A New Winning Streak

The young and improving Bruins aim for a winning season after their first losing campaign in 13 years.

For the George Fox University men's soccer team, the 1999 season was an anomaly. The Bruins' 7-12 record (5-9 and 6th place in the Northwest Conference) was their first losing season after 13 straight winning records, and the first losing season ever in veteran coach Manfred Tschan's 17-year coaching career.

Both the Bruins and Tschan will try to get new winning streaks started in 2000, and with a nucleus of seven starters and nine letterwinners returning, they just might pull it off.

"We've had a good spirit in our early workouts," says Tschan, who enters his 12th season as the Bruins coach with a record of 143-72-8 at the school and a 207-101-17 record overall. "The players have been really attentive to the things we are trying to do, and they seem eager to put things together and have a good year."

Bruins' Returning Starters Include Number 2, 3, and 4 Scorers

Offensively, the Bruins lost Second Team All-Conference midfielder Merrick Brownlee, who was second in the conference in scoring with 29 points (11 goals, 7 assists), but return their next three top point producers. **Bryan Erickson** (Jr., Chehalis, Wash.), **Jamie Johnson** (Jr., Newberg, Ore.) and **Nick Chapman** (So., Newberg, Ore.) followed Brownlee in point production for the Bruins with 18, 12, and 8 points respectively. Erickson and Johnson had 5 goals each, while Chapman had 4 assists. Johnson is shifting from wing to central striker.

Honorable Mention All-Conference midfielder Kevin Whitaker, another key player, left for a two-year Mormon mission, so the Bruins will be looking to



returnees **Ryan Austin** (Jr., Eugene, Ore.), **Adam Moore** (Jr., Shasta Lake, Calif.) and **Jesse Johnson** (So., Grants Pass, Ore.) to step into the breach.

Austin is expected to take over at center midfield after playing on the outside last year. Moore had 5 points and Johnson 2 as top subs last year.

In the backfield, **Kyle Langeliers** (Jr., Creswell, Ore.) missed the early portion of last season with a stress fracture in his foot, but returned to start in the second half, and will be counted on again to lead the defense, if he can stay healthy. Starting sweeper **Kevin Fleming** (So., Oregon City, Ore.) "has the potential to be as effective as anyone we've ever had," says Tschan, "but he must be more consistent and mentally focused." Defender/midfielder **Nigel Hunter** (Jr.,

Wenatchee, Wash.), who showed promise two years ago but missed all of 1999 with an injury, could reclaim a starting role in the backfield.

Chris Shields (Jr., Kennewick, Wash.) returns at right back, while defender **Conley Bergh** (So., Milwaukie, Ore.) moves up from last year's junior varsity program.

Youth Movement Begins in the Goal

The young Bruins have no seniors on the squad, and list 14 freshmen on the roster, one of whom will start in the goal. All three goalkeepers are first-year players. **Ron Besser** (Fr., Kennewick, Wash.) is the top goalie candidate, and his last-minute decision to attend George Fox was called by Tschan "a gift from God! He has the most tools and

the best background of any of our three goalies, he's quick for someone as big as he is (6-2, 196), and he has the potential to be one of the best we've ever had."

Nathan Chamberlain (Fr., Dundee, Ore.) is another goalkeeper "who isn't afraid to get in front of things," says Tschan, and **Scott Burkhardt** (Fr., The Dalles, Ore.) will provide depth to the Bruins' last line of defense.

Along the offensive front, Tschan likes the skills of **Derek Dougherty** (Fr., Springfield, Ore.), noting that "he has a lot of cleverness with his first touch, and he's an intelligent hard worker who gives us some options." Another first-year player, **Jon Miller** (Fr., Nipomo, Calif.), has shown enough skills to be considered a probable starter at either forward or midfielder.

Max Sorensen (Fr., Bothell, Wash.)

has made a strong bid for playing time as a midfielder, and **Chris Thompson** (Fr., Beavercreek, Ore.) provides mid-field depth. Langeliers could move to midfield if Hunter remains at stopper. On defense, **Christopher Waters** (Fr., Boise, Idaho) has been impressive at left back. **Levi Link** (Fr., Hayden, Idaho) and **Ben Young** (Fr., Pocatello, Idaho) could also see action in the defensive backfield.

Midfielder **Jesse Rasmussen** (Fr., Portland, Ore.) and forward /midfielders **Ryan Magnuson** (Fr., Eugene, Ore.) and **Ben Yliniemi** (Fr., Monmouth, Ore.), though young in their development, show promise for the future.

Summary

"We will have to be strong on defense," Tschan asserts, "because it's doubtful we're going to scare anybody on offense. That doesn't mean we can't score — we have some good offensive players — but we won't be like some Bruin teams of old where we literally challenged the other team, 'Just try to stop us!' We will be a more 'traditional' team, in that we will rely on our defense first."

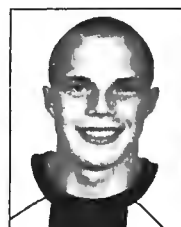

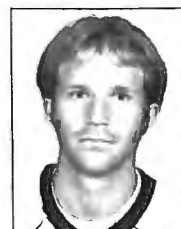

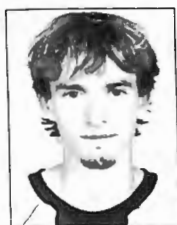

Coaches

Manfred Tschan

Entering his 12th year as the head men's soccer coach at George Fox University, Manfred Tschan has established the Bruins as one of the most successful programs in both the Pacific Northwest and the entire nation.

Tschan's Bruin teams have won almost two-thirds of their games, going 143-72-8 in his 11 seasons, a .659 winning percentage. In six of the last eight seasons, the Bruins were ranked in the NAIA Top 25. Under Tschan's guidance, George Fox has finished first or second in its district or conference nine times. The team also received national exposure by winning two National Christian College Athletic Association national championships (1988 and 1990) and making one NAIA National Tournament appearance (1993). In 1993, Tschan won NAIA District 2 and NAIA Area 1 Coach of the Year honors. Nine of his players have earned NAIA All-American awards.

A former player in the Swiss First Junior and First Amateur divisions, the 44-year-old Tschan has 17 years of coaching experience. Prior to settling in Newberg, he held head coaching positions at Concordia University-Portland and the University of Oregon. During his two seasons at Oregon, the Swiss native guided the fledgling women's program to a No. 4 Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America national ranking and into the 1981 AIAW National Tournament. His 27-3-3 record at Oregon, along with a 37-26-5 mark in four seasons at Concordia, give him an



overall career record of 207-101-17, a .663 winning percentage. Last year's 7-12 mark was the only non-winning season he has ever had.

An assistant professor of

health and human performance at George Fox, Tschan earned a bachelor of science degree in education from the Teachers' College of Hofwil, Switzerland; a master of science degree in motor learning from Oregon; and he has completed Ph.D. course work in sports psychology. He is fluent in German, French and English, and has been published in numerous journals and newspapers in Switzerland and the United States.

Coach Tschan and his wife, Vicki, reside in Newberg and have two children: Twila, 10, and Heidi, 8.

Ian Reschke

Assistant Coach

A former George Fox All-American midfielder, Ian Reschke is entering his third year as an assistant coach. Reschke



was named to the NAIA All-America First Team and the NAIA All-Far West First Team by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA), and to the NAIA All-Pacific Northwest Region Team and as an Honorable Mention All-American

by the NAIA in 1995. He was the MVP of George Fox's 1995 Northwest Conference championship team that finished 16-5, and was First Team All-NWC. In 1994, he made First Team All-Cascade Conference, and he was on the NAIA All-District 2 Second Team in 1993.

Reschke played four years for the Bruins, and currently stands 6th on the all-time list in games played (78), 7th in goals (26) and total points (74), and 8th in assists (22).

A top student, Reschke was named an NAIA All-American Scholar-Athlete, a First Team ISAA/Adidas All-American Scholar-Athlete, and to the ISAA/Adidas Scholar-Athlete All-Far West First Team in 1995. He was honored as George Fox's Outstanding Student in his athletic training major. For three summers (1997-99), he played with the USISL Cascade Surge team in Salem.

Reschke earned his bachelor's degree from George Fox in 1996, and a master of arts in teaching degree from George Fox in 1998. He currently teaches math at Wilsonville High, and lives with his wife, Carrie, in Vancouver, Wash.

Todd Williams

Goalkeeper Coach

Todd Williams begins his third season as coach of both the men's and women's goalkeepers. As a member of the George Fox men's soccer team from 1990-93,



Williams posted a career goals-against average of 1.69 with three shutouts, ranking fourth-best in team history in those categories.

Williams earned a bachelor's degree in biology from George Fox in 1994, and now works for Canby Companies Insurance. He is married to former GFU women's soccer player Lisel Goertzen, and they live in Tigard, Ore.

Athletic Director

Craig Taylor

Craig Taylor is in his 13th year as George Fox University athletics director, but he has been associated with the Bruins for 27 years as a player, coach, and professor.

Taylor, 49, first came to George Fox in 1971 as a junior forward for the men's basketball team. In 1972-73, he helped the Bruins to their first-ever NAIA District 2 title.

Taylor graduated from George Fox in 1974, receiving honors as the Outstanding Man in Teacher Education and Outstanding Physical Education Major. He received a master of science degree in education from Linfield College in 1975. While enrolled in graduate courses, he was a George Fox residence hall director.

From 1976-79, Taylor was the Bruins' baseball coach while also serving as assistant basketball coach. He also coached the softball team from 1981-88 and again in 1990, compiling a 77-99-1 record. In 1985, he was named NAIA District 2 Softball Coach of the Year.

At George Fox, Taylor is responsible for athletic department functions, including budgeting, department and sports center management, and eligibility and compliance with George Fox, Northwest Conference, and NCAA regulations. In 1992 he was named NAIA District 2 Administrator of the Year.

Taylor and his wife, Kathy, live in McMinnville and have three children: Leah, 26; Bree, 21, who plays volleyball for the Bruins; and Casey, 11.



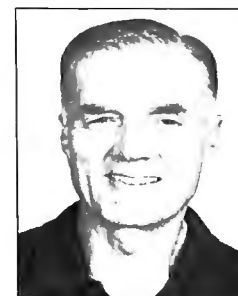

Findley is a graduate of Newberg High School and worked for the school district for four years before coming to George Fox in 1984 to work in the departments of teacher education/communications. She and her husband of 40 years, Jack, are active in the Friends Church, and have four children and six grandchildren, with a seventh due this fall.

The University

George Fox University, an evangelical Christian liberal arts college, is expanding, both in size and reputation. One of the fastest-growing institutions of higher learning in the United States, George Fox has seen its enrollment more than quadruple in the past 14 years, increasing from 549 in 1986 to 2,432 in the fall of 1999. University officials expect 2,636 students to enroll in the Fall of 2000.

Since 1986, George Fox University has been named one of "America's Best Colleges" 12 times by U.S. News & World Report. In 1999, George Fox ranked second and overall third in academic reputation among Western regional liberal arts colleges. The magazine also named the university one of the region's best values among schools in its category.

George Fox offers unique programs to its students. Every incoming freshman is

given a computer to use and keep upon graduation. When students reach their third year, they are eligible for the Juniors Abroad program, in which the University pays transportation costs for an overseas study tour.



The school's history began in 1885 when Willamette Valley Quaker settlers established Pacific Academy. It was during those early days that George Fox's

most prominent alumnus attended the school — Herbert Hoover, who later became the 30th president of the United States.

The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction and the name became Pacific College. In 1949, because of the many schools in the West with "Pacific" in their title, the name was changed to George Fox College, honoring the founder of the Friends (Quaker) Church.

In 1996, with the addition of Western Evangelical Seminary, George Fox became a university, offering students a Christ-centered education and the choice of 35 undergraduate majors and nine graduate degrees. On Jan. 1, 2000, the seminary was renamed George Fox Evangelical Seminary.

George Fox is located in Newberg, Ore. (pop. 17,355), 25 miles southwest of Portland, the state's largest metropolitan center of 1.7 million, and 32 miles northwest of Salem, the state capital.

Curtis and Margaret Morse Complex

George Fox University soccer, baseball, and softball teams have played home games on the three playing fields that comprise the Curtis and Margaret Morse Athletic Complex since 1989.

Located across from the Wheeler Sports Center on Fulton Street and Villa Road on the northeast corner of the campus, the complex was renovated using a major donation from Curtis and Margaret Morse, avid supporters of Bruin athletics. The Morse family has had a long association with George Fox, four

generations of the family having attended the Newberg school.

The Morse Soccer Field, home to both the men's and women's soccer teams, has a natural-grass surface, with temporary bleachers scattered around the field for seating up to 500 spectators, and an electronic scoreboard in the southeast corner.

Fund-raising efforts are now under way for a further renovation of the Morse Athletic Complex that will eventually result in new surfaces for the fields, increased and improved seating, and lights for night games, placing the Bruins' home facilities among the best in the nation at the Division III level.

Dr. David Brandt

University President

David Brandt, George Fox University's 11th president, came to the University in August, 1998, after three years as president of Tabor College in Hillsboro, Kan.

Brandt has international experience, traveling annually to Daystar University in Nairobi, Kenya, an institution he helped organize and for which he continues to serve on the United States board.

Brandt has experience at four other Christian colleges and describes himself as a "lifer" in Christian higher education." He has been vice president and provost at Bethel College in St. Paul, Minn.; dean and vice president for academic affairs at Messiah College in Grantham, Pa.; a physics instructor and

chairman of the Division of Natural Science and Mathematics at Gordon College in Wenham, Mass.; and a physics instructor at Wheaton (Ill.) College.

Brandt did his undergraduate work in physics at Wheaton. He earned a master of science degree in physics in 1962 from the University of Oklahoma, and a doctorate in physics in 1971 from the same university.

Brandt also taught physics in 1962-63



at the University of Omaha in Nebraska; was a demonstrator in physics at Brock University in St. Catharines, Ont., Canada in 1968-69; was a part-time engineer at Raytheon Co. in Sudbury, Mass., between 1972 and 1974; and was a consulting engineer for International

Telephone and Telegraph Corp. in Roanoke, Va., between 1975 and 1977. His research there on fiber optics resulted in two patent applications.

Background on the Bruin Nickname

George Fox's Bruin nickname comes from a real bear captured in 1887, just two years after Pacific Academy (the University's predecessor) was established. The small cub was found in the Coast Range foothills west of Carlton when its mother was shot. The young cub was brought to campus by a student and later lived with a faculty member.



When it grew to adulthood, it was kept in a pit in Hess Creek Canyon south of the campus. After it escaped one too many times, it was turned into steak for the dining table, and the hide was preserved on a frame and displayed in an early campus museum. When the bearskin deteriorated several years later, it was taken to a campus furnace room to be destroyed, but the framework proved a prob-

lem in dismantling so the pelt was left standing in a corner.

Students later found the old Bruin skin and began skirmishes over its ownership, a tradition that continues today. "Bruin Junior," a replica hide, is fought over periodically in class competitions, under a set of guidelines passed down for years. The class that is able to drag the Bruin replica physically off campus is declared the rightful owner until the bearskin is next "flashed."

Despite the Bruin tradition, somewhere along the line, because of the University's church affiliation, the "Quaker" tag for athletic teams became popular with sportswriters. The Quaker nickname was used for years, along with the mascot "Foxy George," a little fox with a Quaker hat. Both gained acceptance for a period in the 1950s and 1960s until a vote of faculty, students and administration in 1970 reinstated the Bruin nickname to its rightful place.

1999 Review

Young Bruins Finish 7-12

A youthful and competitive Bruin team kept it close most of the time, losing six one-goal games.

With a roster that featured only three returning starters and no seniors, the George Fox University men's soccer team faced an uphill battle in its bid to post a 14th straight winning season. In the end, the lack of experience and leadership that more mature players might have contributed led to a sub-.500 record and veteran coach Manfred Tschan's first losing season in his 17-year coaching career.

Bruins Come Up Just Short Too Often

It was a season of narrow misses for the Bruins, who played 10 games that were decided by a single goal, dropping six of them. A split in those losses would have kept them over .500.

The season began with three straight one-goal road defeats, including two on a trip to California against Chapman and Pomona-Pitzer. Returning home, the Bruins got back on the right track with wins over Western Baptist and Warner Pacific.

Then came the rugged Northwest Conference schedule, in which the Bruins went 5-9 and finished sixth in the eight-team league. The team swept Pacific University and posted home wins over Pacific Lutheran, Whitman, and Willamette. In three overtime conference matches, the Bruins went 2-1, with



Ryan Austin kicking in a winner at Pacific and Merrick Brownlee scoring an overtime goal to nail Whitman.

Twice the Bruins scored five goals in a game, posting 5-2 wins over both Warner Pacific and Pacific, the latter in the final game of the season. In each of those wins, the Bruins had one player score three goals, Jamie Johnson turning the trick against Warner Pacific and Brownlee doing the same against Pacific.

Post-Season Honors

Junior midfielder Merrick Brownlee led the Bruins in post-season honors, being named the team's Most Valuable Player and Best Offensive Player and earning All-Northwest Conference Second Team honors. He led the team in goals (11) and total points (29), was second in assists (7), and ranked second in the conference in points per game (1.53). With a decision to transfer to Oregon State University to complete his engineering degree, Brownlee ended his George Fox career ranking ninth in goals scored (19), 10th in goals per game (0.34), and 11th in total points (50).

Freshman Kevin Whitaker made an impression at midfielder in his first season, earning Honorable Mention All-Conference honors while scoring one goal and one assist. The Bruins hope to get him back in 2002 after he completes a two-year stint as a Mormon missionary.

In other George Fox awards, freshman defender Kevin Fleming received Best Defensive Player and Rookie of the Year honors, sophomore defender Austin was named Most Improved Player, and junior defender Greg Lutze was named the Most Inspirational Player.

George Fox University Bruin Athletics

Intercollegiate athletics are an important part of George Fox University, home to one of the Northwest's most successful small-college sports programs. Winning programs, however, are accompanied by a proper balance between academics and athletics: George Fox teams are members of the Northwest Conference and compete in Division III of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, in which need and academic ability, not athleticism, determine scholarships and financial aid.

At George Fox University, intercollegiate athletic competition provides a practical application of what is learned in classrooms and practices. Student-athletes compete for conference and national titles at a Christ-centered university where professors and coaches help them grow in mind, body and spirit. The values of athletics are integrated with the goals of Christian higher education in a process that includes

- physical conditioning
- managing emotions
- courage
- teamwork
- cooperation
- being gracious in winning and losing

More than 15 percent of George Fox's traditional undergraduate students participate in the school's 13 varsity sports, seven for women and six for men. Their records over the years serve as shining testimonies to the administration's conviction that an institution can play for the glory of God, follow the rules and ethics of its governing organizations, and be successful on the fields and courts of competition.

Consider that:

- George Fox has earned district or conference titles in 10 sports during the last decade.
- George Fox athletes have earned more than 250 All-American and All American Scholar-Athlete honors.
- Seven of the 11 coaches on staff have been named district or conference "Coach of the Year" at least once.
- George Fox coaches have held their

positions for an average of over eight years, and together have accumulated almost 1,000 collegiate wins.
