Minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends 1942

1. It is with a renewed feeling of thankfulness that it is not by might nor by power but by His Spirit that Oregon Yearly Meeting is permitted to meet in its fiftieth session at Newberg, Oregon, at 9:30 A. M., June 10, 1942.

2. During the devotional period a hymn, "My Hope Is Built on Nothing Less Than Jesus' Blood and Righteousness", was sung.

After a period of silent devotion, Charles C. Haworth offered prayer, asking God's blessing on the Yearly Meeting.

The Presiding Clerk, Edward Mott, gave his observations on present day conditions in the Friends Church. Wherever he has gone he has found a striking need of God and a need for divine help also a need to wait upon God. He gave a warning against the independent societies of Friends.

14. Keith Macy led the meeting in the song: "Jesus is All the World to Me."

T. Clio Brown brought a message on faith. Faith in God has a uniting effect upon the church. Faith will keep one pressing forward. What faith ought we to have to honor God?

17. A letter was read from Denver Headrick in which he sent greetings to the Yearly Meeting.

18. A summary of the state of the church in the various Quarterly Meetings is given below:

The meetings for worship and business have been regularly held with good attendance. Two meetings report that young people show an increasing interest by their attendance at prayer meeting. Although one meeting was under supply ministers for five months the attendance and spiritual tenor of the meeting held up. One meeting regrets that there are some who do not attend evening services and prayer meetings regularly.

Most meetings report a spirit of unity among the members with care for the reputation of others. Three meetings report that differences which had arisen have been settled. In three meetings there is still a lack of Christian love and fellowship but efforts are being made to remedy this condition.

On the whole Friends seek to maintain religious life, striving to be careful not to become unduly absorbed in temporal affairs. One meeting mentions the difficulty in these times of being led astray by temporal matters. A large number of the members read the Scriptures daily and enjoy family worship, but one meeting reports that few family altars are maintained and another expresses a fear that many are careless in this matter.

Most members strive to give their children suitable training and guard them from harmful reading and evil associates. Some parents are not careful in this regard.

Except for a few cases the members abstain from the use of alcoholic liquors. Two meetings report abstinence from the use of tobacco. There is care throughout the Yearly Meeting of avoiding places of amusement, inconsistent with a Christian character.

The Christian principle of peace is believed in and maintained by most of the members but some feel the need for more teaching on the doctrine of peace to counteract the propaganda of hate. Some young men are in military service and several in the Civilian Public Service camps, thus giving witness to the "faith of our fathers".

Some delay in the payment of debts was reported but on the whole members are careful to meet their financial obligations promptly.

The needs of the poor are looked after and Friends show their concern for the spiritual need of the world by praying earnestly for those actively engaged in Christian work.

The meetings are careful in the appointment of teachers and officers in accord with the doctrinal standards of Friends as stated in our Discipline. One new meeting feels the need of a better understanding of Friend's doctrines.

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

19. Edward Harmon, the Superintendent of this department, read the report as it appears below:

At the start of the church year we began a definite program and set some goals for the year.

One goal was an increase in the number of tithers by at least 100 new ones which would be a 10% increase. We more than reached this goal for the gain in new tithers was 181 or nearly a 20% increase.

Another goal was a 30% increase (which would be 50) in the number of sermons preached on subject. We did not reach this goal, having an increase of only 30 sermons, or about a 20% increase.

We set 2,748 pages of literature distributed as our goal which would have been a 50% increase and we distributed 4,595 pages or nearly 150% increase.

The Superintendent of this department visited each of the six Quarterly Meetings in the Yearly Meeting and four of them twice, in the interest of Stewardship.

In November a seven page pamphlet giving the stewardship program for the Yearly Meeting was sent to every Pastor, Monthly Meeting Chairman, and Quarterly Meeting Superintendent. Again most of the churches had November as a tithing month with satisfactory results.

With the help of the General Superintendent and the other departments a Self-Sacrifice month was conducted in March. \$1,272.98 was raised to apply on the Yearly Meeting debt.

While we feel that there is yet much ground to be gained we feel that this has been a good year in our department and praise God for His gracious blessings to us.

This report was accepted on the condition that if more information is secured it may be incorporated in this report.

The recommendation of the meeting on Ministry and Oversight of Oregon Yearly Meeting that a committee be

appointed to prepare a suitable commemoration on the fiftieth anniversary of Oregon Yearly Meeting is favored. We recommend that the matter be referred to the Evangelistic and Church Extension Board.

The meeting approved this suggestion.

22. The report of the committee appointed by Oregon Yearly Meeting to set up Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting was as follows:

Of the committee appointed by Oregon Yearly Meeting to set up Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting, Edward Mott, Herman Macy, and Walter P. Lee were the only members able to fulfill the mission assigned.

On Friday evening, August 15, 1941, the Christian Endeavors of the meetings to compose the new quarterly meeting met for a rally at which reports from Twin Rocks Conference were made by the delegates who attended and a message to the young people was given by Arthur Roberts, the Yearly Meeting C. E. president.

On Saturday morning an inspirational and timely message was delivered by Edward Mott. He felt that Friends might well use the term church in preference to "society". He explained the various usages of the term church and emphasized the most important of these, that of the body of Christ. Friends were urged to assume their responsibility as a part of the body of Christ.

On Saturday afternoon the chairman of your committee opened the meeting for business by reading the Yearly Meeting's action relative to the setting up of Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting. Edward Mott and Herman Macy, the other members of this committee present, spoke briefly of the importance of the occasion and of the interest of the Yearly Meeting in the steps being taken.

Nominations for the various offices had previously been prepared and were presented. The clerks were appointed and then took their places to continue the business. The new quarterly meeting is composed of the monthly meetings at Greenleaf, Riverside, Ontario Heights and Homedale.

26. During the period of devotion the Presiding Clerk offered prayer.

27. The minutes were read and approved.

28. The Nominating Committee requests the Yearly Meeting that the representatives from Boise Valley and Greenleaf Quarterly Meetings be allowed to make nominations for their respective Quarterly Meetings which were omitted in the reports sent in.

This request was granted.

29. The Permanent Board made the following report which was approved by the Yearly Meeting:

The Permanent Board at its regular meeting held Sixth Month, 10th, 1942, considered the matters of disciplinary changes referred to it at the last Yearly Meeting as follows:

In Minute 34, 1941 in determining the number of Quarterly Meeting representatives to Yearly Meeting the following change is recommended to be made in paragraph 7, page 58, line 5, the word "active" is inserted between residents and members so as to read: "for each one hundred resident active members or major fraction thereof".

This change was approved by the Permanent Board.

In Minute 74 the following recommendation was made:

That Part II. Section 4, paragraph 1, page 47, the first sentence, pertaining to the appointment of Overseers be changed to read as follows:

The Monthly Meeting shall choose through the Nominating Committee not fewer than three Overseers for a term of three years, and as nearly as possible, one third of this number shall be appointed each year.

This change was approved by the Permanent Board.

In Minute 83, 1941, the following changes were recommended in paragraph 3, page 66 so that the second part of paragraph 3 be made to read as follows:

At the last local meeting on Ministry and Oversight before the Quarterly Meeting designated above, two written reports are to be made. The FIRST, to be prepared by the Overseers, dealing with the spiritual and moral conditions of the entire membership, embracing the following matters: The spiritual condition and life of the congregation; the attendance at meetings for public worship, and of family devotions; the character of the ministry and its adaption to the needs of the Meeting; statements shall be made as to the reception of spiritual gifts by any of the members, and the care that has been extended toward the exercise and development of such gifts; information shall be given of any special work that may be entered upon, and of any available fields of service; the conduct of the members in their relationship to one another and to the world; and of such other matters as may pertain to the affairs of the congregation. **

The SECOND report may be prepared by the clerk of the local meeting on Ministry and Oversight, or by a committee appointed for that purpose, and shall deal with matters pertaining to that body.

as suggested by the Queries addressed to that body. (in Part III, Chapter V, Section 2.) and after approval and signed by the clerk, it shall be sent to the Quarterly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight.

These changes were approved by the Permanent Board.

The recommendation that a sufficient number of these changes be printed, and in such form as to be inserted in the Discipline on page 66, was not approved by the Permanent Board, in view of the action recently taken by the Yearly Meeting to revise the entire Discipline.

REMARKS ON PUBLIC MORALS

A survey of the reports from the various meetings shows an increase of interest in Public Morals. All items inquired after in the statistical report, except that of programs, shows an increase over last year. Almost four times as much money was spent in the promotion of this work as was spent last year. Nearly 5000 more pages of literature were distributed. This increase in activity is due

doubtless, to a condition which Morris Heacock describes as follows: "We are tired of the entire sordid mess and rapidly growing public sentiment demands that we put an end to the strangle hold of booze upon our national life."

Many meetings have sent petitions to Congressmen in support of Senate bill number 860 commonly known as the Sheppard Bill. A very large number of personal letters have been sent to both senators and representatives demanding protection of the men in the selective service from the liquor and vice rings. The Administration at Washington seem slow to learn that prohibition would do more to put the country in a condition to win the war than any one of many other things it has tried.

The Greenleaf report calls attention to the training of children in L. T. L. work as a means of fortifying them against the evils of alcohol, tobacco and profanity. The Greenleaf Superintendent cooperated with allied Civil forces, showing W.C.T.U. films to over 3000 students in the north half of Idaho. Other temperance work has been done by her in which she contacted 1000 students.

Medal contests have been promoted and Portland reports two prize-winning orations in behalf of Public Morals.

Nearly all Bible schools furnish temperance teaching each Temperance Sunday and several more often. Stress is laid upon teaching the Juniors the evil effects of alcohol and tobacco upon the mind and body. Work among children and youth will probably bring greater results than any other we can engage in at the present time. In the days of effective prohibition in Kansas, Senator Capper stated that its success was due to the fact that men in official position had been taught temperance in the schools of their youth. "Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it."

Some meetings would encourage reading more temperance literature. The National Voice and the Union Signal are to be especially commended. The Business Men's Foundation of Chicago can supply literature of a very telling character at a low cost. I am glad to note that one meeting is placing a copy of the National Voice on its bulletin board weekly.

Portland Quarterly Meeting reports that some of its members have prepared articles for the press and some have delivered addresses in churches of other denominations. Your superintendent made a trip to Woodland and spoke before a mass meeting there. He would like to encourage all the activities mentioned above for the future and greatly appreciates the work of the Quarterly Meeting Superintendents (one spent \$72.80 of her own money for Public Morals) and the Monthly Meeting Committees. Although dry sentiment in the Nation is increasing rapidly, we have a long way to go before we again get national prohibition.

Let us faithfully continue in well doing.

B. N. Hicks, superintendent of Oregon Anti-liquor League, gave the address for this department. He urged the development of a strong, healthy public sentiment against the liquor traffic.

The following resolution was passed by the Yearly Meeting:

We urge the Governor of the State of Oregon and the Oregon Liquor Control Commission to suspend the operation of the State Liquor stores and to refuse to issue any more licenses, or to re-

new any now in operation for the duration of the war.

Harry and Alice Bundy sang a duet, "Take Up Thy Cross".

35. The inspirational hour began with the singing of, "The Old Rugged Cross."

Gervas A. Carey brought a stirring message from Habakkuk. In conclusion he said: "As you pray, do not make your prayer one sided—wait for the Lord to speak. The supreme good of life is the knowledge and the approval of God."

THURSDAY, 2:00 P. M.

36. The meeting convened at two o'clock and settled into a period of devotion.

37. Marian Edgely from Camas meeting who is assisting with the children's work in the Yearly Meeting was introduced to the meeting.

Iola Stein, a minister from Kansas Yearly Meeting, was also introduced.

38. Earl P. Barker presented the following statement:

In the annual report of the American Friends Fellowship Council, from which the presiding clerk quoted in the course of his opening address, two statements are found which are manifestly inaccurate and unauthorized. It is stated on page three that the 97 members on the Council "represent all the Yearly Meetings," and on page 6 that "the Council represents all Yearly Meetings". Neither of these statements is true with regard to Oregon Yearly Meeting. It is proposed that a letter be written to the secretary of the Council and signed by the presiding clerk on behalf of the Yearly Meeting, calling attention to these errors and requesting that in future issues such statements be corrected or omitted.

It is the wish of the meeting that Earl Barker should write a letter to the American Friends Fellowship Council in regard to this matter, which is to be signed by the Presiding Clerk.

39. The following request came from the committee which was appointed to prepare a revision of the Discipline:

In view of a general feeling among leading members of the Yearly Meeting that the departmental organization of our work should be greatly simplified and thus rendered more efficient, the committee appointed to prepare a revision of the Discipline asks that it be authorized to work out a plan of reorganization, the same to be submitted to the Yearly Meeting in a future session.

This was approved by the meeting.

EVANGELISTIC AND CHURCH EXTENSION

40. Our General Superintendent, Joseph Reece, presented the annual report which was accepted and is to be recorded in the minutes:

On the fiftieth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting, I bring to you my first report. This coincident has caused me to consider briefly some of the events of this half century. In doing this I realize very keenly that a large share of this report is possible only because of the earnest effort and faithfulness of those who had a part in writing the history. Only a few of that historic group who had a part in the beginnings of Oregon Yearly Meeting are with us today. We have a heritage to be proud of. We should give praise and thanks to God for the Spirit filled and Spirit directed men and women who made possible to us the precious privilege of this hour.

During this half century Oregon Yearly Meeting has given close to a million dollars to carry the Gospel message to many distant places, to educate her youth and to establish a home base. Only He whose records note the falling sparrow and the cup of cold water given in His name, will be able to compute the value and worth of this expenditure. Yes it cost these pioneers money.—But they gave more than money, because the use of money indicates the temperature of ones heart and soul for God, and indeed they were on fire for God. They labored, they prayed, they wept. Most of you listening to me know God in His redeeming love, because of their tears, their labors, their prayers and their love. Look at the leadership of Oregon Yearly Meeting today, you see ministers and pastors carrying on with the same vigor and vision as these pioneers of old, whose consecration hold them true in the furnace trials of today. We see missionaries from our homes, who found God at our altars, who heard the call to GO in our meetings, and are now representing us in Bolivia and India. We see young men and women successful in business who are giving of their time and money and loyally standing behind Oregon Yearly Meeting in her God appointed task.

At no time in the world's history has the outlook been so dark and desperate. Never such human suffering, such misery, such distress, such hatred and wanton bloodshed. In a large portion of the world door after door has been closed to missions and the preaching of the Gospel message. Missionaries by the hundreds have been sent or brought home. Those who remained were interned or separated from their congregations. Carrie Wood, a member of Sunnyside, serving in India needs our prayers for her safety. We also have members serving in China. But Bolivia is still open. No one knows how soon the door may close. We have a fine station. Visitors and world travelers say it is one of the best. Yet we have only three missionaries there to carry the heavy load. Never has the call come to Oregon Yearly Meeting with greater force and insistence than it comes today. It is a now or never force. It means that we must do what we can today as tomorrow may be too late. God grant that we fail not in this hour of opportunity.

Last August 30th Howard and Julia Pearson with Donny left for Bolivia and arrived safely on the field. Carroll and Doris Tamplin with David and Rachel left Bolivia soon after Pearson's arrival and reached home in October. A fuller report of our missionary activities will be given tomorrow.

Owen Williams, pastor at Rosedale, was drowned while swimming last July 2nd. The sudden passing of this young man, who possessed so many qualities for being a successful minister, left

Rosedale without pastoral care for five months. Oscar Brown, pastor at Rose Valley answered their call and went to Rosedale last December, and God has richly blessed his service there.

William Ralphs, a student at Cascade College, took up the work at Rose Valley. He would drive up each week-end and visit and preach. He also worked hard to get the parsonage finished by June so that he and his wife might be able to go and live in the community. The parsonage is still unfinished. Several of our pastors plan to go up there after Yearly Meeting and finish it up.

Denver Headrick has left Oregon Yearly Meeting and taken a pastorate at Ridgeland, Illinois.

Gervas Carey, heeded the call of Pacific College to head the Dept. of Religious Education. Lloyd Cressman, pastor at Emporia, Kansas, is coming to take his place as pastor of the Newberg Meeting.

Ray L. Carter, pastor at Long Beach, California, has accepted the call to come to Sunnyside, Portland.

Milo Ross, after 6 years of excellent work at Greenleaf, received a call to remain as pastor, but resigned to take some other field to which he felt the Lord was leading him.

George Moore has done a splendid work at Homedale. The meeting was united in calling him back, but because of his wife's health and on the advice of the physician he is leaving Homedale. Neither Greenleaf nor Homedale has decided on who their new pastors will be.

Clyde Thomas, pastor at Middleton and Sherwood, has accepted a call from Star, Idaho, to serve them as pastor. Clyde Thomas leaves Middleton and Sherwood after two years of very acceptable ministry. Mahlon Macy, a junior in Pacific College, accepted the call to Middleton. Evert Tuning has resigned from Ridgeview.

Several other pastoral changes are to take place but as there is no definite information there is nothing for us to report now.

Oregon Yearly Meeting should be quite proud that three of her recorded ministers have this year completed their college work and received degrees. Walter Cook, Edward Harmon and Paul Mills received their Bachelor degrees. Two of our young men serving as pastors graduated from college this June, William Ralphs and William Thomas. We are indeed proud of the achievement of these men.

We should report that on last July 20th, the church building at Rose Valley was dedicated. There was a fine attendance and a good offering was taken to help in the work. Many expressions were made at that time by the people of the community for the work of Oscar and Ruth Brown. I am sure that all of us appreciate the effort of these two there.

We should not forget to mention the establishment of a new Quarterly Meeting, known as Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting. The committee appointed by you at Yearly Meeting carried out their appointment last August 16 and as a result we have a new flourishing Quarterly Meeting.

I shall not take time now to give you a report of the revival spirit manifest throughout the Yearly Meeting. You will find some intensely interesting reading in the statistics from each meeting. Clio Brown, Edward Mott, and Hubert Mardock have been used of God in revival meetings in Oregon Yearly Meeting and in other Yearly Meetings. Our own pastors have helped each other in special meetings to the uplift of the meetings concerned.

As to some of my personal activities—I traveled about 27,596 miles in these three northwest states. Attended all three of the Christian Endeavor conferences, most of the Quarterly Meetings

and held two revivals, at Riverside last February and at Marion last March. I gave 85 messages and showed the pictures of our missionary and home work 14 times. I have tried to be faithful in my correspondence and my relations to each department.

In closing I would like to speak a word of sincere appreciation for two people who do a large amount of work, mostly unseen and many times taken for granted, but which means much to the success of this Yearly Meeting, namely Mildred Hadley, editor of the Friendly Endeavor and Richard Kneeland, our treasurer. I would like to take time to speak of each of our out-posts and each pastor, I could speak at length about each of our departments and those who compose them, I could gather a lot of enthusiasm in talking about our Quarterly Meetings Superintendents, but time forbids. I count it a privilege to labor with them and with you in the great task God has committed to Oregon Yearly Meeting. I put all the force, power—propelling and explosive, into the words of Jesus, "YE ARE THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD." "YE ARE THE SALT OF THE EARTH."

Appreciation was expressed for this report and for the fine cooperation of the General Superintendent with the pastors of the various meetings.

A rising vote was given to express this appreciation.

Gervas A. Carey, president of the Evangelistic and Church Extension Board, presented the statistical report which will appear in the appendix.

The Evangelistic Superintendents of the various Quarterly Meetings were seated on the platform and each gave a report of the meetings in his Quarter.

The General Superintendent said that the greatest need right now was at Rose Valley. William and Shirley Ralphs, who are taking up the work there, were introduced to the meeting.

Reuben and Rayma Cogswell from Hayden Lake, Idaho, were also introduced.

41. The Executive Committee made the following report which was approved by the meeting:

The Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting recommends unanimously that Joseph G. Reece be called as General Superintendent of our Yearly Meeting for the year 1942-43.

That the Yearly Meeting allow Joseph Reece \$1,500 per year for support and an allowance of \$500.00 per year for traveling and office expense.

44. The request from the Evangelistic and the Church Extension Board for a grant of \$500.00 from the Trustees was referred to the Executive Committee and they are to report back to the Yearly Meeting.

45. The meeting adjourned to meet Friday, June 12, 1942, at 9:30 A. M.

REPORT OF BOARD FOR AGED MINISTERS AND MISSIONARIES

The Board for Aged Ministers and Missionaries has continued its work, endeavoring to put into effect the plans accepted by Yearly Meeting.

We regret to report that since the plan was adopted by the Ministerial Association and the Yearly Meeting in 1938, that only ten ministers have availed themselves of its opportunities.

We feel it is not necessary to repeat the plan, here, as the minutes of former years state, and the minutes of last year give a complete explanation of same.

Only ministers who participate in this plan will be able to receive any benefits from it, as payments from its funds will be based upon years of membership.

The board has received and approved nine applications during the past year.

We are happy that we have been able to give \$10.00 a month each to Marietta Cope and Ida J. Lee.

The board is laboring to create a retirement fund so that in the future we shall be able to give respectable aid to our aged ministers and missionaries on their retirement. To help in this, the board will be glad to receive any gifts or bequests.

Only \$17.00 was paid into the ministers' retirement this year by the ministers of the Yearly Meeting. We trust the ministers will

note this and thus profit.

PEACE DEPARTMENT

55. The following peace report was read by the Assistant Clerk in the absence of Levi T. Pennington, the Superintendent of this department:

REPORT OF PEACE SUPERINTENDENT

The year just closing has been marked by America's entrance into the World War, which has brought many new problems and increased the difficulty of old ones. Most Friends have felt the need for greater care in promulgating our views on the subject of peace and at the same time the definite urge to faithfulness in maintaining our traditional view, not because it is traditional but because we still believe it is the view most in harmony with the life and teachings of Jesus.

Most pressing among the immediate concerns of the Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting has been the need to support our young men members who have taken their stand as conscientious objectors to military service, and have therefore been assigned to work of national importance under civilian direction. The organization of the Northwest Friends Service Committee gave the Yearly Meeting an agency for this work, and this field of service will be covered by the report of that committee. Since the Service organization does not run down into the local meetings in most cases, the local peace committees have for the most part been the agency through which the Northwest Friends Service Committee has worked in the local meetings.

The following statistics indicate some of the work of the local committees:

Number of peace meetings reported, 42.

Number of peace sermons, 55.

Number of other peace addresses, 13.

Number of members in combatant military service, 23; non-combatant, 6.

Amount spent on peace work, \$542.00.

Items such as money raised for Civilian Public Service camps, number of Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting in these camps during the year, etc., will appear in the report of the Northwest Friends Service Committee.

Many special projects have been carried on by local committees, such as the making of kits and the furnishing of books for men in the Civilian Public Service Camps, cooperation with the Red Cross, the "Clothes for Shanghai" campaign, projects for the help of soldiers in army camps, special study group assistance for the benefit of young people, advisory committees for conscientious objectors, filing of records for conscientious objectors, letters to registrants and prospective registrants, service for the suffering in needy areas at home and abroad, work with the National Council for Prevention of War, the Fellowship of Reconciliation, International Relations groups, etc.

Among the plans suggested for next year, an outstanding one is a class for boys and a class for girls to study and receive instruction in the views of Friends on the subject of peace.

Your superintendent has given addresses on "Shall Europe be

Fed?"; "What can the Christian Pacifist do now?"; "How Can the Christian Work for a Just and Durable Peace?"; "Peace and Service", and similar peace subjects, to colleges, churches, service clubs, high schools, etc.; led a two day seminar of the Portland Council of Churches on the spiritual phases of the conference theme, "The Churches and a Just and Durable Peace"; has written numerous articles dealing with the Christian peace attitude which have been printed in a number of periodicals (and has written some that have not been printed); and has dealt with the subject of peace among others in numerous commencement addresses, talks to international relation study clubs, over the radio, etc. As a representative of Friends I have had a hearing which it would have been difficult for me to have had otherwise.

57. During the devotional hour a hymn was sung, then Fern Mills sang a solo, "To Eternity".

Frederick B. Baker talked on faith that works. He showed a graph of the development of Friends' work in England, America, and Oregon Yearly Meeting. The ten different methods that Jesus used in winning men to Him were presented in a stimulating way.

Newberg: 28½ hours work for Red Cross, one box of paper given, several boxes of canned fruit given, cards and notes sent to elderly people, gifts to farm homes, 3 crates of berries, 27 dozen eggs, one kit for C. O. camp, 25 pounds rhubarb, thirty comforts, 12 blankets, 2 mattresses, 6 pairs pillows, 1 bedstead, 2 bed springs, 1 lounge, several quarts milk, several curtains, rolls of rags for sick, shower gifts for returned missionaries; money for home missions—\$297.50. (Some of these things were sent to C. O. camp).

Greenleaf: Ontario remodeled garments and sent them to needy families; Greenleaf gave \$158.09 to needy and those in Outpost work, and a love offering of \$149.20 to their pastor during illness; Homedale purchased and tuned piano for \$63.00, church improvement \$72.96, purchased dishes for kitchen at \$18.22, shrubs for church yard \$3.00, games for church young people \$5.00, and gave to casualty station \$10.00; Riverside gave grocery show-ers to pastor.

Salem: Gave three bushels of nuts, 390 quarts milk, 60 cakes and pies, 5 quilts, 18 tea towels. Three societies sewed and knitted for Red Cross. Sixty letters and cards were sent to sick and shut-ins; many Bibles, Testaments, and tracts were given. Many hours were given for care of the sick. Money and materials were given for work among migrants. \$10.00 was given to Hazel Green Japanese Christian church.

Portland: Amount expended for Jewish work \$171.60; \$28.25 was paid for freight for relief. Gave 1 goodwill bag, 163 garments to Shanghai, 3 comforters to Tamplins, 3 kits to C. P. S. boys, value \$78.30; 3 baskets of fruit, 20 plants, booklets and cards sent to sick, 2 beds, other household goods, a baby layette, hair cuts, working on parsonage 1590 hours, 6 Thanksgiving baskets, 2 quilts made and given, box sent to Outpost filled with pillowcases, tea towels,

bath and hand towels, lunch cloths, aprons, etc. Served for Red Cross.

Following is testimony of Social Service and Home Missions committee in Camas Friends Church: "This committee has endeavored to go out two by two and call on those who had a spiritual need and to pray with them, and encourage them to accept Christ as their Savior. We have been blessed in our souls in doing this, and feel we have been a blessing and a help to those we have called upon. We thank our Blessed Savior for the strength and privilege of serving Him this way the past year."

FOREIGN MISSIONS

62. After a hymn was sung, A. Clark Smith, the Superintendent of this department, presented his annual report as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS OF OREGON YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS CHURCH

Newberg, Oregon, June 12, 1942

Any report we might write would be inadequate to picture the work carried on throughout the yearly meeting in the year that has closed, through the missionary department.

However, a brief review of this work will be profitable.

The United Budget is for the most part paid in full. Missionary information has been presented to the Sunday schools and churches.

The reading of missionary literature is promoted and correspondence with missionaries encouraged.

We would express our appreciation to the staff of the Friendly Endeavor for their cooperation in presenting missionary articles and pictures to the Yearly Meeting through the Friendly Endeavor.

Missionary sermons to the number of 106 have been preached and 123 programs have been presented.

Reports from nineteen meetings, show that aside from the United Budget, money to the amount of \$2,733.33 has gone to our mission field and \$916.33 to other fields of missionary work.

There may be some duplications in this report when compared with that of the Treasurer but not many.

The Board of Foreign Missions wish to express their appreciation for the interest and loyal support which the members of the Yearly Meeting have given in the last year.

Turning now from the home to the foreign field we have the following report to present from Bolivia.

A. Clark Smith, Superintendent.

This was approved by the meeting.

The annual report of the Field Superintendents was given as follows:

TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FRIENDS BOLIVIAN MISSIONARY FIELD

1941-1942

"And when they lifted up their eyes, they saw no man, save Jesus only." Matt. 17:8. Our problem today, the problem of your missionaries is not primarily education and social service but that the people might "see Jesus only". That all might see Jesus in all His beauty, all His holiness and power, and as Savior and as Sanctifier. It is true we cannot always be on the mount but must come down to the valley of service, and as your missionaries we are trying to serve, not alone but Jesus with us as He was with His disciples as they followed Him. Our prayer is that the vision of Christ and service for Christ might go hand in hand. Prepare us Lord, both at home and abroad, to know the mind of the Indian that we might be better able to pray for him and work with him to the salvation and sanctification of souls. The missionaries' daily prayer is for the understanding and for the guidance of the Holy Spirit in dealing with them.

The present superintendent has only been on the field for the last six months and while the report covers the entire year the last six months will be emphasized. We have had the privilege in these few months of visiting every district and nearly every outpost and preaching point of each district. We have found a healthy growth in all our districts, not spectacular but steady. The districts are divided and reported as follows:

AMACARI

This is our oldest district and is ably pastored by Cipriano

Mamani. The work here has advanced considerably and twelve new members were taken in during the year. A notable increase in Bible reading and evangelistic trips is noted, thirty-eight trips having been made. They have raised the pastor's salary, are more faithful in bringing in their tithes and offerings in money and products and have started two new projects. One is to build a road from the main highway to the chapel of about a mile and a half in length and another is to start a monthly meeting. These projects they expect to accomplish this next year. A larger number of tracts were distributed and more bibles and testaments sold. Their offerings amounted to almost seventy dollars and a like amount of food products. Their average attendance was a little less than a hundred and the work of the pastor is being blessed by the Holy Spirit and souls are being saved and sanctified.

COROCORO

This is our newest district and is pastored by our very fine Mariano Medrano. This is the place where the printed Word is being sowed most abundantly and we have the promise that it will not return unto us void. 7,299 tracts were distributed, 17 Bibles, 63 Testaments and 243 Gospels sold. There are now five families celebrating family worship and ten reading the Bible daily, three new persons are practicing tithing. The average attendance has been about 25. Offerings taken in have amounted to about fifteen dollars and a considerable amount of food was given for the conference there. Their second conference was held this year and double the number of persons were fed at this time than the year before. Santo Tomas is a preaching point out from Corocoro where the pastor walks about three miles each way each Wednesday to hold meetings. There is a fine group here who, the Lord willing, will some day build a church in their community. Helen Cammack has made many trips to Corocoro overseeing the work and encouraging the people, as have also the Pearsons since their return.

PONGON HUYO

This is another district of ours with an equally fine pastor, Felix Guanica. This is the most "traveling" congregation we have. 313 evangelistic trips from this district were made this past year. They have 103 members at present having taken in 11 new members this past year. Twenty dollars were taken in as offerings but double or triple that amount of food products was given beside food for the conference held there. Eight families celebrate the family altar and about twenty-four read the Bible daily. This is an enormous per cent when so few of this congregation can read. They have almost finished their new church and expect to have it done to dedicate at their conference next August. They have had to stop work during the rainy season. Property, material and work have all been donated. They have three strong preaching points, one at Guarina, at Mina Fabulosa and Uma Palca. The pastor of Guarina, lives at Pongon Huyo and goes to Guarina each Sunday walking the distance of 9 to 10 miles each way. The Lord is blessing the work of this district and a great advance has been made over last year.

LA PAZ

This is the mother district and shows the greatest advance. Juan Ayllon is our very fine and able pastor and is greatly abetted by his wife, Thomasa de Ayllon. 4,433 tracts were distributed, 11 Bibles, 22 Testaments and 77 Gospels were sold. The average attendance for the year has been 145 but is increasing and now has

as many as 160. Over \$250 were taken in during the year beside much food and products for the annual conference. The congregation has taken on more of the support of its pastor, has raised funds for the flooring of the church basement school room and is planning on buying its Sunday school supplies. Street meetings are held nearly every Sunday afternoon and 21 new members were taken in during the year. 39 Evangelistic trips were made not counting those made by the Superintendent. Regular Sunday school is held at Viacha by one of the members here and preaching services at the Mine Kelluani. Other points are visited weekly. The average attendance at Viacha is 12 to 15 and Mine Kelluani 8 to 10.

SCHOOLS

Helen Cammack has had entire charge of this department. For the most part of the year she has been in Corocoro but making trips to La Paz to complete the second edition of the gospel primer. This is a fine piece of work and she deserves a great deal of credit. Since January she has been in La Paz teaching the fourth, fifth and sixth grades and directing the La Paz school of 34 pupils. Beside her gospel primer, which is being sought after by mission schools of other denominations, she is getting out a prospectus for the use of our other teachers, indicating the course of study on Evangelical lines they should follow. The teaching of our believer's children that they might be our future workers is as necessary as other evangelical work. She has also held a night school for adults, three nights a week since January, taking much of her time and energy.

MISSION HOME

This is a very fine memorial to our past General Superintendent, Chester Hadley. The house is warm and comfortable and of fine appearance. The built-in cupboard in the dining room has been completed, fire place and bookshelves are done, partitions and some built-ins upstairs are in. The house painted on the outside and lawns and flowers planted at the side and rear which are doing beautifully.

AUTOMOBILE

February 10th was a red letter day in the mission. After many weeks getting car out of customs, estimating the repairs, making claim for damage and getting final settlement, car was repaired and delivered on that date. Since then it has been used on countless trips to hospital, doctor's offices and for visiting as well as on many an evangelistic trip. It is always on call and has been out as late as 11 o'clock. The car has been used every day at least once since we got it except for five days it has stayed in the garage all day. Evangelistic trips have been made to every district and to most of the preaching points. A satisfactory trip was made to Pongon Huyo where we held evangelistic services and vaccinated almost a hundred children. Their new church building is almost completed and the work found in healthy condition and prospering. Souls are being saved and sanctified and our trip proved a blessing to the people. Amarcari was also visited, the church animated and edified. The church was encouraged to raise the pastor's salary and to build a road about a mile and a half from the main highway to the chapel for the car and to bring in their tithes and offerings more regularly. This we understand they are doing. They were also encouraged to set up a monthly meeting which will be organized

next November at their next conference. Corocoro has been visited every month on an average. One month was missed but we went twice another month. The believers were encouraged. We also visited Santo Tomas, a village three miles from Corocoro. This church is outgrowing the mother church of Corocoro. While the Corocoro church has not grown appreciably it is being established and believers are being grounded in the faith. Two visits were made to Guarina, a preaching point in the Pongon Huyo district, large numbers listened to the gospel, both in the chapel and in the street meetings. Two visits were made to Viacha where we have a Sunday school of from 12 to 15 students. A great work is being done here by Senora de Marussich, a high class Spanish woman. Many other trips have been made, both long and short and many others in prospect. Praise the Lord for the car ! ! !

SOUL CRY OF THE AYMARA

The "Soul Cry of the Aymara" has not been issued the past year due to lack of funds. One mimeograph edition was mailed out but no comments have been received as to how it was received.

BIBLE CLASSES

The lack of a Bible school has handicapped our work some as time and personnel has made it impossible. (Only three missionaries on the field for the past two years). However, this lack has been supplemented by Bible classes for the pastors, workers and those interested who feel the call into service, by holding them during the month of July. This was found very successful in 1940, 1941 and these will be held again in 1942. The lack of facilities, funds, personnel and the poverty of the Indian has made a Bible school difficult but we find these classes of great benefit.

TRANSLATION

It has now been announced that the four Gospels and the Acts, which our mission had the direction in translating into the Aymara, is now ready for Shipment in New York. The final proofs for the booklet, "The Way of Salvation", published by the Scripture Gift Mission of London has been returned to the publishers and should be in print in Aymara this coming year.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE OR YEARLY MEETING

Every year when conference is over it seems that this one has been the best, and this year was not the exception. While it was not the largest on record it will go down in history in heaven as being outstanding in souls being saved, sanctified and pardons asked of one another and of getting right with God. The La Paz congregation took care of the food and lodging and had a committee of "vigilantes" (caretakers), cooks and waiters to care for the people. It was the duty of the caretakers to see that everyone was lodged, fed, awake in meeting, care for crying babies and be useful in many ways. The local congregation paid all expenses of the conference and had over 700 Bolivianos (\$14.00) left over. Samuel Smith of Central Yearly Meeting Mission was invited to take the morning meetings for worship but he was delayed in coming on account of heavy rains and impassable roads so we waited on the Lord for the first two mornings and He led Helen Cammack and Felix Guanca to give the messages those mornings. These services were blessed of the Holy Spirit and many souls were sancti-

fied. Fred Lee of the above mentioned mission gave the messages of the last two mornings and these too were filled with the unction of the Holy Spirit. Sunday morning was a time of pardons being asked, souls saved and sanctified and the church purified. The classes were true to the gospel and above "par" and the evening evangelistic services were a time of much blessing. No time was given for testimonies except an occasional testimony at the beginning of a service or a few at the close of a meeting so Sunday night the people took it into their own hands at the close of the evening service and testimonies rang out one after another of the blessings they had received and lasted until almost 11 o'clock. Juan Ayllon preached a powerful sermon Sunday afternoon on a missionary topic. Three young men felt the call of service. Many others came to the altar to re-dedicate their lives to the giving of their testimonies. "Go and Preach" was the theme of the conference and all were encouraged to go out and give their testimony to as many people and as many times as possible this coming year. We plan with the aid of the pastors, missionaries and people to cover every corner of our field this coming year.

As we enter the year 1942, with heads lifted and hearts aglow, we claim His promise, "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord."

She gave us a vision of Bolivia, the great unexplored country, the many Indian tribes, the souls lost without Christ, the wonderful work that is being done by the native workers and missionaries.

The General Superintendent urged that the Yearly Meeting take advantage of the doors that are still open in Bolivia—today we have our opportunity. It is the challenge that comes to the Yearly Meeting.

He also presented Ralph and Marie Chapman who have felt a definite call to Bolivia.

Doris Tamplin reported that she had had a letter from Carroll Tamplin saying that he had arrived safely in Norman, Oklahoma, to begin his linguistic work there and he sent greetings to Oregon Yearly Meeting.

63. The representatives made the following report:

GREENLEAF ACADEMY REPORT

We are glad to report that the 1941-42 school year has been one of growth and progress for Greenleaf Academy. Good records of scholarship have been made, all financial obligations have been met, extra-curricular honors have been earned, and fine Christian personalities on the part of many of our students have been developed. Most of the fifty young people who enrolled in September were able to stay for the entire year, and several new ones came during the school year to take the place of those who had to leave. On the evening of May 26, twelve of our students received their diplomas and are now ready to take their places in higher education or occupational life where they, with many others who have gone from Greenleaf Academy before them, are sure to be of service

and blessing to humanity because of the character and personality they developed during their academy career.

The scholastic standards of Greenleaf Academy have been very satisfactorily maintained during the past school year. The subject matter offered and the type of work done has been in compliance with the standards set up by the state department of education. After a careful investigation, full accreditation was given for the work which is being done at our school. We were criticized only on the lack of instructional equipment in the science and industrial arts departments. We trust that through the help of the Lord and the cooperation of our friends we shall be able to secure these much needed items in the near future. Definite progress in that direction has been made already through our purchase of modern mimeograph equipment, athletic supplies, shop materials, and building improvements.

The extra-curricular achievements of our school for the past year have been better than usual. The boys' athletic club was successful in winning a total of twelve games of basketball and baseball played with other schools. The girls' athletic club made a new venture this past year by engaging in interscholastic basketball and baseball. Honors have been earned in declamation activities by our presentation of several plays and by several of our students' winning high ratings in both district and state declamation festivals. The high point of the year's musical program was the presentation of the Easter cantata, "From Olivet to Calvary".

Although some of our students came to the close of the school year without a definite testimony of a personal experience of salvation, we can confidently report that the past year has been one of spiritual success. Many of the young people found definite help and spiritual establishment in the prayer meetings, chapel services, and revival campaigns. The prevailing spiritual atmosphere about the school has contributed to the development of Christian personalities that shall be of permanent blessing to the world in which our young people shall go to live.

We are looking forward to the opening of another school year next September. Communications have already been received from a number of students who intend to be with us at that time. Although we regret the loss of one of our teachers, Miss Doris Snyder, we are glad to report that we have another, Miss Dilla Tucker, coming to us with wide and successful teaching experience. Surely the high type of students that shall be ours, the experienced teaching staff, the many arrangements that are being made for improvements and expansion in our school program, and the prayers and support of our many friends should make the school year of 1942-43 the best in the history of Greenleaf Academy. May God's blessing rest upon us.

THE REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF PACIFIC COLLEGE FOR THE YEAR 1941-42

The past year marks the beginning of the second half of a century of service for Pacific College. The year has been marked by many unusual conditions. The conflagration of war which last year leaped from one nation to another has now engulfed our nation also. War conditions which more and more affect the daily life of every one also are increasingly affecting the college.

There were several faculty and staff changes during the past year.

Christian W. Mackauer and his wife, Clara, both refugees from Germany, served very capably on our staff. Prof. Mackauer taught Philosophy, German and European History. Clara Mackauer taught French and served as Librarian. Veva Garrett Miller filled the position of teacher of Dramatics and Public Speaking and had charge of Physical Education for girls.

Two other departments were added during the year, namely, that of Commerce and Home Economics. To teach the commercial

work Hilda Cooper was secured. To head the department of Home Economics, Elizabeth Ott Bishop was secured. She resigned at the end of the first semester and Marie Allen handled that work for the rest of the year. Gervas A. Carey, who had spent only part time previous to last year, took full charge of the enlarged Bible department and carried on that work in a gratifying way. Jessie Cole was secured to serve as Matron of the girls dormitory and she has been unusually successful.

Veldon J. Diment, whose resignation as Field Secretary was accepted last year, was persuaded to stay on in the capacity of Treasurer and Purchasing Agent. His work has been highly successful with the result that many hundreds of dollars have been saved and other hundreds of dollars were collected. The financial affairs of the College have been skillfully managed.

Hulda Winslow has added greatly to the comfort and economy of the dormitory by her excellent cooking.

COMMENCEMENT 1942

The Commencement concert on Saturday evening, June 6, was of unusual merit. The three members of the music faculty, Earl Wagner, Mark Daniels, and Robert Hirtzel, all participated.

The Baccalaureate service was given by the President of the College on Sunday afternoon. Following this service an informal reception in honor of the graduating class was given by the President and his wife.

Sunday evening the Christian associations of the college held their closing public meeting with an address given by an alumnus of the school, Eugene Coffin.

Monday evening the usual Class Day exercises were presented by the class of 1942.

Raymond Booth, Secretary of the Pacific Coast Branch of the American Friends Service Committee gave an impressive and thought provoking address on the subject, "Superfluities and Dimness of Vision", in which he sought to emphasize putting important things first and earnestly endeavoring to follow our leader, Christ.

In the evening occurred the annual Alumni banquet at which the graduating class of 1942 were invited guests.

FACULTY CHANGES

Several faculty changes are sure to occur for the coming year. In the first place the Mackauers are forced to withdraw because of the fact that Newberg is in the prohibited area for German aliens. Veva G. Miller has resigned to take up other work and Earl Wagner, the head of our Piano department, is moving so far away that he can no longer serve.

Chase L. Conover who had been granted a two years leave of absence for work with the American Friends Service Committee

has resigned as head of the Department of Education and his resignation was accepted. Alvin Allen who was temporarily filling that position was elected as head of that department.

Dorothy Vershum, our very efficient Secretary to the President, resigned in the middle of the year and went to Washington, D. C. to accept a more remunerative position.

Ben Jones who had been so satisfactory in his work as Janitor and Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds resigned to take a much better paying position.

Golden F. Noble, who served as Athletic coach, resigned at the middle of the year.

None of these vacancies have yet been filled for the coming year.

ACTIVITIES

Several things worthy of mention have occurred at the college during the past school year. Several hundred dollars worth of new equipment was added to the Home Economics department. A similar sum was spent on new typewriters and equipment. A new cold storage locker and refrigerator was added to the equipment at the Dormitory.

We enjoyed the largest Freshman class in the history of Pacific College and also the largest total enrollment in its history. And I might say in passing that the character and quality of the Student Body in general was unusually high.

There were a considerable number of students who are definitely preparing themselves for full time Christian service as Ministers and Missionaries.

62% of our Student Body belong to Friends. There is no other Friends College in the United States with such a high percentage of Friends.

One other outstanding accomplishment of the year was the training and presentation of the College chorus of 55 voices under the direction of Robert Hirtzel. This chorus in all, traveled approximately 2,000 miles and gave 18 concerts, going as far east as Boise Valley.

The Christian associations of the College had an unusually successful year. One of their outstanding projects was the bringing of Carl Byrd to the college for a week's services of evangelistic meetings which were of great benefit to the Student Body and the Church. Deputation teams accompanied by a male quartet have visited many churches and Friends meetings throughout the Willamette Valley.

Monthly broadcasts were again given throughout the winter over the state owned station, KOAC.

The usual work of the inter-collegiate Public Speaking contests, dramatic productions, various athletic affairs, International Relations club, the Literary club, the Fellowship of Reconciliation, and many other student organizations appeared as usual.

The college annual which was published this year was outstanding and unusually representative of Pacific College and its work.

The college deeply appreciates the friendliness and cooperation on the part of every one in any way connected with the school.

SCHOLARSHIPS

The highest honors of the graduating class went to Mary Esther Pemberton. The Junior prize was awarded to Maynard Macy. The following new prizes were inaugurated: The Sophomore prize of one-half year's tuition which was divided between Marion Doble and Claude Lewis. The Freshman prize of equal value which was also divided, went to Arthur James and Wilma Archambeau.

In addition to the usual Greenleaf scholarship the following one-half scholarships were authorized as follows: to Newberg high school, two; to Dundee high school, one; to each of the Quarterly Meetings of the Yearly Meeting, one. It is hoped that these quarterly meeting scholarships will be granted in cooperation with the Education Committee of each quarterly meeting.

This terminates the first year of my election to the Presidency of Pacific College.

As one looks back over the year it would be easy to pick out many discouraging features. A good many of our troubles can be traced directly to the results of war and lack of proper financial support. However, the brighter side outshines the darker and one could say with George Fox, "That over the ocean of darkness there is an ocean of light".

I particularly appreciate the fine cooperation of Faculty, Board of Managers and members of the Yearly Meeting. I do not wish to close this report without acknowledging God's blessings to us throughout the year and the definite leading of His spirit.

The meeting of Ministry and Oversight of Oregon Yearly Meeting decided at its meeting 6th month 13, to ask Oregon Yearly Meeting to interpret Part III, Chapter I, Section 3, Paragraph 3 of the Discipline. Memorials for Hanna B. Taylor and Owen R. Williams were presented to the Board, considered, and directed to be read in the Yearly Meeting and filed with the Yearly Meeting documents.

At a called meeting of the Board held June 12, Harlan Smith and Amanda Woodward were nominated to the Board of Managers of Pacific College for a term of three years.

Charles C. Haworth was appointed clerk of the Board for the ensuing year.

The meeting also expressed a desire that the names of Owen Williams' parents should be mentioned in the memorial and that a copy of the memorial should be sent to them.

The names of the members and ministers deceased during the past year were read by the Assistant Clerk.

It was with a prayer of thankfulness that the meeting paused from the rush of business to remember those whose lives had been such a benediction to us in times past and whose consistent Christian lives have been so helpful to us.

84. Earl Barker, the chairman of the Northwest Friends Service Committee, gave the following report which was approved by the meeting:

REPORT OF THE NORTHWEST FRIENDS SERVICE

COMMITTEE, 1941-42

This Committee was set up by the Yearly Meeting last June to operate in behalf of our Quaker young men who are facing the problems of a federal program of conscription in time of peace. Since then the situation has drastically changed. For more than six months our nation has been at war. The size of the proposed national army has changed from a picked handful to an enormous host carefully culled from our entire population. Those above twenty-eight years of age are no longer exempt. The lists of men deferred on account of dependents are being sharply revised, and many of them called to service. With the exception of a few cases those engaged in completing their education are being inducted without further opportunity. All of these circumstances have brought our young men face to face with questions which were not at all foreseen a year ago. At the same time they have worked to-

gether to complicate our problem and to increase our responsibility.

During the past year this Yearly Meeting was approached through its presiding clerk with the question as to whether we favored the continuation of the Civilian Public Service program undertaken at the beginning of conscription by the three peace churches and whether we would be willing to pledge the amount of \$2,000 toward its continuance through the year 1942. Our clerk responded that we could not make a pledge, but that we favored the continuation of the program and would support our own boys; that if we should have as many as five boys in camp our expense would exceed the amount asked. When the Committee met on New Years Day, with the war less than one month old for our nation, the serious question was laid before us as to whether we could keep up with the demands which our program might lay upon us, and at the same time give enough to support our agencies of evangelism. We felt at that time that if we would put evangelism first, God would bless and prosper us in the raising of funds for Civilian Public Service as well. No doubt our faith will be put to the supreme test, but we cannot withdraw from the field in the fear of such an outcome.

Within a few days after the 1941 Yearly Meeting sessions were over, our first young man, John Palmer of the Nampa meeting, was inducted at the San Dimas camp near Glendora, California. This is a Friends camp. He was later removed to the Cascade Locks camp in Oregon, and remained our only responsibility until he was released for essential farm work this spring. On March 10 Melvin Kenworthy and Wilfred Pearson, of Sunnyside meeting, and on March 13 Melvin Wilkins, of Springbrook meeting, were inducted at the Cascade Locks camp, which is administered jointly by the Brethren and Mennonites. On April 22 these three were sent to Camino, California, along with quite a group of Mennonites, to help in opening a new camp near that place. This is CPS Camp No. 31, and is under the administration of the Mennonite Central Committee. Within a few days after that, three additional young men were inducted at Camp No. 21, Cascade Locks, Oregon. They are Ellis Roberts, Denton Darrow, and Wendell Williams, all of Greenleaf meeting. On June 2 Elvett Brown, of Sunnyside meeting, was inducted at Camp No. 31 in California. Ross McIntyre, of Riverside Meeting, has been called to entrain for Camp No. 21 during these Yearly Meeting sessions. Word has just reached us that Kenneth Hull, of Ontario Heights meeting is likely to be called very soon unless he can secure further deferment for the harvesting of crops. It is evident from these statements that we now have eight young men in camp, and another in prospect. We shall feel the burden of supporting them, as a father feels the burden of his own family, but we shall rejoice for them, that they have been true to their convictions and have at the same time shown their loyalty and patriotism by their willingness, while refusing military service, to labor and sweat and risk their lives to meet one of our country's pressing needs.

It is a matter of regret with this Committee that a number of our members have joined the armed forces of our country. We do not wish to criticize them, if they have been true to their convictions, but we feel that not all has been done which could and should have been done to inculcate the true Friends doctrine of the value of human life. We fear that in some cases the real issue has been obscured in a maze of thought and profitless discussion on the subject of securing and preserving political peace. We are to be peacemakers, but our efforts are to be concentrated on making peace between man and God. The true basis of our peace is the Spirit of

God and of His Son Jesus Christ abiding and ruling in our hearts and removing all hatred and all occasion for war. It is for the purpose of aiding in the dissemination of our true doctrine that this Committee has in preparation, for general distribution, 2,000 copies of Edward Mott's 1940 Twin Rocks address, "The Basis of Our Peace". We earnestly exhort leaders and influential persons in the various meetings to take these pamphlets and use them, conducting study classes or prayer meeting services on the basis of the material contained therein. There are many references to the Holy Scriptures, making evident the Bible foundation of our views.

As a Committee we felt deeply bereaved when one of our charter members, Owen Williams, was taken from us within a month after our organization. His place as a representative of Salem Quarterly Meeting was supplied by the election of Dillon Mills.

When Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting was set up, Milo Ross retained his place and Leroy White was elected to be his co-worker. In Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting Paul Mills was elected to take the place left vacant by Milo Ross. We wish to express our appreciation for the valuable assistance rendered locally by the chairmen of peace committees. It is largely due to their work and cooperation with our Committee members in the different Quarterly Meetings that the fine report of our treasurer is made possible. They have also been active, no doubt along with women's organizations, in the making of kits for the boys going to camp. Funds have been raised in all quarters, and for them there have been issued stamp and certificates. These forms have been well received. A movement is in progress to secure on a nation-wide scale the same recognition for them which has been given by the representatives of the U. S. Treasury Department in Pennsylvania. In that state a pledge to buy CPS certificates, often called "peace bonds", will be recognized as the equivalent of a pledge to buy war bonds in the "Pledge for Victory" campaign. The Committee has formulated and issued its own certificates in denominations of \$1 to \$100, and ten cent stamps with cards holding ten. The chairman has had the privilege of speaking for the Committee in the sessions of Newberg Quarterly Meeting at Chehalem Center, at a church night at Camas meeting in Washington, and in Sunday services at Sunnyside and Lents meetings. He has kept contact with the members of the Committee, with CPS headquarters, with the local peace chairman, and with the boys in camp. This has required the writing of some 150 letters, the mimeographing and mailing of about seventy copies each of three general bulletins, issued respectively in June, August and January, and the providing of a number of articles for the Friendly Endeavor. The total amount expended for postage, stationery, paper and printing and mimeographing supplies, with other administrative needs, is \$52.18, as the treasurer's report will show.

As we look forward to the coming year we could be disheartened by the magnitude of our responsibility. We do not see our way through. But we are reminded of One who can make a way where there is no way, and with the strength which He gives we shall continue to go forward. We cannot fail these young men whom we have taught to value the lives of their fellow beings. They have stood by their convictions; we cannot let them down. It would be our shame through coming generations if we should do so. Their cause is our cause; their need our need. Let our dimes and our dollars talk for us, to tell them and the world that we sincerely believe in the way of Christ, and that His Spirit is in our hearts.

85. The financial secretary, Walter P. Lee, presented his written report to the meeting, which was approved and appears below:

THE REPORT OF THE YEARLY MEETING FINANCIAL

SECRETARY FOR 1941-1942

Believing that an honest consecrated effort to meet our financial obligations to the Lord and His Church is definitely an act of worship which is honored by the Lord, the financial secretary wishes to report a year of outstanding blessing from the Lord.

Because of unfortunate financial conditions the Yearly Meeting for years past had been borrowing and drawing from the trustee's reserve fund to meet the current budgets. Last year the Yearly Meeting felt that it was time to begin to retire our debts and balance our books. The plan was to retire \$1,000 of our debt each year for the next three years thus liquidating those obligations.

So heartily did members of Oregon Yearly Meeting support this program that instead of raising \$1,000 they raised approximately \$2,000 for debt retirement. So with thanksgiving to God arising from full hearts we face the coming year one year ahead of schedule with only \$1,000 to raise to retire the debt.

The self-denial month instituted by the Stewardship Department was a major contributing factor in raising this money during the past year.

Today, by the grace of God, Oregon Yearly Meeting is in the best financial position that it has been for at least twelve years.

Out of a United Budget to the amount of \$7,205.00 for 1941-1942 only \$743.78 had not yet been paid by June 1, 1942. Of the Fixed Expense only \$638.13 was yet unpaid by June 1.

Part of this in arrears is due to policy of some meetings in setting up their budgets to cover the period of September 1 to August 31. The Yearly Meeting report year covers the year from May 1 to April 30, however, for convenience of the meetings the treasurer of the Yearly Meeting keeps his books from June 1 to May 31.

The financial secretary wishes to urge such meetings to re-adjust their fiscal year so that they may enjoy the satisfaction of reporting their pledges and assessments due the Yearly Meeting as fully paid at Yearly Meeting time. This is entirely possible since not so many years ago at least some of these meetings did have their assessments paid up at Yearly Meeting time.

It would seem to the financial secretary that it would be an extremely wise policy for not only the Yearly Meeting but for monthly meetings also to retire any indebtedness as soon as possible in view of the uncertainties of the future.

It is a firm conviction with many that God will honor those who honor Him with their substance.

Inasmuch as the recording of men and women in the ministry is a matter which the Quarterly Meeting must face from time to time we very much feel the need of a ruling from the Yearly Meeting which will help us in this important matter.

We therefore recommend that a statement be issued whereby an individual may not be recorded until he has rendered at least two years of acceptable ministry.

The meeting approved of this action and referred it to the Permanent Board for action next year.

88. The following communication from the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight was approved with a change of the word permission to authorization:

We recommend to the Yearly Meeting that authorization be granted young pastors to perform marriage ceremonies even before they have been recorded as ministers. This shall be given for one year at a time.
