## **GFC MEN'S SOCCER LANDS THREE ON NAIA ALL-AMERICAN HONORABLE MENTION**

In one season, the George Fox College men's soccer team has quadrupled the number of All-Americans who have played soccer for the college.

Three Bruins have been named 1992 Honorable Mention NAIA All-Americans. Sophomore goalie Jeff Nelson, Medford; sophomore forward Greg Pflieger, Battle Ground, Wash.; and Swiss senior sweeper Dieter Muenstermann have received the highest individual soccer awards ever earned by a GFC athlete.

NAIA District 2 has one other award winner. Junior forward Jarkko Touminen of Concordia made the third team.

The only GFC soccer player to previously receive an NAIA national award was the nation's all-time career collegiate goal scorer forward Dan LaVeine. Laveine was an Honorable Mention All-American in 1990, the year he finished his four-year career with 130 goals.

All three of this year's award winners could be back next season. In his second year at George Fox, Muenstermann is scheduled to graduate this spring, but could play for the Bruins as a graduate student.

He has accumulated five awards for this season. Prior to the All-American award, Muenstermann received all-Area 1 and all-District 2 first team awards. He also was the only district athlete named to the National Soccer Coaches Association All Far-West team. For his 4.00 GPA, the NAIA named him an Academic All-American Scholar-Athlete.

Pflieger ran away with the district scoring title. He finished his second season atop the district with 19 goals and six assists. He was named to the district first team and all-Area 1 team.

Nelson recorded six shutouts for the district runners-up. He was named to the district second team and all-Area 1 team, giving up just 1.2 goals a game.

George Fox, ranked in the NAIA top-20 for the first time ever, finished its season 12-3-3.

## **George Fox's Muenstermann Lists Among Nation's Elite Soccer Scholar-Athletes**

George Fox College senior Dieter Muenstermann joins the elite on the Adidas Scholar-Athlete Soccer All-America first team.

Selected by the Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America (ISAA), Muenstermann lists on the eleven-member team with players from colleges and universities of all divisions. Named with him are athletes from such schools as Duke, Dartmouth and the Air Force Academy.

Muenstermann, from Switzerland, was a sweeper on the 1992 George Fox College soccer team.

He helped his team to a 12-3-3 record, a first-ever NAIA national top-20 ranking, and a District 2 runner-up finish. The 6-0, 184-pound defender was selected first team all-district, all-Area 1, and NAIA Honorable Mention All-American. He also made the All Far-West NAIA team of the National Soccer Coaches Association.

Thanks to his 4.0 accumulative grade point average, Muenstermann was named NAIA Academic All-American Scholar-Athlete and 1991-92 George Fox Male Scholar-Athlete.

Muenstermann came to George Fox from Europe in the fall of 1991.

1990 GFC grad Dan LaVeine, who holds the nation's collegiate career scoring record, was named to the ISAA list as an honorable mention selection after his senior year.

## GFC MEN'S SOCCER ENDS SEASON IN DISTRICT CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Held scoreless for the first time all season, the George Fox College men's soccer team lost the NAIA District 2 championship game 1-0 to Concordia College.

A goal by Doug Wolvert at 56:00 ended GFC's season at 12-3-3, and sent Concordia (15-2-1) on to play Pacific Lutheran University in the Area 1 finals.

"We played hard for the most part," said Bruin coach Manfred Tschan. "We had plenty of opportunities, but for some reason, we didn't come up with a lot of shots out of our opportunities." GFC outshot Concordia 9-7, getting the majority in the second half.

The last time the 20th-ranked Bruins were shutout was in the 1991 double-overtime district championship game when Willamette University won on penalty kicks.

"I think we played better last year, because we came closer to our capabilities," said Tschan. "We were a lot more aggressive offensively. We had the feeling at Concordia we'd be able to score sooner or later. When it came down to it we didn't get the job done. It was the first time this year we didn't score."

Scoring hadn't been a problem all season long for the fast-breaking Bruins. Five George Fox players finished among the top 21 district scorers. GFC scored 43 goals this season, including a district-leading 21 by sophomore striker Greg Pfleger, Battle Ground, Wash.

Before the season began, Tschan dubbed his offensive front line the RPM offense, based on their first or last names. His forward trio lived up to their billing. The "R", freshman Ian Reschke, Renton, Wash., made the district second team, while Pfleger, the "P", and the "M", sophomore Mike Nadeau, Portland, earned first-team honors. Nadeau finished the regular season as the second-leading district scorer. Reschke, whose four goals and four assists put him 17th among district scorers, had more points than the leading scorer from two district teams.

Swiss sweeper Dieter Muenstermann joined the sophomore forwards on the first team.

Muenstermann, who has a 4.0 GPA, was recently named George Fox College's male Scholar-Athlete.

GFC sophomore goalie Jeff Nelson, Medford, Ore., made the second team.

1992 went beyond Tschan's expectations.

"It's too early to have good perspective on the season," he said. "But we did some things I didn't expect. I didn't think we'd be nationally ranked for most of the season. We won some games I wouldn't have expected us to win."

He's still rather be in the playoffs. "I think this team could have done some damage."

## **MUENSTERMANN EARNS SCHOLAR-ATHLETE AND ALL-FAR WEST AWARDS**

Dieter Muenstermann is a Swiss soccer player at George Fox College, but according to the NAIA he's All-American.

Muenstermann has been named an NAIA Academic All-American Scholar-Athlete.

A senior history major with a 4.00 GPA, Muenstermann is also the only NAIA District 2 player named to the National Soccer Coaches Association of America's NAIA All Far-West team.

"I knew about the Scholar-Athlete award, but I didn't expect the Far-West team," said Muenstermann. "I had a decent year, nothing especially great. It probably helped that the team had a good record and was nationally-ranked."

Muenstermann was the starting sweeper on GFC's 12-3-3 men's soccer team. The Bruins completed 1992 ranked in the NAIA top-20, ending as District 2 runners-up.

"Dieter is very experienced and strong physically," says his coach, Manfred Tschan. "He makes good quick decisions and is athletic enough to go do what he wants to do."

Recognition is not new for Muenstermann. This season the 6-0 184-pound defender was named to the all-district first team for the second-straight year. He also was named George Fox's male Scholar-Athlete for 1991.

Muenstermann's English, which he studied for 10 years, obviously is good enough to earn him perfect college grades. It is one of five languages, Muenstermann speaks. He also knows German, Swiss-German, Spanish and French.

"Just your typical Swiss guy," jokes Tschan, who also is from Switzerland.

Muenstermann, from Hunibach, Switzerland, came to George Fox in 1991 and has used just two years of athletic eligibility. He plans to graduate in this spring but could play for the Bruins as a graduate student.

"I'm not really decided," he said. "I'd love to play at least another year. I'm happy here."

## **GFC SOCCER FORWARD LISTS AMONG NATION'S SCORING LEADERS**

For the sixth straight year, a George Fox College striker leads West Coast NAIA soccer players in scoring.

Recently released national statistics show George Fox striker Greg Pfleger led the West Coast in goals-per-game for his second straight year.

The 5-foot-10 160-pound sophomore scored 21 goals during the 1992 season, ranking him 11th in the NAIA and No. 1 among players west of Kansas. Pfleger, from Battle Ground, Wash., averaged 1.22 goals a game. He is one of four underclassmen listed in the top 15.

Pfleger's 21 goals and six assists put him 15th among the nation's point leaders.

Pfleger collected first team all-District 2, all-Area 1 and honorable mention All-American awards in 1992.

In 1991, his 22 goals and seven assists ranked him eighth in national scoring and ninth in points.

Having one of the nation's top goal-scorers is nothing new to George Fox. 1990 grad Dan LaVeine holds the national collegiate career scoring record with 130 goals in four years. His 43 goals in 1990 led the NAIA. The Tigard High School grad topped the nation in 1989 as well, with 30. His lowest total was 23 as a sophomore, ranking him sixth in 1988. As a freshman in 1987, LaVeine finished fourth with 34.

## GFC MEN'S SOCCER SLIDES PAST WILLAMETTE IN OVERTIME

Call it the miracle on mud.

With a season-ending loss ten minutes away, the 20th-ranked George Fox College men's soccer team produced two quick goals on its chewed-up field and advanced to the NAIA District 2 championship game. The Bruins' 3-2 semifinal win against Willamette University sets up a 1 p.m. Saturday (Nov. 7) rematch at Concordia College. GFC and the Cavaliers played to a 3-3 draw on Oct. 24.

For the Bearcats, Thursday (Nov. 5) was a double whammy. The Bruins' win followed the George Fox women's 3-2 victory over defending champion Willamette on the same moist field.

Nearly 200 fans witnessed the third-straight overtime game between Willamette (9-6-1), the team that beat GFC in last season's double overtime championship game, and the Bruins (12-2-3). They watched as the referee gave Willamette the game-tying penalty kick with three minutes remaining in regulation, and then GFC the game-winning penalty kick with three minutes left in overtime.

After going up 2-1 three minutes into overtime, Willamette watched its lead dissolve to a tie at 110 minutes and into a loss at 117 minutes. With the Bearcats content *just to play defense*, Swiss sweeper Dieter Muenstermann moved up. "They did us a huge favor by playing with just one striker," said GFC head coach Manfred Tschan. It allowed the Bruins' *two other defenders* to cover Willamette's striker and Muenstermann room to roam.

"We were all over them," the district all-star said. "We had so many shots." Outshooting Willamette 9-2 in overtime, GFC finally got into the net on a off-balance shot by senior midfielder Jason Meyer, Philomath, Ore.

"It was one of those many scrambles in front of the goal," said Tschan. "The ball got to Jason and he shot it going down. He put it high and in the corner. For once, luck was with us."

Meyer still remembers last year's season-ending loss to Willamette. "What comes around, goes around,"he said.

The district's leading scorer, sophomore striker Greg Pfleger, Battle Ground, Wash., put the Bearcats away with the penalty kick.

Freshman forward Phil Nelson, Idaho Falls, drew the call when he was tripped by the Willamette goalie while attempting to cut off a possible back pass. "I was just running and the keeper tried to cheap shot me," said Nelson. " I fell down and got the call."

Both penalty calls did not appear to stop possible shots and were of the questionable variety. Sophomore striker Mike Nadeau, Portland was called for pushing in the box on a call that Tschan felt could have been obstruction.

If you ask Tschan, GFC's first win against the Bearcats in two seasons was well-deserved.

"That's what happens when you work hard," he told his players after the game.

Pfleger agreed. "That's the hardest we've played in three weeks," he said. After ripping off a ten-game winning streak, the Bruins have gone 1-1-2. "We've got our team back from the beginning of the season," he said.

Pfleger broke the ice at 26:00, taking a through-ball from sophomore midfielder Jai Cook, Eugene, Ore., and knocking it past the goalie. Pfleger is one goal short of his 22 goal freshman output that placed him eighth in the NAIA.

## **11-2-3 SOCCER BRUINS HOST WILLAMETTE IN DISTRICT SEMIFINALS**

In one of the hottest rivalries in NAIA District 2 men's soccer, nationally-ranked George Fox College and defending district champion Willamette University again clash in the playoffs.

Thursday (Nov. 5) at 2:00, the Bruins host the district semi-finals. GFC ranked 15th in last weeks NAIA poll. Winner advances to the championship against either top-seeded Concordia College or fourth-seeded Albertson College while loser goes home to prepare for next season.

Second-seeded George Fox (11-2-3) and third-seeded Willamette (9-5-1) have a recent history of close, intense matches. Last year, GFC lost the district championship game at Willamette on penalty kicks, four and a half hours after kickoff. When the Bearcats called at Newberg on Oct. 14, they forced a 1-1 tie in the final minute of overtime.

It will be a GFC-Willamette soccer doubleheader. The Bruin and Bearcat men will play following the GFC women's soccer team's 11 a.m. semi-final playoff match with defending district champion Willamette.

Admission for both games will be \$3 for adults, \$2 for students, and \$1 for senior citizens.

GFC men's coach Manfred Tschan has several goals for the Bruins to accomplish if they want a different result than last year's playoff match.

"We're going to have to be a lot more aggressive," he says. "Our front line is going to have to come to play and our midfielders need to make Willamette defend them instead of us just defending their midfielders. We also need to get back when we lose possession."

Questionable for the game because of injuries are starters Jim Maine, a freshman from Yakima, Wash., and Aaron Barnett, a Salem senior.

Neither those two, nor sophomore striker Mike Nadeau, Portland, participated in the swamp bowl at Linfield College, played appropriately on Saturday (Oct. 31), Halloween. Nadeau skipped

the 1-0 win to prevent the possibility of picking up his fifth yellow card, which under NAIA rules would mean automatic suspension from the next game. Tschan went without Nadeau even though a loss could have cost homefield advantage in the playoff game.

"I'd rather play at Willamette with Nadeau than at home without him," said Tschan.

Nadeau picked a good one to miss as George Fox sloshed and slid to a 15-4 shot advantage.

"It looked like Swan Lake," said Tschan, "only not as elegant."

"The water was up and over my shoes in a couple of places," said sophomore striker Greg Pflieger, Battle Ground, Wash. "The middle was really bad."

After 77 frustrating minutes of players slipping and falling and the ball getting stuck in the puddles, GFC finally found the back of the Linfield net. Senior midfielder Jason Meyer, Philomath, Ore., crossed to the shortest Bruin, 5-6 senior midfielder Darren Dilley, Clackamas, Ore., who scored a header.

"That was proof it was Halloween," said Tschan. "That's not necessarily one of his strengths."

"Field conditions hurt us a lot," said Dilley. "It was hard to keep our composure. Then we forgot to play and they almost got one back."

The standing water, which held back the Bruins throughout the game, in turn saved them. On one of Linfield's two second half shots, the water stopped the ball on the goal line. In the scramble, senior defender Clint Warta ended up on his back next to the ball. "The ball was pinned between Clint and the post," said sophomore goalie Jeff Nelson, Medford, Ore. The Wildcat players raised their hands and began to celebrate, but Nelson rescued the ball before it crossed the goal plane. Linfield finished their season 1-15.

## **GFC MEN'S SOCCER "LOSSLESS" STREAK ENDS AT 12**

For the first time in over a month and a half, the 15th-ranked George Fox College men's soccer team lost.

On a game-day road trip to Washington, GFC fell 3-1 to Seattle University on Wednesday (Oct. 28).

Thirteen was unlucky for the Bruins who hoped to extend their 12-game string of matches without a loss. The last time GFC lost was in overtime at now third-ranked Whitworth College on Sept. 11. George Fox's record is 10-2-3.

While the Bruins lost their non-counting match, the NAIA District 2 playoff picture cleared. Concordia College defeated Willamette University 3-1 and claimed the top playoff spot. If George Fox beats Linfield College on Saturday 9 (Oct. 31), it will be seeded No. 2 and will host No. 3 Willamette on Thursday (Nov. 5). George Fox tied Willamette 1-1 on Oct. 14 and lost the 1991 district championship on penalty kicks to the Bearcats.

The Seattle game hurt more than the record. An ankle injury to senior defender Aaron Barnett, Salem, and a knee injury to freshman defender Jim Maine, Yakima, Wash. will keep them out of the Linfield game, said GFC coach Manfred Tschan.

Senior Swiss sweeper Dieter Muenstermann also received a knee injury but is expected to play.

"It wasn't a good trip," said Tschan. "We were pretty passive in the first half."

Seattle took a 1-0 lead into the break, but a renewed Bruin team began to dominate for the first 20 minutes of the second half. "We came out and played hard," said Tschan.

Sophomore striker Mike Nadeau, Portland, tied the game at 57:00. The ball was crossed into a crowd and knocked back to Nadeau, who put in his ninth goal of the season. He ranks second in district scoring behind sophomore teammate Greg Pfleger, Battle Ground, Wash.

The physical Seattle team went back on top 2-1 and added another when Muensterman was moved up to try and equalize.

## **GFC MEN'S SOCCER TAKES TIE IN TOP-20 TUSSLE**

A clash of two teams ranked in the nation's top 20 turned into anticlimactic tie for the George Fox College men's soccer team.

On Saturday (Oct. 24), 16th-ranked Concordia College fought back from two one-goal deficits to give 19th-ranked George Fox its second-straight overtime tie with an NAIA District 2 leader. The teams tied 3-3 in Portland.

Ten days earlier, GFC and defending district champion Willamette University played 120 minutes for a 1-1 tie.

The tie with Concordia was easier to take than the Willamette tie, according to senior midfielder Darren Dilley, Clackamas, Ore.

"The Willamette game was tougher because we had it in hand," said Dilley. "They scored with virtually no time on the clock."

George Fox is 10-1-3 overall and 4-0-2 in district with one district and one non-district game to go. If the Bruins win their Saturday (Oct. 31) 1 p.m. district game at Linfield, George Fox will likely end up as the No. 2 seed in the district playoffs, says GFC coach Manfred Tschan. To the winner of the Oct. 28 Willamette-Concordia game, goes the No. 1 spot, with the loser dropping to No. 3. A tie between Willamette and Concordia would leave all three teams with identical 5-0-2 records. A comparison of home and away records would determine the seedings.

The four-team district playoffs begin next Thursday (Nov. 5) and conclude in a championship game on Saturday (Nov. 7). Highest seeds will host.

Including the draw with Concordia, George Fox has not lost in 12 outings.

Concordia secured its tie with nine minutes of overtime left. Ali Albalushi's goal was the second of two Cavalier goals that followed throw-ins.

"They were strong in the air," said Dilley. "We didn't mark up tight. It'll be a different story next time we play them."

After the Cavaliers scored at 17:00, sophomore striker Mike Nadeau, Portland, headed in a flick from senior midfielder Jason Meyer at 26:00.

"It was something we've seen a few times before," said Tschan.

Following the 1-1 half, GFC took the lead at 65:00 on a Meyer header from Dilley.

Concordia countered with 12 minutes remaining on a throw-in play.

"Two of our guys flicked it on for them," said Tschan.

Then the Bruins went to overtime for the fourth time this season. District 2 scoring leader sophomore striker Greg Pfleger, Battleground, Wash. scored his 19th goal of the season with less than nine seconds remaining in the first overtime period.

"It was vintage Pfleger," said Tschan. "He got one-on-one with his guy and beat him."

Freshman Brandom Wescom assisted.

Pfleger has scored at least one goal in 13 of the Bruins' 14 games.

George Fox plays a non-district match at Seattle University on Wednesday (Oct. 28) at 3 p.m.

## **19TH-RANKED GFC MEN'S SOCCER TEAM SET FOR NO. 16 CONCORDIA**

Rivals since their infancy in 1984, the George Fox College and Concordia College men's soccer teams have emerged among the NAIA elite.

Sixteenth-ranked Concordia and 19th-ranked George Fox play a high-stakes match in Portland Saturday (Oct. 24) at 1 p.m. George Fox, 10-1-2, Concordia, 11-2, and Willamette, 6-4-1, are all undefeated in NAIA District 2 and in fierce competition for the playoff's top seed. No. 1 plays No. 4, while the No. 2 and 3 teams have the rougher chore of facing each other in the district semi-finals on Nov. 5.

"That's what we're trying to avoid," says GFC coach Manfred Tschan.

The Bruins and Willamette tied 1-1 on Oct. 14 and the Bearcats play Concordia on Oct. 28. GFC's tie dropped it in the polls from 14th to 19th.

Both George Fox and Concordia began NAIA men's soccer programs in 1984 and for seven years competed for the right to advance to the National Christian College Athletic Association championships. George Fox won the national title twice, in 1988 and 1990. Since 1991, the Bruins have competed solely in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

The former NCCAA District 8 rivals have another connection. Tschan, a coach at George Fox the last four years, guided Concordia through its first four year.

The Cavaliers are hoping for their first-ever trip to the NAIA district playoffs. "They have the strongest midfield in the district," says Tschan. "And they have had some good quality wins."

Thanks to its stingy defense and potent offense, George Fox has not lost in 11 straight games. The Bruins have outscored their 13 opponents 38-12 and have 5 shutouts. GFC's offense lists 4

### **14TH-RANKED GFC MEN'S SOCCER TIED BY WILLAMETTE**

The rematch of last year's NAIA District 2 championship soccer game between 14th-ranked George Fox and Willamette didn't settle a thing.

Defending champion Willamette scored in the final minute of overtime to force a 1-1 tie with the Bruins, last year's runner-up.

The tie at home broke a streak of ten straight wins for the 10-1-2 Bruins.

Up until GFC's sophomore striker Greg Pfleger, Battle Ground, Wash., scored two minutes into the second half of overtime, it was a replay of the Bruin-Bearcat clash in the district championship game a year ago.

"I got a through-ball, chested it and shot it," said Pfleger. Sophomore midfielder Jai Cook, Eugene, Ore., had the assist on Pfleger's district-leading 18th goal.

Just as they did last year in Salem, the two teams battled to a scoreless tie after 90 minutes of regulation. Last season, the Bearcats prevailed on penalty kicks four and a half hours after kickoff.

This time there was no sudden-death overtime period or penalty kicks, just two 15-minute halves of overtime. Willamette, 6-4-1, matched Pfleger's goal with a header by Adam Halverson in the confusion after a corner kick.

"They were playing our game," said GFC coach Manfred Tschan. "They were fastbreaking, getting it to their forwards and letting them work."

The game will be broadcast on TCI Cable Channel 9 at 6 p.m. on Monday (Oct. 19).

It was the second time this season George Fox has lost a win on a last-minute goal. In the second game of the season, Whitworth College scored in the 89th minute to force overtime and then won 2-1. Last week, Whitworth ranked third in the NAIA.

## **WIN STREAK ON LINE AS SOCCER BRUINS FACE WILLAMETTE**

Fresh from a weekend home sweep of NAIA District 2's Idaho teams, the George Fox College men's soccer team puts its 10-game win streak and national ranking on the line.

Defending champion Willamette will be in town to play GFC, last year's runner-up, in a 4 p.m. match on Wednesday (Oct. 14).

This weekend the Bruins won their ninth and tenth straight, defeating Northwest Nazarene College 3-1 on Friday (Oct. 9) and Albertson College 5-1 on Saturday.

George Fox was a couple of penalty kicks away from taking a string of five-straight shutouts into Wednesday's game. The Bruins, 10-1-1 have outscored their opponents 37-11. In this season's seven home games, George Fox has given up just five goals

While scoring on GFC in Newberg is tough, wins come even harder. The Bruins will be defending their nine-game home winning-streak that spans more than a year. An overtime loss to Oregon State on September 18, 1991 was the last time GFC fell at home.

Sophomore striker Greg Pflieger increased his district-leading goal total to 17 with a penalty kick against NNC and two scores against Albertson.

His penalty kick started the scoring on Friday. Freshman forward Ian Reschke, Renton, Wash. drew the call 14 minutes in, when he was taken down inside the goal box. He scored one of his own, 14 minutes later, when he headed in a cross from freshman Phil Nelson.

"Ian sent a long ball to Phil in the corner," said GFC coach Manfred Tschan. "It was a 40 yard give-and-go."

NNC got off its first shot -- a 30 -yarder wide to the left -- 37 minutes into the game.

Senior midfielder Jason Meyer, Philomath, Ore., punched in the Bruins' final goal from out of a crowd, nine minutes after the break. Sophomore Jai Cook, Eugene, Ore. collected the assist.

Until the Crusaders' Carlos Antras scored his penalty kick at the 74 minute mark, George Fox had played eight-straight halves without giving up a goal. Junior midfielder Tom Faure-Goda was called for a foul on a free kick after sophomore goalie Jeff Nelson, Medford, Ore., had already punched the ball away.

Against Albertson, sophomore striker Mike Nadeau, Portland, got both the stats he wanted and the rest he needed. Nadeau, playing with an injured leg, volleyed in the game's first goal, 12 minutes in, off a pass from Reschke.

"It was a beautiful touch volley," said Tschan, "It couldn't have been any prettier."

A minute later, Nadeau blasted a shot off and through the keeper, but Reschke was there to finish it.

"Ian pounced on the loose ball and stole his goal," said Tschan.

And Nadeau's day was over. "Three points in 15 minutes is not bad," said Tschan.

For the first time all season, George Fox's RPM offense produced a goal for each forward. At the beginning of the season, Tschan dubbed the Bruins' attacking 3-4-3 set-up, the RPM offense, for the first or last names of forwards Reschke, Pflieger, and Mike Nadeau.

The RPMs were racing against Albertson's sweeper-less defense.

"They play a flat defense," said Tschan. "Against our speed, that's a killer."

Pflieger scored his first unassisted, beating his defenders and then the goalie at 22 minutes.

Erin Luthy of Albertson converted the penalty kick nine minutes before the game's end. A linesman called freshman midfielder Jim Maine, Yakima, Wash., for a handball on a corner kick.

"I jumped to try to knock it off the inside of my foot, but it hit my hand and went out of bounds," said Maine. "It was an unlucky thing."

As if the penalty kick was a wake-up call, GFC scored in less than a minute. Phil Nelson sent a through-ball to Pflieger who finished it.

With a minute left, freshman Brandon Wescom scored his first collegiate goal in his first collegiate appearance. It was the first time he suited up with the varsity.

"I didn't even think I was going to play," said Wescom.

## 18TH-RANKED GFC SOCCER BRUINS AIM FOR WILLAMETTE REMATCH

The George Fox College men's soccer team, winners of its last eight games and nationally-ranked for the first time ever, will host a rematch of last year's NAIA District 2 championship game this Wednesday (Oct. 14) at 4 p.m.

Eighteenth-ranked GFC hopes to revenge a double-overtime loss to Willamette that ended on penalty kicks, four and a half hours after kickoff.

"It's a rematch of one of the best games ever played in this district," said GFC coach

Manfred Tschan.

Before the Bruins and Bearcats can tangle, George Fox, 8-1-1, must host Northwest Nazarene on Friday (Oct. 9) at 4 p.m. and Albertson on Saturday at 1 p.m. The Bruins have not lost at home in more than a year. George Fox has won seven straight home games --including five shutouts -- since losing in overtime to Oregon State on September 18, 1991. Just hours after discovering he had been named NAIA District 2 Player of the Week, Mike Nadeau went out and proved his worth.

The sophomore striker from Portland was involved in both scoring plays as George Fox downed Pacific University 2-0 on Wednesday (Sept. 30).

After tying and losing in overtime in its first two games, George Fox has reeled off six straight wins to move its record to 6-1-1. The home win over Pacific makes GFC 1-0 in counting district play.

Wednesday's game is scheduled to be broadcast on TCI Cable channel 9 at 6 p.m. on Monday (Oct. 5).

Nadeau said he read his honor in the paper the morning of the game. "It got me pretty excited," he said. "I wanted to live up to it."

"Today he was unbelievable," said GFC coach Manfred Tschan about Nadeau. "If some of the rest of the team had been there, he could have had five or six assists.

Playing well above his height of 5-9, Nadeau exploited his more earth-bound defender. "The game plan after the half was to get it to me, so I could flick it on," said Nadeau.

Nadeau scored goal No. 2 on another air assault eight minutes from the finish. He headed in his fifth goal in the last four games off a header from senior Jason Meyer, Philomath, Ore. Nadeau has five goals and six assists this season.

Pacific gave up the fewest goals in district last season and continued its defensive game plan.

"They play good defense," said Tschan. "They were pretty massed in there. If there are too many to go through, you've got to go over them. We had to try with the battering ram."

"We wanted to spread them out," said Nadeau. "They really packed it in the back."

Pacific's defensive mind-set cost them on the offensive side. GFC outshot the Boxers 11-2, missing on multiple point-blank scoring opportunities.

The Bruin defense registered its third shutout and has helped GFC outscore its last six opponents by 15 goals, 19-4. It's showing wear and tear, though. Senior Aaron Barnett, Salem, injured his right quadriceps during the Bruins' September 26 win over Oregon State and is out for approximately two weeks. ## **GFC MEN'S SOCCER BREAKS OREGON STATE WIN STREAK**

The soccer Bruins from George Fox College both built and broke a winning streak with their 5-2 victory over NCAA Division 1 Oregon State on Saturday (Sept. 26).

The 5-1-1 Bruins produced their fifth-straight win of the season while cutting off the Beaver's winning string at six.

Sophomore striker Greg Pflieger, Battle Ground, Wash., kept a streak of his own going. His two goals gave him seven straight games with at least one goal and made his season-total twelve.

The Beavers were an aggressive physical team. "They were hitting pretty hard," said coach Manfred Tschan.

"They were so strong in the air," said senior defender Aaron Barnett, Salem. "Manfred told us that before. Their coach is from Ireland and they play that style of soccer. They get it on the sides and cross it. They did it all day."

The Bruins went up 2-0 with back-to-back goals.

Senior midfielder Jason Meyer, Philomath, Ore., started the scoring at the 27 minute mark with a header off a free kick from another senior midfielder, Darren Dilley, Clackamas, Ore.

"We all know he had his eyes closed," joked coach Manfred Tschan about Meyer's header. "He hit it with the top of his head; not the most technically correct way of doing it. We gave him a hard time about it. He's been so close all year."

Five minutes later, sophomore midfielder Jai Cook, Eugene, Ore., set up a 16-yard shot by Pflieger.

"It seems like the 500th time he's been one-on-one with the keeper and put it away," said Tschan. "As soon as he beats his defender we all raise our hands. We don't even worry about it."

But OSU came back with their strong suit: air attacks. Twice in two minutes -- once on a corner kick and the other on a cross -- the Beavers headed in goals.

Fifteen minutes after the 2-2 half, sophomore striker Mike Nadeau, Portland, headed in one of his own. "Every goal in the game was beautiful," said Tschan. "But the third one takes the cake."

Swiss senior sweeper Dieter Muenstermann stole the ball in the back and brought it upfield before passing to Pflieger. He beat his defender and came in on the goal before assisting Nadeau.

"He hit Nadeau in stride," said Tschan. "It was a bullet; just perfect."

Five minutes later, in a near instant-replay, Pflieger sent the ball to Nadeau's foot for Nadeau's fourth goal in three games.

"At that point I felt pretty good," said Tschan. "I didn't think they could come back from a two-goal deficit twice."

The Bruin defence held.

"Our marking was much tighter," said Barnett. "We started to win balls in the air. We were much more aggressive."

The GFC defence has been outstanding during the winning streak. The Bruins have given up four goals while scoring seventeen.

With seven minutes remaining, Pflieger added another to his total when he intercepted a back pass and put the ball in the goal.

George Fox begins a seven-game homestand, hosting NAIA District 2 foe Pacific at 4 p.m. on Wednesday (Sept. 30). The game is scheduled to be broadcast on TCI Cable channel 9 on Monday (Oct. 5) at 6 p.m. Pacific Lutheran visits on Saturday (Oct. 3) for the second half of a soccer doubleheader. After the Lady Bruins host Albertson College at 11 a.m., the men will play at 1 p.m.

### **PFLEGER'S NINE GOALS LEAD BRUINS TO 3-1-1 RECORD**

The George Fox College men's soccer team has won three straight, the Bruin defense owns two shutouts, Greg Pflieger already has nine goals, and Mike Nadeau finally broke his scoring jinx.

That sums up the week for the 3-1-1 Bruins.

Thanks to the two-goal-a-game output from Pflieger, a sophomore striker from Battle Ground, Wash., GFC hammered visiting University of Puget Sound 3-0 on Monday (Sept. 14), and survived a not-so-pretty 3-1 win over Western Baptist on Wednesday (Sept. 16) in Salem.

Pflieger scored 22 goals last season (eighth in the NAIA) and is nearly halfway to matching that total with just over a quarter of the regular season completed.

GFC head coach Manfred Tschan says he's not at all surprised at Pflieger's numbers. "I think we're a lot further along in our offense than we were last year," he says. "It's nice to see how relaxed he is. He hasn't scored any goals with sheer power. Everything this year has been in close."

The "RPM" offense -- so named by Tschan for the first or last names of forwards Ian Reschke, a freshman from Renton, Wash., Pflieger, and Mike Nadeau, a sophomore from Portland, -- is finally hitting with all cylinders. While the "R" and "P" -- Pflieger and Reschke -- both scored goals by the season's third game, Mike Nadeau was the missing "M" - literally. Although he collected five assists and drew two goal-producing penalties during the first five games, Nadeau couldn't find the back of the net until the final minute of the Western Baptist game.

"I had so many chances," said Nadeau, the district's sixth-leading scorer last season with 13. "I knew it had to happen sometime." The 5-9 speedster barely fit in his jinx-breaking goal. With 55 seconds showing on the scoreboard, Nadeau took a through-ball from a fast-breaking Jai Cook, a sophomore from Eugene, Ore., and hit it off the goalie and into the goal.

It was GFC's final goal in a semi-inspired non-counting district game against a team the Bruins hadn't lost to in seven years. "There wasn't a lot of intensity," said Tschan. After Nadeau assisted Pfleger on the only score of the first half, the Warriors came back to tie at the 69 minute mark. Pfleger, who rested an injured leg for part of the second half, was reinserted and outran everybody for a breakaway tiebreaking goal with 12 minutes left.

Against UPS, the Bruin defense, with sophomore Jeff Nelson, Medford, Ore., in goal, picked up its second shutout in a row. GFC has outscored its first five opponents 14-6.

"It was a fun game," said senior Swiss sweeper Dieter Muenstermann. "Everybody was playing good defense. I knew if we played that way for 90 minutes they wouldn't score."

Pfleger went left on a penalty kick for the first half 1-0 lead.

"The second-half goals were world-class," said Tschan. "There were as beautiful as they come."

Both Pfleger and Reschke converted one-on-ones with soft chips over the goalie's head. Pfleger assisted Reschke and Nadeau set up Pfleger.

Sophomore substitute midfielder Ryan Weider, Chiloquin, Ore., is out for three weeks after he injured the medial collateral ligament in his right leg during the UPS game.

George Fox travels to Bellingham to play one of NAIA Area 1's top five teams, Western Washington, on Saturday (Sept. 19). The game ends GFC's season-opening blitz of six games in eleven days.

## GFC MEN'S SOCCER GETS SPOKANE SPLIT

Those faint of heart or short of time need not apply as George Fox College men's soccer fans. The Bruins seem to have a thing for overtime.

Until last Saturday (Sept. 12), when George Fox downed host Gonzaga 4-0, 10 1/2 months had passed since GFC last played a simple 90 minute regulation-length game. That totals four straight overtime games -- two in each season -- since November 2, 1991.

"The first half was a little sloppy," said Tschan. "Jeff had to intervene more than I wanted him to."

Sophomore striker Greg Pflieger, Battle Ground, Wash., cashed in a penalty kick at the 13 minute mark for his fifth goal in three games. Pflieger, eighth in the NAIA last season with 22 goals, was GFC's lone scorer in 1992 until the other Bruins broke in during the Gonzaga game.

Kent George, a sophomore from Klamath Falls, shattered the jinx the first time he touched the ball.

When freshman forward Ian Reschke, Renton, Wash., asked Tschan for a breather at the beginning of the second half, in went George for just the second varsity collegiate game of his life. His first varsity experience came during the overtime of the Whitworth game.

Off of a free kick at midfield, senior midfielder Jason Meyer, Philomath, Ore., headed the ball over the keeper to George. "Kent was there to put it in the open net," said Tschan.

Sophomore striker Mike Nadeau, Portland, finished sixth in NAIA District 2 last year with 13 goals, but has yet to score this season. What he's not doing himself, he's setting up for others.

"Nadeau was pretty instrumental in our offense," said Tschan.

Nadeau drew the penalty in the box that gave Pfleger his penalty kick. He also assisted his teammates on two-on-two breaks that produced goals at the 60 and 81 minute marks.

His first went to freshman forward Phil Nelson, Idaho Falls, Idaho.

"Nadeau laid a perfect pass to the right side," said Tschan. "Phil hit it hard and on the ground to the near post. There wasn't an inch to spare between the post and the goalie's hands."

Reschke came back in the game to collect his first collegiate goal. "Nadeau hit a soft little cross over to Ian," said Tschan. "He saw the goalie coming out and one-touched it softly over him."

George Fox came within a minute of defeating one of the Northwest's top teams and breaking the overtime streak one game earlier. Going into minute 89, GFC led Whitworth, 1-0. Whitworth ranked fifth (GFC was sixth) in the Area 1 preseason poll and since has twice downed top-ranked Simon Fraser.

Whitworth forced overtime on a desperation shot from 20 yards out. "He probably could take that shot 100 times and not hit it ever," said Tschan. The Whitworth player got on a loose ball, turned, and fired. "It went in the upper 'V'," said Tschan. "Right where Jeff had no chance at it."

Whitworth scored the game-winner five minutes into overtime off a rebound from Nelson.

With GFC's offense bogged down in the middle, Evergreen broke into the Bruin defense. The Geoducks converted a penalty kick in front of the Bruin penalty box into a goal in the final minute of the first half. "They crossed it to the far post," said Tschan. "Two of our players stood and watched the Evergreen State guy score a gorgeous header."

Although both teams had opportunities, the second half was scoreless.

## **GFC MEN'S SOCCER HAS RPM OFFENSE READY FOR NEW SEASON**

They're baaack.

NAIA District 2's highest scoring men's soccer team returns all but two starters from the 1991 squad that lost the district championship game on penalty kicks.

If that isn't bad enough news for district opponents, GFC coach Manfred Tschan has a name for his fast-breaking offense. He's dubbed the Bruins attacking 3-4-3 setup the RPM offense.

While the "P" and the "M" are familiar in District 2 - they come from the names of GFC's freshmen phenoms, Greg Pfleger, Battleground, Wash., and Mike Nadeau, Portland, who last year finished first and sixth in district scoring - the "R" is new.

Tschan says Ian Reschke, a freshman striker from Lindbergh High School in Renton, Wash., has the best chance of breaking into the starting lineup. "He's a clone of Pfleger and (Jeff) Passey," says the fourth-year coach. Passey was the Bruins all-purpose sophomore who did not return for fall practice. "Reschke isn't as fast as Phleger but he has the solid technique of Passey," Tschan says.

The Bruins lose four-year starter Marc Waits, a midfielder/forward, but Tschan says he has another player of similar talents. Although he has seen him only on videotape, Tschan says Phillip Nelson from Idaho Falls High School, is a finesse player with good dribbling skills much like Waits.

After graduating the nation's leading goal scorer in 1990 (Dan LaVeine collected 130 career collegiate goals in four years), GFC coach Manfred Tschan knew he needed a new philosophy to produce some scores.

"I had nightmares of us going four or five games without scoring," he said. With LaVeine up front creating his own scoring opportunities, GFC used the traditional 4-4-2 lineup with four defenders, four midfielders and two forwards. With him gone, Tschan moved a player from the back to the front. George Fox is the only district team to use the 3-4-3 setup.

"We try to get the ball to the forwards quicker," said Tschan. While many teams build an attack slowly while moving players forward to help their two strikers, the Bruins won't be waiting around. "They can attack because they already have support," Tschan says.

The three-forward approach produced a district-high 48 goals last year while the more exposed defense allowed only 12. Pflieger scored 22 of the GFC goals, ranking him eighth in the nation at the NAIA level.

Tschan anticipates sticking with the attack-at-every-opportunity approach. "We obviously enjoyed it very much," he says, "Once we figured it out."

The start wasn't so enjoyable. Battling a benchful of injuries, a heavyweight early season schedule and the new system, George Fox limped out of the blocks to a 1-6 start.

By the time the Bruins hit midseason, Tschan had his charges fine tuned and George Fox finished with eight wins in its final ten games. GFC finished 10-9, 9-3 in district.

Injuries forced Dieter Muenstermann, a 6-0, 195 pound all-district first team member, from midfield to sweeper last year. A senior midfielder from Huenibach, Switzerland, Muenstermann performed so well he might have to stay. "We may experiment with new guys at stopper but I'm leaning towards leaving him at sweeper," said Tschan.

The entire defense returns including senior Aaron Barnett, Salem, who spent the spring semester studying in Costa Rica. Barnett received all-district second team honors last year and scored the winning goal in GFC's overtime semi-final playoff win over Pacific.

A couple of recruits looking for playing time in the defense are 1989 Eisenhower High MVP Jim Maine of Yakima, Wash., and Steve Sterhan, a 1992 Milwaukie High grad. Maine transfers from Spokane Community College where he played one season. Sterhan, a 6-1 defender, already has impressed the assistant coach. "Andy (LaVeine) likes him," says Tschan. "When he hacks him, Steve hacks him back."

The Bruins are in as good a position as George Fox has ever been in the race for the district title.

"I think we'll go at least as far as last year," says Muenstermann.

Tschan is wary. "We have a lot of reasons to be complacent," he says. "Our quality of effort will determine what kind of year we'll have."

Pre-1991 powerhouse Warner Pacific has dropped its soccer team as well as all athletic programs. That leaves George Fox, Willamette, Pacific, Albertson and Concordia in the lead pack, Tschan says.

"Anybody in the top five could come through," says Tschan. "Willamette is the defending champ. Its team is the favorite until someone knocks them off."

The Bruins opportunity won't come until mid-October during a seven game home stand.

By then the RPMs should be on high.
