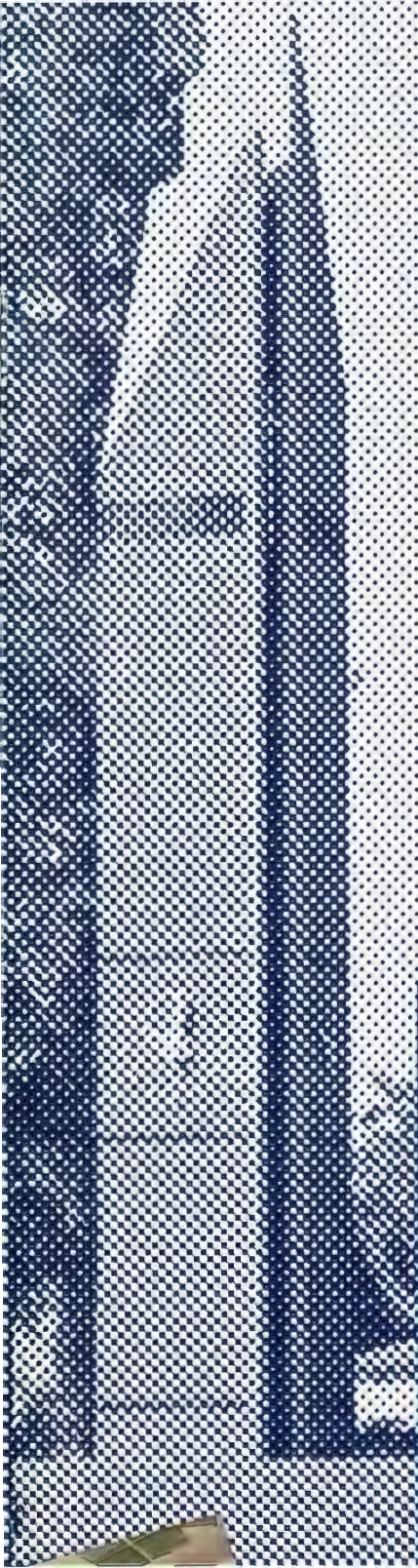

George Fox College, in its 105th year, is one of America's Best Colleges. Eight times it has been given that designation by *U.S. News & World Report* magazine. In 1995 GFC was ranked second in academic reputation among Western Regional Liberal Arts Colleges, including colleges and universities from Texas to Hawaii. The magazine also named George Fox to its list of "Top Teaching Schools," second among liberal arts colleges in the western region.

George Fox is one of the nation's fastest-growing colleges. Enrollment more than tripled from 549 in 1986 to 1,717 in the fall of 1995.

The College offers unique programs to its students. Every incoming freshman is given a Macintosh computer to use and keep upon graduation. When students reach their third year at GFC, they are eligible for the Juniors Abroad program, where the College pays transportation costs for a three-week overseas study tour.

GFC students come from 32 states, one U.S. territory and nine nations. More than 40 religious denominations are represented on campus.

George Fox College had its beginnings when early Willamette Valley Quaker settlers established Pacific Academy in 1885 for the Christian education of their children. The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction for students. In 1949, because of the many colleges in the Northwest with Pacific in their name,

Tigard) the name will again change — to George Fox University.

George Fox is accredited by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges. The College is one of 13 members of the national Christian College Consortium. GFC's undergraduate program is administered through three schools: Humanities, Natural and Behavioral Sciences, and Professional Studies. The 15 departments offer 34 majors with more than 400 courses.

An off-campus degree-completion program in management and organizational leadership enrolls working adults in an evening program with classes in Portland, Salem and Eugene, Ore., and Boise, Idaho. Graduate programs offered are a Doctor of Psychology (Psy.D.) in clinical psychology, a Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.), a Master of Education (M.Ed.), a Master of Business Administration (M.B.A.), and a Master of Arts in Christian Studies (M.A.C.S.).

The 74-acre tree-shaded campus a half-hour drive from Portland has undergone major expansion in recent years with 12 new buildings constructed. Part of a \$16 million Centennial Campaign, the \$5.3 million Edwards-Holman Science Center opened in the fall of 1994.

Alumni of George Fox are primarily in service-oriented vocations of Christian ministries, education, social work and medical fields. The College's most prominent alumnus is the late President Herbert Hoover, who attended Pacific Academy.

the College was renamed George Fox in honor of the founder of the Friends (Quaker) Church.

The College is governed by a 42-member Board of Trustees elected by Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, which comprises nearly 8,000 members in approximately 50 churches in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Following a merger — to be complete the fall of 1996 — with Western Evangelical Seminary (a graduate school of 350 students in

## Softball Looks to Rebuild with Youth

George Fox softball coach Chris Gross figures 1996 is a good year for her team to step up to the Northwest Conference of Independent Colleges.

She doesn't have a single senior on the roster.

"I'm glad we're doing it when we're so young," she says. "I figure one year in the NCIC will give us a year and a half of experience because it's so tough."

George Fox's players can use all the game experience they can get after a wet Oregon spring played havoc with last year's schedule. Just three contests on the 19-date GFC schedule were played when and where originally scheduled. After the wild regular season, a pair of one-run losses ended the defending conference champions' season in the Cascade Conference playoffs, and George Fox finished 10-15.

GFC is really young. Gross says she knows having 11 freshmen and 10 sophomores will mean some inconsistency.

"On a good day, we'll give the top teams a run for their money, but we'll need to focus on keeping our performance on a level playing field."

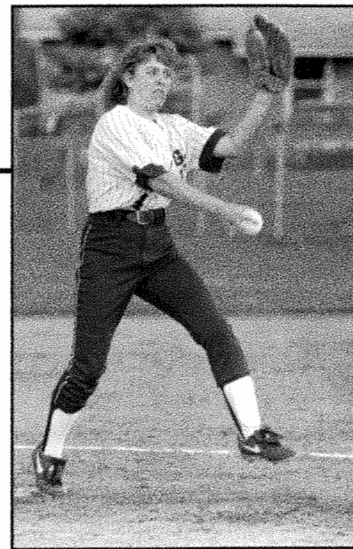
"I think our youth is a strength," Gross says. "People aren't expecting all that much from us, but I like the work ethic our players have and their dedication and attitudes."

Five starting fielders and all three pitchers are back from last season.

All-Cascade Conference pitcher Sarah Swanson (So., Beyer HS, Modesto, Calif.) was last year's conference ERA leader, giving up an average of 1.66 earned runs in 67.1 innings.

"She should be a steady force for us," says Gross. "She also can play first base when she's not on the mound."

Also returning to the mound are Terri Cody (Jr., Woodland HS, Wash.), a utility player, and Dara Lakin (So., W.F. West HS, Chehalis, Wash.).

Returning to the plate is catcher Phoebe Linnell (So., The Dalles HS, Ore.) who was a part-time starter last year.

Another who won conference honors last year, infielder Allison Vaubel (So., Gervais HS, Ore.), won honorable mention as a designated hitter. She led the Lady Bruins with a .357 batting average. Gross expects Vaubel will split time at second base with Mary Butts (So., Hudson's Bay HS, Vancouver, Wash.). Butts also may play in right field, where she started last year.

The Lady Bruins are not a power-hitting squad. Just three returners had extra base hits last year.

"Extra base hits and seniors are two things you won't see much of on the field," jokes Gross. "We will have to put the ball in play and combine base hits in order to score runs."

George Fox will be new, but talented, in the corners.

An Oregon class 3A all-state third-team selection, 5-foot-11 Amy Schultens (Fr., The Dalles HS, Ore.) gives the Lady Bruins good height at first base. She and her twin sister, Jennifer, join the softball squad after playing for the College's volleyball team.

At third base is Breanna Skocilich (Fr., Junction City HS, Ore.), a converted shortstop. "Breanna's got good fundamental skills and is very smooth," says Gross. "She hasn't played third base before, but she's got strong potential. She reminds me of Traci Blair (1994 district tournament MVP)."

At shortstop is team captain Casey

Waits (Jr., North Medford HS, Ore.), one of three returners who helped GFC win the now-dissolved NAIA District 2 tournament in 1994.

"This is Casey's second year at the position," says Gross. "Every game she gets better."

Gross has veterans in left field and center field. Lauree Arnold (Jr., West Linn HS, Tualatin, Ore.) gives GFC good range in center field, and Brenda Linnell (So., The Dalles HS, Ore.) has a strong arm in left field.

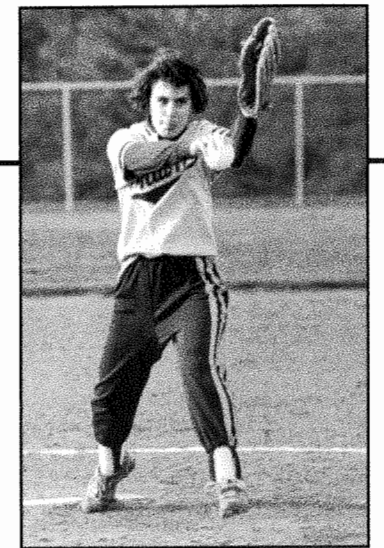
After redshirting last season, Sharka Vokel (Fr., North Tahoe HS, Sierraville, Calif.) will split time in right field with Mary Butts.

"Sharka is much improved," says Gross. "She looked really good in the fall."

George Fox starts its season Saturday, March 2, in Monmouth, playing Western Oregon State and NCAA Division II Portland State. The schedule has George Fox playing four non-conference opponents in addition to contests with NCIC members Lewis & Clark College, Pacific University, Pacific Lutheran University, Linfield College, and Willamette University.

Spring break will include a trip to California, where GFC will play a tournament at NCAA Division II California State - Hayward.

### ATHLETIC AFFILIATION

It's a year of transition for George Fox athletics. The College is in its first season in the Northwest Conference of Independent Colleges (NCIC).

The NCIC is leaving the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) for the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division III. Currently a provisional member of the NCAA, George Fox will be eligible for national championship play in 1998-99. Until then, George Fox and the NCIC will continue to compete nationally in the NAIA.

GFC's men's and women's basketball teams play in NAIA Division II, while the College's other 11 sports are not divided into divisions.

The NAIA is an autonomous association administering programs leading to 13 men's and 11 women's national championships. The NAIA includes 364 four-year colleges and universities in 49 states and Canada. They are grouped in nine regions and 44 conferences.

The NCAA administers 80 championships in 21 sports for its member institutions, involving nearly 21,000 men and women student-athletes.

### 1996 POSTSEASON PLAY

The regular season champion of the six-team Northwest Conference will advance to the NAIA Pacific Northwest Regional Tournament May 10-11 with the champions of the Cascade Conference, the Pacific Northwest Athletic Conference and one at-large entry. The winner of the regional tournament will move on to the national softball tournament (May 15-18) in Decatur, Alabama.

**Chris Gross**

Chris Gross is a young, but veteran, coach. No head softball coach in the Northwest Conference has coached at his or her institution longer. Gross is in her sixth season on the George Fox softball coaching staff.

Beginning her fourth season as head coach, she has coached her teams to a 41-31 record. In 1994, she was named NAIA District 2 coach of the year after the Lady Bruins won the Cascade Conference and NAIA District 2 title.

Advancing to the regional playoffs, George Fox finished one win away from the NAIA national softball tournament.

An Idaho native, Gross was valedictorian of Greenleaf Friends Academy's class of 1983. She came to George Fox, where she played four years of softball as a catcher and one year of basketball. Gross graduated in 1987 with a degree in business and economics.

She joined the George Fox admissions department that year and spent two years in undergraduate admissions. In 1989 she switched to the Department of Continuing Education.

In 1995 she left her position as director of admission for continuing education to pursue a Master of Science degree in human performance at Oregon State University.

**Q & A WITH HEAD COACH CHRIS GROSS**

**What makes George Fox unique?**

"I think our integration of faith and learning is our biggest plus. Our Christian emphasis is an extreme positive. We strive to develop the whole individual: spiritually, mentally and physically."

**How would you describe your team?**

"Our team is like a family. We want people to get along on the field as well as off the field. In addition to playing together, we participate in off-field activities, service-oriented as well as social."

**What type of player do you look for?**

"First and foremost, they have to love the game of softball. In addition to that, they need a strong work ethic and to be disciplined, self-motivated and a servant-leader. The true student-athlete is what we want."



**Marla Hardman**

Marla Hardman is in her third season helping the George Fox pitchers as an assistant coach.

A 1989 graduate of North Salem High School, Hardman went on to Pacific Lutheran University. She played one season for the Lutes and

earned a physical education degree in 1993.

She currently teaches physical education classes at Reed College and St. James Elementary School.



**Ellen (Skeeters) Stevens**

A member of the 1991 NAIA national runner-up softball team at the University of Puget Sound, Ellen Stevens is in her third year as a George Fox assistant coach.

After graduating from Beaverton High School in 1988, Stevens earned a biology degree at UPS in 1992 and a

Master of Arts in Teaching from George Fox in 1994.

She currently teaches biology at Newberg High School. On December 9, 1995, she married Doug Stevens.



**Angie Jordan**

Angie Jordan has the most dramatic life story on the GFC softball coaching staff. Two weeks after finishing George Fox's 1995 season as a honorable mention Cascade Conference catcher, Jordan nearly died. Her heart stopped after a workout, and medics spent 25 minutes starting it up again.

She was diagnosed with a heart abnormality, and an electronic defibrillator was placed in her body to shock her should her heart stop again.

Jordan last year earned a bachelor's degree in human performance at George Fox and is currently is enrolled in the Master of Arts in Teaching program.



**Melanie Parker**

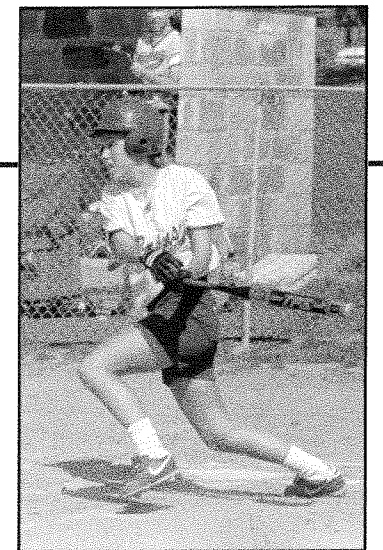
Melanie Parker is George Fox's first-ever junior varsity coach.

Last year as a GFC first baseman, Parker won first-team Cascade Conference honors, hitting .301 and collecting a team-high 20 RBI and five doubles.

Parker is a 1991 graduate of Richland High School in Washington. She spent two years at Wenatchee Valley College, where she twice was a first-team all-conference selection.

She transferred to George Fox in 1993 and played two seasons for the Lady Bruins. She is coaching while finishing up her bachelor's degree in elementary education.
