16. During the inspirational hour the song, "Amazing Grace", was sung and a number of prayers were offered, asking God's blessing on the sessions of the Yearly Meeting.

Richard Wiles, General Superintendent of Kansas Yearly Meeting, brought the message from Hebrews 12:18-24 and Ephesians

2:20-22. He showed how God takes rough stones from the quarry and chisels an edifice of beauty for His dwelling place. The blessing comes after the temple is dedicated.

We had twenty-one names on our list to whom we sent letters, bringing a greeting from the Yearly Meeting, and giving a few items of special interest from the sessions of the Yearly Meeting, held in June of 1945.

19. The reports from the various Quarterly Meetings on the state of the church were read and a summary appears below:

All Meetings report that the attendance at Sunday Morning Worship Services is good. Nearly all deplore the fact that the mid-week and evening services are not so well attended.

Evangelistic services have been held in nearly all the churches. These have been helpful in building up the members in spiritual progress and bringing outsiders into the kingdom. Some were not as fruitful as desired. Special prayer meetings have been held, followed by a period of visitation in some places, which have helped in the adding of new members to the church.

In the majority of places family devotions are practiced among the members. Some meetings report special care taken in regard to the reading material placed before their children. Special effort has been made to encourage the reading of the Scriptures. In some places the outreach of the Sunday School is greater with special stress on bringing young people to Christ.

A number of meetings have taken an active interest in the Youth for Christ Movement and in the Child Evangelism Classes.

In some instances there has been a laxness concerning the attending of places of amusement inconsistent with Christian character.

Most members are faithful to the doctrines of the Friends Church though there are some differences regarding the question of bearing arms and performing military service. One quarterly meeting reports that they have been active in the peace movement

and that a majority of their young men took their stand when called to military service and went as non-combatants or into C.P.S. Camps; while another meeting reports the return of their members from the armed forces.

Some meetings are active in their efforts to suppress the liquor traffic and to point out the evils of the tobacco habit, while others are somewhat indifferent to these evils.

There has been a zealous missionary spirit in some meetings which has expressed itself in giving. Another Quarter deplores the fact that there has been a lack of financial support of missions. More teaching along this line is needed.

Some Meetings endeavor to acquaint themselves with both the material and spiritual needs of the world, and manifest a deep concern for the people of the world.

Care is taken to uphold the doctrine of Friends as held by Oregon Yearly Meeting and in the appointment of persons to official positions in the Church and Sunday School.

A lively discussion on the subject of peace was participated in by various members.

20. Melva Baker presented the report on Literature in place of Lela J. Morrill, the Superintendent, who was unable to be present.

We are gratified to note, from the reports, evidence of an increasing interest in church libraries. A brief comparison of this year's statistics with those of last year shows six more libraries, a total of 1,488 more books in church libraries, and 1,670 more books loaned during the year. One meeting reports the building of a new library and one the addition of a valuable book case and magazine display rack, a gift of the Christian Endeavor. Other meetings report reclassification, revision, and other improvements in their libraries. A considerable amount of money has been raised for the purchase of new books. One meeting has designated one Sunday of each month as Literature Sunday, when an offering is taken for the library. The use of church library books by children and young people is especially noted.

Many meetings have given religious magazine subscriptions, books, pamphlets, mottoes and tracts. One meeting reports sending Sunday School papers to a Civilian Public Service Camp, and one the distribution of numerous portions of Scripture to men in service.

Bulletins or parish papers have been issued by many of the meetings.

Publications Sunday was observed by a number of meetings, and the booklets put out by the Publications Board have been quite generally distributed. Sale of books written by Edward Mott is noted by several meetings.

The good cooperation and response of the Literature Chairmen of the Monthly and Quarterly Meetings has made possible the inclusion in this report of reports from all the meetings of the Yearly Meeting.

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

21. The report was read by Edward Harmon, Superintendent of this department and appears below:

One Quarterly Meeting held a Stewardship Conference and from this conference formulated plans for their work. One Meeting reported that many of their non-resident members sent in their tithe.

Stewardship Bulletins from the Layman Company were used and also short pithy messages used in other bulletins.

One Quarterly Meeting exchanged pastors one Sunday for a Stewardship message. Good work was done by several Quarterly Meeting Superintendents and Monthly Meeting Chairmen.

Edward Harmon gave an address on the subject of Stewardship. In this he showed how important it is to manage and administer our talents as well as our money. We need to be stewards of our time and stewards in prayer. It is required of stewards that they be faithful and dependable.

26. After a period of devotion the minutes were read and approved with one addition.

27. The following report was received from the Board for Aged Ministers and Missionaries:

Since through failure on the part of the Board of Aged Ministers and Missionaries in notification of payments due by Members, delinquencies have occurred. We recommend the suspension of Art. 4 of By Laws, until September 1, 1946 to permit back payments to the Retirement Fund by Members.

Further, we recommend that Art. 4 be amended to provide a 90-day grace period instead of 30 days.

That Art. 7 be amended to permit payment of 2% simple interest on funds withdrawn by Members of Retirement Fund without benefits. (P. 109 Discipline)

28. The Pacific College Visiting Committee made the following report:

Your Committee appointed in 1945 to visit Pacific College met March 22nd at the College to visit classes for the day. We were privileged to have lunch with the students in the dining hall at noon. This day was most enjoyable for each member of the Committee who could be present.

Different members of the Committee have visited the College at various times throughout the year and do appreciate the efforts to maintain high Christian standards.

We earnestly urge Oregon Yearly Meeting to pray definitely for the College Board, the Administration, the Faculty and the Student Body, that our Quaker College may ever be faithful to "the great door and effectual" opened unto her.

29. Foreign epistles from Germany, Sweden, Norway, The Netherlands and Jamaica were read.

Several Members spoke in appreciation of these epistles and expressed deep sympathy for these people who have suffered so much and yet strive to live in the Spirit of Christ.

It was decided that the letters from the young people of various meetings should be referred to the Christian Endeavor group with a suggestion that they might answer them if they so desire.

EDUCATION

30. Helen Willcuts, Superintendent of the Department of Education, presided and read some of the reports.

The report from Greenleaf Academy was presented and accepted as follows:

The Greenleaf Friends Academy has just graduated its thirty-sixth class, which consisted of seventeen members. The enrollment for the year was higher than that of last year with a total of 67 students. We had an unusually large number of outside students from neighboring cities and states. On May 12, Rev. Hubert Mardock gave the Baccalaureate address and on Tuesday evening, May 14, Rev. Scott T. Clark, of Montebello, California, delivered the Commencement address.

Students have carried on a great deal of extra curricular work this year. Our new music instructor, Miss Lucy Clark, has done excellent work with both piano and vocal music. A girl's double sextet was organized under her direction and they presented an excellent recital as well as appearing a number of times in Greenleaf and neighboring cities. Several student piano recitals were presented throughout the year. Under the direction of Fred Knight, the Academy chorus combined with the Community chorus presented selections of Handel's Messiah at the Christmas season. The third annual Band Concert was given May 9.

There has been an unusual interest in gospel team work this year, with groups traveling to various churches over the valley conducting their own services. Several souls have bowed at altars of prayer as the result of these efforts.

Fine work has been done this year by the dramatics department under the direction of Marjorie Craven. Also, under her direction, the Junior Class gave an outstanding play which was well received by a large audience. Harold Thompson has done fine work in the science department, as well as assistant coach.

Improvements to the buildings include a new stage on the gymnasium, a new library room in the academy building with the addition of several hundred dollars worth of new books, and a refinishing of the Home Economics and Shop rooms. New locker and shower rooms are located under the gymnasium stage.

We are especially thankful for the number who have a call to definite Christian Service. During the past year thirteen of our

student body have answered the call of the Lord and are preparing themselves for His work. We are grateful indeed for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on our chapel services throughout the year. The student expression chapels, which are a time for prayer and praise, have been an especial blessing. Several of these "Student Chapels" have ended with gracious altar services sometimes lasting for two or three hours. Certainly God has been good to us.

Highest honors of the year went to the following students: Wilma Harris was chosen as the valedictorian and Mark Roberts the salutatorian. As neither of these two wished to use the P.C. scholarship, it was awarded to Ruth Engle who was third highest. The leadership award was won by Derrol Hockett, and Mark Roberts and Wilma Harris were chosen as the outstanding boy and girl students.

It is our earnest prayer that God will continue to bless and use the Greenleaf Academy, and that she will ever stand as a guardian of the spiritual, moral and cultural aspect of every life who comes within her walls.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF PACIFIC COLLEGE 1945-46

The closing of the school year on June 11 marked the end of 55 years of continuous college work at Pacific College. Again we are glad to acknowledge the blessings of God upon the work of the institution during the year. There was a slight increase in the number of students attending college this year.

Again we are able to report that more than 60% of the student body are Friends. The Commencement activities were outstanding this year. The Commencement Music program was given at Wood-Mar Hall on Friday evening, June 7, featuring a number of the outstanding Music students. The Baccalaureate sermon was given by the President of the college on Sunday afternoon, June 9 and was followed by a reception honoring the Graduating class and in the evening the Student Christian Union held its closing public meeting. The Graduating class presented the Class Day exercises on Monday evening, June 10, in an unusually clever way. At the Commencement exercise Tuesday morning, June 11, the following degrees were granted:

Dr. C. Hoyt Watson, President of Seattle Pacific College gave a very helpful and challenging address stressing the three-fold level of education, that of physical, mental and spiritual side of life. Tuesday evening the Alumni Association held their Banquet honoring the class of 1946 and an unusually fine program was presented at that meeting.

FACULTY

Several changes in faculty are necessary for the coming year. Gervas Carey, who has for the past five years headed the Bible department, has resigned. George Moore has been head of the department of Psychology and Education and has been elected to head the work of Financial and Student Solicitation and we must therefore find a substitute for him. Dr. McCormick will not be back next year. Professor Nye, organ teacher, will not be back.

The Faculty Committee of the Board is trying hard to find suitable replacements and hopes to have these positions filled in the near future.

ACTIVITIES

The college participated in three series of Evangelistic meetings this year. Early in the year Nathan Pierson, pastor of the Vancouver Friends Church, spent a week with us at the college in special Evangelistic services. The college cooperated with the

local church in a service conducted by Carl Byrd of Portland and J. G. Bringdale was with us for five days at Chapel time during the spring. All of these meetings were exceedingly helpful both to the college and community.

Outstanding this year was the work of the Music groups and the Deputation work. Under the direction of Professor Roy Clark the A Cappella choir gave 38 concerts, mostly in Friends and Evangelical churches and traveled over 2000 miles.

The Deputation work under the direction of Professor Roy Knight included the activities of over 50 young people. They traveled a total of 50,000 miles and conducted 317 church services, participated in 25 youth rallies, 17 Civic meetings and three radio broadcasts. Students gave 130 sermons and talks, 45 solos, while 34 special instrumental numbers were given, and special music was furnished for eight series of revival meetings.

Most of the student organizations functioned successfully with the exception of the athletic program. Due to the fact that we did not have a gymnasium, intercollegiate sports were considerably curtailed and only Basketball was conducted as a full-time sport.

The Women's Auxiliary of Pacific College, both the Newberg and Portland branches, were again very active in behalf of the college and have made a fine contribution to the work of the college.

AWARDS

The class awards based on scholarships and character were awarded this year as follows: The Freshman award went to Leona Harris; the Sophomore award was divided between Dale Parrish and Colleene Bybee; the Junior award went to Imogene Degner and the Senior award to Mildred Haworth. In addition, because of her high scholarship and character Mildred Haworth was the winner of a \$1500 scholarship from Columbia University which will enable her to spend an entire year in school there getting her Master's Degree.

Scholarships were offered as usual to some young person in each Quarterly Meeting of the Yearly Meeting and to the outstanding graduate of Greenleaf Academy.

NEEDS AND PLANS

One of the disasters which struck the college this year was the fire which partially destroyed Hoover Hall. In this Hall were located the Boys' dormitory, the Music department, Art, Typing, Shorthand, Biology laboratory, Dark room and large recitation room. Fire destroyed the usefulness of the building until repairs can be made. This disaster however brought to our attention in a more vivid way the need for additional buildings.

By action of the board, Hoover Hall is to be restored at a cost of approximately \$5,000 and definite plans are under way to complete the gymnasium before the beginning of school. Also by action of the Board, plans are being made for the construction of a new girls

dormitory which will house approximately 60 girls and provide adequate dining facilities for all the boarding students.

Needed very badly also are a new Library building and a new Science building which will house the Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Home Economics.

The college Board has taken action authorizing a request for standardization by the Northwest Association for the coming year. We feel that sufficient progress has been made on the requirements laid down by the Northwest Association so that the college is justified in making application for recognition. The one possible exception may be the indebtedness we have been unable to retire. However, more than \$18,000 indebtedness has been paid off during the year and surely the rest can be taken care of in some way.

To aid in financial problems of the institution the Board has elected George Moore to serve as Financial secretary beginning at once. It is hoped that all friends of the college will rally to the financial support of the institution under his direction.

During the year we have secured a number of government houses for the use of returned veterans. These houses were placed on our campus at government expense and are fully equipped with necessary furniture. Even so, additional dormitory space is essential in order to care for all the students who have indicated their expectation of attending college next year. By making certain repairs on the girl's dormitory annex it is hoped that at least 10 more girls will be accommodated there.

FIVE-YEAR PERIOD

At the conclusion of five years of service as President of Pacific College it is interesting to take a quick glance at what has been accomplished in this period. All of this period has been under most strenuous circumstances. The war began for the United States in the fall of 1941 and while the fighting has ended we are still under war conditions. In spite of the fact that Selective Service had claims on all young men 18 years or older our enrollment never went below 75. The highest enrollment reached was 130. During this period the main building, Wood-Mar Hall, has been thoroughly reconditioned inside, and a new roof put on. A dormitory annex has been secured to take care of additional girls, Hoover Hall was thoroughly reconditioned and the boy's dormitory part had all ceilings lowered and a new heating plant installed.

The old gymnasium was torn down and the new gymnasium is well under way.

From a financial viewpoint the past five years have been quite interesting. The net endowment has increased from \$217,629.18 at the beginning of the five years to \$338,910.53 at the close of the period, or a net increase of \$121,281.35. Additional funds have been raised for operating expenses and general repairs to the extent of \$71,234.43 and a building fund of \$30,136.56 has been collected. Adding all these items together we see that \$192,515.78 has been collected for all purposes during this five-year period. This has only

been possible through the divine blessing of our Heavenly Father and the generous giving of the friends of Pacific College. The next five years should be even more fruitful than the past five. God is raising up friends of the institution who are ready to help us out financially. Larger numbers of students are looking toward Pacific College for the coming year. We hope to secure a better trained faculty as vacancies occur. We earnestly hope that we may receive accreditation in the near future. A great field is open for our college. Achievement of our goals and ideals require that we pull together.

Acknowledgment should be made for the sacrificial services of the Faculty, for the untiring effort of the Board of Managers and the gifts and prayers and support of all those who have helped to make the college what it is.

We shall look to the future with great expectation and a continued guidance and blessing of our Heavenly Father.

WOMEN'S HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONARY UNION

There has been an increased interest in the Women's Missionary Union in this fifth year of organized effort. Thirty-one reports were received telling of the home and foreign work, the books studied, and the money raised.

Three new unions were organized the past year: Springbrook, Rosemere and Marion. Rallies were held in Boise Valley Quarter, Greenleaf Quarter, Portland and Newberg. These were days of particular blessing and help as the needs of the field were presented. Julia Pearson brought the inspirational address at the Newberg meeting, Esther White portrayed vividly the needs of the Klamath Indian Reservation at the Portland Rally, and in the afternoon Willis Hotchkiss, veteran missionary from Africa brought a challenging appeal for the work there. The fall day of prayer at Melba was addressed by Howard and Julia Pearson and by Evert Tuning, who brought close to the audience the needs of the Indians at Sprague River. The spring Missionary Day was held at Home-ale with Walter P. Lee and Frank L. Davies presenting the needs of the foreign and home fields.

A Year Book was prepared this year for the use of the Unions, giving devotional material, outline of projects for home and foreign fields, and a directory of addresses. This book was so much appreciated, especially by the newer unions, that it is to be a regular feature of the work.

The books that have been studied or circulated have been many and varied. South Salem deserves special credit for the work they have done along this line.

The Home Project this year has been a five dollar-a-month love-offering to Lillian Frazier, parish worker at Talent, and a \$3.00 subscription to a magazine or paper for each outpost pastor or worker.

The foreign project for this year was the raising of money to be used for the furnishing of the home for Roscoe and Tina Knight. This has amounted to \$735.04. For next year our faith reaches out to an even larger project. We have accepted the challenge of buying a part of the farm large enough to build a chapel and parsonage, with the thought that these may be taken up as later projects. May God increase our faith as we give sacrificially to our project this year.

An outstanding feature of our year's program was the W.M.U. Banquet held at the Chamber of Commerce rooms in Newberg, June 14. Two hundred and three women were present and enjoyed the fellowship and inspiration of such a gathering.

We are grateful to the Lord for His blessing and help throughout the past year, and as other officers carry on the work may we remember them in prayer, and work with unflagging zeal.

Homedale put these ads in the Homedale weekly paper, The Owyhee Chronicle, and also circulated printed temperance articles among the schools once a quarter. They secured fifty subscriptions to the Idaho Challenge.

Greenleaf circulated petitions to get liquor out of the grocery stores in Caldwell.

One of the Sunday Schools in Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting also circulated a petition to eliminate liquor from a grocery store. One Sunday School secured 99 Temperance pledges.

Clynton Crisman, Superintendent

This responsibility as outlined in the discipline is as follows: The Board of Publication is authorized to publish the Yearly Meeting periodical, and is responsible for the appointment of its editorial staff and for all editorial and financial policies concerning it. It is further authorized to build and administer a revolving publication fund and to publish books, pamphlets, and other church and Bible school literature as need may arise and the board deem wise.

During the year the circulation of the Northwest Friend has increased 25 per cent to that of 2,000 copies. EVANGELISTIC AND CHURCH EXTENSION

66. Joseph G. Reece, our General Superintendent, read his report which appears below:

In reviewing the many activities of the Yearly Meeting for the year just past, we would first of all give praise to Him, to whom all praise is due. We are unworthy of our noble calling and any success was because the hand of the Lord was extended in our behalf. We are humbly thankful for the measure of success and blessing God has seen fit to grant.

Secondly, we would speak in heart-felt appreciation for the faithful and sacrificial work of our pastors and missionaries. It is regrettable that many of our pastors do not receive a salary sufficient to maintain their homes, yet they do not complain, but press the work to the best of their ability. Some of our pastors have refused offers of \$250.00 to \$300.00 per month and continue to preach at \$30 per month while the wife works to complement the salary. God grant that the entire membership of Oregon Yearly Meeting may be fired with a new vision of their privileges and opportunities in Christ, and be willing to present themselves as living sacrifices, holy, acceptable unto God, which is their reasonable service.

In the third place we would give sincere praise for every faithful and devoted worker in the Yearly Meeting. This list of workers would include all from the Clerks of our Yearly Meeting down to our Juniors in the smallest of our meetings. All have their places in the extension of the Gospel message. "It is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful." I Cor. 4:2.

For two years there has been a keen desire on the part of many to reach a goal of 4,000 members. This year our gain was only 66. We are still 195 short of the goal. Possibly it is time we were trying to discover the reason for such a slow growth. We trust that we have not contracted that modern disease, which for a better word is known as 'bottle-neckitis.'

It might be well for some of our Monthly Meetings and Quarterly Meetings to give further consideration to the reports they sent in as to the spiritual life of the meeting. Good reports have come from most of our meetings and almost without exception they report that attendance at services and prayer meetings has

been good and that the members have been faithful in their responsibilities. As the report is read one receives the impression that the meeting is satisfied with the accomplishments.

There is a familiar line which reads something like this, "Your life speaks so loudly that I can't hear what you say." In other words—the reports from our monthly meetings and from our quarterly meetings should have their counterpart in action. Jesus said, "Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit." Oh that Oregon Yearly Meeting might bring great glory to our Father by bearing MUCH fruit!

The outlook for the year ahead is most uncertain and the prospects appear hopeless as nations madly scramble for places of power. But whatever the outlook or the circumstances, the task of Oregon Yearly Meeting is certain and sure. **Our task is to evangelize.** It is imperative that we redouble our evangelistic efforts this year. We challenge each of you to become a flaming evangel for our Christ. We don't expect you to be a George Fox, a Joseph John Gurney, a John Henry Douglass, a Walter or Emma Malone, an Arthur Chilson, a Chester Hadley or a Helen Cammack. We plead that you be yourself, indwelt by the empowering Spirit of God and moved into service by Him.

It is natural to expect that God will move on such a person to constantly be on the alert to point men to the "Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world."

Also, He will move upon such people to express in material ways their love to those many millions of people who are destitute, sick and starving. From Oregon Yearly Meeting should go many **"heifers for Europe,"** and **barrels of food** from our barns of plenty and **bundles of clothing** which will help to warm the hearts as well as the bodies. Let each monthly meeting Service committee press this part of our testimony in these days of such pitiful need.

This year we have travelled over 26,000 miles in the interests of the Yearly Meeting; attended the dedication of our beautiful new church at Medford July 22; also, the dedication of the Youth Chapel and parsonage at McKinley Avenue Meeting in Tacoma October 7th and the dedication of the basement under the church at Star December 16.

Tillamook observed their first anniversary on Sunday, October 14, with special services, morning, afternoon and evening and a fellowship dinner at noon.

The News Flash has been issued regularly each month. The new disciplines have been printed and delivered. The very interesting pamphlet, named Quaker Quiz, is now available.

The pictures, both still and moving, of our missionary, home and conference activities have been shown whenever requested.

Roscoe and Tina Knight left for Bolivia, October 23rd. The Yearly Meeting headquarters was a very busy place about this

time as Roscoe and Tina prepared and packed their goods for shipment.

According to instruction and appointment we attended the Convention of the National Association of Evangelicals at Minneapolis, April 24 to May 2, 1946.

The conferences at Quaker Hill, Wauna Mer and Twin Rocks were well attended and brought a challenge and inspiration to the more than 700 who attended. Two new conferences are being started this year. One in Southern Oregon, under the leadership of Medford and Talent and the other in Northern Idaho on the shores of Hayden Lake and sponsored by Tacoma Quarterly Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Ministerial Association was held at Quaker Hill last September.

William Pribbenow is leaving Newberg and Carl Byrd is moving from Second Church Portland to be the pastor. Paul Mills is leaving Nampa and Earl Geil is leaving Piedmont to assume the pastorate at Nampa. Herald Mickelson, from Kansas Yearly Meeting, is coming to Piedmont. Frank Davies is leaving Greenleaf to become General Superintendent of Kansas Yearly Meeting. Ferne and Ellis Cook are leaving Ontario Heights and are moving to Sprague River to help in the work there. Robert and Lela Morse are taking up the work at Ontario Heights. Robert Ralphs is leaving Entiat. Jack and Geraldine Willcuts are leaving Northeast Tacoma to be our missionaries in Bolivia.

Again, we are glad to incorporate into our report the work of our ministers who are not in active pastoral work. Of the 68 question blanks sent out the 39 returned give us the following information:

In spite of restriction and limitations considerable building and remodeling was done over the Yearly Meeting. The meeting at Marion is in the process of building a new parsonage. It is not fully completed but the pastors, Frank and Lois Haskins, are living in it.

At Nampa they are excavating a full basement under the church.

At Caldwell funds have been raised with which to buy property when a suitable location has been found.

West Chehalem has not been able to complete their new parsonage, but have prospects of finishing it soon.

Talent was not able to start their building program because they could not get a clear title. The funds are on hand and as soon as the title is cleared they will begin building. Their building plans have been given to the Advisory Building Committee for the final O.K.

Forest Home has bought and paid for a splendidly located piece of property where they hope to start building soon.

Many of our meetings have their plans made and funds on hand so that they can start building as soon as restrictions are lifted.

The meetings at Middleton and Sherwood have combined and will be known as the Sherwood Monthly Meeting. For several years there has been a feeling that these two meetings located so near each other should unite and thus form a strong and aggressive meeting. The property at Middleton has been sold and with part of the proceeds they have bought a large bus to gather up the people who live at a distance. Kenneth Williams becomes their pastor.

We would also express our thanks for passes on the Southern Pacific R.R., Spokane, Portland and Seattle R.R. and the Northern Pacific Railroad.

Again we acknowledge the excellent services of Richard Kneeland, our treasurer. He has been most generous with his time and his office.

As we obey the injunction to lift up our eyes and look upon the fields white already unto the harvest, in this Northwest, we see Algoma thirty-four miles north of Hayden Lake. We see the Grand Coulee country, Spokane, Seattle and the Olympic peninsula. We see Washougal five miles east of Camas, where millions of dollars are being spent in erecting great manufacturing plants. We do praise God for the faithful and untiring efforts of our General Sup't., Joseph G. Reece, and his wife, Pearl. Throughout the year they have carried the heavy responsibilities, sparing no effort to strengthen the work. We are grateful for the vision our Sup't. has had in two major projects.

1. Pressing the work, and development of the new fields, and endeavoring to make the outposts, and new meetings, as self-supporting as possible.

2. A growing concern that the weaker Monthly Meetings of the Yearly Meeting be revitalized, and strengthened. There is, perhaps, a danger that in the enthusiasm over new points, we should fail to see the need to encourage, and challenge the older meetings, to renewed effort for the Lord.

We want to urge the churches of the Yearly Meeting to do their utmost in raising the standard of Pastoral support, to the level that is now necessary with the higher cost of living. This would be to the glory of God, and the betterment of the church, and standard of service.

Another important concern is that the Yearly Meeting will respond with greater financial assets for our Board. We feel that there should be a closer balance between the response for home and foreign fields. There are many fields in need of help, and we want to challenge the Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting to increase the giving to this work, in order that the old and new fields shall be developed in such a way, as to gain the respect of the world, and other Christian bodies. The Epistle from La Paz appears below:

La Paz, April 23, 1946

To Oregon Yearly Meeting
 Beloved Brethren:

The Yearly Meeting of La Paz was held in Bolivia from the 16th to the 21st of the month of April of this year. We send you affectionate greetings in the love of our Savior Jesus Christ. Having greeted you we share with you the rich blessings with which God has greatly blessed us.

In this Meeting we have gathered from various separate places to the church of La Paz, which is central for all the churches. In these days the services began at six in the morning, and continued until nine at night. During the hours of the morning we had various classes on prayer, holiness and devotionals and preaching. In the afternoon we had the study of the music of new songs, preaching of the tithe and of the workers, and reports of the work by the pastors and workers from many places.

Missionaries of the Methodist, Baptist, Lutheran and Church of God missions visited us, who preached with a fervent spirit and with love. God spoke by His Spirit to the hearts through the preachers, and many sought salvation and holiness; for this reason we appreciated our visitors very much.

So, also, in our own church, Superintendent Ralph Chapman, Roscoe Knight and Pastor Tamplin preached, and other pastors and national workers.

Your committee has gone as far as possible at this time in attempting to stir up interest in the proposed Home for Aged Friends. The response, insofar as Friends in Oregon are concerned, has been disappointing. And this committee can see no further need in attempting to found such a home here in Oregon, unless there should be some definite offers of financial assistance in appreciable amounts to amply justify further procedure.

However, Idaho Friends have responded to the founding of a Home within their own field of service. They have appointed a

joint committee from the two Quarterly Meetings to go forward with this project.

Your committee recommends that Oregon Yearly Meeting endorse the action of the Friends in Idaho and give them every encouragement to proceed.

80. The Executive Committee made the following report:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends:

In its mid-year meeting the Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting considered the askings of the various departments of work of the Yearly Meeting. A tentative budget was adopted and forwarded to the local meetings. The response from the monthly meetings in their pledges did not reach the proposed budget. To present the budget according to the responses would necessitate a cut of twenty cents on every dollar in every phase of both the home and foreign work. The Executive Committee was unwilling to make this cut without presenting the proposed budget to the Yearly Meeting for consideration.

The Meeting adopted the budget according to the pledges that have been made with the understanding that the various monthly meetings attempt to raise the money that is necessary to complete budget as presented by the Executive Committee.

PEACE DEPARTMENT

81. The Reading Clerk read the report of the Peace Department in the absence of Loyde Osburn, the Superintendent.

The report was approved and appears below:

Peace Reports were received this year from twenty-four Meetings, including five outpost Meetings. However, the Reports were generally sketchy and incomplete—and among those who failed to report were two of our largest Meetings. Because of these factors, my summary consists of general observations rather than definite figures.

The Reports revealed that very few committee meetings were held during the year. There were several sermons on peace, but apparently very little special peace emphasis in Bible School activities. However, a commendable degree of activity was noted in the matter of sending communications on behalf of peace.

More than 3900 pieces of peace literature were distributed. This material included: Christianity & Conscription, Position of Society of Friends in Regard to War, Why I Cannot Go to War, Basis of Our Peace, Oppose Conscription, Oppose Draft Extension, Can We Have Both Revenge & Peace?, Final Secret of Pearl Harbor, Amnesty for War Objectors, C.O. Guinea Pigs, Without Food There Will Be No Peace, Rural People & Relief Needs in Europe, Heifers for Relief and Relief Program of the Rural Life Association.

Peace periodicals received by members included: Fellowship, Peace Action, American Friend, Reporter, Civilian Public Service Information, Newsletter from Friends Committee on National Legislation, Melvinonian, and American Friends Service Committee News.

The draft figures indicated a decrease, although several men are still in the armed forces, some in non-combatant service, and a few still in CPS. Those in CPS are no longer under Friends administration but are in camps and units maintained either by oth-

er denominations or by the government. In March, six months after the cessation of hostilities, Friends withdrew from the administration of CPS, fearing that to continue to operate camps and units might contribute to the government's efforts to inaugurate a system of peacetime conscription. However, C.O.'s were not left without aid. The American Friends Service Committee and other Friends groups are still furnishing counseling, educational assistance, dependency relief, placement service, etc., to present and former CPS men. The Peace Reports indicated that our Meetings had expended a considerable amount of money for CPS during the past year.

The most interesting part of the Reports was the section dealing with foreign relief. There has been much activity in this field—although two Meetings reported that they had done nothing. Several clothing drives were mentioned. Clothing donations were reported by packages, boxes, barrels, pounds and tons. Several hundred dollars in cash were contributed, some Meetings raising as much as five hundred or a thousand dollars. One Meeting reported that communications and packages have been sent to a family in Paris. Another stated that one member selected a French child to send supplies to. A third reported that one of the members who is a business man, born in Holland, has paid all expenses of shipping to Holland the church's contributions of clothing, food, etc. At least one Meeting assumed leadership of a community drive for clothing and funds, with very gratifying results.

This concludes the Report summary. I would now like to remark briefly on the general world situation.

The second great World War has ended—but the world is not at peace. In many war-torn countries starvation and disease, death and despair, are tragic realities. Political turmoil plagues nation after nation. The United Nations Organization is unable to agree on international problems. Certain countries continue to prepare for war. Our own nation with its comparative abundance of food and money is in a state of unrest, being tormented by strikes, inflation, class distinctions, race friction and the like. Hundreds of conscripted men are still in the armed forces, in CPS camps, or in prison—and the draft continues.

Of course the picture is not all dark. Considerable effort is being made by the government and independent groups to feed and clothe foreign populations. For this we can be grateful and can resolve to give to the utmost. While thus trying to save lives we may also be helping to promote Christian fellowship and understanding among the peoples of the world.

Problems of the present era are indeed challenging to the Christian pacifist—and his counsel is greatly needed. Relief and reconstruction must be carried on with vigor. Peaceful settlement of international problems must be sought. National and international abolition of armaments and military conscription should be urged. Civilian control of atomic energy should be achieved. There should be amnesty for C.O. prisoners, improvement in race relations, less friction between labor and management; and greater emphasis on Christian principles in all affairs of nation, state, com-

munity and home. This is not a time for preaching alone, but a time to implement our preaching with deeds of kindness, mercy and compassion—for the relief of suffering humanity everywhere.

NORTHWEST FRIEND'S SERVICE COMMITTEE

82. Robert Morrill, chairman of this committee, read the following report which was accepted:

The report of this committee this year will be somewhat different from that of other years in that the work of the committee was enlarged by action of the Yearly Meeting last year. We have endeavored to fulfill the tasks given unto us and we therefore give this report.

The situation in regard to the Conscientious Objectors has changed during the past year. As far as we are now aware we are not paying any more toward the support of men in the C.P.S. Camps. As suggested in the peace report these are now in government camps. The last bill from the A.F.S.C. is in the hands of the treasurer and we hope can be paid soon.

The matter of World Relief was placed in the hands of this committee last year and although through the ignorance of the chairman of the committee nothing was done by the committee until the middle of the year, yet the churches have carried on the work throughout the year. Following is a summary of the reported activity:

Sent through the American Friends Service Committee, 3025 pounds, 8 bundles, several boxes of used clothing and 1112 garments; 4 wool comforters, 1 wool blanket, 11 sewing kits, 65 pairs of shoes, 42 boxes of food and \$2365.15.

Through the Brethren Committee, \$45.50.

Through the National Association of Evangelicals, 1872 pounds, 2 boxes, 25 bundles, 6 barrels of used clothing and 108 used garments, and \$6.50.

Navy Relief, \$10.00

Save the Children Foundation, 37 pounds used clothing and \$136.00.

Through the International Committee 220 pounds used clothing. Federal Council, 50 pounds used clothing.

Other agencies, 75 pounds used clothing.

Camas reported sending their aid direct to Holland through the kindness of a man in the community who paid the shipping charges.

Medford gave a good report of their work in aiding C.P.S. men and helping relocate and settle Japanese in their community.

The committee realizes that this is not a complete picture for only 24 meetings reported.

We are grateful indeed for all that has been done and for the kind help of each one that has aided in this work. This report closes

The Committee had been given the privilege of taking a collection to make up the deficit and to take care of half the tuition of a C.P.S. man in Pacific College. The collection amounted to \$178.10.

Kenneth Eichenberger, who last year expressed a concern to do relief work, in which he could add the evangelical element to the humanitarian efforts, told of his experiences in the Sky Island Hostel where there were many refugee Jews. There he had opportunity of witnessing for Christ.

He said that there was a need of mature, well-established Christians to go and live among people who do not know Christ.

Some members spoke, telling how much his work had been appreciated.

The organization of the Service Board was read and will appear in the Appendix.

The following goals of the Service Board were presented to the Meeting and were approved:

1. That in our communities we endeavor to make use of every opportunity to help our fellowmen that none might suffer because of our neglect of this part of our stewardship.
2. In the realm of National Service we cannot foresee what the future holds for us but we need to keep ourselves in readiness to help our men in C.P.S. Also we have made a promise that we will do all we can to help the returned C.P.S. men to attend Pacific College. We are offering to pay, as the funds come in, one half tuition for these men at Pacific College.
3. The realm of World Service is a wide open door and as Christians we have a great task before us. We are asking all meetings to continue the used clothing drives. In the area of food relief we are suggesting that money donations rather than food donations be made. We would especially call your attention to the program of the National Association of Evangelicals which will furnish meals for the starving peoples of Europe at 3 cents per meal. The A.F.S.C. is also urging money donations.

Some suggestion was made concerning the Heifers for Europe but again we suggest that it might be better if the heifers would be sold and the money sent to the Brethren Committee for them to use for the purchase of heifers on the eastern seaboard.

No matter what we do let us remember to begin now and do it quickly. The need is extremely great. We have a great responsibility.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

100. Walter P. Lee, President of the Board of Foreign Missions, read the following report from the Friends Bolivian Mission from the field:

16TH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FRIENDS BOLIVIAN MISSION 1945-1946

Into the history of the past year has been interwoven a pattern of joys, tears, perplexities, and seemingly insurmountable obstacles. We ventured forth from the Yearly Meeting of 1945 with the determination to glorify God in thought, word and deed. As to the extent of the success or failure in accomplishing this, we can only trust that He, who, in infinite wisdom and mercy is our judge, will add to that which was for the edification of the Church and teach and correct through that in which we failed. Before the missionaries and the church was always the exhortation, "Confirme vuestro corazon en Santidad" (Stablish thy heart in Holiness). Nevertheless, we have failed to find reason for not continually voicing the oft-repeated prayer of Solomon, "Lord, give therefore thy servant an understanding heart." We coveted much the ministry of the Holy Spirit in our midst that we, in even a small measure, might fulfill our obligations to our believers and through them to the Aymara people we are privileged to touch.

Evangelism

We have endeavored to keep before us this year the same vision that has undergirded the evangelistic program of former years. Thanks is given to God for the zeal of the Native Church. It is to be realized that the effectiveness of the ministry of many was limited. In this, reference is made to **lack** of Bible training, **lack** of effective methods for the ministry of the Word, and the limitation of time for active church work on the part of many of the Indian men. The maintenance of the evangelistic as well as other programs, nevertheless, was made possible through the willingness of the Native church to assume its duties. Out of last year's conference went two pastors and 21 workers. They were not aided by extensive training or prompted to more efficient labor by elaborate programing. In their hearts was a desire to tell others about the Christ. This message of Salvation was carried forth on the wings of a zeal to bring to others that which had reached them. It is, therefore, a privilege to emphasize the fact that there is ever present in our hearts a voice of praise and a word of thanks to God for these our brethren in Christ. They have most faithfully labored to evangelize; undaunted by their limited abilities.

"Much visitation" was the unwritten theme during the months that followed the Yearly Meeting. Four trips were made to Mina Fabulosa, which is the most inaccessible of all our preaching points. In proportion to this were the innumerable trips to all our stations where roads now make them easily accessible by auto.

The Amacari influence is expanding. The pastors and workers are reaching out into many neighboring communities with the

Gospel. Our contact with communities in Peru is still maintained through one of the Amacari workers. The work in Pongon Huyo has passed its time of persecution, and the brethren are now ready to build their church again. This district now has a new outpost on the Hacienda Gorpaputo. Corocoro has gained its place in our hearts through the consecration of its pastor, Mariano Cusicanqui. The church there is limited in its ministry, yet faithful, and God has been pleased to use it to further His cause. Mina Fabulosa and Uma Palca have growing evangelistic programs. God is using these faithful believers and is "adding to the church such as should be saved." La Paz, in its outreach to Puerto Perez, Pucarani, Guarina, Laja, Mina Milluni, Asunta Killviri, as well as being vitally interested in all the field, has played a most important role in the developments of the past year. The absence of a resident pastor has been an ever-present reality to them, but they have risen above that and are quite unconsciously receiving that training which marks the development of the Indigenous Church. They have faithfully sent out workers Sunday by Sunday to minister to these charges. Some do not even have a moment to eat their noon meal for they must hold their services in time to return on the afternoon trucks. They travel rain or "shine" and often in disagreeable conditions. Yet, God has placed a message in their hearts, and we dare not thwart its proclamation. In La Paz itself, the brethren are very active. They are not content with Sunday School, Sunday morning and Sunday afternoon preaching, Tuesday and Thursday evening meetings for prayer and preaching. Saturday they come from work to carry on a street meeting. Sunday morning before Sunday School adults, as well as the young people, have another street meeting. Sunday afternoon before the service in the church they have a street meeting, and Sunday afternoon, after the church service, two or three groups scatter over the Indian district to have more street meetings. Cannot God use such consecration as this? God help us all to measure **our** efforts in the light of the task that lies before us, and in comparison to the consecration of these our brethren in the faith.

We express gratitude to the workers, who, through their dedication to the task of evangelizing, have renewed the work in Laja, Patapatani, Guarina, and made contact in Mina Milluni, Asunta Killviri, as well as other points.

Paul writes to the Romans, "... And His (God's) ways are past finding out." We have felt very deeply the humbling force of the "seemingly insurmountable" that engulfed our evangelistic program of the year. Yet, today we stand before God, as missionaries, and I believe as a Native church, with an enlarged vision of what He has before us in the days to come. During the year we, as well as the native believers, have learned the value of placing our confidence in God rather than in man. Our conferences, the newly assumed responsibilities on part of many lay members, the lack of ever-helpful advice on the part of older missionaries, God's assurances through victories gained, and His lessons through failures have, during the year, contributed to that composite which is not to be evaluated with finite mind.

Schools

Our failure to put into action that school program that we desired can only be considered as a result of another of the "seemingly insurmountables" of the past year. We have, at the time of this writing, a large school in Amacari. The students are for the most part Catholic. We demand that in turn for providing the teachers and maintaining the school, we be given authority to have Gospel songs sung, a Bible passage read and enlarged upon, and a time of prayer at the beginning of each day. What a thrill it is to enter the school and listen to 115 young voices raised in the singing of Gospel choruses. This is especially true when we realize that many of them have as yet no other contact with the Gospel, whether by personal choice or by restraint from their parents. There are three teachers in the Amacari school. In the neighboring community of Lluypaya, we have recently opened a school with one teacher and a prospect of 35 or 40 pupils. In Pongon Huyo, Felix Guanica is directing a school which is not officially a Friends Mission school, but is for children of our believers. In the neighboring Hacienda Corpaputo, Felix's nephew has recently opened a school, which, in conjunction with a small church, will be under the direction of Felix Guanica and officially connected with our mission. In the recently visited community of Patapatani, we are soon to open another mission school. La Paz still has its two schools, day and night. The teachers are young men from our own La Paz church who have been privileged to continue with secondary schooling. The day school teacher, Silas Casas, has surpassed our highest expectation, and is really working at his post. The school program is now entirely under the able direction of Roscoe Knight, and we are looking forward to a marked development in this phase of the school program, as well as in that which pertains to the Bible school.

Bible Classes

Roscoe Knight is now actively engaged in Bible Class work among the brethren of La Paz. This class convenes every Wednesday and Friday nights. Roscoe is very capably teaching in Spanish in these classes. Let us all continue more fervently our uplift in prayer for him and Tina as they assume increased responsibility.

Construction, Building Improvements, Etc.

With the exception of a few minor changes or improvements in chapels or rooms occupied by the mission in the country, this phase of the report touches the La Paz property. During the past year a small partition in the church basement was removed and a new partition placed in a different position. Through this change a small, inside room was changed from a "dead" space to form part of a larger room which is now used by the Young People's Society. The rest-room which was located just inside the entrance to the basement has been removed, and two new rest-rooms have been built outside, to the rear of the church. The proposed construction of an auxiliary building on the vacant lot to the side of the mission home has been repeatedly delayed. This has been

to our advantage, for we have recently learned that the street along the back of our property is to be constructed soon. This will cut off the tip of the vacant lot, but will give us from four to six feet of additional property across that portion of our holdings on which is situated the church and mission home. Had the other building already been constructed, we should have had to tear it down as shall be done with all the buildings "across the wall" or it would have had to be cut off, which would have caused much expense at any rate. The Lord willing, we do hope to begin this new construction soon with this recent development in view. In the mission home itself there have been two changes of significance during the year. In what might be compared to a large closet off one of the basement rooms, there has been constructed a large vault, in which we now keep mission funds, legal papers, etc. This has been built by funds given by the relatives of Ida B. Hinshaw, and on the door is printed, "En Memoria de Ida B. Hinshaw". The vault has ample space for the needs of the mission and affords a very suitable location for funds and legal papers. Mention should be made also of the installation of the electric water heater. The old tank that was in the bathroom was removed and the new tank put there in its place. Hot water outlets were placed on the bathtub and wash basin, and connection was made to furnish hot water at the kitchen sink.

Automobile

The car has been an indispensable factor in our work here. The development of the roads, as well as the making of new roads, has increased the usefulness of the car. With the exception of Mina Fabulosa and Patapatani, every district of our field can be easily reached by auto. Thus it is that we offer thanks many times over for the advantage that has been offered by the use of the auto. Its running expense has been nominal in comparison to the strain placed upon it in travel over Bolivian roads. We trust that the day shall soon be at hand when we shall have a truck on the field to aid us also in our ministry.

YEARLY MEETING, LA PAZ, APRIL 16-21, 1946

We once again look back upon the completion of another "Junta Annual". Although we had rather dreaded what we imagined would be cause for difficulties, we found that God helped us to meet the various problems. In place of misunderstandings and disagreements concerning policies of the work, we found a unanimity in the general council meetings that was gratifying to us all. In these meetings we approved the nomination of 41 workers and two pastors to be fingers on the outreaching hand of the mission program. Two new Monthly Meetings, Corocoro and Mina Fabulosa, were authorized, and committees were named to visit and start these meetings. We discussed and formulated necessary resolutions with regard to the Indigenous Church Society and a new plan for the change of pastors. In the morning devotional periods of the conference we were privileged to entertain the following resident missionaries of La Paz: Rev. H. S. Hillyer, Baptist; Rev. John Showalter, Lutheran; Rev. Oather Perkinson,

Church of God, Holiness. Rev. Alberto Merubia, pastor of the Methodist Church of Obrajes, was evangelist for three evening services, and Carroll Tamplin brought the morning eleven o'clock messages. Church reports from the various districts were given during the afternoon business sessions. Without exception the brethren gave thanks for God's presence in their midst during last year and contemplated a wider scope in their ministry this year. We were privileged to obtain the services of Mrs. Marussich, our worker at the Cement Factory in Viacha, for the children's meetings. Sixty-five different youngsters were in attendance during these meetings. Our largest attendance was about 275 during the Easter Sunday morning service. We feel that God was pleased to use this Yearly Meeting and make of it one of the high spots of the year. It is with renewed vigor that we go forth, not just to retain and minister to that which was our charge during the past year, but to broaden the scope of our ministry. Great is the need; expansive is the untouched field. Our motto, "Para mi el vivir es Cristo" (For to me to live is Christ) holds no place for complacency or anything short of a whole-hearted acceptance of our task for the year that lies before us.

Personnel

On October 29, 1945 Roscoe and Tina Knight arrived to take part in the Bolivian Missionary program of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church. Soon after their arrival they undertook an extensive language study in preparation for the tasks ahead. We are thankful for these "companeros" and appreciate their help, that we together might the more effectively represent you here in this needy land. Knights now live in a rented apartment which they have made most livable.

An expression of deep gratitude is to be extended to Carroll and Doris Tamplin who have freely answered any and all calls for help as we have endeavored to meet the ever-increasing demands of the work.

We, your representatives here in Bolivia, wish to use this as another opportunity to thank you of OYM for your sacrifices, volume of prayer, and labors of love that mean so much to us and shall not pass by unrewarded.

Although it be impossible to portray in full our work on this field, we trust that this report may be an instrument in revealing the fact that we are still on the job and that the zeal manifested by the brethren as they went forth from our Yearly Meeting holds promise of great things in the year 1946-1947. To us comes the promise from the Word, "And if thou draw out thy soul to the hungry, and satisfy the afflicted soul: then shall thy light rise in obscurity, and thy darkness be as the noonday: And the Lord shall guide thee continually, . . . Isa. 58:10, 11a.

The following report from the Board appears below:

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE MISSIONARY BOARD

June 19, 1946

"Let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross; despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God".

The pathway of service for our Lord Jesus Christ is not always strewn with roses nor is the message of salvation always proclaimed under cloudless skies, but the love of Christ constrains us and the "joy that is set before us" impels us to take the message of Life to the people that sit in darkness.

This past missionary year has been one of lights and shadows but with a very conscious sense that God was in the shadows. With

trust in "Him who doeth all things well" and a swelling volume of praise in our hearts, we walk in ever-increasing light today. This has been a definite year of progress in the missionary program of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

The beginning of the year found us with two young missionaries, Ralph and Marie Chapman, in the first year of their missionary work alone on the field carrying the responsibility of the work. But God was with them and His amazing grace and divine wisdom is marvellous to our eyes. These young people have displayed a boundless devotion to Christ and a divinely inspired judgment in meeting the tremendous problems that confronted them.

We are very appreciative for the assistance rendered by Carröll and Doris Tamplin during these early months and to the National Holiness Missionary Society for the arrangement which permitted the sharing of the Tamplin's time with us.

In October, 1945, Roscoe and Tina Knight arrived in La Paz to share the responsibilities with the Chapmans. The amazing progress which both these couples have made in learning the language and customs and in winning the hearts of the Aymaras is a work of God. Tremendous problems from outside sources were a constant strain, but today they, along with the Aymara brethren, step forth with springing tread, renewed vision, and a shout of victory in their hearts. The march is forward.

Much genuine interest and prayer has been in operation here in the homeland during this year. We are moving toward the ideal of being actual "workers together" with our missionaries and with God. Churches, Sunday Schools, Missionary Societies and interested individuals have joyously assumed projects to supply various needs on the foreign field.

During the year a consecrated young couple, Jack and Geraldine Willcuts, have been placed under appointment to the Bolivian field. They have been studying the language and are making preparation to go to the field this year.

Howard and Julia Pearson, our missionaries who have been home on furlough, have visited all the meetings and outposts of our Yearly Meeting and are making plans for a return to Bolivia as soon as passports and passage can be secured.

Many interesting facts appear on the missionary reports from the monthly meetings and outposts. An increased emphasis on the urgency of preaching the Gospel to all people has been indicated by the increased number, totaling 231 sermons and addresses given by the pastors and others. Many of these were given by missionaries not only from our own field, but from fields in various parts of the world. A wide interest in the reading of missionary books was indicated as books of 86 different titles were read by about 355 people. About half the meetings reported regular missionary prayer meetings, most of them monthly and a few weekly, at which the average attendance over the Yearly Meeting was 239. It would appear that this powerful weapon should be employed to a much greater degree. The secret of the great success of many missionary

endeavors is the prayer bands that are supporting them. Could not Oregon Yearly Meeting be challenged to build up strong missionary prayer bands.

Of the large number of missionary programs given, 73 were presented in regular church services, 131 in Sunday School, 86 in Christian Endeavor and 131 in the Women's Missionary Societies. These programs were of great interest and inspiration and have helped to broaden our vision.

The President of the Board and his wife in company with the Yearly Meeting Superintendent and his wife were privileged to attend the Evangelical Foreign Missions Association in Minneapolis during the last week in April. This furnished real inspiration and valuable information which we trust will be exceedingly helpful in the progress of our work.

Great appreciation is felt for the assistance of the National Association of Evangelicals in securing passports for Roscoe and Tina Knight.

The Board recognizes keenly its human limitations, but glories in a limitless God. The problems of a missionary field are always great and the Board has felt its utter dependence upon our Heavenly Father and has spent much time in prayer for Divine guidance. We have been bound together by the bonds of unity, Christian Charity and love for our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. To Oregon Yearly Meeting comes the challenge: If we "love His appearing" we will zealously heed the prerequisite, "and this Gospel of the Kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come."
