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Minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, 1927

FIFTH DAY—10:00 A. M.

1. The thirty-fifth annual assembly of Oregon Yearly Meeting convened at Newberg, Oregon, at 10:00 a.m., Sixth month 9, 1927.

A gracious welcome was extended these Friends with the expressed hope that they might feel free to perform any service the Lord might require at their hands.

John R. Carey responded by saying that he had not come as an official of the Five Years' Meeting but with a concern growing out of the decision of Oregon Yearly Meeting to withdraw from the Five Years' Meeting.

William Perry Haworth spoke of his appreciation of the fellowship and freedom that he had experienced during his stay with us thus far.

8. A communication from London Yearly Meeting giving necessary information to Friends visiting within the limits of that Yearly Meeting was read and directed to be printed in the minutes for those who might need such information.

AMERICAN MINISTERS VISITING ENGLAND

1. We desire to extend a cordial welcome to all Ministering Friends who come from other Yearly Meetings for service amongst us, and to do what we can to further their concern.

Of late, however, there has been so wide a diversity of procedure in regard to the issue of Liberating and Returning Minutes for service of Friends between the United States of America and London Yearly Meeting, that we have thought it desirable to write to the Yearly Meetings on the American Continent and to make some suggestions.

2. Our Meeting for Sufferings, (which is the Executive Committee of our Yearly Meeting,) has a standing Committee, whose duty it is to meet such Ministering Friends as soon as possible after their arrival, and, after hearing what is their special concern, to help them in making plans to carry this out in the best and most effective way. Usually one or more Friends are appointed to keep in touch with them throughout their visit by correspondence, and at the conclusion of their service to report to the Meeting for Sufferings and, if desirable, to arrange for a Returning Minute to be given them.

3. When Friends bring a certificate from their home meeting it is best at once on the arrival to hand or send this to our Recording Clerk at the Central Office in London, and he will then make arrangements.

4. Friends in America will see that it is very desirable that those who wish to have religious service amongst us should be furnished with such Minutes. This practice facilitates helpful service and cordial fellowship.

9. The London General Epistle was read.

10. The Clerk made reports on the matters left in his charge at the last Yearly Meeting.

11. Communications were read and referred as follows: Portland Quarterly Meeting.

REMARKS: There has been no report received from Tacoma Quarterly Meeting. The subject of tithing has often been presented to the people, sometimes by Stewardship committees having charge of morning services and again in opening programs of Sunday School. One inspiring address and six programs have been given. The subject has often been stressed in Sunday Schools and morning services. One Storehouse League has been discontinued. Gains in number of tithers in some meetings is almost if not quite offset by losses in others. In some meetings the Christian Endeavor has made a study of Stewardship.

Since much of the effort of this Department is to stimulate interest, create sentiment, influence mind and character, its accomplishments are very difficult to tabulate, yet we confidently trust this seed-sowing will yield a harvest.

Portland First Church sent out 233 church bulletins to non-residents and shut-ins. Newberg Quarter has made some contribution to Tract Fund, also two subscriptions to religious paper given.

We have placed another Circulating Library in the Yearly Meeting which is the fifth 20 books each, totaling 100 books. Meetings which have used these Libraries express interest and appreciation.

28. The meeting convened according to adjournment.
29. The meeting settled into a short season of devotion in which William Perry Haworth led in fervent prayer.
30. The minutes of the last session were read, corrected and approved.
31. The subject of our Indian work, which was postponed to be brought up at a future session, was discussed at this time, after which the meeting decided to leave the matter in the hands of the Evangelistic Board for the present year.
32. The subject of Foreign Missions claimed the attention of the meeting. The Superintendent, J. Harlan Smith, gave the report, tabulated as nearly as possible from reports at hand. Since Tacoma Quarterly Meeting's report had not been received, the Yearly Meeting Superintendent was granted the privilege of incorporating it when received.

REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSION BOARD

The following report is gathered from four of the Quarterly Meetings of Oregon Yearly Meeting. There has been no report sent from Tacoma.

Some of the Monthly Meetings have made a regular practice of sending the missionaries a letter each month and in return have received several letters direct from the field, which have been very interesting and helpful.

Nearly all of the local meetings maintain a Christian Endeavor Society and they have mostly used the regular missionary lessons once each month.

There have been several missionary books read during the year, but perhaps the most effective mission study work has been done by the regular Study Classes, which have been conducted in Springbrook, Newberg, South Salem, and in the Junior Christian Endeavor at First Church in Portland.

Marion sent a mission box which was valued at five dollars (\$5.00); Scotts Mills sent a box valued at twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) and seven pounds of bandages to China; South Salem sent a box valued at thirty-six dollars (\$36.00); Salem sent a missionary box and one barrel of fruit, also a quantity of hospital supplies to China; Rosedale sent a Christmas box valued at twenty dollars (\$20.00); Rosedale also gave the Tamplins Christmas gifts and seventeen dollars (\$17.00) in money, also five dollars (\$5.00) to Edna Holder in India. The First Friends Church in Portland reports sending a Christmas box to Africa valued at \$58.04. Newberg sent fourteen dollars cash (\$14.00) to the missionaries in Africa. Springbrook reports that the Missionary committee has conducted the midweek prayer meeting once each month. Greenleaf Missionary Society has studied two missionary books and Melba also had a regular study class.

Star Missionary Society held an all day missionary meeting March 4, for prayer for missions to which the Greenleaf Society was invited.

Lois Cope gave a short talk introducing the program.

A pageant put on by members of the Christian Endeavor Society of Springbrook Meeting brought to us very vividly the work of our missionaries in Africa, and the attitude of too many of our members at home.

A message in song was brought by Alice M. Roberts.

The address of the hour was given by Clarence G. McClean, in which he stressed some of the problems that must be faced in mission work.

33. An extract from the report of the American Friends Board of Foreign Missions follow:

EXTRACT FROM REPORT OF THE AMERICAN FRIENDS BOARD OF FOREIGN
MISSIONS FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 31, 1927
Africa

The eyes of the missionary world have been focused anew on Africa by the Le Zoute Conference held in September, 1926. Missionaries from all parts of Africa, government officials, Mission board secretaries, and educators from America, England and the Continent spent a week in concentrated study of the Africa which now is, and the new Africa which is to be. Elizabeth Haviland, who was on her way to East Africa to begin her service with Friends in Kenya Colony, and George G. and Lyra T. Wolkins of New England, attended the Conference.

In the area surrounding the Kitosh station Friends have evidenced a spirit of evangelism. Those who live near a schoolhouse, gather on Sunday morning for a meeting for worship. In the afternoon they form into small groups and go among their fellowmen to preach the Gospel. In other parts of the Reserve the Christians have gone to Sunday markets, to small hill side groups, to individual homes and along the highway to talk with the people about Christ. Through this personal effort multitudes have had an opportunity to learn of Christ and His teaching. The Monthly Meetings are attended by such crowds that the mud and thatch chapel is altogether inadequate to accommodate the people.

The schools in the Maragoli and Isuka districts are entirely supported by African Friends and the schools in the other districts are receiving larger support from the church on the field. Several of the advanced pupils have passed the Government Vernacular Examinations and one young man is in the Government school taking courses similar to those offered to the Jeanes teachers in the United States.

Schools have been held on several of the plateau farms for boys who have left the Reserve to make money. These centers form a connection between the Mission and the white settlers and serve as a means of spiritual help to many who, having left tribal restraints behind, are a prey to the baser elements in the civilization with which they come into contact.

In the medical department, considerable time has been spent in training hospital attendants. A class has been started in maternity training with a number of girls in attendance.

37. The epistles from Baltimore and New England Yearly Meetings were read.

38. J. J. Handsaker, the representative of the Near East Relief, again brought to us the very grave needs of that organization.

39. The following report from the meeting on Ministry and Oversight was read:

REPORT OF THE MEETING ON MINISTRY AND OVERSIGHT

Two sessions of this body were held. The business was conducted in a spirit of harmony, Christian sympathy and love, with a good attendance at both meetings. The message brought by John R. Cary of Baltimore meeting, on the revitalizing of the Ministry and Oversight body was timely and much appreciated.

We were united in a concern for our young people who feel a call to service, and the following action was taken by the meeting:

First: That this meeting arrange for a special service to which the Pastors and the young people who have received a definite call, shall be invited. This meeting to be in charge of Elizabeth W. Ward, and held sometime Saturday.

Second: That this meeting request each Quarterly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight, that at a suitable time during the year, they arrange for a meeting, to which, by public announcement, the young people, within their limits, who have received a definite call to service shall be invited to meet with them; and that, by previous arrangement, the matter of the development of the gifts of the young people be considered.

Third: That the Clerks of this meeting be asked to prepare and send out to each meeting within the limits of the Yearly Meeting, a letter, to be read publicly, which will be calculated to give encouragement to any young people who may be called to definite service.

Fourth: That this meeting, through its Clerks, send a written request to the Yearly Meeting Evangelistic Board, asking that it give special attention to the development of the gifts of young people who may have been called to definite service, and to the opening of doors of service to them.

The Ministerial Association of Oregon Yearly Meeting recommends "That an appropriation of three hundred dollars be made for the support of the Church Section of the Friendly Endeavor."

41. A partial report of the Nominating Committee was read, and referred back to the committee for correction.

42. The work of the department of the Evangelistic and Church Extension was the subject of the afternoon. A summary of the report follows:

REPORT OF THE EVANGELISTIC AND CHURCH EXTENSION BOARD

Until the first of August following our last Yearly Meeting, L. Clarkson Hinshaw served as Yearly Meeting superintendent, since that time the work has been carried on under the direction of the quarterly meeting superintendents and members of the Executive Committee.

David Delano and wife were placed in charge of the work at Sprague River. They have had to face some very discouraging and distressing conditions there, but in spite of this they have rendered very satisfactory service. The church building has been greatly improved and the debt on the property has been paid. A garage has been built which has been used as a residence for the pastors. Frederick J. Cope held a short series of meetings there preceeding the holidays.

During the year Kenneth Eichenberger was placed in charge of the work at Quilcene, and reports of the work there have been encouraging.

Henry Richardson has continued in charge of the work at North East Tacoma, and Dillon Mills in charge of the work at Kelso, during the year.

Last Yearly Meeting left the matter concerning Rainier Heights Meeting, which was brought to the attention of the Yearly Meeting by Tacoma Quarterly Meeting in the care of the Evangelistic Board. After careful consideration and investigation by members of the Executive Committee it was decided to request Tacoma Quarterly Meeting to discontinue Rainier Heights meeting and to transfer the membership of the meeting to the First Friends Meeting of Portland. Tacoma Quarterly Meeting took such action, and so far as we have been able to secure the names of members they have been transferred to First Friends Meeting of Portland.

For a number of years Boise Meeting has been feeling the need of a more adequate church building. In view of this need the Board authorized the solicitation of funds by them from the other meetings of the Yearly Meeting, and a new church building there is now in process of construction.

For several months prayer meetings have been held regularly at Vancouver, Washington, and recently a tabernacle has been constructed and a series of meetings held. As a result about thirty persons have requested membership with Friends, and that a meeting be formed there. This work has been under the care of the Portland Meetings.

A number of Friends from Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting have recently settled in and around La Grande, Oregon, and there seems to be an opening for a Friends work in that vicinity. A Friend of Tacoma Quarterly Meeting has conducted meetings at Weyerhaeuser and Eatonville, Washington.

Inez E. Batchelor and Nettie Springer have held, during the year, evangelistic services within the limits of Boise Valley, Tacoma, and Newberg Quarterly Meetings. Other evangelistic services have been conducted by the local pastors or have been arranged for by the local meetings.

Detailed information concerning the year's work will be found in our statistical report.

With a feeling of thankfulness for all the blessings our Father has bestowed upon us, and with a prayer for His continued leading, this report is submitted.

We are holding a Bank Certificate for \$500.00 received from the sale of the Alder Friends Meeting house, also a contingent fund for \$31.16. We are holding a note for \$432.00 for loan made to the Trustees of the Second Friends Church of Portland, Oregon.

A copy of the minutes of 1926 has been filed as the permanent record of the Yearly Meeting

45. The meeting directed the trustees to place the five hundred dollars obtained from the above sale of property into the fund already established for loan to build meeting houses within the limits of the Yearly Meeting.

46. The meeting adjourned to meet at 10:00 a.m., Seventh Day.

47. The meeting met according to adjournment.

48. Elizabeth W. Ward led us in the devotional period in earnest prayer for guidance in the work of the day.

49. The following Friends from Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting have been appointed as fraternal delegates to this meeting: Isaac N. Stanley, James Welch, Etta Cook, Fred D. Carter, and Ethel Carter. Isaac N. Stanley, being the only one present, was accorded a cordial welcome.

50. The epistles from Canada and North Carolina Yearly Meetings were read.

51. The following report of the Finance Committee was read and with the exception of the recommendation referring to the request from the Ministerial Association was adopted by the meeting.

The following communication from Salem Quarterly Meeting was considered and we recommend that Rosedale's debt be cancelled.

TO OREGON YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS:

The following communication from Rosedale Monthly Meeting was endorsed by Salem Quarterly Meeting and authorized to be sent to the Yearly Meeting.

"As the apportionment of Yearly Meeting Stock is based on ability and willingness to pay, and, as Rosedale Monthly Meeting has not been able to meet its apportionment for a number of years because of crop failures and the loss of interested and paying members; and, as the arrears in apportionment have become so heavy as to handicap the work of the Monthly Meeting, Rosedale, with the concurrence of Salem Quarterly Meeting, requests Oregon Yearly Meeting that the arrears in apportionment be cancelled."

52. The subject of Peace claimed the attention of the meeting. The Superintendent, Levi T. Pennington read the report and gave a short address after which John R. Carey followed with a few well chosen remarks.

REPORT OF THE PEACE SUPERINTENDENT OF OREGON YEARLY MEETING

It would be difficult to overestimate the importance of the work for world peace. There is probably no question before humanity today, other than that of the evangelization of the world, which is of greater consequence for the welfare of mankind than the question as to whether war shall destroy civilization or civilization destroy war. The World War "to end war" did not end it, and in the very nature of things could not have done so. The world is still moving along the line of war preparation, which eventually will lead, as it always has led, to war. And in spite of every encouraging step that has been taken, and there are such encouraging things, the world still needs to learn and to follow the path to peace. Too long have we walked in the footsteps of the God of War. Unless disaster is to overtake the world vastly worse than the one which so recently took 40,000,000 human victims, which wasted treasure greater in amount than the total pre-war wealth of the United States, the richest country in the world, and which resulted in moral and spiritual degradation vastly more important than all the loss of wealth and even of physical life—unless war is again to devastate the world, the world must learn to follow the path of the Prince of Peace.

Friends should have a place of real leadership in the effort to bring the world along the path to peace. We have furnished many great leaders in this movement and are still furnishing them, for great peace organizations outside of our own denomination. But every Friends meeting and every individual Friend should be a center for peace education.

It is encouraging to note that the reports from the five quarterly meetings show a very substantial increase in peace activity over last year. In almost every line of peace work on which report is made there has been a substantial advance, not only in the work among our own members but in the effort to get the peace message to people outside of our own membership.

Our wide stretch of territory has again made it seem inadvisable to attempt any meeting of the quarterly meeting superintendents, and an effort has been made to handle the work

of the department by correspondence, as was done last year. Seven of the monthly meetings reported that their peace committee met at the beginning of the year and made their plans for the year's work.

Throughout the Yearly Meeting 23 meetings have been held in the immediate interests of peace. At these meetings addresses, sermons, music, pageants, and other forms of peace propaganda were employed.

A total of 36 peace addresses and sermons were given in Friends meetings, as well as many others to audiences of non-Friends.

An effort was made to learn the number of subscribers to the Messenger of Peace, but with little success. Each pastor was provided by the Yearly Meeting peace department with a copy of this paper throughout the year, and there were probably more than as many members as pastors taking the paper, but the reports were so meager on this point that they mean nothing. A considerable number of other peace periodicals are taken by our members, including the Bulletin of the National Council for the Prevention of War, the Bulletin of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, The World Tomorrow, The Christian Century, The Advocate of Peace, etc.

The total amount raised in the quarterly meetings to carry on peace work, according to the reports sent in, was \$56.82. The Yearly Meeting appropriation of \$30 was all expended and a considerable sum besides, which was made up by Friends of Newberg Quarterly Meeting, but is not included in this report.

Five members of the Yearly Meeting have participated in contests in oratory, debate, or essay writing on various phases of the peace question during the year.

So far as known no member of the Yearly Meeting is engaged in active military service.

The number of pages of peace literature distributed aside from the periodicals taken by individuals cannot be accurately reported since no accurate records have been kept. The total reported is between 5,000 and 6,000 pages.

The effort of individuals which do not appear in a statistical report are frequently quite as important as the things which readily yield themselves to statistical analysis.

Following are some forms of peace work carried on by different local meetings or members which may prove suggestive to other peace workers.

In Newberg meeting the peace committee has secured wide publicity for the peace movement by frequent insertion in the weekly paper of peace articles, poems, world peace news, etc.

In the First Friends Church in Portland the peace superintendent has a weekly peace message in the church bulletin, and this message is always of a character to keep alive the interest in peace both among the members and visitors.

In Newberg quarterly meeting Peace Day was observed by every meeting in the quarterly meeting.

South Salem has done some fine work for peace through the Fellowship of Reconciliation, even though the chairman of the peace committee has been ill during the entire year.

Peace instruction is given in the Sunday School once each month in Newberg and South Salem, and at longer intervals in some of the other meetings.

Very many of the local meetings have adopted resolutions in favor of peaceable action in Mexico, Nicaragua, and China. And in some cases city ministerial associations have been induced, largely through the influence of Friends, to pass similar resolutions.

Peace posters have been largely distributed by the meetings throughout the Yearly Meeting.

Various meetings have sent telegrams to government officials urging the peaceable handling of our affairs with foreign countries, especially Mexico, Nicaragua, and China. The First Friends meeting of Portland prepared and sent in the mail 1,000 cards carrying a protest against intervention in Mexico.

At the beginning of the year the Yearly Meeting peace superintendent urged every meeting to put on at least one meeting in the interests of peace during the year, and offered a list of speakers who would be glad to respond to invitations to speak on the peace question. The most notable response to this suggestion came from Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting, where the superintendent of the peace work was asked to give an address in each meeting in the quarterly meeting. The campaign was well set up, and from Friday night to Monday night six addresses were given in Friends meetings, one before the Boise Ministerial Association, one before a district Christian Endeavor convention, and one before a mass meeting in a Presbyterian church in Caldwell. This quarterly meeting also raised more money for the peace work than any other in the Yearly Meeting.

Cecil F. Hinshaw, chairman of the Newberg peace committee, was a member of the Christian Herald Mediterranean cruise during the year just closed, and he had the privilege of studying international conditions at first hand quite extensively. He says, "The need for definite peace work was never greater than at the present time when hate, fear, and distrust are wide spread."

Newberg was particularly fortunate in securing a number of notable peace speakers from outside our own membership.

Charles S. Tator, pastor of the Anabel Presbyterian church, gave a peace address at Pacific College just before Armistice day.

Dr. L. Lincoln Wirt, Pacific Coast head of the National Council for the Prevention of War, gave one address at Pacific College and one at the Newberg Friends meeting.

Sidney Strong, the peace leader of Seattle, spoke in the Newberg Friends meeting of his journey to Mexico with the peace commission which visited our neighbor to the South.

Thomas Que Harrison, peace superintendent of the work of the American Friends Service Committee, spoke at the Newberg prayer meeting and at Pacific College, and through the Yearly Meeting peace superintendent visited three other colleges in the Willamette valley and made a profound impression on the student bodies there.

The peace superintendent of the Yearly Meeting has had abundant opportunities for the presentation of the peace message both within and without the Society of Friends. A total of 29 addresses have been given on the subject of peace during the year on the lyceum and chautauqua platform, before Rotary and Kiwanis clubs, teachers' institutes, ministerial associations, conventions, etc. One of these addresses was given to a Sunday evening audience at the Willamette Valley Chautauqua, the largest chautauqua assembly west of

the Mississippi river; one to the Oregon State Sunday School convention; one to the Ministerial Association of Salem; one to an Armistice day mass meeting in Newberg under the auspices of the American Legion; one before the Portland Methodist Ministers Association; and one before the Ministerial Association of Boise, Idaho.

Among the suggestions for future work are the following: Discussion groups, where people will really study the peace question frankly, earnestly, and intelligently.

More lectures by competent students of the peace movement.

Individual conversations by ordinary folk on the subject of peace.

Some good peace periodical in every home as well as other peace literature, such as books and pamphlets.

Regular instruction in Bible schools, the minimum being a part of the Bible school hour not less than once each month.

Earnest prayer that God may have mercy on His world and save us from the horrors of another world war.

There has been commendable activity in the work for peace during the year but "there remaineth yet very much land to be possessed." Let every meeting and every member feel a deep interest in the cause of peace which shall manifest itself in earnest and efficient work for peace. "Blessed are the peace makers, for they shall be called the children of God."

The committee also reports the collecting and sending of \$41.38 to the general support of the American Friends Service Committee.

It is the hope of the Yearly Meetings Committee that a larger number of local meetings will acquaint themselves with the details of the work being done by the American Friends Service Committee in this country and in other countries, and support these activities in so far as they may feel free to do so.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF PACIFIC COLLEGE

Pacific College has just closed what has been, in some respects at least, the best year in its history under its present president. For all the good things of the year we are grateful to God and to those who under His blessing have made the successes of the year possible.

The recognition of the college as one of the standard colleges of the state has resulted in a material increase in the student body, especially in the college proper, which has the largest enrollment in its history. There is still room for great expansion in the student body without increase in the teaching force, since the requirements of standardization demand a faculty, especially in the college proper, adequate to handle a considerably larger number of college students than are at present enrolled.

Scholastic Work of the Year

A relatively high degree of faculty permanence has contributed to the successful work of Pacific College for many years. The average length of service on the Pacific College faculty of those who are doing actual teaching during the year just closed is over nine and one-third years. In view of the meager salaries which we are able to pay in comparison with those which these teachers could have secured elsewhere, it is easy to see that the college owes to these teachers a real debt of gratitude.

The scholastic work of the year has been for the most part decidedly successful. Most of the students have co-operated well with the college authorities, and while there have been the usual problems and some which were a bit out of the ordinary, on the whole there is reason for congratulation on the successful work of the year on the part of most students, with a few, as always, delighting the hearts of the teaching force with their desire for real scholarship.

The graduating class of 1927, with their degrees, are as follows: Walter C. Cook, A.B.; Edna C. Doree, A.B.; Therman R. Evans, A.B.; Esther A. Haworth, A.B.; Hilma J. Hendrickson, A.B.; Ralph W. Hester, B.S.; Fleeta Leland, A.B.; Homer Nordyke, B.S.; Ruth E. Whitlock, A.B.; Marion B. Winslow, A.B. In addition to these Harold P. Mills completed his work in residence for regraduation and certification for teaching in the high schools of Oregon, his graduation in 1924, having occurred before the college had recognition as a standard institution; Dilla G. Tucker of the same class has completed a year's work in another college and has transferred her credits to Pacific for the same regraduation and certification; and Harriett E. Hodgin of the class of 1923, is working toward the same end. S. Paul Brown completed his work for graduation and was awarded his degree at the mid year.

The highest honors of the class of 1927, for the work of the four years of college were awarded to Ruth E. Whitlock. This, as all the awards made by the college, was given on the basis of scholarship and character.

The Junior prize, awarded on the same basis for the work of the Junior year only, was awarded to Mildred Choate.

A new award was made for the first time this year. This is the Wilbur Elliott Memorial Award, to the Freshman man who during his Freshman year has made the largest contribution in Christian life and service. This memorial, given by the family of Wilbur Elliott, whose tragic death so shocked the college a little more than a year ago, is awarded by a committee of three faculty representatives and one representative from each of the three college classes above the Freshman class. The honor went this first year to Merlin Brown, who has been active and earnest in Christian service both within and without the college.

Two students received the Commercial diploma this year, Olive Kendall and Minnie G. Ralston.

Nine students completed the Academy course. They are: Bernice Carlisle, Erwin Diment, Charles McClean, Margaret McClean, Harry Schmeltzer, Joseph Silver, Harold Smith, Robert Whitlock and Kenneth Yergen. The Pacific College scholarship was awarded to Joseph Silver.

Religious Work

The religious work of the college especially that which is under the leadership of the students themselves, has been more than usually strong the past year. Never in recent years has so strong a deputation group done active service in conducting meetings in various places about the state, both in city and in country, both among Friends and in other churches. Many testimonies have come to the college of the blessing which has attended this work in various places.

This work is a part of the work of the Christian Associations, and while some of the students have done other forms of work and have not been in this deputation group, over thirty have done definite work along this line. Group meetings were held practically all the year every two weeks until May 1st, and after that each week. The group has held twenty-seven meetings at various points, and for the past three months has served the meeting at Rex each week. It also led the Christian Association meetings at Linfield College and the Oregon State Normal.

In addition to this deputation work, the regular work of the college Christian Association has been carried on with success, the regular meetings being maintained with much interest, with leaders and speakers from the student body, faculty and outside the college community; and with the usual work along the line of Bible study, mission study, etc. The regular Bible study in the curriculum has been carried on as usual but with a somewhat larger enrollment.

Christian Education Day was observed in the various churches of the county, and Pacific College joined in furnishing speakers to all the churches desiring them on that day, and hundreds through our student and faculty speakers heard again the presentation of the importance of education in colleges where proper recognition is given to moral and spiritual interests.

Faculty Changes

Again the college has reason for gratitude that there are to be few changes in the teaching force the coming year. All but two of the faculty who have been teaching in 1926-27 will be back next year; one who has been away on leave of absence for this year will be back on the force; and one who has been away on leave has terminated her service on the faculty.

Mary Eunice Lewis, who has been head of the Department of German since 1910, has severed her connection with the college. She has served Pacific faithfully not only as teacher but as librarian, registrar and in many other capacities, and her services will be greatly missed. Eva L. Miles, who took her place during her leave of absence, is continuing as head of the department of German and French.

Clarence G. McClean, for the past three years the efficient head of the Department of Spanish and assistant in the work in Religious Education, has resigned to accept a similar position in Whittier College. His successor has not yet been elected.

Frank D. Roberts, who has been for three years principal of the Academy and teacher of Mathematics and Physics, has also resigned and his successor is yet to be secured.

The Future Outlook

That there is need for Pacific College in Oregon was never clearer than it is today. Our institutions of higher education are for the most part overcrowded and undermanned and underfinanced. Our state institutions, in spite of the heavy taxation, are in the field for gifts of millions. And there was never more need for the college which can face the truth in the world of history and science and human relations without losing the truth of man's relationship to God and His responsibility to Him. There never was greater need than today for the college which can give a thorough education in the things of the body and the mind, and at the same time put the supreme stress where it belongs, on the development of the **whole** man, whose highest element is neither body nor mind but spirit. Muscles and mind and morals must be developed together unless power is to become power for disaster. Pacific College, with its purpose to give "a liberal education, under the best Christian influence, at a minimum expense," has a growing place of potential power and service if it can measure up to its responsibilities.

Three things may be suggested which the friends of the college can do to make the next year the best in our history.

First, aid in the increase of the student body for the coming year, especially in the college department. We could care for fifty more students in the college proper without increasing our teaching force. This increase would add greatly to the service which the college is rendering, would add materially to the income without increasing the expense, and would open doors of recognition and help which with our present student body are now closed.

Second, aid in the financial efforts of the college. The permanence of our recognition as a standard college depends on further advancement of the college's permanent financial resources. The right man could add \$100,000 to the endowment fund the coming year from sources as yet practically untouched. The right 100 men among the natural constituency of the college could give \$1,000 each, many of them more, and be the better, not

the worse, for the gift. The giving of the friends of the college has been nothing less than heroic in the past. If all this giving is not to fail of its full fruition, there must be further generous giving of money and time and energy, before the college reaches the place of influence and power which lies just ahead.

And third, aid the college by real, persistent, insistent prayer "More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of." If a few hundred or even a few score of people will pray as they ought for Pacific College, the things which it needs in the way of workers, funds, students and power to advance the kingdom of God through genuine Christian education will come to it from God, through men and women whose hearts God has touched, perhaps in ways which they and we would hardly dare to dream.

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR

The spiritual tone of the conference last year was highly pleasing to those who attended. We are more convinced from year to year that the conference is an institution under God's anointing. It has been very blessed to note the spiritual growth of many of our members dating from the time of the conference.

God has so richly blessed us that we have come to expect great things in the future. We feel that it is not presumption to expect missionaries, preachers, and teachers to come out of the conferences.

While not having a separate missionary program of our own to work for during the year, we have nevertheless retained our missionary zeal and have contributed in excess of the previous years' contribution. May God send forth missionaries from our Christian Endeavor Endeavor.

REPORT OF GREENLEAF SEMINARY

We have finished a very good year at Greenleaf Seminary with six graduates. There have been thirty students enrolled during the year. However this is a smaller enrollment than has been some years previous. We have held practically the entire number throughout the year.

Along with the thorough work of the students on a sound educational basis which the faculty has stressed, there has been a wholesome and whole-hearted interest in school activities.

The course of study, while not much different from the course in past years, has conformed, in every particular, to the requirements of the Idaho Manual and Course of Study.

With the required work and only three teachers there has not been as much Bible taught as we desired. The junior class has been required to take a full year course, the Bible being the chief text, the historical settings, facts in the lives of inspired writers with the general facts made it a profitable study. This is the only specific course for the past year. The Bible is accepted as authority in everything including History and Biology.

We have tried in every way possible to increase our students faith in the Bible and God, to that end we have kept the school atmosphere as spiritual as possible. The greatest contributing factor has been the students' prayer meetings, one for girls and one for boys, each Monday at the close of school, three chapel periods of each week have been conducted by members of the Faculty with this thought in view.

We not only think our work up to par, but we received, on May 24th, the approval of the State Board of Education, thus placing the Seminary on the fully accredited High School list.

There has been a splendid school spirit this year, the one strictly student affair has been the Friday chapel period. A program committee, with the co-operation of the faculty, has made this a time of inspiration, entertainment and of great value in a literary way.

Music has received its share of interest, under the direction of Mr. Irwin the Piano and Voice department has done splendid work.

The school chorus, composed of half the enrollment, has given some splendid music at public programs. The band was organized near the beginning of the year by Mr. Spies, considered the best organizer and leader of boys' band work in Idaho.

There has been a good interest manifested in athletics. A new tennis court was secured and tennis and volley ball were under direction of Miss Terrell and Miss Logston. This spring baseball has monopolized other sports, several games were played with neighboring schools. A real school spirit can be attested to by anyone near enough to hear the rah! rah! from the sidelines.

THE EPISTLE FROM LONDON YEARLY MEETING OF THE RELIGIOUS SOCIETY OF FRIENDS, HELD AT MANCHESTER, FROM THE 21ST TO THE 28TH OF FIFTH MONTH, 1926.

TO FRIENDS EVERYWHERE.

DEAR FRIENDS:

It was natural that the thought of Yearly Meeting should be influenced by the Industrial Crisis. We have rejoiced in the ending of the General Strike, in the good temper and helpfulness so generally shown while it lasted, in the widespread response to the call for prayer, and in the appeal for a righteous settlement united in by the different religious bodies. Whatever be our view with regard to the strike as an industrial method, we have been impressed with the comradeship and willingness to bear one another's burdens which it revealed.

The continuance of the deadlock in the Mining Industry has reminded us that many acute industrial problems remain. We have had with us both mine-owners and miners who have told us of the complexity of the issue; and we have been stirred to sympathy with many of the workers in their privations. We are ashamed to think that it needed so great an upheaval to bring home to us the conditions of life of those who minister to our common needs—conditions in which we have acquiesced. This acquiescence involves a share of responsibility for the outbreak of strife in industry.

During our gatherings many different views have been frankly expressed, but we have been at one in seeking the will of God. In that search views were enlarged, and their diversity helped to fill in details of our vision of God's great purpose. In the world around us we see men divided into opposing camps by gulfs across which there seem to be no bridges. If men can be persuaded to look away from their differences, and catch a glimpse of a larger life, they will be able to unite the good in each group for the working out of a common purpose. Is not this what Jesus meant by seeking the Kingdom?

But how to bring to men a vision of the Kingdom?

Jesus came and lived with men, entering into their lives, transforming men by his appeal to their best selves. There came a time when this appeal failed; men did not respond. Nothing remained but to stand faithful to his appeal, even though they rejected it, and by suffering death in unchanging love, to carry his witness forward. In the life and death of Jesus we see God—see him appealing to men to walk his way of love, and whilst they are blind to it, suffering for and with them, bearing with them injustice and oppression, knowing that love alone will win out in the end.

Are we thinking of the need for transformation in individual lives? In industrial conditions? In international relations? The way of love is the one sure path, and we are called to follow it. Once grasp the love of God as Jesus shows it to us, and it will become the motive power for our work, and the foundation upon which we rest. Once grasp the outlook on men which Jesus had, and the way of the cross will be seen to be not only an event

of the past, but a way of action in which we are to join now. Only if we are willing to follow the way of Jesus, whatever it may involve for ourselves or for our Society, have we the right to say that his way is the solution of the world's problems.

This ideal is high, but Jesus called men to begin to work it out at once, wherever they were.

With these thoughts in our minds we turn to face the innumerable claims upon our time and money, our thought, our labour and our love. We have heard once more the call to service in our own country and in all parts of the world. We have fresh evidence that the spirit of Jesus Christ is transforming human lives, healing bitterness and strife, sweeping away injustice and oppression, bridging the gulf between man and man, widening our vision of the oneness of life.

In the power of that spirit we must go forward together sharing in this Divine effort, this reaching out of God to men.

The call is one, whatever the field.

The end is one, the Kingdom of Heaven.

He who calls us is God, the one Father of men.
