● 1. We are thankful as we meet in the fifty-sixth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends, June 10, 1948, at 2:00 p.m., that we have a mighty fortress in God, who is a never failing bulwark and One who will guide and direct us as we undertake the business of His kingdom.

The Ministry and Oversight body felt concerned over certain so-called comic books, some comic strips and some radio programs, which are corrupting the minds of our young people with the lurid portrayal of crime, immorality and vice in various forms. It is our desire that this concern be carried up to our Yearly Meeting with the request that a strong protest against this education in crime be sent to the proper persons and organizations.

- 9. The state of the church as reported by the Quarterly Meetings was read and a summary appears below:

#### SUMMARY OF THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

All meetings for worship and transaction of business have been regularly held. Some meetings report a larger attendance than last year while some say that these meetings are not so well attended. Nearly all report that the prayer meetings and evening services are not so well attended as they should be. Special revival services were reported by all Quarterly Meetings.

Family altars are maintained in most of the families, but regret was expressed that this is not true of the entire membership.

Christian education is encouraged in the various meetings. Several young people are in definite preparation for the work of the ministry. In another place, young people are conducting services in their own home meetings as well as in outposts.

All meetings expressed appreciation for the work of faithful pastors and their families and feel as if the type of ministry that they are receiving meets their needs.

With few exceptions, all members are careful about their amusements, and avoid places of unchristian character. They abstain from the use and sale of intoxicating liquors and tobacco.

Some meetings inspect and relieve the needs of those requiring aid.

The churches have endeavored to be careful in the appointment of officers and teachers and in the calling of pastors.

Various comments were made on the reports. Some expressed a desire that more interesting details might be given and others that more accurate reports might be given of the actual conditions.

- 10. The Press Committee was named as follows: Arthur Roberts, Fred Baker and Willard Mendenhall.

- 11. The committee to write to Aged Friends was chosen and their names appear below: Ethel A. Cox, Cora Gregory, Florence Snow, and E. Grace Clark.

- 12. The report from the committee that served last year was as follows: We received the names of forty-two persons to whom we wrote, or on whom we called, giving some of the interesting things in the various sessions of the Yearly Meeting.

Some churches have sent family-sized packages of food to Europe. This is the most expensive way to get food to those needing it and is therefore not recommended unless it can be sent to a definite family with a personal touch. When this is done the increased cost is doubtless warranted. Some of the meetings have been writing letters and sending Gospel tracts and other literature with the packages and have received splendid letters in reply.

Two meetings report special aid given to families in their communities whose homes were destroyed by fire. One is assisting in a playground project for the children. Several meetings contributed to the Christmas ship. Flowers, plants and various gifts have been sent to the sick, shut-in and needy in local communities.

The present flood disaster has hit some of our Friends' families and thousands of our neighbors here in the Northwest. The service committee of Portland has been keeping in touch with the Red Cross and offering such assistance as they may be able to render. We are not prepared to serve as a disaster relief unit and the Red Cross is and is doing all that can be done right now in that way. Some Friends have received displaced families into their homes, and Bibles are being secured for those who lost them in the flood. The work of rehabilitation is yet ahead. It is still too early to know the extent of the need or what our part should be. As the call comes we should do our best.

The world need is still stupendous. We must not relax our efforts to secure food and clothes. "Whoso hath this world's goods, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him." I John 3:17.

This report was approved.

Fern Mills sang, "Because of Thy Great Bounty."

Bernhard Fedde, who has spent a number of years in Europe helping in relief work, told of the great need for food in China, Japan, India and in five countries of Europe as well as the great spiritual needs of these peoples.

● 34. A telegram from the Committee on National Legislation, Washington, D. C., was read and referred to the Public Relations Board.

● 35. The meeting adjourned to meet Saturday at 9:30 A. M., June 12, after the benediction by Charles C. Haworth.

The Seminary Committee has received a request from the Western School of Evangelical Religion for the appointment of two persons to serve as members of the Board of Western School of Evangelical Religion.

In view of this request the Board of Missions and the Board of Evangelism, in joint action, request the privilege of nominating two members to the Board of W. S. E. R., one to be nominated by the Board of Evangelism and one to be nominated by the Board of Missions.

#### BOARD OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

● 39. Kelsey Hinshaw, the President, presided. He asked the privilege of having his report printed without reading it in the face of the meeting, as they needed all the time for their departments. This request was granted and the report follows:

The following is a summary of reports received from a total of 44 monthly meetings, preparatory meetings, and outposts.

Seven stated they had cooperated fully in the program of the Board. Four said no. The rest either failed to answer or gave a qualified answer.

Most of the reports failed to indicate what part of the program was not carried out. Two indicated the failure was in the field of Peace, one in Stewardship, two in carrying out the Board of Publication program as suggested, and two in the Education work. Those who recognized and faithfully reported their failures are to be commended.

Very few indicated why they failed to carry out any particular part of the program.

Thirty-seven meetings reported libraries with a total of 326 books added during the year.

Fourteen meetings gave a total of 29 papers or magazine subscriptions to their pastors.

The following number indicated that Stewardship, Peace and the various phases of Public Morals had been effectively presented in the pulpit, 41; in C. E., 24; in S. S., 15; and by literature, 28. One said everything but Peace had been presented in these ways.

Twenty-six indicated they made special effort to inform their children and young people with regard to Bible teaching and the Friends stand on these questions. One said no, and one crossed out "the Friends stand," then said yes.

Thirty-five meetings reported a total of 997 tithers. Nineteen indicated a gain, five a loss, and five no change. This indicates a distinct gain over last year.



Many letters or telegrams were sent to influence proper legislation or law enforcement. Few had a record of the total number sent. Several meetings failed to make any report on this question.

One hundred students were reported as attending Pacific College, 45 in other church colleges, 29 in state colleges or universities, 69 in academies, and 120 in high schools.

Three meetings maintain a scholarship fund for their own deserving students.

All but one of the 34 reporting encourage their young people to attend Pacific College.

Some wonderful victories over tobacco and drink were reported. The advance made by several meetings in the field of stewardship and tithing following the Perry Hayden meetings should be especially mentioned. Canby Jones presented, in a very effective way, the Biblical and spiritual basis of our Peace stand to some of our meetings. The advance of the Yearly Meeting as a whole in the field of Peace is to be commended.

Gerald Dillon spoke for the committee on the moral obligation of voting and voting for principle.

Marlin Witt presented the subject of Stewardship. He said our tithe belongs to the church.

Lucy Clark, representing the Education department, urged the various meetings to raise funds to help their worthy students to get an education and to send in the names of the High School Seniors to the College. She spoke of the need of Christian grade schools and high schools.

J. Allen Dunbar gave a most interesting report of his recent trip to Washington, D. C., in company with other Christians on a World Peace and Brotherhood Mission.

Kelsey Hinshaw made various remarks about the report and urged people to write to their senators and representatives.

The Board of Public Relations made the following request, which was granted:

The Board of Public Relations requests the privilege of acting on the recommendation from the Newberg Quarterly Meeting regarding the matter of comic books, comic strips and radio programs in its regular program after Yearly Meeting.

They also made the recommendation which appears below:

The Board of Public Relations recommends that the clerks send telegrams stating the opposition of the Yearly Meeting to the draft to all representatives of Oregon, Washington and Idaho. We further recommend that each Quarterly Meeting represented send a telegram to its own representative, and we would ask that as many individuals as will send telegrams to their own and other representatives.

This recommendation was approved.

Appreciation was expressed for the presentation given by this department.

### MEMORIAL HOUR

- 40. A list of the names of the members who have passed away during the past year was read.

Memorials for Alva S. Gulley and James Francis Lowe were read.

A number of members spoke of the benediction that the lives of those who had gone on before had been to them. Their influence goes on in an ever widening circle touching lives that have never known them.

- 41. Merrill Coffin of California Yearly Meeting and Burnie and Pearl Cook of Russiaville, Indiana, Western Yearly Meeting, were introduced to the meeting.

- 42. After singing the hymn, "Revive Us Again," Gerald Dillon brought the message for the inspirational hour. He mentioned the third approach to the Revelation of God, the Mystical Revelation which is the subjective possession of Christ, our Saviour.

- 43. Grace Clark expressed our thanks for God's guidance and asked a blessing on the noon day meal.

- 44. After a period of devotion, Bertha Stubbs Sumpter, a minister from Wichita, Kansas, Kansas Yearly Meeting, was introduced to the meeting.

- 45. The following recommendations were received from the Executive Committee:

The committee appointed by the Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting to canvass the whole matter of the desirability of moving the Yearly Meeting headquarters to Newberg or of relocating elsewhere presents the following recommendation:

1. That the headquarters be kept in Portland, for greater convenience in communication, travel and transportation.

2. That a new location be secured where a centralized plant could be maintained, including living quarters for the General Superintendent, our missionaries on furlough, the Yearly Meeting printer, and other personnel, and space for operation of printing equipment. In addition to these, it is desired that there be sufficient rental space to help greatly in the liquidation of whatever indebtedness may be incurred, and to take care of all overhead and maintenance expense.

3. That the committee be continued with power to act at such time as the foregoing conditions are brought about.

The Executive Committee recommends that a part of the Joseph B. Rogers Donation Land Claim in the City of Newberg, Yamhill County, Oregon, and particularly described as follows:



Beginning at the intersection of the East line of Howard Street and the South line of Third Street in said City of Newberg, thence South on the East line of Howard Street to the North line of Fourth Street, thence East along the North line of Fourth Street 205 feet, thence North parallel to the East line of Howard Street to the South line of Third Street, thence West along the South line of Third Street 205 feet to the place of beginning, be sold to the best advantage and that the proceeds be used in the retiring of the debt on Portland property, the remainder to be held in trust for the proposed headquarters.

The Executive Committee recommends that Lot numbered twelve (12), in Block numbered one hundred thirty-nine (139) in Rose City Park, within the corporate limits of the City of Portland, in the County of Multnomah and State of Oregon, be sold and that the proceeds be used in the purchase of the proposed headquarters.

#### GREENLEAF ACADEMY REPORT

• 46. Denver Headrick read the report since it was impossible for Arthur Winters, the principal, to be present:

The thirty-eighth class has just graduated from Greenleaf Friends Academy. This class, consisting of fifteen members, is not as large as last year's class, but it represents a depth of spiritual quality and most of the members have signified their intention to continue their education. On May 30, Rev. Joseph Reece, our Yearly Meeting Superintendent, delivered the baccalaureate address, and on Tuesday evening, June 1, Dr. Gervas Carey of Pacific College delivered the commencement address. The enrollment in the academy this year is 68 students. Several denominations were represented as well as several states of the northwest.

During the year, a student revival was conducted by J. Earl Geil during which time nearly the entire student body testified to receiving spiritual help. Several students found the Lord for the first time and their lives gave evidence that much good had been done. Other ministers and evangelists, including Scott Clark, Dwight Ferguson, Hubert Mardock and Denver Headrick, brought evangelistic messages that helped to stabilize many in the student body. A blessing and strengthening also came from the weekly chapel services conducted by our pastors, Paul and Madeline Todd.

Aside from regular school work a number of extra-curricular activities were carried on throughout the year, such as a more efficient athletic program, two dramatic plays directed by Marjorie Craven, band and a cappella groups under the direction of Willard Mendenhall that gave concerts at Greenleaf and elsewhere, and active gospel team work. The students have engaged in considerable amount of deputation work. Quartets, trios, and other groups have been active in service for the Master. A number of our students feel a call to definite Christian service, and in gospel team work they have definite opportunity to witness for the Lord. Gospel teams have

gone to Whitney, Boise, Star, Melba and Baker, and in addition to this, several of the students help regularly in Sunday School work in and around Greenleaf.

Improvements to the building include refinishing the floor of the gymnasium and purchasing a large canvas to protect the gym floor during banquets and other public gatherings. Fluorescent lighting has been installed in the study hall of the academy building. Two new Royal typewriters have been added to our commercial department, and new chairs and teachers' desks were purchased. The equipment in the shop room has been doubled over what it was a year ago through purchases mostly from the war surplus administration. The Home Economics department has purchased new drapes and partition screens; also two new electric Singer sewing machines and two wool rugs were presented to the department. Some new silverware and china has been purchased to replace the church dishes which were moved to the church basement. Hot lunches were served to the students by the Cooking II class during the coldest part of the winter. Two new electric ranges were installed at the beginning of the school year. About fifty new books have been added to the library during the year.

We are looking forward to the construction of a new brick and concrete building, the first unit to be started soon. The building, when completed, will adequately accommodate 150 students. We are trusting the Lord for the future of Greenleaf Academy, not only for this new building but for additional personnel, for there is a growing demand for this type of school for our young people. We must not fail our youth.

#### REPORT OF PRESIDENT OF PACIFIC COLLEGE

In retrospect the past year at Pacific College has seen some very marked changes on the campus landscape together with material improvements in former buildings and grounds.

The three new buildings constructed during the summer and fall of 1947 have been in use, although not completed at the opening of the school year. A great deal of the pioneer spirit was required on the part of students who arrived in the fall to find so much lacking in final preparation for their coming and comfortable living. Unfinished buildings, unfurnished dormitory rooms, muddy crosswalks over streets made sloppy by continued rains and other inconveniences were met with remarkably good sportsmanship. How-

ever, the probabilities are that no one will ever know the sum total of homesickness the cited inconveniences must have caused or intensified.

Gradually, finishing touches were made throughout the weeks; crosswalks were built together with sidewalks to connect the buildings, and life for the students became more agreeable. To their credit it should be said that no student ever came to the office with a complaint about these distressing conditions which must have irritated everyone more or less.

Aside from the three buildings erected in 1947, extensive repairs and improvements were made in connection with Administration offices in Wood-Mar Hall, in the Thomas Hester Memorial Gymnasium, in Canyon, Hoover and Edwards Halls. Much remains to be done if all of our buildings are to be properly prepared and equipped for satisfactory use. This is particularly true in connection with the three dormitories, where further refinishing and refurnishing are needed.

Enrollment for the first semester was 169. Several withdrew for various reasons during and at the close of the semester. A lack of funds prevented some from continuing throughout the year. The enrollment for the second semester was 151, with sufficient new students to make the total enrollment 181 for the year, exclusive of 28 other music students not enrolled in the college proper.

Also the degree of Bachelor of Arts was awarded to Donna Jean Heacock and Laura Eleanor Shook, who appeared with the class of 1947 and had completed their work in the meantime. The Junior Certificate for the completion of the Junior College courses was given to Ruth Engle Wilhite and Marion John Wilhite.

The various class awards for outstanding scholarship and character were given in order: Freshman award to Margaret Shattuck, the Sophomore award to Gertrude Haworth, the Junior award to Mary McClintick and the Senior award to Pauline Ireland.

Scholarships are available as usual to one young person in each Quarterly Meeting of the Yearly Meeting and for the honor student of Greenleaf Academy.

### Campus Activities

The campus activities of the year have been numerous and varied. Early in each semester the Student Christian Union sponsored a Religious Emphasis Week which brought spiritual blessing to many. "Daddy" Graves was the leader during the first semester while Oscar Brown of Rosedale conducted the services of the second semester.

Eugene Coffin, Superintendent of Young Friends Work in California Yearly Meeting, also conducted chapel periods throughout the week of his meetings in the Newberg Friends Church.

Individual students and student groups contributed their services throughout the year in assisting in the work of regular and special activities in numerous churches.

Our Music department has contributed much to gain public notice for the college during the year. The Four Flats Quartet, with but one change in its personnel, again won the one-hundred dollar prize in the Northwest Barber Shop Harmony contest. The quartets of the school, the A Cappella Choir and other musical groups have provided entertainment and inspiration to many and varied audiences.

The athletic program has included classes in Physical Education, basketball, tennis, and archery for both men and women, football and baseball for the men and softball for the women.

Student campus organizations include: The Associated Student Body, Student Christian Union, International Relations Club, Pacific Actorators, Trefian Literary Society, Gold P and Gold Q Clubs, Foreign Missionary Fellowship, Student Ministerial Union, Pacific College Flying Club, A Cappella Choir. In these various groups students are receiving practical training in the organization and administration of their activities while pursuing further their special interests.

### Finances

As is the case with all other educational institutions, the financial problems connected with the administration of Pacific College constantly confront us. Such must always be the case with any school or other enterprise which offers services at less than actual

cost. The past year students have paid in tuitions and fees but little more than forty per cent of this actual cost. The other sixty per cent must be provided for by income from endowment, property income, gifts or other sources. This ratio is not far from the average of other schools. Our tuition rates are still considerably below the average. Even at present basis, it makes a college education prohibitive to many of our young people. Since last Yearly Meeting a total of \$28,596.91 has been received in gifts from various sources, mostly from the churches and individuals of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Of this amount \$5590.43 was designated for Debt Retirement, \$12,503.96 for Building Fund, and \$10,502.52 for Faculty Salaries and undesignated use. Approximately 275 persons contributed to these sums aside from all individuals who gave through their local church treasuries whereby the college received their gifts as from a church rather than from the individuals.

Continued mounting costs made the expense of improvements on the campus run far beyond first estimates. Approximately \$65,000 has been expended on the three new buildings and improvements on all other buildings. Over \$50,000 of this amount has been temporarily financed by personal loans at six per cent interest, the rate which the college is still receiving on its real estate loans of endowment funds. It is planned to secure some long-term arrangement for this fund on a lower rate of interest.

The advance in operating expenses on budget for past year was not equalled by anticipated advance in receipts. It now appears that this deficit will be in the neighborhood of \$15,000.

### Acknowledgments

One of the encouraging features connected with the financial situation is the fact that such a large number of people have made contributions to the school during the year. It should be noted, however, that of the total amount listed one family gave over a third. If the school is to continue to provide Christian education for forty per cent of its actual cost, it will be necessary that other Friends catch a vision of larger responsibility and opportunity to support it.

To John and Esther Brouger of Vancouver, Washington, is due this public acknowledgment for their gift of ten thousand dollars to the Building Fund toward the cost of construction of Science Hall. To the many other friends and alumni of the school is likewise given an expression of appreciation for their contributions to the various funds—Debt Retirement, Building, Faculty Salaries or General Fund.

The Portland Branch of the Women's Auxiliary has been very helpful throughout the year with provision of furniture for Edwards Hall and venetian blinds and drapes for the President's office.

The local Auxiliary did much to prepare dormitories for the coming of students in the Fall.

Many other friends of the school and the student body have contributed time and effort for the improvement of the campus and buildings.

All of these varied contributions are gratefully acknowledged.



### Next Year

As judged by inquiries and entrance application blanks returned and also by the spirit and expressed purpose of this year's students, we are led to anticipate an increased enrollment next Fall. To this end we solicit the cooperation and aid of all Friends in recommending Pacific College to prospective students. Furthermore, the suggestion is made that individuals and meetings have a wonderful opportunity for real service, either by loans or gifts, to aid worthy young people of their communities secure a college education. It may be suggested also that a larger number of non-Friends students are desirable to give our own young people a larger appreciation of inter-denominational fellowship in Christian life and service.

### New Faculty Members

For next year, George Bales will return to assume charge of the Physical Education program for men. He has spent this year in advance study at the Y. M. C. A. College at Springfield, Massachusetts.

Lansing Bulgin, who has been part-time instructor in voice, will serve in full-time capacity following the securing of his degree with major in Music at Linfield College.

Oral Tish has been secured to serve as instructor in Religious Education, which has been his major field in graduate study at Northwest Nazarene College in Nampa, Idaho, and the Southwest Baptist Seminary at Los Angeles. He is now a pastor in California Yearly Meeting.

Paul E. Parker will head the Department of Psychology and Education. He secured his Master's Degree in Education at Arizona State, has done further graduate work in the University of Indiana and Harvard and will receive the Ph. D. degree from the University of Arizona this summer.

The Committee recommends that the Constitution and Discipline be amended (Section III, sub-section B, paragraph 2, page 42) to read as follows:

2. OTHER COMMITTEES. Each quarterly meeting shall appoint annually, on recommendation by the nominating committee, one committee to correspond to and cooperate with each of the Yearly Meeting Boards (see pages 89-98), except the Board of Publication, designating one member of each committee to serve as quarterly meeting superintendent (or chairman) of that department of work. Other committees may be appointed as found necessary.

It should be noted that if the word "superintendent" is adopted, the new reading will not be in conflict with other parts of the Constitution and Discipline. If the word "chairman" is adopted, it will be necessary to amend the supplementary regulations which specify that the committee is to appoint its own chairman. If the word "superintendent" is adopted, then the committee can select the one so designated by the quarterly meeting as its chairman or some other member, as the situation may seem to require).

The representatives approved of these suggestions and recommend this action to the Yearly Meeting.

These recommendations were approved.

- 57. The following request came from the Board of Evangelism and the Board of Missions:

The Board of Evangelism and the Board of Missions have considered the matter of Oregon Yearly Meeting's cooperating with the Western School of Evangelical Religion.

We recommend full cooperation with the Western School of Evangelical Religion in naming members to their Board of Directors and we ask the Board of Finance to place \$1400 in the fixed expense for Oregon Yearly Meeting financial responsibility to the Seminary.

The Executive Committee approved this recommendation.

The meeting favored raising the \$1400 and after much discussion it was decided that the money should be raised by voluntary contribution, and in a few minutes \$526 was raised as a beginning of this fund. The responsibility of securing further contributions was left with the two representatives that are to be appointed to the Board.

- 58. Kelsey Hinshaw requested the privilege of representing the meeting in making long distance telephone calls to some of the key men in Washington in regard to the draft. He hoped that some members would help with the expense. This request was granted.

#### WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

- 59. Arvilla Mickelson, the president, presided and read the following report, which was approved:

The past year has been one of the most active years for the Women's Missionary Union since its organization, and much has been accomplished for our Lord and Master, Jesus Christ, who has said, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature."

Quarterly Meeting reports show a total membership of 471 women in 38 unions reporting. Six unions did not report. Three new unions were organized during the year. They are West Chehalem, Scotts Mills, and Ridgeview. Four quarterly meeting rallies were held during the year. Clayton and Louella Brown, missionaries on furlough from the Friends African Mission under Kansas Yearly Meeting, were the guest speakers at Greenleaf and Portland Quarterly Meeting rallies. Walter Lee, President of the Board of Missions, spoke at the Salem rally.

Many missionary books were read and studied by the various unions. Among these were, THROUGH BLOOD AND FIRE IN LATIN AMERICA; SO SEND I YOU; BLOSSOMS FROM THE FLOWERY KINGDOM; DOCTOR IDA OF INDIA; GO-FORTH OF CHINA; CHARLES COWMAN—MISSIONARY WARRIOR; MISSIONARY DOCTOR; WASTE-BASKET SURGEON; AMBASSADOR OF THE KING; CLIMBING; 'TILL BREAK OF DAY; HIGH SPOTS IN THE ANDES; EARLY HISTORY OF FRIENDS WORK IN BOLIVIA; CHRIST AT THE DOOR; WORLD CHRISTIANITY—YESTERDAY, TODAY AND TOMORROW; and RADIO, THE NEW MISSIONARY.

The Foreign Project for the year was the raising of \$1200 for the Preacher-Teacher Fund. Thirty-two unions supported this project, and the amount was paid in full.

For the Home Project this year, the Missionary Union attempted to refurnish portions of the Pacific College dormitories. Rugs, quilts, doilies, towels, linens, and furniture were purchased and given to the College. With the home project apportionment of dues, venetian blinds will be purchased for the Treasurer's and Registrar's offices.

It is reported that thirty-one unions hold summer sessions, showing a year-round interest in home and foreign missions.



Fifteen-hundred and thirty-six calls were made in the interest of the church by the fifteen unions who reported on this phase of the work. Dues were paid in full by 29 unions.

It would take many pages to list the numerous special projects which have been promoted by the various unions. Among the most noteworthy are the following: Boxes of clothing for home and foreign relief; help to the Red Cross; pastoral support; purchase of a missionary library; financial assistance to the Christian Endeavor camps; painted church and parsonage interiors; canned fruit and vegetables for outposts; and helped to purchase supplies for our outgoing missionaries and those already on the field.

The annual banquet this year was held jointly with the Friend's Brotherhood in the new dining hall at Pacific College. The theme was "Power." Three-hundred and twenty-five men and women enjoyed the bountiful meal prepared by Leona White and Marie Williams. The total receipts for the banquet were \$294.19; \$223.46 was paid for the actual cost of food and labor; the remaining \$70.73 will be used to help build the missionary transportation fund of the Yearly Meeting.

In closing, we would give you the scriptural admonition found in Eccl. 9:10, "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with all thy might."

Portland Quarterly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight requests that a clarification be made of that portion of the discipline which has to do with preparative meetings. May we have the following question answered?

If preparative meetings are required to report to the "Mother" Monthly Meeting, then should not this "mother" meeting incorporate such reports in their report to the Quarterly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight?

The Ministry and Oversight body has considered this question, and since this concerns all reports and not only those of the Ministry and Oversight, the meeting felt that this question should be referred to the Yearly Meeting.

The epistle from the Bolivian brethren was translated and appears as follows:



Oregon Yearly Meeting, U. S. A.

Beloved Brethren in the Christian faith;

We greet you in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. We continue by advising you that we have received your loving letter. It was read in our presence. We all rejoice in its counsel and charges through Christ.

In this Yearly Meeting in La Paz, which is the center, we have received many blessings. We met together from all the places of the field. By means of the preaching, we received innumerable blessings from God. The classes were carried on from six o'clock in the morning until twelve. After dinner we began at two o'clock and continued until seven o'clock at night. In these six days we had services led by a few of the brethren and by the missionaries. Paul Cammack preached in English, his own tongue, which was then interpreted into two other tongues, Spanish and Aymara. Jack Willcuts preached in Spanish, which was interpreted by one of the brethren. The rest of the missionaries preached in the same manner from God's word. Many sought God for pardon of sin, salvation and holiness. We thank you for sending to us these missionaries.

All the churches send you thanks for the verses from Paul's epistle that you referred to. We have rejoiced greatly in these during this conference.

We ask that you pray for us. In like manner we shall pray for you that God might help us in the work. We will march forward. We would remind you of these verses: Phil. 2:2; Heb. 13:15; Eph. 6:11-17.

We close with love and may the blessing of God be upon you.

#### BOARD OF EVANGELISM

- 72. Oscar Brown presided and read the reports which were approved and will appear in the appendix.

Dean Gregory sang, My All to Him I Owe, accompanied by Marjorie Crisman.

The Board and outpost workers were seated on the platform. Orrin Ogier reported on his work at Pringle.

Willard Hanson told of the work in Seattle, Washington, in the Memorial Church.

Arthur Roberts gave an account of the work at Everett, Washington.

Carl Byrd, evangelistic superintendent of Newberg, was introduced.

David Thomas told of the work at Netarts.

Frederick Baker gave an account of the work of Portland Quarterly Meeting and introduced Ray Carter, the new evangelistic superintendent.

Clark Smith, the evangelistic superintendent of Tacoma, told of the work of his quarter.

Denver Headrick spoke of the work in Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting and mentioned J. Will Jones as the next evangelistic superintendent.

Paul Todd, Quarterly Meeting superintendent, spoke for the Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting.

Oscar Brown, Evangelistic Superintendent, told of the work in Salem Quarter.

Joseph G. Reece, General Superintendent, gave the following report, which was approved and is to be printed in the minutes.

#### REPORT OF EVANGELISTIC SUPERINTENDENT

As we review the reports which have come in from our fifty meetings we feel to exclaim with others, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow." We merited not the blessing of God but He richly rewarded as we endeavored to walk with Him. No one person can claim any special share in the victories won, but because of the faithfulness of many, God did bountifully bless.

A word of sincere appreciation and thanks should be expressed for the fine group of pastors serving Oregon Yearly Meeting. It would be difficult to find a more loyal or faithful group anywhere. Many of them are making quite a sacrifice to minister to us, but no word of complaint has come to me. I feel that it would greatly encourage our pastors if the elders would mind the injunction in our discipline (bottom of page 65) and give "public endorsement to the ministry as the way may open therefor, when the truth has been declared faithfully and profitably." It has been years since I have heard an elder do this. Is it not time to reinstate this duty of our elders?

My wife has travelled with me most of the time and has assisted in meetings and conferences. We regret that we haven't been able to accomplish more for Oregon Yearly Meeting but the following figures will give you some idea of what has been done. We have averaged about 2000 miles a month travelling over the Yearly Meeting. In this we attended 13 sessions of Quarterly Meetings and we believe that we visited every meeting sometime during the year. We showed our pictures of the work of the Yearly Meeting 32 times; brought messages on 58 occasions; met with many meetings on Ministry and Oversight for consultation; spoke to 12 meetings for our youth and showed the pictures of yearly meeting work to several of these groups. We attended and had part in the conferences at Quaker Hill, Southern Oregon and Twin Rocks. We attended Wauna Mer just for the joy of attending. These conferences unquestionably mean much to Oregon Yearly Meeting. Some of the special activities included: assisting in the dedication of large and commodious dining halls at Quaker Hill and Twin Rocks; assisting in the dedication of splendid parsonages at West Chehalem and Talent; assisting in the setting up of a monthly meeting at Medford and the starting of a new outpost at Hillsboro. A beautiful fifteen-acre conference ground was secured at Twin



Lakes, Idaho, through the efforts of Gilbert Strand, and the deed to the property now rests with our Yearly Meeting trustees. In the past few days, a twenty-five-year lease, with a first option to renew, has been secured on about forty acres by our conference in Southern Oregon. This property is located about twelve miles west of Klamath Falls and less than two miles off the highway to Medford.

The yearly meeting boards held two meetings, both at Newberg. The first was held in September and the second in February. The annual meeting of the Ministerial Association was held in September at Twin Rocks. Mention should be made of property bought and paid for in the Holly Park district of Seattle. Ernest Fritschle is moving there with his family next week to start a Sunday School and if the way opens to develop a regular Friends meeting. Canby and Eunice Jones spent almost a week within the limits of the Yearly Meeting speaking on the "spiritual basis of our peace testimony." Last June, Jack and Geraldine Willcuts attended the early sessions of Yearly Meetings and left shortly thereafter for Bolivia. Last February 2, we had the privilege of seeing the Cammacks off from the airport in Los Angeles, and on May 8 we met the Chapmans at the Portland airport on their furlough from Bolivia. During the month of March, Perry Hayden visited 19 of our meetings with his motion picture and message on "God Is My Landlord." We feel that this message meant a great deal in reviving throughout the yearly meeting a new sense of our Stewardship to God. The News Flash has been edited and mailed from the Yearly Meeting office each month.

Pastoral changes are contemplated at Highland, Chehallem Center, West Chehallem, First Church Portland, Forest Home, Rose Valley, Rosedale, Marion, Boise, Northeast Tacoma, Everett, Entiat, Ridgeview, South Salem, Hayden Lake and Quilcene. Of these, West Chehallem has secured Herman Macy as pastor; Chehallem Center has secured Leroy Neifert; South Salem, Oscar Brown; and Hayden Lake, Kenneth Kester. Final reports have not come in yet from the other meetings.

Again we are happy to mention the sacrificial and helpful work of our six Quarterly Meeting Superintendents. In spite of the demands of pastoral duties, they have found time to expedite the work of the Quarter. We ask so much of these officers and yet do so little in return for the long hours of service they give.

Word should be said about the highest record of membership Oregon Yearly Meeting has ever attained. The report stated that our membership this year is 4047. Please remember that our goal for 1950 is 5000 members. It can be attained if we will give it a little thought and effort.

We would also express appreciation to the Southern Pacific Railroad for the courtesy of a pass over their lines in Oregon.

We are thankful for the emphasis Oregon Yearly Meeting is placing on Evangelism. If we don't evangelize we will die. However, we would call to the attention of every member to be an evangelist; this is not the task of just a few in the church; it is the God-given privilege of every member whether active, associate,

resident, non-resident, probationary, affiliated, young or old, well or sick, rich or poor, those who are afraid to talk, those who never have spoken to a soul about God; in fact there is no situation in which a member of the church can be placed but that he can evangelize, unless he has grown cold in his soul and has sin within his life. May each of us be in the place before God where He can fire us anew with a passion to go out and evangelize for Him.

"Grace be with all who have a never diminishing love for our Lord Jesus Christ."

The committee on Ministry recommends to the Ministry and Oversight that a Certificate of Recording for ministers, as provided in the Discipline, page 58, article 9, be prepared by the committee on ministry and that these certificates be presented to ministers previously recorded who request them, upon receipt of the date of their recording.

### REPORT OF PUBLICATION BOARD

The Board of Publication has felt a heavy sense of responsibility in endeavoring to live up to its responsibility as stated in the Discipline of 1945, which clearly outlines its duties:

"The Board of Publication is authorized to publish the yearly meeting periodical, and is responsible for the appointment of its editorial staff and for all editorial and financial responsibilities concerning it. It is further authorized to build and administer a revolving fund and to publish books, pamphlets, and other church and Bible School literature as need may arise and the board may deem wise."

The major project of our board this year have been the publication of "The Northwest Friend" and the publication of the newly established "Quaker Bulletin Service."

Ten issues of the Northwest Friend have been published in spite of greatly increased printing costs. No issues were published in July and August.

There has been a splendid response to the newly initiated bulletin service. Twenty-five hundred bulletins have been issued for weekly mimeographing and distribution with 25 churches using the bulletin service.

We appreciate the work of every member of the board and especially the untiring efforts of Ray L. Carter, editor of the Northwest Friend, printer and publisher of the bulletin service.

Publication Sunday was again observed this year in many of our churches at which time appeals were made for the work of the board.

The major project of our board for the coming year will be the establishment of a Yearly Meeting Printing plant to meet the needs of every phase of our growing church work.

The President of the Board presented a situation in Japan that needs our help, but the meeting is unable to help at this time. He asked the meeting to pray for these Japanese.

The President read the following report:

**BOARD OF MISSIONS**

Oregon Yearly Meeting may well say, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us," as it views the steady advancement of its foreign missionary work.

The arrival on our Bolivian field of Jack and Geraldine Willcuts and of Paul and Phyllis Cammack and family brought us to the

accomplishment of our goal of ten adult missionaries in service. Ralph and Marie Chapman and family arrived home for their furlough in time for the sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Three missionary families in travel during the year called for an unusually large financial response for transportation. To this the people of Oregon Yearly Meeting have responded in a magnificent way by contributing over \$6,000.

The presence of Paul Cammack on the farm in Bolivia has made possible increasing development of the agricultural possibilities. We may well expect that years will be required to bring the farm into full and efficient production, but we are already beginning to realize definite returns.

Phyllis Cammack has assumed the editorship of "The Soul Cry of the Aymara" and has prepared one issue for publication. It is the desire of the Board of Missions to continue the publication periodically if interest is such as to produce the necessary funds.

Ralph and Marie Chapman will be available for deputation work during the coming fall and winter. The Board of Missions with the assistance of the various meetings will arrange a schedule for deputation.

Appreciation must be expressed for the splendid work of the Women's Missionary Union in assuming the financial support of the national preachers and teachers to the amount of \$100 per month.

We shall never be without great obstacles and problems as the forces of sin and darkness gather together to resist the light of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Earnest intercessory prayer is required of us continually if we are to fulfill our stewardship of the Gospel in Bolivia.

The reports from the meetings composing this Yearly Meeting indicate a growing interest in the missionary task of the church. Of the 44 reports, 30 were made by monthly meetings and 14 by preparative meetings and outposts. Three-hundred fifty-two meetings were held in which special emphasis was placed upon missions. In these meetings, special missionary speakers number 198.

There were 494 prayer meetings in the interests of missions, which were not evenly divided between our meetings. The 17 meetings reporting no special prayer meetings should be encouraged to join in this prayer crusade. All but four reported the use of the News Flash in some service, with the Sunday School being used the most as an outlet for this news.

An increasing number of meetings are displaying large maps of our mission field, but there are still more than half of those reporting who have yet to reach this goal. Meetings will find it interesting and informational to make their own maps.

Most meetings reported the reading of missionary books with a total of 432. Nineteen meetings reported 38 young people with a call to foreign missionary work. This Yearly Meeting may humbly thank God for the 18 or more of its members serving as foreign missionaries on a number of fields.

While there were 105 missionary committee meetings with a few



monthly meetings reporting regular monthly committee meetings, there were 21 reports showing no committee meetings.

Many interesting projects and methods were reported including missionary plays, displays, imaginary journeys and regular correspondence with missionaries on the field. One preparative meeting reported sending Bibles to Japan for a work which it is carrying on by correspondence. The results have been remarkable.

God has guided and blessed this Yearly Meeting in its endeavor to evangelize souls in darkness, but we humbly recognize how small a place we fill as we look upon the crying needs of the world. Let us beseech God to increase our capacity to serve.

#### **Field Mission Council**

The Mission Council has functioned during this past year with Ralph Chapman as chairman and Howard Pearson as secretary. The following appointments were directed to the Council from the Mission Board: Field Treasurer Howard Pearson, Educational and Agricultural Secretary Roscoe Knight, Evangelistic and Construction Secretary Ralph Chapman. Each secretary supervises his respective phase of the work throughout the field and brings for consideration of the Mission Council all problems that require the decision of the entire group. We are thankful for the Lord's presence with us as we

have faced the problems and rejoiced in the victories of the past year.

#### **Personnel**

Our joy was made full to overflowing during the past year as we welcomed into our midst the Willcuts and the Cammacks. On July 4, 1947, the Willcuts arrived to begin their first term of work in Bolivia. They lived in the Mission home until their household goods arrived and they could set up housekeeping. An apartment was then secured and soon they were established and busy with language study. Geraldine has been actively engaged as church organist and has done chalk drawings at conferences. Jack has been through the field on visitation trips, directed classes at conferences, and preached as opportunity presented itself. He is now pastor of the La Paz church. The arrival date of the Cammacks in La Paz was February 5, 1948. We appreciate the addition of these consecrated workers to our staff. They have lived until recent date in the Mission home in La Paz pending the clearing of their equipment and the completion of other necessary entry details. They are now living at the farm. May the Lord permit their soon gaining a working knowledge of the language and the people that their ministry here be unhindered.

#### **Transportation**

We would advise you that transportation for our work in the past year continued through the use of the International truck and the Chevrolet. Both cars were used as seemed advisable for the furtherance of the work.

#### **Yearly Meeting, La Paz, 1948**

The Yearly Meeting in La Paz convened during the last week of March or specifically Easter week. Much of the time ordinarily dedicated to field reports and the meetings of the general field council of brethren and missionaries was dispensed with this year. Special emphasis was placed upon the evangelistic services directed by our evangelist, Paul Cammack. God truly led Paul in the preparation of pertinent messages for this time and the altars were filled with penitent seekers at most of the services. Julia Pearson directed a class on prayer in which she gave illustrated lessons on the value of prayer, and the manner in which we ought to pray. Jack Willcuts directed the class on Holiness. He placed before the conference attenders the Scriptural basis of the doctrine of holiness and brought home his points through lessons illustrated by chalk drawings and object lessons. Howard Pearson directed classes touching such subjects as basis for church membership and tithing. Tina Knight and Geraldine Willcuts presented classes for the children and were busy as organists for the the services. Roscoe Knight, as music director, conducted the music class and provided the services with special music both by the missionaries and nationals. Ralph Chapman directed the conference business sessions and acted as platform chairman. Marie Chapman and Phyllis Cammack helped as organists and Marie supervised the entertainment of the missionary family during the week. The conference began as customary on Tuesday



night and continued through the Sunday evening service. The days were filled with blessings received from the fine lessons given. A feeling of unity and a desire to seek the Lord's will for every phase of the work permitted a wholesome consideration of field problems. We feel that the Lord most graciously undertook in this important time of our church year, and we take opportunity to thank you all who remembered us before the throne of grace in special prayer.

## ANNUAL REPORT, EVANGELISTIC SECRETARY

1947 - 1948

The work of the past year continued with the challenge that the Lord put before us in reaching the people with the Gospel. May the Lord be judge of our success or failure to accomplish that which He desired of us.

In La Paz itself, the church willingly accepted its responsibilities. Ismael Balboa as the Clerk of the Monthly Meeting was faithful, in his duties. The brethren throughout were actively engaged in street services in addition to their regular church duties. Many of the brethren were given picture rolls for their use in street preaching. These, together with their Bibles, hymnals, and a large picture depicting the "two ways"—one to heaven, the other to hell—seem to be the essentials of the worker in his preaching in open air services. Points of interest from the statistical report of the La Paz church show approximately 12,000 tracts distributed, 120 evangelistic trips sponsored by the church, present membership of the church 67, and average Sunday School attendance of 170.

Included in the work of the La Paz district are the subordinate meetings in Mina Miluni, Chunyavi, Pucarani, Aigachi, Puerte Perez, Laja, and Palca. Of these places Palca is the only place where services have not been held regularly, but workers went their from La Paz as was possible.

In addition to the work of the main church in the district of Amacari, the brethren have maintained services in Ojje, Isla Anapia, Peru, and Lluypaya. Visits were made to the other neighboring communities as well as to places in Peru. Here services were held in homes and in open air. The pastor of the Amacari church, Cipriano Mamani, continued faithful and consecrated to the work of this district. He reports having distributed 1320 tracts and that there are now 56 members in the church and an average attendance of 100 in Sunday School.

Since the pastor of the Achachicala church, Felix Guanica, has been working for the past year on the revision of the New Testament in Aymara, this church has gone forward with one of its own brethren as leader under Felix. Occasional visits by missionaries and brethren have been a help to them.

Corocoro district has felt the effect of the lack of a full-time, recognized pastor for the church there. However, there still remains a nucleus of faithful believers who endeavored to carry on as they could during the absence of a worker. In an endeavor to help in

the need that was presented, the La Paz church sent commissioned workers for a month at a time and the Lord blessed their efforts. Let us pray earnestly that someone be raised up to feel and accept the challenge of going to labor in this field.

The church in Mina Fabulosa, under Rosendo Guachalla, continues to be a light for the Gospel in this small mining settlement. They have had an average attendance of 20 believers during the past year. In addition to the brethren of the mine itself, attendance at the services here include brethren from Uma Palca, a small community below Fabulosa.

The newest work of our field touches our farm, Copajira. Here the church is under the leadership of Maximo Loza, one of the Bible School students. The brethren here are reaching out into neighboring farms and are already realizing the fruits of their efforts. There are 34 in attendance at Sunday School, including five converts among the peons.

Reports from the entire field show active work in open air services during festival occasions. We are thankful for the zeal of the brethren to preach the Word and admire them for their taking advantage of the large festival gatherings to accomplish this aim.

During the past year, five district conferences were held in the following places: Corocoro, La Paz, Mina Fabulosa, Achachicala, and Amacari. These conferences are planned and carried forth with the desire to give the brethren special classes of studies in doctrine, Bible and general help in their Christian walk.

We are sorry to have to include in our report a note of difficulty, but with it we rejoice that God has seen fit to make us partakers of His suffering. During recent months, the Mission Council unanimously decided to sever relationship with one of the main leaders of the church. Consequently, his name was erased from the church membership list. We believe that the Lord will honor our efforts to keep our work clean, and although the resulting reactions have been strong, we stand before Him convinced that we have done that which shall permit a more wholesome fellowship between missionaries and nationals.

## AGRICULTURAL REPORT

1947 - 1948

By Roscoe S. Knight

Well over a year has passed since O.Y.M. purchased Hacienda Copajira. I can honestly say that all the hopes I had for the farm then, I still have now and many are even strengthened. We have had a little opportunity to experiment, sow larger acreage, and all in all, prospects are good.



Last July, the purchase of a small model "A" Farmall tractor enabled us to do more and much better plowing than the peons could do, although a long dry season greatly hindered the work. When it became possible to buy a larger, model "M" Farmall, in November, such was done, and the small tractor put up for sale. A three-bottom plow was bought and with it we have been and are doing all the plowing possible. We hope to put in at least 200 or 300 acres of crops this coming year. However, to do so, a good deal more machinery is needed, some of which we hope to purchase in a month or so. Paul is making some experiments with soil, so we hope to find what is lacking and obtain, if possible the fertilizers necessary.

September, October and a part of November are generally the best months for most planting. However, because of the lack of rain-fall, planting this year was late. It looked as though some crops might not have time to ripen, but a late wet season has given all a chance to do their best. We are now in the middle of potato harvest, and on the average, they are very good. They far excel the average run of the peons. Other crops have not been harvested as yet, but it is time to start on them as soon as possible. This year we have about 65 acres of barley, 10 of potatoes, 7 of habas, and 3½ of kinua. All are average or above and will give us a good yield.

The animals are all thriving quite well and have increased for the most part. A disease went through the sheep and we have eaten a good many but there are still over 500. Hogs now number 14; cows, 13; horses, 4; llamas, 2; with a varied number of chickens, ducks and guinea pigs. We are hoping to improve the stock in general in the coming year.

A few improvements have been made which have helped in various ways. A new well has been dug and rocked up and now serves us all with good, even though alkali and hard, water. A new room was added to the little gate house and now serves as quarters for a married couple. A temporary tractor shed was made to keep the sun and rain off the implements. A remodeled dormitory and other rooms were prepared for living quarters for the Bible College students and workers. Remodeling of the church was started but had to give way for the more necessary construction of Cammack's house, which is now under way.

The peons are still a problem but we are doing all possible to hasten the day when they can be given land of their own and be made into community Indians. This will not be an easy process because they do not want to be "freed." They are bound by custom and every change we make is fought by some. However, we feel that they will be bettered and that the farm will be on a much better basis if it is free of peons. We thank God that a number are becoming interested in the Gospel with five regular attenders to our services.

The Lord is good and with His continued blessings the farm will prove of greater blessing and help in supporting a large part of the program here on the field.

## ANNUAL REPORT, CONSTRUCTION SECRETARY

1947 - 1948

During the past year the only new construction touching the country churches has been in Ojje. In this small community near Amacari, the brethren desired to build a small church for use there. Starting first as a small, one-story building, it was finally raised to make two stories possible for they intend using the building for the church and school. The Mission has helped in this building by the provision of roofing materials, two windows and a door.

In Corocoro, the location of the church was changed, and a small amount of repair work was involved in making ready the new location. This repair amounted to the tearing out of a wall and the building of a platform for the pulpit.

As a result of heavy rains during the rainy season of 1947, the roof of Hadley Hall was found in need of repair. Consequently, the old roofing was taken off, and, after changing the pitch of the rafters, the roofing was replaced with such additions of new sheeting as was necessary. The sky-light was also placed at a steeper pitch and new glass placed. Recently the two front bedrooms in Hadley Hall were painted, and the bathroom was painted and cabinets installed.

At Copajira the construction still involves more repair work than new. During the past year, the Knights have remodeled their home. This has been principally the placing of larger windows in the bedrooms and living room, reconstruction of the fireplace, and redecorating in general in these rooms. In the older farm house the remodeling has been for the providing of better quarters for nationals living there and especially the making of two rooms into a large, more adequate dormitory for the Bible School students. Work has been started on the church with plastering of walls and putting in more and larger windows. We contemplate in this building a fine location for our church until an increased evangelistic and school program on and near the farm demands a larger.

The work on the new home for the Cammacks has only recently begun. The schools boys have been employed in washing sand at the river, and stones have been cut for the foundation. The building plans have been put in the hands of Maximo Loza, and he has already made foundation excavations on the site. The need for the moment is the making of adobes which has been delayed by the late rains.

## EDUCATIONAL REPORT

1947 - 1948

Roscoe S. Knight

### Grade Schools

Since our school year is from January to September each year,



this report necessarily covers a part of two years. The school year ended last year in September for the country schools and in October in La Paz. The same teachers who started the year stayed with us the whole time and completed their work satisfactorily.

This year we are continuing with the same schools but with some change in teachers. Amacari is still in charge of Pedro Quispe with Gregorio Aruquipa as helper. Pedro receives about \$18 per month and Gregorio \$13. Students now number 82 with many more wanting to enter but it is too late. The complete six grades are taught. Ojje has a new teacher, Dionicio Choque, who receives about \$14 per month. Students number 52, which is too many for one teacher but only four grades compensate a little. Lluypaya continues with Angelino Condori who still receives about \$15 per month. He has 27 students and 4 grades. All of these boys are from Huatajata and make good teachers. Silas Casas continues in La Paz with 50 students. Some of the older boys help him with the beginners. He receives about \$23 per month, of which we pay \$9, the La Paz church paying the rest. Felix Guanica is teaching in Achachicala but with no extra pay above his pastor's salary. Total paid monthly to teachers is slightly less than \$70, with the present high exchange.

#### Bible College

School term ended last year on September 12, with 14 students. A field trip, final exams and other closing activities made it an eventful time for all. During the vacation that followed, some students stayed here on the farm to work and the rest went to their homes. Two of them held pastorates during these months.

This year we are continuing on much the same basis as last year. Tuition is about \$5 per month, but this sum is worked out by the students who pay no cash to the college. Because of the lack of facilities, we have received only young men this year. Students number eleven, with all doing good work and the most are definitely consecrated to God, their studies and work. As most of them are able to read and write acceptably we are teaching but one group of classes. There are four class periods and Chapel each morning. Subjects taught are: Life of Christ, Old Testament, Bible Geography, Grammar, Memory Texts, General Class and music and organ instruction. In the afternoons the boys learn hat-making, tailoring and masonry.

This year we are stressing Evangelism, both Personal and General. Each Sunday, some or all are visiting other towns, communities and farms, carrying the Gospel to many, in form of literature, preaching or personal work. We hope to reach many souls in this way and thus enlarge our program in general. We have big hopes for the College and trust and pray that as the years go on, the outreach and influence will be felt by thousands of lost Aymara souls.

### DIGEST OF THE MEETINGS OF THE MINISTRY AND OVERSIGHT BODY

The Meeting on Ministry and Oversight of Oregon Yearly Meeting convened Thursday, 6th month 10, 1948, at 9:30 a.m. There were four sessions during Yearly Meeting.

The presence of the Lord was graciously felt in the opening service as Friends expressed thanks for His guidance during the past year and a concern for those who were passing through times of testing.

Thirty-seven members of Oregon Yearly Meeting attended the conference at Colorado Springs in June 1947. They reported that nine Yearly Meetings were represented there.

In the reports of the State of the Church, a concern was expressed that Friends be more regular in attendance at Prayer Meetings, that material things should not take precedence over earnest religious exercise for the conversion of sinners and that members be not negligent in making evident their appreciation for the faithful labors of others. There was a gratifying assurance that pastors were faithful in preaching the Word and bringing to their people spirit-filled messages.

The question arose as to the functions of the Ministry and Oversight body. The meeting felt that the Ministry and Oversight should not be an open meeting because there are matters to be discussed which should be kept within the body. On page 67 of the Discipline, Section II, paragraph 1, we have a statement of the composition of this body. Friends were urged to read and study I Peter 5 for help regarding the duties of the Ministers, Elders and Overseers.

The question of reports to be made by preparative meetings was referred to the Yearly Meeting.

The meeting felt that a member of a preparative meeting who is an active member of the Friends Church may hold any office which any other member of his Monthly Meeting may hold. It was their opinion that an affiliate member could not be a member of



the Ministry and Oversight body in accordance with the Discipline, pages 74-75.

Representatives to Quarterly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight from a preparative meeting may only be named by the parent meeting because a preparative meeting has a Pastoral Committee instead of a Ministry and Oversight body.
