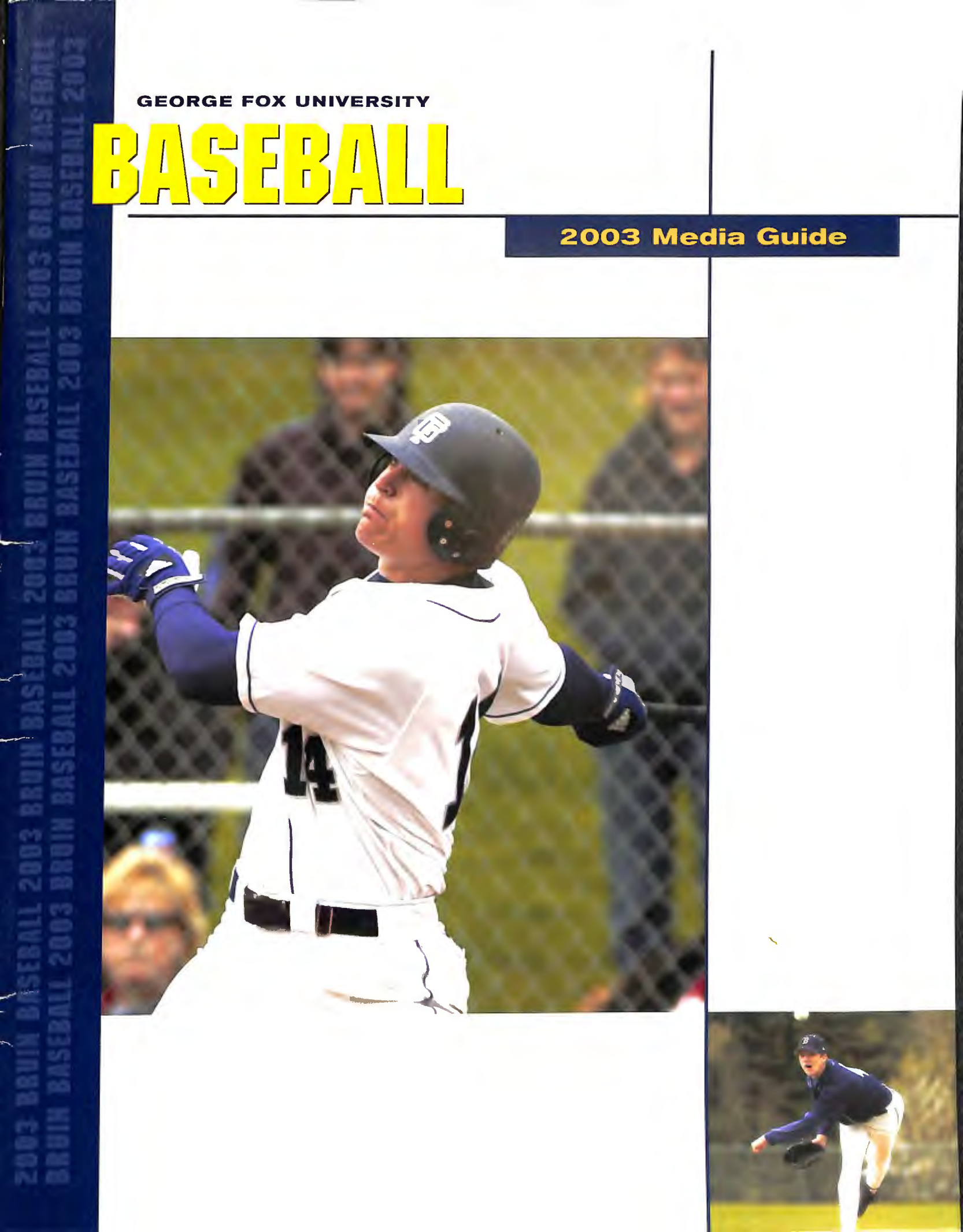
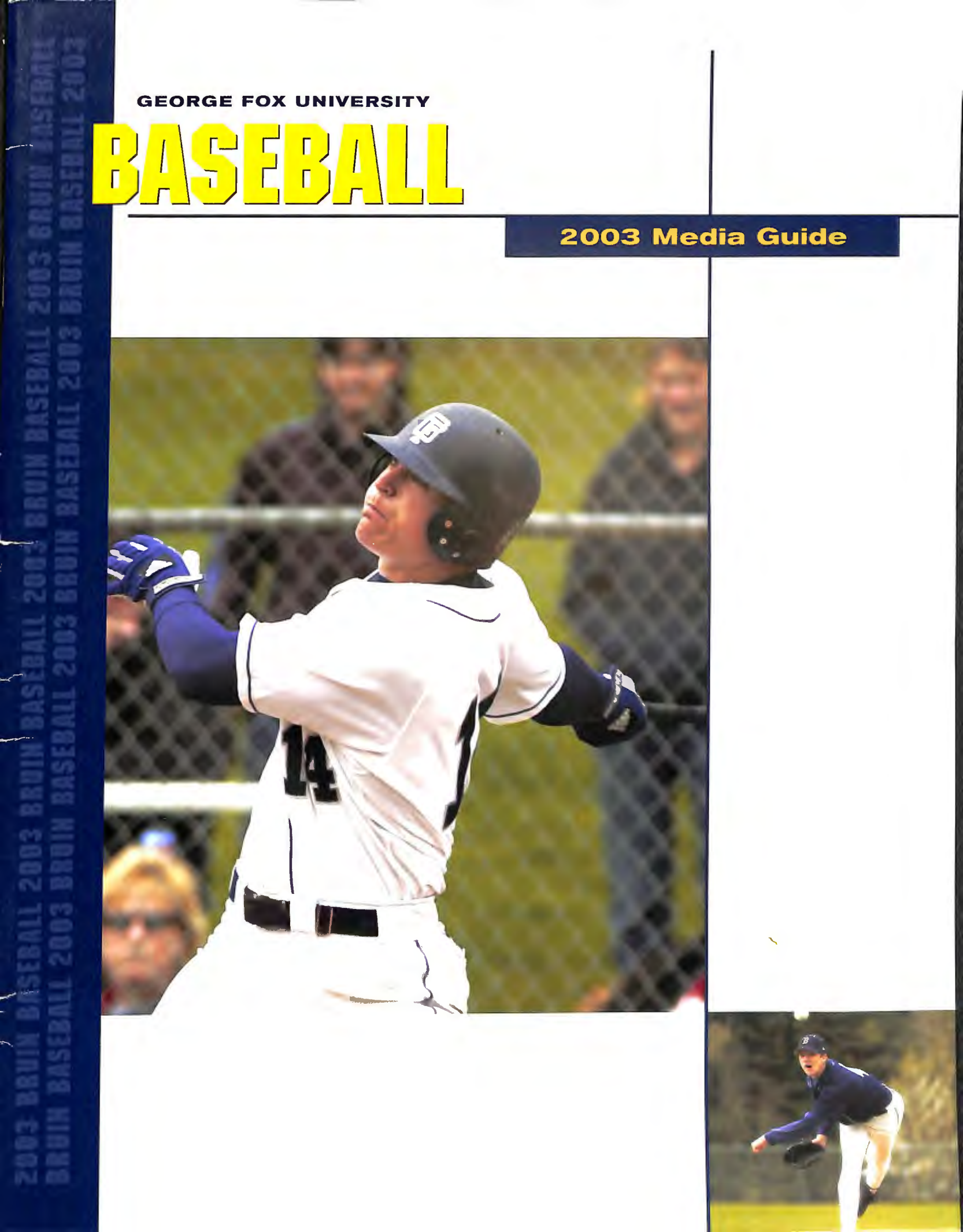

Title Defense

A strong mix of new and experienced players, anchored by a formidable pitching staff, hope to keep the conference crown away from a pack of talented NWC opponents

In a four-team race to the wire, the George Fox University Bruins, led by a league-leading pitching staff, squeezed out a Northwest Conference title and a 4th-place finish in the NCAA Division III Midwest Regional in 2002. This year, the Bruins hope to ride the wings of 8 returning pitchers and several talented newcomers to a successful defense of their conference crown and an even better showing in the 2003 postseason playoffs.

"Hitting is fun, but pitching and defense win ballgames," acknowledges Bruin coach Pat Bailey, the 2003 NWC Coach of the Year and the winningest coach in George Fox history (191-97, .663 in 7 years). "Obviously, pitching will be a strength for us this year, but I think our defense will be improved, so I fully expect us to be one of the teams fighting for the championship in a conference race that will probably be just as close as last year."

The Bruins went 27-15 overall last season and were 16-7 in the conference, edging Whitworth by 1/2 game, Pacific by 1, and Linfield by 1 1/2. Five of the 8 player who earned All-Conference honors in 2002 return to bolster the Bruins' chances to repeat.

Pitching

Two All-Conference selections are back to lead a pitching staff that paced the NWC in ERA (4.30) and set a new team record for single-season strikeouts (270). **Scott Hyde** (So., RHP, Grants Pass, Ore.) and **Cory Dixon** (Jr., LHP, Springfield, Ore.), both First Team All-NWC, are as different in their pitching styles as night and day, but their results are amazingly similar. The hard-throwing Hyde established himself as the No. 1 starter as a freshman, going 7-3 with a 4.19 ERA and 88 strikeouts, 2nd in the NWC and the 2nd-highest

ever by a Bruin pitcher. Control specialist Dixon was 7-5, led the league in ERA (3.02), fanned 54, and threw a 4-hitter to beat Blackburn (Ill.) in the regional tournament.

The Bruins' No. 3 pitcher last year, **Mike Beck** (Jr., RHP, Livermore, Calif.), was 6-1 with a 5.64 ERA and 45 strikeouts and is looking for consistency to become an even bigger winner. He will

be pushed for the 3rd spot in the rotation by **Thomas Chivers** (So., RHP, Chimacum, Wash.), who came on strong at the end of the season to finish 1-2, 4.71, and has added some muscle from a strenuous off-season weight program.

Three veterans — **Nathan Green** (Jr., RHP, Portland, Ore.), **Ash Anunsen** (Sr., RHP, Jefferson, Ore.), and **Seann Hammon** (Jr., RHP, Port Orchard, Wash.) — anchor the Bruins' middle relief corp. Green (1-1, 5.09, 16 Ks in 17.2 innings) has a strong arm and has shown improved control. Anunsen (3-2, 6.30, 1 save) was 2nd in the conference with 20 appearances and is tough when he keeps the ball down. Bailey calls Hammon (1-0, 3.50) "a key to our staff; he could have a great year if he can be confident and aggressive, and could possibly be our closer." **Jimmie Baynes** (So., LHP, Joseph, Ore.) showed promise with a 1-0 record and 1.80 ERA.

Also bidding for the closer's position are newcomers **Derrick Jones** (Fr., RHP, Forest Grove, Ore.) and **Jordan Purdy** (Fr., RHP, Keizer, Ore.), who have good breaking stuff. **Nate Randleman** (Fr., RHP, Bellevue, Wash.) is a tall (6-6) pitcher with a good fastball, while **Alex Bailey** (Fr., RHP, Newberg, Ore.) is another relief candidate with a good curve.

"In this conference, you can never have too much pitching," says Bailey, "and we go 11 deep. I would not be afraid to put any of them out there against our league. There has been a lot of competition for jobs, and the ones who are throwing the best are going to get the ball; there are no favorites here."

Outlook

Catching

Bailey is all smiles when talking about his catchers, calling **Greg Dombek** (Jr., Vaughn, Wash.) and **Mike Halverson** (Sr., Redmond, Wash.) "the best defensive combination in the league, and good enough hitters to bat 6th in the lineup." Dombek (.284-2-20), a righty hitter, and Halverson (.225-2-12), a lefty at the plate, combined to throw out 45 percent of the runners who tried to steal on them last year.

Backing up the 1st-string catching platoon will be Lower Columbia CC transfer **Tom Morris** (Jr., Kirkland, Wash.), a switch-hitter who can hit for both power and average. He will also see considerable time as the team's designated hitter.

Infield

Every Bruin infielder earned All-Conference honors in 2002, but 3 of them are gone: 2nd baseman Ryan Dearing, who was First Team All-NWC, Third Team All-West Region, and set a Division III record for hit by pitches in a season (33), and 2 Honorable Mention selections, 1st baseman Kyle Langeliers and shortstop Paul Gramenz.

Third baseman **Kevin Tucker** (Sr., Forest Grove, Ore.), who was Honorable Mention, returns with a steady glove and line-drive bat that produced numbers of .331-1-22 and a team-leading 13 doubles. At the oppo-

site corner, All-America candidate **Eric Bell** (Sr., Spokane, Wash.) takes over at 1st after producing a .377-10-49 season that resulted in First All-NWC and Second Team All-Region honors as a designated hitter.

The Bruins' new double play combination will include Otero (Colo.) juco transfer **Marc Buffington** (Jr., Ft. Collins, Colo.) at 2nd and **David Peterson** (So., Aloha, Ore.), who hit .255-1-5 in part-time duty, at short. Buffington "turns the best double play of anyone besides David Farrell in the 8 years I've been here," says Bailey, "and Peterson is, bar none, the best defensive shortstop I've had in my 22 years of coaching."

The Bruins are young and untested behind the infield starters. **C.R. Braniff** (Fr., Hillsboro, Ore.) and **Tye Tinner** (Fr., Portland, Ore.), a First Team All-State selection from Grant High, both have a chance to see playing time around the middle of the infield. **Billy Padot** (Fr., Thousand Oaks, Calif.) is a possibility at 3rd. Hyde and Hammon could play 1st if needed should anything happen to Bell.

Outfield

With the departure of First Team All-NWC center fielder Travis Maffey, who made 1 error in his 2 seasons with the Bruins, **Jake Johnson** (Sr., Newberg, Ore.) shifts from right to the middle.

"Jake has looked good out there and should have a fine year if he can make a little better contact," predicts Bailey of Johnson, who hit .250-4-20 and stole 8 bases.

Over in left, **Stephen Donohue** (Jr., Gresham, Ore.) is back after a .331-1-20 season that included a league-leading 21 stolen bases. He'll bat lead-off again. **Joshua Sargent** (Jr., Oak Harbor, Wash.) replaces Johnson in right, and with full-time duty, should significantly increase his .293-2-13 numbers in 41 at bats of a year ago. He's a switch-hitter with a compact line-drive swing who hit .450 in fall ball.

Certain to see significant time in the outfield when he's not pitching is Jones, a First Team All-State pick who has good speed and a chance to start in his rookie season. Bailey, a good offensive player, has shown good range in the outfield and will see considerable playing time. **Andrew Martin** (Fr., Toledo, Wash.) will add depth to the Bruins' flychasers.

Summary

"We lost some key guys in Dearing, Gramenz, Maffey, and Langeliers," admits Bailey, "kids who were experienced and mentally tough. Yet while we have quite a few newcomers, we also have a nice mix of veterans with them. We have good leadership in senior captains Bell, Johnson, and Halverson, a deep pitching staff, and versatility in the lineup — with the switch-hitters we have, we can put as many as 6 lefties in the batting order, which is a huge plus with all the tough right-handers in this league."

"This is a team that will not defeat itself; you may beat us, but we won't beat ourselves, and we'll be hard to put away. We have a selfless group of athletes who have worked hard, with a common goal of getting back to the regionals and going even further. If we can avoid injuries, because we don't have a lot of depth in the field, anything is possible."

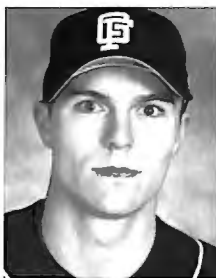

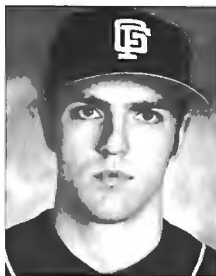

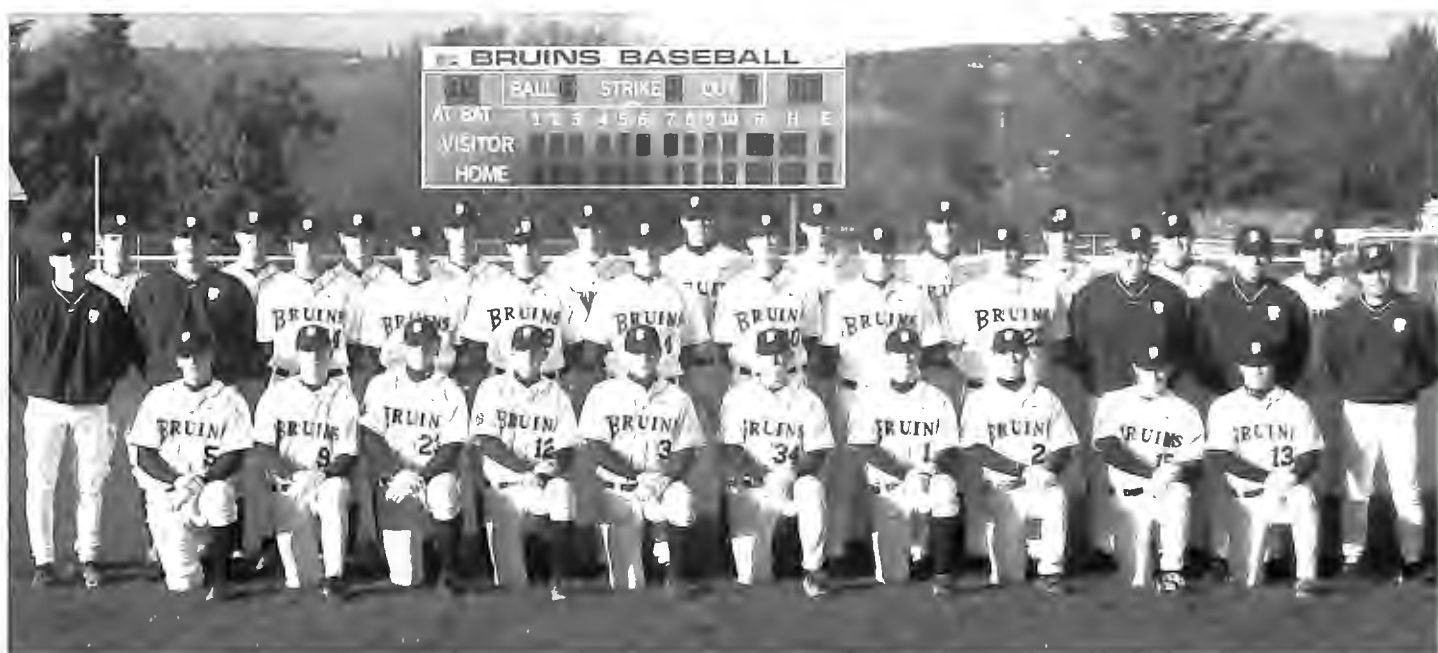

27 Pat Bailey

Head Coach • 8th Season

With the most wins in George Fox University baseball history and the 2002 Northwest Conference Coach of the Year title, Head Coach Pat Bailey begins his 8th season as the Bruins head baseball coach. He has established the program as one of the finest in the Northwest Conference (NWC) and at the NCAA Division III national level.

The Bruins have posted 7 straight winning seasons under Bailey, giving him a 191-97 career record. His .663 winning



percentage is the best of any Bruin coach and ranks in the top 30 among active coaches in Division III with 5 or more years experience. On March 14 last spring, in a 12-6 home win over Vanguard, he surpassed current Oregon State head coach Pat Casey as the all-time Bruin leader in coaching wins with his 172nd victory.

George Fox teams have won 4 NWC championships in Bailey's 7 seasons, including the 2002 title when the Bruins went 16-7 in league play, winning a tight 4-team race and earning Bailey his 4th conference Coach of the Year honor. The Bruins advanced to the NCAA Midwest Regional, where they went 1-2 to finish with an overall 27-15 record.

The Bruins were NWC runners-up in 1996 and 1998, champions in 1997 and 2000, and co-champions in 1999. In 2000, their first year of NCAA eligibility, the Bruins advanced to the NCAA Division III West Regional and earned the regional's No. 1 seed.

The Northwest Conference also honored Bailey as its Coach of the Year in 1997 and 2000, and in 1999 he was Co-Coach of

the Year with Linfield's Scott Carnahan as the 2 rivals shared the league crown.

Under Bailey's leadership, the Bruins have developed a reputation as a team that only gets better as the season progresses. As evidence of this, in the final 15 games in each of his 7 seasons at George Fox, the Bruins have gone anywhere from 10-5 to 14-1.

Many of Bailey's players have earned all-conference, all-district, all-region, and/or all-America recognition, including 8 members of last year's team. In 1999, 1st baseman Nate Barnett became his first NAIA First Team All-American, and in 2000, staff ace Ryan Alvis was named to the NCAA Division III All-America Third Team. Designated hitter Eric Bell was a College Division First Team Academic All-American last year.

Bailey took over the Bruin program immediately after guiding West Linn High School into the Oregon Class 4A state championship game in 1995. At West Linn, his teams advanced to the Class 4A state playoffs 7 times, and in his final season were edged 2-1 in the 1995 state championship game.

Four times Bailey was named Three Rivers League Coach of the Year while at West Linn, where he served for 10 years as head baseball

coach and assistant football coach. His baseball teams won 5 league titles and reached the Oregon semifinals in 1989, 1991, and 1995. From 1989 to 1995, his combined record as a high school and American Legion coach was 315-105 (.750).

Prior to West Linn, Bailey taught and coached at Willamette High School in Eugene, Ore., for 3 years. He has worked at various baseball camps and served as a pitching coach at the University of Portland in 1992.

"George Fox really matches up with me personality-wise and philosophically," says Bailey. "As a coach, I want to make sure every kid is making the most of his God-given talent. I want them to be a class act in the classroom and the community. I want the kids to match the school and my personality. I stress to my team that we're a family. Family members are more important than themselves. If you're going to be a leader, you must be a servant first."

Bailey is a 1974 graduate of Moscow High School in Idaho, where he played football, basketball, and was the baseball team's MVP. He earned 2 letters in baseball at North Idaho College in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, then 2 more as a starting outfielder and team captain during his senior season at the

University of Idaho. He continued playing semiprofessionally until age 28.

In 1978, Bailey completed his business education degree, and earned a master of education degree in educational administration at the University of Oregon in 1983.

At West Linn, Bailey was also a business instructor, and in 1994 was named to Who's Who Among America's Outstanding High School Teachers. In 1995, he was one of 30 outstanding educators honored with a 1995 Education Excellence Award, given by Associated Oregon Industries.

At George Fox, Bailey is also associate director of athletics, chair of the school's Sports Hall of Fame Committee, and a teacher in the Department of Business and Economics.

Bailey and his wife, Susan, live in Newberg with their children, Alex, 19, a freshman on this year's Bruin baseball team, and Ann, 16.

Coaches

33 Mike Thompson

Assistant Head Coach • 3rd Season

Former NAIA All-American outfielder Mike Thompson has a major responsibility in assisting head coach Pat Bailey with hitting instruction for Bruin batters.

Thompson, a native of Bellevue, Wash., first came to George Fox after 2 years at Edmonds (Wash.) Community College. He was an Honorable Mention All-American center fielder during his

junior year in 1994 under former coach Pat Casey, now the head coach at Oregon State, but missed the 1995 season with a medical redshirt year. As a senior in 1996 in Bailey's first year as coach, he earned All-Northwest Conference honors. He graduated in 1996 with a B.S. in fitness management.

After leaving George Fox, Thompson coached at Inglesmoor High School in Bothell, Wash., for 2 years, and also coached American Legion ball. He now works for the Newberg School District as a behavior intervention specialist.

Thompson is married to former George Fox athlete Liz Stevens, a former NAIA All-American in the 400 hurdles and an All-Conference basketball player in 1996 and now a firefighter in the Portland area. The Thompsons reside in Dayton, Oregon.

6 Marty Hunter

Assistant Coach, Infield • 1st Season

After a stellar high school coaching career, Marty Hunter joins the George Fox baseball staff this year to give college coaching a whirl, with his primary focus on the infielders.

Hunter comes to Newberg from Canby, Ore., where he guided the Canby High program to a 132-63 record from 1995-2002. His teams made the state 4A playoffs every year, and won Pacific 9 Conference titles in 1997, 1998, and 2002. He was Conference Coach of the Year in '97, '98, '01, and '02.

Prior to his stint at Canby, Hunter coached Bend (Ore.) High from 1991-94, going 68-40. Bend won the Intermountain Conference championships in 1991 and 1992, and he was named Coach of the Year in the conference both seasons. While working at Bend from 1987-94, he also had the opportunity to serve as an assistant coach with the Bend Bucks, a team in the professional Class A Northwest League, in 1990.

A graduate of Gresham (Ore.) High School, he attended

Linfield College, where he earned 2 letters as a football cornerback and 3 as 2nd baseman and catcher on the baseball team. He earned his degree from Linfield in 1984, then worked at Gladstone, Gresham, and West Albany High Schools before landing in Bend.

Hunter and his wife of 17 years, Kim, have 2 sons: Taylor, 14, and Tucker, 11. The Hunters reside in Canby.

34 J.R. (Jim) Reichenbach

Assistant Coach, Outfield • 6th Season

Jim Reichenbach assisted at George Fox from 1997-2000, and then took a year off before returning last year.

Reichenbach was a 2-time all-city selection at Cleveland High School in Portland, Ore., setting the school career RBI record with 53. He graduated in 1987 and then played at Portland State University for 2 seasons.

As a coach, Reichenbach has experience at Cleveland High and with Newberg's American Legion and Babe Ruth teams.

Reichenbach works with Jugs Inc., the pitching machine company in Tualatin that sponsors the annual Jugs Baseball Spring Classic. He and his wife, Diane, have 4 children: Katrina, Nathaniel, Andrew, and Natasha. They reside in Newberg.

20 Mike Shear

Assistant Coach, Pitching • 2nd Season

Former George Fox pitcher returned to his alma mater last season to take over duties as the pitching coach.

Shear knows what it takes to be a winner, having become one at George Fox. During his 4-year career with the Bruins (1996-99), the right-hander blossomed into a consistent winner, going 4-2 as a junior and 6-0 as a senior while working as a spot starter and middle reliever. In 1999, he also posted a 4.01 earned run average and struck out 30 in 42.2 innings, appearing in 17 ballgames and earning Honorable Mention All-Northwest Conference honors. In his career, he was 11-5 with a save and 71 strikeouts.

Shear was a Second Team All-Sky Em League selection as a senior at Junction City (Ore.) High and the team's Most Inspirational Player.

Curtis and Margaret Morse Complex



Since 1989, George Fox University soccer, baseball, and softball teams have called the Curtis and Margaret Morse Athletic Fields home, with 3 separate fields for each venue.

Located on the northeast section of the campus at the corner of Fulton Street and Villa Road and across Fulton from the Wheeler Sports Center, the complex was renovated using a major donation from Curtis and Margaret Morse, avid supporters of Bruin athletics. The Morse family has long been associated with George Fox, as 4 generations of the family have

attended the Newberg school.

All 3 Morse fields are natural-grass surfaces. The soccer field, home to both the men's and women's soccer teams, has temporary bleachers scattered around the field for seating up to 250 spectators, with plenty of standing room along the sidelines and end lines as well. An electronic scoreboard is located in the south-east corner.

The baseball field has temporary bleachers for 250 and a full-scale electronic scoreboard in right field. Directly behind home plate is a 2-story service building with a concession stand and a large storage room on the ground floor, with a press box located on the second floor. The field measures 340 feet down the left field line, 375 feet to the left field power alley, 400 feet to dead center, 370 feet to the alley in right, and 335 feet down the line in right. The outfield fence is chain-link and stands 6 feet high.

The softball field, which has an all-dirt infield, has seating for 100 fans and an electronic scoreboard beyond the left-field fence. The outfield wall, which is a chain-link fence, measures 6 feet high and is 205 feet down the left field line, 200 feet down the right field line, and 200 feet to straightaway center.

Why the "Bruins"?

GFU's nickname is derived from an unruly pet, and battles over its symbolic remains continue to this day

George Fox University's Bruin nickname comes from a real bear captured in 1887, just 2 years after Pacific Academy (the university's predecessor) was established. The small cub was found in the Coast Range foothills near Carlton, Ore., about 15 miles west of Newberg, after its mother had been shot. The young cub was brought to the campus by a student and later lived with a faculty member.

When the bear grew to adulthood, it was kept in a pit in Hess Creek canyon south of the campus. It escaped one too many times, however, and was turned into steak for the dining table, while the hide was preserved on a frame and displayed in an early campus museum. When the hide deteriorated several years later, it was taken to

a campus furnace room to be destroyed, but the framework proved a problem in dismantling, so it was left sitting in a corner.

Students later found the old bearskin and began skirmishes over ownership, a tradition that continues today, even though the original is long gone. "Bruin Junior," a replica, is fought over periodically in class competition under a set of guidelines passed down for years, with the class that is able to physically drag the Bruin replica off campus declared the rightful owner until the next time it is "flashed" on campus.

Even with the long Bruin tradition, the "Quaker" tag for athletic teams came into popularity with sportswriters during the 1950s and 1960s because of

the school's affiliation with the Friends denomination. That nickname, along with a mascot named "Foxy George," a little fox with a Quaker hat, was used for a while until a vote of faculty, students, and administration in 1970 reinstated the Bruin nickname to its rightful place.

Support Staff

Craig Taylor*Athletics Director*

Craig Taylor is in his 15th year as the director of athletics at George Fox, but has been associated with the Bruins for 29 years as player, coach, and professor. He came to George Fox in 1971 as a junior forward for the men's basketball team, and during the 1972-73 season, he helped the Bruins to their first-ever NAIA District 2 title.



Taylor graduated from George Fox in 1974, receiving honors as the Outstanding Man in Teacher Education and Outstanding Physical Education Major. He received a master of science degree in education from Linfield College in 1975. While enrolled in graduate courses, he was a George Fox residence hall director.

From 1974 to '79, Taylor was the Bruins baseball coach, posting a 47-91 record in 6 seasons, while also serving as assistant basketball coach. He worked at a sporting goods retailing firm in 1979 to '81, but returned to George Fox as coach of the women's bas-

ketball team from 1981 to '93, producing a 12-year record of 162-155. He also coached the softball team from 1981 to '88 and again in 1990, compiling a 77-99-1 record in 9 seasons. In 1985 he was named NAIA District 2 Softball Coach of the Year.

Taylor, 51, is responsible for all athletics department functions, including eligibility and compliance with George Fox, Northwest Conference, and NCAA regulations, budgeting, and department and sports center management. In 1992, he was named NAIA District 2 Administrator of the Year.

Taylor and his wife, Kathy, live in McMinnville and have 3 children: Leah, 28; Bree, 23, a 2001 George Fox graduate who played volleyball for the Bruins; and Casey, 13.

Pat Bailey*Associate Athletics Director*

Pat Bailey begins his 8th year as George Fox's baseball coach and 5th year as associate director of athletics, with primary responsibility for all athletics fund-raising.

Bailey is also director of the Bruin Club, George Fox's athletics booster organization, chairs the Sports Hall of Fame Selection Committee, and assists in game management for fall and winter sports. His baseball teams have compiled a 191-97 record, making him the winningest coach in Bruin diamond history, and have won or tied for 4 Northwest Conference titles. He earned NWC Coach of the Year honors in 1997, 1999, 2000, and 2002.



Bailey lives in Newberg with his wife, Susan; son Alex, 19, who will play baseball for his father at George Fox this year; and daughter Ann, 16.

Patty Findley*Athletics Department Secretary*

Patty Findley has worked at George Fox for the past 18 years, the last 5 as the athletics department secretary. She is responsible for all aspects of

2002 Review

Pitcher Perfect

A pitching-fueled NWC title, a regional NCAA tournament berth, and an odd record chase made the Bruin's 2002 diamond season sparkle

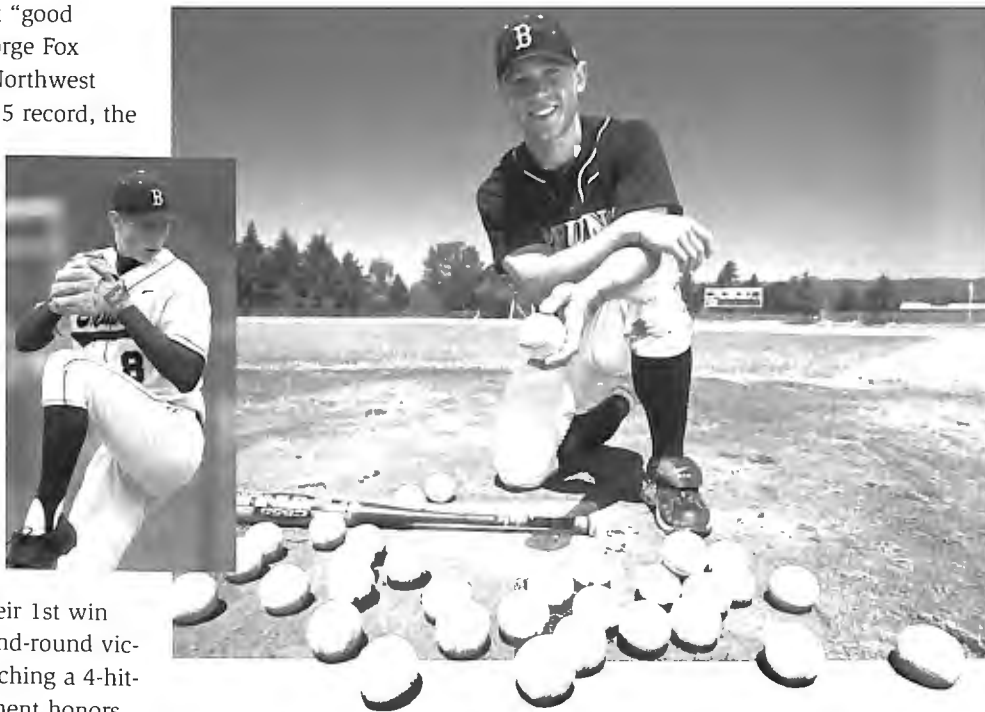
Proving once again the old axiom that "good pitching beats good hitting," the George Fox Bruins rode a pitching staff that led the Northwest Conference in several categories to a 27-15 record, the conference title at 16-7, and 4th place in the NCAA Division III Midwest Regional Tournament, the Bruins' 2nd playoff appearance in 3 years.

As a staff, Bruin pitchers posted an earned run average of 4.30, more than a run-per-game better than anyone else in the conference. That difference was a critical factor in the final standings, as the Bruins squeaked through in a down-to-the-wire race that saw 4 teams (George Fox, Whitworth, Pacific, and Linfield) finish within a game-and-a-half of each other. In the Midwest Regional, the Bruins notched their 1st win ever in regional competition with a 7-1 2nd-round victory over Blackburn (Ill.), Cory Dixon pitching a 4-hitter with 11 strikeouts to earn All-Tournament honors.

Winning the conference championship secured for head coach Pat Bailey the NWC Coach of the Year award, the 4th such honor for him in 7 years. His overall record with the Bruins stands at 191-97 (.663). He became the winningest baseball coach in Bruin history with his 172nd win, a 12-6 victory over Vanguard on March 14, surpassing current Oregon State head coach Pat Casey.

Highlighting the season's individual performances was an unusual record chase by senior 2nd baseman Ryan Dearing of Vancouver, Wash., who set an NCAA Division III single-season record by getting hit with a pitch 33 times. He hit .346 with 7 home runs and 45 RBIs, earning First Team All-Conference honors for the 2nd year in a row. Junior designated hitter Eric Bell also repeated as an All-Conference First Team selection, batting .377 with 10 home runs and 49 RBIs. Senior center fielder Travis Maffey was First Team All-Conference with a .344 average, 11 doubles, 36 runs and 7 stolen bases.

On the mound, freshman right-hander Scott Hyde of Grants Pass, Ore., earned All-NWC First Team honors with a 7-3

record and 88 strikeouts. Southpaw Dixon, a sophomore from Springfield, Ore., was also First Team All-NWC, going 7-5 with a league-leading 3.02 ERA.

Three other Bruins were Honorable Mention All-Conference: senior 1st baseman Kyle Langeliers of Pleasant Hill, Ore. (.353, 8 home runs, 41 RBIs), junior 3rd baseman Kevin Tucker of Forest Grove, Ore. (.331, 13 doubles), and senior shortstop Paul Gramenz of Sequim, Wash. (.252, 5 home runs). Sophomore left fielder Stephen Donohue of Gresham, Ore., hit .331 and led the league with 21 stolen bases.

Bell was named to the All-West Region Second Team and Dearing was a Third Team selection. Each earned Verizon Academic All-District VIII (West Region) First Team honors, while Bell went on to be Academic All-America First Team.

George Fox offers unique programs to its students. Every incoming freshman is given a computer to use and keep upon graduation. When students reach their 3rd year, they are eligible for the Juniors Abroad program, in

which the university pays transportation costs for an overseas study tour.

The school's history began in 1885, when Willamette Valley Quaker settlers established Pacific Academy. It was during those early days that George Fox's most prominent alumnus — Herbert Hoover, who later became the 31st president of the United States — attended the school.

The college division was organized in 1891 to provide more advanced instruction, and the name was changed to Pacific College. In 1949, because of the many schools in the West with "Pacific" in their titles, another change was made, this time to George Fox College, honoring the founder of the Friends (Quaker) church.

In 1996, with the addition of Western Evangelical Seminary, George Fox became a university, offering students a Christ-centered education and the choice of more than 40 undergraduate majors and 12 graduate degrees. On Jan. 1, 2000, the seminary was renamed George Fox Evangelical Seminary.

George Fox is located in Newberg, Oregon (pop. 18,280), 25 miles southwest of Portland, the state's largest metropolitan center of 1.7 million, and 32 miles north of Salem, the state capital.

University President:

H. David Brandt

David Brandt, George Fox University's 11th president, came to the university in August 1998 after 3 years as president of Tabor College in Hillsboro, Kan.

Brandt has experience at 4 other Christian colleges and describes himself as "a 'lifer' in Christian higher education." He has been vice president and provost at Bethel College in St. Paul, Minn.; dean and vice president for academic affairs at Messiah College in Grantham, Pa.; a physics instructor and

chairman of the Division of Natural Science and Mathematics at Gordon College in Wenham, Mass.; and a physics instructor at Wheaton (Ill.) College.

Brandt did his undergraduate work in physics at Wheaton. He earned a master of science degree in physics in 1962 and a doctorate in physics in 1971, both at the University of Oklahoma.

Brandt taught physics 1962-63 at the



University of Omaha in Nebraska; was a demonstrator in physics at Brock University in St. Catharines, Ontario, Canada, 1968-69; was an engineer at Raytheon Co. in Sudbury, Mass., between 1972 and 1974; and

was a consulting engineer for International Telephone and Telegraph Corp. in Roanoke, Va., between 1975 and 1977. His research there on fiber optics resulted in 2 patent applications.



George Fox University Bruin Athletics



Intercollegiate athletics are an important part of George Fox University, home to one of the Northwest's most successful small-college sports programs. Winning programs, of course, are accompanied by a proper balance between academics and athletics. Accordingly, George Fox teams are members of the Northwest Conference and compete in Division III of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, in which need and academic ability, not athleticism, determine scholarships and financial aid.

At George Fox University, student-athletes compete for conference and national titles at a Christ-centered university where professors and coaches help them grow in mind, body, and

spirit. Intercollegiate athletics competition provides for practical application of what is learned in the classroom and at practice. At George Fox, the values of athletics are integrated with the goals of Christian higher education in a process that includes

- Physical conditioning
- Managing emotions
- Courage
- Teamwork
- Cooperation
- Graciousness in winning and losing

The university fields teams in 13 varsity sports, 7 for women (volleyball, soccer, cross country, basketball, softball, tennis, and track and

field) and 6 for men (soccer, cross country, basketball, baseball, tennis, and track and field). More than 15 percent of George Fox's traditional undergraduate students participate in these sports. Their records over the years serve as shining testimonies to the administration's conviction that an institution can play for the glory of God, follow the rules and ethics of its governing organizations, and be successful on the fields and courts of competition at the same time. Consider the growing legacy:

- George Fox has earned district or conference titles 15 times in 8 different sports during the last decade.
- George Fox athletes have earned more than 300 All-America and All-America Scholar-Athlete honors.
- Seven of the 11 coaches on staff have been named Coach of the Year at various levels a total of 35 times.
- George Fox coaches have held their positions for an average of almost 9 years, and together have accumulated more than 1,300 collegiate wins.
