Outlook

Run to Daylight

The Bruins will benefit from a good nucleus of returnees as both the men and women look to climb in the NWC.

It is only one more step up for the George Fox University men's cross country team to reach the top of the Northwest Conference, while the Bruins' women's team has a little bit further to climb. Both teams return a solid core of runners, however, who lend hope to their title aspirations in the fall of 2000.

The Bruin men ran second in the conference race to the University of Puget Sound, year-in and year-out one of the nation's best Division III programs. The Bruin women finished fifth in the standings behind league champion Whitman College. The men lost six letterwinners and the women three, but there are nine returning runners for the men and 10 for the women, giving coach Wes Cook a good nucleus around which to work in his newcomers.

"One of the most encouraging signs that came out of our early-season workouts," says the veteran of 13 George Fox cross country seasons, "was the groupings in our time trials. Our top eight women were all within 50 seconds of each other, with three or four others not far behind. Our top eight men, four of them freshmen, were within 44 seconds of each other. It actually helps in a race to have several people close together, even if they're not in, say, the top 10, because they take up several of the counting positions when the scores are added up. Of course, the ideal would be to have them all bunched at the top!"

Men

"Our men did an outstanding job last year," says Cook, pointing to the team's second-place finish in the NWC meet, the highest place for the Bruins since their first conference season in 1995. "We lost a good one in Brandon Workman (a senior who was both All-Conference and All-West Region) and another strong runner in (senior) John Mantalas, but our top two returning runners from last year give us a good foundation."

Cook was referring to **Steve Willmer** (So., Fullerton, Calif.), another All-Conference, All-West Region performer last fall, and **James Eubank** (So.,

Astoria, Ore.), who missed by only one spot of making both All-NWC and All-Region. Willmer has been hampered in the early going by recurring back problems, but is a team leader when he's at 100 per cent with the potential to be a national qualifier.

Michael Owen (So., Anchorage, Alaska), **Jackson Esselman** (Jr., Bellevue, Idaho), and **Forrest Towne** (Jr., Springfield, Ore.) are returning runners who will be counted on to produce plenty of points for the Bruins. Also back and continuing to show improvement every time out are **Nathan Paisley** (Jr., Salem, Ore.), **Nicholas Ryland** (So., Cheyenne, Wyo.), and **Silas Towne** (So., Springfield, Ore.), Forrest's younger brother.

Newcomers who have shown promise in the early going include **Will Vollstedt** (Fr., Portland, Ore.), **Will Howard** (Fr., Caldwell, Idaho), **Bjorn Doskeland** (Fr., Boise, Idaho), and **Matt Burg** (Fr., Newberg, Ore.). **Bret Vogel** (Jr., Hillsboro, Ore.) comes from what Coach Cook calls "a good distance family," but chronic foot problems have hampered his development. Also getting a look will be **Matt Gerber** (So., LaGrande, Ore.).

Women

Injuries played a significant role in the Bruins' frustrating second half of the season in '99, particularly a stress fracture to the left foot of lead runner **Marisa Merritt** (Sr., Portland, Ore.). She appears fully recovered, and will team up with **Jamie McElwain** (Sr., Tigard, Ore.) to give the Bruins a solid one-two punch. Three other returning

runners being counted on for good seasons — **Mimi Van Hooser** (So., Oxbow, Ore.), **Laurel Starr** (Jr., Yakima, Wash.), and **Rebecca Rising** (Jr., Sanger, Calif.) — have fought injuries in the preseason workouts, but will make a positive impact once they are fully recovered.

Colleen Forbes (Jr., Jackson, Wyo.) "has been our most pleasant surprise," says Cook. "She runs track for us and has always been a sprinter, but has shown remarkable progress as a distance runner. **Katherine Burley** (So., Portland, Ore.) appears healthy after fighting injuries for four years; she hasn't really run well since her sophomore year in high school."

Other returning letterwinners the Bruins will rely on are **Shannon Larson** (So., Forks, Wash.), **Kirsten Norgaard** (Jr., Everett, Wash.), **Rosie Ofstie** (Jr., Amity, Ore.), and **Melissa McKenzie** (So., Colorado Springs, Colo.).

Janelle Goeres (Fr., Sams Valley, Ore.) heads a list of six newcomers who will get a shot at helping the team. Goeres was a 3A All-State performer as a senior with a personal record time of 19:02. Also being counted on will be **Cheri Laulainen** (Fr., Ridgefield, Wash.), **Emily Martinez** (So., Gresham, Ore.), **Elizabeth Moyer** (Fr., Camarillo, Calif.), **Tiffany Nelson** (Fr., Kent, Wash.), and **Tamara Newhouse** (Jr., Dundee, Ore.).

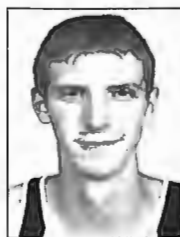

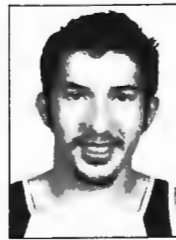

Wes Cook

In his first 13 years as head coach of the George Fox University men's and women's cross country and track and field teams, Wes Cook turned the Bruins' name into a nationally recognized powerhouse in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). Now, with the Bruins having completed their first year as full-time members of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), there is every reason to expect more of the same with Cook at the helm.

All four programs under Cook's leadership regularly participated in NAIA national meets and often finished among the top 15 teams in the nation. In 1992, following the men's fifth-place and women's second-place finishes at the national meet, *Cross Country Express* magazine declared his cross country program best in the nation at the NAIA level. In George Fox's final year in the National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA), his women's cross country team won the 1988 national title with a record low score of 19.



Cook was named National Coach of the Year in women's cross country by the NCCAA in 1988 and the NAIA in 1992. In the West Coast region (NAIA Area I), he won Coach of the Year honors for men's cross country in 1990 and 1992. At the district and conference level, he has been named Coach of the Year 12 times, at least once in each sport he coaches, including last year's Northwest Conference Women's Coach of the Year in track and field for guiding his charges to the conference championship. In 1992-93, he was named NAIA District 2 Coach of the Year for all women's sports.

Cook also was involved with the NAIA for several years as a national rater and served on the NAIA women's track and field games committee.

Cook's athletes won 80 NAIA All-American awards and 53 NAIA All-American Scholar-Athlete awards. In 1995, George Fox was the only school to put both men's and women's teams in the top five of the NAIA cross country national meet team scholastic competition. Last year, five Bruin cross country runners and three track and field athletes were named Academic All-Americans by their respective national coaches' associations. The 2000 women's track team had the second-highest cumulative GPA (3.56) in the country and the men were third (3.25).

A Nebraska native, Cook rose to the rank of Eagle in the Boy Scouts of America before becoming a four-time conference track scorer at the University of Northern Colorado. He set the UNC record in the 800 meters and helped the mile relay team

to four consecutive conference titles. He was the national winner of the Holmes Award, given to the most outstanding senior in Alpha Kappa Lambda, a national collegiate fraternity. In 1961, he graduated from UNC with a degree in physical education and history, and earned a Master of Arts in Teaching at Lewis & Clark College in 1975.

Cook served 26 years as a head coach at five high schools in three states. In his 15 years at Gladstone (Ore.) High School, his track and cross country teams finished as state champion or runner-up 10 times. His boys' cross country team went undefeated for 51 straight dual meets, and he was named Oregon 2A (now 3A) High School Coach of the Year for all sports three times. In 1983, his son Toby set the Oregon 3A state record in the 1,500-meter race.

A member of the U.S. Track Coaches Association, Cook has served as president of the Oregon Track and Cross Country Coaches Association and the Oregon Association of The Athletics Congress (now U.S. Track and Field). Active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and summer track and basketball camps, he has led four international tour teams and traveled to 15 countries. A frequent speaker at national clinics and seminars, he has also authored articles in various state and national publications.

Cook is associate professor of health and human performance at George Fox University, and has three adult children: Tammy, Toby and Brad.

About the University

George Fox is growing in size and reputation. Enrollment has more than quadrupled in the last 15 years, increasing from 549 in 1986 to 2,636 in the fall of 2000.

In the same time span, George Fox has been named one of "America's Best Colleges" 13 times by *U.S. News & World Report*. In 2000, George Fox ranked second overall and first in aca-

demie reputation among Western regional liberal arts colleges. The magazine also named the University one of the region's best values among schools in its category.

George Fox offers unique programs to its students. Every incoming freshman is given a computer to use and keep upon graduation. When students reach their third year, they are eligible for the

Juniors Abroad program, in which the University pays transportation costs for an overseas study tour.

Early Willamette Valley Quaker settlers established Pacific Academy in 1885. The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction. In 1949, because of the many colleges in the Northwest with "Pacific" in their name, Pacific College was renamed George Fox College in honor of the founder of the Friends (Quaker) Church.

In 1996, with the addition of Western Evangelical Seminary, George Fox became a university, offering students a Christ-centered education and the choice of 35 undergraduate majors and nine graduate degrees. On Jan. 1, 2000, the seminary name was changed to George Fox Evangelical Seminary.

George Fox's most prominent alumnus is the late President Herbert Hoover, who attended the school while it was known as Pacific Academy.



Background on the Bruin Nickname

George Fox's Bruin nickname comes from a real bear captured in 1887 just two years after Pacific Academy (the University's predecessor) was established. The small cub was found in the Coast Range foothills west of Carlton when its mother was shot. The young cub was brought to campus by a student and later lived with a faculty member.

When it grew to adulthood, it was kept in a pit in Hess Creek Canyon south of the campus. It escaped one too many times and was turned into steak for the dining table and the hide preserved on a frame and displayed in an early campus museum. When the hide deteriorated several years later, it was taken to a campus furnace room to be destroyed, but the framework proved a problem in dismantling so it was left sitting in a corner.

Students found the old Bruin skin later and began skirmishes over ownership, a tradition that continues today. "Bruin Junior," a replica, under a set of guidelines passed down for years, is fought over periodically in class competition, with the class able to physically drag the Bruin replica off campus declared the rightful owner until next "flashed."

Even with the Bruin tradition, somewhere along the line, the "Quaker" tag for athletic teams came into popularity with sportswriters because of the University's church affiliation, and that nickname was used, along with the mascot "Foxy George," a little fox with a Quaker hat. Both gained acceptance for a period in the 1950s and 1960s until a vote of faculty, students and administration in 1970 reinstated the Bruin nickname to its rightful place.



George Fox University Bruin Athletics

Intercollegiate athletics are an important part of George Fox University, home to one of the Northwest's most successful small-college sports programs. Winning programs, however, are accompanied by a proper balance between academics and athletics: George Fox teams are members of the Northwest Conference and compete in Division III of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, in which need and academic ability, not athleticism, determine scholarships and financial aid.

At George Fox University, intercollegiate athletic competition provides a practical application of what is learned in classrooms and practices. Student-athletes compete for conference and national titles at a Christ-centered university where professors and coaches help them grow in mind, body and spirit. The values of athletics are integrated with the goals of Christian higher education in a process that includes

- physical conditioning
- managing emotions
- courage
- teamwork
- cooperation
- being gracious in winning and losing

More than 15 percent of George Fox's traditional undergraduate students participate in the school's 13 varsity sports, seven for women and six for men. Their records over the years serve as shining testimonies to the administration's conviction that an institution can play for the glory of God, follow the rules and ethics of its governing organizations, and be successful on the fields and courts of competition.

Consider that:

- George Fox has earned district or conference titles in nine sports during the 1990s.

- George Fox athletes have earned more than 250 All-American and All-American Scholar-Athlete honors.
- Nine of the 11 coaches on staff have been named district or conference Coach of the Year at least once.
- George Fox coaches have held their positions for an average of nearly eight years, and together have accumulated more than 1,000 collegiate wins.
