Bruins Threaten Home Run Record

Six former first-team all-Northwest Conference players – including two All-Americans – will lead an assault on the George Fox record book in 1999.

The Bruins return 22 letter-winners from last season's 25-13 club that pounded a school-record 58 home runs.

"I wouldn't want to pitch to them," says fourth-year head coach Pat Bailey.

The Long-Ball Line-Up

Batting No. 1: Outfielder/pitcher Ryan Muñoz (Sr., Aloha HS, Aloha, Ore.) was a first-team all-conference pick in 1997, but sat out last season with a back injury. A multi-dimensional player, he holds the school record for stolen bases (29) in a season and ranks in the George Fox top-five in at-bats (179), hits (65) and runs scored (54). "He plays the game the way it's supposed to be played," says Bailey.

Batting No. 2: Second baseman David Farrell (Jr., Foster HS, Seattle, Wash.) replaced Muñoz as George Fox's lead-off hitter last year and responded with a stunning sophomore season. He claimed all-conference first-team honors after leading the league with a .443 batting average and ranked fifth in NAIA national statistics with 1.7 hits a game.

Batting No. 3: Catcher Mark Tyler (Sr., Bothell HS, Wash.) won honorable mention All-American honors after finishing second in national statistics in doubles per game (0.5). He hit 20 during the season, claiming a share of the school season record.

Batting No. 4: First baseman/pitcher Nate Barnett (Sr., Arlington HS, Wash.) is George Fox's highest honored baseball player in history. The 1997 first-team All-American blasted the school home-run record with 14 last year, ranking 11th in NAIA

national statistics (0.4 per game). Thanks also to his 34 walks, he led the team with a .540 on-base percentage.

Batting No. 5: Third baseman Derek Birley (Jr., Evergreen HS, Battle-ground, Wash.) was the Bruins' top recruit. He hit eight home runs and .386 for Centralia College (Wash.) and was a first-team all-Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges (NWAACC) – Western Division selection. The Bruins graduated three players who combined to hit 14 home runs last season, but Bailey figures Birley has the power to nearly replace them by himself.

Batting No. 6: Shortstop/outfielder Ryan LeBreton (Sr., The Dalles HS, Ore.) has totaled 11 home runs in back-to-back seasons. A 1997 first-team all-league selection, he last year hit nine doubles and drove in 43 RBIs – fifth in the league.

Batting No. 7: Left fielder Chad Hollabaugh (Sr., Lakeridge HS, Lake Oswego, Ore.) is a two-time honorable mention all-conference pick. In 1998, he batted .323 with 12 doubles, six home runs and 35 RBIs.

Batting No. 8: Designated hitter Ryan Mebust (Jr., Lake Washington HS, Redmond, Wash.) was an all-NWAACC DH at Green River Community College.

Batting No. 9: Outfielder Jason Schilperoort (Jr., W.F. West HS, Chehalis, Wash.) batted .327 and drove in 24 runs last year. He also was second in the conference in triples with three.

Going Deep

The Bruins go deeper than their first nine. "We're really talented," Bailey says. "We're deeper than we've ever been. If we have injuries, it will affect us, but not kill us."

Bailey's first option likely will be 1997 first-team all-conference pick Lance Gilmore (Sr., North Bend HS, Coos Bay, Ore.), who can step in as a utility infielder.

Other infielders awaiting their

opportunity are Brian Newman (So., Bellingham HS, Wash.), Sundar Cook (Sr., Juanita HS, Kirkland, Wash.), and Kyle McCain (Sr., W.F. West HS, Chehalis, Wash.).

In the outfield, Gilmore, Rob Mills (Fr., Aloha HS, Ore.), and David Rasmussen (So., Immanuel HS, Selma, Calif.) will provide depth.

On the Mound

"I believe we'll have good defense and we'll hit," says Bailey. "The key to our year will be how we pitch."

The Bruins return all but one of their starters from last year's staff that ranked 20th in the NAIA in fewest earned runs allowed (4.82).

Honorable mention all-conference pitcher Ryan Alvis (Jr., Seattle Christian HS, Kent, Wash.) throws an 89-mile-per-hour fastball and struck out a team high 49 batters last year. "He has the tools to be the best pitcher at George Fox since I've been here," says Bailey.

Kess Romano (Jr., Mountain View HS, Vancouver, Wash.) already has 10 career wins as a Bruin.

Barnett and Ryan Muñoz round out the likely starters.

"If they stay healthy, those four guys will get a lot of innings," predicts Bailey.

Mike Shear (Sr., Junction City HS, Ore.), Paul Andrewjeski (So., Mountain View HS, Wash.), Brody Wilson (Fr., Sheldon HS, Eugene, Ore.) and Schilperoort will provide middle relief and an occasional start.

Closers will be LeBretton and Eric Beasley (Jr., The Dalles HS, Ore.).

Postseason Plans

The Bruins are aiming for their second-ever 30-win season and probably will need to achieve it if they hope to reach the playoffs. George Fox is completing its final year in the NAIA and – although it is a member of the NCAA Div. III Northwest Conference – must rank as one of the

top two NAIA independent teams out of seven in the region to earn a berth in the six-team NAIA Far West Regional Tournament. Getting out of the region will be an even tougher task. The Far West Region includes the NAIA's No. 1- and No. 2-ranked teams in the preseason national poll.

Home Run Record Falls to Bruin Barrage

George Fox's 1998 team swung for the fences and landed in the record book.

The school home run season record of 45 fell by the wayside as the Bruins blasted a remarkable 58 out of ballparks throughout the Northwest.

1997 first-team All-American first baseman/pitcher Nate Barnett contributed 14 to the cause – most ever by a Bruin hitter. Infielder/pitcher Ryan LeBreton became just the third George Fox player to hit more than 10 in a season, finishing with 11 for the second consecutive year.

Despite their heavy hitting, the Bruins were denied a postseason berth for just the second time in the last 11 years. A one-point difference in the regional poll kept the Bruins at home.

George Fox won 17 of its final 20 league games, but the defending Northwest Conference champions finished second in the conference. The Bruins finished with the identical 18-5 league record that won them the 1997 title and were 25-13 overall.

Catcher Mark Tyler won All-American honorable mention after tying the George Fox season record for doubles by hitting his 20th of the year in the Bruins' final regular season game.

As a team, George Fox finished the season with a .336 batting average – just a hair off the school record of .337, set by the 1975 team.

George Fox had four first-team and five honorable mention selections on the 1998 all-Northwest Conference baseball team.

LeBreton and senior pitcher Nate Fast were both selected NAIA All-American Scholar-Athletes.

ATHLETIC AFFILIATION

The landscape of small-college athletics in the Pacific Northwest is undergoing sweeping changes, and George Fox University is in the midst of the transformation.

In the fall of 1994, the University joined the Northwest Conference (NWC), a league of 10 strong academic institutions in Oregon and Washington. That winter, the NWC applied for membership in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division III. The move meant leaving the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), an association George Fox had held membership in since 1965.

George Fox has provisional membership in the NCAA but will continue to compete in NAIA national championships until 1999-2000, when it expects to be eligible for NCAA Division III national championships.

George Fox's men's and women's basketball teams compete in NAIA Division II, while the 11 other sports the University competes in are not divided into divisions by the NAIA.

The NAIA is an autonomous association administering programs leading to 13 men's and 11 women's championships. The NAIA includes about 350 four-year colleges and

universities in 49 states and Canada. They are grouped in nine regions and 44 conferences.

The NCAA administers 80 championships in 21 sports for its 1,201 member institutions, involving nearly 21,000 men and women scholar-athletes. There are more than 350 schools in Division III.

1999 POSTSEASON PLAY

Six teams will play in the NAIA Far West Region Tournament hosted May 14-18 by the champion of the Golden State Athletic Conference (GSAC).

The GSAC and Cascade Collegiate Conference will qualify their champion and runner-up. The other two berths will be awarded to the top-ranked teams among the remaining seven independent teams. The independents are George Fox, Central Washington University, Lewis-Clark State College, The Master's College, St. Martin's College, Simpson College and University of Puget Sound.

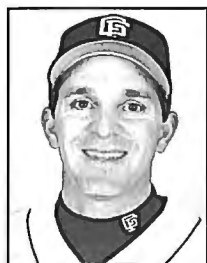
Winner of the regional tournament will advance to the NAIA National Tournament held May 24-28 in Orlando, Fla.

The winning tradition of George Fox baseball continues under fourth-year head coach Pat Bailey.

In his three seasons, George Fox has won one Northwest Conference title and twice finished as conference runner-up. After going 25-16, 29-14 and 25-13, Bailey has the best career winning per-centage (.648) of any coach in the history of the program.

Honors have flowed into the program. On his current 1999 team alone, eight players have been awarded all-conference credentials — six as first-team selections.

In 1997, Bailey was named Northwest Conference Coach of the Year after guiding the Bruins to their eighth conference or district title in the previous 10 years.

Bailey took over the Bruin program immediately after guiding West Linn High School into the Oregon Class 4A state championship game. At West Linn, his teams advanced to the Class 4A state playoffs seven times and in his final season were edged 2-1 in the 1995 state championship game.

Four times Bailey was named Three Rivers League Coach of the Year. He was at West Linn for 10 years as head baseball coach and assistant football coach. His baseball teams won five league titles and reached the Oregon semifinals in 1989, 1991 and 1995. From 1989 to 1995, his combined record as a high school and American Legion baseball coach was 315-105 (.750).

Previous to West Linn, Bailey taught and coached at Willamette High School, Eugene, Ore., for three years.

He has worked at various baseball camps and served as a pitching coach at the University of Portland in 1992.

"George Fox really matches up with me personality-wise and philosophically," says Bailey. "As a coach, I want to make sure every kid is making the most of his God-given talent. I want them to be a class act in the classroom and the community. I want the kids to match the school and my personality. I stress to my team, we're a family. Family members are more important than themselves. If you're going to be a leader, you must be a servant first."

Bailey is a 1974 graduate of Moscow High School in Idaho, where he played football, basketball and was the baseball team's MVP.

A two-year baseball letterwinner at the University of Idaho, Bailey was a starting outfielder and team captain as a senior. He completed his business education degree in 1978. Bailey

also lettered two years in baseball at North Idaho College in Couer d'Alene, Idaho.

Bailey continued playing semiprofessionally until age 28.

He earned a master of education degree in educational administration from the University of Oregon in 1983.

At West Linn, Bailey was a business instructor and in 1994 was named to Who's Who Among America's Outstanding High School Teachers. In 1995, he was one of 30 outstanding educators honored with a 1995 Education Excellence Award, given by Associated Oregon Industries.

At George Fox, Bailey also is assistant director of athletics.

Bailey and his wife, Susan, live in Newberg with their children, Alex, 15, and Ann, 12.

1992 Pacific-10 Northern Division Player of the Year Geoff Loomis is in his fourth year on the George Fox staff as an assistant coach.

He was the University of Portland's MVP in 1992 and was drafted by the Oakland Athletics organization. He

Taylor, 47, came to George Fox in 1971 as a junior forward for the men's basketball team. In 1972-73, he helped the Bruins to their first-ever NAIA District 2 title.

Taylor graduated from George Fox in 1974, named both Outstanding Man in Teacher Education and Outstanding Physical Education Major. He received a master of science degree in education from Linfield College in 1975. While enrolled in graduate courses, he was a George Fox residence hall director.

From 1976 through 1979, Taylor was the Bruin baseball coach while also serving as assistant basketball coach. He worked at a sporting goods retailing firm in 1979-81.

The A.D. was the coach of the women's basketball team from 1981 to 1993, producing a 162-155 record. He also coached George Fox softball from 1981 to 1988 and again in 1990. His teams compiled a 77-99-1 record, and in 1985 he was named NAIA District 2 Coach of the Year.

At George Fox, the athletic director is responsible for athletic department functions, including eligibility and compliance with George Fox, conference, NAIA and NCAA regulations, budgeting, and department and sports center management.

In 1992 Taylor was named NAIA District 2 Administrator of the year. Taylor has three children: Leah, 24, Bree, 19, and Casey, 9. Taylor and his wife, Kathy, live in McMinnville.



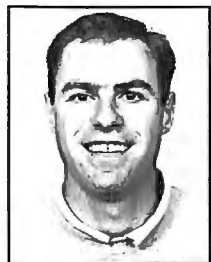
JIM REICHENBACH

The assistant coach was a two-time all-city selection at Cleveland and set the school RBI record with 53. He graduated in 1987 and played at Portland State for two seasons.

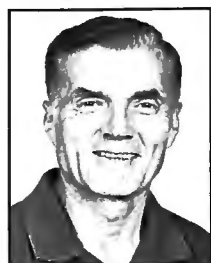
He has coaching experience at Cleveland High and with Newberg's American Legion and Babe Ruth teams.

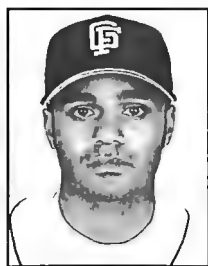

BACKGROUND ON THE BRUIN NICKNAME

George Fox's Bruin nickname comes from a real bear captured in 1887 just two years after Pacific Academy (the University's predecessor) was established. The small cub was found in the Coast Range foothills west of Carlton when its mother was shot. The young cub was brought to campus by a student and later lived with a faculty member.

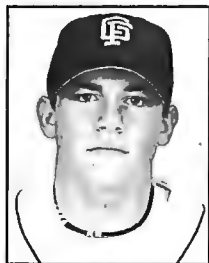
When it grew to adulthood, it was kept in a pit in what is now known as Hess Creek Canyon south of the campus. It escaped one too many times and was turned into steak for the dining table and the hide preserved on a frame and displayed in an early campus museum. When the hide deteriorated several years later, it was taken to a campus furnace room to be destroyed, but the framework proved a problem in dismantling so it was left sitting in a corner.



Students found the old Bruin skin later and began skirmishes over ownership, a tradition that continues today. "Bruin Junior," a replica, under a set of guidelines passed down for years, is fought over periodically in class competition, with the class able to physically drag the Bruin replica off campus declared the rightful owner until next "flashed."

Even with the Bruin tradition, somewhere along the line, the "Quaker" tag for athletic teams came into popularity with sportswriters because of the University's church affiliation, and that nickname was used, along with the mascot "Foxy George," a little fox with a Quaker hat. Both gained acceptance for a period in the 1950s and 1960s until a vote of faculty, students and administration in 1970 reinstated the Bruin nickname to its rightful place.

CURTIS AND MARGARET MORSE COMPLEX

George Fox University baseball, soccer and softball teams have played home games on the Curtis and Margaret Morse Athletic Complex since 1989.

Across from Wheeler Sports Center on Fulton Street and Villa Road, the complex was renovated using a donation from Curtis and Margaret Morse. Using labor from Volunteers on Wheels, new dugouts and a press box were constructed for the baseball field.

The Morse family has a long association with George Fox. Four generations have attended the Newberg school.

The baseball diamond was moved to the current

location in the early '80s when construction on Bauman Auditorium displaced the old field.

The baseball facility continues to improve. In 1991, Smurfit Newsprint Corp., Newberg, donated all lumber for an indoor hitting facility located in the northwest corner of the complex.

The baseball Bruins are tough to beat at Morse Field. In the last three years, they've gone 38-7 in Newberg.

Field dimensions are 335 feet down the left-field line, 375 in the left-center-field alley, 400 to straight-away center, 370 in right center and 330 down the right-field line.

The magazine also has listed the university in its "Top Teaching Schools," "Best Values" and "Most Efficient" categories.

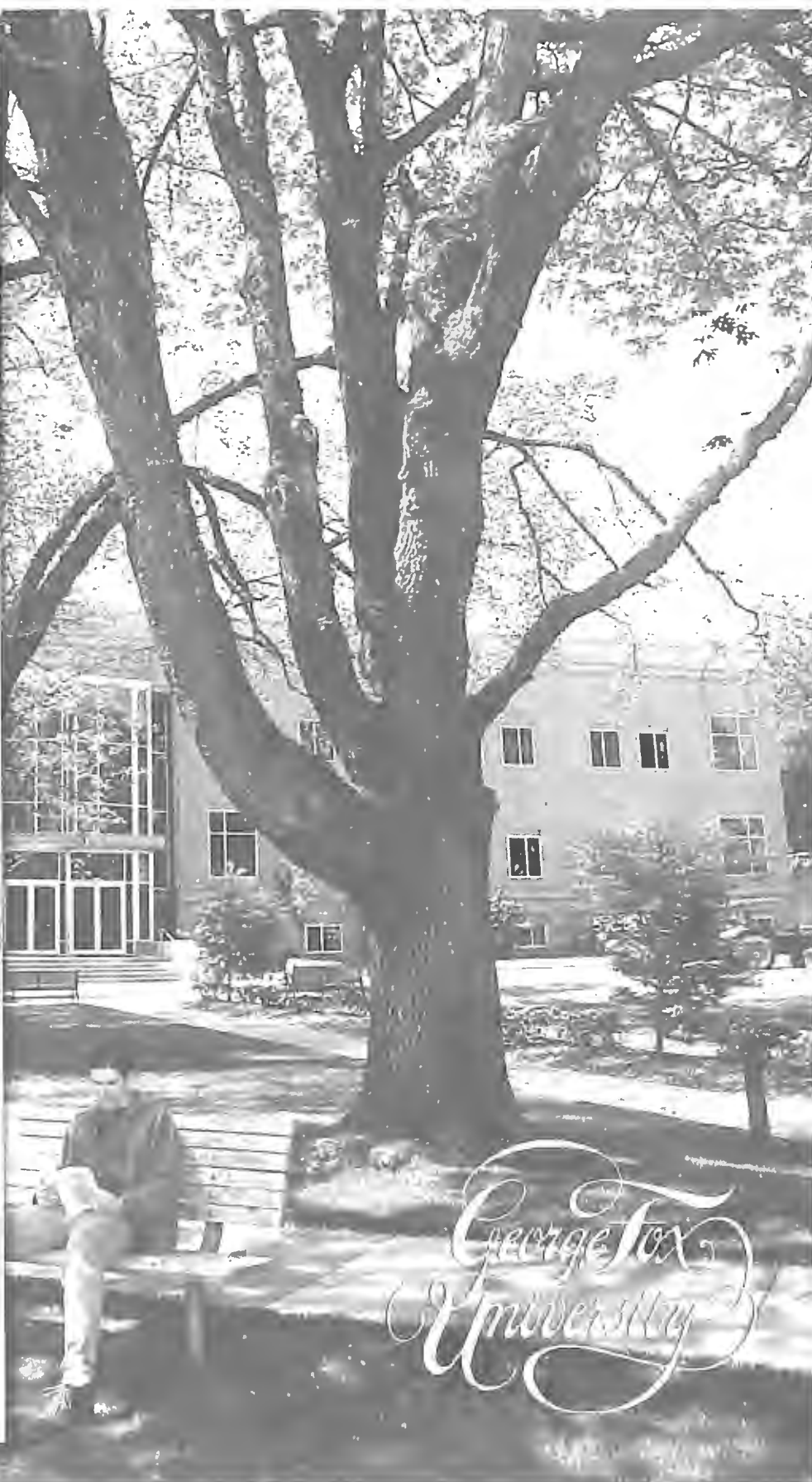

The University's most prominent alumnus is the late President Herbert Hoover, who attended Friends Pacific Academy.



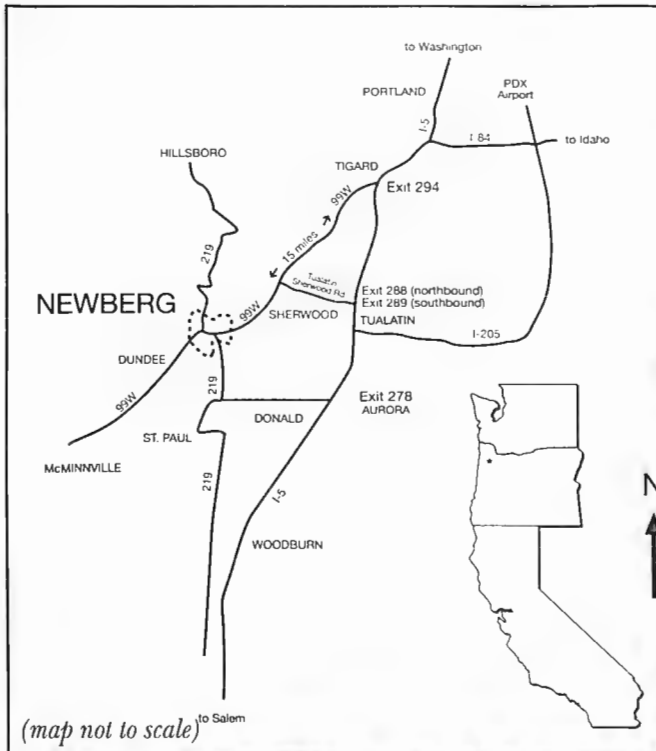
ROUTES TO THE CAMPUS
