# Minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends 1941

1. It is with a feeling of thankfulness to our Heavenly Father that Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends convened in its forty-ninth session at Newberg, Oregon at 9:30 A. M., June 11, 1941.

2. After a period of silent devotion, Edwin McGrew asked God's blessing on the Yearly Meeting.

The Presiding Clerk, Edward Mott, brought a brief message, urging the meeting to have a living sense of the presence of the Head of the Church, our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Today there is more than ever a need of spiritual understanding. We should speak as the Spirit gives us utterance and should do all to the glory of God and for the advancement of His Kingdom.

The devotional period ended by singing, All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name.

3. It was suggested that the first action of the Yearly Meeting should be to send greetings to Milo C. Ross, our Reading Clerk, who is ill in the hospital.

This was approved by the Meeting and the clerks were to attend to this duty.

Walter P. Lee, the Assistant Clerk, was asked to serve as Reading Clerk for the morning session.

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends:

Report of the Committee appointed in March, 1941, to bring back a plan for meeting the conscientious objector problem in Portland Quarterly Meeting:

In order to meet this problem in our own Quarterly Meeting and throughout the Yearly Meeting, we suggest that the following recommendations be forwarded to the Yearly Meeting:

1. That the Yearly Meeting set up a new committee, to be known as the Oregon Yearly Meeting Service Committee, composed of representatives from each of the Quarterly Meetings.

2. That this committee be empowered to carry on its own program for financing the proper care of the Oregon Yearly Meeting Conscientious Objectors.

3. That, for the purpose of participation in the placing of our conscientious objectors, the committee affiliate itself with the Civilian Public Service Section of the American Friends Service Committee, and appoint a representative thereon.

4. That the committee cooperate in every needful and helpful way with the other peace churches in the establishment and operation of a camp or camps for conscientious objectors in the Northwest.

It is further proposed that we request the Yearly Meeting, if these recommendations are adopted, to refer them to the representatives for action looking toward the immediate formation of a functioning Service Committee, i. e., that they be asked to bring forward a plan for the number and method of choice of its members, with nominations for a full committee to begin action at once.

3. To propose funds to be raised for church work, and to nominate a Friend to serve as Treasurer for the ensuing year.

4. To propose the name of one person in each Quarterly Meeting to receive and distribute documents.

5. To propose names of persons to serve on the Printing Committee.

\*To be appointed according to disciplinary change made last year.

15. The Meeting stood and sang: "I Know whom I have Believed."

Carl Byrd then brought the inspirational message from Philippians, 1:9-11, according to the Moffat Translation, basing his message on the verse: "And it is my prayer that your love may be more and more rich in knowledge and in all manner of insight." His prayer was that Oregon Yearly Meeting might know the will of God and might be enabled to have a sense of what is vital.

The Meeting adjourned to meet at two o'clock.

22. The proposition from Portland Quarterly Meeting in regard to reports on the state of society was read as follows:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends:

Portland Quarterly Meeting submits to the Yearly Meeting at large the following matter relative to the reports on State of Society for your consideration.

"The procedure of the reports as stated in the Discipline issued in 1934, page 66, provides for two written reports based on the queries. One on the queries pertaining to the meeting at large, and the other on the queries addressed to the Meeting on Ministry and Oversight. Thus the two reports cover much the same matters.

The procedure as stated in the discipline issued in 1924 and in 1911, together with a Yearly Meeting ruling that appears in the Minutes for 1912, page 47, provide that the report on the meeting at large prepared by the Overseers cover matters of greater interest to the church and the activities of the members."

We recommend that the Yearly Meeting consider this matter with the suggestion that the procedure be readopted or revised as the Yearly Meeting may deem necessary, in order that our reports may reflect the larger interests of the church.

### CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

26. Edgar P. Sims, Superintendent of this Department, gave the following report:

An increased interest in spiritual things brought an increased interest in tithing, reports one meeting; while another reports an increase of 35% in finances during their TITHING MONTH; and three others report a gain of 20% during their TITHING MONTH. And the past year has witnessed the reorganization of TWO Storehouse Leagues, and ONE of them, with a membership of 107. That is a real achievement in the things of the Kingdom of God. Special messages, special programs and other methods were reported used to present the subject of Christian Stewardship.

In September this Department sent a letter to each of the Quarterly Meeting Superintendents suggesting they urge the various meetings to bring before its membership, First, INFORMATION on Christian Stewardship, by having the Pastor, or some other competent person present a message setting forth: (a) Our Individual Responsibility to God. (b) The Biblical Proof Concerning the TITHE, And, Second, INSPIRATION by following up the message with the personal testimonies of those who have experienced

in their own lives, the blessing received in Systematic Tithing; and make their witness a definite contribution to the Kingdom of God.

In October we sent out a total of thirty-five letters, to Pastors Quarterly Meeting Superintendents and Outpost Workers, designating the Month of November as TITHING MONTH, and suggesting ALL THE TITHE be brought into the church treasury. This was done in accord with an action taken by the Minister's Conference held at Twin Rocks in October.

In January another letter was sent to each Quarterly Meeting Superintendent, giving information where literature on Christian Stewardship might be secured FREE, enough for each family in the local meeting. Those tracts came in sets of three, and contained splendid material. It was suggested they convey this information to the local chairman. Again in March a communication was sent with blanks enclosed for the annual reports. In all seventy-eight blanks were sent out with instructions for making them out, and asking for information whereby we hoped to give as complete a report as possible to this Yearly Meeting.

If Oregon Yearly Meeting is to really make this Department FUNCTION as it should, there ought to be chosen as the Superintendent, one who can give some time to the work and go into the field and make personal contacts with the Quarterly Meeting Superintendents, and if possible the local chairman, committees and the membership; to bring INFORMATION and INSPIRATION on this vital subject. And nothing can be profitably substituted for the Scriptures of Truth to bring this INFORMATION and INSPIRATION, when presented by a soul fully convinced and under the anointing of the Spirit of God. And some plan should be instituted whereby the one doing this work, may at least, have the traveling expenses met. No amount of attempts at doing this work by correspondence is efficient. It just, will not FUNCTION as it should, by the correspondence method, any more than could the Foreign Missionary or Evangelistic Boards do their work by the correspondence method.

Which shall it be, Really FUNCTION, or just DRIFT?

Giving encourages one to become trustworthy and dependable. Faithful stewardship proves the reality of the Christ that we serve. If we believe that all we have comes from God then we ought to give Him what rightfully belongs to Him.

Meyer and Alice Tan Ditter sang another duet, "Where They Never Say Good-bye."

### LITERATURE

28. Because the Superintendent of Literature, Grace



Hadley, was absent, Kenneth Eichenberger presented the Literature report as follows:

Among activities reported, of interest to note are: 425 copies "Truth for Students" booklets distributed, one to every student in Camas, Washington high school.

Cards and letters have been written by some approving or disapproving certain types of literature as the case may be. Scripture memory contests have been promoted among children and young people as well as Bible reading on the part of all. Reading contests have been promoted in many meetings with varying results. One Quarterly Meeting reports twelve sermons, five talks and one dramatization given.

The Friendly Endeavor has total circulation of 1200 copies per month. Figures given above for "Friends papers taken" are therefore incomplete and no doubt include some other papers taken, but reports were not received from all Meetings.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HEBREW WORK

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends:

Your Committee on Hebrew Work made a preliminary report in Minute 103 of last Yearly Meeting. In that report we recommended support of the Portland Hebrew Mission, and stated "a more complete report is to be given next year at Yearly Meeting time."

As we have considered the problem of getting the need of this work before the membership of the Yearly Meeting, we found ourselves facing the fact that we had no representatives in the local meetings with whom we could confer, so we then received permission from the Superintendent of the Home Missionary Department to contact the local chairman of that work, and it is through this channel we have attempted to present the needs of this field.

Thirty-eight letters were sent out by your committee setting forth the needs of this work and the responsibility of the church

in the light of Scriptural teaching. And there was the same number of letters sent out by the Portland Hebrew Mission, at the request of your committee, which also gave information concerning the needy field in Portland. And we urged the local chairman to get this information before the membership through the Pastor or some other person presenting the needs before the local meeting, and if possible to take an offering for the work, and recommending the Portland Hebrew Mission as worthy of support.

No direct response has been received by your committee, but we know that one local meeting contributes five dollars per month to the Portland Hebrew Mission and another meeting gave nearly fifty dollars to the same field.

As this type of work is new to our membership, and what we have attempted to do is but a beginning, we believe by continuing this work we are in line with our Lord's command to "preach the Gospel to every creature," and that we may expect His blessing on our labors as we go forward giving information and praying for inspiration.

Therefore this committee believes we should, for the best interests of Oregon Yearly Meeting, as well as the great need of getting the Gospel message to the Hebrew people, keep this vital matter before our membership. And we recommend that this duty be given over to the Home Missionary Department of the Yearly Meeting; and that they be urged to present the needs of this work as fully as they are able; and that a place be given on their annual report blanks where money received for spreading the Gospel in this field may be properly reported to the Yearly Meeting.

### PUBLIC MORALS

37. The Superintendent of the Public Morals Department, Harold P. Mills, read the report which was acceptably received by the meeting and appears below:

Due perhaps, to a typographical error a report from one of the Quarterly Meetings stated that "One member hobbled for dry legislation at the last session of the Legislature." Possibly if more people would "hobby" at activities intended to produce reformation in public morals more would be accomplished because people usually work enthusiastically at their hobbies.

That many of our members have been working energetically in this field is shown by the following report:

All Monthly Meetings that reported stated that their Sunday Schools have special talks or features on Temperance Sundays. One Sunday School has such features every month.

Many of the women of Oregon Yearly Meeting are active members of the W. C. T. U. and several direct Loyal Temperance Legion work. The young people of one of our Salem churches have joined with the young people of seven other churches of the city in a Youth Temperance Council and are reported to be doing a good work. The Superintendent of this department for Salem Quarterly Meeting spoke briefly at a hearing before the Governor on the Wine Bill passed by the legislature. Several of the members of Tacoma Monthly Meeting have worked with the city vice committee in trying to improve moral conditions in the city by securing better law enforcement.

Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting has been actively engaged in making a canvass to put dry measures on the ballot for the election of last November, in alcohol education, in helping the state P. T. A. promote poster and essay contests on the evils of alcohol and narcotics, and wrote seventeen letters to Congress urging the support of the Sheppard Bill.

Two Monthly Meetings in Newberg Quarterly Meeting report having given plays in their own meetings and also in other places.

In the report from Portland Quarterly Meeting is this statement, "The truth about the liquor traffic is not to be found in the daily papers." Then follows an appeal to our members to subscribe for and read "The National Voice," published in Los Angeles by Miss Ethel Hubler.

Many local chairmen have asked for tracts and other literature for distribution and several asked that the head of this department or other speakers be sent to them. Unfortunately the funds available to this department are not sufficient to make compliance with this request possible. There is, however, a small, free, lending library of books, booklets, and plays, available to any member of Oregon Yearly Meeting, the only cost to the borrower being



the return postage. Most of these books were listed and described in the April, 1941 issue of the Friendly Endeavor.

During the past year your superintendent has given several illustrated lectures on the subject: "Alcohol—what it is, what it does, and how it does it." One of these was in one of our own Monthly Meetings and the others were in churches of other denominations.

Your Superintendent again uses this means of expressing his thanks and appreciation to all who have in any way assisted in the work of this department during the year.

The superintendent urged the members to support Bill 2475 by writing to their senators and representatives.

Gervas A. Carey, pastor of the Newberg Friends church, spoke for this department. He based most of his remarks on the book, "The Amazing Story of Repeal," written by Fletcher Dobyns. He said that no one can intelligently approach the subject of temperance unless he has read this book. This book helps to keep one alert to the propaganda that the liquor interest is using.

38. The congregation sang, "Am I A Soldier of the Cross," as the opening for the inspirational hour.

Carl Byrd brought the message from the text, "Wist ye not that I must be about our Father's business?" He emphasized the importance of preparation for participation. There should be a must in our hearts, a divine urge for His service.

45. The following report, submitted by the Administrative Committee was accepted:

The Administrative Committee was appointed by the Executive Committee of Oregon Yearly Meeting to carry on the work of the General Superintendent. This Committee has earnestly endeavored to faithfully fulfill the mission assigned to it. In the division of the responsibilities of the Committee, it seemed best for Clark Smith, President of the Missionary Board, to care for the mission program of the Yearly Meeting; for Richard Kneeland, our Yearly Meeting treasurer, to have general oversight of the Yearly Meeting finances; and for Joseph Reece, President of the Evangelistic and Church Extension Board, to be responsible for the Yearly Meeting program at home.

Many conferences were held as occasion demanded, and as the reports of the different boards and departments are presented you will find in fuller detail something of the activities of the Administrative Committee.

Clark Smith and Joseph Reece have carried on as much of the Yearly Meeting work as possible in connection with their pastoral duties. We feel that the churches at Lents and Sunnyside have been very generous in allowing their pastors to give so much of their time to Yearly Meeting Work.

#### EVANGELISTIC AND CHURCH EXTENSION

To Oregon Yearly Meeting:

Although we have gone through this year without the services of a general superintendent, we feel that through the untiring efforts of our Quarterly Meeting superintendents we can report advances along most lines. These Quarterly Meeting superintendents have given generously of their time in oversight of their respective fields, and to them must go whatever rewards are due for success. As we have had opportunity we have attended the different Quarterly Meetings. In nearly every instance we have received the impression that our Quarterly Meetings are earnestly carrying out the Divine commission of "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." (Mark 16:15)

We rejoice in the faithfulness of the ministry in the pew as well as in the pulpit, and as a result many have found Christ in forgiveness, sanctification, and renewal. May this passion for the lost be increased for the coming year.

We are happy to report that the membership of Oregon Yearly Meeting is increasing in spite of the revision of membership rolls.

Most of our meetings have had special revivals and in most instances our own pastors or evangelists were used. In the evangelistic field we have been ably represented by Hubert Mardock, Denver Headrick, Edward Mott, and Clio Brown. The Lord has richly blessed these men as they have proclaimed the Gospel.

#### Pastoral Changes

It is gratifying to report that there are to be few pastoral changes this year. The latest information indicates that there will be changes at Chehalem Center, Prune Hill, Ontario Heights, and Rose Valley. We pray that care will be exercised to truly find the Lord's will in the selection of Pastors for these places.

Several of our meetings are increasing the usefulness and attractiveness of their meeting houses. Rosemere has finished the basement at their church. Middleton has built a new basement and also remodeled the auditorium. Scotts Mills is in the process of digging their basement. Homedale recently enlarged their basement to care for the increase in Sunday School attendance. Nampa has



put on a new roof, redecorated the interior, and put in new electrical fixtures. Piedmont has redecorated and put in beautiful new benches. Lents also completed their remodeling project.

#### New Buildings

A new meeting house was built at Ridgeview, Oregon and dedication services were held April 27th. A portable structure was built.

If a strong meeting is established a permanent building will be erected and the portable structure will be moved to a new field. At Woodland a beautiful new meeting house has about reached completion. At Camas they are in the process of building a parsonage. All these new projects indicate something of the stirring in our meetings to reach out and touch the communities for God.

#### New Monthly Meeting

It is a source of much joy to report the establishment of a new Monthly Meeting at West Chehalem where Edward Harmon has been serving for the past year. We give a most cordial welcome to this new point and trust that this will mean much to the increased usefulness of our Yearly Meeting at home and abroad.

By this time all of us are acquainted with the establishment of a Monthly Meeting at Homedale. How our hearts rejoice to hear the splendid reports coming from this place. They are surely challenging our older meeting to be moving or they will pass us in achievement.

57. The State of Society in the various Quarterly Meetings was read; a summary of which appears below:

#### Summary of State of Society

All meetings for worship and the transaction of business are duly held and fairly well attended. One Quarterly Meeting regrets that some of their members are not as regular in attendance as could be wished, especially at the evening services. The cares of life and the attractions of the world seem more important to some.

The spirit of the membership seems very good and when differences arise, endeavor is made to end them speedily. Care is taken for the reputation of others, according to most of the reports, but some are not as careful of the reputation of others as would be best.

One Meeting reports that a few families fail to have the family altar but for the most part Friends are careful to have daily Bible reading and prayer. Those who have children under their care endeavor to train them for upright and useful lives and encourage them to read the Holy Scriptures. One Meeting reports the estab-



lishment of a Junior Church which has proved very helpful to the children.

The Meetings report that members abstain from the use or sale of intoxicating liquors but a few report that there are a few who use tobacco. Some say that they regret that some of their members are not careful to abstain from places of worldly amusements which do not contribute to Christian growth and character.

The majority of our Members are careful to inspect and settle their accounts; just in their dealings; and endeavor to live within their income; but some are not as careful in this regard as would be best.

Members are careful to provide suitable education for their children and guard them against hurtful reading in the majority of the homes.

Diligent effort is made to acquaint the members of the Meeting with the needs of the world and members pray and give systematically to those laboring to extend Christ's kingdom. Outpost work claims the attention of a number of meetings.

All Meetings are careful in the appointment of officers, Missionaries, Sunday School teachers, calling of pastors and evangelists to see that they are in harmony with the fundamental principles of Friends as stated in our discipline.

58. The statistical report was read and will appear in the Appendix.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the statistician, Loyde Osburn, for his efficient work.

59. The Board for Aged Ministers and Missionaries—Edward Harmon, the President of the Board, read the following report:

The Board has been actively engaged throughout the year in enlargement of our previous plans. We have submitted the following plan to the Ministerial Association and it has their approval:

#### A PLAN OF ADMINISTRATION FOR THE BOARD FOR AGED MINISTERS AND MISSIONARIES

The work of the Board for Aged Ministers and Missionaries is administered in two departments: The Aged Ministers Aid Fund, and the Ministers' Retirement Fund. Of all undesignated miscellaneous moneys received by the Board approximately 50% are allocated to each department, as the Board determines from year to year. When sums are received which justify investment for endowment purposes, the Board, at its discretion, may so direct. Earnings from endowment are allocated as above. Payments are made to aged ministers and missionaries according to the following plan:

##### The Aged Ministers Aid Fund

Art. 1. Assistance is administered from the Fund upon application to the Board and approval by it to aged ministers and missionaries, or to their widows, who are members of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Art. 2. To receive such aid the applicant (or her deceased husband if she be the widow of one entitled to it) must have been in active pastoral, missionary, or evangelistic service in Oregon Yearly Meeting for not less than ten years, his latest service having been rendered in this Yearly Meeting. He (or his widow) must give evidence of actual need, due to incapacity for remunerative em-

ployment, to the lack of sufficient invested or deposited funds, and to the inability of relatives or others to provide complete care. Applications from women ministers are considered on the same basis as those filed by men.

Art. 3. Each application is considered carefully by the Board on its own merits, with the type and value of the service rendered to the Yearly Meeting, and the nature of the financial situation of the applicant, taken fully into account.

Art. 4. Nothing in these articles shall be so construed as to prevent the award of aid from this fund to one who has received a benefit from the Ministers Retirement Fund, when the Board may find itself justified in allowing such a claim.

##### The Ministers Retirement Fund

Art. 1. The Ministers Retirement Fund is an organization set up by the Board for Aged Ministers and Missionaries. Its members are those ministers and missionaries in active service in Oregon Yearly Meeting who meet the qualifications and fulfill the conditions of membership as hereinafter set forth.

Art. 2. The interests of this Fund are administered by a Friend who acts in the capacity of Executive Secretary, whose office is subject to the following regulations: He shall be appointed by the Board, to serve until his successor shall have been selected and inducted into office. He shall serve without compensation, but shall receive from the Yearly Meeting an annual allowance for administrative expense. He shall promote the interests of the Fund, both by securing and maintaining memberships and by obtaining funds through gifts and bequest. He shall be ex-officio member of the Board and of its executive committee, and shall be answerable to the Board for the proper conduct of his office.

Art. 3. Any Minister or Missionary who is in active service within the jurisdiction of Oregon Yearly Meeting or of its constituent meetings, and is on salary under any of its churches, board, or departments, is eligible to membership in the Fund. The term "minister" applies to any person who has been regularly recorded by the Friends Church, and who still retains that recognition. The term "Missionary" applies to any person, whether a recorded minister or not, who is engaged in religious work in the home or foreign field under the direction of the Evangelistic Board or of the Missionary Board of the Yearly Meeting.

Art. 4. Applications for membership may be received by the Board at any regular, adjourned, or duly called meeting. The applicant shall state his qualifications and shall agree to pay to the Yearly Meeting treasurer quarterly during the year, as membership dues for the previous quarter, an amount equal to one dollar per month or to one per cent of his stated salary. Membership is subject to renewal year by year, the privilege of renewal being contingent on the full payment of dues for the previous year. The fiscal year dates from September 1; after a grace period of thirty days, renewals for the current year may not be accepted. Membership which is allowed to lapse may be resumed at the beginning of any year thereafter, if the applicant is still eligible, but the full privileges of membership shall not be awarded at retirement for any year whose dues are not paid in full at the time of renewal.

Art. 5. A member may apply for a retirement benefit at any annual meeting of the Board, and his claim may be allowed when the Board, upon careful inquiry, is satisfied that the applicant is incapacitated, either by age or by disability, for further remunerative employment.



Art. 6. Applications for retirement benefit may be filed by former members still in Oregon Yearly Meeting who have not been eligible, or who have not taken advantage of membership in the Fund during the year previous to such application, provided that the lapsed membership shall not then have been of more than five years' duration.

Art. 7. Members who leave Oregon Yearly Meeting for employment under another Yearly Meeting or another religious body, or who become permanently ineligible for membership for any reason whatsoever except age or disability, may upon application receive all money paid in by them as dues, but no more. Their years of membership will be eliminated from all calculations of retirement benefits for other members.

Art. 8. In case of the death of a member, or of a former member who would be entitled to a retirement benefit under the terms of article 6, the full benefit will be paid at once to his widow. If there be no widow surviving, or if the descendant be a woman minister, the full amount of paid membership dues will be paid to the estate of the deceased members.

Art. 9. When an application for a retirement benefit has been honored by the Board, the applicant will receive his full benefit from the treasurer, in a lump sum or otherwise as he may elect. This benefit will be an amount equal to the sum of all his paid membership dues plus an amount from the general retirement fund which is determined as follows: the total amount, exclusive of membership dues, which to that date has been allocated to this Fund (but deducting sums already paid to retiring members) is divided by the total number of years of membership of all members (except those of members already retired) to that date, and this figure is multiplied by the number of years of membership of the retiring member. This amount is counted as his proportional share of the receipts of the Fund during the time of his membership.

Art. 10. All dues paid by members are considered as savings on deposit. Nothing in these Articles shall be so construed as to authorize the Board to refuse to refund them on request, with the understanding that the refund of dues, unless same are later replaced, deprives the member of all advantages of membership for the period covered by them.

We are happy to have been able to give \$10.00 a month to Marietta Cope, whose life continues to be a blessing to us all.

The report was satisfactory to the meeting.

61. The Evangelistic and Church Extension Board made the following recommendations:

The Evangelistic and Church Extension Board in considering

the advisability of building a parsonage for our General Superintendent on the Yearly Meeting property, felt that this should be presented to the Yearly Meeting as a project to be undertaken soon.

The following minute presents the matter:

"The recommendation of the Executive Committee of the Evangelistic and Church Extension Board that a parsonage be built on the grounds of the Yearly Meeting, was favored. It was decided that this matter as a project should be presented to the Yearly Meeting sessions."

Taken from the Minutes of the Evangelistic and Church Extension Board held April 25, 1941.

This matter was referred to the Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting with the recommendation that it should receive their immediate attention and that the building of a parsonage for our General Superintendent should be undertaken as soon as seemed advisable.

62. Joseph G. Reece accepted the office of General Superintendent and the Yearly Meeting pledged him their support by a rising vote.

63. The following request was received and favored by the Yearly Meeting:

The Evangelistic and Church Extension Board requests that they be granted the privilege of jointly borrowing with the Missionary Board during the year up to \$1000.00 if the occasion should arise.

64. Walter P. Lee announced a National Day of Prayer for Monday, June 16th, and urged the members of the Yearly Meeting to observe this day.

65. The Superintendent of Peace, Levi T. Pennington made his annual report as follows:

#### REPORT OF PEACE SUPERINTENDENT 1941

What can a Christian pacifist do in a world that is war mad?

This is the question which has engaged the attention of the Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting throughout the year. And the answer has been chiefly along two lines as it concerns us, and two lines also as it concerns others.

For ourselves, we are concerned first that we shall maintain our peace testimony before the world, and not appear, by any change of attitude, to believe that truth changes with changing conditions.

For most of us this has thus far been relatively easy. We can still affirm our belief in the power of understanding and justice and love. We can still insist that for us war is wrong, and we cannot engage in it.

But while this is relatively easy for most of us, for young men of draft age it is not so easy. They must make a decision personally which may cost them something. Their stand as conscientious



objectors makes other efforts to maintain our peace testimony look a bit formal and academic.

One of our members, whose conscience would not permit him to register for the draft, has been for nearly six months now in a federal prison camp. It is hoped that he may soon be paroled, but it is evident that this will be to the civilian public service camp at San Dimas rather than to his work as a teacher on the Pacific College faculty.

The second concern as it relates to our own membership is the care of those who do stand firmly by their Christian and Quaker convictions against war and war preparations, and who at best are assigned to Civilian Public Service camps. In addition to the moral and spiritual support of such as these, there is the problem of their financial support when they take up their work in camp.

In our relationship to others, our task has again been twofold.

First, we have sought to promote peace by helping to keep the United States out of war, not merely that we might save ourselves, but that America might be in position to aid in the restoration of peace. To this end we have sought to influence our representatives in Washington, from the president down, by resolutions, petitions, and personal communications.

Our second concern has been to care for the victims of war. Last year one of our members was on leave of absence from Pacific college faculty in the work of caring for German war refugees in Cuba, after spending half a year in war relief in Spain. During the year just closed another of our members has been in this Cuban work, and has been given leave of absence for yet another year from his duties at Pacific College for other work under the American Friends Service Committee. Clothes for Shanghai have been collected in different parts of the Yearly Meeting, and other efforts have been made to alleviate the suffering that war has caused. One of our members is on the national committee for the relief of the European democracies, of which Herbert Hoover, another member of this Yearly Meeting, is honorary chairman and the most notable worker.

Three of our young men, one from the Pacific College faculty, are leaving this afternoon for the relief of the suffering caused by the recent earthquake in Mexico. These are Richard Binford, George Thomas and Harvie McCaffree.

Some of these activities are in the field of the newly selected service committee, which will naturally handle them in the future.

In work of this kind it is difficult to collect statistics. In some cases a quarterly meeting will report less work in a given line than a single individual member of that meeting has done.

Here are the figures as shown in the report:

Most of the committee met at the beginning of the year to plan their work.

There were 31 special meetings held in the interests of peace, mass meetings, discussion groups, regular meetings in charge of peace committees, meetings to hear reports of peace conferences, etc.

There were 67 peace sermons and addresses during the year, with the Quaker peace teaching given many times in Sunday schools, in sermons, in connection with other teaching, etc.

Three quarterly meetings report 5,645 pages of peace literature distributed. This is in addition to many letters on the subject—one peace superintendent alone sent out 86 letters to members of the meeting of draft age.

Among the peace periodicals taken by our members, mention

was made of the American Friend, Peace Action, the Messenger of Peace, Fellowship. Only one quarterly meeting reported the number of subscriptions, 16.

Three quarterly meetings report \$63.15 raised to carry on the peace work of the meetings. This is in addition to the \$10.00 appropriated by the Yearly Meeting and much more than that spent by the peace superintendent and others who made no report of their expenditures.

It is reported that none of our members are engaged in military service, except one associate member.

In the matter of communications to government officials, statistics are hard to obtain. One meeting sent 58 copies of our discipline to draft boards, that they might have official knowledge of our peace position. One quarterly meeting reports six communications from meetings and 500 from individuals. Another quarterly meeting reports "many."

Young men of draft age were reported from three quarterly meetings. One made no report, another stated that this information had been sent, but failed to state to whom it was sent.

Two quarterly meetings report 32 signed as conscientious objectors. No report from the other quarterly meetings.

Little has as yet been done, certainly nothing on a sufficiently large scale, to provide financially for our conscientious objectors who may be assigned to civilian public service camps. This will be one of the tasks of the newly appointed service committee.

One quarterly meeting report included a very clear and helpful statement of the situation as it confronts conscientious objectors, and of their duties and privileges under existing laws. The quarterly meeting superintendent in this quarterly meeting, and others concerning whom no report was made, as none was asked for, have written numerous and telling articles for various newspapers.

Advisory boards have been formed, some among Friends alone and others in connection with the other historic peace churches and other peace organizations, for the counselling of conscientious objectors.

Among the other reports and suggestions are the following:

"Pray, and then work in harmony with our prayers. National days of prayer for peace cannot avail very much, if all our energy is spent for war."

"Our youth should be taught Friends' methods of dealing, which is Christ's method."

"To seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, praying much that God's will be done in each of us, in these days that are ahead. That we be careful to uphold the peace testimony of our church, realizing at all times the right of the individual to follow the dictates of his or her conscience—But keeping in mind what our church discipline has to say on peace, being careful at all times when giving advice or counsel to others that we do not hinder the will of the spirit—And that we become a more united people in our testimony of peace."

"The education of the growing boys—age 12 to draft age—on Quaker peace principles."

With the hope that the Peace committee and the Service committee may cooperatively handle adequately the educational and practical peace testimony of Oregon Yearly Meeting, this report is respectfully submitted.

Raymond Wilson, assistant secretary of the Peace Section of the American Friends' Service Committee gave an address on the subject: "Some Opportunities for our Quaker Peace Testimony Today." In this he mentioned the facts that Friends should extend a healing, helping hand to a suffering, war-torn world; should work for the termination of the war and a negotiated peace; should stand behind the conscientious objectors and others who are making a strong peace testimony; should maintain civil liberties and democratic rights and help plan for world reconstruction.

66. The song, "How Firm a Foundation" was sung and Carl Byrd brought the message from Psalms 46:10—Be still and know that I am God. We need to be still until we know God and then we should go and do his will.

67. The Meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 o'clock.

M.

Upon due consideration, Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting is in harmony with the desire of the petitioners and requests that Oregon Yearly Meeting act accordingly.

The report of this department was given by Clark Smith, President of the Board of Foreign Missions:

A report of the president of the Missionary Board in conjunction with the Administrative Committee has traveled approximately 4,000 miles. The work has necessitated the writing of eighty letters and 565 pages of mimeographed material.

Most of the meetings of the Yearly Meeting have been visited in company with the missionaries on furlough, Howard and Julia Pearson. A full account of these trips will appear in the report of the Pearsons.

Contacts with the people of Yearly Meeting have convinced us

of the fact that any vital need brought to the knowledge of the Yearly Meeting will be met.

The Missionary Board of the Yearly Meeting the past year has but one aim—that of keeping step with the leading of the Lord. Failures that have come about have been because of human inability to know the whole plan of God. Any success has been due to the overruling providences of the Lord.

It has been a real privilege to be associated with the people of the Yearly Meeting in this, our great work. Their loyalty, spiritual vision, and readiness to respond to the leading of the Spirit in meeting the needs of the Yearly Meeting have been truly inspiring.

Field activities at home and in Bolivia are listed in the reports of the various missionaries.

Clouds around us are dark: skies are lowering: but with David we say "What time I am afraid, I will trust in Thee."

The attached statistical report indicates a willingness on the part of the Yearly Meeting to go forward in giving answer to the question, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?"

#### ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FIELD SUPERINTENDENT—BOLIVIA, 1940-1941

In my report for last year I made reference to the promise of the Lord in Isaiah 54:2-5. The promise is still in force and in process of fulfillment. In this promise the words which stand out in our hearts are the verbs. The principal verbs of the portion are as follows: "Enlarge . . . stretch forth . . . spare not . . . lengthen . . . strengthen . . . break forth . . . inherit . . . inhabit . . . fear not . . . not ashamed."

These are strong words, and they have to do with the work of this Mission. These are words which express activity, growth, faith. It was urgent that the Lord speak to us with energetic words for He knew what the year was to hold for us. Together with many great blessings, we have this year been obliged to pass through the darkest of valleys, the greatest of trials. But a short time after mailing last year's report we received the word of the death of our General Superintendent, Chester A. Hadley. Surely this did not look like a time to enlarge either the place of our "tent" nor the "tent" itself.

Nevertheless, the field has grown as the statistical report will show, and a fine Mission Home is nearing completion. Every earnest effort has been made to make this building a worthy memorial to the man Chester A. Hadley. For many years, if the Lord tarry, it will stand as a tribute to the esteem in which two races of believers in Christ held this man who was willing to spend and be spent for the kingdom of Christ.

At the time of the writing of this report the second story of the Chester A. Hadley Memorial Building is habitable. The first story is still unfinished, and likewise the outside of the building. There is as yet no water or sanitary service in the house. It is our hope that six or eight weeks may see the completion of the work, and that the dedication service may be held during the month of June.

Funds for the Memorial Building have come in regularly and most satisfactorily. The exchange here in Bolivia has been favorable and prices of building materials relatively low. We cannot know certainly at this moment just how the finances will turn out but we believe God, that it shall be as we have asked of Him, "That it may be enough to finish the building, and thus be a credit to the one whom we have sought to honor."

During the course of the year, Howard, Julia and Donald Pearson have returned to the homeland on furlough and Helen Cammack has taken over the station in Corocoro during their absence. Carroll and Doris Tamplin continue in La Paz in charge of the construction work. The Ayllons have taken full charge of the La Paz district. The other outposts remain as in the report for 1939-1940, as to pastorates.

In addition to the building program there has been considerable supplementary work to be done on the Revised Aymara Gospels and Acts. At present the printer's "proofs" of St. Matthew and St. Mark have been corrected and returned to the American Bible Society in New York. Luke, John and Acts are in process of proof-

reading and will be returned to New York shortly for printing. A first edition of ten thousand copies is expected on hand shortly after proof-reading.

The Aymara and Spanish Primers, prepared by Helen Cammack for use in Mission schools, have proven their worth and the First Primer in Spanish is undergoing revision and second edition at this time. A wider sale and use of these books is expected from year to year. Also the Spanish and Aymara Hymn Book, published by the Mission, has found a wide circulation being used by the other Friends Missions in Bolivia, the Salvation Army, the Lutherans and by the Irish Baptists in Peru.

The little Mission paper, the Soul-Cry of the Aymara, has been very irregular due to the lack of personnel and type.

During the month of July, 1940, special Bible classes were held for the Indian workers, with a good attendance. The workers were enthusiastic about the classes and insisted on a continuance of them during July of this present year. Out greatest need is to be found undoubtedly in this field of labor—the preparation of the workers, but the small staff, poor equipment and the poverty of the candidates are obstacles to be overcome.

The Annual Conference of 1941 was the largest yet on record. The room was filled and we looked about to see on what side we might enlarge our "place" and our "tent." To make way for the conference it was necessary for the missionaries to move out of the church basement into the unfinished second story of the Memorial Building. The workmen worked early and late with a will to work, so as to make this move possible. Because of growing problems in connection with the growing attendance at Conferences, greater care and formality was exercised this year in the proper registration of representatives from the out stations. A registration book was kept and meal tickets were issued. Lodging and meals were given free for the five days of conference to 103 guests. The cooks had official appointments from the La Paz Monthly Meeting. Helpers, table-servers and caretakers were appointed by the La Paz congregation and Juan Ayllon took charge of this phase of the Conference. The local congregation carried nearly the full expense of the meals this year. The missionaries were duly thankful for this "lift." The classes and messages were filled with the power of the Spirit and the altars filled again and again with hungry seekers. The spiritual levels seemed higher than in former years.

Howard Pearson gave a challenging message on the problems, opportunities, outlook and responsibilities of our Missionary Field. He said nearly a thousand people were reached weekly with the Gospel. The farms, the mines, the lake region, the large cities are all regions that present a great challenge to the missionaries and through them to the Yearly Meeting. Missionaries are needed who can live the Gospel which they preach and who know how to pray.

The Pacific College trio, consisting of Marguerite Barney, Elenita Mardock and Kathleen Smith sang, "Go Forward."

Julia Pearson gave a vivid picture of the great supper to which the Lord invited the maimed, the halt and blind because those who were first invited did not come. She pictured the humble Bolivian brethren responding to the

invitation which has been rejected by so many in this country.

The names of the members of the Missionary Board were presented to the meeting and approved. They will appear in the Appendix.

Because of the resignation of Mary Cammack, Salem Quarterly Meeting recommends the appointment of Lesta Bates to serve on the Board for two years to fill Mary Cammack's unexpired term.

This was satisfactory to the Meeting.

Mary Cammack has served faithfully on the Missionary Board of Oregon Yearly Meeting for many years. That missionary work has been a very vital part of her life is shown by the fact that she has given two daughters to this great work and has inspired those around her with missionary zeal. It is with a feeling of great reluctance and yet with a feeling of great appreciation that the Yearly Meeting releases her from this work on the Missionary Board.

### EDUCATION

88. Dilla Tucker, the Superintendent of Education, had charge of this Department.

Dorwin Smith sang, "I'll Live for Him."

The report of this department was read by the Assistant Clerk. It was accepted by the Meeting.

Emmett W. Gulley, the recently installed President of Pacific College, gave a talk on the aims and outlook of Pacific College. He spoke of the importance of the Friends Academies in times past. Pacific College has a great future, he said, if we all cooperate with our prayers and our giving.

The report of Greenleaf Academy was read and approved and appears below:

#### REPORT OF GREENLEAF ACADEMY

At no time in the history of mankind has there been a greater need for Christian education than at the present. When nations are rising against nations, when millions are suffering the deprivations of food, shelter, and liberty, and when men everywhere are giving up to fear and despair, we need to inject into the social blood stream a host of Christian young people who have the strength of mind and character and the faith in God that will enable them to take places of leadership and make a positive contribution to this bewildered world of ours. During the past school year of nineteen forty and forty-one, Greenleaf Academy has endeavored to make the young people entrusted to her just such a group.

School opened last September with three new teachers and fifty-two students. From the very beginning we have felt the divine presence of God with us. Although the entire teaching staff was new, making it difficult to tie in with the past school program, the complete and good-spirited cooperation of the school board, student body, and community at large, made it a pleasure for us to carry on. In the face of such support, those who served the school could do none else than give their best.

Although this has been a short year financially on account of

some crop failures in the Greenleaf community, we feel like praising God for the improvements and additions He has enabled us to make. Because there has been an interest and a demand for practical work in home making, and because Miss Helen Willcuts came to us with a major in home making and well qualified to render superior service as a teacher in that field, we have taken steps to build room and furnish equipment for that department. A community banquet early in the school year raised over fifty dollars for the home making project. A school board appropriation of seventy-five dollars to this fund will bring us one step closer to our goal as soon as all tuitions have been paid. Already several pieces of furniture have been supplied. The community ladies have shown extra support by lending sewing machines to be used by the home making girls. Since the boys of the Academy are also interested in the practical phases of education, over fifty dollars has been spent to improve the work shop. The most appreciated addition was a new wood-turning lathe. All of us are proud of the accomplishment of a number of our typing students who have surpassed records of surrounding high schools. This was possible only because the community rose to our need and helped us secure five new typewriters for the commercial department. Then, when the low temperatures of the winter months began to overwork the old furnaces, our friends again rallied and installed a new air conditioning system. Last November, the senior young people of the community produced a play and used the proceeds to build new dressing rooms in our gymnasium. All these things, plus the very useful additions to the library and athletic equipment, cause us to give thanks to our God for all His benefits.

During the past year we have endeavored to expand the opportunities of those young people who are interested in music and declamation. Almost every student took part in these activities at some time or other during the school year. In December, almost the entire school took part in the presentation of the operetta, "Huldah of Holland." Early in March we presented "Young Lincoln" as an all-school three-act play. At Easter time, nearly all the students took part in the presentation of the cantata, "The Glory of the Cross." In May, the Junior class gave an excellent production of the three-act play, "David Copperfield." During commencement week the Senior class gave a greatly appreciated program, written and produced by themselves, which revealed Quakerdom on Trial." Throughout the school year our students made valuable contributions to the church, to the community, and to the outpost work by presenting choir numbers, one-act plays, small music ensemble groups, and individual selections.

A group from our school entered the declamation and music festivals and won superior honors. Several qualified for and participated in the all-state meets. The main objective of our music and declamation program has been to train our young people for active Christian service.

We have made special effort this year to keep in balance spiritual, intellectual, and physical training that would lead to the well-rounded development of each individual. Although we lost more games than we won in competing with surrounding schools, there has been a wholesome interest in the athletic program. We were proud to see our young people meet other teams on the basketball and baseball courts and there display the Christian sportsmanship that our school stands for. The intellectual phase of our work was definite enough to merit a highly satisfactory and commendable rating by the state supervisor of secondary schools. As for the spiritual side of our school, many of our young people have made



definite progress toward a deeper, a more settled, and a more active Christian life. Many started their walk with the Lord during the fall revival held in the Academy by Merle Roe. The spring revival, held by J. G. Bringdale, proved to be a time of firm establishment for a number who before had been up and down in their Christian experience. The daily chapel devotions, the weekly boys' and girls' prayer meetings, and the association of Christian young people proved a continuous source of spiritual blessing and growth.

The close of the school year brought with it a challenge to look ahead and plan and pray that Greenleaf Academy might be of greater service and inspiration to the young people who shall attend during the next school year of nineteen forty-one and forty-two.

Our Yearly Meeting has of necessity been postponed until the end of Seventh month, so that we are unable to send you our usual message embodying the exercise and concern of that gathering. Nevertheless Friends in Great Britain will be at one in desiring to greet you as you come together in your own Yearly Meeting, and to tell of our thankfulness for the strength and understanding of your letter of Sixth month last.

We are indeed more than ever conscious of the "ocean of darkness and death" which seems to be flowing more and more widely over the world. We know the fear that it may overwhelm us and the testimony that we seek to render, and the difficulty of seeing the true light upon our path. We know something too of the problems that are pressing with increasing stress upon ourselves. These things should bind us more closely to one another, that together we may be strong in the faith that God is our refuge

and the Spirit of Christ a lamp unto our feet. So shall we see—and be enabled to live in—the overflowing ocean of light and love.

A quiet blessing as a benediction rested upon the friends gathered to pay tribute to those who in times past have brought a blessing to our lives.

97. Joseph G. Reece expressed appreciation to the Railroad companies who have issued passes to the General Superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting and desired that this Yearly Meeting should send letters of appreciation to them. It was the wish of the Meeting that Joseph G. Reece as General Superintendent should sign these letters as well as the clerks.

98. The Financial Secretary gave his annual reports which were approved by the Meeting.

One of these appears below and the statistical one will appear in the Appendix:

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FINANCIAL SECRETARY

There are several encouraging features in the financial position of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Two Quarterly Meetings have paid their entire fixed expense, while only ten meetings are in arrears in the total amount of only \$380.40 as against \$453.10 a year ago.

In accordance with the Discipline the United Budget askings for 1941-42 were presented to the Monthly Meetings and it is a cause for great rejoicing that this budget of \$7205.00 has been voluntarily pledged in full.

This all indicates hope and confidence for the future.

There are however, some features of our financial condition which should receive our consideration during the next two or three years.

During the strained financial times through which we have passed since 1929 it has been necessary for the Yearly Meeting to borrow from the Trustees Fund from time to time in order to maintain and extend a consistent missionary and church extension pro-



gram. The total amount which has been borrowed during these years is \$2762.62, which added to an amount of \$1100.00 borrowed from private parties for the same purpose during the days of the old Yearly Meeting Stock makes a total indebtedness of \$3862.62. By the application of a balance of funds in the Fixed Expense, this will soon be reduced to \$3362.62.

As we face a new year with United Budget fully pledged, no large appeals for expansion work in sight, and a very apparent prospect of increased business activity in the economic world, it seems a very wise course of action for the Yearly Meeting to make a concerted effort to reduce this indebtedness by at least \$1000.00. If all meetings in arrears on fixed expense will pay up in full, the indebtedness could be still further reduced.

We undoubtedly face a period of business expansion for the next two to four years so it is decidedly the wisest thing for the Yearly Meeting to get out of debt. Since no one knows what conditions may follow these years of favorable business activity, it is not only wise to get out of debt, but also wise to have on hand the Trustees Reserve Fund.

Regarding the United pledges, it might be well to say that while the pledging is voluntary, there is a moral responsibility incumbent on each Meeting to pay its pledge.

The Financial secretary regrets that he was unable to visit throughout the entire Yearly Meeting, but appreciated the privilege of presenting the budget in 12 different Meetings. He is grateful for the able assistance of the Quarterly Meeting financial secretaries.

In closing the financial secretary recommends to all Meetings the use of God's plan, the tithe of the income. It has never failed to work wonders.

Let us all pray earnestly that every member of Oregon Yearly Meeting may wholly be in the center of God's will. Finances will never be a problem if such a situation prevails.

The report of the President of Pacific College was read by Levi T. Pennington:

## Report of the President of Pacific College for Year 1940-41

In presenting this, the thirtieth and last annual report since I came to the presidency of Pacific College, I wish to express my gratitude to God for His many rich blessings bestowed upon me and the wife who has labored with me all these years, and for His blessings on the college which we, with so many of you, have served, some of you longer than we have done. May the college in all the years to come be so under His guidance that it can continually be under His blessing.

## The College Year 1940-41

The year that has just closed has been marked by some unusual difficulties and attended by some unusual blessings. And world conditions are such that both faith and faithfulness will be needed during the years that are just ahead if the college is to do the service that a Christian college should do. Never since the first one was founded has there been greater need than today for the influence of the genuinely Christian college.

There were numerous changes in the faculty and staff of the college during the past year. Professor Emmett W. Gulley returned from an absence of more than a year and a half in war relief in Spain and the aid of German refugees in Cuba; but to take his place the American Friends Service Committee asked for a year's leave of absence for Prof. Chase L. Conover to carry on the same work, and this was granted, Prof. Alvin Allen taking his place.

Prof. Emma Kendall resigned her place as head of the English department, being succeeded by her predecessor, Prof. Russell W. Lewis.

Edwin A. Sanders, assistant professor of English and German, found it impossible to register under the military conscription law without violating his conscience, and for this technical violation of the law was sentenced to a year in a federal prison camp. It is hoped that he is to be paroled soon, but it is evident that it will be to the San Dimas camp rather than to continue his work on the faculty the coming year. Since the Christmas holiday vacation, the work he was teaching has been divided among the other teachers, his wife, Marian Binford Sanders, taking the heaviest single share of it.

Gervas A. Carey assisted in the department of Religious Education, carrying the work in that field that would have been handled by me if I had been on the active teaching force during the current year.

There has been a material increase in gifts for current funds during the year just closing. The largest single gift was one of \$2,500.00 from E. S. Collins of Portland, made some months before his death. Other gifts, most of them the result of my trip to the east in October and November, bring the total in gifts well over \$4,000.00 for the year.

Most of the work of the college has gone on very much as usual, in spite of the distressing world conditions. The Christian Associations have continued to have in membership nearly all the student body; the deputation teams have carried the Christian message to many; the college chorus has been the best for several



years; the monthly concerts arranged by the music department and participated in by both students and faculty, have been real musical treats; the monthly broadcasts over state-owned Radio Station KOAC have been maintained; the college has been represented with credit in intercollegiate contests in public speaking and in various forms of athletics; a number of dramatic productions of merit have been presented; the work of the Trefian Literary Society, The International Relations club, the Gold P, and Gold Q clubs and other student organizations has been maintained as usual; and the regular curricular work of the year has gone smoothly and successfully for the most part, with a few notable and lamentable exceptions. Through various means the class of 1941 has been reduced in numbers from its Freshman strength of 37 to its present number, five, the smallest class numerically since the years immediately following the World War of 1914-18.

#### Commencement, 1941

The year 1941 marks the 50th anniversary of the college (the Academy was established six years before the college) and special arrangements were made for the observance of the occasion.

The commencement concert Saturday evening, June 7, was participated in by all three members of the music faculty, Prof. Earl Wagner, Mrs. Florence Tate Murdock and Robert Hirtzel.

The baccalaureate service was held for the first time on Sunday afternoon, and I gave my closing baccalaureate message to the class and the audience met in their honor.

Following this baccalaureate service occurred an informal reception to the class given by the president and his wife.

In the evening the college Christian Associations held their closing public meeting as usual, with an address given by Paul Cammack.

Monday afternoon occurred the special Fiftieth Anniversary program, with a brief review of the history of the college by Prof. Amos C. Stanbrough, a member of the first class ever graduated from the college, an amusing historical skit headed by Jessie Britt, class 1899, and many brief speeches of reminiscence and of forward look, closing with a brief address by Prof. Emmett W. Gulley, president-elect.

This meeting was followed by a tea provided by the Woman's Auxiliary to the college, which gave additional opportunity for the renewal of old acquaintances by the numerous visitors.

In the evening occurred a banquet in recognition of the thirty years of service to the college by my wife and myself, which was greatly appreciated by us both.

The commencement exercises occurred Tuesday morning, and in addition to the conferring of degrees on the class there were a number of unique features.

The only living ex-president of the college, Dr. Henry Edwin McGrew, president of William Penn College and president of Pacific College from 1900 to 1907, gave the commencement ad-

dress; and the retiring president inducted into office his successor, Emmett W. Gulley, who accepted the responsibilities of his new position in well-chosen and impressive words.

In all its history Pacific College had never till this year conferred an honorary degree. On its 50th anniversary the college conferred on Herbert Hoover, its most distinguished son, the degree of Doctor of Humanitarian Service," in recognition of his leadership in the relief of suffering in Belgium, Germany and other countries of Europe, his work for victims of floods and other disasters in America, his encouragement and direction of the movement for child welfare and other humanitarian causes, his present efforts to save starving people in Europe, and other humanitarian services, both as a public official and as a private citizen."

The Alumni banquet, which closes each commencement week's activities, was highly enjoyable, as always.

On the whole, the year 1940-41 has been a notable one.

#### Faculty Changes

An unusually large number of faculty changes are occurring as the new administration takes over the leadership of the affairs of the college for the years ahead.

Most notable is the choice of Emmett W. Gulley to the office of president to succeed me, whom the college board has made president emeritus, an honor which I appreciate more than I am able to express. The resolution passed by the board contained the statement that after commencement his year "he shall be free to serve the interests of Pacific College, the Society of Friends and the Kingdom of God as he sees fit and is able." It is hoped that there may yet be years of such service.

Emmett W. Gulley, now its president, is a product of Pacific College, in addition to being one who has helped largely in making it what it is today. He was a student of the college in 1912-14 and in 1915-17, with a year's teaching in Greenleaf Academy, of which he was a graduate, in the interim. After his graduation from Pacific College in 1917, he took a year of work in the Hartford Theological Seminary School of Missions, then spent five years as a Friends missionary in Mexico. After his return to America with his family he took another year of graduate work in the T. Wistar Brown Graduate School of Haverford College, from which he took his Master's degree, and then served as field secretary of New York Yearly Meeting of Friends until his election to the faculty of his alma mater in 1928, where he has served continuously since except for half a year in war relief in Spain in 1939 and more than a year in the aid of German refugees in Cuba in 1939-40.

Other changes in the college force for the coming year are as follows:

Mrs. Marian Binford Sanders has resigned her position as head of the work in Public Speaking and Dramatics, and director of Physical Education for women. To fill this position the college has elected Veva Garrett Miller, who held the same position for two years before her marriage.

Veldon J. Diment's resignation as field secretary was accepted with deep regret by the college board. He is a graduate of the class of 1934, and has served in his present capacity for the past four years. His place has not been filled, and will be hard to fill.

Mrs. Sarah Louis has resigned her position as matron of the dormitory for women. To fill this position has been selected Mrs. Jessie N. Cole of Whittier, California.

Mrs. Florence Tate Murdock has resigned after five years as teacher of vocal music and director of the chorus. The place has



been filled by the election of Mark Daniels, one of the most prominent vocal teachers in Portland, to handle the individual vocal lessons, and the assignment of the chorus director to Robert L. Hirtzel already teaching violin and directing orchestra.

Gervas A. Carey has stated that he cannot go on with his teaching work in Religious Education.

Chase L. Conover has been granted another year's leave of absence, for work with the American Friends Service Committee, and Alvin Allen will continue his work at the head of the department of education.

Richard T. Binford has resigned as librarian. This vacancy has not yet been filled, nor has a teacher been secured for the work in Spanish which Prof. Gulley has been teaching, nor for the work in Philosophy and Ethics and Religious Education formerly done by myself.

I came to Pacific College thirty years ago, having had only three years of college attendance as an undergraduate, no graduate work, no experience as a college teacher, and no association with Pacific College before I was chosen as its president. My successor, one of the first students I sought for the college after I assumed my duties here, was a student of the college four years, after graduating from Greenleaf Academy; he has had two years of graduate work; he has had extensive and many-sided experiences in the work of Friends and the kingdom of God both at home and abroad; he has been on the Pacific College faculty since 1928; and he has the love and cooperation of the faculty, with whom he has served so long. I bespeak for him and for his administration the cooperation, the prayers and the sacrificial service of all those who should help to make Pacific College a bigger and better institution than it has ever yet been. God bless Emmett W. Gulley, his associates on the force, the students who are and who are to be its sons and daughters, and all who have been, who are and who are to be associated with this agency for the advancement of the Kingdom of God.
