Friendly Endeavor '36 Quota

The Friendly Endeavor staff met with the Executive Committee at the home of Walter Lee, Friday, March 20th, and the following financial plan for 1936 was compiled from discussions there.

The quotas for 1936 are listed below. They are the same as for 1935 when they were computed by figuring the annual cost per yearly meeting member to be 17c, which amount was multiplied by the number of members of each monthly meeting to secure the quota of that Society.

The plan for receiving special credit this year will be for Quarterly Meetings, much the same as for last year. Each individual Society has its own responsibility for its quota but the "reward" for a generous percentage of quota payments will go to a Quarterly Meeting as a whole.

READ THIS PARAGRAPH

A special edition will be gotten out for each Quarterly Meeting when 75% of the quotas due from Monthly Meetings within that Quarter have been paid; i. e., "Boise Quarter Special Edition", etc. This calls for action on the part of each Quarterly Meeting rally until your quotas have been paid.

It is the plan to have a Missionary Edition, Yearly Meeting Edition, Conference Edition, Sunday School Edition, as well as the five Quarterly Meeting Editions—**SO GET YOUR QUARTERLY MEETING EDITION EARLY.** With all these Special Editions we can run well into next year. Quarterly Meeting Editions will be printed in order of the raising of the 75% of quotas. **SEE THAT YOUR MONTHLY MEETING DOESN'T KEEP YOUR QUARTERLY MEETING FROM HAVING ITS SPECIAL EDITION. "Youth Problems"

YOUTH AND EVANGELISM dothendL44 z

Editor's Note: Because of lack of space, this interesting series on "Youth Problems" was omitted since the November issue. We resume this month with the fifth article in the series.

"Youth, thou art the time to love, to dream," to build ideals, to decide for Christ, thou art that time when the wise man's call resounds through the corridors of the soul, "Remember now thy Creator." But more, it is the time to work for Christ and no greater opportunity is offered to youth in the realm of Christian endeavor than to Evangelize.

No doubt the average intellect is at its prime above forty years. That is not a trite statement but the proverb of wisdom, "Old men for counsel and young men for war." In no sense is there any reflection cast but each is given his place. While youth may not be able, always, to untangle theological problems for the inquirer of the class room, yet he can deliver the plain Gospel message, "Behold, now is the day of Salvation," and pray with a penitent soul telling of the Savior.

The history of revivals discloses the conspicuous part Youth has had in religious awakenings. Especially noticeable are the "boy preachers" of the early Quakers many of whom literally burned themselves up as early as seventeen years of age with their earnest calls to the unconverted.

The editor of the British Weekly quotes Dr. David Christie of Winnipeg, "Don't wait for the fat forties. Put on your armor now. John Wesley was a student at Oxford when he formed the Holy Club. Martin Luther was twenty seven when he climbed Santo Scala at Rome. John Calvin, in his early twenties, was already proclaiming his distinctive doctrines. George Whitfield, at twenty-one, was moving England. Jeremy Taylor at eighteen was holding men spell-bound in Saint Paul's, London. Dwight Moody, in his twenties, was doing marvelous work as an evangelist. Charles Spurgeon, at twenty, was preaching in the great London Tabernacle. Francis E. Clark, in his twenties, founded the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor. George Williams was twenty-three when he founded the Young Men's Christian Association. David Livingstone at twenty-three was spending himself for Christ in darkest Africa."

Outside Christian Endeavor Activities—These reports were read and very interesting and helpful in keeping track of what we are doing as a Quarterly meeting. The Junior Supt. also made a report of their work.

The plan of raising a Quaker Hill Improvement Fund was presented and accepted. This plan asks each member to pledge \$1.00 a year for three years, and a contest between societies for the largest percentage was begun, and will close Easter Sunday with the winner to be announced at our Quaker Hill banquet April 17th.

At the close of the business session a paper was read by Hazel Williams on the subject of "How the Christian Endeavor Can Safeguard Our Young People From the Dangers That Threaten Them." An interesting discussion led by Lucille Roberts followed. A second paper "What the Church May Expect of Its Young People" was read by Kathryn Hadley.

NAMPA SUMS UP GAINS OF FIRST YEAR

"No, I'd like to try it without."

"Well, wouldn't it be wonderful if Oregon Yearly Meeting could start a church and have it self-supporting from the very beginning?"

It was Chester Hadley and Ed Harmon in conversation over a year ago. And the wonderful thing happened. Nampa meeting has not had any support from the Yearly Meeting, and more than that, has helped with the Quarterly Meeting obligations.
