Minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends 1940

1. Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends met, under the providence of God, in its forty-eighth annual session at Newberg, Oregon, at 9:30 A. M., June 12, 1940.

2. During the period of devotion a number offered prayer and each one seemed burdened with the need of peace in the midst of turmoil and the special need of the Yearly Meeting this year because of the passing of our General Superintendent, Chester A. Hadley.

The presiding clerk felt a concern to bring a message to the meeting from Isaiah 9: 6,7. We need to-day a renewed consciousness of God's participating in our affairs. In this world situation God may be working out his plan. If we can get away from the confusion of people and get to the secret place of God, we will see how God is carrying out His purposes. God will finally establish a kingdom which shall never be destroyed. The Lord God, omnipotent, shall reign forever and "of the increase of his government and peace there shall be no end."

6. Worth Mackay, a recorded minister of New York Yearly Meeting, who is now in charge of the Protestant work among the Indians at Chemawa, was introduced to the meeting.

Frank Dell, a recorded minister and pastor of Huntington Park Meeting in California Yearly Meeting, who has been invited to have charge of the inspirational hour, was presented to the meeting.

Denver and Ruth Headrick were introduced to the meeting. Denver Headrick is to have charge of the evening services.

Appreciation was expressed for the presence of Frank Dell and Denver and Ruth Headrick and of their work in other Yearly Meetings.

7. The following communication was received from Salem Quarterly Meeting:

The Ministry and Oversight body of Salem Quarterly Meeting made the following recommendation to the Quarterly Meeting, held at Rosedale 5th month, 18th, 1940.

Salem Quarterly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight proposes that the Quarterly Meeting recommend to Oregon Yearly Meeting that the following additions regarding the reception of members be made to the discipline of 1934: That Part III, Chapter 1, Section 1, Paragraph 2, have inserted, following the comma in line four, these words: "and to see that he takes an adequate course of instruction in the distinctive beliefs and practices of Friends, which shall be provided."

Also that a similar addition be made in Part II, Chapter II, regarding the transfer of associate members to the active membership list.

8. The following communication from Portland Quarterly Meeting was referred to the representatives:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends,
to be held 6 month, 1940, at Friends Church, Newberg, Oregon:

In 1936 a proposition was presented to the Monthly meeting and forwarded to the Quarterly Meeting which forwarded it to the Yearly Meeting asking that action be taken for our youth in the event of war. Again in 1937 and 1938 a similar proposal was presented.

The Peace committee feeling it extremely important that definite action be taken without further delay to help our youth in the event of war, present the following for consideration of the Monthly Meeting with the thought of presenting it to the Quarterly Meeting to be forwarded to the Yearly Meeting.

First: That young people make sure that their conscientious objections to war are of a sound religious conviction and not merely an economic and humanitarian viewpoint.

Second: That the Yearly meeting present our peace principles as stated in the discipline for publicity.

Third: We present the following proposals:

First: That we work with the American Friends Service Committee in recording names and pertinent personal data of all our youth that would like to accept alternative work in the event of war.

Second: That we urge our youth to use care in the finding of work now that would cause the draft board to question their sincerity as a conscientious objector in the event of war.

9. The communication from Portland Quarterly Meeting in regard to sending the gospel to the Hebrews was referred to the Missionary Board.

Your committee appointed in 3rd month, unites with the proposition from Piedmont Monthly Meeting and recommends that the following proposition be sent to Oregon Yearly Meeting:

Believing sincerely that the Scriptures clearly teach there is a special responsibility resting on the church to take the New Testament Gospel message to the Hebrew people, we propose that Oregon Yearly Meeting incorporate into its program of missions support to some known, effective organization now so ministering to this needy people.

This proposition is not intended to burden Oregon Yearly Meeting with an additional missionary project, but, that it shall urge free will offerings for this need; recommend some established organization worthy of support; receive and forward all funds given for the support of the recommended work, or funds given for any other group administering to the need of the Hebrew people; and make a report annually of all such gifts.

13. The following actions taken by Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting were presented to the Yearly Meeting:

By action of Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting in eleventh month 1939, East Bench Monthly Meeting was discontinued.

By action of Boise Valley Monthly Meeting in fifth month 1940, Ontario Heights Monthly Meeting was established. This meeting is to be held the fourth fourth day of each month at 8 P. M. and to be attached to Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting.

16. The reports on the State of Society from the Quarterly Meetings were read and accepted and a summary of these appears below:

The meetings for worship and the transaction of business are regularly held. Most of the members are faithful in attending the morning services. Two meetings report that some are not so careful in attending evening meetings and the meetings for business as would be desirable.

Most of the members have love one for another. Two meetings report that differences have arisen and care has been taken to end them speedily with a deeper spiritual condition as the result.

The spirit of the age in which we are living offers little encouragement to maintaining a spiritual life but by Bible reading

and family worship the large part of our membership is kept from falling.

Our children are trained in the nurture and admonition of the Lord and sincere efforts are made for their conversion. One meeting reports that there is a great lack on the part of the young and the old in reverence and respect for God in places of worship. The Bible reading contest conducted in the Bible Schools of one Quarterly Meeting has been helpful in encouraging the children to read the Scriptures at home.

Three meetings report that a few of their members are not careful to abstain from tobacco which was a matter of concern to the meetings. We are thankful that the large majority refrain from alcohol and narcotics and pray that those who have indulged in the past may change their ways.

One meeting reports that one or two are in military service. The other meetings seek to maintain the Christian principle of peace and we sincerely pray that when the call comes to bear arms we may act according to the spirit and intent of our discipline.

Most members are careful and just in their financial affairs but we regret that because the tendency of the times is to overreach in business affairs there follows unfaithfulness to engagements in some meetings.

Suitable education is provided for the children and they are guarded against hurtful reading. One meeting reported that they were able to secure Christian teachers in the public schools.

The meetings are careful to keep informed about the needs of home and foreign fields and to support them by systematic giving. One meeting feels that there has been some failure in this respect.

On the whole there is an evident growth in grace and deepening of spiritual life.

The meetings are careful in their appointment of officers to secure those who uphold the fundamental principles of Friends as held by Oregon Yearly Meeting.

17. The Presiding Clerk presented the proposition that an Assistant Clerk should be appointed to assist the Presiding Clerk and to be the Reading Clerk. Because this was a disciplinary change, action was deferred until the next day.

The meeting favored this suggestion and referred the matter to the representatives for their consideration.

18. The Nominating Committee was requested to correct names and addresses for the directory.

19. Frederick B. Baker, Gervas A. Carey, and Kenneth Eichenberger were chosen to serve the Yearly Meeting as a Press Committee.

20. The Recording Clerk was directed to secure a typist.

21. The Clerk gave instructions to the representatives as follows:

(1) To propose to the next session of the meeting names of persons to serve as Presiding Clerk, Recording Clerk, Reading Clerk and Announcing Clerk.

(2) To determine a ratio for raising funds and distributing documents.

(3) To propose funds to be raised for church work, and to nominate a Friend to serve as Treasurer for the ensuing year.

(4) To propose the name of one person in each Quarterly Meeting to receive and distribute documents.

(5) To propose names of persons to serve on the Printing Committee.

22. The meeting joined in singing the chorus, "Oh Wonderful Love." Then Frank Dell brought the inspirational message from Acts 2: 38. He emphasized especially the need of repentance in the name of Jesus Christ.

23. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 o'clock.

24. The meeting convened at the appointed time and after a period of devotion the business of the afternoon was considered.

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

29. Lela Gulley, the Superintendent of the Stewardship Department, presented the following report:

Two Quarterly Meeting superintendents report that in some of their meetings, there is an increase in the number of tithers this year, and other meetings report a small decrease compared to last year's report. One meeting is reported to have 100% of their members tithers.

Rosedale reports that tithing was especially emphasized during March and April by songs, sermons, and special comments. A short Stewardship playlet was given at Rosedale at one of their church gatherings. This play emphasized the fact that tithing provides enough money in the church treasury for all the various committees and their work. Emphasis was placed on cheerful giving. The Endeavorers prepared a Stewardship play called "Thanksgiving Ann" which they presented at Rosedale.

One meeting kept literature and Scripture texts on tithing in the vestibule of their church where it would be accessible to the members.

Springbrook reports that each Sunday during March something pertaining to Stewardship was presented to the members, also 8 different Sundays, a two-page leaflet was given to each family present. Twelve account books were sold and \$1.65 was paid for tithing literature.

A Storehouse League was formed at Middleton, which has greatly increased the amount of money given there.

Some meetings report that they have purchased tithing material from the Layman Publishing Company, which they have used in their meetings.

Many short talks and addresses along the line of Stewardship were given in Sunday Schools and at other times.

The Portland Quarterly Meeting superintendent reports that a gospel band composed of young people from Camas and Prune Hill conducted seven services on Stewardship. Three church nights also were devoted to Stewardship, and this subject was stressed during the month of March. A skit along this line was presented at Camas.

Letters and cards and an article for the Friendly Endeavor were written pertaining to this subject.

It is encouraging to find that the young people are getting a vision of tithing and a vital interest is being aroused along the line of Stewardship throughout the Yearly Meeting.

The superintendent was given the privilege of adding to the report as other reports come in.

This report was approved by the meeting.

Fern Mills sang a solo, "Keep on Believing."

Earl Barker gave an address on Stewardship based on I Corinthians 4:7. "What hast thou that thou hast not received?" We must recognize the fact of our stewardship; we must understand the meaning of our stewardship; we may anticipate the reward of our stewardship and lastly we should remember that we are stewards of the mysteries of God.

The superintendent urged that every meeting should try and get as many tithers as possible for this coming year. She read some pertinent items from Stewardship News, published by Perry Hayden, Superintendent of Stewardship, of Ohio Yearly Meeting.

30. W. T. Dodd, Superintendent of the Oregon Anti-Liquor League, was introduced to the meeting and urged the members of the meeting who lived in Oregon to circulate and sign a petition to put a measure on the ballot that all alcoholic beverages over 1/2 of one percent by weight should be sold directly in the liquor stores and in their original containers.

31. Kenneth Eichenberger presented the Literature report in the place of Grace Hadley, the superintendent, who was absent.

A variety of miscellaneous activities was reported, one meeting reporting that a literature table in the church is kept supplied, and also furnished good reading to the local hospital. Some of the C. E. groups and S. S. classes report Scripture reading contests in which several thousand chapters of the Bible were read. A Reading Contest was engaged in in one Quarter and a program given in the interest of good reading. A short skit, "Garbage Reading," was given before a Sunday School with good effect. Over 200 copies of the "Upper Room," daily devotion booklet, have been distributed in one quarter, and a number of Scripture Text Calendars. One Quarterly Meeting reports that a suggested reading list is being prepared by competent workers. Two large bundles of good reading were sent to a lumber camp and needy children by one group.

The report was accepted by the meeting.

Kenneth Eichenberger urged that the Sunday School papers be preserved and passed on to others; that the pamphlet, "What About the Ordinances," by Herman Macy be read by the members and that we should have real Bible study.

Gervas A. Carey gave the address on Literature. He said spiritual lethargy and a lack of spiritual understanding were connected with a lack of Scripture reading. We are suffering from a lack of Bible reading. George Fox was steeped in scriptural knowledge and gave quotations in his Journal from fifty-two books of the Bible. Read all books indiscriminatingly except the Bible. Modern education puts the emphasis on the ability to think and not on being an encyclopedia. One needs to find an interest and develop it. A few dollars invested in the right kind of reading will prevent the reading of a lot of trash.

32. The Executive Committee asks that the matter of providing for the work of the General Superintendent be left in the hands of the Executive Committee.

This was approved by the meeting.

33. The Executive Committee recommends that the sum of \$2,000.00 be appropriated for the work of the General Superintendent for the coming year.

This was approved by the meeting and was referred to the Finance Committee.

34. The meeting adjourned to meet at 9:30 A. M. Thursday, June 13, 1940.

The report was accepted by the meeting.

Glen Haworth gave a talk on Sunday School work. We need to make the services of the Sunday School attractive. The money spent for evangelistic services for children brings great results. The Daily Vacation Bible School is very important for Bible training. The right use of music, stories, pictures to make the Bible and the Sunday School period interesting is one of the problems of the Sunday School worker.

TEMPERANCE

41. The Superintendent of Temperance, Harold P. Mills, presented the work of this department by the following report:

While Europe is an exploding mass of mines and bombs, of trinitrotoluene and gunpowder, while women and children and other innocent non-combatants by the thousands are starving, bleeding, dying at the hands of a ruthless foe, the people of this country are suffering the effects of an undeclared war at the hands of a still more ruthless foe.

This atrocious enemy doesn't care what it does to our boys and our girls, to our young men and maidens, our fathers and mothers, our babies and the generation yet unborn. It doesn't care how it debauches and ruins our country so long as it can put the billions of dollars into its pockets. It has murdered our people by the thousands and sent their mutilated bodies to rest in pieces beneath the daisies. It has filled our hospitals, our insane asylums, our feeble minded institutions and our jails with its victims. It turns happy homes into wretched hutches. It turns peace and comfort into brawling and misery. It turns prosperity into poverty. It turns well-nourished and happy children into hungry, neglected waifs. It sends beautiful girls to the brothel. It leaves a wake of wreckage and misery. And we, the people of the United States of America, have entered into partnership with this fiendish monster, accorded it the sanction and protection of our government and given it a free hand to debauch and slaughter our own sons and daughters for a share of the loot!

God have mercy on us!

Nearly all the meetings report that their Sunday Schools have talks or special features on Temperance Sunday each quarter.

Many of our women belong to and support the work of the W. C. T. U. and many of our members in Oregon are enthusiastic supporters of the Oregon Anti-Liquor League. A few of our meetings sponsor Loyal Temperance Legions. Friends in Boise Valley have circulated a petition.

In response to the question, "Can you suggest any way in which the Quarterly Meeting Superintendent or the Yearly Meeting Superintendent of this department can be of greater service to the local chairmen or Monthly Meetings?" several have expressed a desire that the superintendents visit them in person oftener and give addresses and render any other assistance possible. Several asked that they be provided with more literature. These suggestions are greatly appreciated and should be used as a basis for planning future activity.

The superintendent feels that alcohol education should still be our main line of attack and that this attack should be carried on not only within our own group of members but to those outside, Boy Scout groups, Camp Fire Girls, schools—anywhere we can find

a listening ear. Allied Youth posts should be organized wherever possible. And, again, Friends in Oregon are urged to give increasing support to the Oregon Anti-Liquor League.

Again the superintendent takes this opportunity of expressing his thanks and appreciation to all who have cooperated in the work of this department.

The report was satisfactory to the meeting and was accepted.

The Superintendent presented the following request which was granted by the meeting:

Because the word "temperance" is being so seriously abused, and because it is the belief of this department that its scope should be extended to enable it to deal with other harmful uses and practices of a public nature such as the use of tobacco, opium and its derivatives, marihuana, gambling and dancing, the Yearly Meeting superintendent of this department, with the concurrence of the two Quarterly Meeting superintendents present, requests that the name of this department be changed to the Department of Public Morals.

Two books had been purchased by the Superintendent for use by the members of the Yearly Meeting: "Alcohol and the Man" by Dr. Haven Emerson for adult readers; "Alcohol, Its Effects On Man," by the same author for younger readers.

Three Pacific College students gave short talks on different phases of the Temperance question. Elenita Mardock spoke on the Relation of Alcohol to Health, showing the effects of alcohol on the different systems of the body. David Michener spoke on the Economic Effects of Alcohol, and showed the relationship of Unemployment, Crime, and Poverty to Alcohol. Jeanne Follette spoke on Allied Youth and its activities.

42. Frank Dell brought the message at the inspirational hour from Acts 2:38. "Be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ." We must pass through an experience similar to Christ's experience on the cross and then walk in newness of life and emerge with the spirit of Christ. We must show the proof and practice of our experience by righteousness and love for all men.

43. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 P. M.

44. The meeting convened at the appointed time. Edgar P. Sims offered an earnest prayer for help in this time of turmoil.

47. The annual report of the work of the General Superintendent was as follows:

Introduction

The Society of Friends does not make the vision, the vision makes the Society of Friends. This would probably have been the opening words of the 10th Annual Report of Chester A. Hadley, General Superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting for ten years, who was promoted to be with his Lord on Monday, June the 3rd, just eight days before the opening session of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

This report is compiled from material on hand which was to have been written up by Chester Hadley on the day following his death. Those preparing the report have done their best to give a true picture of the Superintendent's work for the year and the summary of the work of the church.

Expanded Program of the Yearly Meeting

During the past year expanding work of the Yearly Meeting has been continued. We had heard him express publicly that this had been the best year in both home and foreign fields during his term. Three outposts have become Monthly Meetings during the year: Camas and Rosemere at Portland Quarterly Meeting and Ontario Heights in Boise Valley Quarter. Aside from the Monthly Meetings organized there are still sixteen outposts in the Yearly Meeting. Under the leadership of our superintendent there has been a steady gain in membership until this year we are within 32 members of the high peak of 3423 members in 1922.

Spiritual Victories

The Spiritual reports reveal that Evangelism has been stressed and many souls saved and sanctified.

Dollar Pledge Appeal

Three new church groups have been helped during this year by the Dollar Pledge Appeal: Whitney Bench and Woodland in Boise Valley Quarter and Prune Hill in Portland Quarterly Meeting.

Pastoral Situation

Reports indicate that there will be a number of pastoral changes this year but these announcements will have to be made later.

Other Departments

The Missionary Report will be heard tomorrow revealing the greatest year along all lines they have ever had.

Reviewing the work of the year of the other departments reveals unusual activity which will be reported during the other sessions of the Yearly Meeting.

Personal Activity

The past year was a busy one for our General Superintendent. No actual account can be given of many of these activities but a perusal of the last nine Annual Reports reveals that each year had been a busier one than the year before.

3825 letters were mailed from the Church Office, nearly twice that of the year before. 215 sermons and illustrated Missionary addresses were delivered. He traveled 26,582 miles, which figure included a trip East where he attended as a guest a meeting of the American Friends Missionary Board in Richmond, Indiana. He edited the "Church Window" section of the Friendly Endeavor and the News Flash sent monthly to each meeting. He held many conferences and personal interviews and met with various committees. He attended all three of our Christian Endeavor Conferences. He was Evangelist at Quaker Hill Conference and took an active part at both Twin Rocks and Wauna Mer Conferences. He had made preparation to conduct a class on Peace in each of the conferences this summer. He engaged in three revival meetings during the year: one at Woodland, Idaho, one at Nampa, Idaho, and one at Camas, Washington. He visited all of the Quarterly Meetings in regular session several times during the year, having just attended Tacoma, Newberg, Salem, and Boise Valley Quarterly Meetings. It seems to us now in the Providence of God that these messages were his parting farewell challenge to Oregon Yearly Meeting. His closing message was preached Sunday evening, June the 2nd, in First Friends Church, Portland, where he received his call to the ministry and where he had been recorded. That night he read from the 116th Psalm commenting verse by verse through the 14th inclusive, but he did not read the 15th verse which comes to us with such comfort now: "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His Saints."

48. The Permanent Board presented the following Memorial with a request that it be printed in the Minutes. This request was approved by the meeting.

A MEMORIAL

Chester A. Hadley, son of Lewis I. and Edith Hadley, was born at Fairfield, Indiana, January 7, 1888, and died at his home in Portland, Oregon, the 3rd of June, 1940. His childhood was envired by influences permeated with an atmosphere created by obedience to the injunction to bring up children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Having parents zealous for the

strength and growth of the church. Chester Hadley began early to walk with the God of his father who was for many years a teacher, pastor, and evangelist.

Prior to the time of coming to Oregon with his parents and two sisters, the family home was where the church was served by the father as pastor. On this account Portland became the place of the family residence. There Chester Hadley united with the young people of the church and soon became a leader in Christian Endeavor activities. He also taught in the Bible school. As the years passed he qualified as an Electrical Engineer and for other skilled labor. With good prospects of ways and means to support a home of his own, he united in marriage with Grace Gardner, a daughter of a pioneer family of First Friends Church, Portland. To this union a daughter and two sons were born, all of whom survive.

Soon after beginning of this new relationship came his decision to accept the call of God to the ministry and the dedication of his time and talents thereto without reservation. Receiving a call to the pastorate of a newly organized meeting, he resigned a comfortable position giving adequate material compensation to accept the opportunity to exercise his gift under conditions affording meager financial aid. The church duly recognized God's ordination and recorded him a Minister of the Gospel. The churches he served as pastor are Rosedale in Salem Quarterly Meeting, Piedmont and First Friends, Portland, in Portland Quarter. A period of nearly twenty years of fruitful labor. He had an expanding vision for the extension of the work to which he gave the best of his command.

With Homer Cox and others he explored the possibilities for the establishment of a permanent institution for the young people of the church which culminated in the annual Twin Rocks Conference and all that has developed from that worthy enterprise.

While engaged in a good and growing work with First Friends at Portland, the Yearly Meeting called him to a wider service, that of General Superintendent, which office he filled with credit until called home. The missionary work of the Yearly Meeting was close to his heart and interest for the same gained new impetus under his supervision. Notable also is the increase of outposts and the setting up of new centers from which communities have been contacted with the Gospel message. However fittingly we may be able to speak our appreciation or make record of consecrated endeavors, the full measure of a God-ordered life is not for our appraisal.

While bowed down by the consciousness of the heavy loss, failure to submit to His will, though a mystery and beyond our understanding, will weaken the loyalty in which there is found peace. "God Buries His Workmen, But His Work Goes On." By the spiritual energy released by the life of Chester Hadley, "A workman that needed not to be ashamed," God's work is going on.

49. A memorial service held for our beloved General Superintendent, Chester A. Hadley, manifested the power of a life hid with Christ which desires not to be ministered unto but to minister. From his life has flowed an influence that has helped many as shown by the expressions

given in the meeting. His kindly, understanding spirit made him a friend of young and old. He was a spiritual father to many young pastors and his words of encouragement were a source of strength to those who were discouraged. His ability to maintain his Christian love without compromising his Christian principles was an inspiration to many. He helped to unify the Yearly Meeting and to encourage its members to catch a vision of great work yet to be accomplished. His influence has reached beyond the limits of this Yearly Meeting and into other Meetings. The message from the Missionaries of Bolivia shows their appreciation of his helpful spirit. May his promotion to the Heavenly Kingdom be an inspiration to all to go forward in the name of Christ.

The meeting united with Walter P. Lee in a prayer of thankfulness for the life and influence of Chester A. Hadley.

50. The Executive Committee recommends that the salary of the General Superintendent be paid to Grace Hadley until September 1, 1940.

This recommendation was approved by the meeting.

51. The meeting adjourned to meet at 9:30 Friday A. M., June 14, 1940.

FRIDAY, 9:30 A. M.

52. The meeting convened at the appointed time and during the period of devotion, prayer was offered by Carl F. Miller.

53. The minutes were read and approved.

54. The Representatives made the following report:

The representatives granted the Tacoma delegation the privilege of substituting Gertrude Doyle as Representative in place of Calvin B. Choate, who is a member of the Nominating Committee.

The Representatives nominated Walter P. Lee to serve the meeting as Assistant Clerk.

The recommendation from Salem Quarterly Meeting to amend the Discipline as to requirements for membership: The Representatives do not favor the recommendation in its present form, but propose that the Yearly Meeting encourage the Monthly Meetings to work along that line, particularly that the members might know more of Friends history and Friends principles and practices.

The Representatives favor the proposition of Portland Quarterly Meeting with respect to the subject of peace (see Minute 8), as amended:

Section 3, part 1—That we supply to the American Friends Service Committee names and pertinent data of all our youth that would like to accept alternative work in the event of war.

The meeting approved the report.

55. The following requests for additional representatives on the Executive Committee for one year were approved by the meeting and will be acted upon tomorrow. They were referred back to the respective Boards for the naming of these representatives:

Board of Foreign Missions.

Evangelistic and Church Extension Board.

The Executive Committee of the Christian Endeavor Union of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends.

56. The Permanent Board made the following report:

The called meeting of the Permanent Board of Oregon Yearly Meeting convened at Newberg, Oregon, 10th month 5th, 1939.

Approval was given the following recommendations:

That the church consider the possibilities for giving help to our young men in the event of the United States becoming involved in the European War by granting contact with the American Friends Service Committee individually, in groups, or as monthly meetings for relief work or other service not inconsistent with the Christian conscience on war, by a survey of the possibilities for the setting up of a relief workers camp in Oregon and the prospect of securing aid therefor from the American Friends Service Committee.

That action to rescind the 1938 action of the Yearly Meeting discontinuing relationship with said committee be deferred until the meeting in June, 1940.

That we reaffirm our testimony on war was also an approved recommendation.

By the vote of the meeting it was decided not to reconsider the action of 1938 that discontinued relationship with the American Friends Service Committee.

57. Edward Harmon, President of the Board for Aged Ministers and Missionaries, presented the following report which was accepted by the meeting:

The Board for Aged Ministers has continued its work, endeavoring to perfect its operation.

We regret to report that since the plan was adopted by the Ministerial Association and the Yearly Meeting in 1938, that only three ministers have availed themselves of its opportunities.

We would like to call attention to the plan which is as follows:

"We propose that the pastors and the missionaries of Oregon Yearly Meeting be asked to contribute one per cent of their salaries yearly toward a permanent retirement fund. We request the Yearly Meeting to pay an equal amount toward this fund which amounts to two hundred dollars this year. We suggest that this two hundred dollars be placed in the fixed expense.

"On retirement the pastor shall receive a proportionate amount from the Yearly Meeting depending upon the years of service in the Yearly Meeting, plus the amount he has paid in. On withdrawal from the Yearly Meeting, each pastor shall receive the amount he has paid in.

"Contributing to this fund, and receiving benefits from it shall be optional with the minister."

Ministers will have until September 1st to enter for this year. Only those who participate in this plan will be able to receive any benefits from it, as payments from its funds will be based upon years of membership.

We are happy that we have been able to give \$10.00 a month to Marietta Cope whose life continues to be a blessing to us all.

The Board is laboring to create a retirement fund so that in the future we shall be able to give respectable aid to our aged ministers and missionaries on their retirement. To help in this, the Board will be glad to receive any gifts or bequests.

The President emphasized the importance of the retirement fund and also the need of contributions to this fund.

58. The Permanent Board of Oregon Yearly Meeting made the following report which was accepted:

The Permanent Board of Oregon Yearly Meeting in regular session at Newberg, Oregon, 6th month 12th, 1940.

Memorials were read for Samuel Beeson, Mary K. Gear, and Chester A. Hadley.

Those for the first two named Friends were directed for reading before the Yearly Meeting and filed with documents as is the custom. The one for Chester A. Hadley to be read and printed in the Yearly Meeting Minutes.

Frank L. Cole and Joseph G. Reece were placed in nomination, each for a three year term on the Board of Managers of Pacific College.

To serve on the Permanent Board of the Yearly Meeting for two years to complete the unexpired term of Benjamin Clark Miles, deceased, Charles C. Haworth was named and Seth A. Mills was proposed for the year remaining of the term of John Rees, deceased. To serve the Board as clerk for the ensuing year the present incumbent of the office was chosen.

By reason of the possibility of the need to consider and provide for emergencies during the year, the meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the clerk.

59. The proposition from Portland in regard to taking the New Testament Gospel message to the Hebrew people which was referred to the Foreign Missionary Board was returned from the Board with the following recommendation:

The Foreign Missionary Board is in sympathy with this concern, but feels they cannot incorporate it in the Foreign program. We suggest a committee be appointed to take care of this matter.

Summary of reports of Spiritual Condition:

Most of the members are diligent in attending meetings for worship and business.

There seems to be a good spirit of unity among the members of the meetings and an earnest desire for the conversion of sinners and building up of believers.

We seek to use the spiritual gifts with which we have been entrusted, and take an active interest in all who are engaged in the ministry or special Christian work.

There seems to be a realization by all that we are to be examples to the flock in uprightness of life, and that by daily study of the Word and prayer, we are to find the help we need for our task.

We believe that we are all in harmony with the fundamental principles of Christianity as held by friends and would faithfully deal with any of our members who were not so.

61. The report of the Trustees of Oregon Yearly Meeting with their recommendations was as follows:

The trustees present the following items for information:

We hold the following notes:

Boise Church, July 20th, 1929. Note \$500.00, paid \$200.00. Balance due \$300.00 plus 5% interest.

Second Friends Church, Portland, October 26, 1925. Note \$432.00. Interest paid to date \$103.00.

Arthur and May Rose Buse. Note May, 1936, \$300.00 at 6%. Balance on principal \$157.15. Interest due \$9.43.

The Yearly Meeting Treasurer received \$300.00 from the trustee Savings Account which was applied to the reserve fund, leaving a balance on hand of \$50.52.

We have filed a copy of the minutes for 1939 as official record of the meeting.

At the present time, the Newberg Friends Church is covered by fire insurance in the amount of \$12,000.00 paid by Newberg Monthly Meeting.

The Trustees of Oregon Yearly Meeting feel that this is not adequate protection on a building of this type.

Therefore, the Trustees recommend that they be authorized to have the building appraised and additional insurance placed on the building to give adequate protection; the Yearly Meeting to pay for the additional insurance over the \$12,000.00 which will be continued by Newberg Monthly Meeting.

We recommend that \$70.00 be included in the budget for the coming year for repairs on the Yearly Meeting House. These funds are necessary for the purchase of tile for drainage of the basement, the labor to be furnished by the Newberg Monthly Meeting.

In answer to a request from Newberg Monthly Meeting for a lot for use as a site for a parsonage, the description of the lot being as follows:

50 foot front on 3rd street, the east boundary of which would be approximately 32 feet from the west wall of the church, and the south border to terminate at the center of the block,

we recommend that a deed be given to Newberg Monthly Meeting to be recorded when the parsonage is built. If this parsonage is not built, the land will revert to the Yearly Meeting.

The meeting is in favor of securing additional insurance on the Yearly Meeting House according to an appraisal that shall be made.

It also favors the appropriation of \$70.00 for repairs on the church.

The meeting also favored the granting of the request from Newberg Monthly Meeting for a lot of the Yearly Meeting grounds according to the description given in the Trustees' report.

PEACE

62. The Superintendent of Peace, Levi T. Pennington, presided at the meeting and read his annual report which was accepted by the meeting:

"These are the times that try men's souls."

And this does not mean merely times that are hard to bear; it means that these are the times that test men's souls, that bring conviction to the trial. Perhaps none of us has ever seen a time when Lowell's words were more applicable:

"Some day the soft ideal that we wooed
Confronts us fiercely, foe-beset, pursued
And cries reproachful, 'Was it, then, my praise
And not myself was loved? Prove now thy truth.
I claim of thee the promise of thy youth.
Give me thy life, or cower in empty phrase,
The victim of thy genius, not its mate.'"

Even Friends may ask themselves if they are genuine and dependable lovers of peace or if they are only pacifists pro tem.

If we still hold to our faith, as followers of Christ the Prince of peace and believers in the Christian teaching of the power of love and goodwill and understanding, then our question is, "What shall we do under present world conditions?"

The situation today and the prospects for tomorrow make the question of our relation to war most immediately vital to young people, especially those of draft age. If any of these have not crystallized their conviction, they should do so at once. And if each of these would file with the monthly meeting his or her decision not to accept military service, with an adequate statement of the reasons for the decision, it might be of material help and could hardly do any harm. There should be as definite as possible a decision as to just what will and what will not be done in response to any move of the government to place one in military service of any kind.

Of scarcely less importance is the thorough education of our membership, young, middle-aged and old, as to the basis and validity of our peace testimony. For those below draft age, this is important for the future. For those above draft age it is important in order that we may be of maximum assistance to those who may face the immediate consequences of their anti-war convictions.

And perhaps the most important part of all is the task, to which we ought to make a vital contribution, of bringing others outside our own membership to see the better way. This is an almost immeasurable task, and if done completely now would have to be done over again with each new generation.

And those who need enlightenment most are sometimes those who are in highest places, and whose decisions can do most to foment war or to promote peace. We should be diligent in keeping before our representatives in government our peace ideals, by resolutions, petitions, personal letters, telegrams, etc. These things are of value in the order named.

The work which Oregon Yearly Meeting has been doing the past year in the interests of peace has been hard to tabulate. Some statistics are as follows:

Only one quarterly meeting reported that its committee met at the beginning of the year to plan its work.

The number of meetings held in the direct interest of peace was 40.

These meetings were men's meetings, Christian Endeavor meetings, plays, meetings for worship and prayer, mass meetings, discussion groups, etc.

There were 42 sermons and addresses reported on the subject of peace, with other meetings reporting "several." It was repeatedly reported that the subject of peace was mentioned frequently in sermons and other services of the church, in addition to the work in meetings especially in the interests of peace.

Three meetings report the distribution of 4,350 pages of peace literature, the other reports being indefinite as to quantity, though mentioning individual books and booklets which were distributed, such as The Pacifist Handbook, How to Keep America Out of War, etc.

Messenger of Peace and Peace Action are the two peace periodicals most widely read according to report. A shocking number of meetings reported that no peace literature was taken by any members.

Three meetings reported the raising of \$95.00, \$25.00 and \$34.50 for the cause of peace.

One meeting reported that 23 members had participated in contests in oratory, debating or essay writing on the subject of peace. Fourteen of these were students of Greenleaf Academy.

Three of our members were reported as engaged in active military service.

According to the reports, 106 communications from meetings were sent to government officials, 100 of them from one quarterly meeting. There were 261 individual communications, according to the reports, with other reports saying such things as "several."

There was much work in the interests of peace which did not get into any reports. It is impossible for any committee to know of some of this work; many of us could not answer for our own selves. The yearly meeting superintendent of peace gave 15 addresses during the year devoted wholly or largely to the subject of peace. How many letters and other communications he has written he could not have told without much investigation if he had been asked. There has been extensive cooperation by the superintendent, the meetings and individuals with other peace agencies such as the Peace Association of Friends in America, The American Friends Service Committee, The Fellowship of Reconciliation, The National Council for Prevention of War, etc.

Among the suggestions made from various meetings for the ensuing year may be mentioned the following:

Begin young with peace education. If you wait till draft age, you are far too late. Use blackboard, chart talks, posters, plays, etc., to develop peace convictions in the hearts of children.

Stand firm against war hysteria. Fundamental truth does not change as a result of anybody's victory in Europe or elsewhere.

Promote and observe the teachings of Christ as interpreted by Friends on the subject of peace.

Keep our peace attitude constantly before our representatives in the national capital.

Have classes on Friends attitude toward peace in all of our Young Friends Conferences.

Without special divine revelation none of us is wise enough to predict what the future holds for us. But whatever divine Providence permits, let us be true to the truth as He has revealed it to us, seeking always His righteousness whose work is peace, and whose effect is quietness and assurance forever.

The Peace Superintendent presented the following propositions:

First that the following telegram signed by the Clerks be sent to the President of the United States:

Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends now in session representing over three thousand members in Oregon, Washington and Idaho, deplore the war in Europe and its spread to other nations. We respectfully urge you to do your best to keep the United States from war and war hysteria, to labor earnestly for a just and lasting peace, and to preserve religious and civil liberty, whatever may come in the future, by permitting conscientious objectors to war of whatever creed or without creed to engage in service for humanity which will not violate their conscience.

Second, that letters be sent to the Senators and Congressmen of Oregon, Washington and Idaho with the same message.

Percy Thomas, a minister from Des Moines Monthly Meeting, Iowa Yearly Meeting, and a field representative of the Five Years Meeting, gave a peace address. He asked the question: "What message do you have for a frustrated generation?" We can take three attitudes: a cynical one, a stoical one or we can take up our cross and change it into a throne. He quoted Hebrews 12:27 showing that there are some things that can not be shaken.

The Superintendent reported that this department had been asked to have a page in the Friendly Endeavor for this coming year.

It was decided that the Peace Play which was to have been given at this time should be given sometime between sessions.

63. The Evangelistic and Church Extension Board makes the following recommendations:

That the matter of a memorial for Chester A. Hadley be assigned to some Board or that a committee be appointed to definitely take care of this matter.

69. As a part of the inspirational hour a quartet, composed of Walter Cook, Herman Macy, Everett Craven and Joseph Reece, sang "Just Abide."

Frank Dell brought another message from Acts 2:38 in which he emphasized the phrase "unto the remission of sins." Man is powerless of himself to remove his burden of sin but God has made a plan whereby one can be released from the power of sin.

Prayer was offered by Gervas A. Carey at the conclusion of the message.

70. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 o'clock.

FRIDAY, 2:00 P. M.

71. The meeting convened according to adjournment and after a period of devotion, the business was taken up.

72. At the request of the Epistle Committee, the London Special Epistle was read in its entirety.

The following summary of the epistles that have been

received by this Yearly Meeting from other Yearly Meetings was read and accepted:

Although most of the epistles from other Yearly Meetings were written almost a year ago, the gloom of the clouds of war overshadowing the world was felt. Yet there was also a note of trust and confidence in God's over-ruling providence.

The thought of the efficiency and sufficiency of Jesus Christ our Lord for all the world's needs and of His atoning death as the remedy for our sins and all human ills was definitely expressed in different epistles.

Reports of the progress of their work at home and abroad and of the responsibilities being taken by the young in different Yearly Meetings were very encouraging.

Ohio Yearly Meeting spoke of the world's need of a Savior, one who understands its sin, its pain, its agony, its yearnings, its possibilities; one who can forgive sin, cleanse away the pollution, impart abundant life, ennoble the conduct, and, finally, present the erstwhile sinner before the heavenly Father "without spot or wrinkle or any such thing."

Kansas mentioned the blessing of religious liberty which we enjoy in the United States. They felt that Friends should spread the gospel of peace, urging that peace must first be in our own hearts, moving us under the love of Christ to spread His Gospel to the uttermost parts of the earth.

Nebraska reaffirmed faith in Christ, expressing confidence that He is able to meet every need, even in these critical hours. They, like Kansas Yearly Meeting, feel that Friends should spread the Gospel of peace. In their Epistle, the Young Friends of Nebraska were concerned with the problem of how to build lives and characters. They had arrived at three conclusions: (1) The responsibility for character building rests primarily upon the home. (2) It is not a policy, but a principle of peace that we need. (3) A personal devotional life is needed.

Wilmington mentions the renewed zeal for education to overcome the evils of the growing liquor traffic as does also Baltimore with a further concern over the widespread influence of the gambling evils. Wilmington referred to the need for leadership in the development of a truer democracy in worship.

The New York Friends said: "We must stop talking of easy solutions and see with clarified vision that nothing short of a genuine return to Christ and His way of life will meet the need of the world in this desperate crisis of human history."

Indiana Friends stressed individual responsibility. They feel that a Society is only as strong as its individual members. There is no substitute for the Christian life. If we are to serve our generation it is necessary that we be rigorous in our efforts to obtain intelligent understanding of the problems that beset us, that we have an enlightened conscience regarding them and that we courageously follow that conscience.

Western Yearly Meeting writes that in the midst of harassing conditions man receives direct communications from God and can and should express them to an expectant world by His Spirit.

In the epistle from Iowa Yearly Meeting they reminded Friends that every condition of life was met in Jesus Christ. He served in sorrow, in perplexities and diseases but the greatest service was in saving from sin. This epistle urged that the Holy Spirit should empower our lives and that the purpose for teaching and preaching is solely that people may become followers of Christ.

The epistle from London Yearly Meeting asked for our prayers and sympathy that we might be bound more strongly with spiritual bonds.

The epistle from Dublin Yearly Meeting held from the second to the ninth of Fifth Month, 1940, had been opened by the censor, but nothing had been deleted. It begins with these words: "We send you greetings from hearts made full during our days here together, with a sense of Our Heavenly Father's nearness to us and His desire to fulfill and satisfy our every need." They, while living in a country still in comparative peace, express their sympathy with those the world over who, believing war to be wrong, have felt it necessary to take a stand which is opposed to that of their fellowmen and women, and they pray that such may be sustained in the hours of loneliness, in the bitterness of broken friendships, in persecution and pain and death, being certain that the service of the Kingdom of God is the truest patriotism, refusal to do wrong often the highest service.

Swedish Friends rejoice in the presence of God and the light of His Star where the night is darkest. They express gratitude for the service which seems to lie before the Scandinavian Friends, and recognize the accompanying responsibilities.

New Zealand writes: "We have a legacy from the past but this is not enough. To be vital the inspiration must be ever new. How can we sustain the spirit of the Quaker of the olden times? . . . Do we secure sufficient time each day for prayer and communion until we know the presence of God in our lives and realize His will? If the background of all our activity is thus "in Christ" there is an underlying unity which transcends and dissolves apparent differences."

We missed the epistles from Germany and France which have come in recent years. We pray that Friends in those nations at war may be preserved in the love and grace of Him who gave Himself for us all.

73. The Nominating Committee reported the names of those on the Permanent Board, the Board of Foreign Missions and the Board for Aged Ministers and Missionaries and these were approved and will appear in the Appendix.

74. The question arose whether a clerk or a secretary should be a member of the Board of which he is clerk or secretary.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

75. Joseph McCracken, the President of the Foreign Missions Board, read the report by Quarterly Meetings. This was approved and will appear in the Appendix.

The congregation united in singing "A Charge to Keep I Have."

Esther Gulley brought greetings from China. She brought an object lesson showing that God's will can be done and His work can go forward when one comes to

the end of one's self. God has abundantly blessed the work of Christians in China. Many hearts have need of prayer so let us pray.

Cascade College quartet, consisting of Keith Macy, Roger Taylor, Ralph Chapman and Claude Pike, sang "Speed It On."

The tenth annual field report was read by Denver Headrick, Bertha Haworth, Hazel Murphy, Alison Rogers and A. Clark Smith and will appear below:

It is with a deep sense of humility and dependence upon God that I approach the task of committing to writing the report of what has been, in many ways, the best year in the history of the mission in Bolivia. Jeremiah 33:3 has been much in mind and heart during the year. God invites, saying, "Call unto me, and I will answer thee, and show thee great and mighty things, which thou knowest not." The Spanish version gives an interesting interpretation of this verse. It says, "Cry out unto me, and I shall respond to thee, and I shall teach thee great things and difficult, which thou dost not know." To us has fallen the part of crying out unto Him; to Him be the glory for His response to our cry and for teaching us the great and difficult things which we needed to know.

I am not conscious of any desire on my part or of any of our fellows to glory in any measure of success that may have been ours during the past year, for the burden of the unfinished task lies too close to us to admit of such. God grant that however good the report may be, we may never lose that sense of discontent at the thought of the many thousands that are slipping into eternity without God and without hope because we have not yet been able to reach them. While we recount something of progress in comparison to years past let us not forget that other comparison—the un-reached villages and cities, the whitened fields that are casting their grain before a harvester can reach them to gather it into the Master's garner. Surely we are on praying ground, and on believing ground when we pray to the Lord of the harvest, in answer to His own instructions, that He thrust forth laborers into His harvest. His is the Field; His the Seed; His the Harvest; and His the garner that must be filled; His the Grain that must be lost if He thrust not forth the laborers. Therefore pray we with faith, "Oh, Lord thrust forth the workmen!"

We thank God for the missionaries that we have on the field, and for the fields that are being harvested. Yet we are continually faced with the need of more God-called, God-prepared, God-filled and God-sent men and women. Can we be satisfied that we are ministering to Bolivia when we are working a territory which, in comparison to all Bolivia, would be like working the Coast Range of Oregon in comparison to all the rest of Oregon, all of Washington, Idaho, California and Nevada? Can we be satisfied? No; rather, while we thank God for those that He has given us, we must continue to cry out in the night watches, "Oh, God, send us more workers or we must be crushed under the load. How long must our faith be cramped by the size of our 'tea-cup' when Thy great storehouse of wealth and men has not yet been touched? Lord, give us the vision of empires, of whole generations for Christ, of epoch-making eras of evangelization and revival! Lord, help us to see that the measure of our 'tent' must not limit the size of the 'place' upon which we pitch it!"

Now, hear ye the word of the Lord in reply to these groanings.

"Enlarge the place of thy tent, and let them stretch forth the curtains of thine habitations; spare not, lengthen thy cords, and strengthen thy stakes: for thou shalt break forth on the right hand and on the left; and thy seed shall inherit the Gentiles, and make the desolate cities to be inhabited. Fear not; for thou shalt not be ashamed; neither be thou confounded; for thou shalt not be put to shame: . . . For thy Maker is thine husband; the Lord of hosts is his name; and thy Redeemer the Holy One of Israel; the God of the whole earth shall he be called." Allow me to paraphrase: First widen the place to put your tent; then enlarge the tent; don't be stingy about it, but go ahead and lengthen the tent-cords and put in stronger stakes; for you are going to grow on every side as you have never grown before; and your children shall inherit whole nations and repopulate the rural districts. Don't be doubtful and fearful about it, for you will never have cause to be ashamed nor to be in confusion over the matter, nor be made to blush about it; for He who made you is also your husband, your Captain, your Redeemer and your God, and He it is who will give you this increase and phenomenal growth.

On this promise India saw thousands won to Christ; and on it Bolivia may see her great revival. Let us widen our place, both at home and abroad—a vision to match God's provisions. And these things may be ours, "not by an army, nor by force, but by My Spirit, saith the Lord of armies" (Spanish version).

Workers

While the number of workers in the mission, including both foreign missionaries and native workers, seems dreadfully small in comparison to our task, it was a source of great blessing to see the number increased this year to seventeen, of which number only six were foreigners. Following is a list of this united force:

We thank God for these workers. Our hearts were tendered before God when on Sunday afternoon of the Annual Conference Dr. Ridout threw out a challenge to the members of the church to give themselves unreservedly to God's will and to the ministry if He should call them. When the altar was opened the whole church moved forward as one body. About twenty young men were first to step forward, Jonathan Tamplin among them testifying that God had called him to give his life to the work of ministering to the Aymaras. Here we have a church with a vision, not only of their own needs but of other fields. One may hear them praying for the neighboring republics, for Africa, Russia, China, Japan and India, and for their co-laborers in Central and North America. When the missionary offering was received on Sunday afternoon it was voted wholeheartedly and enthusiastically to give it all to Dr. Geo. W. Ridout that he might be their representative in carrying the revival on to other fields. Thank God for a growing church with wide horizons!

Stations

The scope of this report does not permit the many intimate details that would be of interest to all. I must limit my remarks here to a few of the outstanding points of the work.

Among these outstanding features of the work on the field, Howard and Julia Pearson, in Corocoro, stand well to the fore. They came to the Conference accompanied by fifteen representatives, and reporting sixteen new members received during the year. They stood well in the lead as to the number of Bibles sold and Gospel Tracts distributed. They have won through, in three years of labor, to a place of confidence and stability in the town and surrounding communities.

Helen Cammack has been stationed, at different periods, all over the field, having passed four months in Corocoro during the absence of the Pearsons from that place for health reasons. While the Tamplins were at the coast for two months and a half, she also took charge of the work in La Paz. In between times she was busy in the print-shop and at the Lake District.

The Tamplins were absent from the field for a period of two and a half months in search of health and rest. This they found in Antofagasta, Chile, and are thankful for all those who had a part in making this vacation possible. For nine months of the year Doris Tamplin served as pastor of the La Paz congregation. During this time her pastoral work built up the spiritual tone of the congregation and increased the average attendance to the highest point yet attained. On the first of December, 1939, she released the pastorate to Juan Ayllon H. By consent of the Missionary Council and the Board of Foreign Missions, Carroll Tamplin gave the major portion of his time to the direction of the Aymara Revision Committee, under the auspices of the American Bible Society. His week ends were given either to La Paz or to visits to other parts of the field. Members of the La Paz congregation have consistently evangelized the surrounding villages and served periodically in all parts of the field. Probably the outstanding developments within the congregation itself have been the appointment of a committee on education to direct the local school, the choice of and entire support of their teacher, and the taking over of a part of the support of their own pastors, Juan and Tomasa Ayllon. They also handled ably, and practically unaided by the missionaries, the feeding and entertainment of the more than one hundred visitors at the Annual Conference. This congregation measures up to the growing demands made of it as the "mother" congregation.

Among the Native Workers

Mr. and Mrs. Felix Hermosa, for personal reasons, resigned a year ago from the Mission. This resignation took effect at the conclusion of the Aymara Revision Committee work. They continue as members of the Church but have taken up secular work.

Cipriano and Petrona Mamani, from Amacari, have asked permission to enlarge their field of evangelism. A growing number of Peruvians is being saved and asking for this "salvation mission" to come over into Peru and preach to their villages. The Indians have free access back and forth across the frontier so this permission was granted to them.

Justo Tabel, worker in Tiquina, needs and merits the sustaining prayer of the people in that fanatical town. During the year the rented hall in this town was forcibly walled up and closed to services. On another occasion an authority took the believers who were holding an open air service on the public square, drew a revolver on them and cuffed and kicked them off the place, warn-

ing them to never come back again. This is one of the strategic approaches to Satan's seat in the Romanist pilgrimage center, Copacabana. But nothing daunted, he seeks a new method of entry and approach.

Felix Guanica has kept up the evangelistic zeal of his congregation, reporting thirty-six communities, towns, farms and mines visited, and nearly a hundred journeys of evangelization. This is an enterprising congregation. Their new chapel is in process of construction and will provide seating space for 250 persons. They propose to create a refuge for faithful believers who may be put off of neighboring farms because of their faith in Christ, thus setting up the foundations for a protestant township. At the same time they propose to build about three or four miles of private auto road to connect their community with the main highway and thus facilitate pastoral visits of the missionaries.

Mariano Medrano boasts of no fixed pulpit or congregation. His pulpit may be rolling bottom of a sailboat and his congregation the passengers; or again he may be seen seated astride a bag of potatoes on top of a truck preaching to bobbing group of fellow travelers; or again he may be seen seated on a mule, jogging along evangelizing some burden-bearers; or he may be seen along the roadside kneeling with some foot-sore sin-burdened pilgrim. He is never idle. His particular work this year has been to be present in Pto. Perez every Thursday for the market day and hold the services in open air and in the chapel. He reports about 25 new converts won in these ways.

Due credit should be given to the lay-workers who, though not having official recognition as workers from the mission, are doing a valuable work in opening and holding new groups that will eventually make permanent preaching points. Feliciano Condori is the clerk of the Pongon-huyo monthly meeting who travels on foot every Sunday about nine miles to the little town of Guarina, holds two services, and then walks nine miles home again. Rosendo Guachalla is the head mechanic of a mine, who works two hours overtime every day of the week in order to be able to keep the Lord's day holy and preach to his fellow miners. Victor Nina is the chofer of a truck in the Kellyani Mine, who has organized a Sunday School at his mine, brings every year an offering to the Annual Conference, and this year brought a written request for a regular pastor and teacher at the mine to take up his work. Sra. Honorinda Marrusich is a fine cultured Chilean woman with three beautiful daughters, wife of the head electrician at the National Cement Factory at Viacha. She was a convert of a Presbyterian church in Chile, but found holiness at the altar among the Aymaras of Bolivia. The urge in her heart to be doing something for the Lord caused her to start a Sunday School among the children of the many employees of the cement factory. Her parlor is her chapel.

The greatest forward step of the year in the realm of native workers and the formation of the Indigenous Church has been the return of the Ayllon family to Bolivia from Central America. This is a beautiful little family and contribution to the formation of the Gospel community in Bolivia. Juan Ayllon's value as a leader, as a "cholo" and as an Aymarist, is an important factor in the establishment of a native leadership. Tomasa Ayllon is also an able speaker, teacher and counsellor. The children, Dorcas, Juan and Ruth, are well-behaved and talented, and God willing, will make within a few years a worthy contribution to the work.

Schools

Three primary schools for children are functioning under the direct supervision of their local congregations. These are entirely

self-supporting, and are maintained for the immediate purpose of instructing the children of the local memberships. However, the demand for night classes for illiterate adults is growing, and it was found necessary this year to appoint a Director of Biblical Instruction, of primary standing for both children and adults. Pending the Missionary Board's approval Helen Cammack was appointed by the Missionary Council and the Native Church to fill this position. This action will make instruction throughout the mission uniform and will give a system of graduation. The Bible will be the center of these schools, and for this purpose special lesson sheets and text books will be prepared on the Mission Press. Instruction will also be offered by correspondence and special program of "Each one teach one" spread throughout the field. The main objective of this system is, of course, while teaching the fundamentals of literacy to form a Bible-reading church. In the business session of the Conference special time was given to the discussion of this plan of instruction, and an appeal made to the church at large for each one who knows something to teach at least one who knows less. At the close of this appeal and amidst the enthusiasm of the brethren a woman, evidently an Aymara, shabbily dressed and with shrill voice, stood up and began to speak. She said, "Pastor, this is the first time I have ever entered this building; and it is the first time I have ever heard anyone make an appeal for the teaching of my people. Everyone has tried to dominate us and enslave us, but no one has ever before made any effort to raise us from our misery. I am for you!" And she sat down. May God indeed help us to set free this soul-bound, vice-saturated people!

Bible Schools

Each pastor is expected to carry on during the year special classes for the lay-members of the local congregations.

Besides these local Bible Classes there will be a special Bible Class or Institute of one month's duration especially for pastors and workers. Attendance at this Institute will be obligatory for all recognized workers and their expenses will be paid by their local congregations. It is hoped thus to raise the standard of workers in relation to the raised standards of the congregations through the above-mentioned program of instruction.

Aymara Translation and Revision of Gospels

Neither space nor time will permit me to enlarge upon this important work of the past year. A Committee, composed of eight members representing four missions engaged in the evangelization of the Aymaras, was appointed by the American Bible Society of New York. Mr. John Ritchie, A. B. S. representative for Ecuador, Peru and Bolivia, was the man to whom the Committee was directly responsible. Your field superintendent was asked to preside at the sessions of this Translation and Revision Committee. This came, not as a personal compliment but as a compliment to the whole mission. With the consent of the Missionary Council and the Board of Foreign Missions of Oregon Yearly Meeting, I separated myself to this very difficult task.

After five months of severe and exacting work the Committee finished its task of revising the Sr. Angel Medina Manuscripts of the four Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles. The Committee disbanded and the President of the Commission spent another month in getting the new Manuscripts in order and catalogued to send to the printer in New York. The criticisms of the language experts in New York have been on the whole very commendatory and favorable. At this writing we are in the stage of replying to the few criticisms of the experts. There will be some further cor-

respondence to satisfy these men that our work is faithful to the original Greek Text, and then the work will go to the printers for a trial edition.

In a day when the Scriptures have been translated into more than a thousand tongues and dialects, Oregon Yearly Meeting is to be congratulated on having had a part in such a work and in having four members of its staff participate in it.

Special tribute should be paid to Juan Ayllon without whose sacrifice, separation for many months from his family, richness of vocabulary and intimate knowledge of the Indian manner of expression and psychological reactions, his attention to exactness, harmony and adornment which have enriched the practical and literary value of the work, the Revision Committee must have fallen far short or failed of its purpose.

Now the work must be prayerfully committed to its divine Author, that it may find its field of labor and work its way into the heart of a once royal and noble people.

Dr. Geo. W. Ridout

This report would be incomplete without a reference to the ministry of Dr. Geo. W. Ridout, world-wide missionary evangelist. Many new believers have come into the church as a result of his ministry, but his particular contribution has been to the church. His burden has been two-fold—that the Church might be filled with the Spirit of God, and that there might be raised up a God-called native ministry. The church throughout the field has been stirred to a new high level in the spirit of sacrifice and evangelism. We thank God for the work of this man of God in our midst.

Dr. Ridout had charge of the morning holiness hour and the evening evangelistic services during the Conference. The other classes were ably filled by members of the staff of workers and missionaries.

Annual Conference

This year's conference was full of the promise of Jeremiah 33:3. The "great" and the "mighty" things. It was a conference of the greatest things in our history. We had the **greatest attendance** on record; the **greatest number of places** represented; the **greatest number of workers**; the **greatest number of places evangelized**; the **greatest number of evangelistic journeys**; the greatest number of Bibles and Testaments sold; the greatest number of Gospel Tracts distributed; the greatest seeking after God and Holiness; the greatest number of consecrated men and women; the greatest blessings and victories; and we have set before us the hopes of the greatest year just ahead. To God be the glory, and may each succeeding year see these things increased a hundred-fold, is our prayer.

The needs are a challenge to us as well as the great commission of Christ. We must not fail Him.

Esthel Gulley feels a definite concern to study a year at the Oregon Medical School in order to fit herself to carry on the medical work in Bolivia and asked for a year's leave of absence which was granted by the Board. Some of the members of the meeting, feeling that she should have financial support, voluntarily pledged \$121.00.

EDUCATION

87. J. Allen Dunbar presided at this meeting in the absence of the superintendent, Marita Smith. The annual statistical report was given and was accepted and will appear in the Appendix.

The Report of Greenleaf Academy for the year 1939-40 was given and accepted by the meeting.

Since its inception in 1908 the Greenleaf Academy has been vigilantly building christian character in the lives of young people until today it has become an integral part of the Friends Church. From this educational institution have come many preachers, evangelists, missionaries, and prominent business men.

The Academy has just completed one of its best years, showing advancement and improvements in several departments. The school year opened with a fine enrollment of 46 eager, whole-hearted students. During our fall revival with Frederick Baker we had the privilege of having him at the Academy for three services. If

The result of a meeting is to be judged by the number of seekers. I would say that God answered prayer in an unusual way. However, this year has been outstanding in that there has been a spiritual deepening among the students throughout the entire year. Out of a graduating class of eleven, we have two who definitely feel God's call to the ministry and a third who is planning for active christian service. During the year the school gave full emphasis to the students' religious life. The first fifteen minutes of every school day was devoted to a chapel service. Each class was opened with a word of prayer and one entire period each week was given over to boys' and girls' prayer meetings.

During the year there has been an increase in the physical equipment of the school. Approximately \$90.00 was spent for new library books with an increase of 90 volumes, \$30 for additional laboratory equipment, \$50.00 for the improvement of the gymnasium and additional physical education equipment.

The music and speech class represented the Academy in district competition, returning with high ratings and awards in their respective fields. Also the chorus was featured several times at the church on Sunday evenings.

After having taught one hundred and seventy-three days, the school year closed with the graduation of eleven fine young men and women. Thus we have added another leaf in the history of Greenleaf Academy and confidently and purposefully face the future, for it is in God we trust.

Again grateful acknowledgement is made of the blessing of God upon the work of Pacific College during the year just closed, and of the faithful service of many who have given cheerfully of time, energy, prayer, counsel and financial resources for the maintenance and advancement of the college.

Class honors, on the basis of scholarship and character for the four years of work in Pacific College, were awarded to Robert Sieloff, who had already received a graduate scholarship in Haverford College.

The Junior Prize, on the basis of character and scholarship during the Junior year only, was awarded to Janet Phipps.

The Wood-Mar plaque, given to the college by the class of 1935, to be awarded by each successive Senior class to that other class which in their judgment had been of greatest service to the college during the current year, was awarded to the class of 1943. This year's Senior class won the plaque last year.

The commencement address this year was given by Dr. Thompson Shannon, pastor of the First Christian Church of Portland. The closing address to the college Christian Associations was given by Paul Cammack, president of the Oregon Friends Christian Endeavor Union. As usual the president of the college preached the baccalaureate sermon. The commencement concert was given by Mordaunt A. Goodnough, interim professor of music during the absence of Earl Wagner, head of the music department, and Robert Hirtzel, who has been chosen to teach violin and direct the orchestra next year.

Material and Financial Advancement

Two outstanding advances have been made during the year, one in the way of improvements on the campus, the other in a substantial addition to the finances of the college for student aid.

The latter is in the form of a gift of \$25,000.00 from a donor whose identity the college authorities are not at liberty to divulge, the income of which is to be used "for the aid of worthy and needy students of Christian character who have successfully completed one year of work in Pacific College." The students who are to receive this aid are to be selected by the college board.

The outstanding improvement on the campus has been the remodeling and modernization of the dormitory for women. So complete has been the change here that there is little of the old building left except the framework and the foundation. A new roof

has been provided, new floors throughout, including concrete basement floor and oak floor for the enlarged living room, the building has been plastered throughout, new closets have been provided for every sleeping room, new plumbing and lighting has been installed throughout, a new heating system has been put in, the building has been repainted, the foundation stuccoed, new furniture has been purchased, and it is substantially a new building. This building improvement does not mean, however, that the project for the new brick dormitory for women has been abandoned. The Woman's Auxiliary to the college is still working on this larger project, and when it is completed it is expected that the present women's dormitory will be made available for men students.

In addition to the remodeling of the dormitory, considerable work was done on the gymnasium, new walks and drives were put in, and numerous other campus changes were made.

The total improvements on the campus, counting cash paid, material and labor contributed, etc., has amounted during the year to over \$8,000.00.

Roland Hayes Concert

The college faculty, with the cooperation of the board and a group of fifty sponsors, presented Roland Hayes in concert January 22nd in the new High School auditorium in Newberg, and he spoke at the college chapel that morning. The concert was a great success, both artistically and financially, and Roland Hayes will appear under Pacific College auspices in the Portland Civic Auditorium on the evening of January 23, 1941.

Faculty Changes

Earlier in the year it was confidently expected that all of the faculty of 1939-40 would be back for 1940-41, with the return of Emmett W. Gulley, who has spent the current year in the relief of German refugees in Cuba, and the addition of Robert Hirtzel to teach violin and direct the orchestra.

But in rapid succession near the close of the year came the resignation of Beulah S. Ramsay, who has been teaching French and Spanish the past year, and Emma Kendall, who has been head of the English department for the past six years, but who feels it her duty to return to Indiana to care for a sister who was severely injured in an accident recently; and a request for a year's leave of absence for Chase L. Conover, head of the department of psychology and education, who was chosen by the American Friends Service Committee to assume the position which Emmett W. Gulley has filled the past year.

To fill these vacancies Professor Russell W. Lewis has been called back to his former position as head of the English department and teacher of French; Alvin Allen has been chosen as acting professor of psychology and education for the ensuing year, during Chase L. Conover's leave of absence; and Lois Morrill has been appointed as an assistant in English and education.

In addition to these changes, as has already been mentioned, Robert Hirtzel has been selected to teach violin and direct the college orchestra.

Another change has been made by the college board in relieving President Levi T. Pennington from actual teaching work the coming year in order that he may be free for more work off the campus, and providing that he is to become president emeritus with the close of the next college year, the plan being to select a man for the active presidency to assume his duties in June, 1941.

Fiftieth Anniversary

The year 1941 will mark the fiftieth anniversary of Pacific College as a collegiate institution, though Friends Pacific Academy, out of which the college grew, was established in 1885. A committee of the college board and faculty has been chosen to make plans for this fiftieth anniversary, and it is hoped that the yearly meeting may cooperate in this observance.

Looking Forward

In view of present world conditions, which may make the maintenance of the small Christian college increasingly difficult, it is the firm conviction of thoughtful Christian educators that there has never been a time when it was more important to keep up and strengthen these educational institutions which have as their chief reason for existence the building of Christian character as well as culture, the advancement of the Kingdom of God rather than personal advancement, and the service of God and man rather than material profit.

It is the confident hope that Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting, Friends in other parts of America, and other friends of the college, will redouble their efforts to maintain and advance Pacific College during these difficult and dangerous but potentially fruitful days. May the future of the college, under God's blessing, be fuller of service than have any of the years of the past.

The Superintendent asks the privilege of incorporating the report from Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting when it comes. This request was granted and the report was accepted.

Rev. Meyer and Alice Tan Ditter from the Jewish Mission in Portland sang "What You Are."

Alice Tan Ditter spoke of God's blessing on their work. Meyer Tan Ditter told of their work in Portland, saying that within the last year they have contacted almost 5,000 of their people. He asked some pertinent questions. Are we honestly interested enough to give the Jews the gospel? Are we guilty of indifference?

A great number of the congregation promised to pray for the work the coming year.

96. S. B. Laughlin presented the following concern which was approved by the meeting:

1. That the records of the Monthly Meeting should be more carefully and accurately kept.

2. That vital statistics should be kept for every member. The Monthly Meeting records should show the date of birth of every member whether birth-right or taken in later. The records should also show the place of birth, name of parents, date of marriage, name of person married, date of death, date when associate member became active. Every name of the member should be spelled in full.

3. In other words, how and when a person comes into a Friends Meeting; how he leaves and important things that happen in the meantime.

97. The Executive Committee presented the following items which were approved by the meeting:

1. A committee appointed by the Executive Committee to consider plans for a suitable memorial for Chester A. Hadley proposed:

(a) That a building be erected in La Paz, Bolivia, for the headquarters of the foreign missionaries of Oregon Yearly Meeting. The building, as planned, shall contain the missionary living quarters, medical clinic, visiting missionary accommodations, the superintendent's office, and room for the printing plant.

(b) That suitable memorials be erected on each conference ground and at the Yearly Meeting House.

(c) The minimum need for the above memorials to be \$3000.00.

The Executive Committee approved the report of its sub-committee and requests the Yearly Meeting to grant the memorial committee the privilege of receiving an offering and pledges at the Sunday afternoon service of Yearly Meeting, and to solicit funds throughout Oregon Yearly Meeting for this purpose.

2. That the Yearly Meeting Treasurer, Richard Kneeland, be authorized to care for and sell disciplines. These may be obtained from him at the usual price, twenty-five cents each.

102. The Epistle Committee presented the epistle to go to the various Yearly Meetings and the one to Bolivia.

These were approved by the meeting. It was decided that epistles should be sent to the Friends in France and Germany although no epistles have been received from them this year.

103. The committee, consisting of Edgar P. Sims, Pearl Reece and Miller H. Porter, who were to have charge of a plan to contribute toward taking the Gospel to the Hebrew people, were united in recommending that during this year all persons who are interested in getting the Gospel to the Hebrew people could safely consider giving support to the Hebrew mission in Portland conducted by Meyer Tan Ditter.
