St. Joseph's Is Accredited

St. Joseph's hospital has again been fully accredited by the American College of Surgeons for 1944 and 45, Sister Christiana, superior, announced today. This approval indicated that the hospital has met all the standard requirements of the college regard-

ing facilities and functions.

Head of the medical staff at St. Joseph's, reputed to be the oldest hospital in the Pacific northwest, is Dr. J. C. Brougher with Sister Theresa Agnes as superintendent of nurses and Miss Ann Engeldinger serving as educational director of the nursing school.

Twenty-eight graduates of the school are now serving in the armed forces whether in this country or in the European area it was said. Three senior cadets Mary Bland, Billie Bland and Lauretta Wylie, have received appointments to Barnes general hospital here for experience in army nursing.

Funeral services for Alvin L. Brougher of Scotts Mills, who died Thursday of a cerebral

hemorrhage at Vancouver Memorial hospital, will be Sunday at 2 P. M. in Scotts Mills. Rev. Marion Cook of the Friends church, where Mr. Brougher was a member, will officiate and interment will be in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Born September 22, 1860 in Mt. Vernon, Ill., Mr. Brougher received his education in that state and taught school there ten years before going to La Center, Wash., in 1891. He taught school in Washington for two years, after which he entered the retail grocery business. In 1907 he moved to Scotts Mills and purchased a general merchandise store, from which he retired two years ago. He was a former trustee and Sunday school teacher in the Friends church.

Besides his widow, Carra, Mr. Brougher is survived by four daughters, Mrs. Nellie Coulson of Scotts Mills, Mrs. Myra Stapp of Oregon City, Mrs. Ruby Mulvihill of Portland and Mrs. Lila Berg of Sitka, Alaska; four sons, Oliver Brougher of Mt. Angel, Dr. John Brougher of Vancouver, Harvey Brougher of Clatskanie and Ira Brougher of Ketchikan, Alaska; ten grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Early Mail Carrier Dies

Alvin L. Brougher, 85, of Scotts Mills, Ore., a former school teacher and mail carrier in Clark county, who had been a merchant at Scotts Mills, for 37 years prior to his retirement two years ago, died yesterday at Vancouver Memorial hospital. The death notice states that he was born Sept. 22, 1860, at Mt. Vernon, Ill.

Brougher had lived at La Center for 16 years before moving to Scotts Mills, just outside Portland, and is said to have carried mail between La Center and Vancouver by horse before roads were put through. He had also taught school at Lake Shore for a few years during this time, according to reports.

The former Clark county resident was a member of the Friends church, Scotts Mills, of which he was a trustee and Sunday school teacher for many years.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Carra Brougher of Scotts Mills; by four sons, Oliver of Mt. Angel, Ore., Dr. John Brougher of Vancouver; Harvey of Clatskanie, Ore., and Ira of Alaska; four daughters, Mrs. Ray Mulvihill of Portland, Mrs. Lila Berg of Sitka, Alaska, Mrs. Myra Stapp of Oregon City, and Mrs. Nellie Coulson of Scotts Mills; by ten grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 2, in the Friends church of Scotts Mills, the Rev. Marion Cook officiating. Vault entombment is planned at the I.O.O.F. cemetery, Scotts Mills.

St. Joseph's Hospital Will Add Doctors

Approval of an application to train resident physicians at St. Joseph's hospital, after a three year attempt to get this rating, has been received this week from the American Medical association, Sister Romuald, superior of St. Joseph's, announced today.

Dr. F. H. Arestad, assistant secretary of the American Medical association, said that the application was approved at a February 8 meeting of the council on medical education and hospitals, and is for two doctors at the 150 bed Vancouver hospital.

Residents are doctors with one year of interne training, it was explained, and are required to gain a year's experience in a hospital which has been approved.

Sister Romuald said that a notice of approval will be published in a medical journal, and that she expects that she will receive several more applications at that time. No decisions have been made as to who the residents will be at present, she said.

St. Joseph's hospital is in the middle of an expansion program but no date can be set for the completion of the addition now being built.

Unanimous vote of the education and hospital council, extended the approval, it was announced.

Painless Birth Dangers Seen

Los Angeles, Feb. 11 (U.P.)—Expectant mothers were warned today that absolutely "painless" childbirth may endanger the health of their children.

Dr. William F. Windle, a neurologist and professor of anatomy at the University of Washington, told the mid-winter assembly in obstetrics and gynecology that a child may be born a spastic if it fails to receive sufficient oxygen from the mother before birth.

Too much anesthesia demanded by a mother during childbirth can deprive the child of air, Dr. Windle said. Such asphyxiation may injure brain cells and may cause the child to be sub-normal mentally, he said.
