# Minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends 1938

1. Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends met, under the guidance and blessing of God, in its forty-sixth annual session, at Newberg, Oregon, at 9:30 A. M., June 8, 1938.

2. The song, "Jesus Keep Us near the Cross," opened the period of devotion and seemed to express the feeling of the meeting. The encouraging message that "Hitherto has the Lord helped us" and that "Henceforth He is able" was brought to the meeting by Kenneth Eichenberger.

The Presiding Clerk urged that the meeting be held on the basis of the guidance of the Holy Spirit and that we wait before the Lord for His direction in our worship.

"God is light and in Him is no darkness at all." Our growth and our following God depend upon our responding to the light which God has given us. The Light keeps on shining and willing souls can have the benefit of the light." These were the thoughts presented by Edgar Sims.

Friends were urged not to neglect the opportunity of testifying as it is a means of spiritual growth. The period of devotion closed with a prayer by Richard Haworth, a visiting minister from California.

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends—A Conference of Concerned Friends:

We advocate that a conference of Friends who hold the Gospel as the only cure for sin and its effects be held as soon as arrangements can be made for it.

That such a conference should be held is evident, first, because of the imperative need that a general revival of true religion should take place. This is an inescapable conclusion when we consider the wide-spread prevalence of moral declension throughout the earth; second, that Friends should have a considerable degree of influence in bringing about such a revival we can but feel intensely. Our church was brought into being because of the part it could have in promoting true spirituality; third we need this spiritual energizing on our own account. We cannot promote it in others unless we ourselves are possessors of it. We therefore urge that such a conference be held for prayer and for the consideration of the means that may be employed to bring about the desired ends.

The outstanding objectives of such a conference are a greatly increased interest in evangelism of a true spiritual type in our home land, the increase and intensification of the missionary zeal at home and abroad that souls in darkness may be brought to the knowledge of the true light and salvation through Christ. In the promotion of these ends prayer is the great essential and must have a prominent place.

In the interest of the above objectives we ask the Yearly Meeting to appoint a committee which shall have the entire matter under consideration and report its findings to the Yearly Meeting next year.

12. J. Allen Dunbar, Charles C. Haworth, Sophia E. Townsend, Walter P. Lee were appointed to act as a committee on returning minutes.

13. Frederick B. Baker, Milo C. Ross, Gladys Cook, and Carl F. Miller were chosen as a press committee.

14. The Recording Clerk was directed to secure a typist.

15. The Yearly Meeting favored giving the Evangelistic Board the privilege of having a public recognition service for newly recorded ministers during the sessions of the Yearly Meeting, as the need may arise.

16. The reports on the State of Society, from Quarterly Meetings, were read, a summary of which follows:

#### Summary of the Reports on the State of Society.

All meetings for worship and transaction of business have been regularly held. One meeting expressed thankfulness that the meetings for worship could be held unmolested. Some meetings report that the evening service is not so well attended, and others that the attendance at prayer meeting has gained. Most of the members live true and consistent lives and are careful of their conduct as becomes followers of Jesus Christ. Among them there is a spirit of unity and Christian fellowship.

Those having children under their care do attempt to train them for upright and useful lives. Different meetings report that many of their families have daily family worship.

All meetings oppose the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor as a beverage. Temperance is taught in all things.



The peace principles are maintained and taught. One meeting reported that some of the young men have stood true in a testing time at a State University.

The majority of members are conscientious about their business affairs but one meeting said that some of its members were not as careful as they should be in settling their accounts and involving themselves in business beyond their ability to manage.

Care for the education of the children has been taken by most of the members of the meetings.

The doctrinal standards of the Yearly Meeting have been upheld and care has been exercised in the appointment of officers, Sunday School teachers and in calling pastors.

17. A proposition was made that the Yearly Meeting send a note of appreciation to the officials of the State Colleges of Oregon and Idaho for granting exemption from military training to young Friends and to encourage them to grant this privilege to conscientious objectors of all denominations without unnecessary delay.

18. The Clerk gave instruction to the representatives as follows:

(1) To propose to the next session of the meeting names of persons to serve as Presiding Clerk, Recording Clerk, Reading Clerk and Announcing Clerk.

(2) To determine a ratio for raising funds and distributing documents.

(3) To propose funds to be raised for church work, and to nominate a Friend to serve as Treasurer for the ensuing year.

(4) To propose the name of one person in each Quarterly Meeting to receive and distribute documents.

(5) To propose names of persons to serve on the Printing Committee.

19. The meeting united in singing "Trust and Obey" after which Edward Mott gave the inspirational talk on the text, found in I John 2:3. "And hereby we do know that we know."

20. The meeting adjourned until 2:00 P. M.

21. The meeting convened according to adjournment and settled into a period of devotion.

23. In the absence of Viola Ball to serve on the Nominating Committee from Tacoma, the name of Bertha Jones was presented by the representatives of Tacoma Quarterly Meeting. This was accepted by the meeting.

24. The Executive Council recommends that the Statistical Secretary be made a member of the Executive Council. The Yearly Meeting approved of this recommendation.

25. Portland Quarterly Meeting announces the change in the time of its Quarterly Meeting in ninth month. It is to be held the first seventh day after the first second day. This was approved and will appear in the Appendix.

26. A communication was read from Iowa Yearly Meeting, announcing the observation of its seventy-fifth anniversary August 22 to 28 and asking that Oregon Yearly Meeting have a personal representative there.

A committee consisting of Charles C. Haworth, Chester A. Hadley and Calvin Choate were appointed to consider the matter and report its findings.

27. The chairman of the Epistle Committee asked for someone to fill the vacancy in the committee caused by the absence of Hazel Murphy. Sophia E. Townsend was chosen to take this place.

28. The reports of the state of society of the various Quarterly Meetings were discussed in the meeting. Members were urged to be positive in their ministry, to be thankful for the Christian privileges of worship that are now enjoyed.

29. The nominating committee is requested to check the lists in the directory and correct the addresses.

### CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

30. Marie Haines, the Superintendent of the Stewardship Department presented the following report which was accepted by the meeting:

Boise Valley reports a study of Stewardship by the Christian Endeavor and Sunday School followed by an enlistment campaign with 140 signing under one of four propositions presented. Two Quarterly Meetings had an exchange of pulpits on a Sunday all speaking on the subject of Stewardship. Our out-posts are also active along this line. Woodland reports tithers in the meeting



enthusiastic about the system and seeking to get more to adopt it. Prune Hill has a growing storehouse league. One chairman fittingly says "This grace is not something to be put on or taken off as a cloak, it is a life lived."

Joseph G. Reece sang a solo, "Shall I Empty Handed Be?"

Frederick B. Baker gave an address on stewardship. God is the Senior partner and the individual is the bookkeeper and the books should be carefully kept. Prayer and not worry about temporal affairs brings God down from heaven to live and work with men. The tithe belongs to the Lord.

### LITERATURE

31. The department of Literature was in charge of Grace Hadley, the Superintendent. She spoke of the exhibit of the Primary work that illustrated the Bible stories. Some thought-provoking posters were shown to the meeting.

A reading contest of religious books was held in Salem Quarterly Meeting, 84,880 pages were read, also 4,700 chapters of the Bible. The booklet, "The Upper Room" is used by forty five homes for devotional reading in Portland Quarter, also several books, "The Christ of the Eternities," by Edward Mott, and booklets by Edward Simms have been purchased. Boise Quarter donated books to start a library at Vale. Sixty-five of Charles Fuller's "Heart to Heart" talks, and one hundred scripture text calendars were sold and given away.

Newberg reports ten new Bibles for one church, and another has been supplying hospitals with good reading and sent magazines to lumber camps, co-operating with the Anderson distributing system.

The superintendent also presented various books that were suitable for different ages.

Everett Craven gave a talk on Literature. He said that the Bible should hold the pre-eminent place in the life of the Christian. A preacher should know what the members of his congregation are reading and should keep abreast of the times.

32. The meeting adjourned to meet at 9:30 a. m. Thursday, June 9, 1938.

33. The meeting convened according to adjournment and settled into a period of devotion. Carl F. Miller led in prayer.

34. The minutes were read, corrected and approved.

35. The statistical report was read and approved and will appear in the Appendix.

37. The quota for Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting being eighteen, the representatives voted to seat two additional alternates as representatives since sixteen appeared on the regular list. This was approved by the meeting.

38. Edward Mott, Mary C. Sutton and Chester A. Hadley were named by the representatives to serve as a printing committee.

39. The Representatives reported that the proposition from Salem Quarterly Meeting in regard to exchange of epistles with Central Yearly Meeting was quite thoroughly discussed and it was the decision of this body to recommend that we do not accept this proposition. The meeting approved of the action of the representatives.

40. The Representatives reported that the proposition from Portland Quarterly Meeting relative to a publicity committee was considered and it was decided to recommend that this be not approved but that newspaper men be referred to the proper authority in the meeting for news. This was accepted by the meeting.

### BIBLE SCHOOL AND RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

41. Kester L. Mendenhall, the Superintendent of the department presented the statistical report from the Bible Schools and gave helpful comments on the items. The report was approved by the meeting and appears below:

K. L. Mendenhall, Superintendent

Frederick B. Baker gave the address for the department on the subject, "The Evolution of the Sunday School." He mentioned five periods in the development of the Sunday School—the Jewish, the period of the early Christian Church, Robert Raikes period, the modern Sunday School movement, and the future Sunday School. Training is absolutely necessary for teachers in the Sunday School. The Bible should be the chief text book and evangelism should be emphasized in every Sunday School. Bible school is a better name than Sunday School as learning and training should continue throughout the week not only on Sunday.

"My Message to Sunday School Workers," by Marion Lawrence was recommended by the speaker.

## TEMPERANCE

42. Harold P. Mills, the Superintendent of the Temperance Department gave the report which was accepted by the meeting.

Nearly all the Monthly Meetings report talks, demonstrations, or other special features on Temperance Sundays, a few every month, and one only occasionally.

In response to the question, "Can you suggest any way in which the Quarterly Meeting Superintendents or the Yearly Meeting Superintendent of temperance can be of greater service to the local committees or monthly meetings?" several suggestions came in which indicate the kind of assistance needed to make the service of the superintendents more effective. One monthly meeting suggests that the Quarterly Meeting Superintendent visit the various Sunday Schools and present the work of the Temperance Department. Another requests that material for short plays in Sunday School be provided. Several requested literature and plans for temperance work.

Among the items of interest reported are the following: Scott's Mills Monthly Meeting helped in a successful campaign to prohibit the sale of intoxicants in their town.

Portland First Church secured the cooperation of other churches, the Parent-Teacher's Association and other organizations of their community to drive out a State Liquor Store. The result of this battle is still undetermined.

Two Monthly Meetings report some form of special work among the children resulting in eighty four signing temperance pledges.

Many of our members are actively engaged in W. C. T. U. work. One Quarterly Meeting Superintendent of Temperance reports that he has sent out notes each quarter to the Monthly Meetings for use on Temperance Sunday.

This suggestion comes from Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting. Superintendent of Temperance: "Each member of the Friends Church should consider it his sacred duty to keep informed on all issues of social morality and act on such information. The devil loves ignorance as it is the mother of idleness."

The Yearly Meeting Superintendent of Temperance had hoped to continue the work in Alcohol Education begun last year but unavoidable circumstances made it impossible. Only one illustrated lecture has been given since last year's report. Literature dealing with alcohol, tobacco, and marijuana has been sent to the Monthly Meetings.

Harold P. Mills, Superintendent

Charles C. Haworth brought a message from Isaiah 5:20 emphasizing especially the dangers and evils of gambling. Gamblers produce nothing but take something from one person and give it to another. An outraged public conscience brings reform.

"Repeal's Broken Promises" was the subject of a talk by Morris Heacock. He showed graphically the increase of liquor advertising, of crime and kidnapping. Federal prisons are filled with liquor violators.

43. Earl F. Aiken, pastor of the Free Methodist church, O. J. Morris, pastor of the Presbyterian church and George Culver, pastor of the Nazarene church were introduced to the meeting.

44. Earl Barker, an instructor at Portland Bible Institute and a minister of the Gospel, brought the message at the Inspirational Hour from 1 Corinthians 1: 17-25, emphasizing especially the importance of the right kind of preaching, the kind that is inspired by God and is true, and exalts Christ crucified.



45. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 P. M.

46. The meeting convened at the appointed time. The Presiding Clerk offered prayer at the time of the devotional period.

### EVANGELISTIC AND CHURCH EXTENSION

47. The annual report was read by Chester A. Hadley, the General Superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting. This report was acceptable to the meeting and appears below:

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

##### Introduction

I am reading my eighth Annual report. I have perused those of the preceding years with interest, and have resolved that this one shall be much shorter than any of its predecessors. Not that there is a lack of material upon which to enlarge, but we have reached that stage in development and growth where concrete illustrations takes the place of anticipation and desire.

##### A Busy Year

This has been by far the busiest year of my services as Superintendent. Through all the activities I have constantly prayed that in the true sense of the word I might be able to say "I am among you as one that serveth." This was the keynote of the ministry of our Lord and should ever be the objective of his followers.

Two thousand letters have been mailed from the Church office. I have spoken in public services, either in sermons or missionary addresses one hundred and forty-five times. I have traveled 29,000 miles, and held numerous personal interviews and committee meetings, and have edited the Church Window Department of the Friendly Endeavor each month of the year.

##### Four Conferences Attended

I attended four conferences during the summer and fall, conducting classes at two of them. The first of these was at Lake Sequoia in California held by the Christian Endeavor Union of the Northern Quarterly Meeting of California Yearly Meeting. I conducted the Inspirational hour at this conference. At Twin Rocks and at Surprise Lake I conducted Study Class groups.

Later in the fall together with Milo Ross, Joseph Reece, A. Clark Smith and Edward Harmon I attended unofficially the sessions of the "All Friends Conference" held in Philadelphia.

##### Monthly Meeting Visitations

Together with Helen Cammack, returned missionary from our own field in Bolivia, South America, I visited nearly all of the meetings in the interests of a combined study of our Home and Foreign work. These meetings proved to be a real blessing to all in attendance, and we have reasons to believe, have helped to a clearer understanding of our responsibility at home and in Bolivia.

##### Four Revivals Held

I held four revival meetings during the year at the following places: East Bench Vale, Oregon, Capay Rancho in California, Scotts Mills, Oregon and at First Friends Church, Portland, Oregon. At Vale, Oregon I was assisted in the meeting by Merle Green whose

ministry was very much appreciated. At the Church in Portland I assisted Joseph Reece the pastor during Easter Passion week.

#### Four Meeting Houses Being Erected

Four new churches are in the process of erection, three of them at our outpost points as follows: Oak Park in Camas, Washington, Woodland, Idaho and Ontario Heights, Oregon. The fourth is the chapel at La Paz, Bolivia, South America which is nearing completion. Each of these places has been approved by the Yearly Meeting Evangelistic and Church Extension Board and will receive the benefit of the \$1.00 pledge appeal which at the present time amounts to \$420.00 if every one of the 420 pledges are paid. This sum should be increased materially.

#### New Parsonage at Rose Valley Serves As Meeting House

A beautiful new parsonage at Rose Valley is nearing completion. The pastor, Oscar N. Brown, has moved his family in, and the two front rooms are being used for worship.

#### Prune Hill Purchases Permanent Home and Establishes Monthly Meeting

The Friends at Prune Hill are enjoying the privilege of a home of their own having purchased the Prune Hill Grade School Building. The accepted bid on the building and acre of ground was \$1050.00 which is being paid for at the rate of \$15.00 a month.

They are now in the process of having a Monthly Meeting established with a charter membership of thirty-six.

#### Greenleaf Plans New Church

Greenleaf meeting has outgrown its present meeting house. This edifice was built over 25 years ago and has served the community for one quarter of a century. "Standing Room only" is the usual occurrence on Sunday morning and during the past few months they have had the largest attendance in the history of the meeting.

#### Evangelistic Meetings Held

Again as in the past God has blessed the ministry of our evangelists and many spiritual victories have been reported and appear in the tabulated report.

#### Pastoral Situation

A few changes are being made this fall. Zenas Perisho is closing three years of faithful ministry at East Bench Vale. This point is a pioneer work in a newly opened irrigation project. His successor is to be Loren Burton, a graduate this June from Portland Bible Institute. Francis and Leah Ohse are leaving Rose-dale Friends Church in order to finish their college education. They have labored acceptably at this point for the past two years. A. Clark Smith who has ministered to the Melba meeting for the past ten years is leaving that point and has accepted a call to Second Friends Church, Portland, Oregon where Calvin R. Choate has had seven years of fruitful ministry with them. George and Mary Lou Palmer who have been working for the past 11 months at Oak Park Outpost are leaving that work to attend college. Frederick Baker is to assume the pastorate at Oak Park June 19th. Glen Har-worth who has been in charge of the work at West Mill Plain for two years is finishing P. B. I. and expects to return to California early in the summer. Other pastoral changes occurring before the printing of the Minutes will be added. Robert and Lela Morrill have resigned from Marion and William Watson will serve there.

#### Other Departments Busy

The other departments of the Yearly Meeting have been busy with their work. The Missionary Department's report will be heard tomorrow and will reveal a most encouraging condition.



The Christian Endeavor is one of our most vital departments. Under the fine leadership of our president, Paul Cammack and the Quarterly Meeting superintendents this part of our church is ministering to the spiritual and recreational needs of our young people in a most satisfactory manner.

#### Closing Injunction:

For years we have prayed for growth and expansion. Now God is answering our prayers. Will we rally to the great opportunity that He is presenting to us? I know that we will.

48. Oliver Weesner, President of the Board, expressed the appreciation of the Board for the work of Marietta Lewis who has been the secretary of the group for thirty three years. Her resignation as secretary was accepted with regret.

The members of the meeting stood to express their appreciation of the work of Marietta Lewis on the Evangelistic and Church Extension Board.

Marietta Lewis has served faithfully and well on the Evangelistic and Church Extension Board of the Oregon Yearly Meeting for more than 30 years. Her zealous services have been an inspiration to members of the Board and to those in the outpost regions to whom her communications have come, and to all the Yearly Meeting.

49. The outpost workers took their places on the platform and were introduced to the meeting. Alison and Inez Rogers from Vancouver, Washington; Lewis and Myrtle Russell from Northeast Tacoma, Washington, who have been twenty-six years in Gospel service in Oregon Yearly Meeting; Dillon Mills from Woodland, Idaho; Esther L. Hendricks from Bethany church, in Seattle, Washington; Mildred Raymond from Rosemere; Frederick B. Baker from Prune Hill and Oak Park; Glen Haworth from West Mill Plain; Mary Allen, a parish worker in the community of Oak Park; Oscar Brown from Rose Valley; Leroy White from Ontario Heights; Ava Brown, from Ardenvoir; Robert and Lela Morrill from Marion. All these workers told of their labor in the various fields, giving God the praise for victories won.

Because there were no representatives from Vale, Greer and Johnstown, Chester A. Hadley told of the work in these places. Zenas Perisho is leaving the work at Vale and Loren Burton is to take charge of the work there. Curtis Morse and his wife are doing good work at Greer and Johnstown, especially among the Sunday School children.

Chester Hadley made a special appeal for the United Bud-

50. Oliver Weesner, President of the Evangelistic and Church Extension Board, read the statistical report of the Board in summary. The Yearly Meeting approved of the report and it will appear in full in the Appendix.

51. The Executive Committee recommends to the Yearly Meeting that Chester A. Hadley be retained as General Superintendent with a salary consideration of \$1,500.00, the same as last year, and a travel expense allowance of \$350.00.

The report was accepted by the meeting by a rising vote.

If approved by the Yearly Meeting the representatives recommend that the nomination of this committee be referred to the Yearly Meeting Nominating Committee. The report was accepted by the meeting.

57. The meeting convened according to adjournment and entered into a period of devotion. Charles C. Haworth led in prayer.

58. The minutes were read, corrected and approved.

59. The committee appointed to study the question of sending an official representative from this Yearly Meeting, to attend the seventy fifth session of Iowa Yearly Meeting to be held August 22 to 28 of this year makes the following report:

"Having been informed that Edward Mott has a concern to attend Iowa Yearly Meeting, we are united in recommending that he be sent as our official representative and that funds for his traveling expenses be raised in the face of the meeting."

## REPORT OF THE AUDITING COMMITTEE

We, your Auditing Committee, have carefully examined the accounts and records of the Treasurer of Oregon Yearly Meeting for the year ending May 31, 1938, and find them correct and kept in a very satisfactory manner.

62. The Representatives reported that they approved of the recommendation of the Entertainment Committee as related to next Yearly Meeting that the dormitory be engaged with a charge of \$1.00 per bed and that the charge for supper be lowered to twenty-five cents.

This was approved by the meeting.

## PEACE

63. The Superintendent of Peace, Levi T. Pennington, presided at this meeting and read his annual report. The report was accepted as read:

### REPORT OF PEACE SUPERINTENDENT FOR 1937-38

In the world of today, torn by wars and threatened by war on a vastly more terrible scale, the friends of peace have taken widely differing attitudes during the past year. Some have apparently yielded to the counsel of despair and have abated their efforts, under the conviction that the war madness of the world cannot be cured; some, believing that anything can be done that ought to be done, are working with the confidence that the great mass of humanity want peace and that it is only necessary to give form and substance to this will to peace in order to secure and assure the permanent peace of the world; still others, with conviction that it is impossible to prevent ALL wars, especially with the present attitude of humanity, are working hard as opportunity seems to offer for the prevention of all wars that may be prevented at present, for the removal of racial antagonisms, international hostilities, and multiform injustices which grow out of selfishness and greed, and for the cultivation of the spirit of good will which if sufficiently carried out would make wars impossible.

Surely in view of the traditional testimony of the Society of Friends and of our faith in a God of love, no one of us is justified in taking the hopeless attitude. It is obligatory upon us all to seek earnestly to know what we ought to do, and to work industriously toward the accomplishment of everything possible to save the world from the curse of war.

The activities of Oregon Yearly Meeting during the past year have been directed principally in two directions: first, toward the creation of peace sentiment and a peace psychology; and second, toward the influencing of those in authority in the direction of peace.

Along the latter line have been numerous petitions and protests sent to government officials from quarterly meetings, monthly meetings, and individuals. An accurate account of these is difficult to the point of impossibility. Of the communications from meetings, one quarterly meeting reports five, and "innumerable" personal communications; other quarterly meetings make no distinction between action by meetings and personal action. These communications have gone to members of the national House and Senate, to the secretary of state, and to the president of the United States; and while it is not easy to point out the exact result of them, that they have had an influence is clear from the replies received.

These communications to government officials have had to do with our protest against increased preparation for war and against actions on the part of the government which in the judgment of the

ones writing were likely to encourage war, and with our effort to promote governmental action which would definitely promote peace.

The reports received from the quarterly meetings included such things as the statement that only part of the monthly meetings reported; that no meeting was held early in the year to plan the work, etc. But some of the meetings have made careful plans and in some monthly meetings splendid work has been done in the interests of peace.

Reports show that 18 meetings were held in the interests of peace; that 51 sermons and addresses were given on some phase of the peace question within the year, and one open forum conducted; that no friends are reported as participating in active military service; that members of the yearly meeting have taken a variety of periodicals dealing with the subject of peace, including "Messenger of Peace," "Peace Action," "World Events," "The War Resister," "The Arbitrator," the bulletins of the International Policy Association, of the Council for International Friendship Through the Churches, and a considerable number of other publications which have a definitely pacifist policy but that are not devoted exclusively to the subject of peace.

One meeting reports that peace orations by two Pacific College students were given at quarterly meeting. One report records the fact that through their own objection to military training and the efforts of their parents and their pastor, four of our young men were excused from military training in state institutions of higher education.

In the matter of money expended in the peace cause, most of the meetings have little to report directly, since most of our funds are contributed through other agencies. One meeting reports \$17.50 paid to the local representative of the National Council for Prevention of War. Other meetings are known to have made substantial contributions to this and to other peace agencies, though these were not reported. One meeting reports 1500 pages of literature on peace distributed, and this one meeting reports 25 communications to government officials.

The peace superintendent has given 15 addresses during the year dealing wholly or partly with the subject of peace. He has been able this year to respond to every invitation which Oregon Yearly Meeting Friends have given for service of this kind.

Among the suggestions for more active work for the ensuing year is the insistence that more public meetings ought to be held by Friends, properly to develop an understanding of our own religious peace testimony and to make us efficient promoters of peace, and also to spread the peace message to others outside our own denomination. One quarterly meeting urged that we protest against the sale of munitions to warring countries. One meeting urged especially the increase of our earnestness in prayer for our own country and the world to the God of "peace and good will among men," that peace might prevail. This same quarterly meeting urged a return to sanity in the matter of international relations, and the abandonment of the mad armament race which threatens the whole world. Another meeting urges greater stress on peace education, and tells of emphasis in the Bible Schools on the rights of other nations and an appreciation of their contributions to the world.

A number of these activities have been, as will be seen, directed toward the more distant goal of education and the building up of a peace psychology, rather than opportunism and the work for the immediate present. The distribution of peace literature, the holding of peace meetings, contests, conferences, etc., while dealing with the immediate present to a degree, are all aimed at more distant and more permanent results. Among the agencies of this sort one would include the peace education in our schools and colleges,



the conferences on international relations, and the cooperative work with other organizations such as the National Council for Prevention of War, the Peace Association of Friends in America, the peace section of the American Friends Service Committee, the National Peace Council, etc. Some of these organizations have given us the opportunity of hearing notable peace speakers such as Jeannette Rankin, Kirby Page, Muriel Lester, and others of great power and influence in the peace movement.

One of the very fine contributions to this line of work was the study class each day for a week at the Tacoma Quarterly Meeting Christian Endeavor conference, under the leadership of Harold P. Mills.

With the earnest hope that more adequate planning and more earnest effort may make the peace work of the Oregon Yearly Meeting still more effective during the coming year.

The Superintendent mentioned many books related to the subject of Peace and also told of the Institute of International Relations that is to be held this summer in Portland.

Richard Haworth, a minister from California Yearly Meeting gave a talk on the topic, "What ought Friends to be doing in the Interest of Peace?" He used the text from Matthew 26:52. People should be posted on Congressional action and should send letters and telegrams to their senators and representatives to let them know how the individuals at home feel about the various questions in Congress. He quoted from William Jennings Bryan who said, "Throw around your enemies a circle of love and make it so extensive that the enemy can not get beyond it."

#### 64. The Peace Department made the following report:

The Peace Department of Oregon Yearly Meeting, to whom was referred the communication from Portland Quarterly Meeting on the subject of our scriptural message on peace, recommends that the Yearly Meeting encourage all its subordinate meetings and its members to promote vigorously, not only those views of Christian truth which we share with all other evangelical Christians, but also those peculiar views which have characterized us in some measure as differing from other denominations, including our teachings on the subject of peace. We recommend that the Yearly Meeting especially encourage the teaching of the scriptural message of peace in our meetings, our Bible Schools, our young People's societies and other church agencies, in our homes, and in our contacts with others outside of our own membership.

This was accepted by the meeting.

65. The Peace Department also presented the letter which is to be sent to the authorities of the State College in regard to exemption from military service, and this was approved by the meeting.

66. The inspirational hour was in charge of Levi T. Pennington and he brought real inspiration to the hearts of

the people by speaking of the omniscience, omnipresence and omnipotence of God.

67. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 P. M.

FRIDAY, 2:00 P. M.

68. At the appointed time the meeting convened and prayer was offered by S. Lewis Hanson during the devotional period.

69. The summary of the epistles from the twelve American Yearly Meetings was read, also the summary of six epistles from foreign lands.

70. Annis Brady asked to be excused from her duties as representative. The request was granted.

71. The Executive Committee made the following recommendations:

1. That the Yearly Meeting grant the Evangelistic and Missionary Boards of the Yearly Meeting the privilege of borrowing if necessary a sum of money, not to exceed \$1,000.00 during the ensuing year.

This recommendation was approved by the meeting.

2. That the Evangelistic Board be granted the privilege of taking offerings at the Sunday services of Yearly Meeting.

The meeting approved this recommendation.

3. That the Missionary Board be allowed to take an offering after the Missionary service to apply on the chapel in Bolivia.

This was approved by the meeting.

4. That the meeting raise sixty dollars for the traveling expenses of Edward Mott as the official representative to Iowa Yearly Meeting.

This was approved by the meeting. The collection was taken and amounted to twenty-eight dollars and ten cents.

The Executive recommends that the balance necessary for the traveling expenses of Edward Mott, be made up from the Fixed Expense.

#### 72. The Trustees made the following report:

"The Trustees of Oregon Yearly Meeting recommend that the name of the Building Fund under action of the Yearly Meeting, page 88, paragraph number two, be changed to the "Reserve Fund" to be used by the treasurer of the Yearly Meeting, and the disposition of the fund as outlined under paragraph 2, page eighty eight be rescinded.

"We recommend the sale of the Kelso property and that the proceeds of said sale be used at Rose Valley at the discretion of a joint action of the trustees and Evangelistic Board.

### FOREIGN MISSIONS

73. Joseph W. McCracken, Superintendent of the Department of Foreign Missions, read the report by totals and it will appear in the Appendix.

A song, "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name" was sung by the meeting, after which Helen Cammack showed some of the hand work made in the various churches of the Yearly Meeting. She also mentioned various books that would give a better understanding of the conditions in South America.

Chester A. Hadley, the General Superintendent, presented the Eighth annual report of the Field Superintendent:

#### EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FIELD SUPERINTENDENT, LA PAZ, BOLIVIA, 1937-1938

The year 1937-'38 has not been without it's blessings. Not the least of these blessings has been Christ's "Lo, I am with you always, even until the end of the world." To have HIM with us, and be thoroughly conscious of that Presence, has frequently been our only stay and hope.

At the present time the political situation of the nation has the appearance of stability. During the course of the year there have been two revolutions, one of which was successful. In order to bring the government back to a constitutional form the present military commission which is in charge of the administration conducted an election of Senators and Representatives. There has been no Congress for almost four years, administrative measures being carried out by means of "decrees" approved and published by the President and his cabinet, or by the "military commission" which is in charge of affairs at present. An election of President and Vice-President is to be held within a short time, if all goes well. The matter of administrations is of great interest to the mission as the type of administration determines the degree of religious liberty we are to enjoy.

#### Missionaries Have Been Located in the Field as Follows;

The Tamplins in La Paz are in charge of the administrative work of the mission. Beside these tasks their time has been occupied with pastoral work, Bible Classes, Evangelistic trips, conferences, building and numerous indescribable errands.

To Esther Gulley has fallen the difficult task of supplying wherever there might be a need. She has filled this task with grace and competence. She has served in the class room, in the pulpit, in the



clinic, at the bedside of the travailing mother, and in the night watches with the dying persons. Both La Paz and Corocoro have been her fields of labor.

Howard and Julia Pearson have "fought with the beasts" of opposition in Corocoro. The field which seemed so easy to enter has proven a difficult field indeed. Romanism does not die easily. Though smaller than at the beginning, the attendance is still good. Though efforts were made to make it impossible for the Pearsons to obtain certain foodstuffs, they have not lacked the necessary things. We thank God Who always causes us to triumph. Not that the fight is over, but past victories encourages us to believe God for the outcome of the future battles.

The beneficial influence of Helen Cammack's presence in the homeland have been felt by us here on the field. We trust and pray that her continued presence during the sessions of the Yearly Meeting may contribute to the interest for us who are afar off.

#### The Work of the National Workers Has Been Highly Gratifying

Cipriano Mamani and wife continue their faithful labor in Amakari, on Lake Titicaca. The work continues to grow under their direction and new believers have been added to the flock.

Felix Hermosa and wife have done a work of sacrifice about Puerto Perez. Though the residents of the port itself still resist all efforts at evangelization, a great deal of intolerance has been broken down. However, the storekeeper still refuses to sell to them or to anyone who attend the services. They are able to buy only as they employ a third party. There are believers in other places nearby who have accepted the Gospel through hearing it preached by the Hermosas in the plaza. Their influence has extended far beyond the little port through tract distribution, sales of Bibles and Testaments and ministry to the sick. Don Felix is at present laid up with an ulcerated leg which is causing him a great deal of inconvenience. There was born to the Hermosas in February, 1938, another little daughter—Esther. They now have Ruth and Esther.

The hearty response of the believers in La Paz to the call to evangelize the outlying fields has been a great comfort to the missionaries. They have willingly sacrificed time from work to hold services on the street, in the plazas of Villa Vicotria, Laja, Achocalla and Tambillo. Trips were made regularly every week-end (two teams in different places) when weather would permit. Among their listeners have been officials, military men, lawyers, Roman priests. In only one place were they met with open opposition. In this place the priest incited the local authorities to arrest the believers and take away from them their legalized license to hold such services. God helped us to win this little "skirmish" and on the last trip out there the priest satisfied himself by coming to the believers in open plaza and saying, "It is time for mass now, and we are going to ring the bells. Will you please bring this service to a close so the people will come in?"

Lately a new place of visitation has been added to the list—the town of Palca. The Word of Life was preached with great liberty and many invitations were extended to the believers to come back and hold regular services there.

A man of mestizo type came to our meeting one day and took his place at the altar of prayer with some Indians. He was nicely dressed and cultured. Being lame he could not kneel, so stood by the altar while we tried to teach him to pray. He then asked for a Testament, Gospels and tracts to help him evangelize his home town. Upon inquiry I found that he came from Luribay, to the south of us. He had heard one of our boys give his testimony in a stable in La Paz, and he said, "I want the Gospel that saves a man from sin like this Indian has testified." We thank God for this

new, zealous believer in that immense, untouched southern district.

Other forward steps in the development of the mission during the past year are, the purchase of mission property, the beginning of a mission publication—"The Soul-Cry of the Aymara"—published quarterly, and the preparations for opening a Bible school to run through the rainy season—January to March inclusive of 1939.

At the time of this writing the new church building is nearing completion. Meetings are being held in the basement until the main auditorium—with a seating capacity of 300—may be ready for service. As soon as the main auditorium is ready the meetings will be held there and the basement re-arranged for living quarters for the missionaries and school room. As living quarters, it is not expected that the basement will be satisfactory for a short time only. The building is in an attractive location and will be worthy of the Yearly Meeting and the Gospel which it represents. The native church has given an offering of Bs.691.05 (which represents as much to them as the same amount in American dollars would to Oregon Yearly Meeting) in cash. Beside this cash offering many have come and worked on the building without remuneration, and others have worked at reduced salaries. The missionaries express to Oregon Yearly Meeting their appreciation of the wonderful spirit of sacrifice and co-operation with us in this great undertaking. It is hoped that the dedication service may be held either the third or fourth First-day of Sixth month.

The mission feels keenly the shortcomings and imperfections of "The Soul-Cry of the Aymara." We also feel that it has already more than repaid the labor, weariness and trials that it costs to put it out, by the encouraging expressions received by the editor from its patrons. It is our hope that it may be in truth the soul-cry of the people to whom we minister in your stead.

There is great enthusiasm manifest in the prospect of opening the Bible School. It is the faith of the missionaries that it will soon grow into an organization that will prepare pastors and evangelists to lift the weary hands. Pray for it.

The Annual Conference in April, 1938, was by far the best attended that we have yet held, there being over fifty visitors present from neighborpoints. Visitors were fed and "slept" on the mission property and with disposable mission resources. How fine to have a strong missionary force to take charge of the classes and preaching services! It was a time of great heart-searching for all. Every class was a spiritual preparation for evangelistic efforts. The needs of body, mind and spirit were ministered to. There was never a fruitless altar call, and seldom less than 15 seekers, often as many as 20 or 25. How wonderful to see souls seeking God with strong crying and prayer! And yet we are barely touching the fringes of the thronging thousands! The climax of spiritual enthusiasm was reached on Sunday afternoon following a message on "Witnessing", when the whole chapel space was turned into an altar and the people with tears and purpose consecrated themselves to a more faithful testimony; and pastors and missionaries dedicated themselves anew to their stubborn task of carving a mystic church out of the unlovely and age-hardened "stone."

It is also worthy of note that the native church in La Paz, in addition to paying salary of Cipriano Mamani and wife, and giving nearly Bs. 700.00 toward the new church building, has undertaken a part of the salary of the teacher of the primary school in La Paz.

This report looks rather gratifying as compared to former years. But when compared to the great unfinished task it is as but a drop in the ocean. The missionary is never satisfied with past accomplishments. The missionary has an incurable "malady." He no sooner sees one field opened to the Gospel, and occupied, than he begins to yearn and pray over another. And when that one is reached, he must press on to yet another. Every mountain top scaled in his journeys discovers to him numerous other villages and towns the smoke of whose fires still curls upward about the silk-clothed idols, filters through chimneyless straw roofs to darken the sky over thousands of thousands who are yet being born, living and dying without a knowledge of the Gospel or hope of salvation. The missionary's heart burns out in prayer and desperation for those who, if he brings them not the Gospel, must live in vice, cursing and bloodshed, and then die in utter misery and despair without God. And so:—

#### (A LIVING SACRIFICE)

He bows the weary head in prayer;  
Tears from his heaving breast  
The quivering heart,  
And holds unto himself  
No living part,  
But leaves it on the altar there,  
A living, pulsing thing  
That knows no rest.

Though the sky, o'er cast by clouds,  
Rends with lightning flash  
And the blast of thunder,  
And birds of prey,  
Whirling, wonder,  
On downward swoop,  
He shelters not his heart with any shroud;  
But holds it up  
To heaven's refreshing splash,  
And, thus, is blest.

Behind him lie the lights of home,  
It's tender, loving cheer;  
Before him only pain and groans  
And desert pathway drear.  
He knows it not, nor takes account,  
Nor holds his life more dear  
Than that of Him on Calv'ry's Mount,  
Forced by nail and spear.

So, thus he travels on, and on,  
And on ——— and on ——— and on,  
And thrusts his heart ahead of him  
Until his day is done.

He looks not to the world about,  
Nor to that home behind  
But upward, onward, reaches out  
Unto the heavenly mind  
Of Him Who journeyed on and on  
To bring him rest. (CGT)

Such amusements dull the spiritual perceptions and the sense of right and wrong.

Nor are we alone in this conclusion. It is the conviction of a large number of experienced and by no means narrow minded people, that these and many other amusements current in our day divert the mind and heart from those deeper interests which are vital to the welfare of the soul and weaken that measure of service which we should render.

With reverence and thanksgiving we profess our unwavering allegiance to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Our individual obligation to the master of life will often require the sacrifice of lesser things for the sake of the Soul's clear vision and that highest service to others which after all is the Christ-like life.

#### REPORT OF GREENLEAF ACADEMY FOR THE YEAR 1937-38

At one time the Society of Friends maintained a number of academies. Today Greenleaf is one of the few remaining institutions of this type.

Greenleaf Academy is filling a unique place in the field of secondary education. It maintains a four-year high school course, fully accredited under the Idaho State Board of Education, which enables the school to have equal standing with other schools.

On Thursday, May 26, 1938, Greenleaf Academy concluded its thirtieth year of service and one of the most outstanding years in its history. We most humbly acknowledge God's blessing in making the year one of unusual activity and progress.

The registration has been the largest in many years, 61 students having enrolled, two from Alaska.

On December, the 22nd, the combined boys' and girls' choruses, under the direction of William Murphy presented the Christmas concert, "The Coming of the Christ." The concert was well received by a large audience.

Three students, Lela Hawley, Frances Dunbar, and Wayne Roberts, entered the District Declamation Festival. Lela, whose reading was adjudged "superior," was sent on to the Southern Idaho Festival at Twin Falls.

Almost the entire student body participated in the District Music Festival at Nampa. The Academy was represented by the com-

bined Boys' and Girls' Chorus, the Boys' Quartet, the Girls' Sextet, and several vocal soloists. All did commendable work. The Boys' Quartet and the Girls' Sextet were adjudged "excellent."

With all of these activities there has been a balance of emphasis on high scholarship and character building. There has been ample opportunity for Christian growth and decision in chapel services, prayer meetings, and church services. Many took a definite stand for Christ during the splendid meetings held by Hubert Mardock. Our pastor, Milo C. Ross, has been of great assistance to the student body.

The baccalaureate sermon was given this year by Mr. E. W. Stuchbery, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Caldwell. His subject was "Five Lamps for the Path of Life."

A forum discussion was a unique feature of the class day program, a departure from the customary orations. This was coached by Miss Jackson, and was very well received.

Dr. R. H. Leach, President of the College of Idaho, presented the commencement address, speaking on the subject, "The Challenge of the New Day." Following this, diplomas were given to seventeen graduates, the largest senior class in the history of the school.

The scholarships given by Pacific College and the Northwest Nazarene College were awarded to Wilma Tish and Frances Dunbar. The junior scholarship was won by Wayne Roberts, with the unusual average of 97.9 for his three years' work.

The splendid cooperation of community and student body throughout this year has been much appreciated, and plans for the new school year give promise of development and better days ahead as Greenleaf Academy faces the future.

The year just closing has been marked in many ways by the manifest blessing of God, for which we are genuinely grateful. There have been some especial difficulties, but on the whole the work of the college has been very successful.

**Commencement Exercises**

The close of the college year was marked by the graduation exercises in which the address "Toward a New Utopia" was given by Professor Russell W. Lewis, a graduate of Pacific Academy and of Pacific College, for 23 years a member of the teaching force and for the past three years professor of English at Friends University.

The class of 1938 is the largest in the history of the college, 16 young men and women who have made a remarkable contribution to the college. The names with their degrees are as follows:

The Senior class award of the Wood-Mar plaque, conferred on the basis of service to the college, was given this year to the Junior class.

Three members of the class, Maisie B. Burt, Dorothy L. Choate, and Marjorie Jane Otis were nominated as possible cadet teachers for Portland. This does not mean an appointment, but that they are placed on the list of those eligible for such appointments.

A scholarship was awarded to Wilbur V. Newby by Friends University, covering full tuition for the ensuing year in their graduate divinity school. Lewis M. Hoskins has been awarded a full graduate scholarship in Haverford College for the ensuing year, covering tuition, fees, and living expenses.

The Junior Prize, on the basis of scholarship and character during the Junior year, was awarded to Vera Hicks of the class of 1939.

It is the regular custom for the faculty to confer the highest honors of the class upon the one deemed most worthy to receive that honor for character and scholarship during the full four years of college work. This year two students were so outstanding that the honor was doubled. Both students were exceptionally high in scholarship, their records being almost exactly equal as to quality of work; one presented 135 semester hours of credit for graduation, 15 semester hours above the 120 hour minimum, in addition to high school work materially in excess of that required for high school graduation; the other had already completed 132 semester hours of work, and had 8 more hours almost completed at the time of graduation. And so the highest class honors were doubled, and conferred upon Lewis M. Hoskins and Maisie B. Burt.

#### Faculty

Continuity of service on the part of the faculty is a valuable asset to any college. There is to be no change in the force the coming year so far as is known. In view of the difficulties which must be faced, financial difficulties among others, the fact that the average term of service of the present faculty is 11 2-3 years is a clear testimony to their interest in and loyalty to the college, especially in view of the many opportunities offered them for more advantageous positions, especially in a financial way.

#### Many-sided Work of the College

The college has sought to carry on the service for which it was created and for which it has been maintained, a service cultural, intellectual, physical, social, moral, and religious. Perhaps it is not necessary to mention these activities in detail.

The regular work of the curriculum, in the departments of Philosophy and Religious Education, Psychology and Education, History and Political Science, Economics and Sociology, English and Literature, German, French, and Spanish, Mathematics and Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Music, Public Speaking and Dramatics, etc., has been carried on with the same faithful effort as heretofore, in the effort to approximate as nearly as possible the purpose of the institution, "personal attention to every student in every class every day." The integrating course by which the college seeks to tie up the work of all the different departments, and not only to integrate the knowledge of the student but also his purposes and personality, seems to be working with a good degree of success, even though it has not yet had time to arrive at its full efficiency.

The extra-curricular activities of the students have been as varied as usual. Under the Associated Student Body have been carried on various forms of intellectual, social, athletic and forensic activities, as well as the publication of the bi-weekly Crescent, and L'Ami, the college annual.

The Christian Associations, jointly and severally, have carried on their weekly religious meetings, which have offered considerable variety, their deputation work, including the weekly student prayer meeting on the campus and the work in outlying districts and among churches where their service has been welcome, and numerous other enterprises.

The work of the Trefian Literary Society, the Adelphian Music Club, the International Relations Club, and the two Gold letter clubs have been carried on as usual. And in addition to all this the students themselves have participated in the work of the churches to which they belong or with which they have affiliated themselves in Newberg, aiding in young people's meetings, prayer meetings, the regular church services, extension work, etc.

The college life is so full that it is always difficult and sometimes impossible to arrange the extra-curricular events without conflicts in dates, sometimes between various college affairs, sometimes between college affairs and activities of other organizations outside the college. Every effort is made to avoid these conflicting dates so far as is possible.

Concerts, lectures, debates, oratorical and extemporaneous speaking contests, dramatic productions including religious pageants, and many other interesting and profitable events fill the extra-curricular life of the students. Among the more notable of these have been the concerts of the vocal and piano departments; the Home-Coming, now an annual affair; the Christmas concert, which has also become an annual feature; the annual grade-school basketball tournament; the annual dramatic tournament for High Schools; the biennial May Day celebration, which came this year; and numerous other features of college life.

A very interesting event from the standpoint of the faculty especially was the conference of Quaker teachers for the Pacific Northwest. Invitations were sent to all Friends teachers known to the faculty committee in charge of the conference, and if any were missed, it was an unintentional oversight. A program of addresses and discussions, dealing with the history, ideals, achievements and aims of Quakers in education was felt by most of those who attended to be of real profit.

#### The Purpose of the College

It is the earnest purpose and desire of the college management to make the institution in the largest possible way of real service to the Kingdom of God, to Christian Education in the large, to Quaker education more specifically, and to Oregon Yearly Meeting still more definitely. In many ways the college has sought to express this purpose. The college slogan has long been "A liberal education, under the best Christian influence, at a minimum expense." A still further statement of the purpose of the institution is contained in the following paragraph which has for years concluded the statement of our aims in the college catalogue: "Pacific College seeks to be definitely and positively Christian. It seeks to bring its students to an acceptance of Jesus Christ as personal Savior and Lord. It seeks to help its students to a definite dedication of life to the service of Christ, and to that incoming of the divine Spirit without whose help the fullest service to God and to humanity is impossible. It seeks to assist its students to find their work in life, and at least to begin their definite preparation for it. It emphasizes constantly the ideal of service rather than selfishness, and of character as well as scholarship."

It seems inevitable that misunderstandings should sometimes arise, even among those who are most earnest in the cause of genuine Christian education. That the college management make mistakes, as do other servants of God, would naturally be expected.



But there is an earnest and steadfast effort on the part of the college management to do the will of God as they see it, and to conduct the affairs of the college in the best way of which they are capable. Whenever misunderstandings or questions arise, Friends are urged to come directly to the college management, the college board or the college faculty, with the assurance that their interest and their advice will be gratefully received. The affairs of the college, financial, educational, and spiritual, are open to the investigation of any concerned Friend.

#### Advances During the Year

In numerous ways the college has seen definite advances during the past year.

The college real estate has been materially increased by the addition to the campus of the tract adjoining it to the north, property that was formerly owned by E. L. and Marie Evans and Marion and Margaret George. This addition of some eight acres to the college campus provides ample grounds for the enlargement of the institution as its building program develops along the line adopted some years ago. The first unit in this enlarged building program is to be the women's dormitory for which the Woman's Auxiliary to the college has begun raising funds. This first permanent dormitory unit is to cost \$30,000.00 and to house approximately 30 women students. The relatively high cost in proportion to the students which this would provide for is due to the fact that this first unit must include living rooms for matron, cook, and other help, kitchen and dining room equipment, and rooms for social and religious uses. For a future dormitory unit a similar expenditure would provide for twice as many students.

For the first time in a number of years the financial report will fail to show a definite increase in the net resources of the college. This is due, however, not to any actual decrease in the college's financial resources, but to the charging off of certain items held in abeyance for some years. And the financial report does not show the \$3,000.00 raised by the Woman's Auxiliary toward the new dormitory.

Material additions have been made during the year to the equipment of the institution in laboratories, library, and campus machinery; and some fairly extensive up-keep improvements have been added.

#### Needs of the College

If Pacific College is to carry on successfully its work in the future as it ought it must have the blessing of God and the interest and support of those who should be its friends and helpers. One of the outstanding needs, and one which is felt very keenly is the need for additional financial support. If Friends are to maintain higher education for their own members in the Pacific Northwest, and to spread Quaker ideals among non-Friends through the work of the college, they must realize that financial contributions are absolutely necessary.

But more important than mere financial support, because it would insure that and very much more, is the earnest, persistent, prayerful interest of the Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting. The college earnestly desires to deserve and to receive that support.

#### REPORT OF THE FINANCIAL SECRETARY

In a year of unsettled general financial conditions, there is ground for encouragement in the financial condition of our Yearly Meeting.

Again this year the financial secretary has given his attention almost entirely to work on the fixed expense in an effort to reduce the amount in arrears. The results have been very encouraging. Last year's report showed \$639.34 in arrears while this year we enter the new financial year with only \$468.21 in arrears.

Several of the meetings which have been carrying a heavy balance from year to year have valiantly labored, either in erasing the amounts in arrears, or in greatly reducing them. Only a few meetings are carrying any appreciable balances into next year.

Another encouraging feature is the fact that sufficient amounts of the fixed expense in arrears have been paid to enable the Yearly Meeting to pay \$200.00 toward the reduction of its debt.

With the same amount of effort and devotion it should not be difficult for all meetings to come to Yearly Meeting next year with all fixed expenses paid.

While the Yearly Meeting has raised more than enough money this year to pay its entire budget, it is unfortunate that the United Budget, especially the Evangelistic and Church Extension part of it, apparently has suffered considerably at the expense of other offerings.

One obvious difficulty has been the large amounts of money sent designated for a particular purpose, thus preventing the Yearly Meeting treasurer from making the division of the funds to the different fields as it should have been done.

We beg of the Monthly Meetings that money raised for the work of evangelization both at home and abroad be sent to the treasurer as United Budget money rather than as designated sums for certain fields. This will permit the treasurer to make the proper division as indicated in our budget and prevent a recurrence of the situation in which one department suffers at the expense of another.

May every member of the Yearly Meeting "seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness" and trust Him that the necessary "things shall be added unto" us during the coming year.

97. The report of the Board of Aged Ministers and Missionaries was presented by the President, Edward Harmon, and appears below:

The Board for Aged Ministers and Missionaries has continued its research work, endeavoring to find a workable plan for taking care of our aged ministers and missionaries, and has submitted the following plan to the Ministerial Association and the Yearly Meeting for their approval. Both bodies have endorsed their part of the plan and it will commence operating September 1st.

#### PLAN

We propose that the pastors and the missionaries of Oregon Yearly Meeting be asked to contribute one per cent of their salaries yearly toward a permanent retirement fund. We request the Yearly Meeting to pay an equal amount toward this fund which amounts to two hundred dollars this year. We suggest that this two hundred dollars be placed in the fixed expense.

On retirement the pastor shall receive a proportionate amount from the Yearly Meeting depending upon the years of service in the Yearly Meeting, plus the amount he has paid in. On withdrawal from the Yearly Meeting, each pastor shall receive the amount he has paid in.

Contributing to this fund, and receiving benefits from it shall be optional with the minister."

We have been happy to be able to continue to give five dollars a month to Anson Cox and ten dollars a month to Marietta Cope. We wish we were able to do more for these and other deserving Friends, but because of our limited finances we have not been able to do so.

Other work has been done by the Boise Valley Superintendent of this Department. An offering of nearly forty dollars was raised to help Anson Cox purchase necessities. The Superintendent of this Department in conjunction with the Superintendent of the Literature Department is investigating the possibilities for printing the memoirs of Anson Cox.

The use of the Felto-Gram, a comparatively new feature in Children's work helped them to visualize the messages more clearly.

Helen Cammack gave the children a very interesting talk about her return to Bolivia and about the new home where she will live with Esthel Gulley and other things that pertain to her daily life in Bolivia.

Throughout the services, Bible study, prayer and a vital personal experience in Salvation were stressed.

Our prayer is that these lessons will bear fruit in the lives of these children in days to come.

1st. The Service Committee through the Fellowship Council sets up within the established Yearly Meeting, Quarterly Meetings, local and Monthly Meetings, irrespective of the wishes of these established meetings.

2nd. The Service Committee, through its intervisitation work,



tries to unite in one, groups of opposite beliefs such as Hicksite, and Evangelical Friends without regard to the fundamental doctrines of Christ as held by Oregon Yearly Meeting.

3rd. We believe that in case of war our young men would have at least as good a chance to be recognized as conscientious objectors on a basis of Christianity as with an organization of questionable political connections.

4th. After studying the reports of the American Friends Service Committee and having seen the results of its work, we believe that it places a wrong emphasis on the work of salvation, ignoring the soul need, which we hold to be the primary importance.

Therefore we recommend that the department be dissolved and the committee discharged.

Kneeland, Yearly Meeting Treasurer, are hereby authorized and empowered to negotiate a loan of fourteen hundred dollars (\$1,400.00) from the Citizens State Bank, Camas, Washington and be it further resolved that the Board of Trustees of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church are authorized and empowered to sign a note in the name of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church in favor of the Citizens State Bank, Camas, Washington for the sum of fourteen hundred dollars (\$1,400.00) payable in monthly payments for a period of five years and to properly execute sign and deliver a mortgage on the Camas Church property as security for the payment of said note.

### CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR

Last summer a total of seven hundred Endeavorers registered as attenders. Our conferences are proving of inestimable value as means of teaching and leading us young people in spiritual life with a proper balance of proper amusement.

Many of us young people owe our conversion or our sanctification to decision times at last summer's conferences. God poured out His abundant blessing on the altar services of each conference. We sincerely pray that holy standards of conduct and the revival spirit will always honor our conferences.

Rally banquets for the purpose of advertising this summer's conferences were held this spring in Boise, Portland, and Tacoma.
