Impressions of Yearly Meeting

Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends met in its forty-fourth annual session at Newberg, Oregon, June 9-14, 1936.

Edward Mott, Presiding Clerk gave the opening message, expressing a deep concern that Friends would avoid the subversive errors of Calvinism, Unitarism, Religious Alliances, or any other substitutes for the full ministry of reconciliation, as being ambassadors for Jesus Christ.

Hubert Mardock spoke at both the morning and evening services, emphasizing the Baptism of Jesus Christ with the Holy Spirit; about fifteen individuals professed being born of the Spirit, or baptized with the Spirit.

A. Clark Smith gave a message on stewardship, informing us that 25 percent of the people are contributing 75 percent of the money, and 75 percent of the people are contributing 25 percent of the money for the support of the Lord's work; that only 25 percent of our membership are tithers.

The Literature report revealed that very few books are reported as actually being read during the year; a message was given, expressing three things for readers to do: to find out what the author says; to think over what the author says; to think.

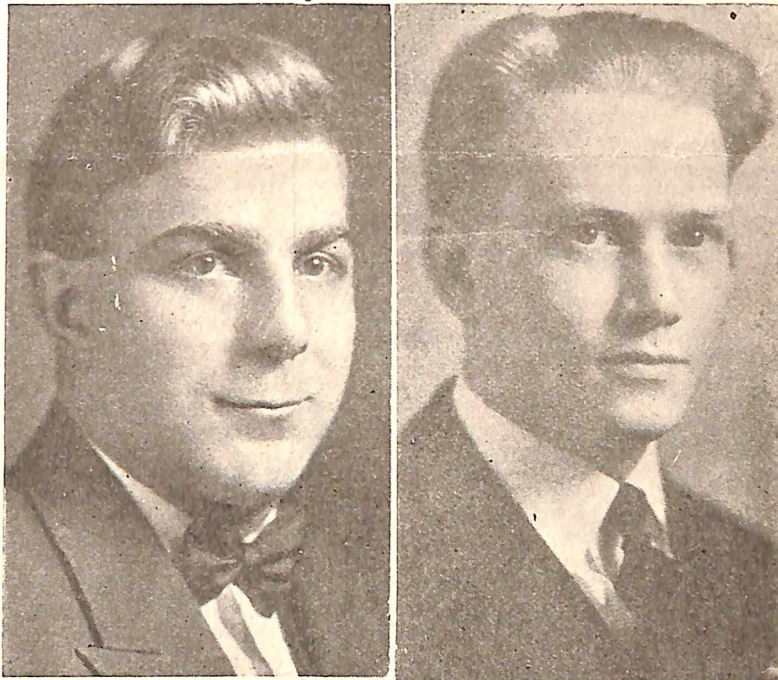
Dr. George B. Pratt of Portland, Oregon made the statement that the general, the special, and specific purpose of the Sunday School is to win souls to Jesus Christ; that one half million pupils leave the Sunday School every year; that only 15 percent of the S. S. scholars are won to the Church; that 70 percent of the scholars are won to Christ before they are 20 years of age; that 96 percent of them are won to Christ before they are 25 years of age; that a Sunday School teacher has the one calling that an angel from heaven would undoubtedly choose, if given an opportunity to work among earthly creatures.

Friend's views and stands on the questions of Peace, Temperance, Home and Social Service and from other departments were presented by the superintendents in charge.

Last year following Yearly Meeting time one man actually made the statement that he had read the Yearly Meeting Minutes through; that man deserves a medal; the best way to know of the work of the evangelistic and Church Extension Board is to read this splendid report as given by Chester A. Hadley, Yearly Meeting Superintendent. It tells of 1200 spiritual victories gained during 1935-1936.

Carroll Tamplin gave the report of Helen Cammack, the acting field superintendent for the Bolivian field; this report reveals that the Gospel has accomplished in six

years what other efforts failed to accomplish in 400 years time. The report is in the 1936 Minutes.

The address by Edward Mott on Christian Education revealed that Moses and Paul both became murderers without a Christian Education, but after a Christian Education with a Christian experience as a first requisite they both became great spiritual leaders. The Educational report revealed that over 100 students are in Bible Institutes or colleges; this is about five times the average for the U. S.

The program of the Christian Worker's League for the coming year was outlined by Lyman Meyers, President, telling of meetings to be held at Woodland, Idaho, Rose Valley, Wash., Prune Hill, Wash. and Salem Heights, Oregon.

The Christian Endeavor Society under the direction of Paul Cammack has had a very successful year with over 700 attending conference banquets and more than 600 attending conference.

Carroll Tamplin's message was a clear call for Friends to let their Churches be power houses to send forth the workers into the harvest field. The man from Bolivia pled for an advance at home.

TACOMA FIRST

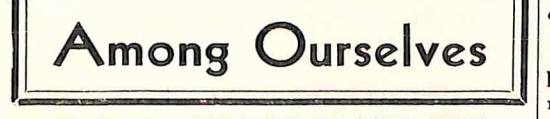
We say, "Good work, Tacoma Quarter, for winning the banquet attendance contest."

UNITED BUDGET FINANCES

Dear Friends:

The following action was taken at Yearly Meeting: "That the askings of the Evangelistic and Church Extension and various departments, all of which comprise the "Home Field Work," and the askings for "Foreign Missions" be placed in one budget and that the money received for such be divided out between the home and foreign work by the Yearly Meeting Treasurer at the fixed ratio determined by the askings of the home and foreign mission work. It is understood that special designated gifts shall be applied as designated."

This action is very important and changes the whole set-up of our United Budget finances. It is an ideal plan and if each member of the Yearly Meeting responds it will meet our needs.

During the past year we have emphasized that the United Budget was on a free will basis, but we have also called attention to the fact that the ratio of fixed expense that each Monthly Meeting raised would serve as a basis for the free will giving. Under this new plan we urge that the giving be only on free will with no thought of a ratio. Give as you are prompted and do not compare your giving with any other meeting; if our people are vitally interested in the program, and if our program is as gripping as it should be, we will have no trouble to raise enough to cover all the expense involved in the task.

Here is an illustration of what the ratio did in one meeting to the free will United Budget! This Meeting was stirred by the appeals and raised easily what the ratio of fixed expenses amounted to. They kept on being interested and raised a large amount and kept it in the treasury because, said they, "We have given in our share to the Yearly Meeting Program." This is not as it should be, there should be no comparisons of Monthly Meetings on this free will basis. Cannot we forget any "fixed amount" in this matter and give as the Lord Directs? Please try it this year.

Another reason for this appeal is that our missionaries now enter on the "share and share alike" basis of the home field men. We must not let them suffer. Our askings are increased this year, but only a small

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amount in comparison to the challenge of the opportunities.

It is difficult to begin talking it, but constant practice is what one must have and I hope to get more while out there for a time.

Pearson's are also getting on nicely with Aymara. They are anxious to get as full an outline of the grammar as possible before going out to a station.

We are getting on nicely with the meetings. We divide the responsibility up so none of us are over worked. We are in the midst of the cold season but the attendance, especially on Sunday morning, is keeping up fine.

The owner of the house has been much more friendly of late and it seems that no crisis about moving will come for some months although she says they want to return the money if possible, but do not have it all arranged as yet. However she said we would

be able to go on renting for a few months even after we might close the contract. So I am sure the Lord will see us through that problem and work it all out to His glory.

We had Carroll's letter today which told of them planning to start back the 2nd of August. We shall be so happy to see them again and be all together on the field at once! We are sorry for them to miss Twin Rocks. The Lord will work everything out for the best and so we trust Him. For so long we have prayed that the Lord bring them in His own time. So however He works it out, whether for August or October we shall praise Him and be sure that He has accomplished His will. It is wonderful to walk close to Him and know that He is doing all things for our good!

We anxiously await Yearly Meeting news. May the Lord bless and clearly lead in these coming days and cause His will to be clearly done!
