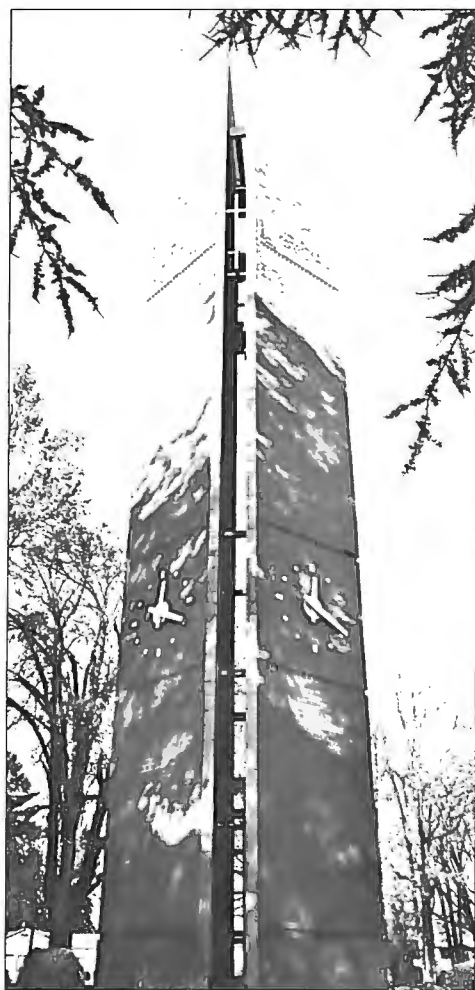

George Fox College, in its 102nd year, is one of America's Best Colleges. Four times it has been given that designation by U.S. News & World Report magazine. In 1992 GFC was ranked third in academic reputation among Western Regional Liberal Arts Colleges, including colleges and universities from Oklahoma to Hawaii.

This year, for the fourth time, the College was named to the Templeton Foundation Honor Roll of Character Building Colleges, the only Oregon college selected and one of 111 in the United States.

George Fox College is the outgrowth of a desire by early Willamette Valley Quaker settlers who established Pacific Academy in 1885 for the Christian education of their children. The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction for students. In 1949, because of the many colleges in the Northwest with Pacific in their name, the College was renamed George Fox in honor of the founder of the Friends (Quaker) Church. The College is governed by a 42-member Board of Trustees elected by Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, which comprises nearly 8,000 members in 51 churches in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho.

George Fox is one of the nation's fastest-growing colleges. Enrollment has risen from 549 in 1986 to 1,425 in the fall of 1992, a 162 percent increase, including an 18 percent growth from the previous year. GFC students come from 25 states and 11 nations. Nearly 40 religious denominations are represented on campus.

George Fox is accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools. The College is one of 13 members of the national Christian College Consortium. The College's undergraduate program is administered through three schools: Humanities, Natural and Behavioral Sciences, and Professional Studies. The 15 departments offer 30 majors

with more than 400 courses. An off-campus degree-completion program in management of human resources enrolls working adults in an evening program with classes in Portland, Salem and Eugene. Graduate programs offer a Doctor of Psychology (Psy.D.) degree in clinical psychology, a Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.), a Master of Business Administration (M.B.A.), and a Master of Arts in Christian Studies (M.A.).

The 60-acre rural, tree-shaded campus a half-hour drive from Portland has undergone major expansion in recent years with 12 new buildings constructed. The latest academic building is the M.J. Murdock Learning Resource Center, dedicated in 1989. Two new residence halls—Willcuts and Beebe—were opened in 1990 and 1991, respectively. Currently a three-year project (using summers when students are not on campus) is underway to renovate and expand Heacock Commons. It is part of a \$16 million comprehensive Centennial Campaign through which \$10 million already has been raised.

Alumni of George Fox are primarily in service-oriented vocations of Christian ministries, education, social work, and medical fields. The College's most prominent alumnus is the late President Herbert Hoover, who attended Pacific Academy.





George Fox College boasts one of the Northwest's premier small-college athletic programs. Five of seven fall and winter teams ranked among the NAIA's national top 20 in 1992-93.

During the calendar year 1992, 17 GFC athletes earned 22 NAIA All-American awards—seven matching the College's national academic reputation with All-American Scholar-Athlete honors.

In 1991-92, George Fox's athletic program ranked as the most successful in the state at the NAIA level.



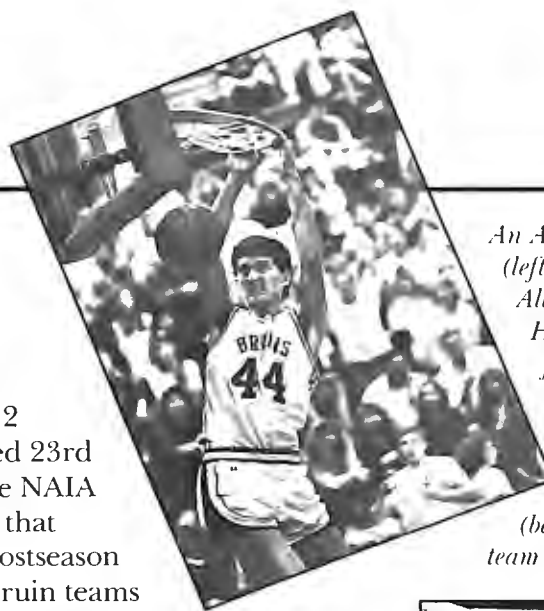
The men's teams topped all District 2 colleges and ranked 23rd in the nation in the NAIA All-Sports Contest that judges teams on postseason finishes. All five Bruin teams qualified for the District 2 playoffs with two taking titles. Lady Bruin teams took third in the district and 33rd in the nation in the All-Sports Contest. Four of six teams advanced to postseason play and two advanced to top-10 national finishes.

George Fox's highest national team finish came in the fall of 1992 when the women's cross country team maintained a No. 1 ranking for its entire season before finishing as national runner-up.

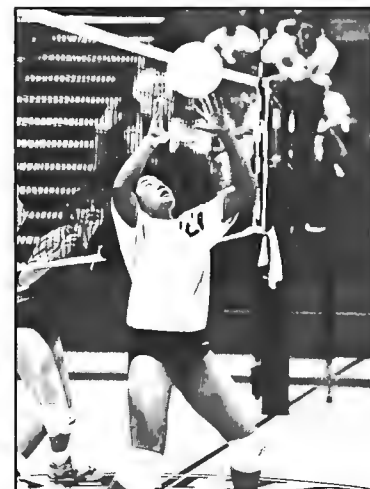
Intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the overall education program at George Fox. Men's varsity athletic teams represent the College in baseball, basketball, track, cross country and soccer. Women teams are fielded in volleyball, basketball, track, softball, cross country and soccer.

For students not participating in the varsity program, GFC has a

complete intramural program including flag football, basketball, volleyball, softball, racquetball, indoor soccer, skiing, swimming, bowling, floor hockey and tennis.

Athletic facilities include the Coleman H. Wheeler Center for Sports and Physical Education; Colcord Field; tennis courts; and the Curtis and Margaret Morse Athletic Field containing a baseball diamond, softball field, and soccer field.

## NAIA

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) is a completely autonomous association administering programs leading to 23 national championships in 13 events. The NAIA includes 40 percent of America's collegiate athletic programs, representing 411 accredited four-year colleges and universities in 32 geographical districts spread over 49 states and Canada. The colleges have a total enrollment of more than 800,000, including approximately 65,000 varsity athletes.

Established in 1940 as the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball, the NAIB evolved from the institution of a "National Small College Basketball Tournament" that was inaugurated in 1937. In 1952, the NAIB expanded to include tennis, outdoor track and golf, and that year the organization was renamed the NAIA.

Since that time, the NAIA has further enlarged to encompass football, cross country, baseball and swimming, which were added to the NAIA championship program in 1956, wrestling (1958), soccer (1959), and indoor track (1966). In 1980 the NAIA initiated championships for women in the newly organized NAIA Women's Division. Nine championships are offered: basketball, cross country, fast-pitch softball, indoor and outdoor track, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and volleyball.

NAIA national headquarters and staff are located in Kansas City, Missouri, but will move in July to Tulsa, Okla-

homa. The NAIA is governed by two bodies. The Council of Presidents, composed of one president from each district, is responsible for fiscal matters and supervision of the national staff. George Fox College president Edward F. Stevens represents NAIA District 2 and is one of five U.S. college presidents selected to serve on the NAIA Council of Presidents Executive Committee, serving as chairman in 1992. The national Coordinating



Council, elected by the membership, is responsible for organizing championship events, academic standards, and overseeing the committees and associations.

Eligibility rules within the NAIA govern all play of all sports recognized by the Association, not just post-season play. All eligibility guidelines must be adhered to by all members, including those holding dual affiliation with other associations.

The NAIA clearly outlines its own responsibilities and those of its members: a sound athletic program, administered and controlled by those responsible for the administration of the college or university. The NAIA's basic premise is that the athletic program is a basic component of the overall general educational process, and not an entity apart.

NAIA academic eligibility requirements mandate that all student athletes exhibit demonstrated progress toward an academic degree throughout their collegiate careers for the duration of their athletic eligibility. Where institutional rules and standards are more strict than those of the regulatory group or the NAIA, those rules and standards of the institution are recognized and supported by the NAIA.

## NAIA DISTRICT 2

George Fox College competes in District 2 of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). Eleven teams participate in baseball, all but two within Oregon.

The district has two scheduling pools. George Fox plays in the independent "Cascade Conference" along with Albertson College, Concordia College, Eastern Oregon State College, Northwest Nazarene College, Western Baptist College and Western Oregon State College. Members of the Northwest Conference of Independent Colleges (NCIC) are Lewis & Clark College, Linfield College, Pacific University and Willamette University.

A six-team district tournament will be held May 12-17 in Boise, Idaho. The top three Cascade teams and the NCIC's best two automatically qualify. The sixth is selected from those remaining by best conference record.

## Bruins Duplicate Title Performance

In a repeat performance of 1991, the George Fox College baseball Bruins last year steamrolled to their second NAIA District 2 championship.

With the exception of the first inning of the tourney, the Metro-Valley conference champs never even trailed in their four straight playoff victories. The GFC pitchers, statistically the best in the district and 12th in the nation with eight shutouts and a 3.44 ERA, helped the Bruins outscore their opponents 39-13.

In the Bruins' closest game of the tournament, junior first baseman Fernando Pol swatted back-to-back home runs to give GFC the 7-5 title-game victory over Albertson College of Idaho.

The Puerto Rico native was GFC's lone representative on the all-district team. Pol batted a team-leading .402 and rewrote school records with 12 home runs and 51 RBIs.

Five days later, GFC's season dead-ended with a 26-7 NAIA record, 29-18 overall, in what Bruin coach Pat Casey labeled the "toughest area tourney in the nation."

George Fox began the Area 1 tournament falling 8-2 to Lewis-Clark State, eventual winner of its sixth-straight national championship, and ended with a 5-4 loss to the NAIA's third-place team in 1991, Hawaii Pacific.

"I'm not disappointed in the season," said Casey. "It's just hard to see the players work so hard to get to the show and not get it done. We didn't play up to our potential."

Last year, the Bruins showed they had more than potential by upsetting two Pacific 10 Conference foes, Oregon State and Portland State.

When senior pitchers Jason Williams and Vincent DeJoia teamed up to down PSU 8-4 on Feb. 27, it was the first time GFC's baseball team had defeated an NCAA Division 1 team.

After that exhilarating start, the Bruins' season took some tough bounces, including a 1-4 bad hop through California during spring break.

Casey, the 1991 and 1992 district coach of the year, points to double-header losses to Lewis & Clark in Portland as the turnaround. "After the Lewis & Clark games, we realized we needed to start doing things differently," he said.

The Bruins ran off a 10-game win streak and won 20 of their next 23 games. Included in the hot stretch was Casey's 100th win as a GFC coach. His five-year NAIA record is now an impressive 107-38, and he's 114-84 including games against NCAA opponents.

Crucial to George Fox's season were the freshmen—and standing tallest was 5-9 speedster Mike Nadeau of Gresham, Ore. Nadeau, a forward on the GFC soccer squad, hit .348 with 16 stolen bases and 40 RBIs. Near the end of the season, the third baseman knocked out an unrookie-like 18-game hitting streak.

George Fox batted a collective .306 and boasted four players with 30 or more RBIs: Pol, Nadeau, senior Sean Bahrt and junior Brandon Crosier.

Junior right-hander Rob Gehrke of Troutdale, Ore., threw himself into the record books.

With 7.38, the transfer from Clark Community College had the second most strikeouts per nine innings in GFC history, and his six complete games tied a school record.

George Fox dominated the district honorable mention awards, receiving 10 of 26 selections.

## Bruins Eye Title No. 3

George Fox College's quest for its third NAIA District 2 baseball title of the decade has begun.

Ten district opponents and recent history are against the Bruins. 1975 was the last time a district school won its third consecutive championship.

The Bruins are one of the Northwest's most dominant NAIA teams. In the last two seasons, George Fox won 78 percent (48-13) of its NAIA games, but in the district playoffs it's been untouchable. Its last tournament loss came in 1990. At the 1992 District Tournament, George Fox trailed an opponent just once—in the first inning of the first game. NAIA teams aren't the only ones to fall to the Bruins. Last season, GFC notched its first-ever wins over NCAA Division I schools, beating Portland State and Oregon State on the road.

Sixth-year coach Pat Casey leads 17 players—six starters—from last season's team that finished 29-18 overall and 26-5 against NAIA opponents. The returning core is larger than last season, when Casey rebuilt a district champion from just three returning starters. Among the veterans are the 1992 team's top four hitters according to batting average. Senior outfielder **Fernando Pol** brings back his big bat that led the Bruin hitters at .402. Last season, GFC's only district first-team selection installed new school records with 12 home runs and 51 RBIs. Casey says he's the most dangerous offensive threat in the district. Senior **Gage Campbell** split time at first base and batted .355. Stealing 16 bases after hitting .348 was **Mike Nadeau**. Casey felt his third baseman was one of the top infielders in the district even as a

freshman. Senior outfielder **Brandon Crosier** will start again in center field. Hitting .338 at the plate last season, he registered a team-high 12 doubles and stole eight bases in nine attempts.

Graduation and George Fox's growing reputation among professional baseball scouts cost the 1993 Bruins. Three Bruins went pro after last year, making GFC's total six in the past four years. Missing from the roster are five seniors and four significant underclassmen. Twelve transfers and three freshmen join the 1993 Bruin brigade.

Perhaps the most notable absence will be behind the plate where **Steve Lampkin** resided for his four years. Now the property of the Montreal Expos, Lampkin's leadership and defensive skills earned him district honorable mention honors twice.

Casey has two possible replacements. Senior **Michael Burton** was Lampkin's understudy last season, seeing action

in 26 of the Bruins' 47 games. Burton hit .245, collecting 15 RBIs. Casey says Mesa Community College transfer **Joe Bergen** brings solid defensive skills.

Despite inexperience on the left side, Casey says pitching will be a Bruin strength.

With a 3.44 E.R.A., the George Fox pitching staff was District 2's best. Six return, including District 2 honorable mention all-star seniors **Clark Anderson**, **Rob Gehrke**, and junior stopper **Tom Bohlman**. Three senior pitchers—**Jason Williams**, **Darrell Dirks** and **Vincent DeJoia**, who combined to work 98 innings—are gone.

The Florida Marlins and Atlanta Braves raided the Bruin bullpen, taking junior **Scott Englehart** and sophomore lefthander **John Avery**.

The losses of DeJoia and Avery hurt GFC's southpaw supply. Sophomore **Todd Saperstein** is the lone lefty

returner. Casey will look to four newcomers for left-handed help.

Oregon State's and the Cincinnati Reds' loss is George Fox's gain. Senior righthander **Jason Carroll** was drafted in 1989, but played for the Beavers for three years. Casey says he could be one of the district's best on the mound.

A player who could slip into the rotation's open fourth spot after Gehrke, Anderson and Carroll is sophomore **Brian Meyers**, who redshirted 1992 after breaking his leg.

Casey is loaded defensively in the infield. At first, he has Campbell or third-team NCAA Div. III All-American **Josh Gilbert**. A senior transfer from Bethel College, Minnesota, Gilbert also could play third. Senior **Jose De La Cruz** can do the same. He came off a broken finger to hit three home runs at the end of last season. Casey expects big numbers from him.

Up the middle, Casey can choose from Nadeau, senior **Matt Capka**, senior **Davin Miyamura**, Miracosta JC transfer **A.J. Buckholz**, and sophomore **Tony Iranshad**.

**Tony Robertson** returns to Oregon after three seasons at San Diego State. Casey says the 205 pound, 5-foot-10 Benson High grad can play infield or outfield.

Pol and Crosier return to the outfield, but the loss of district honorable mention selections **Sean Bahrt** and **Tony Spencer** has opened the position to community college transfers **Eric Nielsen** and **Mark Daniels**.

What will it take to secure title No. 3?

"It's a matter of getting good years out of people," says Casey. "Talent-wise we should be able to compete, but talent isn't everything. I didn't feel we had the most talent in the district last

year, but we came together pretty good."

Casey expects Linfield and Albertson to be the largest obstacles to a three-peat. He thinks Willamette, Eastern Oregon and Western Oregon also will be in the hunt.

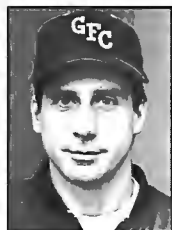
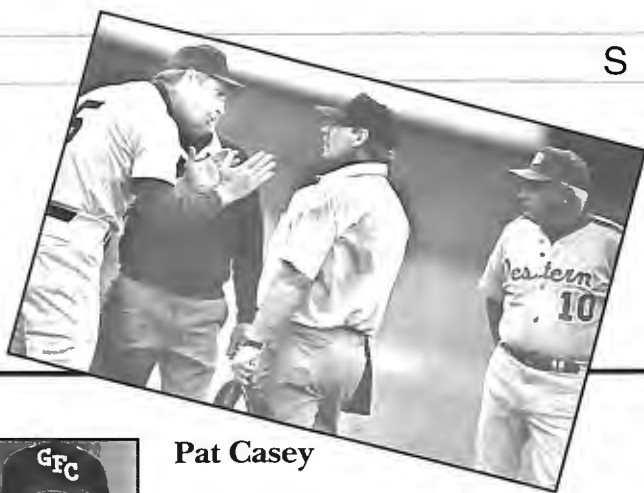
The Bruins have never made it to the NAIA World Series. After its two district championships, GFC's seasons have halted in the Area 1 playoffs that include the champions from districts 1, 2, 3 and 29. George Fox resides in what may be the toughest area in the nation. To get to the NAIA World Series from Area 1, a team must knock off Lewis-Clark State of Idaho, the owner of the NAIA national title since 1987. Should GFC pass through Boise—site of this year's district tournament—the Bruins would come home for the area playoffs. The District 2 representative hosts the 1993 Area 1 tournament.

## Pat Casey

Baseball at George Fox College hasn't been the same since Pat Casey became the Bruins' coach in 1988.

A Newberg High product with seven years of pro baseball experience, Casey has transformed GFC into a Northwest baseball powerhouse. It's been an astounding turnaround. In his first season, he brought George Fox its first winning record since the College entered the NAIA in 1965. In the 13 years prior to Casey's arrival, George Fox won a total of 96 games and lost 257. The two-time NAIA District 2 Coach of the Year has already passed the 100-win plateau and has his Bruins looking for their third-straight district title. His five-year NAIA record is an impressive 107-40, and he's 114-84 overall including games against NCAA opponents.

Casey, 33, has a successful baseball background. He was drafted by the San Diego Padres after his junior year at the University of Portland, where he was an all-region left fielder. In 1980, he stole 30 bases: still a record at U of P.

With San Diego, he played AA ball in Virginia and Texas, and AAA ball in Calgary with the Seattle Mariners organization. He finished his pro career with the AAA Portland Beavers. A center fielder, he batted over .300 at each level.

Casey, a 1977 graduate of Newberg High, was a Coast Valley League all-star in baseball, basketball and football.

In addition to coaching, Casey works in his family's real estate business.



## Ron Northcutt

Ron Northcutt has been a GFC assistant coach since Casey became head coach in 1988, but the connection goes back farther.

Northcutt, 33, and Casey played baseball together at Newberg High and both graduated in 1977. Northcutt was a first team all-league infielder. After taking first-team all-league honors at Clackamas Community, he rejoined Casey at the University of Portland.

Northcutt assisted at Newberg High for five years. He became GFC's pitching coach in 1991.

## Tim Casey

A younger brother of Pat, Tim joins the Bruin coaching ranks this season. Tim spent eight years playing for the Houston Astros, Oakland Athletics and Milwaukee Brewers organizations. The outfielder was drafted by the Brewers after playing 1982-84 at the University of Portland. His 32 career home runs for the Pilots puts him second in U of P records.



## Craig Taylor

Craig Taylor is in his fifth year as George Fox College Athletic Director, but he has been associated with the Bruins for 19 years as player, coach, and professor.

Taylor, 41, graduated from George Fox in 1974 after playing two seasons on the Bruin basketball and baseball teams. He received a master of science degree in education from Linfield College in 1975 and is in a doctoral degree program at Oregon State University.

The AD coached GFC's women's basketball teams from 1981 to 1993. From 1976 through 1979 Taylor was the Bruin baseball coach while also serving as assistant basketball coach.

Taylor is a member of the NAIA District 2's Executive Committee, serving since 1985. In 1992 he was named NAIA District 2 Male Athletic Administrator of the Year.

At George Fox, the athletic director is responsible for athletic department functions, including eligibility and compliance with GFC and NAIA regulations, budgeting, and department and sports center management.
