THREE GFC TRACK ATHLETES NAMED ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICAN

Academic All-American Scholar-Athlete honors aren't all a couple of George Fox College track athletes have in common.

Newberg brother-sister pair, David and Kristin Thomas, both earned the NAIA national honor as racewalkers on the GFC track team. Also awarded was All-American javelin thrower Cheryl Shepherd, Langlois, Ore.

For David, it was his fourth All-American title in two years. The senior finished fourth in the 1992 10,000-meter racewalk and received the scholastic honor. This year, the international studies major took sixth in the 5,000-meter racewalk. He graduated with a 3.79 accumulative grade point average (GPA) on a 4.0 scale.

Kristin, a junior sociology/social work major, met the national racewalk qualifying standard in her first-ever competition this season. At the national meet she finished 11th. She carries a 3.81 accumulative GPA.

Shepherd earned a fourth place finish at the NAIA national meet. A senior health teaching major, she holds a 3.48 accumulative GPA.

Combined with George Fox's seven athletic All-American honors, the track team collected ten All-American awards. Head coach Wes Cook's cross country and track teams have produced 18 All-Americans titles this year.

Women Ninth, Men 14th In Nation

GFC TRACK EARNS HIGHEST-EVER NATIONAL FINISHES

Nine of 12 George Fox College track and field athletes scored as GFC's men's and women's contingents recorded highest-ever NAIA national team finishes.

Prior to leaving for the May 20-22 meet at Abbotsford, B.C, six-year head coach Wes Cook labeled his 12-athlete squad the strongest in his six years and they proved it with seven top-six All-American finishes.

LADY BRUINS RETURN TO TOP-TEN

The women edged NAIA District 2 champion Western Oregon State College and took ninth – the second top-ten finish in two years for the Lady Bruins. GFC scored 26 points to WOSC's 23.5.

FOUR-MAN TEAM ALL ALL-AMERICANS

Four top-six All-American finishes lifted the Bruin men to 14th from a 26th-place showing last season. George Fox's 19 points was a leap from its nine in 1992. District champion WOSC produced a fourth-place showing with 61.5.

LIFE AFTER BEALS

The Lady Bruins did it without 1992 grad, Jill Jamison-Beals, who's 18 national points a year ago muscled her team to a tenth-place 22-point finish.

CYRUS CORRALS 16 POINTS AND BREAKS BAD LUCK STRING

Junior Juli Cyrus, Newberg, did double duty and secured runner-up finishes in the 3,000 and 5,000-meter races. She contributed 16 points to the Lady Bruin total. Cook said she ran solo for most of both races, finishing with near-personal-record times of 9:46 and 17:02.3.

It was a breakthrough for Cyrus, who had suffered phenomenal bad luck at previous national meets. After finishing as a cross country All-American her freshman year at Western State College of Colorado, asthma attacks have denied her a repeat performance twice as a Lady Bruin. Last season at the national track meet, a collision in the 5,000-meters ended another All-American bid.

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"It took a big monkey off her back," said Cook.

THROWERS PITCH IN

The javelin crew chucked in eight points. All three Lady Bruins came through with performances that were within inches of their season's best. Senior Cheryl Shepherd, Langlois, Ore., heaved 140-7 for fourth place. She held third going into the final round of throws, but was dislodged.

Freshman Leah Johanson, Kirkland, Wash., and sophomore Kristy Fleming, Aberdeen,, Wash. scored points with respective seventh and eighth place finishes.

STENBERG SEVENTH

Senior Marlyss Stenberg, Canyonville, Ore., who two weeks ago earned District 2's female Athlete of the Meet, improved her heptathlon score 200 points from last year, but moved up just one notch at the national meet. Stenberg's 4,455 points moved her into seventh and produced two team points. She also attempted the 400-meter hurdles, where she made the semi-finals, but was the fastest non-qualifier. She may not have had much energy left. "It's tough for her to come off the heptathlon," said Cook.

The strength of District 2 was evident on the men's side.

LATE KICK LIFTS MORSE TO THIRD

District 5,000-meter champion, junior Jonathan Morse, Coquille, Ore., earned third with a late charge. "He ran a great race," said Cook. "He was six or seventh with a lap to go. Then it was big-time kick-time. It wasn't like he was loafing. It was a tough race."

INSTITUTIONAL ENTRIES PAY OFF

Cook brought along sophomore Rob Rising, Goldendale, Wash., and senior Ed Sloan, Newberg, as institutional entries. Neither had met the national qualifying standards, but both made the grade in Canada.

Rising's first attempt at the long jump was his best ever at 23-7.25 and latched him onto third – the same place he took in the district meet. He actually tied for second, but was moved down by a

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tie-breaker. His top jump was so close to scratching that Cook said the officials used a magnifying glass to determine if he had touched the line.

Sloan, who had a bad day at the district 3,000-meter steeplechase and finished fifth, roared to a fifth-place 9:15.5 showing in the national competition.

THOMAS TWO-TIME ALL-AMERICAN

Returning All-American senior racewalker David Thomas, Newberg, completed the 5,000-meter competition in 23:30 and finished sixth. It was a drop from fourth last year. "He thought he had a better chance," said Cook. "He went out too fast and paid for it."

Cyrus Sets GFC Record In 1,500 at Oregon Twilight Meet

GFC SENDS DOZEN TO NATIONAL TRACK MEET

George Fox College is sending a Cook's dozen to the NAIA national track and field championships this weekend (May 20-22).

Head coach Wes Cook says the 12 athletes he's taking to Abbotsford, Canada, are his strongest national contingent in his six years at GFC.

"If you look at quality and quantity, this is the best year we've had since I've been here," he said. They may not score enough points to improve on last year's finishes, but Cook thinks he may return with a handful of All-Americans. "They all have a chance to score. If they all compete as normal, they'll be in the hunt."

GFC's 1992 grad Jill Jamison-Beals, scored 18 of the Lady Bruins' 22 points last season and helped her team to a 10th-place tie.

THREE NATIONAL SCORERS RETURN FOR WOMEN

Cook returns to Canada with the three seniors who scored the other four points.

Marlyss Stenberg, who was named the District 2 championship's Female Athlete of the Meet, will again compete in the heptathlon. She finished eighth at the national meet last year with 4,318 points. This year she finished second in district with a 4,556 total that is fifth-best among the eight national qualifiers.

Stenberg may add another event. The Canyonville, Ore., product also qualified in the 400-meter hurdles with a 1:02.78 time that would have placed her fifth in last year's national meet.

Despite a knee injury during the district meet, cross country All-American Debbie Kintrea will attempt to improve on her 1992 seventh-place finish in the 800 meters.

In the javelin, Cheryl Shepherd, Langlois, Ore., topped the defending national champion, Mea Frantz of Willamette University, while winning the district meet. She finished eighth in the nation a year ago.

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Shepherd will be one of three GFC javelin throwers in Abbotsford. Sophomore Kristy Fleming, Aberdeen, Wash., and freshman Leah Johanson, Kirkland, Wash., did not surpass the 140-0 national qualifying mark, but join the team as institutional entries. All three have thrown farther than 136 feet this season. That was a top-eight finish in 1992.

"I'm looking for good things from them," said Cook.

CYRUS COMING OFF RECORD-BREAKING WEEKEND

Junior Juli Cyrus, Newberg, rolls into the national meet off a record-breaking weekend. At the Oregon Twilight Meet in Eugene, Saturday (May 15), she set George Fox's 1,500-meter top time at 4:34.24. It beat her previous best of 4:38.97. She was the fifth collegiate runner to finish and 10th overall. "Pretty high-powered stuff," said Cook.

Cyrus will be running the 5,000 meters and possibly the 3,000 at the national meet. She swept all three races at the district championships.

GOLDEN TIES OWN SCHOOL RECORD

Sophomore Tina Golden, Portland, is the third Lady Bruin institutional entry. She tied her own school record of 5-5 at the Twilight Meet and has jumped 5-6 in practice. "5-6 has been a scoring jump every year," says Cook.

BROTHER-SISTER RACEWALKING DUO

Sophomore Kristin Thomas, Newberg, will compete in the 3,000-meter racewalk.

Her brother, David is the men's lone returning 1992 track All-American. He struggled at the national meet and still took fourth in the 10,000-meter racewalk. The race has been converted to the 5,000 meter distance where he holds a 22:30.1 season best.

The Bruins tied for 26th last year with two scorers.

MORSE LOOKS TOUGH IN 5,000

In the 5,000, GFC has another potential All-American in junior Jonathan Morse, Coquille, Ore. He ran away with the 1,500 and 5,000 meters in the district meet.

Sophomore Rob Rising, Goldendale, Wash., and senior Ed Sloan, Newberg, are GFC's final two institutional entries.

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ALL-WEATHER RISING

Rising will long jump. His district leap of 23-6 would have placed him third at last year's national meet. Cook feels one of his strengths is his ability to jump in poor weather conditions. "If you go to the horse track and talk about the mudders - that's Rob," he says. "It (nationals) will be a great experience. He'll only get better."

Sloan, who took fifth in the district 3,000 meter steeplechase, returns for his second appearance at the national meet.

Marlyss Stenberg Named Athlete of Meet

GFC FINISHES SECOND TWICE AT DISTRICT TRACK MEET

Two runner-up finishes meant different things for the George Fox College men and women at the NAIA District 2 Track and Field Meet.

For the men, it meant a solid step forward from fourth place a year ago. Of the 23 GFC men entered, 19 scored points. The Bruins dominated the distance races, winning the 1,500, 5,000, and 10,000 meters. Western Oregon State College took the title with 193 points. GFC followed at 130 and Linfield was next at 106. GFC head coach Wes Cook said he was surprised. "I didn't expect we'd have that easy of a time taking second place," he said. "I thought it would be a battle."

For the women, it meant the end of their first-ever reign as district champions. Western Oregon took back the title it had held five of the past seven years. "That was two of the better women's performances at district," said Cook. As the meet finished, GFC lost a late lead when WOSC scored 25 unanswered points in the triple jump and finished ahead of the Lady Bruins in the 4x400 relay. The Wolves won with 181 points, GFC ended with 164.5 and Southern Oregon State College took third with 91.5. "We knew we'd have to be at our best," said Cook. "We did what we could do under the circumstances."

SENSATIONAL STENBERG

Multi-talented Marlyss Stenberg competed in six events and won the 100 high hurdles and 400 high hurdles. "It's my senior year," she said. "I was hoping it'd be like this." The Canyonville, Ore., native was named Female Athlete of the Meet. Stenberg scored 35.25 district points and finished her career with 130.75 – the most ever by a GFC female. Already bound for the May 20-22 NAIA National Meet in Abbotsford, Canada, to compete in the heptathlon, Stenberg set a new GFC 400-meter hurdle record with a national qualifying 1:02.78.

CYRUS SWEEPS THREE RACES

Junior Juli Cyrus, Newberg, lived up to her top billings, winning the 1,500, 3,000, and 5,000 and added 30 points to the Lady Bruin total. -more-

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SHEPHERD TOPS DEFENDING CHAMPION

Senior Cheryl Shepherd, Langlois, Ore., surpassed Mea Frantz, Willamette University's defending national champion in the javelin. Friday morning, while the rain and wind hampered the athletes, Shepherd's 136-11 edged Frantz's 136-9. "I was dodging puddles on the approach," said Shepherd.

10K DRAMA

The 10,000 meters produced some of the meet's best drama. Freshman Ruth Hinds, Tillamook, Ore., came in ranked 10th out of 11 entries with a personal best of 45:27.56. She locked into a one-on-one battle for fifth with Eastern Oregon's Keri Fezzey that lasted the final ten laps. As they reached the halfway point of the bell lap, Hinds broke away and finished with a 20 yard lead and a personal record 41:40.13. "It was a great surprise," said Cook. "That's what track and field is all about."

INJURIES HURT GFC TITLE HUNT

Injuries cost the Lady Bruins points.

Defending 800-meter champion Debbie Kintrea, a senior from Portland, finished second in the 1,500 meters, but later on Saturday afternoon hurt her knee while leading the 800. She finished the race in sixth.

That left a hole in the 4x400 relay that sophomore Eva Crawford, Redmond, Ore., filled and helped the team to its second best time of the season.

An injury kept freshman Jenny Campbell, Seattle, Wash., from finishing the 3,000 meters, but she ran the next day in the 1,500 to score points for her team in the five-person race. "I told her to jog, but she ran pretty well," said Cook.

Sophomore Tina Stauffer, Salem, Ore., injured her knee while competing in the triple jump. She entered the event at the last minute to attempt to help her team in the tight race with WOSC. She may require surgery.

Billie Bentley, a freshman from Yamhill, Ore., registered a personal record in the 200 meter

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preliminaries, but spent Friday night in the hospital. Cook said she required a emergency appendectomy.

MORSE MASTERS 1,500 AND 5K

On the men's side, junior Jonathan Morse, Coquile, Ore., easily won the 1,500 and 5,000. "He did what he was supposed to do without straining too much," said Cook.

The men produced 16 personal records.

STRAIT VAULTS TO PR

For the second straight year, junior Jason Strait, Newberg, achieved his pole vault personal record at the district meet. He vaulted 15-1, topping his season's best of 14-6.

RISING STARS

Sophomore Rob Rising, Goldendale, Wash., slashed his personal records in the triple jump and long jump. "Rising probably had the most exceptional meet of all the kids," said Cook. Rising took third in the long jump with a 23-6 effort and third in the triple jump at 44-11.5. His final jump in the triple moved him from fifth to third place. GFC jumpers sophomore Aaron Young, Newberg, and freshman John Smith, Lakeside, Ore., finished second and fourth respectively. Cook was impressed with Rising's efforts. "If he jumps this well in our climate, he has a good chance of being an All-American," said Cook.

Rising also ran a season's best 49.1 split in the 4x400 relay that set a new school record at 3:18.17. GFC finished third, less than two seconds behind the winner, WOSC.

BREWER AND WRIGHT BAG 10K

Freshman Jim Brewer, Stanwood, Wash., and senior Jon Wright, Caldwell, Idaho, finished one-two in the 10,000 meters.

DISTRICT MEET NEXT FOR GFC TRACK

The George Fox College women have a title to defend and the men a mountain to climb this Friday and Saturday (May 7-8) at the NAIA District 2 track and field championships.

The Newberg athletes almost have a home field advantage. The meet is being held at their Yamhill County neighbor, Linfield College.

Last year, the Bruins finished fourth and the Lady Bruins swept the middle distance races while scoring an all-time district scoring record of 179.

It won't be as easy for the women this time.

COOK TABS WOSC AS FAVORITE

"On paper, Western Oregon has to be the favorite on both sides," says GFC head coach Wes Cook.

Injuries have set back both GFC teams. "We'll have 40 points sitting back home," says Cook.

LADY BRUIN LEADERS

He still has plenty of national-calibre athletes with the ability to ring up plenty of points. Senior Marlyss Stenberg,, Canyonville, Ore., is GFC's all-time leading district scorer. She's helped the women to a district-leading 18 points already this season, taking second in the heptathlon. GFC finished 2-3-4 in the contest.

She'll be contending for titles in the long jump, both hurdles and the 4x100 and 4x400 relays.

Cook's counting on Juli Cyrus, a junior Newberg runner, for another batch of points. She'll probably run in the events in which she's nationally qualified: the 1,500, 3,000, and 5,000 meter races.

Two other Lady Bruins own the district's best times in their events. Senior Debbie Kintrea, Portland, was a national scorer in the 800 meters last year. She'll be running there and in the 1,500

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meters and 4x400 relay. Freshman Liz Stephens, Bellevue, Wash., holds the top time in the 100 meter hurdles and will compete in the 400 meter hurdles as well.

BRUIN FAVORITES

On the men's side, Cook feels the men can do their damage from the 400 meters on up.

Sophomore Torrey Lindbo, Colfax, Wash., has the district's top time in the 800 meters and has a shot at qualifying for nationals. Four other Bruins make up the top eight.

Jonathan Morse, a senior from Salem, could be a run-away winner in the 5,000 and a favorite in the 1,500. He should have plenty of help from his teammates in the 1,500, but injuries have hurt George Fox's opportunities in the 5,000.

Off the track, the Bruins should make a better showing than last year. "Our jump crew is much improved," says Cook.

He'll have the multi-talented sophomores Aaron Young, Newberg, and Rob Rising, Goldendale, Wash. competing in the long jump and triple jump. Junior Jonathan Huwe, Bigfork, Mont., took second in the district discus last year, but is battling an inner ear infection that severely affects his balance. Cook says they are trying to find proper medication to help solve his problem.

GFC TRACK ONE NATIONAL AND FOUR DISTRICT QUALIFYING MARKS

A partial-squad off George Fox College's track and field team made good on the final regular season meet by producing one national and four district qualifying marks Saturday (May 1) at the Western Oregon Open.

GFC was senior-less in Monmouth because it was graduation day back on the Newberg campus. "We had a lot of kids not there because of commencement," said head coach Wes Cook.

Still, the results were impressive. "We had 16 PRs (personal records) or season's bests," he said.

Junior Juli Cyrus, Newberg, raced for the first time since mid-April and came up with national calibre results. Her 1,500 meter time of 4:40.54 was best among the two heats and good enough to qualify her in her third national event. She already had national qualifying times in the 3,000 and 5,000 meters.

Cyrus also turned in a first place 2:22.58 performance in the 800-meter run that qualified her for the district race. She probably won't need it. Cook says she'll stick to the longer races.

Three George Fox men earned the right to compete in events at the NAIA District 2 championships May 7-8 at Linfield College.

Sophomore Rob Rising, Goldendale, Wash., qualified in the triple jump with a 44-4.25 effort in his first and only attempt. He finished fourth, one place behind sophomore teammate Aaron Young, Newberg, who jumped 47-7. Rising's main concentration was the long jump where he leapt a 22-6 for third.

Freshman Jonathan Ulmer, Seattle, registered himself for his first post season competition with a second place 15:20.63 in the 5,000 meters. He was just two seconds slower than the winner.

The third men's qualifier was sophomore Kevin Alteneader, Newberg. Alteneader won the 110-hurdles with a 15.81 effort.

WOMEN'S TRACK TAKES EARLY LEAD IN DISTRICT CHAMPIONSHIPS

The George Fox College women took an early lead in the 1993 NAIA District 2 track championships with second, third and fourth place finishes in the heptathlon.

The district meet will be held May 7-8 at Linfield College, but the multi-events were held at Linfield Monday and Tuesday (April 19-20).

SENSATIONAL STENBERG

GFC senior Marlyss Stenberg, Canyonville, Ore., finished second with a GFC record 4,556 points. The winner was defending champion Jennifer Harman of Southern Oregon, who scored 4,597. "The 200 meters was the difference," said GFC head coach Wes Cook. Stenberg's 26.7 was a little more than a second slower than Harman's 25.6. The difference gave Harman 94 points more than Stenberg in the event.

Stenberg produced personal records in the 100 high hurdles, high jump, 200 meters and javelin enroute to the improving her old record of 4,473, set this season. Her 2:22.9 in the 800 meters and 200 meters time both met district qualifying standards. Stenberg finished eighth in the heptathlon at last year's national meet.

Stenberg's versatility has made her the most productive Lady Bruin ever at district meets. Her eight second-place points give her the GFC career district scoring record. Her 103 1/2 points edges the 103 of 1992 grad Jill Beals. Her total should grow. She has qualified in four district events and will run relays.

STEPHENS STARTS STRONG

In her first collegiate heptathlon, freshman Liz Stephens, Bellevue, Wash., grabbed third with 3,870. Fourth went to sophomore Tina Stauffer, Salem, who scored 3,834.

"That's very good for Tina," said Cook. "It's a good start for Liz."

GFC, the defending district champion, earned 18 points, SOSC 10, Eastern Oregon 2, and Western Oregon 1.

GFC WOMEN'S TRACK TAKES EARLY LEAD IN DISTRICT CHAMPIONSHIPS

The George Fox College women have an early lead in the 1993 NAIA District 2 track championships with second, third and fourth place finishes in the heptathlon.

The district meet will be held May 7-8 at Linfield College, but the multi-events were held at Linfield Monday and Tuesday (April 19-20).

SENSATIONAL STENBERG

GFC senior Marlyss Stenberg, Canyonville, Ore., finished second with a GFC record 4,556 points. The winner was defending champion Jennifer Harman of Southern Oregon, who scored 4,597. "That's very good for Tina," said Cook. "It's a good start for Liz."

GFC, the defending district champion, earned 18 points, SOSC 10, Eastern Oregon 2, and Western Oregon 1.

Gortler, a transfer from Lane Community College, finished in 13.15. Bentley, from Yamhill, Ore., finished in 27.32. The 400-meter relay team of Stenberg, Dahl, Tina Golden, and Stephens won their race at 52.23. The Wolves were disqualified when a handoff wasn't made.

Freshman Sara Luckensmeyer qualified for district in the high jump with a 5-2 effort in her first collegiate competition. Luckensmeyer, from Cashmere, Wash., has spent the beginning of the season recuperating from knee surgery.

Cyrus Qualifies For National 3,000 Meters At Stanford Meet

A fourth place finish in the 3,000 meter run at the Stanford University Track and Field Festival, earned Newberg's Juli Cyrus a return to the NAIA national meet.

Cyrus, a junior on the George Fox College track team, finished in 10:09.76, besting the 10:20.24 national standard.

It wasn't a personal best for Cyrus who ran for the Lady Bruins at the national meet last season. "She's been sick and struggling," said GFC head coach Wes Cook. "Her time was pretty good for right now."

Cyrus was one of more than two dozen GFC athletes who competed at the Stanford meet Friday-Saturday (March 26-27).

George Fox's highest finish in a meet dominated by NCAA Division I teams came from senior Cheryl Shepherd, Langlois, Ore. She took second in Friday's javelin competition with a season's best throw of 137-3. The NAIA national qualifying standard is 140-0.

Two GFC women qualified for the NAIA District 2 meet. One week after qualifying for the national heptathlon, senior Marlyss Stenberg, Canyonville, Ore., topped the district standard in the 400 meter low hurdles. She finished in 1:06.45. Stenberg also produced a season best in the 100 meter high hurdles at 15.8.

Junior Michelle Brown, Sherwood, Ore., qualified in the 5,000 meters with a 18:25.3 time. In the same race, sophomore Stephanie Rosen, Newberg, just missed the 19:40.9 qualifying time with a 19:41.3 effort.

Junior Jonathan Huwe, Bigfork, Mont., threw the discus 147-7, under the national standard of 158-0.

Jason Bingham, a junior from Medford, Ore., tossed the javelin 158-4 for an eighth place finish, but it wasn't among his best. "They were throwing off grass and it was wet," said Cook.

Saturday, the sprint medley teams ran to fourth place finishes before the weather turned wet.

The women finished in 4:25.7, using a team of senior Amy Dahl, Newberg; Stenberg; Vansise; and Smith.

Lindbo and Lewis combined with junior Dennis Sinclair, Eugene, and sophomore Josh Kneeshaw, Colfax, Wash., to complete their race in 3:36.6.

Despite the pouring rain, the women took fifth in the two mile relay with a time of 9:47.43. "It was a monsoon," said Cook. VanSise, Smith, Kintrea, and Sheryl Van Tassel, Hong Kong, made up the team.

The men's two mile relay team of Potts, Lindbo, Kneeshaw and Morse finished in seventh in 7:54.56. "They had good solid efforts," said Cook.

As the weather worsened, Cook said he recommended they not beat themselves up by entering additional races. They took his advice. "I haven't been this wet in years," he said afterwards.

Saturday, sophomore Tina Stauffer, Salem, scored 3,408 points and finished sixth of 13 in the Linfield Heptathlon. She finished second in the 800 meters and shot put.

Stenberg Sets New GFC Heptathlon Record

GFC Track Starts Spring By Qualifying Two For Nationals

With athletes spread out in four meets between Santa Barbara, Calif., and Monmouth, Ore., the George Fox College track and field teams qualified two for national competition and seven for the district meet.

Senior Marlyss Stenberg went to Chico, Calif., to qualify for the NAIA national meet in Abbotsford, B.C., May 20-22. The Canyonville, Ore., product competed Friday and Saturday (March 19-20) at the Chico State Multi-Events and set a new George Fox heptathlon record with 4,473 points. It easily surpassed the national standard of 4,000 and gave her a victory over the district's defending champion, Jennifer Harman of Southern Oregon State College. Without a win in any of the individual events, Stenberg used consistent solid performances to finish second out of the 11 competitors, nine points from Chico State's Erin McLaughlin, the winner. Stenberg's lowest finish in the seven events was a fourth place showing in the shot put.

Teammate Cheryl Shepherd, Langlois, Ore., finished seventh with 3,394 points.

Sophomore Aaron Young, Newberg, turned in stellar performances at the University of Oregon Preview on Saturday. The 1991 4A high jump and triple jump state champion bested UO competitors while winning both events. He cleared 6-8 in the high jump and hopped to a district qualifying 46-2.75 in the triple jump. Young had previously qualified for the district meet in the high jump.

In Santa Barbara at Westmont College's Easter Relays on Saturday, GFC got its best results from the 3,000 meter race. Junior Michelle Brown, Sherwood, Ore., finished third overall and qualified for the national race with a 10:15.20 time. The standard is 10:20.24.

In the same race, three Lady Bruin underclassmen beat the district measure of 11:09.7. Freshman Sandy Taylor, Eagle, Idaho, finished sixth at 10:53.53, Sophomore Stephanie Rosen, Newberg, followed her at seventh with 10:56.25, and freshman Dawn Hartwig, Trenton, Mich.,

Junior Juli Cyrus, Newberg, produced a season's best in the 1,500 at 4:47.7, seven seconds off the national standard. She finished third and Campbell took fifth at 4:54.8. Both have qualified for the district meet previously.

With a time of 52.12, the women took third in the 4 x 100 relay. Running were senior Amy Dahl of Newberg, Smith, Van Tassel and Kintrea.

Junior Kristy Fleming produced the Lady Bruins' highest finish – third with a throw of 126-8 in the javelin. It's good enough to send her to the district meet.

On the men's side at Western Oregon, sophomore Rob Rising, Goldendale, Wash., won the long jump with a 21-9.5 leap. Sophomore Torrey Lindbo, Colfax, Wash., took first in the second heat of the 800 meters at 1:55.63. Both previously had qualified for the district meet.

Stenberg, from Canyonville, Ore., won the second heat of the 100 meter high hurdles with a time of 16.3. Kintrea, from Portland, Ore., finished fourth in the 800 meters at 2:22.4. A 1,500 meter time of 4:50.6 was fast enough to qualify Newberg's Cyrus. Hers was the fastest NAIA time.

The 4 x 400 meter relay team of Kintrea, Stenberg, Portland senior Marne VanSise, and junior Hannah Smith, Lakeside, Ore., won their race at 4:08.6.

"The women finished the meet on a high note," said George Fox coach Wes Cook.

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Already a national qualifier in the 5,000 meters, Jonathan Morse broke the district standards in two other events: the 800 and 1,500. George Fox College racewalker Kristin Thomas competed in her first-ever race and qualified twice for the NAIA national championships. Thomas surpassed the national 1,500 and 3,000 meter standards at Sunday's (March 7) Oregon State 20K Championships at Willamette University.

GFC Grad Walks Into Sixth At USA Indoor Track And Field Championships.

George Fox College graduate Vance Godfrey's walking has taken him to New York City.

At the USA Indoor Track and Field Championships Friday (Feb. 26) in Madison Square Garden, he placed sixth out of 15 in the 5,000 meter racewalk. Godfrey finished the race in 21:18.

"I'm happy with it. I finished a race at that level," said the 1992 graduate.

Godfrey competed in the Olympic Trials last summer, but was disqualified because of a technique infraction.

"It's been a real struggle to refine my technique," he said. "When you get going really fast, it's a fine line. You have to cut it close."

Godfrey qualified for the competition by finishing 5:39 in the 1,500 meter racewalk at the Portland Indoor on Feb. 19. National qualifying standard was 5:45.

Godfrey sets his goals race-by-race, but he dreams of competing in the Olympics.

"I need to face each meet as a chance to improve," he said. "I can't look too far ahead. 1996 (the next Olympic year) is a long time away."

Godfrey's immediate goals are to compete in the World Cup Trials and qualify for the outdoor nationals. The 20 kilometer World Cup trials are in Washington, D.C., at the end of March. The World Cup championships will be held at Monterey, Mexico, in April. The outdoor national meet is in Eugene in June. The meet is the equivalent of the Olympic Trials in an Olympic year.

Godfrey is competing for Athletes in Action, a division of Campus Crusade for Christ. His teammate from Athletes in Action won both the indoor national meet and the Olympic Trials.

Godfrey began his racewalking career in 1981 when he was in the sixth grade. His interest in racewalking began through the AAU Junior Olympics.

"It was something I was good at," he said. I didn't train for it, but did it at races and just did well."

In the spring semester of 1988, Godfrey walked onto the George Fox track team without a scholarship and began to train. After four consecutive NAIA District 2 championships, he placed

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fifth at the NAIA national race his senior year and finished an All-American. He placed eighth, ninth, and seventh in the nation the three previous years.

Godfrey lives in Independence, Ore., and works part time for U.S. Bank in McMinnville. He trains twice a week with the GFC track team.

Freshman Geoff Olson, Yelm, Wash., met the national qualifying standard for the marathon while running the Seattle Half-Marathon at the end of November.

Chuy Rome, Hermiston, Ore., is an all-state 800 meters runner. His bests include 1:57.52 in the 800 and 4:11 in the 1,500. "He has the talent to come in and do well," says Cook. "In a couple of years, he could be a national qualifier."

Cook says all-state triple jumper John Smith has the versatility to make him one of NAIA District 2's best decathletes. Smith, from North Bend High in Lakeside, Ore., is the brother of junior cross country and track Lady Bruin, Hannah Smith. "He's a great athlete," says Cook. "He'll be a good one for Aaron (Young, the Bruins sophomore jumper)." Smith has cleared 6-4 in the high jump and gone 22-1 in the long jump and 46-9.5 in the triple jump.

The Bruins get a state champion in Duane Londagin, from Pacific High in Bandon. Londagin was the 1989 class A high jump champ after being the runner-up the year prior. Last season, he won the NWAACC with a career best of 6-8. Cook says he has excellent potential for the decathlon. Londagin has long jumped 20-9 and pole vaulted 12-6.

A glance at the George Fox College women's track recruits reads like a "Who's Who" listing of Oregon and Washington all-state athletes.

GFC has 14 incoming elite-level athletes to replace two district scorers and a national champion.

After four years, three 10,000 meter NAIA titles and 13 All-American honors, Jill Jamison Beals no longer leads the Lady Bruins.

Although "nobody can replace Jill," Cook has another gem from the Emerald City of Seattle - Jenny Campbell, a 1992 graduate of Highline High School. She enters with "the best high school distance credentials ever recruited to GFC," says Cook.

Although just 5-1, Campbell was the 2A state runner-up in the 1,600 meters and third in the 3,200 this year. "She runs with an incredibly big heart," said Cook.

A fourth place finisher at the state cross country meet with a time of 17:43 over three miles, Campbell was heavily recruited by NAIA and NCAA schools. "She has a lot of potential," says Cook. "She's never been in a program with women (of her talent). A 3.6 honor student and an assistant for the Special Olympics soccer program, Campbell received the Seattle Times Athlete of the Week award three times. Her best times of 60 in the 400, 2:21 in the 800, and 4:47 in the 1,500 would rank her in the top ten for all-time GFC women. She is a liberal arts major.

Long distance events have stood out as the Lady Bruin track teams forte since Cook arrived. This year he expects his high jumpers to raise some eyebrows and break some records. "It's high jump city," he proclaims.

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Cook can point to six of his jumpers capable of producing a new GFC record. That includes Tina Golden, a Portland sophomore who as a freshman two years ago set the standard at 5-5.

Four of the high jumpers are newcomers.

The Oregon 3A 1991 and 1992 state champion from Sherwood High School, Heidi Wilkerson already has jumped high enough to score at the NAIA national meet. A foreign language major, she owns the best jump of the bunch - 5-7.

Sara Luckensmeyer stands 6-1 and she's jumped 5-6. If she can improve any at all, Cook says she'll be a national scorer. Senior year injuries kept her from all-state status last year. A 1992 graduate from Cashmere, Wash., Luckensmeyer will be a pre-med major.

From Clatskanie, Ore., comes Gennie Sluder, who does the sprints as well as the jumps. Clatskanie High School's 1991-92 student body president has personal records of 5-4 in the high jump and 15-10 in the long jump. She has run the 100 in 13.3, the 200 in 27.05, and has run a quick 59.0 in the 400. She will be a business management major.

One of two 1990 Newberg graduates who transferred to GFC from Clackamas CC, Kathy Muck is the sixth potential record-breaker. A versatile athlete who could do the heptathlon, Muck was a Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges (NWAACC) all-star high jumper with a personal record of 5-3. She will be a liberal arts major.

The other Newberg HS alum, Stephanie Rosen, will run the long distances. Rosen was seventh in the NWAACC and one of the top three runners on the 1990 and 1991 NWAACC champion cross country teams. Mononucleosis sidelined the liberal arts major from the 1992 track season.

Another athlete entering with physical problems is Katie Meyer of Camarillo High and Moorpark Community in Camarillo, Calif. Meyers best times include 66 in the 400, 5:30 in the 1600, and 11:32 in the 3,200. She has been a California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Southern Sectional finalist twice in cross country. "She's had a lot of trouble with her legs," says Cook. "We're going to have to nurse her back to health." A 1991 graduate with a 3.97 gpa, Meyers will major in chemistry and mathematics.

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Cross country/track runner Dawn Hartwig brings all-state credentials from Michigan. A 1992 grad of Trenton High in Detroit, Mich., Hartwig finished fourth in her state cross country meet. In track, the biology major has bests of 2:29 in the 800, 5:26 in the 1,600 and 11:55 in the 3,200.

With the exception of a 100 meter hurdles victory and top three finishes in the 400 meter run and hurdles, the Lady Bruins made little noise in the district short sprints last season.

1992 Yamhill-Carlton grad Billie Bentley brings hope. Although she missed the 1992 season with an ankle injury, Bentley was a 3A all-state sprinter in 1991. She earned fifth place finishes in the 200 meters and long jump. She has run the 100 meters in 13.0, the 200 in 26.3, and the 400 in 60.1. Bentley plans to be a biology major.

A couple of Lady Bruin basketball players will come off the court and onto the track in March.

An all-state hurdler at Newport High in Bellevue, Wash., Liz Stephens is a potential heptathlete. "She's a diamond in the rough in the multi-events," says Cook. A three-time state competitor, Stephens took sixth in the 300 low hurdles as a junior. She is a business major.

Kristy Fleming from Aberdeen, Wash., through Lower Columbia Community, will attempt to return to throwing the javelin. Cook says it has been three years since the Lady Bruin's future basketball center threw competitively, but if she matches her 124-4 personal best from high school, she'll score at district. Fleming is a physical therapy major.

Another javelin thrower, Cindi Vetter strengthens GFC in a district where the javelin throwers took first, third, and eighth in nationals. A freshman from Woodburn High, Vetter has one of the state's best marks with a throw of 128-4. A behavioral science major, she has also putted the shot 36-5.

An all-state shot putter at Bellevue Christian High in Washington, Leah Johanson is one of the Northwest's best "multiple throwers" according to Cook. Her bests include 40-0 in the shot, 123-0 in the discus, and 135-4 in the javelin. Johanson will be a science major.

1993 GFC Women's Track And Field Outlook

After a record-breaking 1992 season, what will the George Fox College women's track and field team do for an encore?

"Anything's possible," says sixth-year coach **Wes Cook**, the 1992 district Coach of the Year. "We're better than we were a year ago. Whether that's good enough, I don't know."

Last season at the NAIA District 2 championships, the Lady Bruins pocketed wins in every event from 800 to 5,000 meters and romped to their first-ever title with a district-record 179 points. Then they followed 13-time All-American distance specialist **Jill Jamison Beals** to a national top-10 finish in Abbotsford, Canada.

Can GFC come up with a repeat performance – without the graduated Beals and three others out of GFC's top seven district scorers?

The cross country team survived a season without Beals: ranking No. 1 all season and finishing as national runner-up.

Cook has a cross country and indoor track All-American on his roster. Junior **Juli Cyrus**, Newberg, ran right with Beals last season, winning the district 1,500 meters and finishing as runner-up in the 3,000 and 5,000 meters. She entered fourth-ranked in the national 5,000 meter race, but was forced to pull out after a fall in a lead pack collision. She began this year well, just missing a school record while winning the Jan. 29 Eugene Indoor 1,500 meter race.

The other Lady Bruins around Cyrus will have to step up in a sport geared to their team's traditional weakness.

"Track is a speed-based sport," says Cook. "Our women have survived because of their dominance in the distance events." He isn't sure how long it will be so. "It will be hard for us to continue to dominate. Linfield demonstrated (with a second place showing at the district cross country meet) they can break us up."

Another cross country All-American, senior **Debbie Kintrea**, Portland, is the defending 800 meter district champion. At the national meet, she reached the finals and finished seventh. After a

successful fall season, Cook says she may consider the 1,500 meters.

Senior heptathlete **Marlyss Stenberg**, Canyonville, Ore., is GFC's third returning district champion. She won the district 100 meter high hurdles. Stenberg did a little of everything for the Lady Bruins last season, finishing eighth in the national heptathlon. She is only a district second place finish from overtaking Beals as GFC's top district meet career scorer.

Three other Lady Bruins have national championship experience.

Senior **Cheryl Shepherd**, Langlois, Ore., competed at Abbotsford, taking eighth in the javelin. At district she took second in the javelin and sixth in the shot put.

After qualifying for her second national meet, junior **Michelle Brown**, Sherwood, Ore., missed the end of the 1992 season with an injury. Following an All-American cross country season, she will try to improve on her third place finish in the 1991 district 5,000 meter race and return to the national meet.

Senior **Angela Murrell**, Silverton, Ore., ran in the 5,000 meter national preliminaries after earning a fifth place finish in the district 3,000 and 5,000 meter races last spring.

Sophomore **Tina Golden**, Portland, sat out last season after setting the school high jump record at 5-foot-5 as a freshman. She finished third in district. A preseason injury has temporarily grounded her.

Among Cook's recruits are seven all-state athletes who will give debut performances this season.

Freshman **Leah Johanson**, Bellevue, Wash., held one of Washington's best marks in the javelin at 135-4 and won the 1A state title in shot put for Bellevue Christian High. Her shot put best is 40 feet, one-half inch. "She's one of the best multiple throwers in the Northwest," says Cook.

Freshman **Gennie Sluder**, Clatskanie, Ore., was all-state in 1991 as a high jumper and a 1992 state competitor in sprints and relays. Her high jump personal record is 5-4.

Jenny Campbell, a freshman from Highline High in Seattle, Wash., brings all-state credentials in the 1,600 and 3,200 races.

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The top sprinter among Oregon 3A high schools during the 1985 and 1986 seasons is now a Lady Bruin. **Terri Gortler**, a transfer from Lane Community, set state records in the 100 and 200 meter races while at Siuslaw High.

In the sprints and long jump, freshman **Billie Bentley**, Yamhill, Ore., was all-state in 1991, but was injured in 1992.

The same occurred to freshman **Sara Luckensmeyer**, Cashmere, Wash., an all-state high jumper. If she can match her 5-6 high jump best, she'll be at the top of the district.

Three join from George Fox's women's basketball team. Freshman **Liz Stephens**, Newport, Wash., was all-state in 1991 in the 100 high hurdles and 300 low hurdles. "She is an excellent athlete with strong heptathlete potential," says Cook. Her personal record in the 400 is 59.6.

Junior **Kristy Fleming**, Aberdeen, Wash., transferred from Lower Columbia Community where there is no track program. In 1988, she was a state finalist in the javelin. Her best throw is 124-4.

An all-Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges high jumper, junior **Kathie Muck**, Newberg, has transferred from Clackamas Community. She has jumped 5-3.

From across the Pacific Ocean comes **Sheryl Van Tassel**, Hong Kong. Cook says she was one of the top-ranked 800 meter runners in her age group in the western Pacific area. Her top time is 2:17.82.

Cook feels Western Oregon poses the stiffest challenge to a GFC repeat. "They were third last year and have most of their talent back," he says. Southern Oregon also will be tough. "They're going to have to be dealt with." He says Linfield, with its strong long distance crew, will be improved.

The curtain has come up on the GFC season. March 6th, the GFC teams competed in the Lewis & Clark Invitational.

George Fox College men's track team hobbles off the starting blocks into the 1993 season.

"It would be nice if we were healthy," understates sixth-year coach Wes Cook.

Although Cook estimates half his team are nursing injuries, GFC returns 13 athletes who scored 60 of the college's 89 points at the NAIA District 2 meet. Two of the Bruins' three national scorers are back. With the addition of 14 new recruits, the Bruins will attempt to improve upon their fourth place district finish. Among the newcomers are three all-state athletes and the top high jumper among Northwest community colleges.

Back in Cook's fold are seven Bruins with national championship experience. Senior racewalker **David Thomas**, Newberg, holds the highest credentials. He returned from the 1992 national NAIA meet in Abbotsford, Canada, with two All-American awards. One came from his fourth place finish in the 10,000 meter racewalk and the other from his 3.75 grade point average that produced an Academic All-American Scholar-Athlete honor. Illness has hampered him through the early season.

GFC's other 1992 All-American, **Brian Hartenstein**, ended his senior season having earned three consecutive District 2 championships and a sixth place national finish in the 400-meter hurdles.

Sophomore **Erik Gibson**, Seattle, Wash., scored with an eighth place finish, but missed All-American status in the 3,000 meter steeplechase. Senior **Ed Sloan**, Newberg, reached the national meet in the same race.

The Bruins forte is in the distance events. "Our strengths, as usual, are the 400 (meters) on up," says Cook. GFC has just two returning national competitors who didn't run or walk.

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Junior **Jonathan Huwe**, Bigfork, Mont., was the district's top discus man in 1992 and finished ninth in the nation.

Former Newberg High standout and 4A state champion, sophomore **Aaron Young**, did not place at the national meet, but led the Bruins in scoring at the district meet. He took second in the high jump and triple jump and sixth in the long jump. This season, a hip injury is taking its toll. "Young's struggling," says Cook.

Senior **Jon Wright**, Caldwell, Idaho, and junior **Jonathan Morse**, Salem, return after All-American cross country seasons. Wright – whose 13th place finish in the cross country national meet was GFC's best ever male effort – begins the season slowed by injury. He made it to Abbotsford last season, competing in the 10,000 meter race.

After an appearance at the 1991 national meet, Morse began last track season with fireworks. He took over the school record in the 1,500 and produced GFC's second best-ever time for the 5,000 meters. Then a nagging hip injury forced him from district and national competition. Cook felt a healthy Morse would have moved the Bruins up at the district meet. "We were Morse away from third," he said.

Morse still runs with pain, but he's finished with the student teaching that kept him from practicing with the cross country team.

Three return off of the four-member 1,600 meter relay team that stunned the district with a split-second victory. Sophomore jumper **Rob Rising**, Goldendale, Wash.; sophomore **Torrey Lindbo**, Colfax, Wash.; junior **Jason Lewis**, Portland, and Hartenstein entered the 1992 district meet with the fifth-best time.

Senior **Rolf Potts**, Wichita, Kan., enters his third season with the Bruins. Potts has scored four times at the district meet, finishing sixth in the 800 and 1,500 meters twice.

Sophomore **Kevin Alteneder**, Newberg should be a factor in the hurdles. "He'll be one of the best in the district," says Cook.

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The Bruins will be looking for district scoring from junior **Jason Strait**, Newberg, as well. Strait finished third in last year's district pole vault competition.

Help is on the way for Young and Rising in the jumping events. Out of Southwest Oregon Community College comes Bandon, Ore., junior **Duane Londagin**, the 1992 high jump champion of the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges. His best jump is 6-8. "He's an excellent athlete with strong decathlon potential," says Cook.

Three freshmen bring all-state credentials. **John Smith**, Lakeside, Ore., will also be a decathlete. "He's an exceptionally gifted athlete," says Cook. Smith – the brother of Lady Bruin Hannah Smith – was all-state in the triple jump in 1991 for North Bend High. His best in the event was 46-9 and a half inch.

He is joined by **Chuy Rome**, Hermiston, Ore., an 800 meter runner, and **Jonathan Ulmer**, who runs the 1,600 and 3,200 meters. Ulmer, from Seattle, Wash., redshirted cross country because of an achilles injury.

Another freshman, **Geoff Olson**, Yelm, Wash., dramatically improved during cross country season. Olson attended the cross country national meet as an alternate and already has met the NAIA national qualifying standard for the marathon.
