The Alison Rogers Class of our Sunday School has a concern which developed at a recent class meeting. We would like to present this concern to First Friends Monthly Meeting with the recommendation it be approved and transmitted to Portland Quarterly Meeting for referral to the Yearly Meeting for its consideration.

Our concern has to do with the hours during which business sessions are held at Yearly Meeting. Many business and professional lay members of our Yearly Meeting are not permitted to participate in business sessions due to the fact they are held in the afternoon when normal business hours confine such members to their desks or to their professional duties incident to their livelihood.

We feel that the business sessions of our Yearly Meeting are of vital concern to all members and that the hours of the sessions should be so arranged to allow maximum attendance. If part of the business sessions could be scheduled in the evening, many could attend from Monthly Meetings in Portland and Salem Quarters who otherwise would be unable to do so.

We respectfully recommend that part of the business sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting be scheduled in the evenings.

- 13. The reports from the various Quarterly Meetings on the state of the Church were read and a summary appears below:

SUMMARY OF THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

All meetings report a good attendance at the Sunday morning services but most meetings feel that the Sunday evening services and midweek prayer meetings were less faithfully attended.

Most meetings report that family worship was maintained but some feel that more time could be spent with profit in reverent waiting on the Lord.

Some meetings are thankful for the blessing and inspiration that comes from the ministry of song as rendered by adult and youth choirs.

One meeting mentioned a spiritual growth among the young people and others mentioned the interest among the young people in the Youth for Christ movement and in Child Evangelism classes. A number of the young people are considering calls to full-time Christian work.

All the meetings have an interest in Missionary work. In one Quarterly Meeting missionary prayer bands and study groups have completed several projects.

Some feel the need for more teaching along the lines of peace. One meeting expressed a desire that members might be more careful of unkind criticisms. Another said that there was a spirit of cooperation among church members, that differences were easily settled and love of one another was shown.

All are opposed to the manufacture, sale or use of liquor and tobacco and most are consistent in avoiding places of harmful amusements.

Care is manifest in the selection of officers, teachers and workers in the church and they are in harmony with the doctrinal standards of Friends.

One meeting reports twenty-five young people taking a class in Friends Doctrines.

It is with a certain sense of achievement that we present our report today. While not all has been accomplished that could have been done, we are glad to report that all churches have done something in this field of activity. At least six relief agencies have received our support in money or goods, while much was sent by individuals or individual meetings to needy families across the ocean.

Many reports have come in stating the interest with which letters from the families that received help were read. While this is perhaps the most expensive method of doing relief work, it is also the most interesting because of the human interest and personalities involved.

During the year the committee has approved payment of \$90 tuition money to Pacific College for each of four ex-C.P.S. men who were in school. We thank you for your contributions that have made this possible.

The world-wide need of assistance has not diminished during the year, and so with this in mind we present the following goals for 1947-48:

1. Community Service.

(a) That in our communities we endeavor to make use of every opportunity to help our fellow men in the name of Christ and the church.

(b) That calling in interest of the church by the members be stressed.

2. National Service.

(a) That we again offer one-half tuition scholarships to all Oregon Yearly Meeting ex-C.P.S. men who desire to attend Pacific College.

(b) That we do all we can by letter or personal contact to defeat Universal Military Training and Peacetime Conscription.

(c) That we hold ourselves in readiness to do what is demanded of us by our changing times.

3. World Service.

(a) We suggest the following agencies: N.A.E., A.F.S.C., Ohio Yearly Meeting China Project; Heifers-for-Relief.

(b) That those wishing to support the Heifers-for-Relief do so by furnishing the heifers when possible. Money is acceptable also.

(c) That individual boxes be sent where practicable.

(d) That those interested look into the possibility of doing foreign service in other fields of activity besides missionary.

Ross McIntyre, a man who had served in C.P.S., told of his trip to Greece with a load of horses and mules. He told of the great need of the people of Greece, especially for clothing.

BOARD OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

- 35. Kelsey Hinshaw, President of the Board, presented the following reports:

Report of Committee on Public Relations Including public morals, stewardship, peace, literature and education.

Have you as a Monthly Meeting cooperated fully in carrying on the program and reaching the goals suggested by the Public Relations Board? 3—yes, 5—no, 14 give conditional answers.

Please indicate any part of the program that has not been used by your meeting. Education and Peace by a few meetings.

If you have not carried out some part of the program, can you suggest the reasons why this may be so? Very few answered the question, and those who did suggested lack of material and insufficient time after receiving goals.

Does your meeting have a library? 22—yes, 4—no.

What books added this year? Seventeen of those who had libraries added a total of 231 books. Some mentioned several second-hand books without giving the number.

What books or magazines have been given or subscribed to for your pastor? Twelve meetings gave a total of 18 books or magazines.

List books that have been found helpful for S. S. Superintendents, teachers and officers: Sunday School Digest by 17 meetings, Higley's Commentary—4, Sunday School Times—3, Century Leader, Church School Builder, 117 Object Lessons, New Century Leader, Holiness Journal, How to Put your Sunday School Across, My Message to Sunday School Workers, The Sunday School in Which We Teach, Christian Digest, Christian Century, Christian Era, You Can Teach, Successful Sunday School Teaching, A Successful Sunday School, B. Bowers' books—In Steps of St. Paul and My Vineyard, Outlines and Illustrations by Ellis, Talks for Superintendents, 101 Ways to Improve Your Sunday School, How to Put the Church School Across, Life and Times of the Messiah by Edersheim, Primary Methods, King's Business, and various books on Religious Education.

Do you handle all the literature distributed by the Boards of the Yearly Meeting? 13—yes, 17—no.

Have Stewardship, peace and the various phases of public morals been effectively presented from the pulpit? 31—yes; 2—no; one says indirectly and another says stewardship only. In C. E.? 15—yes; 2—no; 1 says some. In S. S.? 14—yes; 3—no. By literature? 13—yes; 3—no; 4—some.

What Sunday School literature is being used: George Fox—27; Friends—8; Union Gospel Press—11; Gospel Light—9; David Cook

—12; Wesleyan Methodist—6; Higley's—5; Penn—2; Scripture Press—2; God's Plan of the Ages—1; Nazarene—2; Gospel Life Press—1; Sunday School Banner—5; Augustan Lutheran—1; Gospel—1. A few other individual papers were mentioned.

Does your meeting make a special effort to inform its children and young people as to the Bible teaching and the Friends' stand with regard to these question? 29—yes; 1—no; 1 said yes on temperance; another said not enough aside from pastoral preaching.

How many tithers in your meeting? Twenty-eight meetings report a total of 897; 11 report a gain; 4 report a loss.

How many letters or telegrams sent to influence proper legislation and law enforcement? A total of 136 reported. One says practice encouraged but number not known.

How many students attending Pacific College?—83; Other church colleges—39; Universities—25; Academies—23; High School—129.

Do you have a fund for helping deserving students of your own membership? Three answer yes, 27 answer no.

Do you encourage your young people to attend Pacific College? 26—yes; 1—no; 1—some do; and 5 say not especially.

In addition to the above, the experience of four men was given. In each case the tobacco habit was banished with the coming of Christ into their lives.

One of the smaller meetings reports the distribution of twenty-one thousand pages of tracts during the year.

The following statement was attached to the report of one of the larger monthly meetings:

"We feel that there is increasing indifference regarding the peace question in our church. The concern of our peace stand as being an integral part of our Christianity has been shared by only a very small nucleus. It will take more than a mere handful in our midst to function effectively in the event of any crisis.

"It has been our observation that any concentrated effort in regards to Friends' peace testimony has been met with the idea that it is a complete endorsement of the activities of Eastern Friends and the American Friends Service Committee. It is our belief that the peace question is so vital to our Christianity that we can't afford to abandon it. We should be more zealous in our cause for peace because we have more than a belief in God; we believe in Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, as a means of salvation and it behooves us to exemplify the pacifistic traits in our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, to a nation wrought with many conflicting ideals."

At the mid-year meeting of the Board of Public Relations, we were asked to prepare a statement of our Peace principles to present to the Yearly Meeting. We present the following:

We believe that our statement of doctrine as found on pages 31 and 32 of the Discipline is clear and adequate. It reads: "We feel bound explicitly to avow our unshaken persuasion that all war is utterly incompatible with the plain precepts of our divine Lord and Law-giver, and the whole spirit of His Gospel, and that no plea of necessity or policy, however urgent or peculiar, can avail to release either individuals or nations from the paramount

allegiance which they owe to Him who hath said, 'Love your enemies.' (Matt. 5:44, Luke 6:27). In enjoining this love, and the forgiveness of injuries, He who has brought us to Himself has not prescribed for man precepts which are incapable of being carried into practice, or of which the practice is to be postponed until all shall be persuaded to act upon them. We cannot doubt that they are incumbent now, and that we have in the prophetic Scriptures the distinct intimation of their direct application not only to individuals, but to nations also. (Isaiah 2:4, Micah 4:1). When nations conform their laws to this divine teaching wars must necessarily cease.

We would, in humility, but in faithfulness to our Lord, express our firm persuasion that all the exigencies of civil government and social order may be met under the banner of the Prince of Peace, in strict conformity with His commands."

Since we believe that all war is wrong it becomes a matter of moral obligation to abstain from all connection with war organizations.

We feel that the statement on page 9 of the Discipline that many of the young men of the Yearly Meeting engaged in non-combatant service in the army or navy in full accord with the Friends peace testimony is not in harmony with the above statement of doctrine. We therefore recommend that the Yearly Meeting (1) recognize this discrepancy and (2) take the necessary steps leading to the elimination of the passage in question.

The Annual Report of Greenleaf Friends Academy

The thirty-seventh class has just graduated from the Greenleaf Friends Academy. This class, consisting of twenty-three members, was one of the largest classes in the history of the institution. Again, the enrollment was higher than the preceding year, with a total enrollment of 74 students. There were several denominations represented as well as several states of the union. On May 11, Rev. Nathan Pierson delivered the Baccalaureate address, and on Tuesday evening, May 13, Rev. Jack L. Willcuts delivered the Commencement address.

During the school year two revival meetings were conducted, the first at the beginning of the year with the faculty members and our new pastor, Paul Todd, conducting the chapel services, and the second with Paul Mills as evangelist. Many students testified to receiving definite spiritual help, and their lives gave evidence that much good had been done.

Along with regular school work a great deal of extra-curricular activity was carried on throughout the year. In the spring semester a series of programs was presented to raise money for long-needed tennis courts. A favorable response on the part of the Community netted almost enough for the courts. Recitals were presented at Christmas time by the Chorus and in the spring by the Girls' Double Sextette. Lucy Clark, director of the Sextette, also directed the Junior Class Play. Under the direction of the dramatics teacher, Marjorie Craven, several one-act plays were

presented at various churches in the valley. Under her direction the dramatics class presented a three-act play, "Mother Mine," for the tennis court benefit. The Band, composed of 33 members and directed by Fred Knight, presented the 4th annual Concert on Tuesday night, April 29. Harold Thompson has done fine work in the Athletic Department as coach.

Improvements to the building include refinishing the floor of the gymnasium, fluorescent lighting in the auditorium and part of the first floor, and plastic rock laid on the upper stairways. The Home Economics Department has purchased a new portable washing machine and has on order two new electric ranges; also a fine new set of silverware was presented to this department. A new set of large maps has been added to the Social Studies Department, and 20 new desk chairs were purchased for the Science room.

The students have engaged in considerable amount of deputation work throughout the year. Quartets, trios, and other groups have been active in service for the Master. Surely we are glad for the opportunity to tell others of Christ. A number of our student body feel a call to definite Christian Service, and we pray the Lord to continue to lead them into the path of His choosing. Our chapel services have been times of gracious victory and outpourings of the Holy Spirit.

Louise Fivecoat as valedictorian was awarded the scholarship to Pacific College. Elma Standfield was salutatorian. The honor of outstanding boy and girl student went to Gene Hockett and Margaret Weber.

We are trusting the Lord for the future of Greenleaf Academy. A great number of inquiries are being made concerning the possibility of enrolling here, but we have no dormitories, and our buildings and equipment are limited. There is a growing demand for this type of school for our high school young people. Let us not fail them in these troublous times.

President Gulley read his annual report, which appears below:

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF PACIFIC COLLEGE

The closing of the school year on June 10 marked the end of the 56th year of college work at Pacific College. The year 1946-47 was remarkable in several of its aspects. In the first place, we had the largest enrollment in the history of the institution, a combined total of students attending for one or both semesters of 180. Of this student body, 72 per cent were Friends. Following in order, 7 per cent were members of the Christian Church, 5 per cent Methodist, 4 per cent Baptist, and from thereon numerous other denominations were represented in smaller degree. Fifty-five G. I. students were enrolled the second semester.

The Commencement exercises were carried out as usual. On Friday evening, June 5, the Commencement Music program was given at Wood-Mar Hall with a considerable number of music students appearing on the program. The Baccalaureate sermon was given by the president of the college on Sunday afternoon, June 8, and the usual reception for students of the graduating class was held in Canyon Hall. The Student Christian Union held its closing public exercises on the evening of June 8. Senior class day exercises were held on Monday evening, June 9, and on June 10 at 10:00 a.m. the Commencement Exercises were held with a class of 13 sitting on the platform. The two last named are to receive their degrees on completion of a small amount of work which they have not yet finished.

Errol Elliott, Editor of the American Friend and Executive Secretary of the Five Years Meeting, gave a most helpful address dealing with practical Christian problems in the world in which we live. One of the largest gatherings of the Alumni Association was held Tuesday evening, June 10, when their annual banquet was given in honor of the class of 1947.

The class awards, which are based on scholarship and character, were as follows: Freshman award went to Roderick Falk, the Sophomore award went to Norval Hadley, the Junior award to Keith Williams, and the Senior award to Claude Lewis. Scholarships are offered as usual to some young person in each Quarterly Meeting of the Yearly Meeting and to the outstanding graduate of Greenleaf Academy.

Activities

The college activities were somewhat more numerous this year than common. The college participated in two evangelistic series, one, which was held in the college under the leadership of Paul Petticord, and the second, which was held in the Friends Church under the leadership of the pastor, Carl Byrd. Many students and others testified to the great blessings which these meetings were to them and the community.

The music groups were unusually active again this year. The A Capella Choir made a ten-day trip into California, reaching as far south as Los Angeles. In all, they gave over fifty public programs in three states. Numerous quartets and groups of singers were active, and in a contest for Barber Shop Quartets in the Northwest, the Pacific College entry captured first place and prize of 100 silver dollars.

Deputation work was carried out over a wide area with a particular emphasis on help to mission centers in Portland and elsewhere.

Athletics were carried on more extensively this year than during the war period. A full program in football, basketball and baseball for men was carried out, and an extensive program for women was also in evidence.

Faculty

Several changes in faculty are a necessity for the coming year. Those who are not to be back next year are Charlotte Macy, Lindell Hockett, Edward Harmon, Revetta St. Clair Crecelius, Galen Miller, Russell Lewis, Kelsey Hinshaw, Albert Shatzel and Mrs. Wesley Boyes. Those who have definitely been secured to take their places are Wallace Emerson, Paul Mills, Shirley Jo Stuart and Lucy Clark.

Buildings

During the year, work progressed on the new gymnasium to the point where it could be used for basketball and Physical Education. The playing floor, the lights, dressing rooms and general arrangement make our gymnasium one of the finest in the State of Oregon.

A new library was secured from the Federal Works Agency of the government and has been in operation during the latter months of school. It has extensive floor space and sufficient stack room space to meet our needs in a very adequate way.

Hoover Hall, which was partially destroyed by fire late in the school year of 1945-46, was restored for use during this present year. It houses, in addition to boys' dormitory quarters, the Music Department, the Art Department, the dark room, the Biology laboratory and a large recitation room.

At the conclusion of my service as president of Pacific College, I should like to briefly call attention to some of the outstanding accomplishments of this period. All of this period has been characterized by unusual circumstances. It included the full war period and a short part of the reconstruction period. Although Selective Service affected all young men eighteen years and older, the enrollment at Pacific College never dropped below 75. We reached the highest enrollment in the history of the institution this year. During the strenuous wartime period, Pacific College was recognized as a training school for ministers. It is gratifying to me to say that no bona fide case affecting ministerial classification among those who wished to attend Pacific College was lost, although in one instance the case had to be carried to the president of the United States.

The old gymnasium was torn down and a new gymnasium has been made ready for use at considerable expense. Twenty-four G. I. Houses have been located on the campus at a cost of \$49,000 and a new library at a cost of over \$18,000. These two latter were, of course, at the expense of the government. A great deal of equipment from the government was also received. The indebtedness of the institution has been materially reduced, and the net endowment has been increased by about \$125,000. Practically all of the buildings on the campus have been renovated and put in good order.

Standardization with the Northwest Association was under consideration, and acceptance was assured in the very near future. The standing of Pacific College both among the supporters of the institution, the school men of the Northwest and the people

of this community was raised to one of the highest peaks in the history of the college.

I trust I shall not be wrongly understood when I list some of the events of the year which definitely are on the other side of the picture. I do not care to comment on their interpretation but simply to list, for the information of the Yearly Meeting, some of the incidents which have occurred. Although my contract with the board called for three more years and I did not feel that God was through with my services at Pacific College, yet because of the attitude and action of certain leaders of the Yearly Meeting and others more closely connected with the college, the issue was forced and my resignation was accepted. The circumstances under which this occurred have led to a great deal of confusion and loss of confidence. A considerable number of the faculty have resigned. Definite promises were made that five or six Ph. D.'s would be contracted within ninety days after my resignation, but to date only one Ph. D. has been hired by the board. Several other positions on the staff are yet to be filled. No one has yet been secured for the presidency of the college. There has been wide-spread expression of lack of confidence in the future and in those who have brought about this condition. Among those expressing this feeling are numerous alumni, townspeople, former supporters both within and without the Yearly Meeting, and the High School Board has formally withdrawn permission for Pacific College students to participate in practice teaching there.

Several wills, which contained large provisions for the college, have been changed and the college is losing in the neighborhood of from \$250,000 to \$500,000 as a result of this loss of confidence. Standardization has been postponed indefinitely. This picture should present a real challenge to the Yearly Meeting. With the prospect of materially increasing the budget for the coming year and a decrease in income from former sources, new ways of financing the institution must be found. Additional equipment is imperative, and the housing situation is far from adequate. Additional dormitory space is needed, a new dining hall is a necessity, and additional laboratory space is required. My earnest concern is that the Yearly Meeting will rise to meet this challenge in an adequate way.

Acknowledgments should be made for the loyal and sacrificial service of members of the faculty and others who have given so generously of their time and means. Our confidence has been in God and may He continue to have sway in the future development of our beloved college.

● 36. After singing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," Edward Mott brought an inspirational message from Isaiah 12 and John 14:18. He emphasized especially the emotional aspects of the Christian religion—how marvelous have been the blessings of the Lord upon our lives and we need to express our joy and appreciation. We need to pray for the **recognition** of Christ in our midst. We should have feelings and we should express them.

SATURDAY, 2:00 P. M.

- 37. During the devotional period Arthur Roberts offered prayer.
- 38. The following communication was received from Richard Kneeland: "Because of the death of G. A. Weiler who had heretofore been designated as our legal representative for the State of Idaho, we must appoint another person in order to comply with the laws of the state. It is suggested that Arthur Hadley of Star, Idaho, be now appointed to serve. He needs the approval of the meeting."

The meeting approved the appointment of Arthur Hadley as our legal representative in Idaho.

- 39. A minute for LeRoy and Marie Thornburg, both ministers, from Liberal Monthly Meeting, Liberal, Kansas, was read and LeRoy Thornburg was introduced to the meeting.

- 40. A communication from the Friends Committee on National Legislation was read. In this Friends are urged to be interested in the relief of the needy in Europe and to take a definite stand against peacetime military conscription and universal military training.

- 41. The recommendation of the Public Relations Board in regard to the statement on page 9 of the Discipline "in full accord with Friends peace testimony" was discussed at some length.

It was referred back to the Board to bring in a definite statement for the revision.

All the reports of the Board of Public Relations were accepted and approved.

- 42. The following recommendation from the Executive Committee was approved:

The Executive Committee recommends that all boards and meetings of the Yearly Meeting adopt as a special project the coming year to assist in the liquidation of the debt of Pacific College of approximately \$27,000.

- 43. Walter P. Lee as representative of the Executive Committee of the Board of Managers of Pacific College announced that Gervas A. Carey had been chosen as president of the College.

MEMORIAL HOUR

- 44. The memorials were read for Leonard L. Craven, Seth A. Mills and Rosa Elliott.

These are to be filed with the Yearly Meeting documents.

The names of those deceased during the past year were read.

The faithfulness in Christian service of many of these dear friends has been a blessing and an encouragement to many. Their memory will continue to live on in lives of many now serving the church.

- 45. The representatives nominated the members of the follow-

ing Boards and Committees, and their names will appear in the Appendix:

Board of Service, Board of Public Relations, Board of Finance, Board of Publication, Trustees, Christian Education, Auditing Committee, Pacific College Visiting Committee, Printing Committee.

- 46. The representatives request that the recommendation from Portland Quarterly Meeting that part of the business sessions of Yearly Meeting be scheduled in the evenings be referred to the Executive Committee with power to act.

This was approved.

- 47. The following recommendation from the representatives was approved as revised:

In view of the action of the Yearly Meeting in accepting Everett and Seattle Monthly Meetings from Indiana Yearly Meeting, subject to the final approval of this Yearly Meeting, the Representatives propose the following:

(1) that the Executive Committee be instructed to form a Quarterly Meeting consisting of Tacoma Quarterly Meeting and Everett and Seattle Monthly Meetings, if and when Indiana Yearly Meeting has given its approval to the transfer of the two monthly meetings.

(2) that the present officers and organization of Tacoma Quarterly Meeting be continued until the combined Quarterly Meeting is established.

(3) that the name of the new quarterly meeting be determined by the Executive Committee, acting in the interest of the Yearly Meeting and the desires of the meetings involved.

(4) that the names of the new Quarterly Meeting officers and appointees to the Yearly Meeting Boards be provisionally accepted, subject to approval of the Quarterly Meeting if and when it is established; and that these names be placed in the Yearly Meeting minutes with stars to indicate that they are accepted subject to such approval.

- 52. The Executive Committee made the recommendation that

our General Superintendent be sent as a delegate to the annual meeting of the National Association of Evangelicals in 1948 and that \$200 be appropriated for his expense.

This recommendation was approved.

- 53. The representatives made the following report:

In regard to the recommendation from Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting that the Discipline be amended, the Representatives recommend that there be no change in the Discipline, but that the quarterly meeting nominating committee be informed that it has the privilege of naming the person to call the committee together.

This was approved.

- 54. The committee on returning minutes presented the returning minute for Scott Clark and his wife, Grace, ministers.

This was approved after it was revised.

- 55. The Executive Committee made a recommendation in regard to the sending of epistles.

This was referred back to the committee for an additional statement.

- 56. The Executive Committee recommends to the Yearly Meeting that Robert Morrill be appointed to serve as financial secretary for the year 1947-48.

This was approved.

- 57. The Executive Committee made the following request:

In regard to the recommendation from Portland Quarterly Meeting that part of the business sessions of the Yearly Meeting be scheduled in the evenings, the executive committee requests the privilege of postponing its action until its mid-year session in order that it may have more time for consideration.

This was approved.

- 58. The Executive Committee presented the following tentative budget:

A tentative budget including the askings of the various departments of work of the yearly meeting was adopted at the mid-year meeting of the executive committee.

This proposed budget was forwarded to the local monthly meetings. The responses from the meetings did not reach the amount that was suggested.

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

● 61. Melva Baker, President, presented her annual report as follows:

The W. M. U. reports an average attendance of 394 women in 32 unions. Four new unions were organized this past year—Entiat, Parkrose, Cherry Grove and Hayden Lake.

Six Quarterly Meeting rallies were held during the year, four of which were attended by the president, Melva Baker. These meetings proved times of inspiration and blessing. Laura Trachsel was the main speaker at the Portland Quarterly Meeting rally.

Jack and Geraldine Willcuts spoke at the Newberg, Portland and Salem rallies. Katherine Dixon and local pastors were the speakers at the Boise Valley and Greenleaf rallies.

Many missionary books were read and studied by the Unions. Chief among these were "Through Blood and Fire in Latin America," "Biography of Arthur Chilson," "Then and Now in Kenya Colony" and "India At The Threshold."

The Home project was magazine subscriptions to pastors and outpost pastors.

The Foreign project was the raising of \$1000 to help establish the Bible School in Bolivia. We are happy to report this money was raised.

The second annual W. M. U. banquet was held in the new gymnasium at Pacific College. One hundred ninety-two women attended.

The president travelled 1,770 miles, visited several local W. M. U. meetings and wrote over 225 letters.

- 63. Prayers were offered asking God's blessing on the sessions of the Yearly Meeting and thanking Him for His help so far.
- 64. The report of the epistle committee was read and approved as follows:

Your Committee has selected with care those thoughts from the various epistles received which we felt would be most helpful to the Yearly Meeting, which, of course, does not include all of good which the epistles contained.

We have also with meditation and prayer prepared an Epistle to be sent to the Yearly Meetings with which we have corresponded.

A communication will be prepared for our Mission in Bolivia, to be laid on the table of the Clerks before the close of Yearly Meeting.

The summary of the Epistles was read and appreciated.

An invitation to attend Philadelphia Yearly Meeting accompanied their Epistle. Their Yearly Meeting begins March 29, 1948.

The Epistle that is to be sent out to our sister Yearly Meetings was read.

A number expressed their appreciation of this Epistle.

The Presiding Clerk proposed that this Epistle with a statement in regard to our future policy in sending Epistles be forwarded to every body of Friends from whom communications have been received this year.

The meeting favored the proposition.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

- 65. The President of the Board, A. Clark Smith, presented the following report:

"If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God that giveth to all men liberally and upbraideth not and it shall be given him."

The work of the Board of Evangelism for the past year has been a succession of needs for more than human wisdom. We give Him the glory; He has been faithful in all things and we say gladly and humbly, "Hitherto has the Lord helped us."

Item I. Reports:

Disciplinary changes have brought to the Board three reports from each Meeting: first, the report of the pastors; second, the report of the activities of the local Boards of Evangelism; and

third, the report of the non-pastoral ministers. An analysis of the pastors' reports indicates an advance in every department except two. The average attendance in morning services has been 3,001; and 1,784 attended our evening services; 867 persons attended prayer meetings and 866 carried on the business of our monthly meetings; 3,132 Sunday School attendance, an increase of 195 over last year. Sixty-seven special meetings were held, from which 1,154 experiences of sanctification, conversion and renewals are reported. Two meetings did not report. This is an increase of 422 over last year. This is a matter for encouragement and to Him we give the glory.

Our pastors made 13,866 calls, attended 824 extra prayer meetings, performed 76 marriages and conducted 87 funerals. This is 16 more marriages and 12 less funerals than last year. Ninety-seven children were dedicated, as compared to 51 last year.

Your pastors did not report their mileages, but the recorded travel is 238,742 miles for the year. A little figuring here gives the amount of \$11,937.10 spent by our pastors in transportation in the year 1946-47.

In addition to the work of our pastors, the non-pastoral ministers of the Yearly Meeting have reported the following: 1554 messages have been given in 195 meetings of various duration, running from week-end services to regular evangelistic meetings of two weeks duration or more. From these services have come 977 experiences of salvation. They report 16 weddings, 20 funerals and 18 radio services. A total of 155 religious papers are taken.

When we add these to the totals of the pastors we have a grand total of 162 special meetings, 2131 experiences of salvation, 5290 sermons preached; 92 marriages, 107 funerals, 149 radio messages, with 449 religious periodicals.

A compilation of the incomplete reports from the monthly meeting Boards of Evangelism is as follows: Eight new fields are reported for the year; one was dropped. Ten outposts are being maintained. Thirty-four hospital services were held, one preparative meeting. Bethany in Seattle reported conversion of Alaskan Indians in a Federal Hospital. We record 57 jail services and 166 missionary services.

A total of 139 radio services are reported, but these have been reported through the pastoral reports.

Gospel Bands to the amount of 189 were held. One hundred seventy-six people have been engaged in these services through the year.

Item II. Activities of the Board:

In late September and October, representatives of the Board undertook a survey of the Oregon Yearly Meeting field. Our General Superintendent Joseph Reece, Dorwin Smith, Oscar Brown and Clark Smith drove to Bend, Oregon, meeting Denver Headrick and Clynton Crisman. Our first Yearly Meeting contact was Sprague River with the Tunings. The Board surveyed that dark field, which grips the soul with the realization that here is a people that, aside from our work, is systematically doomed to be born in and live in poverty and debauchery, die and go to an eternal

Hell with the planned program of the white man. Ad Lib.

Klamath Falls was next. Here we found a large section of the town with no churches—an open field indeed for some Holiness Church. Milo Ross met the Board members at Klamath Falls, and our next stop was with the Ross's in Medford, and George and Elenita Bales at Talent. Services were held in these places. Since that time, Medford has become a Monthly Meeting. The Talent work is progressing and Friends have a splendid beginning in southern Oregon in these two strategic points.

In Grants Pass, another unchurched section was located. This door has since been entered by another denomination.

Sunday we spent in services at Tillamook with the Thomas's. They have since moved to a new location at Netarts. Almost all the Tillamook congregation is able to attend at Netarts as conveniently as they could in Tillamook. There was no church service being held there. It seemed to be a much more desirable location, hence the move was made. Attendance and interest have witnessed to the wisdom of the change of location.

After investigating openings in Portland area, we drove to Meadows in central Idaho near Payette Lakes where the Board representatives had the privilege of assisting in the establishment of a new Preparative Meeting, under the leadership of Marlin Witt. The Meadows Valley people have since purchased a parsonage and the work progresses in a satisfactory manner.

The next day's journey brought us to Spokane, Washington, by way of Woodland and Hayden Lake. Encouraging reports from the Woodland field are pleasing to the Board. We appreciate the work of the Smiths at Woodland. We were disappointed upon arriving at Hayden Lake to find the pastors absent. The Cogswells had been called away and were not able to return in time to meet with the Board representatives. They have erected a beautiful church on a fine location. Some Friends families have moved in to assist in the work and the prospects for services at Hayden Lake are encouraging.

After a night in Spokane and a quick survey of the city where we should have a work established, the Board traveled across the great Grand Coulee section to Entiat. This great expanse of virgin territory, larger than some of the states of our union, thrilled the hearts of the Board as we viewed its possibilities. Grand Coulee Project is a big country with a big challenge for a great work under the hand of a mighty God. Services at Entiat were an encouragement to the people and gave the Board an understanding of the needs of that field and an appreciation of the work of Ira and Parolee Downs.

An appointment with Seattle Friends was our next concern. The evening was spent in consultation with representatives from Everett and Seattle Meetings relative to their desire to merge with Oregon Yearly Meeting. We thoroughly enjoyed our fellowship with this group.

The next day's services were divided. Part of the group attended the new work in Kirkland across the lake from Seattle while some representation attended the Everett church for the

morning services. In the afternoon, we sat in on the business sessions of the Everett Monthly Meeting. Sunday night, we returned to Seattle, meeting with the Bethany group. This Meeting has purchased property in the Highland Park district of Seattle which is on Empire Way, in the southern part of the city. Through accumulated funds of their own, and some funds available in the Yearly Meeting held in trust for them, they have been able to purchase and give the Yearly Meeting a deed to an excellent piece of property, costing them \$3,000. This is in the heart of a thriving business and residential district and has been assigned to us by the Seattle Council of Churches.

Monday we surveyed the Olympia Peninsula. Our first objective was the new point at Agnew where Ethel Cowgill is carrying on services. This point is in the heart of a thriving new farming district. They have had an attendance averaging 45 for the year in their morning service. New people are coming in and Ethel reports an increase in their average attendance this month. If you have not yet responded to the Agnew call, please give it your immediate attention.

The Board stopped for a visit with Douglas and Patty Brown at Quilcene. This has been one of the outstanding points of the Yearly Meeting this year. They report 42 definite experiences of salvation in the year. When we realize this has come about from a meeting that was in a state of complete collapse and that under their ministry it has come to the point where they are almost in a position to be reinstated as a Monthly Meeting, we can appreciate something of the work which the Browns have done in the two years of their ministry. A great deal of the increase in members in Tacoma Quarterly Meeting has been due to the work of our outposts.

This completed the tour of the Board representatives; Joseph Reece and the other members returning to Portland by way of Tacoma.

As a result of this survey, two meetings were held—one with the Quaker students of Cascade College, the other with the Student Christian Union of Pacific College. The field was placed before them, possibilities for expansion in Oregon Yearly Meeting were emphasized and out of this has come the offering of several of the young men and women of the Yearly Meeting for summer work and for future work in the Yearly Meeting. As we look at the map of the great Northwest territory, we see a few sprinklings indicating the locations of our Meetings, but the wide open spaces are the drive that spurs us on to prayer and purpose that, as God shall lead by the power of His Spirit, opening doors where He will and calling leaders whom He will, the Board of the Yearly Meeting will be true to the great task of winning souls for Christ in the territory to which He has assigned us.

He asked the Board members and the outpost workers to sit on the platform and later these were introduced to the meeting. He asked the prayers of the meeting for Ruth Headrick, who is very ill.

The General Superintendent, Joseph G. Reece, gave his annual report, which appears below:

In reviewing the work of the past year I have been made very conscious of that portion of God's Word (Deut. 33:25) where Moses, in pronouncing his blessing upon the tribe of Asher said, "As thy days, so shall thy strength be." The Lord has graciously sustained and given direction and strength as the duties and responsibilities of the days have come. I am happy to witness to a conscious sense of His presence and give to Him all glory and praise for any measure of success which may have come.

In caring for the work of the Yearly Meeting I have traveled over 23,000 miles, attended 21 meetings for worship, met with 12 meetings on Ministry and Oversight for consultation and was present at 12 Quarterly Meeting sessions. Had some part on the programs of our summer conferences at Evans Creek, Wauna Mer and Twin Rocks.

The mid-year meeting of all the Boards in Portland last February was one of the best I ever attended.

I have faithfully attended every regular meeting and called meeting of the Pacific College Board of Managers.

The month of November was spent at Star, Idaho, where my wife and I took care of some of the pastoral duties while Walter Lee traveled over the Yearly Meeting to complete raising the sum of \$35,000.00 for the farm in Bolivia.

With the help of my wife and daughter and with the help of others when needed, the Yearly Meeting office has been able to care for the correspondence. The News Flash has been edited and mailed each month. Special letters and information have been sent out when occasion demanded. Over 5000 Yearly Meeting annual report blanks were mimeographed and mailed out.

It was my privilege to visit and speak to our young people who are attending Pacific College and Cascade College. Of special interest to me was the opportunity granted for personal interviews and conferences with any of the students who desired to confer about their personal problems or concerns.

During the year I brought 22 messages, showed the missionary pictures 20 times, the Sprague River pictures 3 times, the Twin Rocks pictures 9 times, the Quaker Hill pictures 3 times and the Wauna Mer pictures 3 times. The pictures of our home work were shown only once.

It was my privilege to assist in the dedication of the church at Agnew, Washington and the parsonage at Meadows, Idaho.

The Yearly Meeting office is open at any time for your visit. During the year I held 85 conferences with groups or individuals on various matters touching the work of the Yearly Meeting.

Last October I had the privilege of touring the northwest with the Executive Committee of the Board on Evangelism. We visited and studied many of our outpost points and investigated several new places offering possibilities for service.

The following churches are making pastoral changes this year: Forest Home, Parkrose, Chehalem Center, Talent, Scotts Mills, Melba, Boise, Star, Vancouver First Church, Riverside, and Second

Church Portland. At the present only two of these churches have definitely decided on whom their pastor will be. Nathan Pierson is going to Star and Dean Gregory, from Western Yearly Meeting, is moving to Second Church Portland. Other decisions will be made in the next day or so.

As in past years I must speak of the excellent and sacrificial work done by our Quarterly Meeting Superintendents. A word of public appreciation should be given to the churches whose pastors have had to carry the heavy responsibilities of being Quarterly Meeting Superintendents in connection with their pastoral duties. We trust that these meetings will be mindful of this fact and not feel too badly if they believe their pastors have not given all the time desired.

This year Oregon Yearly Meeting reached the highest record of membership. Let us set a goal of 5000 members by the year 1950. This year Tacoma Quarterly Meeting set the pace for membership gain. If the other Quarterly Meetings would make similar gains we could easily reach 5000 members by 1950.

Howard and Julia Pearson left last November for another term of service on our mission field in Bolivia.

It is well to remind ourselves that the supreme task of Oregon Yearly Meeting is Evangelism. We have boards on Missions, Christian Education, Service, Public Relations, Finance, Publication and even Evangelism, but the main objective should be that of winning men to Christ. In fact this should be the main concern of every individual member no matter what his office or place of service.

In closing this report I would call your attention to a habit many of our meetings are falling into, that of comparing their accomplishments with what other meetings are doing. This is not a healthy condition. Comparisons do not give a true picture. The apostle Paul in writing to the meeting at Corinth said, (1 Cor. 4:2.) "It is required in stewards that a man be found faithful." and then he adds, "To me it is of least importance to be judged by you or any human court." What others do or what others give has little bearing on what I should give. The question is, "Am I faithful in my stewardship?" God doesn't deal in ratios or apportionments. Notice when Peter was concerned about what others might or should do, and Jesus said, "What is that to thee, follow thou me." Too many of our meetings look to see how much another meeting is giving and then they give accordingly. Jesus challenged Peter to a higher standard when He said, "Do you love me?" That, my friends, should be the standard of our giving. There will be no shortage in our funds, our pastors will be paid good salaries and the calls coming to us can be answered, if we give on this basis. Love is not expressed in the giving of tithes. Love is best expressed in the unreserved giving of self and means.

The major project of the board at the present time is the publication of "The Northwest Friend," making possible an informed constituency. Present circulation of the paper is 2,000 copies, printed every month, excepting August.

We appreciate the splendid work of our editorial staff for the year consisting of Paul Cammack and Ray L. Carter, editors, Marjorie Crisman, Christian Endeavor editor, and A. Willard Mendenhall, circulation manager. With the resignation of Paul Cammack in December, Ray L. Carter, was secured to fill out the unexpired term of Paul Cammack. Ray Carter will continue on as editor for the coming year.

Publication Sunday was observed again this year in most of our churches at which time offerings were received for the revolving publication fund.

One of the major problems of the board at the present time is the securing of the board's printing at reasonable rates in view of the rising printing costs.

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends to be held at Newberg, Oregon, June 12-19, 1947:

Recent information has reached us in regard to the situation in the Klamath Indian Reservation. We learn that the conditions which exist there are deplorable indeed.

The Indians, being a minority and weaker group, are being exploited and oppressed. In violation of the law, liquor is being sold to them, which results in much poverty, degradation and crime and many times in violent deaths.

They are oppressed by the unscrupulous, treated unjustly and almost cruelly by corrupt petty officers and politicians. And all of this within the borders of our own State and also within the limits of our Yearly Meeting work.

Since the Friends first came to America their attitude toward the Indians has been one of peaceful relations, just dealings and a sympathetic and helpful understanding. The Indians, and the Government as well, have looked to the Friends for help at various times in the past, hence in this emergency we feel that a great responsibility rests upon us.

Therefore, we ask the Quarterly Meeting to request the Yearly Meeting to appoint a competent committee to investigate and lay the facts before the proper authorities with an urgent appeal that these conditions be corrected.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

- 97. Walter P. Lee, President of the Board, gave the following report:

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE MISSIONARY BOARD June 17, 1947

With the words of Jesus, "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest," ringing in our ears and stirring our hearts, Oregon Yearly Meeting enlarged her missionary vision during this past year.

No doubt the outstanding result of enlarged vision was the tremendous, God-directed response to the need for a Bible School and farm in Bolivia which reached the financial proportions of \$35,000. With the opening of the long-anticipated Bible school on March 25 with a present student body of 17 young men and women, the prayers of many have been answered and Oregon Yearly Meeting may well sing, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow!"

During the year the missionary staff was strengthened by the return of Howard and Julia Pearson to the field. Their years of experience and knowledge of the field have been most helpful in meeting new situations which have arisen.

Jack and Geraldine Willcuts were delayed in joining the staff on the field because of lack of boat transportation for their baggage. However, that was finally secured and they are now started on their way to Bolivia. During their time of waiting, Jack and Geraldine held several revival meetings and carried on deputation work throughout the Yearly Meeting.

Soon after the first of January, Carroll and Doris Tamplin and Felix Guanica, one of our national pastors, joined a committee for the revision of the New Testament in Aymara under the direction of the American Bible Society. According to previous agreement, Oregon Yearly Meeting is giving financial support to these for the carrying on of this work. Carroll is chairman of the Revision Committee. It will be a marvelous thing for the Aymara Indians to be able to read the New Testament in their own language.

Paul and Phyllis Cammack and family spent the spring semester of the school year living in a trailer house in Los Angeles while Paul attended a Missionary Medical School at Biola. This was done at their own expense and considerable sacrifice on their part. They have set an example of consecration which should challenge each of us. Paul plans to study some in agriculture this summer, and it is hoped that they will be able to go to the field not too many months hence.

The enlarged elementary school program and the need for national pastors made it necessary to appeal throughout the Yearly Meeting for funds for national preachers and teachers. The

encouraging response, which is increasing, again indicates an enlarged vision.

However, it would be a mistake to assume that all of the problems on the mission field have disappeared. Our missionaries are continually facing trying situations, disturbing influences and Satanic forces. As suggested last year, there is a great need for "effectual fervent prayer" here at home and for the establishment of prayer bands which will meet regularly.

The greatly increased cost of transportation to Bolivia has enlarged the financial load, but we are happy to report that in recent months meetings have responded with enlarged birthday offerings. This is due to the fact the people are contributing nickels, dimes and dollars instead of pennies.

A healthy missionary interest was revealed by the annual reports which were submitted to the Missionary Board by all but two of our monthly meetings and by most of our outposts. The forty-one reports indicated that there were 314 services held in which special missionary emphasis was given. The number ranged from one to 29 with an average of 7 for each meeting reporting. There were 177 services in which special missionary speakers appeared with every meeting having at least one. Twenty meetings reported regular monthly missionary prayer meetings, while one meeting reported two each week.

Most of our meetings reported regular presentation of our missionary work to our youth although 9 failed along this line. Only 12 of our meetings are displaying a large map of our missionary field in Bolivia. We hope this number may increase the coming year. It was reported that 418 missionary books had been read with high honors going to Rosedale, where 62 books were read, and with some meetings reporting only one or two read in the entire meeting. An outstanding discovery was made when the reports revealed that there were 40 persons throughout Oregon Yearly Meeting who felt called to missionary work. The point of greatest weakness revealed was the fact that only half of the meetings held any missionary committee meetings and several of them held only one during the year. Honorable mention should go to First Friends, Portland, and Piedmont Missionary Committees, which were the only ones which reported holding committee meetings each month.

All of our meetings make some use of the News Flash with more than half of them making the presentation in the Sunday School hour. Such interesting features as a missionary library, missionary dramas and fund-raising contests between the men and women were mentioned by different meetings.

The Board of Missions has prepared for distribution to all the homes a poster containing the pictures of all of our missionaries on the field and under appointment.

With a strong faith and a confident dependence in a limitless God, let us espouse the opportunities, shoulder the responsibilities and face the problems of presenting Jesus Christ as the only Savior from sin to a people that sit in darkness.

The Reports from the Bolivian Mission.

The following reports from the mission field were read:

17TH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FRIENDS BOLIVIAN MISSION

1946-47

The statement has been made that the firmest thing in this inferior world is a believing soul. Certainly the truth of this statement is manifest on the mission field. We can think of no greater source of joy relative to our fellow man than that of seeing him become established in the grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

God has permitted us to view again this year the ever refreshing scene of a sin-bound soul liberated by the cleansing flow from Calvary's brow. Come sickness, come temptation, come persecution, and even though his weaker brother fall by the wayside, he who takes not his eyes from faith's view of the Christ, is he through whom our Lord gives encouragement and verifies the value of a life spent to bring the "Words of Light and Life" to the Aymaras of the Bolivian Highlands.

We herewith submit to the fifty-fifth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends this our annual report of the Friends Bolivian Mission for the year 1946-47.

Personnel

The scope of our labors was enlarged again this year by the return of the Pearsons in November, 1946. Thus our field staff is comprised of three families. Knights and Pearsons moved to the farm as soon as was possible after its purchase that they might begin the Bible School. Chapmans remain in La Paz, where Ralph is acting as pastor and is superintending the evangelistic program of the field.

Mission Council

In accordance with the new Handbook of Rules and Regulations, shortly after the arrival of the Pearsons, our field personnel was organized under the Field Mission Council. Ralph Chapman was elected chairman and Howard Pearson as secretary. The office of Field Superintendent was abolished, and the management of the field was undertaken by the Mission Council, officiating as one body through its departmental secretaries. We feel that the merit of this form of mission policy already has been evidenced in the exercise of unity among the missionaries and in our relationship as a missionary body to the national church.

Farm

It being the desire of O. Y. M. to investigate the possibilities of the purchase of a farm, contacts were made and trips arranged for the visitation of possible locations. Farm locations outside of our area of work were disregarded and those within our field were carefully studied in the light of what they presented for our particular need. One location in the area of Santiago de Huata and a short distance from Achicachi seemed advisable and we began the transaction for it. When the order came from the Board that we might buy, we went to the owner with the idea of drawing up an agreement as we had been talking. The farm was not as large as he had told us and he refused to lower his price. Other existing conditions that were revealed as we studied the purchase added to the consensus of opinion that this was not the place to buy. Through our lawyer, we were made acquainted with two other farms and we began again to investigate. These two farms were very comparable in size but one had a large number of peons and was completely mechanized which placed the purchase price beyond our reach. The other farm, Copajira, seemed to present possibilities and a thorough investigation was made of it. When it was decided that this farm would meet our needs, the actual dealing with the owner for a price agreement was begun. We are confident that the Lord led us in this. When the final agreement was reached, we found that the purchase price, the transaction and transfer taxes, lawyer's fees, and accompanying obligations were all made for around \$4000 less than the original price quoted to us by the owner as that which they demanded for the purchase price alone. Now that we have the farm, we are praying that God will give us wisdom to make of this new enterprise an additional unit in our efforts here for the extension of His kingdom.

Visitors

Visitors in the Mission Home in La Paz or as speakers in the church included Hugh Paine of the Child Evangelism Fellowship; Philip Tate and William Brackenridge, representatives of the United Bible Societies; Luis Forero, converted Catholic Priest. In addition to these were several missionaries of various missions established in Bolivia.

Transportation

We would report again of the value that the car is to the work of the Mission. It has been used this year in journeys relative to the work of the field, as well as being used within the city.

In October of 1946, the final papers were signed and a new International one-ton truck was added to the Mission property. Due to scarcity imposed by war conditions, the demand for trucks here in Bolivia was tremendous. Our transaction for a truck began in May but nothing developed until October. At that time it seemed advisable to buy the one-ton truck rather than wait a longer period for another type. Since its purchase it has been used for journeys in the field in the maintenance of the evangelistic

and educational programs, and to transport people to conferences. It has been occupied at the farm since the date of the farm's occupation. We are very thankful for this additional means of transportation for our field.

Yearly Meeting, La Paz

Our Yearly Meeting in La Paz was truly one of blessing for us all. As is the custom, there were classes conducted on Holiness, Prayer, and Practical Christianity. Outside speakers included Miss Lillian Bangs and Mr. John Showalter, both of the Lutheran Mission of the city. There were reports by pastors and workers about the work in the various stations, and almost every group represented sang a song or two and repeated some memory verses. The average attendance of the Yearly Meeting was around 300, and at least 350 were present at some of the evening services. God richly poured out His blessings upon us during the entire Meeting and especially during the Sunday afternoon missionary service. Young people gave their lives to the Lord to enter into His vineyard as He led them, and their elders wept with them for a continued leading of the Lord upon them and all of our labors for the reaching of the lost around us.

During this Yearly Meeting there was formed what we have been pleased to name the "Evangelical Society of Bolivian Friends." Its executive committee is composed of six nationals and two missionaries. This Society is to be responsible for the evangelistic work of the field and together with the Mission Council to work out the problems of the maintenance of this work.

ANNUAL REPORT, EVANGELISTIC SECRETARY

June 1946-April 1947

The evangelistic work of our field is now being carried forth by five monthly meetings instead of three as in former times. These meetings with their workers are: La Paz, Ralph Chapman, pastor and Ismael Balboat, Monthly Meeting Clerk; Amacari, Cipriano Mamani, pastor; Achachicala, Felix Guanica, pastor; Corocoro, Mariano Cusicanque, pastor; Mina, Fabulosa, Rosendo Guachalla, pastor. Two other stations (not Monthly Meetings) have been under the care of full-time workers. These stations are Puerto Perez and Patapatani with their respective pastors Feliciano Sirpa and Mariano Medrano; the latter holding his station as long as his health permitted. Out from these meetings have gone numbers of part-time workers to reach new points as well as to maintain the stations already established.

Not uncommon to the work on the mission field, our field has not been exempt from its trials, persecutions, and problems, but we feel that victories gained have been gained through the ever-present Spirit who is our guide and stay. Visitation trips by the missionaries have been of encouragement to the nationals that they in turn carry forward the Great Commission. More and more

the nationals are realizing the necessity of contributing more to the maintenance of their work. Some accept this responsibility with willingness and others are continually reminding the Mission Council of how much work they are doing. May the Lord successfully mold them in this transition period to meet the requisites of a well-founded Indigenous Church!

The regular conferences have been held as is customary with the exception of the Mina Fabulosa Conference. This has been postponed until July since the heavy snowfall in the Cordillera made inadvisable the holding of this conference at its scheduled date in February. There was an increase in attendance in all of the conferences and we feel that they were a definite blessing to all attending.

An increase in attendance has been evidenced in all points of our field, with special notice in Amacari, La Paz, and Pucarani.

We have been faithful in the proclamation of the Doctrine of Salvation and Sanctification according to the belief of Friends. New believers have been made acquainted with the Friends' doctrine as pertains to the ordinances.

EDUCATIONAL REPORT

By Roscoe S. Knight

Praise the Lord, our educational field is growing. Our program is now divided into two parts, the grade schools and the Bible College.

Grade school term ended last year with schools in Amacari, Llujpaya, Pongon Huyo, and a day and night school in La Paz, the school in Patapatani having closer earlier. This year the grade schools started their term on January 20. We now have schools in Amacari, Llujpaya, Pongon Huyo, Ojje, Copajira and the day and night schools in La Paz.

Amacari has an enrollment of about 90 students. The two teachers, both members of the Amacari church, are certainly fine Christian young men and are doing a wonderful work in directing the work there. The head teacher, Pedro Quispe, receives a salary of Bs. 1000 monthly and the helper, Marcelino Yujra, receives Bs. 500. The school in Llujpaya is continuing with the same teacher, Angelino Condori, who receives a salary of Bs. 1000 mensual. Students number around 30.

Ojje, the site of our new school this year, is about two miles from Amacari. I refused at first to promise a school there because of the lack of funds and teachers, but when they earnestly pleaded and offered to pay a good part of the salary, I managed to supply them with a teacher. Dario Espejo, who was at Patapatani last year, is there and is doing an excellent job with his 50 students. He also receives a salary of Bs. 1000 of which we pay Bs. 600. We do not have the school in Patapatani this year because there are so few students and because there is a lot of trouble between the Catholics and Protestants.

Pongon Huyo, which we now call Achachi-kala (old rock), still has the school under the direction of Felix Guanica. Two older boys of the school are teaching under his direction while he is at Huatajata. The school has an attendance of 25, and the two boys, who are still students, receive Bs. 100 each, monthly.

La Paz day school, with an attendance of 55, is still under the direction of Silas Casas, one of our La Paz young people. He is making a good teacher and receives a salary of Bs. 1500 mensual, of which we pay but Bs. 600. La Paz night school, under the direction of two of the La Paz brethren, Francisco Medrano and Mariano Baptista, has an attendance of about 15, and the teachers are paid by the church.

The school here on the farm is still being taught by a teacher who was hired before we came. We wanted to change but couldn't find another teacher easily, and since the year was well started we decided to keep him for the rest of the year. He is a Guaqui boy, Saturnino Choque, and we pay him Bs. 400 a month.

Bible School started March 25, 1947, with nine students, and the enrollment has now increased to seventeen, which is an excellent number for the first year. Education of the students ranges from no schooling to a fifth-grade education, thus making individual attention necessary. Students are divided into two main groups depending on their knowledge. We have classes in the morning and work in the afternoon. Tuition is Bs. 300 a month, and the students work this out at the rate of Bs. 3 an hour. Courses are: reading, writing, arithmetic, grammar, geography, Bible, music, organ, hygiene and a general class for instruction in church work. Most of these subjects are taught to both groups thus necessitating a rotation of classes in order to be able to cover each course. During the afternoon work period the boys are being taught carpentry, masonry, tailoring, gardening, and we hope to add to the list as time goes by. The girls are making yarn from the wool of our sheep and later on will make cloth, be taught sewing and other necessary types of work for a woman in this country.

Yes, our school program is advancing, and for everything we give God the glory. We are reaching hundreds and will eventually reach thousands because of our grade schools and the Bible College. The doors are open wide. Oh, that we can provide teachers and workers for the places that are pleading with us to supply them with a pastor or a teacher.

AGRICULTURAL REPORT

By Roscoe S. Knight

Since much of the report of the work on the farm has had to do with reconstruction and preparing for Bible School, there is not a great deal of information about the agriculture itself. However, I will give what information there is that has not been included in other reports.

Since arriving at Copajira on Feb. 8, 1947, most of the farm work has had to do with harvesting. We had five small fields of potatoes and finished digging the last of them today. It was a very poor crop, and we will probably use all of the potatoes that we

received as food for the Bible College students, with exception of the small ones that will be used for chunas and tuntas. This will require completely new seed for another year, but the potatoes that we have would not serve anyhow. They are all small, the average being about the size of a golf ball. It is possible to raise good big potatoes here but not under the Indian methods of farming and not without good seed.

Other crops harvested include two fields of habas, with about two acres to the field, about seven acres of kinua and about five acres of barley. None of these have been thrashed as yet but are still drying in the fields. There are about six acres of barley that are still green and will be used for grain and for feed. I'm not a good calculator but I imagine that all the barley will just make about enough seed for large acreage next year. The only products that we might be able to sell are kinua, perhaps some habas, tuntas and chunas. We are using much of the produce for the school.

Of animals, we have around 540 sheep, of which about 450 are ewes, 9 cows, 6 hogs, 2 horses, 15 ducks and a few guinea pigs. All of the animals are ordinary Altiplano stock, which means that they are small and would not be considered as good stock in the States.

We have done a little plowing, but what a system. With a tractor we can plow from 5 to 10 times as much in one day as can our thirty peons with their oxen, and the job will be well done instead of just having the surface scratched.

During our short time here I have become convinced that we have an excellent farm and that with proper and modern farming methods we can soon realize the hopes and desires that we have for the farm. It will mean work, study and experimenting, but I firmly believe that there are possibilities unlimited in every line.

ANNUAL REPORT, CONSTRUCTION SECRETARY

June 1946—April 1947

Building construction and repair work for the year June 1946 to April 1947 touches four of our stations: La Paz, Chicharro (Amacari district), Achachicala, and the farm, Copajira.

In La Paz there has been put up as inexpensive a construction as possible for general conference use as well as for such other uses as occasion may demand. It amounts to nothing much more than a large lean-to up against the back of the house which forms the boundary line between our property and one of our neighbors. The building extends across the entire width of our side lot and thus uses the side wall of the Mission Home as one of its walls and is against the building that borders the property on the opposite side. It is about 14 feet by 30 feet in size. At one end, and jutting out to the side, is a small kitchen which accompanies the main building or Dining Hall. It is nothing more than a frame in which no doors or windows have been installed. The extent of the use for this building will determine the advisability of more work with it. It had its initiation during the festival of "Carnival" in February and was used again during the Yearly Meeting at

Easter. It is used to advantage by the school children on rainy days.

In Chicharro, the brethren of Amacari have helped in the beginning of a small chapel on the property donated by Manual Alvarado. The heavy rains have curtailed this work and this construction stands at present with only the walls raised to about six or seven feet high. This work will be continued in August of this year.

The brethren in Achachicala have not been discouraged by their being "chased out" of the former Pongon Huyo church and have again built for themselves another large church of comparable size to the former. It is located on the property donated to the Mission by Victoriano Quispe, the father of the family that was converted and who opened his home to us for the carrying on of the work of our Mission in this district. Pictures of this construction have been sent to you. At this time it is completed and the windows and door furnished by the Mission have been installed. Benches are needed for this church, as we now have available a pulpit, and the organ taken from the former church is to be placed in Achachicala.

Copajira has been the scene of more repair work than of new construction. The newer farm house stands practically as it was at the date of the farm purchase. The most work has been involved in the remodeling of the older building to meet our needs for an apartment for a missionary family and to house our Bible School. This work has been the putting in of concrete floors, constructing decent ceilings in the apartment, replastering the walls, general repair of some of the walls themselves, putting in new doors and windows and repairing, as was advisable, the old ones. One of the worst jobs was the cleaning up of an old kitchen. Black, greasy smoke had made the entire room unfit for use. The walls were scraped until all the surfacing had been removed. It was replastered, windows were installed, and it is to be used for the kitchen and dining room for the school. Plans are being formulated for the construction of a new missionary home at the farm.

Supplementary Report:

We have borrowed over a hundred dollars and are still three months in arrears in paying teachers salaries. We are now paying January and February salaries out of April allowances. Also out of missionary allowances we are supporting or helping support four pastors.

Cost of farm \$23,800, with additional costs such as care for 1947 crops already planted, transaction tax, lawyer fee and other incidentals, amounted to a total of \$26,197.

Estimated cost of running expenses of Bible School is \$5 per month per student for meals, 15 students, or \$75 a month and for ten months, \$750. We are however feeding 18 persons with a possibility of one or more later, but this year will run less than eight months so we may come out with the estimated cost. This does not include such equipment as beds, mattresses, chairs, desks, tables, stoves, benches, blackboards and a multitude of other supplies.

Estimated cost of repairs to buildings to adapt them to Bible School use depends on what we do to them. We planned on putting cement floors, plaster walls and ceilings (for warmth) throughout and put in doors and windows as needed. The roof needs repair every year and needs replacing every few years as it is of grass. We planned on a tile roof. Tile can be gotten very cheaply from a nearby kiln, but lumber to support such a roof would be expensive. Lumber is approximately 20 cents a square foot B/M/ cut to measure. The walls of the old farm house are solid and substantial and should last another hundred years and more!
