A Letter from Carroll Tamplin

Portland, Ore., Sept 18, 1935
Dear Friends of the Homeland:

We are with you again, after four years and eight months absence from you among our mutually beloved Aymara Indian believers. Our mind has been drawn to Acts 14:21-28. "And when they had preached the gospel to that city, and had taught many, they returned again to Lystra, and to Iconium, and Antioch, confirming the souls of the disciples, and exhorting them to continue in the faith, and that we must through much tribulation enter into the kingdom of God. And when they had ordained them elders in every church, and had prayed with fasting, they commended them to the Lord, on whom they believed. . . . And thence they sailed to Antioch, from whence they had been recommended to the grace of God for the work which they fulfilled. And when they were come, and had gathered the church together, they rehearsed all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith unto the Gentiles. And there they abode long time with the disciples."

Even the apostles had a home-church. Paul's home church was Antioch. To this church he and Barnabas returned to recount the work of God among the Gentiles—the heathen. We, too, have come back to our "Antioch," to review the work of God in our "Derbe, Lystra, Iconium" etc, and to abide with the "disciples" of our Lord in "Antioch" for a time. We look forward to meeting all of you face to face, recounting the work of the Lord and to the abiding-time. We also look forward to the time of again being given by you into the hand of God for the working of those other fields and the bringing in of those "other sheep" that still blindly wander over the wind-swept plains and rugged crags of the Andes of Bolivia.

I have been wondering how Paul and Barnabas found things in the little home church: if some of the "old-timers" had not gone in for the popular heathen styles of the day; if some, having loved this present world, were still holding the form of religion but denying the power thereof; if some of the "patriarchs" of the church, emblems of power, purity and faith, had gone on to receive their "crown of life"; if the burden of the church and its future were now resting on those whom Paul and Barnabas remembered as toddling babes and unstable youths; if, while those that had been "separated unto the work whereunto the Lord had called them" had been much-travelled, be-

Missionary Board Meets At Newberg
Members of the Board met with them in a delightful session Tuesday, Sept. 17th. The meeting was held in the Newberg Church and the ladies of the meeting served a bountiful dinner which was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

It would have been a rare privilege for every member of the Yearly Meeting to have been present with us and hear first hand the things that they had to tell us. However it was not all just pleasure for we had much business to consider.

Missionary Conferences Planned

Not the least of the matters of business was the itinerary of the Tamplins during the year they are home. They have come home tired and worn after nearly 5 years of hard work in an altitude far too high for most folks to endure. The Board feels that they must use the time at home to the very best advantage and that a rest of at least one month before any public meetings, is imperative. We ask the meetings to cooperate with us in this courtesy to them. We also feel that to ask them to visit every monthly meeting during the year will consume more time and energy than they can spare from work that they must get done before they return. We have therefore planned for "Sectional three day Missionary Conferences" to be held in various places in the Yearly Meeting. The time and place of these meetings will be arranged with the Quarterly Meeting Supts. and will be announced as soon as possible. The following program indicates the nature of the conference and should "whet" one's appetite for the good things in store.

Suggested Program For 3-day Missionary Conferences

1. Daily a.m. Prayer Services—(Whether early or later at disposition of interested parties.) Directed by (?).
2. Display in booth of Indian clothing and curios, under direction of local missions official—½ hour before and after classes.
3. Display of same at one only special service, with brief conversation, song, etc. in Spanish and Dialect. (10 minutes.)
4. A brief little 3-act dialogue in native costume. 15 minutes.
5. Daily afternoon classes for women (combining Ladies' Aid features with study if so desired.)
