- Administer the college community so that students will learn to apply their learning to life.
- Provide a modern center for the world-wide evangelical movement among Friends, consistent with the holiness message of our founder.

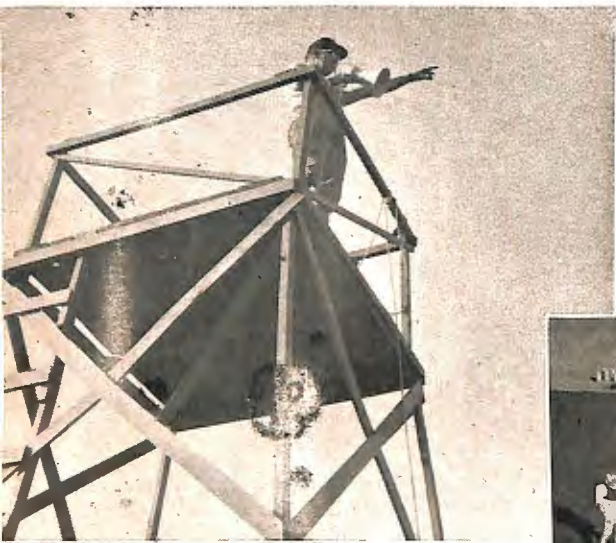

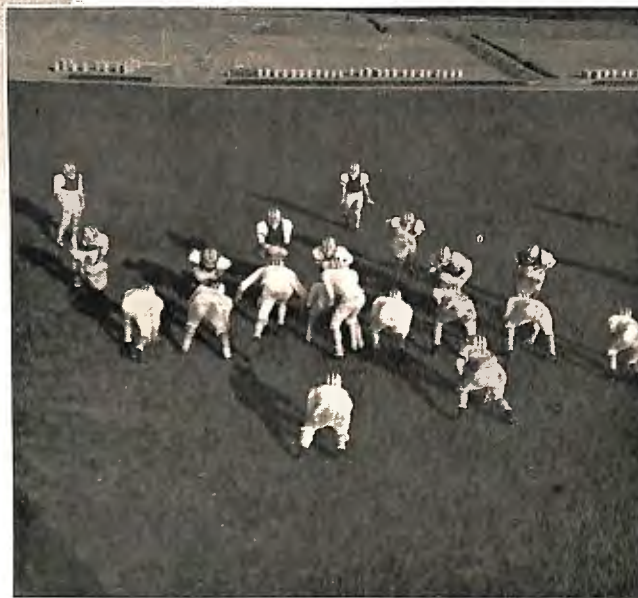
