## MOBILE'S VASSILEV NAMED TOURNAMENT MVP

SAN ANTONIO, Texas - Dentscho Vassilev of the University of Mobile was elected Most Valuable Player in the 35th Annual Sprint-NAIA Men's National Soccer Championship here Saturday.

Two Lynn players were honored by the ISAA - Darren Read as the Outstanding Defensive Player and Neathan Gibson as the Outstanding Offensive Player.

Sangamon State defeated Lynn, 4-3, in sudden death overtime to win its third national title.

Lynn placed four players on the All-Tournament team while Sangamon State and Belhaven had three each.

Lynn players on the all-tournament team are Darren Read, back; Richard Hasse, midfielder; and Neathan Gibson and Jacob Lorentzon, forwards. Sangamon's representatives are Jose Corona and Pat Mann, backs; and Sel Eren, forward. Belhaven had Alfredo Estrada, goalkeeper; Sheldon Bennett, midfielder; and Craig Demmin, back.

Other all-tournament players are Rob Harradine, midfielder, and Vassilev, forward, both of Mobile; and Benny Bayr, midfielder, of Westmont.

Bloomfield College of New Jersey was awarded the Dahlquest Award for outstanding sportsmanship during the tournament. It was the Deacons' first trip to nationals which are coached by Ralph Dougan.

## SANGAMON STATE UPENDS LYNN, 4-3 FOR TITLE

SAN ANTONIO, Texas - Sangamon State's John Lochbaum scored a goal on a loose ball in sudden death overtime to post a 4-3 victory over Lynn University to win the 35th Annual Sprint-NAIA Men's National Soccer Championship here Saturday.

It is the third national title for the Prairie Stars, who were seeded sixth in the tournament and return to Illinois with an 18-4-1 record. The loss was Lynn's only blemish on an otherwise perfect season. The Knights return to Florida with a 23-1 record and their second straight runnerup trophy. The Knights gave up as many goals in their last two games as they did in the 20 games prior to the national tournament. They entered with a 20-0 record and a 115-5 goal advantage.

The Prairie Stars had a tough route to the finals, beating John Brown 2-1 in a mini-game following a 0-0 tie Wednesday. They defeated Belhaven, the defending champions, 2-1, in Friday's semifinals while Lynn stopped Mobile, 3-1.

"We knew we were going against the best team in the NAIA," said Sangamon State Coach Aydin Gonulsen. "We had big weapons going into the game - faith, determination, desire and enthusiasm. The only thing that got us through was all of that. One for all and all for one."

Sangamon took an early 1-0 lead on a goal by Sel Eren at the 24:05 mark. Lynn didn't get on the board until the 78:49 mark on Richard Hasse's goal. Lynn took the lead five minutes later on another Hasse goal. Sangamon tied it less than a minute later on Eren's second goal and the two teams went into overtime.

Lynn opened the scoring in the first 15-minute overtime on Hasse's third goal - this one a header. Sangamon tied it with a minute left in the second overtime on Pat Mann's shot and the game was into sudden death overtime.

Lynn dominated the shots on goal for the entire game (24-11) and the overtime (9-5). Sangamon struck quickly in the second sudden death overtime as Lochbaum scored 23 seconds into the period on a loose ball.

## McSORLEY LIFTS BLOOMFIELD OVER GEORGE FOX

SAN ANTONIO, Texas - Bloomfield College's Anthony McSorley scored two goals, the last coming with less than two minutes to play to carry the Deacons to a 2-1 victory over George Fox University in the 35th Annual Sprint-NAIA Men's National Soccer Championship here Tuesday.

McSorley scored on a penalty kick at the 88:38 mark to break a tie. McSorley tied the game on a cross at 16:55 with the assist from Joseph Montesinos.

George Fox struck first and quickly with Greg Pflieger scoring just 36 seconds into the game. He dribbled and shot from midfield.

The 17-4 Deacons from Bloomfield, New Jersey will play top-seed and undefeated Lynn University (21-0) at noon Wednesday. The winner advances to Friday's semifinals at noon. A tie would send Lynn to the semifinals.

The George Fox Bruins return to Newberg, Oregon with an 18-5 record.

TOP-SEED LYNN WHIPS GEORGE FOX, 8-1

SAN ANTONIO, Texas - Lynn University's Neathan Gibson scored a hat trick and the Knights from Florida showed why they are the No. 1 seed with an 8-1 victory over George Fox University in the first game of the 35th Annual Sprint-NAIA Men's National Soccer Championship here Monday.

Gibson scored two goals in the first 18 minutes. His third goal was a cross which gave the Knights a 4-0 halftime lead.

Lynn outshot the Bruins, 26-4.

George Fox (18-4-0) scored its only goal on a Trevor Smith header at the 49:24 mark. It was only Lynn's sixth goal allowed in a 21-0-0 season. The Knights have scored 123 goals this season.

George Fox of Oregon plays Bloomfield NJ (16-4-0) at noon Tuesday, Nov. 23. Lynn plays Bloomfield at noon Wednesday.

**GAMES RESET:** Due to the fact that Lynn's new on-campus facility, the de Hoernle Center, is not yet ready, the Knights are moving some of their home basketball games. Seven home games-two men's and five women's games-will be moved. The teams should be in the facility by December 20th, in time for the women's game against Michigan-Dearborn December 28th.

**BASKETBALL TEAMS OPEN:** The men's and women's basketball teams will begin regular season play. The women visit Tampa's Martinez Sports Center Friday night, while the men are at Florida Tech's Hedgecock Gymnasium next Monday.

**WOMEN READY TO GO:** "I like what I see in practice," said Head Coach Dan Olson. "I see sparks of real greatness. We can put the ball in the hole, but we have to play team defense and rebound well. We do not want to start off with a lackluster performance. We're deep at the guard position and we're talented inside. Our players are tired of looking at each other. The desire to compete is really there."

**THE SPARTANS:** Tampa was 14-12 last season under Head Coach Tom Mosca, and the Spartans hope to take a shot at the Sunshine State Conference title this year (they were 6-6 and finished third last season). Guard Tori Lindbeck and forward Crystal Ashley, the top two scorers last year, are back. Lindbeck averaged 15.8 points, shooting 41.3 per cent from three-point range. Ashley averaged 15.2 points and 9.8 rebounds. Starting center Karen Verwoord, 9.7 points and 5.3 rebounds, also returns.

**OLSON ON THE GAME:** "Tom (Mosca) has some good players who can make a contribution," said Olson. "I'm concerned about Crystal Ashley and Karen Verwoord, their inside players. They have good size and will be able to match up with us. They also have a quality backcourt player in Tori Lindbeck. We'll have to play good defense."

**PRICE ON THE KNIGHTS:** "After Friday's game (107-91 exhibition game victory against the Bahamian All-Stars), I'm confident about our ability to score points," said Head Coach Jeff Price. "We have to guard people better and not gamble so much defensively. I feel comfortable with our first seven or eight players now, and my goal was to be able to go nine deep."

**THE PANTHERS:** Florida Tech went 10-16 last season under Andy Russo, who is in his third year with the Panthers after leading Washington to NCAA and National Invitational Tournament appearances during his tenure with the Huskies. F.I.T. returns 6-0 guard Peter Walcott and 6-5 forward David Johnson.

**PRICE ON THE FIT GAME:** "The game is special to me," said Price. "It's not only my first game as a head coach, but we're going against a guy I worked under for four years. Florida Tech plays in an awfully good league, and they have one of the best rebounders in the Sunshine State Conference in David Johnson. He'll be one of the people we have to keep off the boards. Andy's teams always play hard, and we'll have to get started right from the jump. We have to come out right away and play hard. We can't afford to get down on the road."

## Men's Soccer Wins District, Area Titles

The George Fox men's soccer team shed the runner-up role that's haunted it since 1988 and, in its most successful season ever, advanced to its first-ever NAIA national tournament.

Five of the past six years, George Fox has proved itself one of the top two small-college teams in Oregon and Idaho and played in the NAIA District 2 championship game. Twice the Bruins went to overtime, and once GFC was later awarded a forfeit win, but not until 1993 did George Fox take the title on the field.

"We have established ourselves as one of the top NAIA teams in the Northwest—period," said head coach Manfred Tschan, 1993 District 2 and Area 1 Coach of the Year. GFC, with no senior starters and a completely reorganized defense, finished the season 18-5.

After knocking off seventh-ranked Concordia College 2-1 for the district title, GFC needed overtime to get by Simon Fraser University 2-0 for its first-ever NAIA Area 1 championship.

From there, GFC went as the Northwest's representative to the 12-team national tournament. The Bruins received the worst possible seed and ran into the NAIA's No. 1 ranked team—undefeated Lynn University of Florida—in the first game. On a controversial referee call, GFC's all-star goalie, Jeff Nelson of Medford, Ore., was ejected for an illegal handball outside the box, and the Bruins played a man short for three-fourths of the game. The shorthanded Bruins became just the sixth team to score on Lynn, but fell 8-1. In the second game of pool play, Bloomfield College in New Jersey slipped by George Fox 2-1 on a penalty kick in the final two minutes.

Defense carried the Bruins in a record-breaking regular season. It cost Tschan, who promised to buy his team steak dinners if they broke the school record of 10 shutouts in a season. The Bruins outdid themselves, holding their opponents scoreless 15 times and allowing a record-low 12 regular season goals.

The young George Fox squad opened the season with an unexpected seven-game winning streak over NAIA opponents from Washington and California and appeared in the NAIA top-20 rankings. After a three-game skid, GFC rode an 11-game win streak into the national playoffs. During the second streak, the Bruins outscored their opponents 27-2, both goals coming on penalty kicks.

## Bruin Trio Honored

For the second straight year, three men's soccer players were honored as NAIA All-Americans.

Goalkeeper Jeff Nelson (Jr., Medford, Ore.), who earned honorable mention in 1992, made the All-American third team—the highest honor ever awarded to a GFC soccer player.

He finished the season with a GFC record 14 shutouts and posted a .714 goals-against average.

Forward Greg Pfeiffer (Jr., Battle Ground, Wash.), NAIA District 2's Player of the Year, received honorable mention for the second straight year. Pfeiffer, with 22 goals and four assists, led the district in scoring for the third straight year.

Sweeper Jai Cook (Jr., Eugene, Ore.) earned honorable mention, his first national award. Cook anchored the GFC defense that set a school record with 15 shutouts. The Bruins allowed 23 goals in 23 games.

## Two GFC Men's Soccer Individuals Listed Among Nation's Statistical Leaders

The George Fox College men's soccer team, which made its first appearance in the NAIA national tournament this season, is showing up in the NAIA's final statistics.

Two Bruin individuals and the GFC defense ranked near the top in final statistics for the NAIA's 210 soccer playing institutions.

1993 NAIA third team All-American goalkeeper Jeff Nelson (Jr., Medford, Ore.) finished with the fourth-lowest goals-allowed-per-game average. He played in 21 games and allowed 15 goals, an average of .71 a game. With 14 shutouts, Nelson tied Joe Schafer of Lynn University, Fla., for most in the nation. When No. 1 ranked Lynn and GFC met at the national tournament, GFC kept Schafer from another shutout by becoming just the sixth team at the time to score on the Knights.

The GFC defense gave up 23 goals in 23 games. Their 1.0 goals-allowed-per-game average tied the Bruins with Belhaven College, Miss., for eighth lowest in the nation.

For the seventh straight year, a George Fox College forward leads West Coast NAIA soccer players in scoring. For the third straight year, 1992 and 1993 NAIA honorable mention All-American forward Greg Pflieger (Jr., Battle Ground, Wash.) leads in goals-scored-per-game. He scored 22 goals in 23 games, an average of .96 a game. His 22 goals is 10th highest in the nation and his average is 16th best. No NAIA player west of Kansas scored more goals.

Pflieger scored 21 goals during the 1992 season, ranking him 11th in the NAIA. In 1991, his 22 goals was eighth highest in the NAIA.

Having one of the nation's top goal-scorers is nothing new at George Fox. 1990 grad Dan LaVeine scored 130 goals in four years, a national collegiate record. His 43 goals in 1990 led the NAIA. The Tigard High School grad topped the nation in 1989 as well, with 30. His lowest total was 23 as a sophomore, ranking him sixth in 1988. As a freshman in 1987, LaVeine finished fourth with 34.

### **George Fox (18-3) Claims First-Ever NAIA Area 1 Championship With 11th Straight Win**

Newberg--The George Fox College men's soccer team advances to the NAIA National Men's Soccer Tournament with a 2-0 overtime win over Simon Fraser University.

"If anyone doesn't believe in God, they haven't seen us play soccer," said a relieved Manfred Tschan, GFC's fifth-year head coach.

The District 2 champion Bruins (18-3) topped SFU (12-7-1), the District 1 champions, with **Chris Cook's (Fr., Medford, Ore.)** first collegiate goal at the 101 minute mark.

"I was open in the center of the box and I knew I'd only have one shot," said Cook, who saw limited action off the bench this season. "Something like this never crossed my mind. Ever."

GFC won its first-ever Area championship before an estimated crowd of 800.

Defense again carried the Bruins. Goalkeeper **Jeff Nelson (Jr., Medford, Ore.)** made five saves and recorded his 14th shutout of the year. Nelson has allowed two goals in the last 11 games -- both on penalty kicks. The last team to score a non-penalty kick goal on Nelson was 15th ranked The Master's College on Oct. 6.

In 21 games, GFC's stingy defense has allowed 13 goals and totaled 15 shutouts.

**Greg Pflieger (Jr., Battle Ground, Wash.)**, District 2's leading scorer, added GFC's second goal at 109 minutes, finishing a crossing pass from **Phil Nelson (So., Idaho Falls, Idaho)**. The play developed from a acrobatic sliding kick from **George Warta (Fr., Brush Prairie, Wash.)** that saved the ball from going out of bounds at midfield. Pflieger, 1993 District 2 Player of the Year, has 21 goals in 21 games.

The Bruins outshot the Clansmen 18-15, but survived two SFU shots that rebounded off the cross bar. "It was a very well-played game," said Tschan. "Simon Fraser played a great game."

GFC had a first-half goal disallowed by the referee after **Ryan Hendricks (Fr., West Linn, Ore.)** dislodged the ball from the SFU goalie.

George Fox, unranked in the final NAIA poll, has won 11 straight -- two short of its 1990 record of 13 wins in a row.

The Bruins advance to the NAIA national tournament, Nov. 23-27 in San Antonio, Texas.

The George Fox College men's soccer team lost its all-star goalie and played a man short for three-fourths of an NAIA national tournament loss to the NAIA's No. 1 ranked team.

The shorthanded Bruins became just the sixth team to score on undefeated Lynn University this season, but the No. 1 ranked Knights ran over GFC 8-1 in the first game of the NAIA National Men's Soccer Tournament on Monday (Nov. 22) in San Antonio.

1992 NAIA honorable mention All-American goalkeeper **Jeff Nelson (Jr., Medford, Ore.)** was ejected at 22:37 for an intentional hand ball outside of the box. The referee ruled Nelson prevented a goal with an intentional handball.

"It was a reaction," said Nelson. "I didn't know if I was outside of the box. It was a bad call." Nelson was required to sit out Tuesday's match with Bloomfield College. Backup goalkeeper **Todd Williams (Sr., Eugene, Ore.)** came in for his fourth game of the season.

The NAIA gave the Bruins the 12th and lowest seed in the tournament and GFC paid for it. Coming into the game, Lynn was 20-0 and had outscored its opponents 115-5.

"Everything would have had to have gone right, but everything that could go wrong, went wrong," said GFC coach Manfred Tschan. "Our style of play is to be disruptive and control the tempo of the game, but we were not able to do it because it was a large field and we had to defend it with fewer players."

Forward **Trevor Smith (Jr., Medford, Ore.)**, who started his season on the junior varsity squad, scored his third goal of the season on a header from defender **Ryan Weider (Jr., Chiloquin, Ore.)**

BRUIN BITS:

\*\*\* GFC took just one senior to San Antonio. Backup goalkeeper **Todd Williams (Sr., Eugene, Ore.)** finished his college career in the national tournament. Williams replaced 1992 Honorable Mention All-American goalkeeper **Jeff Nelson (Jr., Medford, Ore.)**, after Nelson was ejected in the first game for an illegal handball outside the box. The rest of GFC's roster is made up of six juniors, four sophomores and eight freshmen.

\*\*\* Lynn University advanced to its fifth-straight NAIA national championship match and lost 4-3 in sudden death overtime to Sangamon State. Lynn put four players on the all-tournament team including the tournament's outstanding defensive and offensive players.

\*\*\* Striker **Greg Pfleger (Jr., Battle Ground, Wash.)** led the NAIA District 2 in scoring, but it was the Bruin defense that set the school records. The 1993 Bruins shattered the 1990 school record of 10 shutouts. GFC collected 15 this season. With just 12, GFC also bested the 1990 regular season record of 15 goals allowed.

\*\*\* For the first time ever, GFC finished undefeated (7-0) versus the Washington NAIA District 1 schools.

TSCHAN TSHOTS: (Comments from Manfred Tschan, 1993 NAIA District 2 Coach of the Year)

*On Lynn:* "Lynn's a great team. No doubt they were the deepest, most talented team there. They had no weakness."

*On Nelson's red card:* "I think it was terrible judgement on the part of the referee. It is clear from the rules that if there is an intentional handball you get a red card, but all season long we've seen handballs that have gotten yellow cards. Jeff did what he did out of self defense. The guy blasted a shot from point blank range. It would have hit him in the chest or his face. It hit him on the elbow and both his arms were in front of him. It was unfortunate that we were handicapped. Thank goodness **Todd Williams, Sr., Eugene, Ore.** came in and had a great game or the score might have been even worse."

*On Bloomfield:* "We played a lot better offensively against them. It was pretty much a wide open exchange. Since this was their first game, I would have expected them to be a little more fresh than we were. Our defense probably still was in shock from what Lynn had done to us. We all felt Bloomfield was a decent team, but that we should have beaten them. Many of our shots came within six yards, but we couldn't put them in. It was just a tournament thing. We couldn't get a break."

*On National Tournament:* "It was really educational to walk into the hotel lobby and see that we look like a college soccer team and the other teams looked like somebody's national team. Most of them had eight or nine older foreign players. There's a definite gap. They all can be beaten on any given day, but their quality of soccer is just outstanding. I felt there were the top-four teams that we couldn't match, but the teams five through 12 were within our range. The guys are already talking about next year and doing what it takes to get back there."



*On Season:* "Without a doubt this is our most successful season in any aspect of how you would measure success. When we won the NCCAA (National Christian College Athletic Association) national championships and played in the district championship games, they were marks to measure our success. Now we have established ourselves as one of the top NAIA teams in the Northwest — period. We need to understand how we got there and keep going that way. This was a great team to have and to be involved with. It was a very successful year any way you look at it."

George Fox College junior goalkeeper Jeff Nelson has been named to the 1993 Far West Region Adidas Scholar Athlete soccer team.

## **GFC's Men's Soccer Defender Named NSCAA Third Team All-American**

The honors keep coming to members of George Fox College's first-ever NAIA men's soccer national tournament team.

The most recent to receive an award is junior sweeper Jai Cook. The 5-9 defender from Eugene, Ore., was named a National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA)/Umbro third team All-American. Cook anchored GFC's defense which shut out its opponents a school record 15 times and allowed just 23 goals in 23 games.

## **GFC Men's Soccer Takes Top District Awards** **Tschan named Coach of Year, Pflieger voted Player of Year**

The nationally unranked George Fox College men's soccer team is earning recognition from NAIA District 2 in the form of Player of the Year and Coach of the Year awards.

The 1993 district champion Bruins also put five on the district first, second or honorable mention teams.

The George Fox College men's soccer team advanced to the NAIA National Men's Soccer Tournament with a 2-0 overtime win over Simon Fraser University.

"If anyone doesn't believe in God, they haven't seen us play soccer," said a relieved Manfred Tschan, GFC's fifth-year head coach.

The District 2 champion Bruins (18-3) topped SFU (12-7-1), the District 1 champion, with **Chris Cook's (Fr., Medford, Ore.)** first collegiate goal at the 101 minute mark.

"I was open in the center of the box and I knew I'd only have one shot," said Cook, who saw limited action off the bench this season. "Something like this never crossed my mind - ever."

Defense again carried the Bruins. Goalkeeper **Jeff Nelson (Jr., Medford, Ore.)** made five saves and recorded his 14th shutout of the year. Nelson has allowed two goals in the last 11 games - both on penalty kicks. The last team to score a non-penalty kick goal on Nelson was 15th ranked The Master's College on Oct. 6.

In 21 games, GFC's stingy defense has allowed 13 goals and totaled 15 shutouts.



**Greg Pfleger** (Jr., Battle Ground, Wash.), District 2's leading scorer, added GFC's second goal at 109 minutes, finishing a crossing pass from **Phil Nelson**, (So., Idaho Falls, Idaho). The play developed from an acrobatic sliding kick from **George Warta** (Fr., Brush Prairie, Wash.) that saved the ball from going out of bounds at midfield. Pfleger, 1993 District 2 Player of the Year, has 21 goals in 21 games.

The Bruins outshot the Clansmen 18-15, but survived two SFU shots that rebounded off the cross bar. "It was a very well-played game," said Tschan. "Simon Fraser played a great game."

GFC had a first-half goal disallowed by the referee after **Ryan Hendricks** (Fr., West Linn, Ore.) dislodged the ball from the SFU goalie.

**George Fox**, unranked in the final NAIA poll, has won 11 straight – two short of its 1990 record of 13 wins in a row.

## **SOCCER BRUINS BOUND FOR NATIONAL TOURNAMENT**

Of the 210 NAIA men's soccer teams that began the 1993 season, just 12 have advanced to the NAIA National Tournament. The George Fox Bruins, despite four wins versus teams that ranked in the NAIA top-20, received the lowest seed available, 12th. In their first-ever trip to the NAIA national tournament, the Bruins were placed in Pool A with the NAIA's No. 1 ranked team, Lynn College, Fla., and unranked Bloomfield College, N.J. After round-robin competition Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, the pool winner advances to the semifinals on Friday. The championship game is Saturday.

\*\*\* As the final minutes ticked off the clock during the Area 1 championship Saturday, GFC students gave their players a musical reminder of their Thanksgiving week destination. "The stars at night, are big and bright, deep in the heart of Texas," they sang.

\*\*\* The GFC student government is planning a campus pep rally on Saturday night for the soccer team.

\*\*\* The GFC squad is leaving Portland International Airport, Sunday (Nov. 21) morning at 6:05 a.m.

\*\*\* Based on what the national raters say, it would seem George Fox would need a near-miracle to defeat its first opponent, Lynn University. The Bruins received encouragement from Tony Campolo, an internationally-known evangelical speaker and author, during chapel Wednesday (Nov. 17) on campus. Campolo told the assembly of nearly 1,200 students and faculty, that although George Fox might be the 12-seed team in the tournament playing the No. 1 team in the country, "Nothing is impossible with God."

\*\*\* GFC has outscored its opponents 49-13 this season and 27-2 in the last 11 games.

\*\*\* He needed an extra game to do it, but striker **Greg Pfleger (Jr., Battle Ground, Wash.)** has matched his 1992 goal output. The 1993 District 2 Player of the Year has 21 goals this season and 64 in his three-year career. Last season he ranked 11th in the NAIA in goals and led all players from West Coast NAIA schools. A GFC player - either Pfleger or 1990 grad Dan LaVeine - has led West Coast scoring since 1987.

\*\*\* After making a save in the Area 1 championship game, the Simon Fraser University goalkeeper made one of the classiest plays of season. GFC forward Phil Nelson (Idaho Falls, Idaho) was injured and down on the ground. Rather than put the ball into play with a man-advantage, the goalie intentionally threw the ball out of bounds to stop play. Nelson was helped off the field and GFC returned the ball to the goal keeper.

\*\*\* The GFC-Lynn game is the first match of the entire tournament.

**TSCHAN TSHOTS:** (Comments from fifth-year head coach Manfred Tschan)

*On national tournament:* "This has been a goal we've had since 1990. It was the year after we won the NCCAA (National Christian College Athletic Association) nationals. We thought it was time to go after the NAIA nationals. Interestingly, that 1990 recruiting class now makes up the key guys on this team.

*On Lynn:* "If you're going to be an underdog, you might as well be a big underdog. It brings to mind all those guys who are seeded 64 in the (NCAA Div. 1) basketball tournament. It's something we have no control over. We'll just go out and play them. Obviously it doesn't help our chances of going on a whole lot. It's an opportunity to learn and see how we stack up. We haven't been favored to do a whole lot this season and we're not favored against them. Maybe that's a good omen.

*On Bloomfield:* "I really have no idea about them or the teams they've played. The only interesting thing I saw was they have four or five kids from Kearney, New Jersey. That's a hotbed for U.S. soccer. They have a pretty good youth program there."

## **Surprising GFC Men's Soccer On Brink Of No. 1 Seed In NAIA District 2 Playoffs**

Pull out all the cliches about "jelling, playing like a team, and coming together." George Fox College men's soccer coach Manfred Tschan is going to need them.

His Bruins (14-3) have come from nowhere – at least according to the NAIA national poll – to position themselves one win away from their first-ever No. 1 seed in the four-team NAIA District 2 playoffs. With a win at home over Western Baptist College this Saturday (Oct. 30), GFC would earn the right to host all playoff games leading up to the Nov. 23-27 NAIA national tournament in San Antonio, Texas. For perspective on the Bruin-Warrior matchup: George Fox hasn't lost to Western Baptist since becoming an NAIA team in 1977.

Should the Bruins win both district playoff contests on Thursday, Nov. 4, and Saturday, Nov. 6, GFC would host the District 1 champion from Washington or Canada on Saturday, Nov. 13.

No one needs remind the GFC players that a No. 1 seed means a higher District 2 finish than NAIA No. 8-ranked Concordia College. GFC topped the then-No. 5 Cavaliers 1-0 on Saturday (Oct. 23) in Newberg.

While the Cavaliers have basked in the limelight of their national ranking, the Bruins have quietly stopped their opponents from scoring. GFC's 1-0 win at Willamette University on Wednesday (Oct. 27) was shutout No. 12 for the season. The Bruins have outscored their opponents 37-12. Of the goals allowed, nine came during the three losses that separate GFC's seven-game win streaks.

Two of the losses came against nationally-ranked teams, one – at Seattle Pacific University – in NCAA Division 2. The Bruins' first loss – 3-2 to playoff-bound Westminster College – might have resulted from a young team's overconfidence in a 2-0 halftime lead. Indeed, George Fox is young. The Bruins list just one senior on the roster: backup goalkeeper Todd Williams, Eugene, Ore.

Before the team jumped out to its 7-0 start and knocked off three NAIA top-20 teams, Tschan had his doubts. Five starters from the 1992 district runner-up team were gone, including three defenders.

Going against what might have seemed wise, he installed a new offensive attack that put more pressure on his goalkeeper and inexperienced defense.

While most soccer teams use four defenders, four or five midfielders and one or two forwards, George Fox uses just three defenders and adds a third forward. On the field, it translates into a more aggressive style that creates more scoring chances.

"It's like a full court press in basketball or blitzing every down in football," says Tschan. He's got the offensive personnel to make it work. Leading the talented GFC forwards is NAIA honorable mention All-American Greg Pflieger, the district scoring champion in 1991 and 1992. Pflieger, a junior from Battle Ground, Wash. was third in district scoring going into the week.

"There is a trend now that you jam the middle (of the field)," says the coach. "We give you the middle and make you defend your own end.

"It puts a bigger burden on the three guys in back," said Tschan. "But they've done a lot better than I expected; they just don't make the mistakes you expect when putting guys in new spots."

Of the three defenders – Ryan Weider (Jr., Chiloquin, Ore.), Jai Cook (Jr., Eugene, Ore.), and Steve Sterhan (So., Milwaukee, Ore.) – only Sterhan played defense last year. Weider and Cook have moved from the midfield.

With one less defender than most opponents use, the Bruins have broken the 1990 school record of 10 shutouts in a season. That was the year GFC won its second National Christian College Athletic Association national championship. George Fox no longer participates in the NCCAA, concentrating instead on NAIA competition.



At the back of the Bruin defense is NAIA honorable mention All-American junior goalkeeper Jeff Nelson, Medford, Ore., who on Oct. 25 was named NAIA District 2 Goalkeeper of the Week for the second time this season. He has 11 of the team's 12 shutouts, and his goals against average is 7.5.

"If there is a better goalie, I haven't seen him," said Tschan. "Jeff's been unbelievable."

As unbelievable as GFC's success has been unlikely.

Says Tschan, "I never expected anything like this."

## **Bruin Scoring Leader Earns District Player Of The Week Honor**

George Fox College men's soccer striker Greg Pfleger is the NAIA District 2 Player of the Week for the second time in two seasons. Pfleger, a junior from Battle Ground, Wash., earned his most recent honor by leading the Bruins to a sweep of the two district Idaho colleges, scoring five goals – three in overtime at Albertson College and two at Northwest Nazarene.

His second honor should come as no surprise to Bruin soccer fans. Pfleger, a 1992 NAIA honorable mention All-American, last year led District 2 in scoring and was ranked 11th nationally in goals-per-game. On Sept. 21, 1992, he earned his first district Player of the Week honor.

His talent became obvious his freshmen year as he scored 21 goals and led the district. He's led all NAIA players on the West Coast both years.

"He was one of the guys we were counting on (at the beginning of the season)," said fifth-year head coach Manfred Tschan. "Especially for scoring."

Pfleger is continuing his scoring ways. Through 13 games he has scored 13 goals and recorded 2 assists. On October 11, he was tied for the second-most goals in the district. He's also played a vital part in the Bruin's current three-game win streak – producing the game-winning goal each game.

All this and he usually draws the opposing team's best defenseman.

"He gets double teamed quickly and team's are very inventive in their ways of trying to get him off his game," said Tschan. "They try to intimidate him and say things to him to try to throw him off."

"Most of the time it backfires on them – sometimes making him mad gets him going."

Pfleger began the season with a knee injury and didn't score in the first two games, but is back in shape now.

"I think his injury hurt his timing a little bit," said Tschan. "But after that he was fine."

Despite their 10-3 record, the Bruins are not putting the ball in the net like the "Bruins of old" says Tschan.

"Scoring is so much mental," related Tschan. "Our skills haven't got any worse since last year and we're getting good scoring chances – it's frustrating."

So who does the team look to?

"He's definitely what you'd call our go-to guy," said Tschan. "I think it puts some pressure on Greg, he feels like he has to get it done."

If you look to past achievements, you know Greg Pfleger will be there.



## **PFLEGER NAMED NAIA DISTRICT 2 MEN'S SOCCER PLAYER OF WEEK**

George Fox College junior soccer striker Greg Pfleger is NAIA District 2's Player of the Week.

Pfleger, from Battle Ground, Wash., last week led the 9-3 Bruins to two district wins over Albertson College and Northwest Nazarene. A 1992 NAIA honorable mention All-American, he scored three goals in overtime to give GFC its 3-0 win over Albertson and two of the Bruins goals in their 5-0 win over NNC.

Pfleger led NAIA District 2 in scoring in 1991 and 1992. This season he has 12 goals and 2 assists in 12 games. His 12 goals is tied for second highest in District 2.

Pfleger was named District 2 Player of the Week once before on Sept. 21, 1992.

Although head coach Manfred Tschan has cornered the market on the two families, he insists just because he has one brother it doesn't automatically mean the others will follow.

"I think they were all pleased with the school and just happen to be soccer players," said Tschan. "It doesn't assure that a brother is going to come here."

Both sets of brothers have obvious similarities – they all at one time or another played the same position.

The George brothers, Mike, Kent and Steve, all played midfield and the Warta's came to GFC as midfielders. Warta's older brothers, Greg and Clint, were converted to defenders.

Tschan doesn't think his newest Warta will make the same move. "I tried George out on defense and will use him if I have to, but I can't turn three straight offensive machines into defenders," he jokes.

As always, with siblings the next-in-line is expected to perform at a higher level than his brother before. The one coming up next is always "better than the rest," which brings high expectations.

"I think it's common that there are raised expectations (for the next brother)," said the coach. "You tend to expect more after you've had someone's brother, but that's not always fair."

And if it wasn't tough enough to not call someone by their brother's name, Tschan has to deal with Steve George and George Warta sharing a name.

"It's tough, especially this year, but no one has kicked me yet," said Tschan. "They roll their eyes, but I think they're probably a bit proud."

So are there any more brothers waiting in the wings to join the soccer Bruins?

Yes, but Tschan says there's a small problem.

"There is another Warta brother, but he says he's going to kick footballs in college."

## GFC MEN'S SOCCER 1993 OUTLOOK

Ordinarily, George Fox College men's soccer coach **Manfred Tschan** has a few holes to fill each new season.

1993 begins with a gaping pit directly in front of **Jeff Nelson (junior, Medford, Ore.)**, GFC's honorable mention All-American goal keeper. And this one has nothing to do with the automatic irrigation system that was dug into Morse Field this summer.

Graduation uprooted three defenders and two midfielders who helped George Fox to a 12-3-3 record and propelled it into the NAIA District 2 championship game. "We lost rocks," says Tschan. "Very tough solid defenders with great experience and athletic ability." In 1992, the Bruins allowed 21 goals while the GFC offense scored 43 of its own. Honorable mention All-American **Dieter Muenstermann** will be especially difficult to replace at the sweeper position.

Some of the speed went out of the Bruin offense over the summer as well. The district's second-leading scorer, **Mike Nadeau (junior, Portland, Ore.)**, will give up his two-sport career to concentrate on preparing for a possible trip into professional baseball.

"He's someone you hate to lose, but he's the one loss we can handle," says Tschan.

The Bruins are loaded on offense. Honorable mention All-American forward **Greg Pfleger (junior, Battle Ground, Wash.)** finished as the NAIA's 11th-highest scorer, collecting 21 goals and six assists. He continued a six-year George Fox tradition, leading all West Coast NAIA scorers. Dan LaVeine, who scored a national-record 130 career goals, led the West Coast from 1987 to 1990, and the nation in 1989 and 1990. Health is a concern for Pfleger, who returns with a knee injury.

Calling his standout goalkeeper and striker his "bookends," Tschan is reusing a term from 1990. With LaVeine in the front and the acrobatic Jason Koop in the goal, Tschan dubbed his senior stars with the same title. That team finished 21-3-1.

"We're a lot younger this year, but we have more potential game-breakers," says Tschan.



**Phil Nelson (sophomore, Idaho Falls, Idaho)** stepped in last year when Nadeau was injured. He made appearances in every game last season and recorded three goals and four assists.

Two freshmen with the potential to start at forward are **Justin Rivard (Las Vegas, Nev.)** and **Joe Scott (Portland)**. Rivard was an all-state selection in 1992, while Scott took first-team Mt. Hood Conference honors.

Tschan says the loss of his two midfielders is magnified by the gutting of his defense. Of the four midfielders in Tschan's tentative opening-day lineup, just **Jim Maine (junior, Yakima, Wash.)** played there last season. **Ian Reschke (sophomore, Renton, Wash.)** moves back from striker, where he collected four goals and four assists. The other two midfielders probably will be **Ryan Hendricks (freshman, West Linn, Ore.)** and **George Warta (freshman, Brush Prairie, Wash.)**.

So what's Tschan going to do with his defense? "We're going to turn midfielders into defenders, as always," he says. "That's the first thing I did when I came to George Fox."

His first transfer was Andy LaVeine, a senior in 1988 and now an assistant coach for the Bruins. LaVeine moved to the sweeper spot and received the district's player of the year award.

Muenstermann made the switch when he came to GFC and rose to All-American status.

This year, it's **Jai Cook (junior, Eugene, Ore.)**, a two-year starting midfielder, who receives the call. He'll be joined by the lone returning defender, **Steve Sterhan (sophomore, Milwaukie, Ore.)**. **Ryan Weider (junior, Chiloquin, Ore.)** also moves from the midfield.

The Bruins have been consistent since Tschan came to GFC as an assistant coach from Concordia College in 1988. George Fox has finished as district runner-up every year except 1990, when the Bruins lost the title game to Warner Pacific College on the field, but later won by forfeit when a Knight player was found ineligible. Last season, GFC made its first appearance in the NAIA national top-20 poll, ranking as high as 14th.

Tschan hasn't made things easy for his new defenders. The schedule is weighted down with seven teams that broke into the NAIA or NCAA Div. II top-20 rankings last year.

The district playoffs took a new twist with the addition of Westminster College of Salt Lake City to District 2. Westminster made an appearance in the top-20 last year, but will play all district games on the road.

"It's at least a five-team race for the four spots," says Tschan. He gives defending district champion Concordia College and Willamette University the favorites titles, with Albertson College, Westminster and GFC also in the hunt.
