Dear Friends:

Though laid up for three weeks with influenza, so that I had to spend the day of your inauguration in bed, thanks to the radio I was able to hear your splendid inaugural address, and I rejoice that you rather than any other man in America are in the office which you now hold.

I need hardly tell you that I rejoice at your courageous stand on questions that touch obedience to law, the moral life of our citizens and the peace of the world. I am especially gratified with your desire for the adherence of the United States to the World Court; and whenever you desire to bring it forward as an issue, I wish to assure you of any cooperation which I can give in support of it.
