Minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends 1939

1. Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends met, under the blessing of God, in its forty-seventh annual session, at Newberg, Oregon at 9:30 A. M., June 14, 1939.

2. The devotional period was a season of thanksgiving and praise. Charles Haworth lead in prayer and a number of people spoke of the victory of the past year, expressing their thankfulness to God for his leading and guiding and for the love and grace of God as revealed in Christ Jesus.

A desire was expressed that all Friends might continue and increase in Christlike attitude and life. The song, "Revive Us Again," closed the time of devotion.

Members of the meeting spoke of their appreciation of the fellowship and presence of these Friends.

8. Charles C. Haworth, Sarah P. McCracken, and Sophia E. Townsend were named as a committee to prepare returning minutes for these Friends.

9. The following communication was received from Salem Quarterly Meeting:

"Salem Quarterly Meeting, held at Rosedale 5th month 20th, 1939, instructed the Clerks to send the following communication to the Yearly Meeting.

"In Psalms 122:6 we are instructed to pray for the peace of

Jerusalem. Therefore let us pray for the Jewish people and the peace of Jerusalem.

"In Jeremiah 29:7 God told His people to pray for the city where they were to dwell. In I Timothy 2:2-4 Paul exhorted Timothy to pray for those in authority so that the Christians might lead a quiet and peaceable life. In accordance with these instructions we should pray for our nation that peace might continue.

"Salem Quarterly Meeting suggest that throughout the Yearly Meeting the First Prayer Meeting after the sessions of the Yearly Meeting be set aside to pray for God's Covenanted people, the Jews, and for our own nation. If peace is prolonged many may be saved who would otherwise be lost.

"Some trust in chariots and some in horses but we will remember the name of the Lord our God." Psalms 20:7.

12. Melba Monthly Meeting has changed their time for business meeting from the second Wednesday evening of each month to the second Thursday evening of each month at eight o'clock.

13. The Nominating Committee were requested to correct names and addresses for the directory.

14. A reply from the University of Idaho, Southern Branch, to the communication written last year in regard to compulsory military training was read.

15. Edward Mott, presiding clerk, returned the minute granted him last year to attend Iowa Yearly Meeting.

He spoke words of appreciation for the hospitality and fellowship of the Iowa Friends. He also reported about his work there this past year. He spoke especially of the foundation laid in Iowa Yearly Meeting by Thomas Frazier whose descendants are now active in Oregon Yearly Meeting as well as in other Yearly Meetings.

19. The reports on the State of Society from the Quarterly Meetings were read, a summary of which appears below:

Summary of the Reports on State of Society

All quarters report that the meetings for worship and transaction of business are duly held. One meeting asks for prayer that their business meetings may be better attended.

A feeling of fellowship and love prevails among the members. The members are trying to live to the glory of God in business; in the care of those in need; in the care and education of their children; in maintaining the principles of peace and of temperance.

The doctrinal standards of our Yearly Meeting are upheld and the church has been careful in the appointment of officers, Sunday school teachers, and in the calling of a pastor.

20. The Clerk gave instruction to the representatives as follows:

- (1) To propose to the next session of the meeting names of persons to serve as Presiding Clerk, Recording Clerk, Reading Clerk and Announcing Clerk.
- (2) To determine a ratio for raising funds and distributing documents.
- (3) To propose funds to be raised for church work, and to nominate a Friend to serve as Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- (4) To propose the name of one person in each Quarterly Meeting to receive and distribute documents.
- (5) To propose names of persons to serve on the Printing Committee.

21. The meeting united in singing, "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." Jefferson Ford gave the inspirational talk from the first chapter of Ephesians, mentioning the seven benefits of the atonement.

22. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 o'clock with a benediction by Edgar Sims.

23. The meeting convened according to adjournment and settled into a period of devotion.

29. The presiding Clerk urged the members of the Yearly Meeting to be faithful in the appointments of the church, however, small they may be, and to be interested in all the work of the church.

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

30. The Superintendent of the Stewardship Department, Lela Gulley, presented the following report:

One Quarterly Meeting reports that pastoral letters on Stewardship were sent to non-resident members. Three young people not members of Friends, have signed the Tithers pledge and are tithing consistently. From one church, three went out to other monthly meetings and gave their testimony as to the blessing received in their own lives from tithing.

Some meetings counted families as tithers and not all individuals in the families who tithe. There are some out post workers who are tithers. New meetings are being organized and one quarterly reports a larger per cent of tithers in some of these new meetings than in our old meetings.

Pastors and heads of this department have been faithful in stressing the fact that all should tithe. One Stewardship Committee, the past year, has sponsored the raising of money to remodel their church.

It is encouraging to find that young people and children are taking up the practice of tithing. In one meeting where the Storehouse League is discontinued, individual responsibility is being stressed. One meeting reports a musical reading given for an evening service on Stewardship. Some meetings are using the tithing bulletins published by the Laymen Co. These are four page bulletins prepared for weekly use having two pages blank for printing of church announcements.

The Stewardship Department in connection with the Financial Department of the Yearly Meeting made a special effort to get enthusiasm aroused along the line of tithing. Each meeting was contacted by letter and by the Friendly Endeavor. The month of April was designated when everyone should bring all his tithe into the church. We hope this effort has been a blessing to those who took part in this plan.

Lela Gulley, Superintendent

The report was satisfactory to the meeting and opportunity to incorporate the information from one meeting which has not sent in its report in this report was given to the superintendent if the information may be obtained before the minutes go to print.

A trio, composed of Ruth Gulley, Inez Butler and Lela Gulley sang "He Wore a Crown of Thorns."

Denver Headrick gave an address on Christian Stewardship. He spoke on Luke 16:1,2, and especially of the portion "Thou mayest be no longer steward." He showed how necessary it is for us to appreciate our privilege of tithing and what a blessing comes when one goes beyond tithing in giving.

The superintendent of the department asked the pertinent questions:

Have we done our best along the line of tithing?

Have we caught a vision of the work that can be accomplished if we all tithed?

The following recommendation was presented by the superintendent of Christian Stewardship:

"The Stewardship and Financial Departments wish to recommend that each monthly meeting strive to make their membership 100% tithers.

"During one month of the year, which will be designated later, we recommend that the plan of bringing all the tithe into the local church treasury be carried out."

This was approved by the meeting.

31. The Financial Secretary, Walter P. Lee brought in the report of all the money raised by the various meetings. This report will appear in the Appendix.

The superintendent brought some striking sentences to the attention of the meeting: *Study the Word of God*

Be informed Friends.

Tell other people about it.

Spend money and have books at home.

Offer suggestions to the Libraries in regard to the purchase of the right kind of books.

Adelaide Barker gave a helpful talk on reading. What you read, remains a permanent possession, therefore, we should be careful what we read. Children need to be guided in their reading and it is an every minute affair.

Kenneth Eichenberger presented to the meeting plans for the pastors' reading; for a reading contest and an offer to supply book lists to the chairmen of Literature Committees of the various Monthly Meetings.

33. The meeting adjourned to meet at 9:30 A. M. Thursday, June 15, 1939.

THURSDAY, 9:30 A. M.

34. According to adjournment the meeting met at 9:30 A. M., Thursday, June 15, 1939. The congregation united in singing, "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name." The Presiding Clerk brought a short message from I John: 1-4.

35. The minutes were read and stand approved as read.

36. The following report was approved by the meeting:

"To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends:

Report of the Committee on a Conference of Concerned Friends

"The Committee has held three meetings, and has considered carefully and prayerfully the subject of the advisability of calling a Conference of Concerned Friends. The following report is submitted:

1. An investigation has been made by members of the Committee both in person and by correspondence. A very general concurrence in the concern has been found.

2. The conclusion has been reached that it would be unwise for such a Conference to be promoted by action of Yearly Meetings, and that it should rather spring from individual concern and initiative.

"The Committee further requests that a meeting for Friends who are interested in the holding of such a Conference be announced for Thursday at 4:00 p. m., and that the Committee be discharged from further responsibility in the matter.

Boise Valley Quarter, report a six week Bible institute at Greenleaf; Melba gave \$75.00 for purchase of a mule in Bolivia; Nampa report taking a general forward step in all departments. Boise gave 24 Bibles, and Star gave pins for perfect attendance; East Branch took part in Sunday School parade in Vale.

Newberg Quarter, report Chehalem Center dug out basement to make room for classes; Newberg repaired some of their class rooms, also gave \$46.00 to the social service department, Several Bibles given for special work.

Salem Quarter. Special offerings at Christmas time; held some special council meetings. Special effort to get every one to carry Bibles. \$13.50 for Esthel Gulley's transportation. Highland and Marion both increased attendance 35 over last year.

Tacoma Quarter. Special study, Gospel of John by Entiat. Memory work by N. E. Tacoma, Special effort Missionary giving.

Portland Quarter. Rosemere has group that sing in hospital; Lents creating fund for Tamplin car.

K. L. Mendenhall, Superintendent

Joseph Reece gave a challenging address, showing the immediate need of putting forth every effort to save boys and girls. There should be preparation for the work of the Sunday School and teachers should read and study so that the work may be attractive and interesting.

The arresting statement was made in the report from Portland Quarterly Meeting that, "the liquor traffic would destroy the church if it could and the church could destroy the liquor traffic if it would." This is unquestionably true, but whether the church ever does destroy the liquor traffic or not will depend upon how hard we are willing to fight and how much we are willing to sacrifice.

The fight of the liquor dealers to maintain their business brings dollars into their pockets while our fight against it takes dollars out of ours so we cannot expect to win in the struggle unless we are willing to give sacrificially of our means and our time.

Reports show that Friends have been active in the fight during the year. But reports, at best, are probably never complete, for much that is done is not reported. For example, one quarterly meeting does not report any money expended, but they have been doing things that couldn't have been done without spending a considerable amount of money.

The three quarterly meetings in Oregon supported the bill, sponsored by the Oregon Anti-Liquor League, the W. C. T. U., and the Portland Council of Churches, which, if passed, would have confined the sale of all intoxicating liquors to state-owned liquor stores.

Several report having given dramas, demonstrations and special features of various kinds. Petitions have been sent to the state legislature and to the governor. Boise Valley reports having contacted about two thousand youths in high school and in Youth Temperance groups. Many scientific books and magazines have been circulated among teachers and high school students. One chairman writes a temperance column entitled, "The Wreckard of Repeal" for a local newspaper, and many other articles have been written and published in various papers and magazines.

The superintendent of this department was asked to prepare a temperance lesson for the Christian Endeavor lesson helps, which he did and also sent a booklet containing valuable scientific material to each society that uses the lesson helps. The superintendent has given one illustrated lecture on the subject: "Alcohol—What It Is, What It Does, and How It Does It," and he has a few other appointments scheduled for the near future.

The Yearly Meeting Superintendent wishes to express his appreciation to the five Quarterly Meeting Superintendents for getting their reports in in good time.

The children from the Daily Vacation Bible School came over to see the moving pictures shown by Hayward Johnson, the head of the Anti-Liquor League of Oregon. He showed two reels of pictures—one depicting the night life of Port-

land with the numerous electric signs, advertising beer and other alcoholic drinks; the other one showing what a boy faces every day as he goes to school and into the stores.

40. Helen Kersey Ford brought the message at the inspirational hour from Psalms 37:1-7. She emphasized the necessity of not fretting but trusting and doing good. We should dwell in the land and feed on God's faithfulness. After feeding on his faithfulness we will have strength to go out and fight the evil of the world. Various illustrations from the mission field showed the faithfulness of God.

41. Gladys Cook offered the benediction and the meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 P. M.

THURSDAY, 2:00 P. M.

42. The meeting convened at the appointed time. The hymn, "I Am Thine, O Lord" was a part of the devotional period.

43. John S. C. Harvey expressed his appreciation of the kindly way in which he and his wife had been received in this meeting.

EVANGELISTIC AND CHURCH EXTENSION

44. Chester Hadley, the General Superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting, spoke of Joshua and Caleb in his introductory remarks, emphasizing the sturdy faith of Caleb that could conquer mountains, even in his old age.

He presented his report which follows and which was accepted by the meeting:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

Introduction

This is my ninth annual report. I thank God that He has permitted me to have a part in the development of the work of Oregon Yearly Meeting during these past years. His hand has been on us for good and we have seen His promises verified over and over as we have faced the "impossible" and have found that "with God all things are possible." A study of those years will reveal that we have passed through financial and economic upheavals that have disturbed nations and caused untold misery and suffering. Retrenchment has been the order of the day with many institutions and even large churches with more resources than ours have been forced to curtail their missionary endeavor at home and abroad.

Oregon Yearly Meeting Has Expanded Program

During these disturbing conditions Oregon Yearly Meeting has expanded her program both at home and in Bolivia. We have entered new outpost points, until at the present time we are serving at least 17 points where either Sunday School or both Sunday School and preaching is being conducted regularly from week to week. We have responded to the "dollar pledge" for new meeting houses approved by the Evangelistic Board and several meetings have been able to build because of this financial aid.

We have sent out new missionaries and faced emergencies that have arisen on the field in Bolivia, we have kept the salaries of our workers paid at home and abroad and have brought our mission-

aries back on furlough at the regular time for them to return. We have purchased property and erected suitable places for worship and for headquarters at La Paz and at Porto Perez.

Spiritual Victories Won

There have been signal spiritual victories won during these years and to recount them would enlarge this report beyond reason. God has given us rich blessings. Souls have been saved and sanctified, young people called and fitted for full time service for God for which we express our gratitude to the great Head of the church.

Personal Activities Past Year

Again this has been a busy year. I have prayed much that I might not let the busy rush of the work crowd out the real significance of the task, for after all the "program and schedule" are only "means to an end." They should not become so important as to overshadow the true objective of all Christian service which is the salvation of souls and the upbuilding of the kingdom.

Twenty-two hundred letters have been mailed from the church office, of this number over seven hundred have been of a personal nature and have been written or dictated by the superintendent. The others were form letters of the Dollar pledge calls. I have preached or given illustrated missionary addresses 114 times. I have traveled 32,391 miles, this mileage includes a trip to Ohio Yearly Meeting. I have edited the Church Window Department of the Friendly Endeavor each month of the year and the News Flash sent monthly to each meeting. I have had the pleasure of holding many conferences and personal interviews and meeting with various committees.

I attended Quaker Hill and Twin Rocks Conferences and was the guest speaker at the sessions of Ohio Yearly Meeting held in Damascus, Ohio. In April I held a revival meeting at the Boise Friends meeting in Boise, Idaho. I visited all of the Quarterly Meetings in regular session at least once during the year and have been in all but one or two of the monthly meetings for regular services at some time during the twelve months. I have spent much time with the development of some of the outpost points and have been blessed in that ministry.

Dollar Pledge A Great Help

Three meetings have been assisted by the dollar pledge during the year. Rose Valley, Ontario Heights, and Oak Park each received the benefit of the call. Whitney, a new meeting in the suburban district of Boise, Idaho, and Prune Hill will soon be included in the call. In the report last year, mention was made that Woodland was building. Their plans were changed and all that they were able to do was to get the lumber cut and sawed. They are planning to go ahead with construction and we sincerely hope to be able to report a completed building there by next year.

Evangelistic Meetings Held

We have in our Yearly Meeting a fine group of preachers fitted for evangelistic preaching and it is interesting to note that at least eleven of our own preachers were used in revivals held in the Yearly Meeting this year. Three men were called in from outside our own limits, if there were more it has not been reported to me and failure to include them in this report is unintentional. Thirty-four revival meetings were held and the reports indicate that God's blessing was upon the ministry of his servants as they preached.

I feel it fitting here to mention several of our men that are available for revival work. These men are not now connected with our meetings as pastors but are open for services as the way may open. Edward Mott, Edgar P. Sims, Calvin R. Choate, Denver B. Headrick, Hubert Mardock, and Esther Hendricks. If your meet-

ing plans a special series this fall please give these persons prayerful consideration. Again, if any names are omitted from this list it is unintentional and I will be glad to add such names as may be given if they are in regular standing with the Yearly Meeting.

Pastoral Situation

Oregon Yearly Meeting has been highly favored throughout her history with sound, evangelistic pastors and I am glad to report that the condition obtains at the present time. Our men are devoted, full of vision and are willing to make any sacrifice necessary in order to preach the gospel. We should give them our loyal support as together we face great opportunities in this Northwest country.

As to pastoral changes, the situation is too unsettled at this time to make a full report. There will be several changes this fall, but as yet no report of who will fill these vacancies has come in. They will be added to this report if definite information can be gotten before going to print. Carl Miller has resigned as pastor of the Newberg Monthly Meeting. He has served that meeting for nine years and has done excellent work. If his future service takes him from Oregon Yearly Meeting, we will sustain a real loss. Abram Astleford closes his ministry at Chehalem Center. His meeting pays him high tribute as a pastor and preacher and are loath to release him from leadership among them. Paul Mills has resigned at Tacoma and unless pastoral work opens for him will enter the evangelistic field. His name can be included with those above as an evangelist. He has served the Tacoma Monthly Meeting for the past four years and has rendered valuable service to the church and the past community. Alison Rogers is leaving Vancouver. He has done excellent work at that place during the past four years. The indebtedness on the property was paid, a Sunday School bus was put in operation and improvements on the church building were put in during his ministry. Lealdus Mardock is leaving Riverside to take the pastoral care of Center Point a community work where Edward Baker has been preaching for the past few years. His work at Riverside has been gratifying. Prior to his ministry there, water was hauled to the Parsonage for domestic use. He was instrumental in digging a well which has proven a great help. Leroy White and Calvin Hull who have served the Ontario Heights Meeting since its beginning have resigned. These young men have made a lasting contribution to the work in that community. They have given their labors freely without financial remuneration. Working on their own ranches during the week and alternating their ministry on the Sabbath and at the mid-week prayer meeting.

These are all the changes that have been reported to the superintendent, and at present none of these points has secured successors to the outgoing pastors. If this information can be secured in time it will appear in the printed report.

Other Departments

The Missionary Report will be heard tomorrow, so we will not take time here to enlarge on the work in Bolivia.

The Christian Endeavor Department has been active during the past year. Their report will indicate real interest in the Chart program which they have been following in friendly rivalry since last August. Tacoma Quarterly Meeting has entered the list of property owners having secured a beautiful location on Henderson Beach on the Sound. They have named their Conference Grounds "Wauna Mer," and are highly enthused over the prospect of developing it into a permanent home. Quaker Hill in Idaho and Twin Rocks in Oregon offer suitable places for spiritual recreational privileges for young people of these sections and God has honored the efforts put forth by them. The Friendly Endeavor is a part of the program of

the Christian Endeavor Department and serves the Yearly Meeting in a commendable manner.

The Stewardship Department put on a special drive in April in the interest of tithing, and much good was accomplished. Meetings have reported noticeable increases in their offerings for that month and it is hoped that this plan will be adopted each year with the thought in mind to secure tithers not only for one month of the year, but for all the year as well.

The other Departments have been busy and are facing their responsibility to this time in which we serve. They deserve our loyal support.

In Closing

We still face a great task, with us it is impossible, in our strength we will fail, BUT HE IS ABLE. Again I ask Oregon Yearly Meeting to respond to this undertaking and again I have faith to believe that we will "press the battle to the gates."

Baker, the pastor at Prune Hill and Camas; Lolita Gundry who with her husband is working at Whitney, Idaho; A. Louis McConnell from Homedale, Idaho; Richard Brown from Ardenvoir, Washington; Oscar and Ruth Brown from Rose Valley, Washington; James and Mildred Raymond from Rosemere, Washington; Leroy B. White from Ontario Heights, Oregon; Edward Baker from Center Point, Idaho; Merle and Thelma Green from Woodland, Idaho.

Chester Hadley also mentioned other outpost workers who were not present but were active in the work. Lewis and Myrtle Russell at Northeast Tacoma, Washington; Evert Tuning at Owyhee Heights; Roy Dunagan at Mud Lake, Idaho; Loren Burton at Vale, Oregon, and Zenas Perisho at Unity, Oregon; Curtis Morse at Greer, Idaho.

47. The statistical report was read in summary and accepted by the meeting. It will appear in full in the Appendix.

51. The minutes were read, corrected and approved.

53. An excellent summary of the epistles was read. Nineteen epistles were received seven of which were from beyond the seas.

It was decided that the epistles should be left in some convenient place for anyone to read who desired to but they should not be taken away.

54. The following communication was received from the Permanent Board:

"The Permanent Board of Oregon Yearly Meeting in regular session at Newberg, Oregon, 6th month 14th, 1939 read the memorials from Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting for Frank Roberts, Myrta Eliza Jones and Anson Cox and directed the reading of the same at Yearly Meeting session, and that they be filed with other records as is the custom.

This was approved by the meeting.

The memorials were read and also the names of other members, deceased during the past year.

A number spoke of the blessing received from those who had gone on before. The meeting felt the benediction of many who had formerly met with us, and that we are all one church of the Living God.

PEACE

55. Levi T. Pennington, Superintendent of Peace, presided at this meeting and read his annual report which appears below:

Report of Peace Superintendent

"For all the armour of the armed man in the tumult, and the garments rolled in blood shall be for burning, for fuel of fire. For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder; and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government, and of peace, there shall be no end The zeal of Jehovah of hosts will perform this."

Thus wrote the old prophet centuries before the coming into the world of the long-promised Messiah named then the Prince of Peace. The words were written in a time of disorder, warfare, oppression, struggle for world dominion, when men's hearts were failing them for fear, and when God's promises were hard to believe, and the counsel which He gave to His people through Isaiah was difficult to follow, that they "take heed and be quiet" and would thus save themselves from the curse of war.

To us today comes the same word of promise and instruction, in a world of disorder, oppression, warfare, struggle for world dominion, when many who have no faith in God believe that peace is impossible, and many who have a living faith in God so far as personal life is concerned, but in matters of inter-class, inter-racial and international relations hold to the same counsel of despair.

Whatever our belief as to the possibility of complete and permanent world peace, we all agree that some wars can be prevented, and the report of our activities during the past year shows a marked increase over that of the previous year.

Only three meetings report a meeting of the peace committee at the beginning of the year for the planning of the work of the year.

Seventeen meetings in the interests of peace were reported, but in addition there were many sessions of Sunday School classes, discussion groups and other gatherings where the cause of peace was presented. One meeting reports monthly peace talks before the Sunday School. A marked increase is noted in the use of peace plays. In one quarterly meeting a peace play was given twice, to large audiences, and the peace play has been an effective means of spreading the peace idea in other meetings and communities.

More than fifty peace sermons and addresses have been given, the exact number being unknown because of the impossibility of adding "several" and "a good many" and "quite a number" so as to secure an accurate figure. Half a hundred plus "a good many" is as accurate an answer as can be given to this part of the report.

Some thousands of pages of peace literature were distributed, the same difficulty as above preventing any accurate figure.

Among the peace literature mentioned as being taken by our members are Peace Action, the Messenger of Peace, the Defender, the Christian Herald, and publications of the American Friends Service Committee. One meeting reports 13 peace periodicals taken by members.

A total of \$32.00 was reported as definitely raised and expended for peace. Several times that sum is probably expended every year in travel at private expense, telegrams and letters to government officials, etc. One meeting reports \$50.00 sent for war relief through the American Friends Service Committee.

Four of our members are reported as engaging in military service.

It is impossible to obtain accurate information as to our approaches to government officials. In some cases single individuals are known to have written more letters than are reported from the entire quarterly meeting. A dozen communications have been sent by meetings, to the president of the United States, to senators and congressmen; sixty individual communications were reported, in addition to "many" from other meetings; one quarterly meeting reports "many" petitions, etc. It is evident that we are more wide-awake than we used to be to the importance of letting our earnestness in the cause of peace register in Washington as well as in heaven.

Individual reports and suggestions are of unusual interest.

One quarterly meeting superintendent reported to the quarterly meeting that on the whole Friends were a peaceful people, but they did not seem much interested in bearing positive message to the world outside. It is earnestly to be hoped that this criticism does not apply to most of us, and that insofar as it applies to any of us we may correct the condition.

One quarterly meeting reports a communication from two monthly meetings sent to the president of the United States and the senators from that state protesting against the shipment of arms, munitions and other war materials by the United States to belligerent nations.

Other activities reported were the displaying of posters, communications to newspapers, the sending of many postcards in the interests of peace, to government officials and others, presentation of addresses showing the conditions in war-torn parts of the world, travels and talks by one quarterly meeting superintendent before six Sunday Schools, the writing and reading of papers by three younger members of the peace committee of one meeting, etc.

Perhaps there is no more significant service in the cause of peace than that being rendered by Emmett W. Gulley, Professor of Spanish at Pacific College, who has spent practically all of 1939 thus far in the relief work for war refugees in Spain, and has now been granted leave of absence for the college year 1939-40 for relief work on behalf of German refugees in Cuba. In both these tasks he has been working under the American Friends Service Committee.

For a time a German Aryan assisted in foreign languages at Pacific College while getting located in America. He has a position for next year in another college, secured through the help which Friends have been able to give him.

Different reports refer to the cooperation of Friends with other peace organizations and movements. The International Relations Club of Pacific College has the cooperation of the Carnegie Peace Foundation; many Friends of the Yearly Meeting are members of the National Council for Prevention of War, the Fellowship of Reconciliation, etc.; Friends of the Yearly Meeting are prominent in the work of the Northwest Conference on International Relations; we work in other groups laboring on different parts of the great task of the peacemakers.

The yearly meeting superintendent of peace has given a dozen or more addresses devoted wholly or partly to the subject of peace.

From all the quarterly meetings have come suggestions as to plans for better work in the cause of peace for the ensuing year, and promises of greater activity in this work so appropriate for Friends, and so obligatory upon us.

The matter of the passage of the Wagner-Rogers bill in regard to the bringing into the United States 10,000 German children was discussed. It was the will of the meeting that Milo C. Ross should prepare letters to be sent to the Representatives, Senators, and to the President urging the passage of this bill. A number of people also signified their willingness to write personal letters in this regard.

56. Jefferson Ford, during the inspirational hour, told of the Conference that he attended at Madras last year. Seventy different countries were represented with four hundred and seventy delegates. The major emphasis at the conference was on evangelism and the need of a religion with spiritual content.

57. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 P. M.

Doris M. Tamplin

Chester Hadley presented the annual epsitle and report from the mission field. These were accepted by the meeting and appear below:

NINTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FIELD SUPERINTENDENT La Paz, Bolivia, 1938-'39

In sounding the key-note of the report for the year just closed, I can do no better than to quote the text which was the basis of the burden for our Native Church during our Annual Conference, 1939. This text may serve as the adhesive element which must cement the Native Church, the missionaries and the homeland into a solid working unit. Without the spirit of this text we should be bound to failure in every field of activity; but most of all do we need to regard to the Foreign Mission and Church Extension program of Oregon Yearly Meeting. We need it no less than you; and you need it no less than we.

The Psalmist must have been conscious of a slipping and easing up of his sense of privilege, and responsibility to God, when he said, "Bind the sacrifice with cords, even unto the horns of the altar." How subtle the temptation, when face to face with the altar, lovely and practical reality of the sacrifice we have made in our consecration to God, to view this sacrificial consecration only from its unlovely aspects—the view-point of the victim of sacrifice! It is when we have only this view of the altar of sacrifice that there is likely to come a loosening of the cords that bind us to the giving of our life blood to the soil and our bodies to the consuming fire of the altar of sacrifice; but let us turn the viewpoint of holy sacrifice Godward—God's viewpoint of the altar—and then, when the heart faints and heat consumes, there will come a tightening of the cords that bind us to our united tasks. Let there be now no looking back, no pining for the green fields and still waters of home, no loosening of the cords as the sacrificial "knife" flashes and the reddening coals of the altar glow. Let there be only a joyous waiting for the pouring out of our lives for the brethren, and the "ashes" of a perfectly consumed sacrifice which speak only of a sweet savour before God in the heat of the day.

I have spoken, as the Aymara says. Now let us to a view of the field of sacrifice in so far as it relates to the mission.

Missionaries

In the general and vital interests of the mission there has been a commendable spirit of unity and cooperation and mutual helpfulness, each being a complement to the other.

It is good to have Helen Cammack in our midst again, since August last. By the common accord of the Missionary Council she was given the direction of the Lake District, with her headquarters in Puerto Perez. To date she has had little opportunity to give much direct attention to her district due to urgent need of her services in other quarters, in a supplementary capacity. It is our hope that she may soon be established in Puerto Perez, however, and able to give that district the regular attention that it merits.

Esthel Gulley was appointed to accompany Helen Cammack in Puerto Perez as companion and fellow-laborer. A great deal of this responsibility has rested directly on her in the frequent absences of Helen Cammack. Esthel Gulley has included in her work a multitude of variations, but has excelled in her ministrations to the sick. Her ministry to the physical needs of the people about the port is playing a large part in the breaking down of the prejudices against the mission there. Her furlough will fall due very soon after the reading of this report and her ministry in the interests of the foreign mission work of the Yearly Meeting will be at the disposal of the homeland. May she be used of the Lord.

Howard and Julia Pearson, and son Donald, have faithfully stood by the new work in Corocoro, surrounded by heavy discouragements and hardships due to opposition and the extreme altitude and cold of this mining center. Probably their greatest need at the present moment is an exemplary family of believers to help as interpreter in the Aymara services and in the journeys to the outlying districts. May we request the sincere help in prayer of the Yearly Meeting that this need may be supplied soon. We have been unable to find, to date, any of the believers who were willing to undertake this task.

In spite of the difficulties in Corocoro some distinct victories and gains have been obtained. One definite victory is the conviction of the priest and the public that the Gospel has come to stay. Another is the consciousness that a "new thing" has come to them in the presentation of a Gospel that SAVES from sin. Another victory is that, in spite of great efforts to get the new believers to fall into temptation during the Roman festival seasons during the past year, quite a number came safely through the most dangerous times without falling. Another gain is the wide-spread advertising of the mission in Corocoro throughout the district, and the consequent influx of seekers into the mission quarters for help, instruction and literature.

Doris Tamplin has had charge of the pastoral work in the city of La Paz, though her activities have also covered an innumerable variety of labors such as Secretary-treasurer of the mission, cook, hostess to the visiting missionaries, directing the workmen in the absence of the superintendent. Under her hand is growing up a fine native congregation, zealous for souls and carrying the burden of evangelization in the surrounding district. There is a group of some twelve volunteers for this work of evangelization, and from their midst two have been duly recognized by this local congregation as having a gift for the ministry. These two men, Justo Tabel T. and Mariano Medrano, have been separated to their work, one as a self-supporting pastor and the other as a travelling evangelist with partial salary and expenses paid by the La Paz congregation. This congregation is setting the pace for the entire field, carrying their local expenses and supporting two native workers, Cipriano Mamani and Mariano Medrano, with their offerings.

The Native Workers

Mr. and Mrs. Felix Hermosa have been located in the city of La Paz during the year. Mr. Hermosa has been laid up with a stubborn leg-ulcer, the complication of a wound received while working on the new church building in La Paz. During his sickness he has participated, together with others, in a Revision Commission of the Aymara translation of the Gospel of St. Luke, and has prepared a handwritten manuscript translation of the Epistles of St. James, St. John, Jude and Revelations. At this writing he is working on the Epistle to the Hebrews. He has also helped in the folding and wrapping for mailing of "The Soul-Cry of the Aymara."

Mrs. Hermosa gave half a day regularly to teaching in the La Paz Primary School during the school year, the local church carry-

ing a part of her salary as teacher. She has also served ably as Sunday School teacher, musician and in the pulpit. Her willing spirit and her example have been above reproach. Hers is the qualification of a good steward—faithfulness in every task assigned to her.

Cipriano and Petrona Mamani have proven loving and faithful pastors. He has a reputation for steadiness, fairness and wisdom throughout the field of his labors. She is a good example to all, helps in the meetings and in the class-room. When the question was put to some of his people as to whether or not they would like a change of pastors, they said, "No., no, no! We have already talked about this matter and we do not want this man and his wife to move from our midst!" He has been with them for six years and they love him better as the years go by. Tata Cipriano is aging, however, and suffers somewhat with rheumatism in the knees, which makes his evangelistic and pastoral work hard for him; for, at times, he must walk on foot as far as nine miles to a point on his circuit. Also, the demands, due to his active evangelism together with his people, are growing beyond his strength to care for alone. During the course of the coming year they hope to construct a much-needed church building with seating capacity for three hundred persons. The present chapel will then be used exclusively for school-room, prayer-meetings and dormitory for the visitors at their annual conference time in November 1-3 each year.

Felix Guanica, the Indian pastor of a new congregation, recently came to us on petition, in a community known as Pongon-huyo, leads a work among more than eighty believers. He is partially self-supporting and partially supported by his local congregation. Three brothers of this congregation have recently donated two plots of ground to the mission, one plot for school, chapel and play-ground, and the other plot for a burial ground for believers. The decision to have a mission burial ground at this point was due to fanatical romanist objections to protestant burials in the public cemetery. Thus they meet their problems with courage, vision and sacrifice.

This congregation also has two others of its own planting, one in the Fabulous Tin Mine (15,500 feet above sea-level) and another in a small township called Guarina (wah-ree-nah).

Mariano Medrano, whose official recognition was referred to above, is a tireless and wise evangelizer—the "hand-picking" method. He is learning to read at the age of approximately 30 years, with great difficulty due to an eye defect. His latest triumph is the conversion of four customs soldiers at Puerto Perez. These four young men are natives of the fanatical romanist pilgrimage center of Copacabana. Thus may God open to us a doorway to that center of filthy lucre and idolatry.

Justo Tabel T. is our newest ordained worker. He is a carpenter and native of Amacari, having lived in La Paz for many years. He still holds his family inheritance in Amacari, however. He Gospel and in the Bible School God has laid His hand upon Justo for pastoral work. He came to us with the burden of his old town center upon his heart, the town of Tiquina. Here he was known in years past as a dancer, drunkard and troublemaker. He has been appointed to this task to help Tata Cipriano in his field. As he departed to his field he said, "Pastor, I am leaving the sweets, the honey and the marmalades behind, to go out to I know not what, where they will not listen to me because they have known me as I was. Pray for me." To which we replied, "God bless you. Go. And as you go God will give you 'sweets' to mix with your bitterness; and He will permit the bitterness with the sweet that you may prove Him."

Building

On August 28, 1938 the new chapel building was dedicated. It was a happy day, indeed. Many thought, when they saw the large room, that we had built too large; but at the dedication and during the Annual Conference sessions the room was filled. Our Sunday morning attendance on ordinary occasions comfortably fills the space. Already the floor about the altar is stained with the falling tears of weeping seekers. Few services are without seekers. Thank God for the privilege of preaching to a people who are not "gospel-hardened"!

The basement of the church is being used as living quarters for the Tamplin family, which makes a passable arrangement. Great difficulty has been encountered in keeping down dampness, but the mission has thus been relieved of many difficulties in connection with renting in other quarters. A large part of the basement is reserved for a school-room and dormitory for visiting believers. These two rooms are still with dirt floor and should be floored before another conference time.

The street wall is being constructed as funds will permit. The division wall between the mission property and the adjoining lot has not been built yet. The building of this division wall should probably be our next undertaking in the way of construction.

The housing conditions in Puerto Perez and Corocoro are very poor, being of native construction. The house in Puerto Perez is small, but sunny; and Helen Cammack and Esthel Gulley have a nice flower-bed there to reward them for some days of hard labor. Corocoro is so intensely cold and the house so poorly arranged that the Pearsons suffer considerable inconvenience. Efforts to raise flowers there have proven complete failure.

Perhaps few people in Oregon Yearly Meeting realize that if these three missionary stations (La Paz, Puerto Perez and Corocoro) were transferred at their present elevations above the sea to a position directly above Mt. Hood, the Tamplins, Helen Cammack and Esthel Gulley would have to descend eleven hundred feet and the Pearsons twenty-five hundred feet in order to plant their feet on the peak of that worthy mountain!

Politics

The political situation of the country has been somewhat more stable than formerly, though there have been two unsuccessful revolutions during the course of the year. There was not much violence, but, upon the occurrence of the second of these the country was put under martial law for ninety days. It was stated to me by a veteran missionary of Bolivia that Romanism was never, in his long experience, as strong as it is now. The Jesuits control the administration. At the same time it is possible to truthfully state that the Gospel was never so beset with open doors as it present.

Schools

The present administration being socialistic an attempt was recently made to bring all schools directly under government direction. A decree was passed prohibiting the establishment of private schools (such as Mission Schools), the teaching of any religious dogma in the classroom, or any attempt to use schools as a means of "proselytism", or for the propagation of political ideas contrary to the present socialistic form. This was a direct hit at the Seventh Day Adventists and the German schools, but affected all mission school work as well as the private schools conducted by the Romanists.

This decree forced us to either close down our schools or to so arrange our program as to avoid the application of it to our case. We decided upon this latter course of action. Much pressure was

brought to bear upon the administration by public opinion, and the decree was invalidated. But, taking warning from the occasion we determined to follow out our new plan. This will make our schools, from the primary grades up, essentially Bible Schools (Junior and Senior), using especially prepared text books for this purpose. Helen Cammack has designed and is printing on the mission press a special set of Bible Readers. Other studies will be made to center about the Bible. The school will be exclusively for the use of the believers, members of the mission, and will be maintained by their own offerings for the specific purpose of teaching their children the Bible. Both day and night classes will conform. There are at present three schools, La Paz, Amacari and Pongonhuyo, all taught by native workers.

Special Gifts

A number of special gifts have come to hand for specific purposes. These include offerings for the completion of the Chapel in La Paz, a memorial pulpit, (from the Eichenbergers of Melba), memorial benches (a gift from a California friend as a memorial to William Abel), two chapel organs, mules for Corocoro and Puerto Perez, and helps toward the publication of our new Spanish-Aymara Hymnal. La Paz remains, since the sale of the motorcycle, without a means of transportation.

Publications

"The Soul-Cry of the Aymara" continues to be published quarterly. The gifts forwarded for this publication are very much appreciated. Letters of appreciation of the little paper are frequently received and we feel that the sacrifice of time and strength for its publication is being repaid in interest and prayer.

Bible School

The Bible School program of the mission, started in 1931, was rudely interrupted by the three years' war with Paraguay. At that time there were twelve students enrolled over a period of three months. This work was impossible of continuance until the next year. A three months course was outlined, each month to be taken by a different missionary. The attendance in these classes has varied from 6 to 15, the Indians coming in as their work would permit. Only three were able to attend throughout the full three months. A certificate of award was given to these three, one of which was a young Indian mother.

Special emphasis was given to the Bible School during the Annual Conference to encourage others to attend next year. A very pleasant reaction of these three months of study was a petition signed by fifteen Aymaras and presented to the Superintendent asking for the continuance of these studies at night, so that those who could not leave their work during the day might have the blessing of receiving these classes. One student was very definitely called to the service of the Lord as a result of the Bible School. The general impulse given to the whole field was to learn to read and study the Bible, and to greater efforts for their fellow men.

Annual Conference

The Annual Conference of 1939 was the largest ever, there being above one hundred and fifty in continuous attendance. The days started with prayer from 6 a. m. to 7 a. m. A class in prayer was held from 8 a. m. to 9 a. m. Both of these prayer hours were presided by native workers. At 10 a. m. there was an illustrated class on Holiness, followed by a holiness message. These morning services were blessed and owned of the Holy Spirit in a special manner. There was no fanaticism; just a steady, persistent and victorious seeking for the fullness of the blessing. The undercurrents

of spiritual life were deep and strong. The ministry was in the leading of the Spirit and the program constantly overlapping and blending to give full freedom to this leading.

Among some other important forward steps in the development of the Aymara church was that of a studied plan of nationalization. As a proper development of the movement already in operation a united council of missionaries and Aymaras was appointed—to consist of four missionaries and four Aymaras. This council is called The Missionary and Native Church Council. We trust that this work may be carefully guided of the Lord.

Attendance at the business session on Saturday afternoon was no smaller than at any other service. In fact it seemed larger. Nobody left the room to go home though the meeting continued from 3 p. m. to 5:45 p. m. The reports of the pastors showed care in records, pastoral care and evangelistic zeal in all parts of the field. To see five native workers on the platform with six missionaries was a blessing to the people as well as to the missionary force. It manifests a willingness on the part of the missionary to take his place beside the native workers as their fellows, counsellors and helpers.

There was this year a decided willingness on the part of the people to listen to their own Aymara workers preach and report, whereas in other years they seemed to prefer only the ministry of the foreigners. This shows, not a drifting away from the missionary, but an increased respect for their own fellowmen as pastors and men of God. Our respect to these men gave them a piece of confidence which in former years they had not enjoyed. It is our hope that from year to year the ministry of these native brethren may be much enlarged.

When the report of the opening of two new stations was given great enthusiasm was awakened, and on Sunday afternoon, following a consecration message, a voluntary offering was received to purchase benches for these new stations.

The conference closed on Sunday night, the 9th of April, with a grand testimony meeting. Many were the expressions of gratitude for the teaching and the messages of "these foreigners who have come to us to be one with us. We have known no other foreigners to be thus humble amongst us." Many such expressions manifest the depth of love that binds us to the people.

Translation Work

Two pamphlets have been translated from English to Spanish, but they have not yet come from the press.

Your field superintendent has been honored with an invitation from the American Bible Society to act as chairman of a Revision Committee to revise the Aymara translations of the four Gospels and Acts, the Revision Committee being made up of representatives from the Methodist, Baptist and Friends missions. The Missionary Board of Oregon Yearly Meeting having consented to the field superintendent taking the four months necessary to the accomplishment of this work, he has accepted the opportunity and will begin the work near the first of May.

Many are the incidents of the year with which we might enrich this already lengthy report. The calls come faster than we can fill them. "Pray ye the Lord of the Harvest that He thrust forth laborers into His harvest." This is indeed our prayer. Join us in prayer that our workers may be increased in number and that their sacrifice may indeed be bound with "cords, even unto the horns of the altar."

EDUCATION

Report of Greenleaf Academy for the year 1938-39 was read as follows by J. Allen Dunbar:

REPORT OF GREENLEAF ACADEMY FOR THE YEAR 1938-39

The Greenleaf Academy began its thirty-first year of service on September 12, 1938 with an enrollment of forty-five students.

With the challenge of properly educating our young people before the nation today, the Academy is still graduating Christian young men and women who are active in Christian service today and who are preparing to be leaders of tomorrow.

Throughout the year we have recognized the hand of God. The responsibility and financial load has been heavy, but we are determined to carry on, being fully convinced of the value of Christian education in this godless age.

The influence of the fall revival meeting with Frank Davies as evangelist is still being felt and evidenced in the lives of our young people. No doubt one of the most remarkable factors in the school year has been the steady growth and the deepening of the spiritual lives of many of the students. Of course, there have been some students who have not responded as we wish to the Christian influence, but we still believe and pray that the seed which has been sown will at some future time bear fruit.

The State Supervisor's report was the best this year that it has been for some time. His report on the Academy's ability to meet the State's requirements was very encouraging. Quoting from the report: "Relocation of library in studyhall is commendable. Larger use of science laboratory is good. Larger emphasis upon science and vocational courses as well as the traditional college preparatory work is commendable in view of the agricultural and home-making objective of this community. The new administration is showing commendable progress."

In February the combined boys' and girls' choruses under the direction of Cornelia Holmes presented a cantata, "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow." Almost the entire student body participated in the District Music Festival at Boise. The Academy was represented by the mixed chorus, both the boys' and girls' choruses, a girls' sextet, and a solo. All did commendable work. The boys' chorus and the solo were judged "Superior" which is the highest rating, and the girls' and mixed choruses were judged "excellent."

This year intramural contests in the form of two literary societies have been sponsored. Each student was a member of one of the groups. The competition for the athletic honor was keen. Each society presented a program and a chapel service.

With all these various activities there has been a proper emphasis on right living, character building, and scholarship. The prayer meetings have been well attended. Our pastor, Milo C. Ross, brought very helpful messages in chapel on Fridays.

The baccalaureate sermon was given this year by Rev. John L. Anderson, teacher at the College of Idaho. He challenged the class to put on the whole armor of God and to live Christian lives in this time of unrest and doubt. Dr. Russell V. de Long, President of the Northwest Nazarene College, presented the commencement address. Following this, diplomas were given to eight graduates.

The scholarships awarded by Pacific College and the Northwest Nazarene College were presented to Wayne Roberts and Bruce Bartlett.

The thoughtful cooperation of the community and student body during this year has been appreciated, and we face the future with confidence and hope.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF PACIFIC COLLEGE For 1938-39

In presenting this my twenty-seventh annual report as president of Pacific College, I wish to acknowledge the goodness and blessings of God which have been over us during the past year, and to express my sincere appreciation of the human agencies that have contributed to the service which the college has been able to render to the cause of higher education, to the work of the kingdom of God, to Quakerism in general and to the work of Oregon Yearly Meeting in particular. It is fitting that special mention be made of the college board and the committees and the officers associated with it; the faculty and others in the employ of the college, who have given such faithful service in the face of such serious difficulties, financial and otherwise; the Woman's Auxiliary to the college, who have carried on their usual activities and at the same time made substantial progress toward the raising of the fund for a new dormitory for women; ministers and other members of Oregon Yearly Meeting who have given counsel, encouragement, constructive criticism, and prayers; and to all others who have aided in this difficult and important project during the year 1938-39.

Forty-Sixth Commencement

The class of 1939 was graduated Tuesday, June 13, and was the largest by one in the entire history of the college. It was notable in that every candidate for graduation had the work entirely completed at commencement time, and that there was so large an excess of work beyond the minimum. It is possible to graduate with only 120 semester hours of credit, but the class of 1939 presented an average of over 128 semester hours of credit.

Class honors were awarded, on the basis of scholarship and character for the full four years of the college course all done in Pacific College, to Wauline Nelson and Helen Schmeltzer.

The Junior Prize, awarded on the basis of scholarship and character in the Junior year only, was awarded to Robert Sieloff.

The Wood-Mar Plaque, given to the college by the Class of 1935, and awarded by the Senior class to that other class which in their judgment had been of greatest service to the college during the year, and has furnished the best leadership, was awarded to the class of 1940.

The commencement address was given this year by Dr. Walter L. Van Nuys, field representative of the Board of Christian Education of the Presbyterian Church. Joseph G. Reece gave the closing address to the college Christian Associations, and as usual, the president of the college preached the baccalaureate sermon.

Progress During the Year

The regular and extra curricular work of the college has gone on during the year with not many things which are out of the ordinary, but with a number of definite advances.

Further work has been done in completing the integrating course of the college, which has won considerable notice from other colleges in the state and in a much wider circle. There is now a course for each of the four years intended to aid the student in unifying the course of study and aiding toward the integrating of the personality.

A change has been made which renders the library much more effective than heretofore. Formerly the stack room occupied a relatively small room on the first floor, with a somewhat larger room for reference, and with a much larger room on the opposite side of the main corridor as a library annex and study room. During the spring vacation building changes were made which have made possible the removal of the library to the east side of the corridor, the stacks occupying a much larger room, while the still larger room formerly used as a library annex is now used as a ref-

erence and study room, and the appearance of the library is greatly improved, while the change makes available one other room for office or other purposes.

The fund being raised by the Woman's Auxiliary to the college for a new brick dormitory continues to grow; but serious consideration is being given to a proposal to modernize the present women's dormitory in such a way as to make it a much more sightly and satisfactory building; which can be used by the women students until the erection of the new women's dormitory, when Canyon Hall will be available for additional living quarters for men students. No decision on the matter has as yet been reached, but there seems a real likelihood that the project will be put on for the coming summer.

There are other plans which may develop soon, but which are not ready for announcement just at present.

Faculty Changes

Pacific College has been widely known for the long term of service of its teaching force. The average will still be exceptional, though there are an unusual number of changes for the coming year.

Esther Allen has resigned as librarian and teacher of French, and Lois McCurley as teacher of dramatics and public speaking and director of physical education for women. The former vacancy has not yet been filled. The latter has been filled by the choice of Marian Binford, who took her bachelor's degree in 1937 from Earlham College and her master's degree from Pennsylvania State College this year.

Emmett W. Gulley late in 1938 was granted a half-year's leave of absence for war relief work in Spain, and has been in that service since early in 1939, under the American Friends Service Committee. Recently he was asked by the same organization to become director of relief for German refugees in Cuba. He was granted leave of absence for the college year 1939-40 for this service. He is expected home in a few days, and after a brief time here, will leave with his family for his new work in Cuba. His place as professor of Spanish and director of physical education for men has not yet been filled.

Earl Wagner, professor of music and teacher of piano, has been on leave of absence this year for graduate work in the University of Iowa. If he accepts a teaching position elsewhere, the place will be filled by Mordaunt A. Goodnough, who has done excellent work as acting professor of music and teacher of piano and academic music during the year.

For a time in the second semester we had with us Dr. Walter Naumann, a German refugee who assisted briefly in foreign languages. His appointment was only temporary, and he was aided to find a position in another college much better financially than we could have provided for him.

In definite addition to the teaching force are two young Quaker men both of whom have taken master's degrees from Haverford College this year. One is Edwin Sanders, who graduated in 1937 from Earlham College, and who will teach in the English and Public Speaking departments; the other is Lewis M. Hoskins, who graduated last year from Pacific College and who will assist part time in Social Science and Athletics.

A Look Ahead

With consciousness of the difficulties which we face in an attempt to maintain a college with so small a constituent membership in the Friends Church in the Pacific Northwest, but with confidence in God and in the friends of the college, this report is respectfully submitted.

Christian Endeavor in its inception had a threefold purpose: (1) to furnish a meeting where young people could fellowship in praying and testifying, (2) a gathering where young people who wanted God could find Him, (3) a place where young people would be better prepared in the use of the Word and Christian service in order to point others to Jesus the Saviour.

Those purposes should always be the goal of our Christian Endeavor. Of late the general tendency in Christian Endeavor at large and too often in our own societies has been to make the Christian Endeavor service a place of little prayer and much aimless talking and cavilling over things of little import. Our societies need to pray more in their services.

It is true that our Conferences are high points in mass evangelization but along with the many conversions and purifyings we had at our Conferences this year we needed more home society altars where conference blacksliders could get back to God again and where we could draw our unsaved school friends and lead them to Christ.

We needed to study God's word more in C. E. not as a drill or to match wits in looking up scripture, but in seeking its nourishment that would build us to be heroes of holiness and evangelists for God.

With all our needs in mind we turn to thank God for the following blessings of the past year:

Conferences at Twin Rocks, Wauna Mer, and Quaker Hill and for young people who at each turned from a life of sin, for our Lesson Helps that our own members have written and edited, for the better stewardship among our young people over last year by some \$40. for the Friendly Endeavor that has through the trials of financial trouble continued to reach us, for the Chart "Touring through the Northwest" and the willing work done by societies,—for the increase of about 200 members.

We thank God as a body of young people for the heritage of the precepts and examples in holy living among our ministers and older people.

And out of our Christian Endeavor membership rises a fearless group which joins our church's voice in testifying that the blood of Jesus Christ cleanses from all sin.
