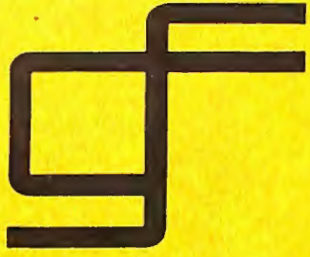

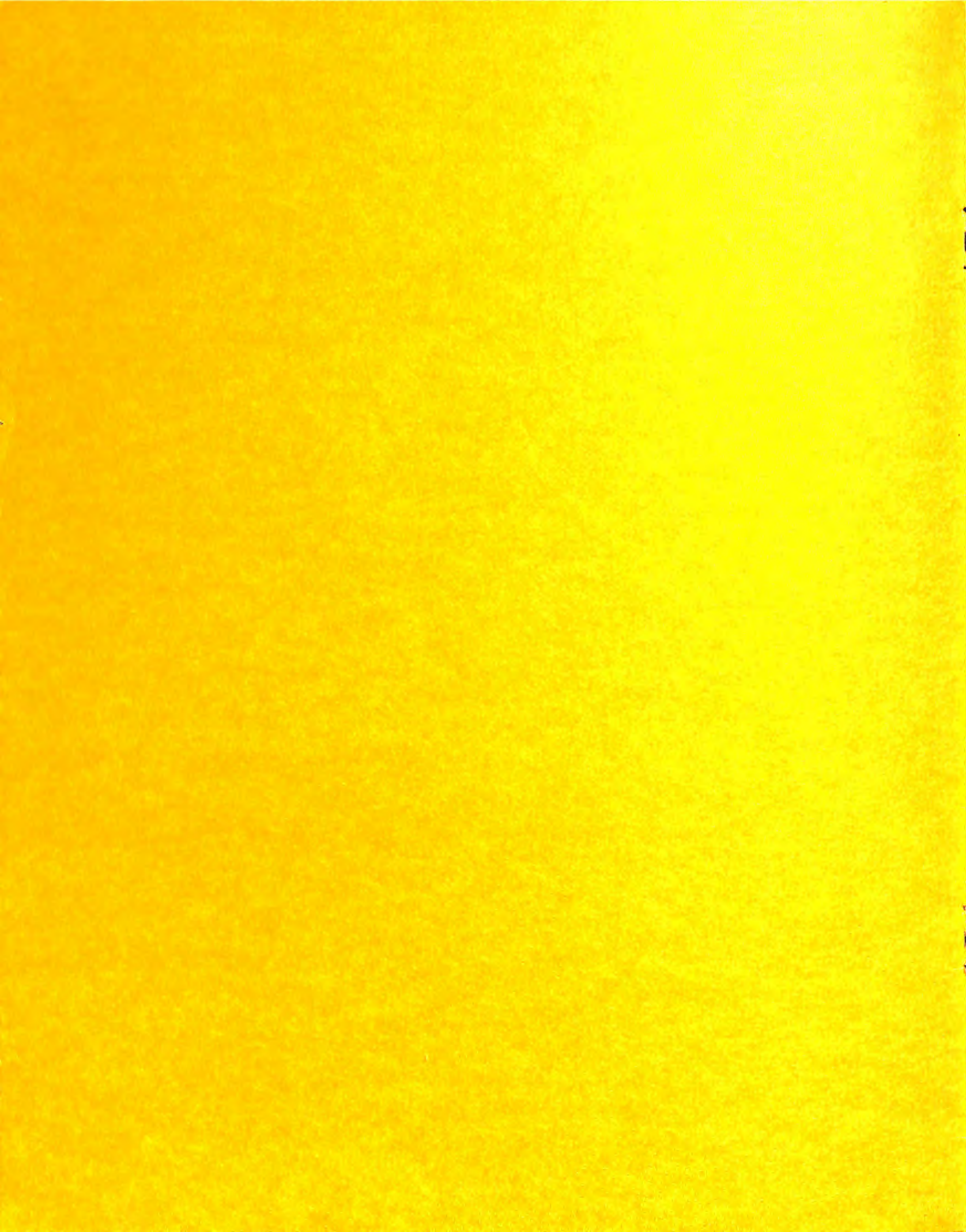

# GEORGE FOX COLLEGE

## HISTORY

George Fox College is the outgrowth of a desire by early Newberg area Quaker settlers who established Pacific Academy in 1885, in the middle of what was then a wheatfield, for the Christian education of their children even before Oregon public schools offered many advantages.

It was of this school that the former president Herbert Hoover stated: "As a young student there for three years, I received whatever set I may have toward good purposes in life."

A college division of the Quaker institution was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced work for the students. In 1930 Pacific Academy was discontinued so that the educational efforts of the Quakers could be centered around the college which was beginning to play an ever increasing role among the colleges of the west. In 1949, because of the many "Pacific" colleges in the Northwest, the college was renamed George Fox College in honor of the founder of the Friends Church.

The \$3 million in campus facilities now includes 16 buildings, including 13 new or remodeled in the last 10 years. Approximately 425 students are enrolled this year with a full time faculty of 40.

## ATHLETIC PHILOSOPHY

The athletic philosophy at George Fox is based on four objectives:

Involvement: The athletic program must necessarily involve large numbers of students if it is to be a justifiable part of the total school program in terms of both time and money investments required for competitive sports.

Excellence: The program must provide George Fox students with the finest possible experiences within the limitations imposed by finance and staff adequacy.

Consistency: The athletic program must promote the development of skills, attitudes, and value patterns that are totally consistent with those of the educational system of George Fox College.

Realism: It is necessary that the program exist in a realistic environment wherein "athletics" enjoys optimum status among the many other significant areas of education.

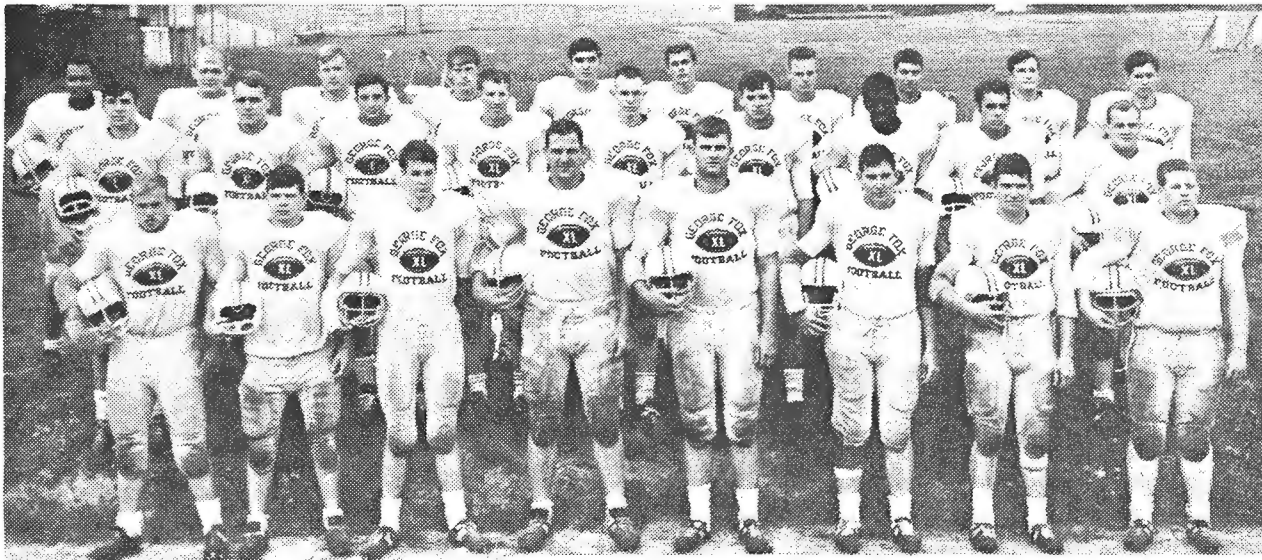

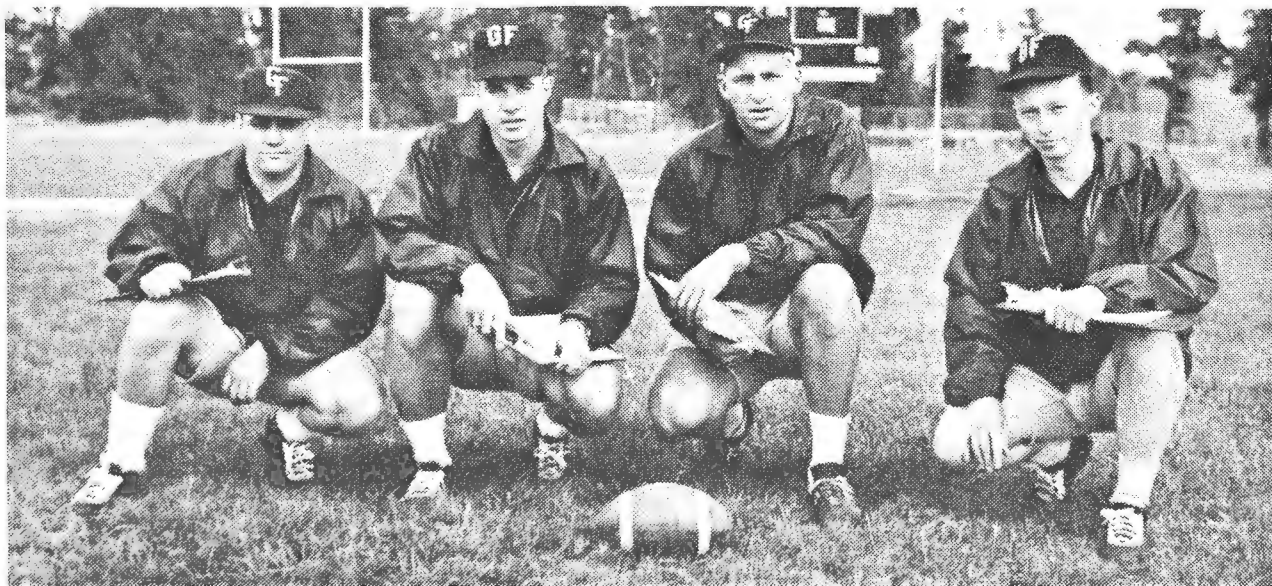

The 1968 season marks the third year for Jerry Louthan at George Fox. It will be the young mentors second year as head coach of the Quaker II.

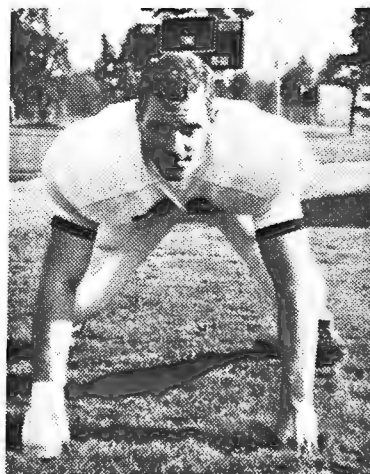
Louthan is a graduate of Kansas State College in Pittsburg, Kansas, where he received both a Bachelor and Master of Science degree. Before coming to George Fox Louthan compiled a 26 win, 12 loss record as a high school coach in Iowa.

Last year Louthan led the Quakers to their first conference win since joining the Oregon Collegiate Conference. He proudly predicts the Quakers will no longer be taken lightly in the 5-member league.

## BOB HADLOCK

A senior tackle from Franklin High in Seattle, Bob is 6'6", 260 pounds of solid gridiron talent. A defensive specialist, Bob can detour any offensive thrust with his great mobility and strength. Probably the most outstanding team morale builder, Bob has been chosen for all-conference teams the last three years and the all-district 1st team last year.

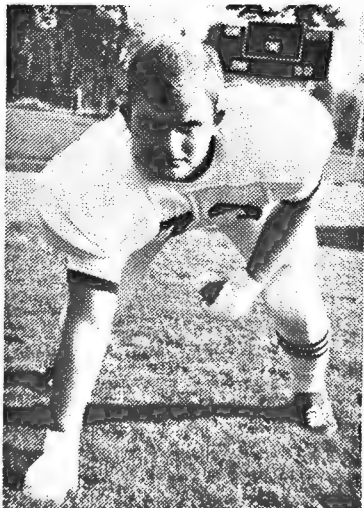
Bob has aspirations of becoming a pro and has all of the tools for it.

One of the most improved players on the Quaker team, in spirit and ability, Randy is one of the best blockers in the line. He can go equally well on defense.



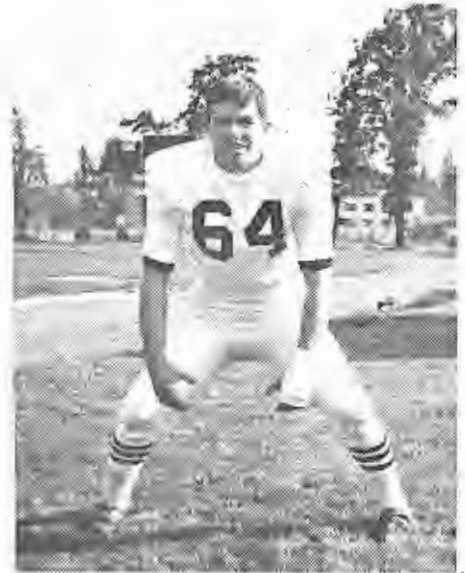
STEVE BEECROFT
