the benefits of the close association of Friends Center to GFES, and having Friends on faculty at the seminary, is the opportunity to come into contact with students looking for a church "home." # APPENDIX

Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends ORGANIZATION OF AREAS

Currently, NWYM is comprised of "Areas," which serve as regional collections of local churches. The Area structure, and the regular gatherings that occur in each of them, provide a way to encourage community, corporate worship and service, and facilitate business affecting NWYM. Healthy, functioning Areas are important to the work of NWYM as we move forward in our common ministry.

With the changes that have occurred through the NWYM restructuring plan (approved July, 2006), several unresolved matters related to the Areas need attention. These include the naming of "Area Superintendents" and clarifying the ongoing shape and function of Areas. The restructuring discussions also raised the desire for greater connectedness.

In an effort to respond to these concerns, as well as others raised by the Representatives over the past few years regarding the lack of meaningful functioning of our Areas, we offer the following proposals.

These proposals can be forwarded to the floor of the 2007 Yearly Meeting Sessions, and if approved, passed along to the Faith and Practice Revision Committee.

#### **Proposal for Area Clerks**

FFFFFFFF

Because of previous confusion about the title of "superintendent" when it comes to Area duties, and because we are laying down the part-time positions and duties of the recent district superintendents, it is recommended that Area Superintendents be re-titled Area Clerks. This designation fits well with Friends nomenclature and helps characterize the functional role of the person serving in that capacity. Also, because of changes in the nominating process and board structure, Area Clerks will no longer be automatically a part of any NWYM board as an area representative.

The Area officers, active resident members appointed annually, are as follows: the Area Clerk, Area Recording Clerk and Area Treasurer. The Area Clerk serves as a primary organizer for Area gatherings and presides over the business agenda and discernment process. Additionally, this person functions as a primary connection to the Yearly Meeting office and NWYM Presiding Clerk for matters related to Area functioning.

#### **Proposal for Nominations of Area Officers**

All officers are nominated to the Area in business session by a task force composed of the named Representatives from each local church. Rather than having an "area nominating committee," this function now becomes part of the local church Representatives' role. The Area Clerk will convene and instruct the Representatives in this task, presiding until the Reps select a member of their group to serve in a clerking role during the nominating process. The Area Clerk is welcome to assist the Representatives in the nomination process, but will be excused during discussions regarding the annual appointment of the Area Clerk.

In addition, as the Representatives are nominating officers, they are responsible to recommend a NWYM Nominating Committee member from their region for a three-year term of service. The Nominating Committee member cannot be a member of any Yearly Meeting board, since there would be an overlap in meeting times. The Area will consider this recommendation at their Spring gathering and forward it on to the NWYM annual sessions for final approval.

#### Proposal for "Yearly Meeting Sundays"

In order to strengthen relationships and encourage healthy, functioning Areas, as well as promote general unity throughout NWYM, we will be inaugurating two "Yearly Meeting Sundays" in the coming year. These special Sundays, to begin in the Fall of 2007, will be facilitated with resources from the Board of Communication and the Yearly Meeting Office, and will allow every NWYM church to celebrate our connectedness on the same day. They will also serve as announcements for the scheduled Area Gatherings, which might take place that afternoon or the following weekend, at the Area's discretion. YM Sundays are proposed for early October and early June.

#### **Proposal for Area Gatherings**

Each Area will hold at least two gatherings, around the dates of the announced October and early June "Yearly Meeting Sundays." These gatherings are planned and supervised by the Area officers or an Area task force charged with these responsibilities. The Communication Board and NWYM office will work in cooperation with the Yearly Meeting boards and Area Clerks to provide information, resources and programming to support these events.

Area gatherings provide opportunity for public information, consideration of business and support of special programs of the Yearly Meeting. Area Clerks are encouraged to contact the Yearly Meeting office regarding program elements or training opportunities that might be offered during the gathering. Worship and inspiration should be balanced with program promotion and training. Named Representatives from each of the constituent churches will attend the Area gatherings, in order to give reports from their local churches and to respond to business that may be considered at the upcoming Yearly Meeting session.

The June Area Gathering must incorporate a business session in order to elect officers, recommend a person for the NWYM Nominating Committee, consider and approve concerns to be forwarded from local meetings to the boards or the Yearly Meeting, and if applicable, hear the financial report and approve an annual budget.

Special business sessions may be called by the Area Clerk at the request of two or more clerks of local churches or the Yearly Meeting general superining.

tendent. Notification and agenda for such meetings will be sent to the clerks of local and extension churches at least one week in advance of a called meeting.

# Proposal for Sharing Minutes of Concern and Minutes of Support

Any individual may be moved with a concern or a call to a ministry. This concern should be brought to the local meeting for weighing, to receive seasoning, correction, and support. We encourage monthly meetings to share any minuted item of Concern or Support directly with their sister churches of NWYM, with any applicable YM Board, and the YM Presiding Clerk.

There will be times when the local meeting is led by Christ to raise a question or propose a challenge that is beyond the scope of its own meeting. If the meeting is convinced that Christ is calling them to speak to a wider gathering of Friends, the clerk of the local meeting will contact the Area Clerk to gain the Area gathering's participation in discerning any further steps. The Area gathering will meet for worship and to seek Christ's direction in responding to the question or challenge. Several possible results may come from the Area:

- 1. The question or concern may be validated and given weight, to then be referred via the YM Clerk to the Yearly Meeting Representatives or the appropriate board.
- 2. The question or concern may be revised, and then validated and given weight, to then be referred via the YM Clerk to the Yearly Meeting Representatives or the appropriate board.
- 3. Even without agreement at the Area level, the question or concern may seem a good point of discussion that the Area wishes the Yearly Meeting to consider. It would then be referred via the YM Clerk to the Yearly Meeting Representatives or the appropriate board.
- 4. The gathered body may discern that the question or challenge is not to be forwarded at this time and is returned to the local meeting for their continued consideration and prayer.

This process allows individual or corporate leadings to be checked and affirmed by the local meeting and the Area before coming to the floor of the Yearly Meeting. This builds awareness and ownership on the local level, allows us to experience the support or check of our most immediate faith community, and gives weight to items considered at Yearly Meeting sessions.

Such minutes would be considered at the June Area gathering, following any monthly meetings that occurred after the YM agenda was released to Representatives in late April. If a concern arises after that time and a specially called Area meeting cannot be arranged, the Representatives, gathered on the first day of Yearly Meeting sessions, would act on behalf of the Area gathering.

It is important for sound teaching and practice around discerning the leading of Christ corporately and individually to occur at the local and area levels.

Accountants' Review Report

To the Board of Trustees of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church

We have reviewed the accompanying statement of financial position of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church (a not-for-profit organization) as of December 31, 2006, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. All information included in these financial statements is the representation of the management of Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

A review consists principally of inquiries of Organization personnel and analytical procedures applied to financial data. It is substantially less in scope than an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements taken as a whole. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

Based on our review, with the exception of the matter described in the following paragraph, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

As disclosed in Note 7 to the financial statements, management has informed us that the Organization has not determined the cost of its defined benefit pension plan in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, which require the cost of employees' pensions to be recognized over the employees' respective service periods and a liability to be recognized when the accumulated benefit obligation exceeds the fair value of plan assets. The effects of this departure from generally accepted accounting principles on financial position, changes in net assets, and cash flows have not been determined.

The prior year summarized comparative information has been derived from the Organization's 2005 financial statements, which were reviewed by us. Our report on the 2005 financial statements dated May 16, 2006, stated that we were not aware of any material modifications that should be made to those statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, except for the matter discussed in the preceding paragraph.

Our review was made for the purpose of expressing limited assurance that there are no material modifications that should be made to the financial statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. The supplemental information as listed in the table of contents is presented only for supplemental analysis purposes. Such information has been subjected to the inquiry and analytical procedures applied in the review of the basic financial statements and we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made thereto.


