Lack of size puts GFC Lady Bruins on the run

What do you do when your basketball team graduates its entire front line and your tallest player is 5-10?

George Fox College women's basketball coach Craig Taylor has the answer: fast break.

Taylor will have his team running and gunning this year after losing his three tallest players from a year ago, including 6-3 center Tammy Lewis of Newberg. She leaves behind GFC records for career rebounding and blocked shots and finished second in career scoring.

While lack of height is a problem, Taylor will compensate with what he said is his quickest team in his nine years of coaching. Taylor said the Lady Bruins will play an aggressive, up-tempo game.

Running the show will be junior point guard Linda Funderhide of Newberg. A starter for the last two years, Funderhide finished last season just 13 assists away from the GFC career record. She led the team with 5.4 assists a game. Funderhide, in addition to being a sharp passer, also is strong on defense. She holds fourth place in the GFC career steals list.

Joining Funderhide in the backcourt is transfer Jennifer Childress from Wenatchee Valley Community College. A 5-7 junior from Bellingham, Wash., Childress was "one of the most consistent JC (junior college) guards in Washington last year," according to Taylor. She received from the Northwest Association of Community Colleges the outstanding female scholar athlete award for the state of Washington. A quick player, Childress is one of three team captains, along with Funderhide and center Tracy Nelson.

Playing out of her normal forward position, Nelson, from Glennallen, Alaska, will anchor the center spot and has the potential of becoming one of the best inside players in NAIA District 2, according to Taylor. "Unless she fouls out or passes out, she will play 40 minutes a night."

Starting at forward this year is junior Missy Eubanks, from Heppner. A deceptive player, Eubanks, at 5-8, is an excellent rebounder and inside player for her size. Taylor says she's as coachable a player as he's ever had. She returns following major knee surgery.

The Lady Bruins' leading returning scorer, with 10.8 a game, is junior small forward Heather Gurney. Playing off-guard at 5-8 last year, Gurney, from Lake Oswego, received district honorable mention. Taylor said she helps the team with a subtle positive

impact. "She has a quality to quietly influence the game," he said.

Junior forward Ann Marie Owsley is a possible starter in place of Gurney. A good offensive player who is working to improve her defense and rebounding, Owsley, from Boise, started at various times last year.

Adding to the depth at the first three spots — which Taylor believes are as strong as any in the district — is junior college transfer Ronnie Philpot. An outside shooter, Philpot, from Canby, brings intelligence and maturity to the off-guard spot, according to Taylor.

Two returning sophomores are Susan Seals and Karen Wright. Seals, from Castle Rock, Wash., has come to the Lady Bruins late, following volleyball competition. Taylor calls her a consistent, fundamentally sound player who will not make many mistakes. Wright is in the process of healing from a knee injury. A good physical inside player, Wright, from Oregon City, is predicted to be back in late January.

Four freshmen join the team, including a member of the Oregon AA state champion team. Guard Mary Purdy was named first-team All-State as she helped Silverton Union to the state title. "Mary is the best passer we have. She will chase Linda's (Funderhide) assist record," Taylor said. A relentless defender, Purdy is unselfish and would rather pass than shoot, according to Taylor.

The tallest player on this year's team is freshman Cathy Bartell at 5-10. A first-team All-League player at McKay in Salem, Bartell is adjusting to the more physical college game, Taylor said. He calls her a strong inside player who will soon be an impact player.

The other two freshmen are guards: Sid Miller, Crane, Ore., and Robin Snider, Medford. Both are good shooters adjusting to the college game, Taylor said.

Taylor expects to use an eight-man rotation, but probably will play certain personnel in up-tempo games. He expects balanced scoring, but said the team needs Nelson to score 15 or more per game.

Taylor picks Concordia of Portland and Western Oregon as the teams to beat in the district this year. He said, however, there is a great deal of parity in the district. "There aren't four or five teams that all you have to do is show up to win," he says.

The George Fox women play a 27-game schedule with 12 of those contests being at home.

Lady Bruins win home opener

George Fox College women's basketball coach Craig Taylor has been heard to say he wants his squad to "stay out of neutral."

In Wednesday's home opener the Lady Bruins followed their coach's command and put it into high gear, handing visiting Pacific University a 72-59 defeat.

George Fox revved up on the defensive end and had four consecutive steals, not allowing the Lady Boxers to get off a shot until 1:42 into the game. Pacific didn't get its first field goal until 2:23. "We set the tempo with defense," Taylor said later.

Sophomore center Tracy Nelson got the Lady Bruins out of the blocks with three field goals in the opening two minutes. When she was given two quick fouls, Taylor inserted freshman Cathy Bartell. Bartell, a 5-10 forward from Salem, scored her team's next eight points as the two squads traded two-point leads.

At the 9:11 mark, junior forward Heather Gurney hit a three-pointer to give GFC the lead for good. Junior guard Jennifer Childress then connected on three consecutive 10-foot jumpers to give the Lady Bruins a nine-point margin. By halftime George Fox was on top 42-31.

George Fox's offense was slow to restart in the second half. Taylor's team was outscored 10-5 in the first seven minutes as the Lady Boxers cut their deficit to six. Then George Fox got back into gear with junior forward Missy Eubanks, back from major knee surgery, hitting two straight shots from the left side on her way to team-high honors with 15 points, matched by Bartell.

George Fox's defense didn't allow the visitors another field goal for the next eight minutes as the Lady Bruins went up by 12, 56-44 with 7:50 to go. Pacific came no closer than nine the rest of the game. The final score was

GFC's largest lead.

Taylor praised both Gurney and Bartell. Gurney was three for three in field goals and two of two at the line as she produced 13 points. Bartell was the spark from the bench with a game-high 12 rebounds along with her 15 points.

Taylor noted that the inside defense by GFC was not strong and that Pacific's 6-0 freshman center Amy Johnson benefited. She came up with a game-high 23 points. "We have to keep other teams' offense out of sync — if they get inside, we're in trouble," Taylor said.

Taylor said the win, which puts the Lady Bruins at 1-1, gives the squad momentum going into this weekend's tournament games at Linfield where GFC meets Lewis & Clark in the opening game. Also competing is Oregon Tech.

GFC tops Linfield tourney

George Fox College beat Oregon Tech Saturday night in the championship game in Yamhill County to win the tournament.

Sound familiar? Repetitious?

Yes, but in this case it's the Lady Bruins who beat Oregon Tech's women's team to win the Linfield College Christmas Tourney, matching the Bruin men who topped Oregon Tech in winning George Fox's Willcuts-Twenge Memorial Classic.

And GFC Coach Craig Taylor's women's team took it to their opponents even more than the men. The Lady Bruins led by more than 30 points at times on their way to a 70-49 win that gave them the tourney crown.

The Lady Bruins reached the championship game with a 64-52 Friday night win over Lewis & Clark. The double-victory weekend leaves GFC women atop NALIA District 2 with a 3-0 standing and 14 power points in the ratings.

The championship game was a classic battle of height versus speed. Oregon Tech's roster boasts a 6-0 center and two 5-11 forwards. GFC's tallest player is a 5-10 freshman. In the end, though, it was the shorter, scrappier Lady Bruins who won the tourney title.

Oregon Tech coughed up 28 turnovers playing into the hands of the Lady Bruins' run-and-gun offense. Leading by 35 in the second half, Taylor played all his players. Up by 19 points at the half (38-19), Taylor left his starters in for just the first five minutes after the break.

Defense was the key to the game with George Fox out rebounded by six, 51-45.

George Fox had four in double figures, which included junior forward Missy Eubanks leading the team with 15 points, 7 rebounds and 4 steals. Junior transfer guard Jennifer Childress had 10 points and 7 assists. Taylor said his team was "fortunate" to be in the championship game after surviving the matchup

with Lewis & Clark. Even though his squad led from the 15-minute mark on, Taylor said he never felt the Lady Bruins had total control. They recorded 24 turnovers.

George Fox women were scheduled Monday night at Concordia. Friday they are at Warner Pacific and Saturday they host Northwest Nazarene in a 7:30 p.m. game.

Lady Bruins travel rocky road

George Fox College's women's basketball team has a bad habit. The Lady Bruins overcame their bad habit of playing only one half of good basketball in last week's wins over Linfield and Oregon Tech, but it finally caught up with them Friday as Lewis and Clark held off a late GFC rally to come up with a 75-63 win in Newberg.

In the last three games GFC coach Craig Taylor has seen his team wait until the second half to play inspired basketball. "It's not going to work out if we only play 20 minutes a night," said Taylor. "We're going to have to get back to playing 40 minutes a night." It's uncharacteristic of this team to be so unexcited, he said of his 9-4 Lady Bruins. "They're usually intense."

Taylor said the only word he can use to describe the Jan. 9 road victory over Linfield is "ugly." Down by seven at the half, the Lady Bruins rallied to win by the same margin, 60-53, behind freshman forward Cathy Bartell's 13 points. Junior forward Heather Gurney was seven for eight

at the free-throw line and junior forward Missy Eubanks pulled down nine rebounds to help the Lady Bruin cause.

Two nights later in Newberg the Lady Bruins had a slightly easier time, knocking off Oregon Tech for the third time this season, 90-69. The game was not a "real stellar performance," said Taylor but he was happy with the outcome.

GFC scored 45 in each half as Taylor made sure everybody got some minutes. Sophomore forward Karen Wright played for the first time this season after recovering from a knee injury. Junior forward Anne Marie Owsley led the Lady Bruins with 18 points while Eubanks grabbed 13 rebounds.

After nearly a decade of dominance, GFC lost to Lewis and Clark for the first time in Taylor's nine-year coaching career. What hurt just as bad, the 75-63 loss ruined the Lady Bruin preseason goal of being undefeated in Miller Gym.

As in the two previous games, the Lady Bruins started off slow, giving up leads of 8-4 and 10-6.

A ten footer from the right side by freshman guard Mary Purdy brought GFC to within two at the 13:14 mark. That deteriorated to a nine point deficit, 19-10, with 7:55 to go in the half. Gurney drove the lane, Bartell made an eight footer in the paint, and Purdy hit from 15 feet out to bring GFC within four, 20-16. When freshman guard Robin Snider hit from the right perimeter with 2:23 left, the game was knotted at 24. At half, GFC was down by two, 29-27.

In the second half the Lady Bruins jumped to a three-point lead, which they relinquished and regained four times. Eight minutes into the second half Lewis & Clark ran off six straight points to take the lead for good. Eubanks' three-point play with 8:30 left would tie the game, but Lewis & Clark then went on a 14-4 tear to rip the game open. A Gurney layup brought the Lady Bruins to within five with 1:15 to go, but Lewis & Clark scored the last seven to make the final score their largest lead of the night.

LADY BRUINS RUN RECORD TO 11-3 IN DISTRICT

When you come to a George Fox College women's basketball game you're almost assured of seeing a good 20 minutes of Lady Bruin play.

The question is which half it's going to be. And it's the same question being asked by Lady Bruin coach Craig Taylor.

With two wins and a non-counting loss in the week, his team now stands at 11-3 in NAIA District 2, in second place with 3.21 power points, behind Pacific University. Overall the Lady Bruins are 11-5.

The unpredictable GFC squad played well in the first half in a 91-64 loss to Sheldon Jackson, turned a seven-point halftime deficit into a 9 point, 62-53, win over Warner Pacific, then let an 18-point halftime lead dwindle to just 5 in a 70-61 victory over Willamette University. All games were in GFC's Miller Gymnasium.

Taylor says his team's come-from-behind win over Warner Pacific on Tuesday (Jan. 16) was a "typical" game for this year's Lady Bruins. Behind 35-29 at the break, the Newberg team continued its trend of saving the best effort for last, holding the Lady Knights to just 17 points in the second half. The Lady Bruins, meantime, went to work to push through 33 points.

The Lady Knights, who lost to GFC by 35 earlier in the season, came in with three new players eligible at the second semester, including a 6-2 center. Taylor said the key to the game, however, was not stopping Warner's big people, but instead, the smallest Knight, 5-4 Wendy Butler. She had 14 points in the first half, but just one in the second.

The Lady Bruins led only once in the first half, 11-10. WPC led by as many as 11 before the half. GFC cut the deficit to three, but then fell behind by nine with 13:07 remaining. Newberg junior guard Linda Funderhide hit an 18-footer to start a 9-0 run that tied the score at 24 with 9:40 left. The teams then traded baskets until GFC's top scorer, junior guard Jennifer Childress, knocked down a 13-foot jumper with 7:03. It sparked a 14-2 run by GFC that put the Knights away. Childress finished with 14 points.

Center Cathy Bartell led the Lady Bruins with 12 rebounds as GFC edged Warner on the boards 43-41.

"The virus has moved to the second half," Taylor mused after the Saturday (Jan. 20) game with Willamette. George Fox took a commanding 18-point halftime lead at 43-25, then let it fall to 5 three times in the second half. The last time, at 4:16, George Fox was on top 59-54.

The Lady Bruins had to overcome a nearly 6 1/2 minute drought to start the half. They went scoreless until 13:39 when forward Ann Marie Owsley hit the second of a pair of free throw attempts to make the score 44-38 for GFC. The first second-half basket came at 13:13 on a layup by forward Heather Gurney.

Gurney sparked GFC with nine first-half points and finished with a game-high 16. Funderhide led the Lady Bruins with eight assists and nine rebounds, one more grab than junior forward Missy Eubanks. George Fox hit 48 percent of its first half shots, and 33 percent the second (9 of 27) for a 41 percent night.

In the non-district matchup with Sheldon Jackson of Sitka, Alaska, on Jan. 15, the Lady Bruins were the odd team. Not one GFC player shot better than 50 percent for the night. No Seal shot less than 60 percent.

"Just one of those nights, said Taylor. "Anytime you give up more than 90 points and shoot 25 percent you know that combination isn't going to work." George Fox women shot 17 percent in the second half -- 9 of 53. The first half it was 10 of 23, 43 percent. Still the Lady Bruins stayed close for most of that half, rallying from a six-point deficit to take a four point, 20-16, lead after 10 minutes of play.

Sheldon Jackson's 8 point, 44-36, lead at the half was as close as GFC would come in the second. The Seals' Junell Larson burnt GFC for 27 points, hitting 9 of 15 field goals.

George Fox was led by the 15 points of sophomore forward Tracy Nelson. She was also the game's rebound leader with 12 as GFC won on the boards, 46-38.

Tuesday, January 23, the Lady Bruins were to host Columbia Christian. Friday (January 27) George Fox is at Northwest Nazarene in Nampa, Idaho. The next night the Lady Bruins face Eastern Oregon State in La Grande.

NNC women win: Sarah Schroeder scored a season- and team-high 24 points to lead the Northwest Nazarene women's basketball team to a 64-53 victory over George Fox at Nampa.

It was the sixth straight home-court victory for NNC and its eighth win in nine games. The Crusaders are 10-9 overall (7-1 at home) and 8-3 in District 2 play.

George Fox, which defeated NNC 75-72 in December, is 12-6 overall.

George Fox was led by Tracy

Nelson's 15 points and 10 points from former Borah High standout Ann Marie Owsley.

Lady Boxers display Olmsted touch

Concordia took turns winning the district title the next three years. With Olmsted now in his third season as Pacific head coach, the Lady Boxers have moved into the driver's seat. They are averaging 77.4 points per game and have been beating opponents by an average of 18.1 points. It has not been a team of outstanding players or even one dominate individual, however.

Amy Johnson, a 6-foot freshman center from The Dalles, has overcome an injury and the last three weeks is playing a dominant role as a shot-blocker with six per game. "We're young, small and slow," Olmsted said. "But together, we're a good team."

It was the youth and inexperience that contributed to their only loss — a 72-59 trouncing by George Fox last November in the second game of the season.

George Fox, second behind Pacific's 13-1 district record at 12-7,

smothered the Lady Boxers right from the start. "They got all over us all over the court, and we got kicked," Olmsted said. It was a rude awakening for his seven freshmen "who didn't even know what the inside of a college gym looked like yet," he said.

Western Oregon is 10-5 in district games, while Northwest Nazarene is 8-3, Eastern Oregon 7-4 and Concordia 9-5 in the race for eight playoff berths.

Western Oregon, which used to play second fiddle to Olmsted's University of Portland powerhouses before winning the district in 1987, is one of the teams to watch, however. Liz Gullick, Eastern Oregon's senior center, leads the district scoring with a 21.2 average, but Jeannie Watkins, a Columbia Christian sophomore, scored 31 points in one game last week and is averaging 20.0 per game even though the Lady Clippers are only 1-16.

It looks more and more like the year of the Lady Boxers in NAIA District 2 women's basketball. That may not be altogether surprising, however, since they are coached by Dave Olmsted.

Pacific University, off to a strong 15-1 start, last weekend stretched its school-record winning streak to 14 games and appears to be the team to beat with four weekends remaining in the race to the playoffs.

When the district was first formed for women's basketball in 1983, Olmsted was the coach at University of Portland, then an NAIA school. And Olmsted's Pilots dominated, winning four consecutive District 2 championships and advancing to the national NAIA tournament three times.

When UP left the NAIA ranks, Western Oregon, Warner Pacific and

GEORGE FOX WOMEN WIN AT HOME, DROP TWO ON ROAD FOR 12-5 RECORD

George Fox College's basketball women are finding they like their own gym and the Willamette Valley better than life on the road.

The Lady Bruins, 11-3 going into the week, won at home, beating Columbia Christian 82-67, then made the long journey to southern Idaho and eastern Oregon, dropping a pair to fall to 12-5 in counting district play. Overall the Lady Bruins are 12-7.

In their first back-to-back losses, the GFC women fell 64-53 to Northwest Nazarene Friday (Jan. 26) in Nampa, then 70-55 to Eastern Oregon the next night in LaGrande.

With Columbia Christian, the Lady Bruins led from the get-go. It took just 23 seconds for junior forward Ann Marie Owsley to find the basket off a fastbreak assist from junior guard Linda Funderhide.

Two minutes later Owsley returned the favor, passing to Funderhide for two in the key to break the game's only tie. It started a 12-2 tear that put GFC on top 14-4 at 14:37. A minute later all five starters were gone and the reserves came in to build a 32-16 lead with 7:54 to go in the half. Sophomore reserve Karen Wright had four blocks during the first half. Columbia Christian then outran GFC 21-11 to bring the halftime score to 43-37 for GFC.

The Lady Bruins' starters returned for the second half. Seven minutes into the half GFC was still up by six, 53-47. Then freshman forward/center Cathy Bartell and the rest of her teammates turned up the defense and the fastbreak.

Bartell scored GFC's next six points to begin a 16-2 streak that put away the Clippers. Bartell benefited from the fastbreak, finishing with a game-high 22 points and 13 rebounds. George Fox's 20-point lead dwindled to 13 in the last minute, but freshman Robin Snider rebounded a GFC miss and scored with one second left to give George Fox its 15-point margin.

With Northwest Nazarene the Lady Bruins lost a three-point, 24-21, halftime lead in front of a crowd reported at 1,000. GFC lost the game by not capitalizing on fastbreak opportunities, according to Bartell.

George Fox hit at a .343 pace from the floor, to .412 by the Lady Crusaders, who owned the boards 55-34.

The officiating also might have been a factor, according to GFC Coach Craig Taylor. "We didn't get to the line as often as we'd have liked," he said, adding that he didn't like that in Idaho the officials put the ball up for inbounding at the baseline after a jump ball. "That give the advantage to taller teams and in a game that adds up to three or more inside scoring opportunities," he said. In the Willamette Valley, he noted, the ball comes in on the side "the way it's supposed to." In the game George Fox was called for 19 fouls, NNC 10. Sophomore forward Tracy Nelson led GFC with 15 points and 9 rebounds.

At Eastern Oregon, the Lady Bruins were "ready to go home, mentally and physically," Bartell reported. It also didn't help that GFC and Eastern have similar post players. Normally the quick GFC front line can out-hustle the opposing big people for easy fastbreak baskets. With Eastern, the Lady Bruins were against equally quick players and GFC's speed advantage was negated.

Eastern's full-court press also confused the Lady Bruins, forcing 29 turnovers. George Fox, shooting .382 for the night, trailed 31-24 at the half. Eastern Oregon hit .435 of its field goal tries. The Lady Bruins were out rebounded 51-31, with GFC junior forward Heather Gurney grabbing 7. George Fox was whistled for 27 fouls. Eastern picked up 18.

Following a 5:30 p.m. game Tuesday (Jan. 30) at Western Oregon, the Lady Bruins stage a rematch with Eastern Oregon Thursday (Feb. 1) at 7:30 in Miller Gym. Saturday (Feb. 6), the George Fox women are at Columbia Christian for a rematch, starting at 7:30 p.m.

GFC raises record to 13-6 in district

Homecourt advantage is always a good cure for most basketball teams' woes. The GFC women proved it heals their ails, winning at home Thursday over Eastern Oregon State College, 71-60, only five days after losing by 15 to the same team in LaGrande. The win broke a three game losing streak, all of which came on the road.

Against Eastern, junior guard Jennifer Childress put the Lady Bruins on the board first after driving the lane for two points. the Mountaineers' senior Liz Gulick, who leads the district with a 21.5 scoring average, responded with six straight points before GFC scored again nearly four minutes into the game. Gulick had 12 of Eastern's first 16 points. After she missed her first shot at 8:47, GFC tied the game at 16 on a Childress breakaway layup.

Eastern kept the score tight for the rest of the half. With no time left in the first half, the Lady Bruins broke the seventh and final tie on an inbound play to junior forward Heather Gurney. Gurney cut to the basket and threw up a shot. The ball rolled around the cylinder and then dropped through as the horn sounded, giving GFC a 29-27 advantage.

The Lady Bruins served notice to Eastern within the second half's first 30 seconds as junior guard Linda Funderhide stole the ball and fed Childress for another fastbreak layup. For most of the second half, GFC used what Coach Craig Taylor calls his "Buzz" defense, a trapping 2-3 zone defense.

The Lady Bruins' trademark intense defensive pressure forced 14 second half turnovers, including 12 GFC

steals, but it was junior forward Missy Eubanks who stole into the record book with her solitary steal of the night three minutes into the second half.

Eubanks, who returns this year after major knee surgery, tied the GFC single season steal record of 69 held by Gurney. GFC finished with 19 steals for the night.

The Lady Bruins forged a six point lead five times, but the Mounties would not let them get any farther ahead. Then sophomore center/forward Tracy Nelson popped a shot from the top of the key to make the score 54-46 with 7:52 left in the game.

After an Eastern player hit a three pointer, the GFC women turned up the heat, allowing only one field goal in the next five and a half minutes. GFC took its biggest lead of the game at 1:48 when Childress made an unassisted steal and layup for a 69-56 advantage.

Childress and Funderhide both hit the front end of one and ones for the Lady Bruins' final two points. Childress finished the game with 16 points and Funderhide had nine assists. Both played the entire game.

Against Western Oregon, Taylor was happy with his team's intensity level, but said that Western is the hottest team in the district. Also, in the last two minutes, the Lady Bruins made only one basket in six possessions. Taylor felt it was an accomplishment for the Lady Bruins to be in the game at the end.

"Western took us out of our offense" he said, noting that his team only shot 29 percent for the game. Tracy Nelson led the Lady Bruins with 21 points and eight rebounds.

GFC women wallop 'Cats

George Fox College's Lady Bruins lost some ground in their NAIA District 2 playoff race, but still remain in the district's top four after splitting two contests in a week.

The Lady Bruins with a 71-50 win over visiting Linfield on Feb. 13 and a 75-57 loss at Lewis and Clark the next night own a 16-9 season record or 16-7 record in the district. George Fox women now face contenders for playoff hosting positions in the next week.

On Tuesday, GFC traveled to district-leading Pacific in a game played after the Graphic deadline. Friday, George Fox hosts third place Western Oregon, which began the week at 17-6. In Monmouth earlier this year, the Lady Bruins fell by five. Saturday George Fox hosts Concordia, the district's sixth place team, with a 13-9 district record entering the week.

In the Linfield game, Lady Bruin coach Craig Taylor got to play everyone in an easy victory. The Lady Wildcats started the year with eight players, but because of injuries just five suited up for the GFC contest.

George Fox jumped out to a 20-5 lead when Linfield did not score a field goal for the first eight minutes. GFC had a 9-1 lead in the opening 3 1/2 minutes. It had an 18-3 margin at 13:03 when junior guard Ronnie Philpot knocked in a shot from just inside the three-point line. When she popped a similar shot at 7:45, George Fox moved ahead by 22 as it led 32-10, the largest margin of the first half.

Taylor substituted his bench and in the final stretch to the break, Linfield outscored the Lady Bruins 15-2 to

come within 9. The score was 34-25.

After the break, junior forward Ann Marie Owsley scored twice underneath in the opening 45 seconds to push GFC's lead back to 13. But with 14:35 left, the Lady Wildcats were within striking distance with a score of 42-35. George Fox then buried Wildcat hopes with a 13-3 run that led to a 17-point GFC margin and with 9:26 remaining they led 55-38.

The margin increased to 25 at 5:08 when Owsley hit a pair of free throws to push GFC to a 66-41 lead.

Linfield's two field goals in the final 90 seconds equaled what they had in the previous 10 minutes. Junior forward Heather Gurney led George Fox with 15 points, followed by junior forward Missy Eubanks with 13. Eubanks also grabbed eight rebounds as the Lady Bruins controlled the boards 47 to 39.

Erratic play doomed the Lady Bruins at Lewis and Clark, said Taylor. The final score was the largest margin of the game. George Fox trailed 33-29 at the half, and with eight minutes left in the game came

within two points of the Lady Pioneers. Taylor said George Fox could not score consistently while Lewis and Clark finished off at the free throw line.

The Lady Bruins focused their attention on Lewis and Clark's Kristin Rademacher, who scored 26 points against GFC Jan. 12 in the Lady Bruins' only home loss of the season. This time Taylor's team held her to 12. But her teammate, senior Kathy Copple, more than compensated with 32 points on an 11 for 17 night from the field. She also was perfect at the line, hitting all 10 tries.

"This time the dam broke at another spot," said Taylor, noting that GFC junior guard Jennifer Childress, one of the best defensive guards in the district, fouled out attempting to defend Copple.

Lady Bruin forward Cathy Bartell, a freshman, netted 13 points to lead George Fox and junior guard Linda Funderhide contributed 11. Sophomore center Tracy Nelson led all players with 11 rebounds but GFC was edged 40-37 in rebounds.

Lady Bruins win two road contests

Two wins, both on the road and both by more than 15 points, have pushed George Fox College's Lady Bruins to a 15-8 season, 15-6 in NAIA District 2 play. The Lady Bruins rolled by Columbia Christian 95-79 Tuesday, Feb. 6, in Portland and swept Western Baptist 70-49 Saturday night in Salem. The game with Western Baptist was one of the Lady Bruins' best of the season, according to coach Craig Taylor. George Fox jumped to a 6-0 lead after three steals and a Warrior travel. When Lady Bruin center/forward Tracy Nelson fed forward Missy Eubanks for a fastbreak basket at 13:40 GFC had a 16-6 lead. That margin hovered around ten until 8:05 when reserve forward Heather Gurney grabbed a rebound and went the length of the court, driving the key for a layup and a 13-point advantage at 24-11. 41-foot shot drops; WOSC edges GFC

George Fox College's womens basketball team lost three games in five days last week to drop out of a hosting position in the NAIA District 2 playoffs.

After losses to Pacific, Western Oregon State College and Concordia, the Lady Bruins — with a 16-10 district record — fell out of fourth place with 2.69 "power rating" points tallied by the district. One shot looms enormous in keeping George Fox from a homecourt advantage in the playoffs.

With no time remaining in Friday's contest, Western's 5-6 junior guard Joanne Steffey heaved a 41-footer that banked off the glass and fell through to tie the score at 71-all. That shot enabled the Lady Wolves to reverse the game's momentum and pin the overtime loss on the Lady Bruins.

After the game, GFC coach Craig Taylor watched the game tape and walked out the distance the shot had sailed. Until Steffey let fly, no Lady Wolf had attempted a three-pointer in the game.

George Fox trailed by as many as nine points in the first half, and was down 38-32 at the half. Eight minutes into the second half, GFC took a one-point lead on forward Tracy Nelson's basket from underneath.

George Fox led from 11:42 until the end of regulation. The Lady Bruins were ahead by five points at 3:36, and with a minute left in regulation they were up by four, 67-63.

With 57 seconds remaining, WOSC's Lisa Sherwood hit the second of two free throws and GFC in-bounded. Steffey collected a steal, and with 25 seconds remaining, Western scored to get within a point. GFC's junior guard Linda Funderhide drove the ball upcourt and was fouled with 18 seconds left. She pushed GFC's lead back to three, 69-66, with her two free throws.

WOSC scored inside, giving the ball back to GFC with seven seconds remaining and the Bruins ahead by one point. The inbounds pass went to GFC junior forward Ann Marie Owsley, and she was fouled with four seconds left. She, too, knocked down both foul shots and George Fox's lead was back to three points.

Steffey then put in her "Hail

Mary" and the game went into overtime. GFC was outscored 19-9 in the extra period as WOSC jumped to a quick five-point lead and never trailed.

Against Pacific, George Fox played the regular-season's champions tough on their own court. Pacific led by as much as 10 points in the opening half, and held a 32-28 edge at intermission.

GFC then took over, and had a four-point lead with 8:30 remaining. The Lady Boxers then came back and George Fox could not capitalize on scoring opportunities in the final 90 seconds. With three seconds left, GFC missed a desperation shot that could have tied the game. Eubanks led the Lady Bruins in the loss with 13 points and eight rebounds.

In their final regular-season game of the year, George Fox was overpowered by Concordia, which has a roster with five players 5-11 or taller. GFC's tallest player is 5-10.

The visitors owned the area underneath the basket, hitting 18 shots from five feet or closer. The Lady Bruins, meanwhile, got seven goals from the same area.

After six lead changes, Concordia took the lead at 15:57 and never relinquished it. At the half, Concordia was on top 37-32, and it then used a 10-4 run in the next nine minutes to build the lead to 11 points.

George Fox threatened when Eubanks hit a put-back shot at 2:24 that got the Bruins within three points at 59-56 after a 12-2 GFC run.

Taylor's team, however, did not score after that, and Concordia hit four of six free throw attempts to seal the victory.

Eubanks again led GFC with 18 points and nine rebounds. She was backed in both categories by sophomore forward Tracy Nelson, who added 10 points and eight caroms. George Fox was edged on the boards 49-46.

George Fox College women's basketball coach Craig Taylor says that if someone had asked him at the beginning of the season if his team could be competitive in NAIA District 2 without a center, he would have told them he didn't think so.

But his Lady Bruins produced 16 wins and reached the district's playoffs. The Newberg team ended its season Feb. 27 with a 74-52 playoff loss at Lewis & Clark after the Lady Bruins missed a hosting opportunity by a single game.

The George Fox women used a 5-9 forward to fill up the middle against opponents three to four inches taller. Then, using a quick, tenacious defense and fast-breaking offense, the Lady Bruins ran their record to 16-13 overall, 16-~~11~~ in district play to finish fifth.

GFC's fill-in center, Tracy Nelson, a sophomore from Glennallen, Alaska, played her way to All-District honors. She was joined by junior guard Jennifer Childress, Bellingham, Wash., who received honorable mention.

Taylor says the highlight of the year has been the way his team fit together. He said his senior-less squad was "an unselfish, fun group to coach."

Taylor said he told his team to not evaluate the whole year on the last two weeks, when the Lady Bruins dropped five straight to lose a playoff hosting role. Of those games, Taylor says he believes GFC could have won two or three. In the season finale, however, Taylor said the Lady Bruins were just beaten.

After a see-saw first half that ended with GFC on top 28-26, the game turned into a romp by the host Lady Pioneers. They scored twice as often as the Lady Bruins. "The halves were night and day," Taylor said. He said he could not find any defensive or offensive combinations that would work to alter the game's direction. Junior forward Ann Marie Owsley led GFC with 12 points.

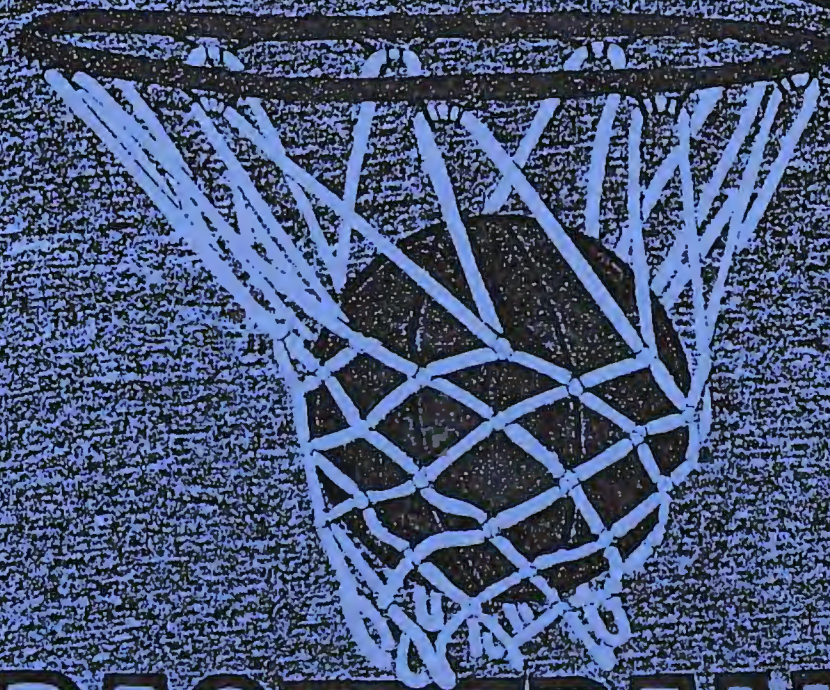
