MINUTES of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends 1945

1. Safely through another year God has brought Oregon Yearly Meeting on its way. Let us now a blessing seek for the fifty-third session of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends which convened June 5, 1945, at 9:30 a. m. at Newberg, Oregon.

2. The message: "Speak, Lord; for thy servant heareth" sounded the keynote for the Yearly Meeting. Earnest prayers were offered by Mary Moore and Gervas A. Carey after which the Presiding Clerk brought a message based on the text: "Be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might."

3. The Presiding Clerk reported that we had received permission from the government to hold the Yearly Meeting.

Appreciation for the presence of these Friends was expressed by various members of the congregation.

9. Marjorie Votaw, Bertha Haworth and Helen Willcuts were named as a committee to prepare returning minutes.

10. The Presiding Clerk gave the following instructions to the representatives:

1. To propose to the next session of the meeting names of persons to serve as Presiding Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Recording Clerk, Assistant Recording Clerk, and Announcing Clerk.
2. To determine a ratio for raising funds.
3. To propose funds to be raised for church work, and to nominate a Friend to serve as Treasurer for the ensuing year.

4. To propose the name of one person in each Quarterly meeting to receive and distribute documents.

5. To propose names of persons to serve on the Printing Committee.

11. Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting and Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting submit the following recommendation to Oregon Yearly Meeting:

1. That the Idaho constituency be represented on the College Board of Pacific College by three members instead of one as at present. The Idaho Quarterly Meetings make up at least one-third of the membership of Oregon Yearly Meeting and since we are supporting the college financially and by sending our students there we feel we should be thus represented on the board.

This was referred to the representatives.

12. Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting recommended that the names of the College Board be printed in the Yearly Meeting Minutes. This was approved by the Yearly Meeting.

13. Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting recommended that the names of Quarterly Meeting treasurers be printed in the minutes. The Yearly Meeting approved this proposition.

14. Portland Quarterly Meeting sent in the proposition that Yearly Meeting should always be held on the second Tuesday in June. This was referred to the representatives.

15. The reports of the State of the Church in the various Quarterly Meetings were read and the Recording Clerk was asked to prepare a summary of these, which appears below:

Report of the State of the Church from various Quarterly Meetings—A summary:

All meetings for worship and business are reported as held regularly. In some places the evening services are not so well attended and two meetings do not have any evening service. Some regret a lack of interest in the mid-week prayer meetings.

The spirit of love and unity seems to prevail. One meeting regrets that some are not careful of the reputation of others.

Some members because of the rush of the war world are too interested in the affairs of the present life. Other meetings report an increased interest in spiritual life.

Many families have regular family worship but some of the meetings regret that there is a neglect along this line.

Care for the proper education and spiritual guidance of the

children are concerns of the parents. They are distressed about the many allurements that draw their children from the paths of rectitude.

There is a little use of tobacco and liquor and some attendance at questionable places of amusement, but in general the membership is free from such harmful practices.

Most meetings feel as if the members are conscientious in the matter of peace. Several meetings emphasize the peace message and have given programs. Some of the young men are in C.P.S. camps, some in non-combatant service and some in military service. Some meetings feel as if the church has failed somewhat in upholding the principles of peace.

Considerable interest has been shown in missionary work. There have been talks, study groups, and prayer bands in the interest of missions.

A number of series of evangelistic services have been held which have been of help in the spiritual condition of the meetings.

Friends seek earnestly to keep the church in a good spiritual condition and uphold the standards as set forth in the Discipline.

A number of members spoke of their concerns for the church and were glad for the frankness of these reports.

16. A cablegram was received from London Yearly Meeting in which greetings were sent to Oregon Yearly Meeting with the statement that Howard Adams was present at the sessions and "We are trusting God's blessing in building a new world."

17. Roy Clark led the congregation in the singing of various hymns. After this John Trachsel brought the inspirational message on the power of the Holy Spirit. He gives power to preach, to reveal Christ, to win converts and give discernment.

When we review the reports that have come in we are pleased with the many and varied activities in the meetings in the interests of good reading matter. We wish we might have able to mention many of these in more detail.

Many of our meetings have given liberally to such organizations as The Gideons, The American Bible Society and our own Publication Board. Several meetings have sent extra Sunday School supplies and printed matter to our outposts.

Two meetings report having distributed generous quantities of the devotional quarterly The Upper Room to people who greatly appreciated such reading matter. Others gave annual subscriptions to good periodicals to people in need of such.

Helpful parish papers and news letters have been sent out locally and over the Yearly Meeting by at least three meetings. Weekly church bulletins have been issued by a large number of the churches.

The needs of our service men for good reading material has not been overlooked. Some churches have given either Bibles or Testaments to all the boys as they entered the service. One meeting is reported to have given \$20 to buy devotional books for the men in the service.

Herman H. Macy, Superintendent

This report was accepted with the privilege of adding the data from the reports which are not now in.

Lloyd S. Cressman, pastor of Newberg Monthly Meeting, brought the address for the Literature Department. He said that fathers and mothers need to keep their eyes open to good books and publications that will add to the religious life of their children.

There is a great need for abbreviated pamphlets on Friends'

beliefs and customs. They should be put out in an attractive way and should meet a standard of literary excellence. The controversial approach should be avoided.

He suggested a plan whereby the pastors might have a revolving library.

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

20. The Superintendent of this Department, Edward Harmon, presented the following report which was acceptable to the meeting:

This report covers only four Quarterly meetings. The stewardship department conducted a self-denial thanksgiving month. The money raised went to the funds of Aged Ministers and Missionaries.

The 10% club was a real success in the churches that worked. One church gained 12 new tithers through it.

Some of the Quarterly Meeting Superintendents and Monthly Meeting chairmen have worked hard and their meetings show a good increase in the number of tithers. Your Yearly Meeting Superintendent visited four Quarterly Meetings and spoke in several of the Monthly Meetings.

Edward F. Harmon, Superintendent

His request to be allowed to add the reports of the other Quarterly Meetings if they come in in time was granted.

The Nominating Committee presents the name of Edward F. Harmon as Yearly Meeting Superintendent of Christian Stewardship.

This was approved by the meeting.

21. A communication was received from California Yearly Meeting of Friends in which was expressed their appreciation of the acceptable services of Joseph G. Reece who was in attendance at their Yearly Meeting last year.

22. Letters from Senators and Representatives were read which were written in reply to letters sent them last year in regard to conscription.

The subject of conscription is still a very live one.

The members of the meeting are asked to write to

their representatives and senators protesting Peacetime Conscription.

The names of the congressmen from Oregon are already posted. J. Allen Dunbar is asked to prepare and post those from Idaho and A. Clark Smith those from Washington.

The clerk is asked to prepare and send a telegram to Clifton A. Woodrum, chairman of the committee on Post War Military Policy, protesting against Peacetime Conscription.

23. A letter was read from Governor Earl Snell in reply to the Resolutions sent him last year.

24. The federal broadcasting commission reported that letters should be sent to the individual broadcasting stations in regard to the religious programs on the air.

Kenneth Eichenberger, Frederick B. Baker, and A. Clark Smith were appointed as a committee to write to the Mutual Broadcasting Company urging them to retain the religious programs that they now have and continue religious programs.

25. The representatives from Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting request that the vacancy on the Yearly Meeting Nominating Committee created by the absence of Genevieve Armstrong of Boise Valley be filled by Carol Lee.

This request was approved by the meeting.

26. The representatives made the following reports:

The matter of determining ratios for raising funds and to propose funds to be raised for church work and to nominate a Friend to serve as treasurer for the ensuing year were referred to the finance committee.

We propose the names of the following persons to receive and distribute documents: Newberg—Joseph McCracken, Salem—Clifton Ross, Boise Valley—Raymond Haworth, Portland—Emmor Hall, Tacoma—Robert Pierson, Greenleaf—J. Allen Dunbar.

We also nominate the following to serve on the printing committee: Gervas A. Carey, Mary C. Sutton, Joseph G. Reece, Robert Morrill, and Sophia Townsend.

The representatives recommend that the Yearly Meeting Nominating Committee be given the same privileges in the dining hall as those enjoyed by the representatives from Idaho and Washington.

28. After a period of devotion the minutes were read and corrected.

29. Gervas A. Carey presented the following telegram that he had prepared to send to Clifton A. Woodrum, chairman of the Committee on Post-War Military Policy:

Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends in session, Newberg, Oregon, expresses opposition proposed peacetime military conscription. We believe preparation for war leads to war, that traditional freedom within American way of life has made great contribution to development strength and resourcefulness of our youth. German and Japanese militarism confirm our convictions.

The meeting approved of it.

30. A minute for Robert J. Leach from Providence Monthly Meeting of Friends, Media, Pennsylvania, was read.

He was welcomed by the meeting.

32. The Discipline Revision Committee made the following report:

CHANGES IN THE PROPOSED NEW DISCIPLINE

A statement has been incorporated into the paragraph on Activities and Progress in the Northwest (pages 2 and 3) regarding the establishment of Pacific Friends Academy, Pacific College, and Greenleaf Academy. Under Boards and Committees (page 8, C, 1) the term of office of trustees has been indicated as three years. The statement concerning membership in the local meeting on ministry and oversight has been changed to include all ministers, as heretofore (page 8, C, 3, and page 22, II, A, 1). The method of appointing nominating committees has been left to the discretion of the meetings appointing them (page 9, C, 4, and page 10, B, 1). The statements calling for the issuing each year to ministers in good standing of certificates stating their relation to the church have been eliminated (page 12, B, 9, and page 19, 7).

In those paragraphs relating to the organization of the Yearly Meeting boards these changes have been made: The combined board of missions and evangelism has been eliminated, and instead a board of evangelism and separate board of missions have been substituted (page 13, D, 2, a, and page 33).

The board of service has been divided, with the departments of community, national, and world service only being grouped together under that name (page 14, c, and page 34). The remaining departments—public morals, stewardship, peace, literature, and education—have been grouped to form a new board, the board of public relations. All boards have been reduced in size, except the board of publication. Thus there would be six boards with membership of twelve each, and one board with six members.

The paragraph concerning the final act of recording a minister (page 18,A,9) has been changed to give the Yearly Meeting, rather than the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight, authority for this final act. The latter body is to recommend to the Yearly Meeting, rather than do the recording itself. The paragraph concerning the termination of the pastoral relation (page 18,B,2) has been altered to provide for an understanding in writing between the pastor and the monthly meeting as to the length of his service, whether one year, a specified term of years, or an indefinite period. Under the appointment of elders (page 21,D) a sentence has been inserted to encourage the meetings to bring in younger members, and the provision requiring the approval of the quarterly meeting on ministry and oversight before the monthly meeting appointment is final has been removed.

The statement restricting the holding of offices by affiliate members (page 26, 7) has been changed to read thus: "they may hold offices in the meeting, except those of minister, elder, overseer, presiding clerk, and trustee." The final act of deposing a minister has been shifted to the Yearly Meeting body (page 27, II, I, 3). The substance of the Yearly Meeting action in 1932 on the subject of divorce has been incorporated in the paragraph on that subject (page 29).

Query 6, in the part relating to peace and war, has been changed to read as follows: "Do you maintain the Christian principle of peace and consistently strive to demonstrate that Christian love and good will are more effective in settling personal and international difficulties than the use of armed force?" (page 30)

Changes have been made in the paragraphs which relate to the duties of the monthly meeting committees in connection with the various Yearly Meeting boards. The committees which have several types of work to care for are to nominate to the monthly meeting, rather than themselves appoint, persons to head up these departments. (page 34, 3 and 35, 3). The paragraph on the time and place of yearly meeting sessions has been altered to provide for opening annually on the second Tuesday in June (page 36, top). Under the entertainment of representatives (page 37, 7) the more remote quarterly meetings have been named—Boise Valley, Greenleaf, and Tacoma. A place has been left at the end of the appendix for a suggested form of marriage ceremony in accordance with the custom of early Friends.

This was referred back to the committee to secure mimeographed copies of the proposed changes with the recommendation that written suggestions for further correction be handed to the chairman of the Discipline Revision Committee by noon Friday.

It was decided that this matter should be considered as the first item of business Saturday morning.

WOMEN'S HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONARY UNION OF OREGON YEARLY MEETING

33. Florence Snow, the president of the organization, presided and presented the following program:

Solo by Elenita Bales—"He Was Not Willing".

An account of the Idaho Conference by Orpha Larrance.

Literature Superintendent's report by Carol Lee, assisted by Bernice McGill, Lela Morrill, and Lura Gulley.

A report on the Devotional Division by Marie Haines.

After the program the following report was read by the president and accepted by the meeting:

The Women's Union is closing its fourth year of organized effort. We praise the Lord for the growth in numbers, and interest that has been manifested the past year. Thirty reports were sent in to the Yearly Meeting Union.

A rally day was held in Boise Valley, Greenleaf, Portland, and Tacoma Quarterly Meetings. The blessing of the Lord was manifested at all of these special days of prayer and inspiration, as we heard the needs of the fields, listened to special songs, saw clever skits presented, and learned of new books to be read. Joseph Reece, Walter Lee, Arthur Schnesse of Honduras, Charles Haworth, and Frank Davies were speakers at the Idaho meeting, while Melva Baker, and Vercia Cox, missionary from China, spoke at the Portland rally. Pearl Reece and Florence Snow brought the needs of the foreign and home work at Tacoma Quarterly Meeting.

A devotional book "Along the Highway of Prayer" was sent to each Union by our Devotional Chairman, Marie Haines. Some Unions have a prayer circle, while all have times of devotion and prayer at the regular meeting.

The outpost workers' needs were learned by the Home Project chairman, Melva Baker, and a generous response was made to these needs by our Unions.

Carol Lee sent to each group a suggestive list of books to be studied. Almost every Union had a study time or circulated Missionary books among their members.

The main foreign project for the year was the Dining room and Sunday School class rooms for the La Paz church. We are very happy to report that the money, \$593.21, for this project has been raised. We thank the Lord for this, and for the good year He has given us.

BOARD FOR AGED MINISTERS AND MISSIONARIES

34. Dillon Mills, president of the Board, read the following report:

The Board for Aged Ministers and Missionaries has continued its work this year with Dorwin Smith as Executive Secretary. Through his efforts those ministers participating in the retirement plan have been kept informed of the time of their payments. The new pastors in the Yearly Meeting have also been made acquainted with the opportunities of this plan.

A greater interest was created in this work throughout the Yearly Meeting with the giving of the self denial offering for the use of this Board. \$402.44 was collected in this way. It was divided equally between the Ministers Retirement fund and the Ministers Aid fund.

Our contribution of \$10.00 each per month to Ida J. Lee and Marietta Cope has continued.

The Board is continuing its efforts to create a retirement fund sufficient to give proper aid to our ministers and missionaries on their retirement.

Any gifts or bequests for this purpose will be thankfully received.

REMARKS ON PUBLIC MORALS

An analysis of the reports from the Monthly and Quarterly Meeting indicates an active interest in Public Morals. Camas sent the "National Voice" to 5 homes, and Boise Valley gave each of their 5 pastors a subscription to "Foundations Says".

The Camas pastor is chairman of the Temperance work in the City Ministerial Association, and is one of the promoters of the Advertising Campaign against the liquor industry carried on by the people of the vicinity.

Homedale reports two members of the Church elected to the city council, thus causing consternation to the beer venders. That meeting has run paid articles on scientific temperance instruction in the local paper. From this church comes a recommendation that debates, essays, and plays stressing Public Morals be sponsored by this department. Also, the lack of temperance teaching material in Sunday School helps, is called to the attention of the Bible School Department.

Newberg reports that in two of their meetings, Sunday School classes take turns in presenting temperance instruction before the whole school. They also report placing copies of "The Amazing Story of Repeal", by Dobyms and "Wrecking the 18th Amendment", by Ernest Gordon, in the public library and that they keep a supply of temperance literature in the stage depot.

South Salem people have used the local papers for publicity purposes, and attended meetings of the city council to protest the issuance of liquor licenses.

Two public school teachers of the Woodland Meeting have been active in giving temperance instruction in their schools.

In Matthew 7:16 and 19 we read "Ye shall know them by their fruits. Do men gather grapes of thorns or figs of thistles? Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down and cast into the fire." This refers to breweries, distilleries, gambling plants, and every other establishment that produces bad fruit. And if "cutting them down", "rooting them up", and "casting them into the fire" is not Prohibition, what would it be?

Nehemiah 4:14 tells us when the hostile nations surrounding Jerusalem joined to stop the work of rebuilding the walls, Nehemiah looked and rose up and said unto the nobles and to the rulers, and to the rest of the people, "Be not afraid of them, remember the Lord, which is great and terrible, and fight for your brethren, your sons, and your daughters, your wives, and your houses." The church of Christ should adopt this verse as its battle cry and drive the devastating, soul and body destroying traffic from our land.

"Constant dripping wears away the stone. You can't make men good by law," says the critic of reform. Yes, men can be made good by law. They can be made good by education. They can be made good by suggestion. They can be made good by conversion—and this is the best method of all.

This was approved by the meeting.

Pertinent remarks were made by various members.

BIBLE SCHOOL AND PUBLICATION BOARD

40. Earl Barker read the following report:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends:

As your committee appointed a year ago to confer with representatives from Kansas and Ohio Yearly Meetings on the matter of cooperation in the publication of Friends Sunday School literature, we wish to present the following report and recommendations:

The six representatives met at Wichita, Kansas, August 30 and 31, 1944, with a sense of humble dependence on God and an earnest desire to take such action as might contribute to the spiritual welfare of many. Richard Wiles and Lee Stevens were present to represent Kansas Yearly Meeting; Byron Osborne and Robert Mosher represented Ohio Yearly Meeting.

Richard Wiles was chosen as chairman, and Adelaide Barker as secretary. The business of the committee was carried on in the YMCA through the morning, afternoon, and evening of the 30th and the morning and afternoon of the 31st. The expense of your representatives was \$200; a voluntary contribution from the Kansas delegation of \$60 reduces the net expense to \$140.

The following recommendations were adopted for presentation to the three yearly meetings:

1. That a joint publication board be formed, composed of two members of each yearly meeting, these members to be appointed for terms of two years with terms expiring in alternate years.
2. That this board be called the Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends.
3. That a series of Bible school literature based on the international uniform lessons and adapted to at least four age groups be published.
4. That the yearly meetings be requested to subsidize the publication board in the amount of \$5000, \$2500 a year for two years, apportioned on the basis of 38% from Kansas Yearly Meeting, 36% from Ohio Yearly Meeting, and 26% from Oregon Yearly Meeting. These amounts are \$1900 from Kansas, \$1800 from Ohio, and \$1300 from Oregon (\$650 a year for two years.) The board agrees to pay to the yearly meetings in the form of dividends such funds as become available, to the extent of the whole amounts contributed.

As your representatives we propose that these recommenda-

tions be adopted and the funds appropriated.

La Paz, March 31, 1945

Oregon Yearly Meeting,
Beloved Brethren in Christ:

In the name of the Yearly Meeting of La Paz, it is a pleasure to present to you our Christian greetings, desiring that the Lord bless you greatly in Spiritual things. Also with joy we share with you something of our annual conference which began March 28 and ended April 1.

God has blessed us with His presence from the daily prayer meeting at six o'clock in the morning, where He has permitted us to see many souls seeking salvation and holiness, until the night meeting which ended in the same way.

The number in attendance this year has been better than formerly and with more enthusiasm, for which we give thanks to the Lord. As is customary the pastors and workers, as well as the representatives from the country were here from the beginning until the last day. In doing this we dedicated ourselves to preparing our plans for the coming year.

The other services, the intermediate, the youth and the adult work, and the different programs and reports, have been developed with the blessing and help of God, especially the reports concerning the Churches, the trips and the offerings.

We have noticed that the Meetings is composed of a goodly number of the inhabitants of the seven districts: La Paz, Amacari, Corocoro, Pongon Huyo, Mina Fabulosa, Puerto Perez and Pucarani. There were many members from various other fields.

The very well attended meetings every day and the altar services have been with much power in which a large number of souls have obtained great victories. We have abundant reasons for giving thanks to God for all His blessings to His people.

It is to us a great joy to be at your command in the service of Him who has redeemed us with His blood.

We bid you farewell in the Lord.

48. The report of the statistical secretary was read and accepted and will appear in the Appendix.

It was requested that the list of active evangelists should appear in the report. This request was granted and the Evangelistic Board is asked to prepare such a list.

PEACE DEPARTMENT

49. Loyde Osburn, Superintendent of the Department, read the following report which was accepted by the meeting:

PEACE DEPARTMENT

Report for Year Ending April 30, 1945

By Loyde W. Osburn, Superintendent

A summary of the peace reports from twenty-seven meetings, including three outpost meetings, is as follows:

Number of committee meetings during the year: thirteen churches reported 30.

Number of sermons on peace: twenty churches reported 43, one "several", one stated that only a few sermons were specifically about peace but many had stressed the peace testimony, and four reported many sermons with peace emphasis.

Number of addresses on peace: 20 in seven churches.

Number of peace meetings other than regular church service: 15 in five churches. The Newberg church reported a special V-E Day service with messages dealing with problems of peace now confronting us. Topics of these messages were: The Anti-Christian Philosophy of the Nazis, Dangers of a Vindictive Peace, Reconstruction, and The Need for Religion.

In regard to peace education in Bible School, twelve churches reported using talks and reports in opening exercises, posters, literature, peace lessons, and in general teaching Christ's way of peaceful living. Reports from fifteen other churches gave no indication of peace education in the Bible School.

Seven meetings reported peace education in groups other than the regular Bible school. This included peace lessons in Christian Endeavor, a special service at mid-week prayer meeting, peace teachings in Daily Vacation Bible School, and talks to local civic organizations. The Medford Friends Church in cooperation with the Brethren Church sponsored a public meeting on conscription, with Emmett Gulley as the speaker.

The peace motto "Not to destroy men's lives, but to save them" was displayed by about 13 churches.

Eight churches have secured signers to the peace pledge. The reports seem to indicate that more than 40 persons signed during the year.

A total of 42 communications on behalf of peace were sent by eight churches. The individual members of one church sent 200, the members of another sent 100, and the members of ten others sent 123.

More than 2500 pieces of peace literature have been distributed. This material included Basis of Our Peace, The Terrible Meek, Position of the Society of Friends in Regard to War, Thou Shalt Not Kill, Christianity and Conscription, The Reporter, Washington Newsletter, The Conscientious Objector Under the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940, and several different pamphlets dealing with the problems of military conscription.

Peace periodicals received by members include: Fellowship, Peace Action, American Friend, Reporter, Washington Newsletter, Melvinonian, and CPS Newsletter.

The draft figures, from twenty-seven meetings which reported, total 197, of which 127 (or 64.5%) are in the armed services, 52 or (26.5%) are in non-combatant service, and 15 (or 9%) are in Civilian Public Service. (Possibly the report of the Service Committee will give a more accurate figure for the number of CPS men.)

Five C. O. kits were provided during the year.

In the matter of finances, the meetings reported approximately \$3400.00 contributed to Civilian Public Service and about \$900.00 expended through other channels for the cause of peace.

On his return from a Friends Peace Conference held at Richmond, Indiana, last fall, Emmett Gulley, Peace Superintendent of Newberg Quarterly Meeting, gave messages in some of our meetings regarding the dangers of peacetime military conscription and what Friends should do about it.

Your superintendent has endeavored to supply each meeting with literature and suggestions for peace action. Meetings have been urged to inform themselves regarding peace problems and to exert Christian influence in such matters as military conscription, military education in public schools, race problems, international relations, etc.

In general, my thesis has been that evangelism must be accompanied by peace education and training if we are to produce the type of Christian who will measure up to his Master's peace standards. Why are so many evangelized Quakers engaged in actual military service, in the production of warships, and in other war activities; and why are so many buying war bonds and hoping for the "extermination" of the enemy? How has the church failed to produce men and women who will uphold our traditional peace doctrine?

I have stated my belief that we can seldom depend on the automatic emanation of real Christian pacifism from the average religious life. It seems necessary to focus attention on pacifism as a special and distinct entity before people will really accept it as part of their religion and come to a full realization of what Jesus meant when he said "Love your enemies" and "Whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them." Pacifism is not a thing for the Christian to disregard, evade, or brush lightly aside. A task of paramount importance is to keep before our congregations the fact that pacifism is an integral part of Christianity, requiring study, research, meditation, prayer; that it is a thing to face squarely and consider seriously in the light of Christ's teachings; that it challenges the individual to decide in times of crisis whether he will serve God or man. Older people as well as the young need this emphasis, but for the latter it is especially vital. Quaker young people should certainly not arrive at draft age without a full appreciation of the Christian pacifist stand.

In conclusion, I would like to suggest that this Yearly Meeting send two resolutions to Washington, D. C. The first, to be addressed to Chairman Clifton A. Woodrum of the House Committee on Post War Military Policy, might read as follows:

"Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, convened in annual conference at Newberg, Oregon, June 4-10, 1945, has authorized its Peace Department to file with you the following statement for inclusion in the printed hearings on peacetime military conscription:

'We disapprove of the proposals for adoption of peacetime military conscription. Military domination of an individual's life is un-democratic and un-Christian, violating the rights of conscience and religious liberty. We believe that our youth should be taught how to keep their country out of war rather than to be trained to fight wars. We believe that educationally, physically, and morally our youth would not profit from a program of military training. Moreover, rather than guaranteeing peace, such a program would engender suspicion and fear which are the seeds of war. In contrast, we prefer a policy of Christian good-will and cooperation leading to confidence and understanding among the peoples of the world.'

The second resolution, to be addressed to President Harry S. Truman, might read as follows:

"Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church convened in annual conference at Newberg, Oregon, June 4-10, 1945, submits the following statement:

'It is our desire that all possible relief be given to the homeless and starving peoples of war-devastated areas in Europe. We feel a keen sense of responsibility for them in as much as part of the destruction came about through military activities of our nation. We feel also our obligation as inhabitants of a rich and favored country to alleviate as far as possible the horrible effects of war. We believe that our nation is well enough supplied with the necessities of life to spare great quantities of desperately needed materials to relieve these stricken peoples. We believe such action would not only partially fulfill our Christian duties toward the unfortunate but would do much to start our torn world back toward peace by displacing some of the hatreds engendered by our bombings.'

The two resolutions that were presented were accepted and authorized to be sent.

A number spoke words of appreciation of the work of the superintendent of this department.

NORTHWEST FRIENDS' SERVICE COMMITTEE

Edward Harmon, chairman of this committee, gave the following report:

The Northwest Friends Service Committee has endeavored to discharge within its ability the concerns laid upon it by the Yearly Meeting. Since the beginning of Selective Service we have had 29 men assigned to C.P.S. camps. One gave his life in service and 13 have been discharged. We now have 15 men in these camps. To our knowledge the dependents of all of our men in the C.P.S. camps are provided for.

Kenneth Eichenberger has reported to the committee his concern that someone do relief work in Europe who will add the evangelical element to the humanitarian efforts. He has offered himself to the American Friends Service Committee for this service.

In preparation he will go to New York for two months this summer to work with the refugees. He asks for the prayers of the members of the Yearly Meeting that he may be used of God to point these needy people to Christ as well as to help meet their physical needs.

No definite plans have been made for the education of the men in the C.P.S. Camps but it is the purpose of the committee to help Oregon Yearly Meeting young men when the time comes.

Remember we need \$234.44 a month and as other men are assigned to the C.P.S. Camps we will need more money. We are glad to report that our financial condition is somewhat better than a year ago.

Please remember your Service Committee in prayer.

The Board of Publication requests that a day be appointed again this year as Quaker Publication Sunday. This is to be a day upon which a suitable message or other observance in the interest of the publication of good literature for our people is provided for, and on which offerings are taken in the various meetings throughout the Yearly Meeting for the revolving publication fund. The Board requests that the third Sunday in September be designated for that purpose this year.

Howard Pearson, Superintendent of the Bolivian work, read the fifteenth annual report which was accepted as follows:

15TH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FRIENDS BOLIVIAN MISSION — 1944-45

"My peace I give unto you". We praise the Lord for definite things. For the definite love of Christ, for definite answer to prayer and for definite salvation. "I am persuaded that He is able to keep that which I have committed unto Him, against that day." As we look back over the past year many things have occurred which we cannot understand but we do have definite peace in our hearts.

In the very early days of the past year we said good-bye to our faithful and valuable co-worker Helen Cammack. Her death was a blow to our work and her place can never be taken. She accomplished much in her years of service but fell in the midst of battle leaving many things yet unfinished. She was visionary, one who could see the needs of the future and was not only ready to meet the needs but prepared for them. She left behind her plans for years in advance but why she was not able to carry them out only our dear Lord knows.

Evangelistic

Our evangelistic efforts were aimed at the building up of the established churches and the bringing in the lost wherever they could be found. Each church was evangelistic "conscious" and not only gained in numbers, which was natural, but gained spiritually. The conferences were in every case as large if not larger than the year before and were a blessing to all who attended. Most of our week-ends were spent in visiting around in our field, preaching, advising, giving out medicines, tracts, and selling Bibles, Testaments and Song Books. This year we went as far as the "Fabulous Mine" which is a dangerous trip. We went by truck and mule. We arrived at the mine in a terrific snow storm which had covered the trail for many miles and we were greeted by the administrator. The following day being Sunday we held three services all of which were blessed with souls seeking the Lord. There are only about a hundred, including women and children, working in the mine and what was so remarkable about the service was that there were about fifty in attendance. This is a great percentage considering it a Catholic country. We also visited Uma Palca while there, wading through deep snow and climbing a steep mountain. This mine is 16,500 feet high and we go by many glaciers and cross a big one.

Schools

We now number five schools in our field, the main one being of course in La Paz. Here in La Paz we have between forty and fifty in the day school, most of whom are believers' children, and about the same number if not a few more in the adult night school. This latter school is a great means of evangelization as many are unbelievers but usually attend "en masse" at the regular services. Both day and night schools follow the course set for them by Helen Cammack. The day school is taught by an ex-teacher of the American Institute, a school run by the Methodists, and the night school by a believer of our La Paz congregation. Our other schools in the outlying districts are all taught by our pastors or members of our congregations.

Clinic

In our travels around the field we have sold more than fifty dollars worth of medicines and given away considerable more. Usually a treatment costs only a few cents so you can see we have treated a great number of people. We have vaccinated several hundred children and many adults against small pox. This is done free of charge and the vaccine is furnished free also by the United States Sanitary Commission in Bolivia. We have treated many kinds of diseases from head to toe. Blood and skin diseases are the most prevalent but rheumatism, headaches, stomachaches and liver complaints make up the grand total. We got a special ration of gasoline for our medical work which is recognized by the government.

Car

The car has been busy running to and fro carrying the missionaries up and down the hills of La Paz and out into the field on evangelistic and inspection trips. It also carries many nationals to doctors, hospitals and cemeteries. It is an absolute necessity.

Books, Bibles, Etc.

One of our biggest sales of Bibles, song books and religious books took place this past year and we distributed the largest number of tracts. After an open air meeting, of which we have several every Sunday, we are trampled upon by the mobs scrambling to get the tracts. Many times we have had our shins kicked, our clothing torn, and hats and glasses knocked off in the rush.

Visitors

The long expected visit of our General Superintendent, Joseph G. Reece, was finally made. It was a happy day when we at last met him at the highest commercial airport in the world last September. He was accompanied by Walter P. Lee, Financial Secretary of Oregon Yearly Meeting and George R. Warner, General Secretary of the National Holiness Missionary Society. Although all were more or less affected by the high altitude they unselfishly gave of their strength in conferences, talking to groups and individuals, advising, conferring and helping unstintedly. They came home with a greater vision of the work in Bolivia and a greater appreciation of the tasks already done. They have a vision of the greater possibilities of the work in the Bible School line and the buying of a truck, farm and launch.

New Missionaries

It was another happy day when we greeted our new missionaries, Ralph and Marie Chapman, in October. They had a little knowledge of Spanish which greatly helped them but soon began their studies to master the language. Ralph took over the treasurership and the superintendency when Howard left the field and he has an enormous task before him. Pray for them and also that new missionaries to help might soon be sent out.

Miscellaneous

Ever since the sickness and death of Helen Cammack, Julia has suffered from nervousness having had to care for her. We took her to Cochabamba and later to Santa Cruz, the latter being nearly sea level but this failed to help her. After returning to La Paz she suffered a nervous breakdown and it was found advisable for her to return home to Portland. She came home in November and Howard followed her in February.

Juan Ayllon, feeling that his work was completed with our mission sent in his resignation to take effect November 30th of this past year. After much consideration, consultation and counsel this was accepted.

Carroll and Doris Tamplin were loaned to our field by the National Holiness Missionary Society and supported by us during the rainy months of the year during which time they could not work on their own project. They pastored the La Paz church after Juan Ayllon left and also had charge of the 1945 Annual Conference. They also directed the La Paz day school and night school and served in an advisory capacity to Ralph Chapman. They gave unstintedly of their labor and time and their efforts were greatly appreciated.

The foregoing are only the highlights of a great and growing

work. We pray the Lord will continue to bless as He has in the past. A great field lies before us, a small portion of the Indians for whom we alone have the responsibility have been touched by the gospel. The door is still wide open, both Government and people are friendly. The time has come for the training of national workers, our forces have been depleted, we are badly in need of new recruits, let us arise and possess the land the Lord has given us!

Dear Friends in Christ:

Since the formulating of this year's report is rightfully the privilege of J. Howard Pearson, a few brief remarks shall suffice as a post-script to his report.

God has been pleased to allow the burden of the work here to rest upon us but with the giving of the task He has also enlarged the vision and supplied us with strength for the day. There have come circumstances that have been difficult to understand but we are believing God for a blessed ministry of the OYM mission among the Aymara Indians. To date I have visited the major portion of the field. The trip of the past week-end gave good practice for the use of our Spanish for no one accompanied us who could translate for us from English. Each passing day is indeed an adventure with the Lord for no two days are the same. Our daily prayer is for the grace of consistent Christian living that affords a positiveness to the spoken word.

The books for the year 1944-45 were closed after Howard returned to the States. I am glad to include with these remarks the following statistics.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE MISSIONARY BOARD

JUNE 7, 1945

There are many evidences that the past year has been one of progress in the missionary program of the Yearly Meeting. The Board is aware of much work which remains yet to be done and of fields of need which have not been reached because of our lack of workers. Our missionaries have served to the limit of their physical strength and we believe that the Yearly Meeting has entered into their labors in the spirit of prayer and by sacrificial giving.

Our Yearly Meeting has stood loyally by the work with its prayers and with tithes and offerings. The support and sacrifice of Friends made it possible to send Walter P. Lee and Joseph G. Reece to Bolivia, and each of these Friends will be reporting to the Yearly Meeting. The Chapman family went to Bolivia, arriving in October 1944, and with Howard and Julia Pearson here at home we need to pray much that God shall sustain the work and bless all our workers, abroad and at home. Carroll and Doris Tamplin are laboring under the direction of the National Holiness Missionary Society in what is known as the Simaco project with a view to carrying the gospel to the jungle Indians and establishing a Christian colony in the Tipuani valley.

The board appreciates the helpful interest and co-operation which has come from individuals, Sunday Schools, prayer groups, monthly meetings, Christian Endeavorers, and the Women's Missionary Union, as well as others through their prayers and financial support. Missionary committees of Monthly and Quarterly Meetings have been most helpful and co-operative.

The following information is gleaned from reports of missionary committees as recently compiled by them covering their activities. The reports mention the titles of 63 different missionary books which have been read or studied by about 317 persons. Monthly Meetings report a total of 166 missionary addresses given by pastors, our general superintendent and others. These addresses have brought information concerning missionary activity in China, Alaska, Hawaii, Russia, Guatemala, Africa, Bolivia, etc., and have pertained to work being carried on by perhaps a dozen different organizations. They have undoubtedly contributed to the widening of our vision and interests. 165 special missionary prayer meetings are reported and the board would encourage

the forming of many more prayer groups in which time is spent in definite prayer in behalf of our work in Bolivia. Missionary programs have included 60 in regular church services, 133 in Sunday Schools, 33 in Christian Endeavor and 162 in Women's Missionary Society meetings. These programs have meant much in inspiration as well as in an educational way in the promotion of the cause. It would be impossible to note the many contributions from individuals and groups which have directly and indirectly aided our missionaries in bringing the gospel message to a needy people.

The board acknowledges its keen sense of limitation in its ability to cope with situations in which more than human wisdom is needed. However we have been favored with a spirit of unity and love and with a sense of the overshadowing of the Divine Presence. The needs of our field are great; but God's resources are great and we challenge the Yearly Meeting constituency to lay its all on the altar of service in order that we might not fail in carrying out our great commission.

Walter Lee told of some of the problems on the mission field that had to be met and of some misunderstandings that have been straightened out.

Joseph Reece spoke of his trip to Bolivia and presented the following urgent needs:

1. An enlarged mission home so that two separate apartments can be made.
2. A truck.
3. Bible Institute Work
4. A launch
5. A farm

Lloyd Cressman spoke of the great need of workers on the mission field and introduced two candidates, Roscoe and Tina Knight, who are now ready to go.

In an impressive way these two young people told of their call to the mission field and their desire to serve.

Ray Carter offered a prayer for a blessing on these young missionaries who are about to go out and a prayer of thanksgiving for God's guidance in the past and trust for the future.

62. The special committee which was appointed to consider the proposition of giving \$25,000 to the college gave the report that appears below:

After careful and prayerful consideration we your committee submit the following report: referring to minute 99, page 52, of the 1944 minutes, we quote:

"The representatives recommend that the Yearly Meeting instruct the nominating committee to nominate a committee of six, three of whom shall be pastors and three non-pastors, to study into the problems involved in the request from the Pacific College Board of Managers as recorded in minute No. 24, and to forward their recommendations to each monthly meeting. The sentiment of the meetings shall then be determined, and a report of the same sent back to the committee, which shall give its report at the next Yearly Meeting session."

This minute sets forth the duties of this committee and indicates them to be: 1. To study into the problem involved in the request from Pacific College Board of Managers; recorded in minute 24 of the 1944 minutes; 2. To bring a report to the Yearly Meeting at this session.

This we did by asking that anyone who might have questions submit them to the committee for compilation and presentation of the College Board.

The questions received fell into four categories, namely: 1. The standing of the college; 2. Financial; 3. Spiritual; 4. Connection between the college and Yearly Meeting.

We would not have time to present all of the questions asked but we have presented the trend of these inquiries. These questions were presented to the Board and we have the answers listed.

After further consultation and investigation the following recommendation was submitted to the Monthly Meetings:

"In view of the splendid progress made by the college in the past few years in spiritual values, in academic standards, and in financial stability, the committee is recommending that the loan and gift be made by the Yearly Meeting to the amount of \$25,000.00. The committee believes that it will be an effective method of bringing about closer cooperation between the Yearly Meeting and Pacific College."

Twenty-two meetings responded to this recommendation with the following results: Two sent disapproval. One of these has since qualified that report which leaves one disapproval on general principles. Nine returned approvals and twelve sent in

approval on certain conditions. Taken in percentages this would be 4.5% no, 40.9% yes, and 54.6% conditional.

Investigation of these reports shows that the one disapproval was on general principles of indebtedness, etc., the nine approvals were based upon the improved spiritual conditions of the last four or five years. The conditional returns range in nature from one conditioned upon a prompt campaign for repayment, one the continued and accelerated trend in spiritual program, and the others the requirement that there may be a change in administration of the college.

The committee recognizes that this brings grave and weighty problems to the Yearly Meeting and to the Board of Managers of the College. Problems and objectives known to the Board and of which the Yearly Meeting is not aware, and desires and feelings in the Yearly Meeting of which the Board has not known but which have now been made clear, present problems which cannot be settled in an hour or a day, but which will require prayerful consideration.

THEREFORE:

THE COMMITTEE DOES NOT FEEL THAT IT HAS THE AUTHORITY TO MAKE FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS BUT IT IS THEIR HOPE AND CONFIDENCE THAT THE BOARD OF MANAGERS HAVING THUS OBTAINED THE MAJORITY OPINION OF THE MEETINGS WILL MOVE IN LINE WITH THE DESIRES OF THE YEARLY MEETING. THEREFORE WE CONTINUE TO RECOMMEND THE COMPLETION OF THE PLAN TO BORROW AND GIVE THE \$25,000.00.

We further note that this does not involve a financial burden to the Yearly Meeting since in the last year some \$3000.00 has been turned to the college which if the loan had been completed last year would have applied as payments on the loan.

EVANGELISTIC AND CHURCH EXTENSION

63. Gervas A. Carey, president of the Board, read the following report, part of which appears below and part of which will be printed in the Appendix. The report was approved by the meeting.

REPORT OF THE EVANGELISTIC BOARD

The Evangelistic Board of Oregon Yearly Meeting faces

a most challenging situation. The field is truly white unto the harvest. Our outpost work is developing rapidly while numerous new fields are opening before us. The Holy Spirit continues to impress his call upon young people in our midst to enter full time Christian service.

The Evangelistic Board cannot function as an initiative agency in the extension of our limits of service. Its responsibility must remain that of encouragement, direction and of limited financial aid to initiative locally conceived. In the light of this fact it should be recognized generally that the primary responsibility for outpost work must be borne by local monthly and quarterly meetings in consultation and cooperation with our Yearly Meeting Superintendent on behalf of the Evangelistic Board.

The Board has faced the fact that for itself and the local meetings there is need for careful and conservative procedure at this time. We rejoice in the liberality of Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting and in the number of consistent tithers whose offerings have aided in the promotion of our work at home and abroad. However, all thoughtful people must recognize that the present prosperity cannot continue indefinitely. It is highly desirable that heavy indebtedness be avoided in all phases of the Lord's work. If we will seek to live within our incomes as individuals and as organizations within the Yearly Meeting it will lend strength to our activities as well as forestall possible embarrassments later.

The following statistics are of interest in relation to the work within our Yearly Meeting:

Our General Superintendent, Joseph G. Reece, read the following report which was accepted and approved:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting in session at Newberg, Oregon June 8, 1945

Dear Friends:

In presenting to you this annual report I must first of all admit my human frailties and errors in judgment. However these were of the mind and not of the heart. With a deep sense of humility I venture to appropriate that challenge of the apostle Paul when he said, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me."

Our souls should be thrilled as we lift our eyes and view the field of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Many doors of service are open to us in the great Northwest and in Bolivia. God has heard the prayers of faith and many of our youth have heard His call and are preparing themselves for service. From some quarters we hear suggestions that we should go slow and be prepared for hard days which are surely ahead. These suggestions are accepted in the spirit given, but I would call your attention to this thought—when God opens doors of service and then graciously calls our youth to leave all to follow Him, He will enable Oregon Yearly Meeting to meet and accept the challenge. God in His wisdom knows what our Yearly Meeting can

do. If he opens doors and calls upon our youth to enter these doors, then surely He knows that we are able to supply the means to carry out our part of the program. These are momentous days. Let us not be alarmed because we are few in number. God does not depend on numbers, all He needs to save this generation in Bolivia and our great Northwest, is our obedience to His will. Our disobedience will shut the door of salvation to many here and in Bolivia. Will we dare make a covenant with God like unto Joshua, "As for me and my house we will serve the Lord." Joshua was a man who believed that He and God were great enough for any task. Lord—increase our faith, give us a faith to move the Northwest and Bolivia for God.

This year we have a group of 13 fine out-post points. Seven of these are organized in preparative meetings. To my mind five of these have reached the place where they might become Monthly Meetings soon. Aside from the 13 out-post points we have two places where excellent Bible Schools are carried on each Sunday. Many other places are calling out for us to enter. I confess that it is hard to turn people down when they come asking that we send someone to minister to them.

Medford invites all of you to the dedication of their new meeting house next July 22.

Hayden Lake will complete their new building this summer and soon you will have an invitation to attend their dedication service. They will complete their parsonage and church about the same time.

Talent is planning to enlarge their meeting house to accommodate the crowded conditions of their Bible School. Salem Quarterly Meeting assumed the challenge of raising \$1000.00 to assist Talent in this building program.

Parkrose is our newest point, but has already surpassed many of our regular meetings in attendance at Sunday School and regular services. Their average attendance so far has been 84. They are very anxious to begin building as soon as possible and the WPB has granted them permission. What they do will depend upon your response.

Whitney, Rose Valley, Cherry Grove, Baker, Sprague River and Tillamook are doing well. They offer a challenge to our established meetings if we are to keep ahead of them. Caldwell near Greenleaf was organized into a preparative meeting this past year and the prospects for a meeting here are good.

I will briefly review the report of our out-posts:

Many of you remember Prune Hill Monthly Meeting. Well—Prune Hill has changed to Forest Home. The meeting at Prune Hill was too far from the center of population, so they sold their property and bought in Forest Home, in Camas, Washington. They now have a splendid location and a great opportunity. At present they are worshipping in the parsonage but hope to build soon.

McKinley Ave. Meeting in Tacoma, Washington has made quite a change in their physical set-up since last Yearly Meeting. They sold their old parsonage and bought a better place just south of the church building. Also they bought an old store

building just south of the new parsonage which is being remodeled into a place to carry on youth activities. The work at McKinley Ave. is growing in interest and attendance.

N. E. Tacoma is not to be out done by her neighbor, McKinley Ave., they too, are remodeling the church and parsonage. But of greater value has been the spirit manifested by the entire meeting. It is proper that I should here express to Helen Willcuts, the sister of Jack Willcuts, the appreciation of the Evangelistic Board for her unselfish and generous gift of her time and services to the work there.

Sherwood has completed a basement under their church building. This meeting has a fine new parsonage, built last year, and now enjoys a full basement to meet the need of their Bible School.

Greenleaf dedicated their beautiful new church last September at a cost of \$20,000.00 and out of debt.

All three of our conferences, Quaker Hill, Wauna Mer and Twin Rocks will operate again this year. At Wauna Mer they are building a new auditorium and improvements are being made at Quaker Hill and Twin Rocks.

We rejoice to see so many of our meetings repairing and remodeling their meeting houses and parsonages. Each meeting should strive to keep their property as attractive and useful as possible.

We have a number of pastors who have just finished their first year of service in our Yearly Meeting. Robert and Lela Morrill at Boise, Denver Headrick at Melba, Alden and Esther White at Middleton, Frank Haskins at Marion, Marion and Evangeline Cook at Scotts Mills, Louis Harris at Ridgeview, Clynton and Marjorie Crisman at Homedale and Frank and Ora Davies at Greenleaf.

We do not know all the pastoral changes contemplated this year but information has come that Lloyd Cressman has resigned from Newberg, Edgar Sims resigned from Piedmont, Carl and Minnie Miller resigned from First Church, Vancouver, Herman Macy from Highland Meeting in Salem, Edward Harmon from West Chehalem and Ethel Cowgill from Quilcene. None of these meetings have come to a decision yet as to whom they are calling except First Church, Vancouver. They have called Nathan Pierson of Friendswood, Texas and he has accepted. We urge that each meeting complete their work along this line soon so that the name of pastor may appear in the minutes.

Again I would like to report on the activities of our ministers, who are not active pastors. This year we sent out 63 report blanks and 35 were returned. These reported as follows:

Of this group 7 are teachers, 3 are evangelists, 3 are active in religious work but are not pastors, 11 are active in some

type of business along with their ministerial work and 11 are inactive or retired. The evangelists referred to are William Murphy, Edward Mott and Hubert Mardock. We believe for the most part that these ministers are faithful and true and uphold the doctrinal standards of Oregon Yearly Meeting as stated in her discipline.

My personal activities are about as follows: I spent three months on a trip to Bolivia. After my return I spent at least a month and a half visiting each meeting to show the pictures taken of our field in Bolivia. I showed the pictures 41 times to 3415 people. Nine week ends were spent attending Quarterly Meetings. Attended all three conferences and had part on the program of two of them. Eleven issues of the News Flash were sent out from the office. By invitation I attended California Yearly Meeting and spoke five times. Attended the Ministerial Association and mid-year meeting of the Yearly Meeting Boards. Attended many rallies, conferences and banquets. I feel that I should speak a word for my wife who made it possible for me to do what I did. She gave up much home life and its care to help me better serve you and I truly appreciate her help.

There are many others who have given much to the work of Oregon Yearly Meeting and I desire to pay my respects to our faithful pastors. They have done fine and I don't know where you would find a finer group of men and women. I consider it an honor to be associated with them. I feel that our Quarterly Meeting Superintendents have done good work and have made it much easier for me so many times. Then out of the many individuals who have given generously of their time I will list two. Richard Kneeland has spent hours and days and weeks doing for us a great work. I have found him spending many nights and holidays working on our finances. We can't pay him but surely we can thank him. Then I would like to speak of Earl Barker. He is chairman of our Discipline Revision Committee and has spent a month of working days on this job alone. Then he is proof-reader of our paper the Northwest Friend which consumes many hours each month. All this beyond his regular activities of teaching a Sunday School class, preaching and other Yearly Meeting jobs. I thank God for men like Richard Kneeland and Earl Barker and also for folks like you.

We also wish to express our appreciation for passes to travel on the Southern Pacific, Great Northern, Spokane Portland and Seattle, Union Pacific and Northern Pacific Railways.

The numerical growth in membership did not reach the goal desired. Tacoma Quarterly Meeting made the best growth along this line and they plan to bring in a much better report next year. If each meeting would give some energy to increase their membership this coming year we could easily pass the 4000 goal in membership.

If the early church had the spirit of many Quakers today we would never have heard of the early church. When persecution came upon them, they were scattered abroad, away from friends and home ties, but they continued to preach and live the gospel message and we have the report that the 'Word grew.' Truly Quakers have scattered abroad over the land, but instead of swarming and preaching the message, they report "We were all alone and there wasn't any Quaker church

handy, so we went to another denomination." I some way believe that if these Quakers had felt the urge and convictions of our early church fathers we could have been a much larger force today. Some of us die to easily. It doesn't take much to discourage us. The early church grew because they were scattered abroad, how did we Quakers get the idea that it was much better to give up our convictions and concerns and quietly be lost in the crowd? I am not crying out against other denominations, God bless them, but my concern is, if we have a message which is so vitally needed as it is today, let us begin to work at our job as if today was the last day we had an opportunity to work.

As a Yearly Meeting we made gains along many lines this year, but we should be far from satisfied. Individual burden, individual concern, individual praying and intercession will bring a new surge into the life and vitality of the Yearly Meeting. Let us forget our smallness, our differences, our peculiarities and remember we serve a great God who is not concerned about numbers or divisions or oddities, but who does reward obedience. Undoubtedly we will make faster progress upon our knees.

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends:

The committee on Discipline revision has examined carefully the suggestions which have been received during these sessions. The opinions expressed are somewhat centered about three points. Some reference is made to one or two others, but not with sufficient weight to be presented here. It is assumed that aside from these points the proposed Discipline is acceptable to the Yearly Meeting. The Clerk has been asked to take an expression on the three already referred to. The will of the Meeting in respect to these will then be written into the proposed Discipline with the result that the draft thus produced will have been accepted in its entirety by the Yearly Meeting. The three points on which it is necessary to have an expression of the Yearly Meeting are these: (1) The wording of Query number 6, relative to war and peace; (2) The omission of the permanent board; (3) The inclusion of the peace work in a board with other departments of work.

The report of Greenleaf Academy was read by J. Allen Dunbar and appears below:

GREENLEAF FRIENDS ACADEMY ANNUAL REPORT

The Greenleaf Academy has just graduated its thirty-fifth class, which consisted of ten members, three of which have attended Pacific College during their senior year. However, they are counted as members of the class and will receive their diplomas upon completion of their years' work at P.C. The total enrollment for the year was 54, many of whom came from neighboring cities and states. On May 6, Denver Headrick of Melba delivered the baccalaureate address and on Tuesday evening May 8, Frank Davies brought the commencement address. Leona Harris was valedictorian of the class and Ethel Fivecoat the salutatorian.

Students have been very active in outside or extra-curricular work this year. Besides the band which included nearly

one-half the school, a fine girls trio and an equally fine male quartet were organized and all in all kept very busy. The dramatics class has done some very fine work this year, giving plays for different churches and groups over the valley. Due to the explosion in the gymnasium which resulted in the death of one student, Lorraine Emry, the Juniors did not get to give their annual play.

Highest honors of the year went to the following students: Leona Harris won the scholarship to Pacific College, Ethel Fivecoat as salutatorian won the scholarship to Northwest Nazarene College, and William Potter won the trophy for being chosen by the faculty as the most valuable and most outstanding student of the year.

During the year we had varied types of chapel services, a large number of which were conducted by the students. One chapel each week was given over to "Student Expression", a time for praise, testimony and song, with almost 100% taking an active part. Denver Headrick held our fall revival at which time the presence of the Lord was very keenly felt, and a large number of students felt the regenerating and cleansing power of the Holy Spirit in their lives. We are especially thankful for a number who have felt the call of the Master to full time Christian service and are giving their lives completely to Him. Services of equal blessing and inspiration were conducted during the winter months by Rev. Carl Byrd.

With the exception of one part-time teacher, the faculty will remain the same for next year. The new part-time instructor has not been secured as yet. We have greatly appreciated the feeling of unity and the high degree of cooperation that has been felt on the part of the faculty members this year.

We pray that the Lord will continue to bless and to use the Greenleaf Academy, and that she may ever stand as a lighthouse of knowledge and truth sending forth those who pass through her portals with the highest aspirations and callings for His service.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF PACIFIC COLLEGE 1944-45

Pacific College has now been in continuous operation for 54 years. This year we had a slight increase in number of students attending and trust that the extreme low has been passed. The total number of students this year is approximately 100, with somewhat lower number last year. It should be remembered that although the United States has been engaged in this war for a much longer time than the last World War, our Student Body has not dropped below approximately 75 while in the first World War the number of college students dwindled to less than 30.

Again we are able to report that approximately 60% of the students belong to Friends. As we look back over the year we are made more conscious than ever of the divine guidance and blessing which has attended our efforts.

Commencement 1945

The Commencement Musical concert this year was given at the Friends church on June 1 under the direction of Professor Roy Clark. All four Practical Music departments were represented including Voice, Violin, Piano and Organ. On Saturday evening, June 2, the Class Day exercises were presented by the graduating class.

The Baccalaureate sermon was given by the President of the College on Sunday afternoon, June 3 and the Student Christian Union held its closing exercises Sunday evening.

Dr. Burt Brown Barker gave a most interesting and instructive commencement address to the graduating class and assembled friends.

Monday evening the annual Alumni banquet was held honoring the class of 1945 and taking care of the usual business of the Association.

Faculty

Few faculty changes were anticipated for the coming year. Burton Frost who had charge of the Men's Athletics and Physical Education, while at the same time taking work in the college, graduated and will not be back.

Mrs. Flora Stone who assisted as a Piano instructor will not be back. All of the other teachers as far as it is now known, will return for the coming year.

The faculty has given unstintedly of their services and deserve the appreciation of all of those interested in the college. It is interesting to note how members of the faculty are serving in official capacities in the Yearly Meeting. Both the presiding Clerk and Recording Clerk of the Yearly Meeting are members of the faculty. One of the members is chairman of the Northwest Friends Service Committee and Christian Stewardship committee. Two other members have served for many years as chairman of the Evangelistic and Church Extension committee. Several others are serving in the capacity of chairmen of the Quarterly Meeting departments in similar work.

Improvements

During the year work of improving the present buildings was carried forward. The ceilings in the Boys' Dormitory were lowered 6 feet, and all rooms redecorated. The Auditorium at the College was completely renovated with extended improvements on the stage. New fluorescent lighting was installed, the floor sanded and varnished, venetian blinds were put up at the windows and velour drapes were hung. In addition to that the walls and woodwork were refinished and another coating of water proofing put on the roof.

Work has started on the razing of the old gymnasium and plans are complete for the erection of a new gymnasium.

Several new courses are to be offered the coming year, among which are several courses in the Bible and Religious Education department. A new course is being offered in Economic Geography and another in Cooperatives and the Cooperative movement.

Plans are being made for the offering of a laboratory experience in professional and business callings. This we have designated as Functional Education. Educators are aware of the necessity of keeping abreast of the changes that are bound to come as the war ends and many of the men and women return to take up again their educational preparation.

Pacific College is in a position to make a real contribution toward the proper correlation of religion, the sciences, the humanities and other related fields.

Activities

The college participated in two series of Evangelistic meetings this year. Early in the year the college invited Frank Davies for a week's services and in the spring the college cooperated with the local monthly meeting in services held by John Trachsel. These were times of great blessing to students, faculty, and the community.

Most of the student organizations functioned successfully with the exception of inter-collegiate sports. Only basketball was conducted as an inter-collegiate sport.

Unusual emphasis was again placed on Public Speaking and Music. Several successful plays were given by the students during the year and many students participated in Inter-collegiate debates and Public Speaking contests.

Under the direction of Professor Roy Clark numerous musical organizations were active. For the first time in many years we had an orchestra. Outstanding were the A Cappella choir, and numerous ensemble groups, quartets, and trios. These groups gave many program in Newberg and surrounding cities.

Considerable effort has been expended to improve our financial situation. George Moore was released for about 8 weeks in order to solicit funds throughout the Yearly Meeting. Considerable solicitation was done both personally and by letter by the President. Considerable amounts have been contributed for various activities and improvements. Nearly \$15,000 has come in to be used in the construction of the new gymnasium. Several sizeable gifts have been added to the endowment funds. Some additional gifts have come in for the Herbert Hoover House memorial project and approximately \$8,000 was added to the Progress Fund for current expenses and debt retirement.

The Women's Auxilliary of Pacific College in Portland donated the funds to purchase two new pianos for the college.

An effort is being made to strengthen certain sections of the Library. A most interesting collection of Hoover books, both those written by him and those written about him is being made. Another strong collection under the direction of professor Macy in the section dealing with the history of the Northwest. The third is under the direction of Professor Hoskins and is the section dealing with Friends writings. We hope to make these sections outstanding and would be greatly interested in receiving books for these particular sections.

The College board has taken into consideration the needs of our young men who are in C.P.S. camps and have arranged to grant ½ scholarships for young men of Oregon Yearly meeting who have been in C.P.S. camps or in prison for 6 months or more. It is hoped that Yearly Meeting friends will respond in like manner and supply the other ½ tuition for those C.P.S. members who wish to continue their college work.

Awards

The annual class awards based on scholarship and character were awarded this year as follows: Senior award went to Wilma Archambeau, Junior award to Mildred Haworth, Sophomore award to Genevieve Belz, Freshman award to Isabel Schroeder.

Scholarships are being offered again this year to some young person in each Quarterly Meeting of the Yearly Meeting and to the highest rating Senior of Greenleaf Academy.

Eighteen students active in the ministry or sons and daughters of ministers received ½ tuition during the year. These together with the Quarterly Meeting scholarships and Greenleaf

scholarship amount to nearly \$2000 per year which the college is granting to ministers and members of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Needs and Plans

One of the great needs of the college is the acquisition of sufficient resources to meet the demands of the Northwest Accrediting Association. As was stated last year three basic demands were made by that organization. One was a new gymnasium, another was retirement of our indebtedness and the third was the raising of faculty salaries. We are making every effort to attempt to meet these demands during the coming school year.

Work on the new gymnasium has already started and with the funds on hand and some that continue to come in we believe that this will be accomplished. More than \$5000 indebtedness has been paid off during the year and it is hoped that the Yearly Meeting and friends will make it possible to retire the rest of the indebtedness.

Plans are under way to attempt to pay salaries comparable to that paid in other institutions of this nature.

More and more we realize the necessity of securing a new library for which we have raised approximately \$10,000.

Additional Dormitory space is an essential need. The problem of housing all of the students who have indicated their expectation of attending college next year is a very pressing one. Indications are that there will be enough girls wishing to stay in the dormitory to occupy all the space in both of our dormitories the coming year. Additional dormitory facilities must be secured some way to take care of the boys.

With the growing emphasis on music there is a need for a house or building to take care of the music department.

During the past year there has been remarkable unity and cooperation between faculty, student body, Board, people in the Newberg community and the Yearly Meeting. One Yearly Meeting group expressed its dissatisfaction with the administration of the college.

The college deeply appreciates every effort of cooperation, the prayers of those who have supported us, the fine cooperation both financial and otherwise, the many helpful suggestions and words of commendation.

Pacific College wishes to be of great service to Oregon Yearly Meeting and the kingdom of God and wishes to maintain at all cost a real Christian educational institution. To this end we seek divine guidance and blessing.

Other work done by different Quarterly Meetings:

1. Portland: \$1,075.39 were spent for Christian Service Center. One person served at the Center approximately 500 hours and gave \$50.00 to carry on this work. One meeting gave 2 sheets and pillow cases, another \$2.60 for this work. One member gives \$5.00 per month to buy Bibles for Service men. One church gave labor at Center of 72 hours. Other work of this kind has been done which was not reported. All three Portland churches served food. Many have done Red Cross work. One church made 6 pair of pajamas, 24 bedside bags, another made 100 pieces. One church raised \$268.00 to buy outpost property, \$125.00 to help outpost workers. The primary department of another church gave outpost worker's children each \$1.00 for Christmas. \$12.50 was spent for chairs, \$54.00 given to a needy family; one church gave a daveno, another a comforter, one meeting reports a Home Mission study class. One speech was made in interest of this work. Gideons were given \$40.00.

2. Newberg: \$28.00 was given to a returned missionary; \$22.00 cash and \$20.00 worth of food stuffs given to a family whose home burned. \$43.00 worth of garments given. One meeting reports services rendered equal to \$76.45. 213 garments made for Red Cross, and \$87.25 given to Red Cross. One meeting made 3 rugs and one quilt for their parsonage and 131 hours repair work on church and parsonage. \$50.00 given to Cascade College, and \$25.00 given to Pacific College. Also \$10.00 given a student. \$14.73 was used to send Christmas gifts to Service men. One Christmas box sent to a C.P.S. camp. \$45.00 cash and one set of dishes was given to two families who home burned. One meeting gave \$252.00 aid in cases of illnesses. Another meeting gave \$62.00 to Radio Gospel broadcasting and \$33.00 to other Home Mission work. 365 quarts of milk, 6 quarts cream, 10 dozen eggs were given. One stove was given to "Good Will", 96 hours house work was done for a neighbor. Total amount of cash given in Home Mission work—\$2,460.01, plus \$360.68 cash used for foodstuffs, garments, etc.

3. Greenleaf: \$13.50 given for a library, \$662.00 for the needy, \$125.00 for Red Cross, \$50.00 for Salvation Army, \$30.00 Gideons for testaments, \$10.00 War relief, \$45.00 Home Missions, \$6.00 spent for Reader's Digest for soldiers. One baby shower was given. One comforter and 2 quilts. One meeting reports giving "ever so many" doughnuts, quarts of fruit, bushels of vegetables.

4. Boise Valley: \$255.66 reported for Social Service. Services and some work was done in Mexican labor camps. Some gifts and food was given for nursing home. 250 hours nursing aid in hospital. Some home caring for sick and taking others to doctor, two quilts and some baby garments were given.

5. Salem: Letters and cards of sympathy were sent to shutins and the sick, amounting to 250. Four comforters valued at \$5.00 each were given. \$26.00 reported given to Social Service.

6. Tacoma: \$101.50 reported given to Red Cross. One table, one set of dishes and miscellaneous shower given a burned out family. The two Tacoma churches furnished food and served it

at the Christian Service Men's Center every third Sunday of each month. Total cash in Tacoma reported is \$599.87.

Total amount for all Quarterly Meetings' special Christmas donations are as follows:

Food—\$78.00 value, 3 chickens, several boxes to men in service.

Money—\$10.00.

Clothing—20 garments, 6 dolls and toys given, 9 religious booklets, and many Christmas cards.

This excellent report was accepted by the meeting.

87. The following communication was received from the Evangelistic and Church Extension Board:

"Let your yea be yea and your nay be nay" has been a part of the Quaker church since its birth.

We hold that an agreement once made must be kept until such time as it is by mutual agreement changed.

In case of violation by an individual or an organization we believe that a proper repentance and confession is necessary to the party who has been wronged in order to fulfill the requirements of Matthew 5:23, 24.

"Therefore if thou bring thy gift to the altar, and there rememberest that thy brother hath ought against thee;

"Leave there thy gift before the altar, and go thy way; first be reconciled to thy brother, and then come and offer thy gift."

It has come to the attention of the Evangelistic Board that some years ago Oregon Yearly Meeting entered into an agreement with Indiana Yearly Meeting relative to territorial boundaries and fields of operation in the state of Washington. This agreement, according to the records of Oregon and Indiana Yearly Meetings was ratified by both Yearly Meetings. Reading from the report of a committee of the Evangelistic Board, we quote:

"The records have been searched and in so far as we are able to determine no action has ever been taken by Oregon Yearly Meeting changing the conditions established by the agreement recorded in the minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting."

The Board does not undertake to discuss the merits of the case as entered into in other years. However, we do bring to the attention of the Yearly Meeting the fact that an agreement was entered into with Indiana Yearly Meeting and was later broken by Oregon Yearly Meeting.

We therefore present the following recommendation:

"According to available records of Oregon and Indiana Yearly Meetings it is evident that Oregon Yearly Meeting has violated an agreement entered into by both Yearly Meetings relative to territorial boundaries in the state of Washington.

"In view of this we recommend that Oregon Yearly Meeting direct a communication to Indiana Yearly Meeting, confessing the wrong of our actions in violating this agreement and that we humbly ask their forgiveness."

The recommendation was approved.

88. The caretakers made the following report which was accepted:

REPORT OF THE FINANCIAL SECRETARY

"Where there is no vision the people perish". We cannot be but deeply grateful to the Lord for a vision which He has entrusted to us. The evidence presented in this financial report indicates that Oregon Yearly Meeting has not been intentionally "disobedient to the Heavenly vision." No doubt we shall need to follow with increasing zeal this vision without which we are lost.

The financial condition of the Yearly Meeting appears to be excellent. Contributions have been far in excess of our budgets indicating that our plans for expansion have not over-reached our capacity to execute those plans. The total amount of funds given for the Lord's work is perhaps larger than any in the history of Oregon Yearly Meeting. The increase over last year is approximately fifty percent making the total of \$182,380.75.

The office of Financial Secretary was created ten years or more ago and has been encumbered by the same person for its entire life. It has been a real joy to watch the Yearly Meeting steadily progress from a condition of considerable debt in the days of financial depression to the excellent condition in which we now find ourselves.

At one time we watched with bated breath to see if the per capita giving could reach \$25 per year. Today it is approximately \$50 per capita. At one time it seemed that if the giving should reach \$100,000 we would reach our highest hopes. Today we may expectantly look forward to next year when perhaps the amount will exceed \$200,000.

May the Lord continue to bless this Yearly Meeting in every way and may the retiring financial secretary solicit for the new financial secretary the same hearty cooperation which you have given in the past years.

"A part of the committee met in Newberg at the time of the Ministers conference in February. At that time those present agreed to make an appeal to Friends of the Yearly Meeting through the Northwest Friend, inserted the following information and request:

"In the Yearly Meeting Minutes for 1944 Friends should read the action taken toward establishing a "Home for Aged Friends" . . . These minutes give the concern, the appointing of the committee and defining its duties; the names of its members.

This committee urges all Friends who are vitally interested to make known their interest in this proposition. You may offer to the committee any constructive plan you desire. Or you may suggest the amount of financial support you are willing to assume toward such an institution when approved by the Yearly Meeting.

At a meeting of the committee in Newberg on Feb. 13th, two types of building were considered: one, a central plant, and the other, for small units housing from two to four persons. The central plant would cost many thousands of dollars and seemed not to be feasible as a beginning. The small units could be undertaken and expanded as interest grew and financial support was available.

Perhaps many Friends do not know that the Yearly Meeting owns a block and a half of ground immediately west of the present Yearly Meeting House, which is available and would be almost ideal for such an institution.

The time is short until another Yearly Meeting session. This committee should have something definite to report as to the interest among Friends concerning this matter. If you are vitally interested, please write at once to Harold Aebischer, Newberg, Oregon, that the committee may know if there is a genuine desire in Oregon Yearly Meeting for such a home."

By the Committee

Considerable interest has been shown in this matter. One Quarterly Meeting expressed a desire for such an institution, four of the Monthly Meetings favoring the proposition, and one Monthly Meeting non-committal. Also others favored by letters and conversation.
