● 1. Our prayer at the opening of the fifty-seventh session of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends, June 9, 1949, at 9:30 a.m. is that Christ may have the preeminence in all our sessions.

● 2. - 9. The state of the church as reported by the Quarterly Meeting was read and the following summary was prepared:

### SUMMARY OF THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

All meetings report that the meetings for worship and transaction of business are duly held. The morning services are well attended. Although many report that the evening services and prayer meetings are not so well attended, a few meetings report an increase in these services.

The revival services and the faithful preaching of the pastors have been a help in building up the spiritual condition in the various Quarterly Meetings. Family devotions in nearly all meetings have added to spiritual development of the young people, but some have neglected this important means of spiritual advance.

Some members are not careful to avoid places and amusement inconsistent with Christian character but most of them observe a high standard of conduct.

The Christian principle of peace is not maintained in all churches and one Quarterly Meeting feels as if the church has failed in

some places in not teaching the Friends' stand on military training and that some young people are not registering as conscientious objectors.

All report that the doctrinal standards of Friends as held by Oregon Yearly Meeting are upheld.

- 10. The following report was received from the committee appointed to write to Aged Friends:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends—

We, your committee, appointed at last Yearly Meeting to write to Aged Friends, wish to report that 52 letters were written, which we trust brought cheer and blessing to those to whom they were sent.

- 11. Ethel Cox, Helen Frazier, Irena B. Cunningham, Edna Mills and Clifton Ross were appointed as a committee to write letters to Aged Friends this year.

- 12. The Press Committee was named from the floor as follows: Mahlon Macy, Herman Macy, Marjorie Crisman and Charles Beals.

- 13. The hymn, I Am Thine, O Lord, was sung at the beginning of the inspirational hour. Walter Williams brought the inspirational message from Matthew 1:21. He spoke on the heritage of Christ and in conclusion said, "Our Christian heritage is the cross that we wear deep within our hearts."

- 14. After a word of prayer the meeting adjourned to meet at two o'clock p.m.

### THURSDAY, 2:00 P. M.

- 15. After a devotional period a letter from the Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church of North America was read in which they appealed to the people of the churches to join together in requesting an amendment to our constitution as follows: We, the people of the United States . . . "Devoutly recognizing the authority and law of Jesus Christ, the Saviour and King of nations."

This matter was referred to the Representatives.

- 16. A communication from the Committee on National Legislation was read.

This was referred to the Board of Service for further consideration.

### BOARD OF SERVICE

- 17. The President of the Board, Paul Mills, presented W. A. Sellwood, who spoke of the great need for goats in Japan and



Okinawa. Thousands of goats are needed so urgently that they are hoping to send a shipload this month and another in August.

The report of the Board was read by the president and appears below:

According to the statistical reports received there have been about 20 programs presented during the year which featured the needs of the various communities of the world for relief. In addition to this there have been 25 sermons stressing Christian obligation to those in distress, and local committees report meetings to the number of 77 in the interest of this work.

Nearly 250 homes within our communities where need for clothing, fuel, food or other help existed have been aided by our meetings. Victims of the Vanport flood were helped by Friends through the channels of the Red Cross, by personal service, opening homes for temporary housing and giving of 160 Bibles to those who had lost theirs and requested that they might have the Word of God.

Some meetings took the opportunity of the Christmas season to prepare and send gifts for the inmates of a state institution who had little to brighten their lives at that time. Minority groups, including Negroes, Jews, Indians and Germans, have been helped and encouraged as opportunity was given.

Two young men, Ellis Roberts and James Armstrong, who served under C.P.S., have been given aid in pursuing their education. The board wishes to thank all who responded to the call for money for this purpose and reports that the need was met.

Although the local centers of distress abroad may shift some, the overall need for foreign relief continues unabated. There is prospect for lessening demands in sections of Europe, but as these slack off the volume of suffering in the Orient increases. During the past year our meetings report the sending of aid through the National Association of Evangelicals, American Friends Service Committee, Heifers for Relief, Russian Bible Society, C.A.R.E., Mutual Aid, Bob Hammond Relief for China, and the Hebrew Evangelization Society.

About two tons of clothing and one-half ton of food have been sent abroad besides cash offering for food and packages sent to families in Europe.

Report has come to our board from the clerk of the German Yearly Meeting that Oregon Yearly Meeting has been helping more Friends' families in Germany than any other yearly meeting. While this is not the most economical way to send food it does afford an excellent opportunity for correspondence with those helped, which may be of great spiritual benefit.

The service board would like to point out the medical aid and rehabilitation work being done by the yearly meeting in connection with our mission work in Bolivia. The need is greater than has been met and any Friends concerned for this service may find a channel for the exercise of their concerns through the mission board.

The hand of God has bestowed upon our northwest country

prosperity and abundance, while large sections of the world suffer want. We do not well if we enjoy these blessings alone.

This was approved.

Walter Williams spoke of the great need in China and showed how even a small gift may have far-reaching results.

### NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF EVANGELICALS

● 18. Howard S. Lower, who has charge of the regional office in Portland, told of the many activities of the N. A. E. He spoke especially about the importance of the Broadcasting stations and of the work of the N. A. E. in helping to bring displaced people of Europe to the United States.

● 19. Kelsey Hinshaw reported that his correspondence with the National Association of Evangelicals in regard to the draft and universal military training had been very satisfactory. (Minute 62, 1948 Minutes).

● 20. A suggestion was made that the meeting appeal to our legislature for a liberalization of the laws in regard to displaced persons.

This was referred to the Service Committee.

● 21. The meeting adjourned to meet Friday morning, June 10, at 9:30.

### FRIDAY, JUNE 10, 9:30 A. M.

● 22. After a period of devotion the minutes of June 9 were read and supplemented.

● 23. Charles Haworth spoke on behalf of the Epistle Committee, saying that only two members were present and requesting that other persons be added to the committee. The names of Mahlon Macy and Edward Harmon were added.

A concerned epistle is to be prepared and presented at a later session.

● 24. A Committee to read and to determine what memorials should be read in the meeting and what memorials should be printed in the minutes was chosen as follows:

Marguerite P. Elliott, J. Allen Dunbar, and Vera York.

● 25. The representatives returned the concern from Newberg Quarterly Meeting in regard to extending the time of the Public Relations Board at Yearly Meeting with the recommendation that it be referred to the Executive Committee for their consideration.

This recommendation was approved.

- 34. The names of the ministers from the various meetings were read and these will appear in the Appendix.

- 35. The representatives returned the proposition from the Reformed Presbyterian Church of North America with a statement that it had been endorsed by them. After some further consideration it was decided to send them an unequivocal statement of our belief. As a body we do devoutly recognize the authority and law of Jesus Christ, the eternal Son of God and only Saviour of men. However, we are fully aware that large sections of our citizens do not recognize this. Hence, in the interests of truth we cannot urge that the statement be incorporated in the Preamble of our National Constitution.

- 36. A minute was read for Bertha Kistler, a minister of the gospel, from Oakridge Friends Meeting in Fairmont Quarterly Meeting, Indiana Yearly Meeting.

The meeting is glad to welcome her.

### WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

- 37. Geneva Eichenberger read the report of the nominating committee and the names of the officers will appear in the appendix.

Arvilla Mickelson, the president, read the report of the union, which was approved and appears below:

The blessing of the Lord has been much in evidence in the work of the Missionary Union throughout the past year, and we humbly acknowledge His assistance in all that has been accomplished in our work.

The reports from the Quarterly Meetings show a total membership of 585 women, in 38 Unions reporting. This is a gain of 114 over last year. Eight Unions were either newly set up or reorganized under the Oregon Yearly Meeting Women's Missionary Union. Six Quarterly Meeting rallies were held during the year.

The Foreign Project of last year was adopted again this year. This was the raising of \$1200 for the Preacher-Teacher fund. Thirty-three Unions supported this project and the amount was paid in full.

The Home Project which was adopted two years ago was completed this year. Bed linens, miscellaneous kitchen supplies, rugs, bed quilts and comforts, clothing and food stuff were brought by the various Unions for the auxiliary sale and all proceeds will be turned to Pacific College for refurnishing the college dormitories. The approximate value of these articles is estimated at \$160 (plus). There has been \$326 cash sent in by 9 Unions for this project. In addition our Home Project this year has included the sending of Christmas boxes to all outpost workers, and since there were not enough outposts to go around, there were 8 pastors who



received two boxes. Many special projects were promoted by various groups.

Two thousand, five hundred and seventeen calls were made in the interest of the church by 19 Unions reporting on this phase of the work. This is a gain of 981 calls over last year's report. Dues were paid in full by 27 Unions. Four hundred forty-six individual meetings were held by the 38 Unions reporting; 83 special speakers gave messages to the various missionary groups.

The annual banquet this year, held jointly with the Men's Brotherhood, was served in the Pacific College dining hall. The theme was "China" with appropriate food and decorations for the occasion. Approximately 350 men and women enjoyed the meal, consisting of Chinese food and served in the Chinese manner. Our thanks to Leona White and Violet Brown, who prepared this sumptuous feast.

In closing, may we thank all those who have contributed in any way to the success of our work during the past year.

Marie Haines read an interesting history of the Missionary Union.

To the Brethren in the faith at Oregon Yearly Meeting,  
Newberg, Oregon

Respected Brethren:

We greet you lovingly in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, desiring that the present letter finds you rejoicing in God's richest blessings both in your respective churches as well as in the Yearly Meeting.

We received your kind letter and it was read in our Yearly Meeting held from the 12th to the 17th of April. In these days God gave us great blessings.

This year in our Yearly Meeting, the messages from God's word were given by Captain Garnet Townsend of the Salvation Army, from Cochabamba, Bolivia. He gave us precious and powerful messages under the power and unction of the Holy Spirit. There was not a single service conducted but that there were many who at an altar of prayer sought salvation and sanctification of their souls.

Our schedule began this year with early morning prayer at 6:00 a.m. Then we continued with a class on prayer at eight o'clock, followed by a class on the history of the church, and a class on Holiness. We also had separate classes for the women and men, and finally the Holiness preaching each morning. The afternoon schedule included a class for the learning of new songs, a class on stewardship, and these were followed by the reports of all the churches of our field. Every day a class for the children was conducted at the same period given over to reports. Our work is growing under the blessing of the Lord, and this year the brethren came from all parts of the field; from the mines in the Andes to the islands of Lake Titicaca and the valleys and plains of the Altiplano. Some even came from Peru. We worked hard to care for them, to feed and house them, and at times the church was so full that there was not room for all, and many remained on the outside. We estimate that the attendance was approximately 500.

This is the second year of our organization known as the "Evangelical Society of Bolivian Friends." This is an organization composed of the Bolivian brethren and the missionaries as they work together for the advancement of the evangelization of Bolivia. This organization is still in its infancy, but we see a new impetus in it this year. It is accepting its responsibilities more and more in the governing of the Bolivian church.

We wish to close by calling your attention to Galatians 6:9-11 and I Corinthians 15:58. May God add His blessing!

### BOARD OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

- 44. The president, Kelsey Hinshaw, presided. His request that the report for this department might be completed and printed in the minutes without reading it in the face of the meeting was granted.

The report is printed below:

Some of the highlights summarized from the 43 meetings reporting are as follows:

All but four maintain a library. Eighteen added no books while the rest added a total of 185. Twenty-three meetings listed no books or magazine subscriptions given to their pastors. The rest listed a wide variety and number as given.

Reports indicate that Stewardship, Peace and Public Morals were presented in all pulpits. By literature, in Christian Endeavor and in Sunday School were listed with descending frequency. Some felt that Peace and Stewardship might well receive greater emphasis. Little more than half reported special effort to inform their young people of the Friends stand in these matters and several of them felt more and better work should be done in this respect.

The number of tithers reported was 1344. This is a gain of 347 over last year's report. This gain came from 18 meetings, while 13 were losing and the rest remained the same or failed to report. One indicated that the number of tithers had doubled with a corresponding increase in the spiritual life and activity of the church. Slightly more than half indicate any work in the field of legislation or law enforcement. Three or four meetings were quite active. In this respect, Boise Valley as a Quarterly Meeting and Greenleaf and Newberg as Monthly Meetings were most active.

The yearly meeting has more than one-third as many attending Pacific College as the total of high school and academy students listed. Several meetings listed more in college than in secondary schools. These facts should cause us concern. If reports are any indication, several of our meetings do not have enough young people coming on to insure their future continuance unless there is a much larger percentage of children who are below high school

age. An increasing percentage of the yearly meeting students are attending our own college.

Only two meetings have a fund for helping deserving students. Almost all encourage their young people to attend Pacific College.

The president read several commandments that are a challenge to us all—John 15:10; I John 3:23,24; Matthew 4:23.

Mahlon Macy spoke on Stewardship and asked three pertinent questions: What are we to give? When do we give? and where shall we give?

The president then spoke on Literature and Public Morals.

The topic of Peace was treated very effectively by J. Earl Geil. He said that everyone ought to read, pray and study the subject of peace, then walk closer to Jesus and have His spirit in our lives.

Dean Gregory discussed the subject of the Christian Day School Movement. Children should have a well-rounded education which is God-centered.

The report of this committee was approved.

- 45. The hymn, More Love to Thee, was sung during the inspirational hour. Betty Wood brought a special, Alone with God.

Walter Williams, Jr., spoke on the topic, The Friends of Christ. We are called Friends—may you and I be friends in fact as well as in name.

- 46. After the benediction, the meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 p.m.

### Report of Pacific College Auxiliary and Treasurer's Report (Newberg Chapter)

### Report of President of Pacific College

The school year of 1948-49 has passed into history. My attempt to review the events and lessons of the year will be presented under the following headings: 1—Physical Equipment; 2—Student Enrollment; 3—School Activities; 4—Graduating Class; 5—Faculty; 6—Finances, present and future; and 7—Appreciations.

#### Physical Equipment

As to physical equipment, the progress of the year concerns primarily the improving of existing facilities. During last summer it was necessary to purchase a portable sprinkling system to save the grass on the athletic field, which had been seeded in the spring. This was also used on the lawns. Summer activities also included a limited amount of refinishing and refurnishing of the three dormitories together with other buildings on the campus. This was not sufficient to meet all needs, as there are still inadequate provisions for the comfort and satisfactory work of the students. A list of these needs has been prepared by the local Women's Auxiliary, who will gladly provide any meeting or individual with the same.

Venetian blinds were provided for the Dining Hall and Hoover Hall. Asphalt tile flooring was laid in the Dining Hall and upper hall in Edwards. Floors were refinished in several buildings.

A sidewalk was built on the east side of North River street from Sheridan to the Music and Art Hall.

The major improvements of the year were the finishing of a room in the basement of Hoover Hall for the use of the Student Co-op store and the enlargement and remodelling of the Home Economics room by removal of partition which separate it from the former Co-op Store in Wood-Mar Hall. The Home Economics



Department now has a modern, well-equipped room, which Friends generally are invited to inspect.

Two offices were built over the gymnasium front entrances for Directors of Men's and Women's Physical Education respectively.

An efficient steam boiler was installed by the Kitchen to provide for cooking and dishwashing and for the heating of entire building, including dining room and apartments above the kitchen.

At the opening of the football season materials were secured from which the men under direction of Roy Knight and Isaac Smith built bleachers for use on the athletic field. These are exceptionally well made and finished, and were moved into the gymnasium for the basketball season.

The Men's Athletic Association secured an Electric Scoreboard, which added greatly to the interest in basketball.

The severe winter and spring resulted in unusual difficulties with frozen water pipes and water-logged furnaces. There was also continued difficulty with clogged sewer and storm drain lines. The freezing and thawing did extensive damage to the new paving on the campus as to roads in general. This spring it was necessary to purchase a new power mower to replace the old one, which was worn out.

### Student Enrollment

The records show 158 students enrolled each semester, with sufficient changes between semesters to make net enrollment for the year of 171 compared with 181 a year ago. However, on the basis of the four regular undergraduate classes, the record for this year was 159 compared with 161 a year ago. This shift is due to the lesser number of special or part-time students this year. As grouped according to various classifications, the year's enrollment included: Seniors 33, Sophomores 28, Juniors 43, Freshmen 56, Graduates 5, Special 6; Men 95, Women 76; Off-campus Music students 50.

The church preferences as stated by the students are Friends 126; Methodist 8; Nazarene and Baptist, 5 each; Presbyterian, Minthorne Community, Christian and Lutheran, 3 each; Evangelical United Brethren, Kingwood Bible, Congregational, Free Methodist, and No Preference, 2 each; with 1 each from the Assembly of God, Evangelical, Evangelical Mennonite, Brethren, Seventh Day Adventist and Mohammedan. The areas represented included Alaska, Bolivia, California, Idaho, Kansas, Oregon, Palestine, Pennsylvania and Washington.

### School Activities

The school activities of the year were of a high order. The Religious Emphasis Weeks sponsored by the S. C. U. early in each semester were a source of great blessing to the school. Many students made or renewed covenants with the Lord. Students and faculty alike received fresh spiritual inspiration under the leadership of Gerald Dillon of the Western School of Evangelical Religion during the first semester and Dr. Lowell E. Roberts of Friends University during the second semester.

Student deputation groups were active throughout the year in visitation to churches. Different groups visited Sprague River, one making the trip by plane, others by car.

The athletic teams in football, basketball and baseball experienced both wins and losses as did also the women in basketball and softball. Losing to a better team is as wholesome an experience as winning over a weaker one. To lose to a weaker team or win over a stronger one is also a profitable lesson for students who are interested in sports for sports' sake with a desire to analyze results of a game regardless of who won it.

In Dramatics, the department presented some excellent plays, both comedy and of a religious character. The outstanding presentation of the year was that of "Follow Thou Me," a religious drama given twice in Wood-Mar Hall and once at Greenleaf during the Easter vacation.

In Music, the school had one of its best years. The A Cappella Choir under direction of Roy Clark, and the Oratorio Society Chorus under direction of Lansing Bulgin were both outstanding. The Four Flats continued their successful appearances together with two other men's quartets, The Crusaders and The Done for Four. The Women's Sextet became popular for its renditions.

The quality of the various musical productions as outlined enabled the school to secure sustaining or free time on two Portland radio stations with program entitled "Friendswood Echoes." Records have also been made and are available with numbers by the various musical groups.

In Speech, Priscilla Doble, a freshman, won the State After Dinner Speaking Contest held at Lewis and Clark College. This contest was participated in by representatives from the leading Independent and State College of Oregon.

### Graduating Class

The graduating class of this year was the largest in the history of the school. It consisted of 22 men and 14 women, of whom 29 received the B. A. degree, 5 the B. S. and 2 the Th. B. One student was awarded the Junior Certificate for completion of the lower division or Junior College requirements. Those with names starred have some courses to complete in summer school prior to final reception of degree.

### Faculty

The faculty as constituted for the year served faithfully. Laurence F. Skene, Professor of Chemistry, was granted a leave of absence at midyear in order to aid in the administration of relief for the Arabs under the United Nations. Professor Stanbrough took over the Chemistry classes for the second semester.

New faculty members for the coming year include Barbara J. Sill, Instructor in Music; Mildred Minthorne, Acting Professor of English; Mackey W. Hill, Professor of History; Dr. Paul E. Parker, Professor of Psychology and Education; Beth Hockett, Instructor of Typing and Shorthand; Leona Harmon Lyda, Instructor of Women's Physical Education; and George Kenny, who after completion of work for Doctor's degree at California Institute of Technology, is to serve as Professor of Physics.

Appreciation is due the retiring faculty members for their varied terms of service: to Lansing and Eleanor Bulgin, who have leave of absence for further study; to Russell Lewis, who is retiring after thirty-one years of teaching in the English Department; to George C. Berreman, who has served as Professor of History the past three years and also taught Education and Psychology the past year; and to Loyde Osburn, who has served as Librarian for three years.

### Finances

For the second year in succession, the balance sheet shows a

deficit in operating expenses. This fact is due primarily to two causes with other contributing factors.

Two years ago all salaries were increased materially although all are still below the normal public school level. At the same time, the new building program involved an increased indebtedness on which the General Fund has had to meet interest payments. In addition there have been other improvements made during the year as listed under Physical Equipment.

It is very evident to all who consider the matter that this situation cannot continue indefinitely. More students, a larger number of contributors to the \$25 Club and several contributions of substantial amounts to reduce the indebtedness are absolutely essential to the future balance of the college finances. Beyond this goal lies the path to accreditation and greatly enlarged field of service.

It remains for Oregon Yearly Meeting to determine whether it desires to maintain Pacific College for the intellectual and spiritual training of its young men and women. The College, under the blessing of the Holy Spirit, can be a vital factor in the preparation of young people for the ministry, missionary service, religious education leadership and Christian citizenship in every worthy vocation of life. It can make and mould the Oregon Yearly Meeting of the future if Friends are willing to assume the cost in loyalty, prayer, contributions and moral support.

The Board has indicated and adopted a definite course of action with the goal of \$550,000 by Yearly Meeting of 1955. Of this, one thousand shares in the \$25 Club will provide \$150,000 for operating expenses during the six-year period and should be the first goal to be sought. This would provide income equivalent to 4 per cent net on \$625,000 additional endowment. Beyond that, \$100,000 must be secured to pay indebtedness and \$300,000 will be needed for dormitories and permanent apartments unless Friends are satisfied to maintain the school at its present size, which could scarcely be done after present temporary apartments for veterans are taken down in agreement with the city of Newberg. This looks like an impossible undertaking and will never be realized without prayer, faith and sacrificial giving. With man it may seem impossible but with God nothing is impossible.

Yet even God cannot intercede for us in the matter without human cooperation. If \$550,000 is to be raised in six years, it will be necessary to secure some large gifts. In making any appeal for such one must be prepared to answer satisfactorily the question, "What are the church, community and alumni doing?" Sacrificial giving on the part of all will enlist assistance from a wider circle.

During the past year many Friends who have sent their sons and daughters to Pacific College, have recommended the school to their neighbors and have made substantial contributions toward the expenses of the school. The local and Portland branches of the Women's Auxiliary and the Women's Missionary Union of the Yearly Meeting have contributed largely to the improvement of



college facilities. All of these interests are appreciated together with every other effort made by anyone on behalf of the school, the faculty or the student body.

Last in order recorded but first in importance there is a desire to acknowledge the continued blessings of God. Repeatedly when apparently at the end of our efforts, the Lord has intervened in a remarkable manner to make a way where there seemed to be none. This recurrence alone is abundant proof of the fact that God has a place for Pacific College to occupy for Christ and His church if His people will do our part.

In retrospect, it is easy to note weaknesses and mistakes. The prayers of Friends generally are solicited that in our forward look we may be able to plan intelligently for the elimination of these and for the building of a far stronger and better college in the future.

Appreciation was expressed for the work of President Carey this last year.

### GREENLEAF ACADEMY REPORT

● 54. Arthur Winters, Principal of Greenleaf Academy, read the following report, which was accepted:

A satisfactory school year has just been completed for Greenleaf Friends Academy. The enrollment this past year has been 67



students with the majority belonging to Friends. Students have come from Oregon and Washington. The thirty-ninth class, consisting of ten members, has just graduated from the Academy. This class represents a depth of spiritual quality and several of the members have signified their intentions to continue their education. The baccalaureate service was held in the Greenleaf Church on May 22, 1949, with Dr. Elmore Paulson bringing the address, and on Tuesday evening, May 24, J. Earl Geil, pastor of Nampa Friends Church delivered the commencement address.

During the fall months a student revival was conducted by Reuben Cogswell at which time nearly the entire student body testified to receiving spiritual help. The revival spirit has prevailed throughout the year among the students and we have seen a marked deepening of spiritual life and constant spiritual growth in many of the students. The daily chapel services have been excellent. Several outside speakers, including Hubert Mardock, Denver Headrick, Howard Gardin, beside several missionaries and ministers of other denominations, have contributed to the worth of these services. These messages have helped to stabilize many in the student body.

Aside from regular school work, the Academy carried on a number of extra-curricular activities throughout the year; such as, developing a more efficient athletic program, presenting two dramatic plays, and publishing an annual—the first in the history of the Academy. The A Cappella Choir, under the direction of Alvin Anderson, has given concerts at Greenleaf and elsewhere including singing at the Youth for Christ rally. The students have been more active in deputation work. During the past year this form of service has taken on greater importance as an outside activity. Students have had charge of many church services, and quartets, trios, and other groups have been active in service for the Master. In gospel team work, the students have a definite opportunity to witness for the Lord. In addition to this, several of the students help regularly in Sunday School work in and around Greenleaf.

While waiting to occupy our new building, advances have been made in the various departments and the Academy is being strengthened scholastically and in the addition of new equipment. More than 20 volumes have been added to the library. In the past two years, the commercial department has grown from a very small nucleus to one of the strong departments in the Academy. The addition of six new typewriters last September has helped to make this possible, and Mr. Carroll Crew made ten new individual typing desks for the department. The home economic department is working very efficiently in giving the girls training in cooking, sewing and homemaking. This year an advanced course in home economics was offered to senior girls.

The construction of the new building is progressing steadily. This new \$85,000 building is being constructed in three units—the first or classroom unit we hope to see completed by this fall. The second, or office, library and auditorium unit, will be constructed on the site where the old building now stands. The third unit will comprise the new gymnasium and will be con-

structed at a later date when funds are available. The groundbreaking took place during commencement week a year ago and during the summer and fall the foundation was laid and poured. The solid brick wall was constructed early this spring after the break of cold weather. Carpenters and roofing crew will enclose the building very soon, and if the Lord so leads and directs, classes will be held in the new building in September.

Truly the Lord has blessed Greenleaf Meeting and our people have been faithful in bringing in their tithes and offerings, thus making this new building project possible. Most of the contributions have been received from the local meeting. There is no greater investment possible than that which is invested in lives of Christian youth who constitute the church of tomorrow. Greenleaf Academy is the only Friends academy in the northwest and covets the prayers and interest of Oregon Yearly Meeting. We daily witness the hand of the Lord in this great project and can see the seal of His approval. To see young people not only saved from the evils of our present day, but growing in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, rooted and built up in Him is worth any amount of sacrifice that it may take. Pray for Greenleaf Academy and the work it is trying to do.

● 59. The presiding clerk read the letter that he had written in reply to the letter that Fred Ryan of Spokane had written. It was acceptable to the meeting.

● 60. The returning minutes for Bertha Kistler and Anna Neifert were read and approved.

● 61. Paul Petticord, President of the Western School of Evangelical Religion, told of the work of the school. He spoke highly of the Friends students who had attended the school this past year and said one, Mahlon Macy, was their first graduate. He asked for the prayers of the people for the seminary.

● 62. The Oregon Temperance League was represented by George Smith Brown, who was introduced by Kelsey Hinshaw. He said that Oregon was in the liquor business and the people are spending over \$3,000,000 a month for liquor. He thinks the 300,000 determined "drys" could make the state dry in five years. They need money to carry out the project and are asking every interested person to give liberally.

● 63. Charles Beals, pastor of First Friends Church, Portland, said that they had written into their budget an appropriation for the Oregon Temperance League. The meeting approved of this suggestion and the meetings of Oregon were encouraged to support this organization and that members from Idaho and Washington be encouraged to help similar organizations in their states.

● 64. The representatives presented the nominations for Trustees and for the following Boards: Evangelism, Missions, Christian Education, Service, Public Relations, Finance and Publication; also the persons to serve on the following committees: Auditing, Epistle, Press and Publicity, Entertainment and George Fox College Visiting.

These were approved and will appear in the Appendix.

● 65. The names of the officers of the Friends Brotherhood were read and will appear in the Appendix.

● 66. It was the will of the meeting that travelling minutes be given to Gervas A. and Amy G. Carey as they take their trip to Hawaii this summer and to Helen Willcuts as she goes on a visit to her brother on our Bolivian Mission field.

The Assistant Clerk and the Recording Clerk are asked to prepare these letters.

● 67. The Executive Committee made the following recommendations, which were approved:

The Executive Committee recommends that the Board of Missions and the Board of Evangelism be granted the privilege of taking offerings to supplement the budget for the year 1949-50 and to have the privilege of borrowing up to \$1000 in case of an emergency.

The Executive Committee recommends that Joseph G. Reece be appointed as General Superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting for the year 1949-50. The Committee further recommends that our General Superintendent be paid a salary of \$3000 and travel expense up to \$1300, including auto travel at the rate of five cents per mile.

It was the will of the meeting that the Trustees should investigate the fountain and put it in good condition.

● 70. The presiding clerk expressed his thankfulness for the answer to prayers that had been offered for this Yearly Meeting and for the testimony of the power of the Holy Spirit to unite Christian people. He said trust, confidence and faith do cast out all fear.

● 71. The financial secretary brought up the matter of the ending of the fiscal year. After some discussion it was decided to refer back to the Executive Committee the time of holding Yearly Meeting and the ending of the fiscal year, etc.

● 72. The financial secretary also asked the privilege of completing his report after Yearly Meeting closes for printing in the minutes.

This was allowed.

● 73. There Is a Fountain Filled With Blood was sung at the opening of the inspirational hour.

Walter Williams, Jr., used for his topic, The Message of Christ, John 10:10. He said the message of Christ was an eternal message, a message of peace, a message of salvation and deliverance from



sin. God calls us by the message given by Christ to settle the affairs of our life.

- 74. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 p.m.

Joseph G. Reece read his report as it is printed below:

### REPORT OF GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

Under the evident blessing of God Oregon Yearly Meeting has experienced a good year. Many of our meetings have made real advances in membership, in increased attendance and in community interest. Some of our meetings are struggling hard to maintain the "status quo" in the face of denominational competition and also from the growing forces of evil. A few meetings have suffered losses. Generally speaking, Oregon Yearly Meeting has made greater progress along many lines of endeavor than ever before in her history. Interest and attendance have increased generally. Revivals with good results have been held in most of our churches. One very encouraging feature is to note that in many of our meetings people have been finding God around our church altars in regular services. Our Christian Endeavor is exhibiting new life and zeal. And it seems that our Quarterly Meeting sessions are becoming times of rich blessing as needy hearts pray through to victory. Many of our Women's Missionary Union groups had most helpful and challenging meetings. The Friends' Brotherhood is not too well organized as yet, but where it is functioning, it is of real help to the men. During the year our missionaries in Bolivia faced critical conditions; such as the trouble with the peons and the illness of Jack Willcuts. They were helpless to meet the situation and we were too far away to do much about it. However, Oregon Yearly Meeting went to her knees and prayed, and He who hears prayer answered in a mighty



way and brought deliverance. Yes, our God hath done great and marvelous things for us, whereof we are glad. Praise ye the name of the Lord.

During the year we lost two of our valued and faithful pastors. Cipriano Mamani, a saint of God in Bolivia, went home to glory last September and in the same month our beloved Carey Jessup went to be with the Lord. Oregon Yearly Meeting is richer for the lives they lived in our midst.

Two new church buildings were built, one at Caldwell, Idaho, and the other at Forest Home in Camas, Washington. The Seattle meeting has completed and dedicated a small educational unit which they use as a place for worship until they are able to erect their church building. Holly Park has remodeled the basement of the residence they moved onto their lots, so that they have an attractive place of worship. They dedicated their place last month. Many of our meetings have or are in the act of remodeling or enlarging their church buildings. First Church Vancouver enlarged their auditorium and added class rooms. Highland meeting has remodeled their basement so that they might have more class room. Cherry Grove placed a full basement under their church. Many of our meetings have painted, redecorated and fixed up their church buildings. All this is commendable. Even the Yearly Meeting parsonage was painted inside and out last November.

Two new parsonages were dedicated, namely at Newberg and Rosedale. Cherry Grove is building a parsonage now. In fact it is so nearly finished that the pastor is living in it.

Sherwood meeting purchased a fine new bus; also Rosemere and Cherry Grove purchased good used busses, with which to transport children and adults to Sunday School and other services.

The meeting at Pringle is rejoicing that after holding services for nearly three years in a school house they are now meeting in their own building. We rejoice with them.

Greenleaf Academy is erecting a modern administration building. The heavy financial burden of this falls hard upon the Greenleaf meeting and also upon all the Idaho meetings. Greenleaf Academy has made a worth contribution to Oregon Yearly Meeting, and we trust that Oregon Yearly Meeting will mean much to the Academy.

Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting became a reality last November 6 when the committee you appointed attended to their responsibility at Everett, Washington, and officially welcomed the newly organized Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting into Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Last September the Yearly Meeting bought a large house with six apartments at 1611-1619 S. E. 21st Avenue, Portland 15, Oregon. As soon as the present Yearly Meeting parsonage is sold this new location will become the Yearly Meeting Headquarters.

Your Yearly Meeting office has tried to faithfully administer its work. Very few days passed when we did not have conferences with groups or individuals. Forty-six times we met with various boards and committees. We visited every meeting once during the year and many of them several times. We either sang, preached

or showed pictures as we travelled to the various meetings. We attended every Quarterly Meeting we could. Conflicting dates of Quarterly Meetings made it difficult to attend more than 3 to 4 each quarter. Last year the Boards of Evangelism and Missions took action to include the News Flash in the Northwest Friend on the condition that the Northwest Friend would reach you before the first Sunday of each month. This did not seem to be satisfactory with many so we sent out a few issues of the News Flash. If you feel that the News Flash is still needed we will see that it is maintained.

From December 29 to January 25, while Milo and Helen Ross were undergoing medical treatment, we assisted in the work at Medford. At another time we assisted for two Sundays at First Church Vancouver while Walter Lee was holding a revival at Rose Valley.

A very successful conference of the Ministerial Association was held at South Salem the week following Easter.

At various times we have had the privilege of meeting with our young people who are attending Pacific College. We have a wonderful group of faithful young people who will mean much, not only to Oregon Yearly Meeting but to Quakerdom at large. Several of our pastors and others, who feel called of God to the ministry, are attending the Western School of Evangelical Religion. Mahlon Macy has the honor of being the first graduate of this Institution, receiving his B. D. degree about a month ago. He has been serving as part-time pastor at Forest Home. He now goes to give his full time to this meeting.

Last August a new venture was made in Oregon Yearly Meeting. Our Idaho friends deserve all the credit. For some time they have felt that the Quakers should have a Camp Meeting of their own. We have our summer conferences. We cooperate with others in Camp Meeting efforts, but as a denomination we had nothing of our own. With this burden upon their hearts our Idaho Friends organized and made plans for a Camp Meeting. Many feared for its success. But they prayed much about this, worked hard, and God gave them a great victory. They are now planning for another Camp Meeting to be held at Caldwell in August. Let all of us remember to pray for them.

Our summer conferences at Quaker Hill, Sawalainais, Wauna Mer and Twin Rocks were occasions of great blessing. However, there are two points we need to keep in our minds as we plan our conferences. They are: (1) These conferences are held first and foremost for the spiritual welfare of our youth. If we fail to challenge them to greater faith and zeal in the Gospel and to win the lost to Christ, then we are missing in a measure our objective; (2) The laity need to take a greater responsibility. We are pushing too much of the load of the conferences on our pastors. They need to help and should, but more of our laymen should accept responsibility and help carry the load. Our Boys' and Girls' Camps will never make the contribution they should to our boys and girls and to the Yearly Meeting until more of our laity get under the burden and give active assistance.

We warmly commend the work of Laura Shook as Field Sec-



retary of C. E. and trust that every meeting will give her a hearty welcome.

Again we express our appreciation to the Southern Pacific Railroad for the courtesy of a pass over their lines in Oregon.

It is ever in order to express the appreciation of Oregon Yearly Meeting for the excellent services of our treasurer, Richard C. Kneeland.

Oregon Yearly Meeting has reason to be thankful for the consecrated and sacrificial group of pastors we have. Some of them have used up what savings they had in order to better preach the gospel; they couldn't maintain living standards on the salary they were receiving. Some of our churches could pay their pastors a better salary and before God they are going to be held accountable. Too many of us give when it is convenient. Too many of us watch others and see how much they give before we give our offering. Not enough of us fall on our faces before God and ask Him how much we should keep for ourselves. Not long ago the farm in Bolivia needed some money at once to buy some needed machinery. One man who was living off the income of some of his investments came to the Board of Missions and said that he would be willing to release a third of his investments and the income so that the Board could have some money at once to send for this emergency. He is too old to earn more money. He will just live on less so that God's work down there will not be hindered.

In the office we have many letters from over the northwest asking Oregon Yearly Meeting to come over and help us. They say that they have no Gospel work or no church nearby. These appeals come from Nevada, Montana and in Idaho and Washington. We have an urgent appeal to come and hold services not over 30 miles from here. We leave these appeals with you. The answer rests with Oregon Yearly Meeting.

An earnest word of appreciation should be spoken for the splendid work of our Quarterly Meeting Superintendents. Most of them are busy pastors and still they have given liberally of their time and counsel. We would ask those churches whose pastors are quarterly meeting superintendents to be thoughtful and considerate and that the elders should assist these pastors in a larger way.

In closing, a scripture comes to mind which reads as follows, "One sows and another reaps." We praise God for all that has been accomplished this year, but we must not take credit for it, because down through the years faithful men and women and boys and girls have sowed and today we are reaping. In our minds we can count a most loyal host who sowed well. We are thankful for the harvest of today. Now comes the question, How are we sowing? We know what we are sowing, so in a measure we can know what the harvest will be in the days ahead. Oregon Yearly Meeting has a great field. The possibilities are unlimited. We are not too small for the job. We are not too poor for the job. Our God is not limited except as we limit Him. Oregon Yearly Meeting, let's go out and win this great northwest for God within the next ten years.

This was approved.

Paul Todd brought a concern to the meeting that evangelism be carried on by personal visitation. He said that we need to use offensive methods of bringing a spirit-filled message to those who are unreached. The elders have a great responsibility and all Sunday School officials; in fact, every individual member of the church has a responsibility. Unless they are all faithful many may not be won. The ministry in prayer is often neglected.

Clark Smith spoke of the mechanics of visitation evangelism. He said that the Evangelistic committee will compile the necessary materials and the kits will be sold at cost.

It was announced that Frederick and Melva Baker are going to the Hillsboro outpost and that Clark and Elizabeth Smith have answered a call to go to undertake the challenging field at Spokane.

Oscar Brown asked God's blessing on the undertaking of this new field.

- 78. The meeting adjourned to meet Tuesday, June 14, at 9:30.

## TUESDAY, JUNE 14, 9:30 A. M.

- 79. A number of prayers of thanksgiving for God's blessing on our meeting were offered during the devotional hour.

- 80. The minutes of the preceding day were read and corrected.

- 81. It was the wish of the meeting that a letter of appreciation and sympathy be sent to Edward Mott as he has been unable to attend any of the sessions of the Yearly Meeting.

Irena Cunningham was asked to deliver the letter personally.

- 82. Earl and Esther Turner and their two daughters, Neva and Arlene, from Pueblo, Colorado, Nebraska Yearly Meeting, were introduced to the meeting.

- 83. The following report was received from the Christian Endeavor Association:

Christian Endeavor of Oregon Yearly Meeting has just completed its 56th year of activity.

This year has been marked in many ways by the leading of the Lord. I feel one of our greatest accomplishments was securing of a Field Secretary. After months of prayer the Lord led us to Laura Shook, who had a burden for the work of Christian Endeavor. Since last November, Laura has given full time to the cause of the young people of Oregon Yearly Meeting. The Lord has richly blessed her and the Christian Endeavor is further up the road today because of her faithfulness.

Another marker is that we have discontinued the old chart, using the point system. We felt that in many societies that the winning of the chart was the primary emphasis, rather than growing spiritually for Christ and the Church.

Last summer all four of our Christian Endeavor conferences were held. It is evident that the Lord is using these conferences as a means of salvation for our young people. There were about 850 who registered at these camps. Your President was unable



to attend Wauna Mer Conference, but did attend Twin Rocks, Sawalainais, and Quaker Hill.

One-day mid-winter conferences were held in two places. Whitney society sponsored a conference for Boise and Greenleaf Quarters, and Sherwood was the host church to the conference for Portland, Salem and Newberg Quarters. Southern Oregon held a three-day convention at the Medford church.

There are some needs that should be presented here. First, there should be more emphasis placed upon our Quarterly Meeting Rallies. The Yearly Meeting Executive Committee is trying to solve this problem but we need the cooperation of every Quarterly Meeting Executive Committee and society Presidents.

Second, our summer Christian Endeavor conferences should be used as a means for instruction in Christian Endeavor methods. At the two largest conferences, the Christian Endeavor hour for Sunday evening was not scheduled, neither was it held.

Third, we need to encourage the young people of our societies to a deeper walk with the Lord.

But let us be encouraged, the Christian Endeavor Union of Oregon Yearly Meeting IS going forward with Christ.

The Board of Service wishes to present the following as their projects for the World Service Department for the coming year:

1. Continue the German family plan that has been in operation for the past three years.

We will be assisted in this channel through the contact which August Koch, of Caldwell Meeting, is making for us in Germany at the present time.

2. It is our desire to assist by giving relief to the "Friends Girls' School" of Osaka, Japan. This school is under the direction of Dr. Iwahashi. This contact was originally made by Dr. Alvin Roberts.

3. We desire to cooperate with Ohio Yearly Meeting in giving financial support to the work in China. This work will be carried on through Dr. Walter Williams, Superintendent of

Foreign Missions of Ohio Yearly Meeting.

The Board of Service will furnish your local committees promotional material as rapidly as possible in order that we might carry out this program to the fullest extent.

The Board has endeavored to live up to its responsibility as stated in the Discipline, which clearly outlines its duties:

"The Board of Publication is authorized to publish the yearly meeting periodical, and is responsible for the appointment of its editorial staff and for all editorial and financial responsibilities concerning it. It is further authorized to build and administer a revolving fund and to publish books, pamphlets, and other church and Bible school literature as need may arise and the board may deem wise."

The major project of our board this year has been the establishment of a yearly meeting printing plant in the newly acquired yearly meeting headquarters property at 1619 S. E. 21st Avenue, Portland, Oregon.

The publication of eleven issues of the *Northwest Friend* has been one of the main responsibilities of the group.

The Quaker Bulletin Service continues to meet a definite need among our constituency with 2600 copies sent out to 30 of our churches.

A large contribution has been made in the publication of material for Pacific College such as the college quarterly bulletins and the college annual.

Considerable printing has been done for various departments of our yearly meeting, such as the conferences and camps.

Publication Sunday was observed this year with a fine response over the yearly meeting. In connection with this observance 5,000 copies of the pamphlet, "The Friends Church," were distributed.

We appreciate the untiring work of Ray L. Carter, editor and printer, assisted by Ralph Fletcher.

Our major project for the coming year is an increasing service to every department of our church.

2. Financial report
3. Treasurer's report

5. Any other statistical report which the Yearly Meeting deems advisable to record.

(B) That the number of tithers be included in the financial report.

(C) That the blanks for the reports listed in "A" be distributed to the monthly meetings not later than June 1 and be returned to the proper Yearly Meeting office, as indicated on the blanks, prior to Yearly Meeting.

(D) That each monthly meeting committee write a statement each quarter presenting the progress of the committee and meeting with respect to the goals, aims and objectives presented to it by its representative Yearly Meeting Board. These letters or articles are to be in the hands of the Quarterly Meeting chairman prior to each Quarterly Meeting session. The Quarterly Meeting chairmen will thus be in contact with the work of the Quarterly Meeting and will be enabled to make an interesting and challenging survey of progress in the Quarterly Meeting sessions when opportunity is given. With this information at hand, the Quarterly Meeting chairman is expected to inform the President of his Yearly Meeting Board each quarter of the progress of the work in the Quarterly Meeting. The Presidents of the Yearly Meeting Boards with this information will be enabled to present information and challenging articles from time to time in the columns of the *Northwest Friend*.

The failure to receive these suggested statements of progress may be presupposed to indicate that no progress has been made.

The Executive Committee requests the privilege of presenting next year any amendments to the Discipline necessitated by the change from formal reports.

This was referred back to the Executive Committee:

The Board of Public Relations recommends that a statement to the proper public authorities be sent expressing our opposition to increased appropriations for stock piling of munitions and for arming other nations while cutting down our appropriations for protecting the health of our American Indians. ### Field Mission Council

The Mission Council has regularly convened for one or two days each month for devotional and discussion periods. The departmental secretaries of the mission work, which include the Field Treasurer, Howard Pearson; Educational and Construction Secretary, Roscoe Knight; Agricultural Secretary, Paul Cammack; Evangelistic Secretary, Jack L. Willcuts; and Editor of the SOUL CRY OF THE AYMARAS, Phyllis Cammack, each presented reports and problems at these regular business sessions in an attempt to properly coordinate the separate departments of the mission work. Each missionary has taken his turn in leading the devotional and prayer periods at these monthly meetings and God's blessing has rested upon these times of spiritual renewing of the soul and consideration of field problems. One important result of these hours of fellowship was the setting apart of two days each month, the 1st and the 15th, for private prayer and meditation in which each missionary spends an hour in such exercise.

The value of these spiritual and social times together as a Mission Council cannot be over-emphasized. One highlight of the year was the departure of the Chapman family for their well earned furlough period and the Council is eagerly awaiting their return to the field.

### National Society of Bolivian Friends

The reorganization of the National Society of Bolivian Friends was effected a year ago and has functioned efficiently and smoothly since that date. This organization is envisioned by the Mission Council as a foundation for a national Bolivian Friends Yearly Meeting and specific advance toward this goal is evidenced by the activities of this group. This organization under a joint directorship of missionary and national leadership has assumed definite financial responsibility in field church construction and maintenance thus relieving to some degree the financial burden of the Mission Board. This particular effort has been accomplished through voluntary contributions on the part of national Christians and through a cooperative plan in which the Society farms a small acreage on the mission farm. Another responsibility the Society has assumed is in working with the Mission Council in choosing the personnel and themes for presentation at the regular field Conferences. We thank God for the splendid manner in which the national leadership and the missionaries were able to work together for the upbuilding of the work and salvation of souls in this organization. The new leadership for the coming year is also consecrated and capable and we are trusting the Lord for even greater progress this year.

### Special Activities

During the month of July a pastor-worker institute was held at the Farm Bible School where most of the pastors of the field and a number of workers gathered for special classes and periods of worship directed by the missionaries. These classes were of definite value to each student in attendance and spiritual progress resulted from this special effort. We hope this can become an annual event on the field.

Of interest is the incorporation of the Mission and farm now under the Bolivian Government, which was accomplished this year.

The annual conferences at Amacari, Achachikala and Mina Fabulosa were well attended and souls were saved and believers strengthened.

The mission news periodical, "The Soul Cry of the Aymara" was resumed this year and six issues have been issued bi-monthly.

Our mission cooperated in a united Protestant evangelistic effort conducted in La Paz during the month of January with Rev. Ramon Vasquez of Buenos Aires as evangelist.

Our missionaries have also joined a national Fellowship of Evangelical Bolivian missionaries thus providing us the privilege of personal representation before the Bolivian Government. We should add that during the past year we have enjoyed complete religious freedom in our work, a fact for which we should praise



the Lord in this Catholic country where all missionary endeavor is assumed with apprehension. On three specific occasions we received genuine encouragement from local governmental officials; when buying property in the village of Pucarani where a new church is under construction, in the town of Palca where we opened a new work this year, and on the farm in dealing with the peon difficulties.

### Yearly Meeting, La Paz, 1949

During the regular Easter week services, Captain Garnet Townsend of the Salvation Army mission served as evangelist. His dynamic holiness messages were used of the Lord in the salvation of souls. A fine attendance and full program made this Yearly Meeting one of the outstanding events of the year. Classes were conducted by Phyllis Cammack assisted by other missionaries on the subject of Stewardship. Other classes included a special class for women directed by Julia Pearson and one for men led by Howard Pearson. Tina Knight sponsored the children's meetings. Roscoe Knight acted as platform manager and music director, plus assisting the other missionaries in teaching the classes on Church Doctrine and practices formerly assigned to Jack Willcuts, but which he was unable to direct due to illness. Geraldine Willcuts supervised the entertainment of the missionary family during the week and helped with the classes.

In addition to the worship services, various reports from the field churches were heard and a number of discussion periods with the national leaders were held. A very fine spirit pervaded over the entire Yearly Meeting and each one, national and missionary alike, received much help and left the sessions with a greater determination to spread the Gospel.

### Transportation

The transportation and visitation for our work in the past year continued through the use of the International Mission truck and the generous use of the privately owned vehicles of the various missionary families.

Truly the Lord has prospered our work during the past year. We should like to take this opportunity to thank all who remembered us in prayer, in interest, correspondence and particularly for the helpful and kind counsel of the Mission Board.

### ANNUAL REPORT, EVANGELISTIC SECRETARY 1948 - 1949

"That which we have seen and heard declare we unto you, that ye also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father, and with his Son Jesus Christ. This then is the message which we have heard of him, and declare unto you, that *'God is light, and in him is no darkness at all.'*" I John 1:3,5.

As a preface to the evangelistic report, I should like to acknowledge my inability to accurately acquaint you with the actual spiritual progress and conditions of our field. "Man looketh on the outward appearance" and hence his evaluations of spiritual conditions and situations are often misleading or erroneous. Nevertheless, numerical counting of believers, construction of church edifices, distribution of Bibles and Christian literature and the amount of actual preaching done is an accepted Quaker manner for reporting and no doubt somewhat indicative of spiritual progress among the membership. If the hidden individual spiritual battles could be tallied or a graph portraying the workings of the Holy Spirit in the hearts of our people both through and beyond human instrumentality or if the soul victories of the pastors and other stalwart Christians among us could be forwarded for your study, I am sure a more challenging and correct report would be yours than the one I am sending. Some day these things shall be revealed, praise His Name! and may God grant us grace to work now in view of such eternal reports.

I should also like to add in this connection that the evident truth of the scriptural quotation mentioned, "God is light, and in him is no darkness . . .", has been demonstrated on the field once again during the past year. In trying and difficult situations in various of our churches, situations in which we could neither advise nor see a way through, were miraculously penetrated and cleared through the faithfulness and the "light" of Christ's revelations and darkness has been dispelled. I refer specifically to the difficult situation caused by Francisco Medrano's being expelled from the work last year, and which caused a cloud of uncertainty and confusion to overshadow the field. These difficulties have disappeared. Also, the death of our beloved brother and pastor Cipriano Mamani left the strong work at Amacari in precarious straits, but God in his wisdom apparently had already prepared a man to stand in the gap and we are rejoicing in His choice of Pedro Quispe to pastor that point. Young Pedro Quispe is more than fulfilling our expectations and some of the former problems at Amacari have been cleared. Surely the growth at the newer points of Chunavi and Chirapaca evidence the power of the "light" of God to release men and women from the darkness of superstition, ignorance and sin, where the Spirit has had very little human aid in ministering to these people. Absence of governmental or other serious opposition to our work reflects God's presence and power to us. Other less spectacular events and occasions also reveal the truth of God's promise above mentioned and we take courage at this moment in his abiding care and guidance.

### La Paz Monthly Meeting

The work here has continued according to custom. Five services were held weekly at the church, Sunday morning Sunday School and worship, Sunday afternoon evangelistic meeting; these two being preceded with open air services on the busy street in front using the public address system. A Sunday night youth meeting has been held regularly with an average of 10 in attendance. This



meeting is held in the youth room of the church basement. The Tuesday and Thursday evening prayer meetings were attended with an average of 50 persons. La Paz sponsored four street meetings each Sunday afternoon and two each Saturday afternoon and also sent workers to the city jail and the neighboring churches at Laja, Chirapaca and Chunavi each Sunday. Mariano Baptista served as Clerk of the Monthly Meeting and also as assistant pastor. His faithfulness in home visitation and general helpfulness to me personally was a great aid to the work. The La Paz church Council (Ministry and Oversight Body) felt and acted upon a concern to commence regular services in the village of Balca near La Paz. This was undertaken in February and God has blessed the effort. The Mission assumed partial support of the resident worker in April, but this initial step is indicative of the spiritual concern carried by the La Paz Christians. The average Sunday morning attendance is 185. There have been very few Sundays without an altar service.

The points in the La Paz district including Pucarani, Aigachi, Puerte Perez, Mina Millun, Chunavi, Chirapaca, Laja and Palca, have each been maintained during the year. Pucarani and Aigachi each received regular pastors for the first time during the year. Feliciano Sirpa moved with his family onto the property bought by the mission during the year and now a church building is under construction. Anacleto Lopez, a local Christian at Aigachi, is now preaching regularly in a new room rented on the central plaza of the town. The opposition here is strong and not much evident growth is seen, but Lopez is consecrated and surely God can work here. The Puerte Perez work was under the direction of Octavio Quispe, a promising young Christian, but he is now enrolled in the Bible School and they are without an active worker. Feliciano Sirpa visits the village each Thursday on market day, but even though we own an adequate building there, it has been most difficult to attract the people. Mina Milluni continues under the direction of Gregorio Mendoza, a local Christian, and is about as it was a year ago. Laja has suffered serious setbacks during the year. The attendance has dropped from 25 to 10. Increased persecution may be one reason and the fact we lost our rented chapel for several months may be another. Regular meetings are now resumed under a worker going out from La Paz each week, but interest is not as is desirable. Let us pray especially for Laja this coming year. It is on the road between the farm and La Paz, a potential village and community in which we should have a strong work. This may be one reason the devil is fighting so hard. Chunavi has grown in numbers this year and they now have a better church building. They enjoy comparative freedom of worship even though they are peons on a Catholic farm. Chirapaca, a neighboring Catholic farm, has not been so lenient and the dozen or so believers here worship under threats of persecution.

Work in the Amacari district is growing. Amacari itself suffered some difficult trials during the year due largely to coldness and bitterness on the part of some of the older believers, but a better spirit seems to prevail at present and the attendance is as high or perhaps highest in its history. They send workers regularly to

Isla Anapia in Peru, Yanapata, also in Peru, and to Calata. The congregation of Isla Anapia is anxious to have their own pastor and church and have bought property with that purpose in mind. May God give us pastors to supply these places! Ojje has prospered this year and now have their own pastor. They, with Pucarani, were set up as Preparative Monthly Meetings this year and have proven themselves worthy. They assist Amacari in sending out workers.

The Mina Fabulosa Meetings and Uma Palca continue under the leadership of Rosendo Guachalla with no obvious changes in attendance or interest.

Corocoro has taken on new life under the direction of Martin Garnica. He was named a year ago as pastor and has spent about one-half his time there. The Council had hoped he could live there but his wife was unwilling to accompany him. Nevertheless, he has borne a genuine concern for the work and it has grown from 8 or 9 to about 20 in attendance.

The work in Achachikala has not run smoothly this year although it is difficult to say as yet if any permanent damage has been done. Felix Guanca, the pastor, and an older worker in our mission, to the great disappointment of the mission staff, chose to leave our work and go with the Francisco Medrano group. Before leaving he got the church property in his own name and left the work with considerable hard feeling on the part of the believers and other divisions as to loyalties to the mission. It results in a problem which needs the prayers of us all and will demand patience and wisdom to handle. The Achachikala Conference last August was well attended, however, and a fine spirit was felt.

The Meeting at Copajira has grown and the missionaries there have done much evangelizing in nearby villages and fincas as well as on the farm itself.

During the year Conferences were held at Amacari, Mina Fabulosa, Achachikala and La Paz. These Conferences proved to be times of revival and spiritual fellowship and were directed by the Mission Council and National Society. The Corocoro Conference was postponed until the coming September, as the local brethren could not attend during January as has been customary.

Each point of the field has been visited during the year and we have tried to aid, advise and evangelize when possible during each visit. I served the La Paz church as pastor. It is estimated that 30,000 tracts have been distributed over the field this year.

I wish to use this opportunity to express appreciation to my fellow workers on the Mission staff for their help during the two months I was ill with typhoid fever. They gladly assumed extra work to keep the work going as normal.

God has been good to us during the past year and we praise Him for it. I should like to leave with you a concern which I share with the Mission Council, that of the need of a genuine revival over all our field. The work is advancing, but it might advance much more rapidly. How we need a real spiritual awakening in our churches, a fire which will grow and envelope the entire



altiplano and lake area which is ours to evangelize. A contemporary historian says this about the Quaker Church of today, "Though for years (after the death of George Fox) the Society kept up its active evangelical work, yet, surely and steadily, it began to retire within itself and lose its first love for a dying world, content in keeping itself pure and unworldly." God grant us a vision and a faith to evangelize a dying, a darkened and dissipated world. In this concern I feel to request the prayers of those in Oregon Yearly Meeting who know how to get hold of God. Those prayer-warriors of our church who have the time and leading to plead with God for Bolivia can be of greater influence for the salvation of souls here than the missionaries themselves. May we be filled with the Spirit, guided by the Spirit, and used of the Spirit to win men to Christ. Such a revival could not only stir up these of our own field, but all Bolivia and this continent to the power of salvation.

"God is light, and in him is no darkness at all."

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

Year ending April 30, 1949

"Ask of me, and I shall give thee the heathen for thine inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possession." This challenge of God to us has borne fruit during the past year and faces us with emphasis on the work "ask" for the coming year.

There is abundant evidence of the Lord's blessing upon the work in Bolivia as will be seen in the reports from our missionaries in service there. God has wonderfully cleared away some very difficult situations, such as the peon unrest and the disaffection of Francisco Medrano. Surely He makes the "wrath of man to praise Him."

Ralph and Marie Chapman, during their furlough time this past year, have rendered a great service to God and to us in their deputation work. The plan of week-end missionary institutes in which the Chapmans had three or four services was introduced into many of our meetings. This received enthusiastic approval and was a source of inspiration and wider information concerning our Bolivian work and challenge.

The Chapmans have visited most of the meetings in Oregon Yearly Meeting and plan to visit the remaining few before the anticipated time of departure for Bolivia in September.

Throughout the Yearly Meeting there has been material evidence of the interest of our members and friends in the various phases of the missionary enterprise, and especially in the farm and Bible Training School.

The consecration of the Women's Missionary Union in steadfastly raising \$100 per month for the support of Bolivian national teachers and preachers has been received by the Lord and used

to bring blessing both to those in Bolivia and to us at home.

Here at home, there has been commendable interest and activity along various lines. Missionary emphasis was given in 349 services throughout the Yearly Meeting with special missionary speakers numbering 177.

While the reading of missionary books has increased this year to a reported total of 655, there are many meetings which report no reading. The inspiration from such worth-while reading should be more general throughout the yearly meeting. Many interesting plans for presenting information and challenges were used. The Pacific College Foreign Missions Fellowship presented a short missionary play in several of the meetings.

Some missionary committees reported regular monthly meetings, but only 24 out of 37 committees reporting from our established monthly meetings met at any time during the year. Our missionary responsibility should receive more serious consideration than it is receiving in a number of our meetings.

Incomplete reports indicate that 26 of our young people feel a call to foreign missionary service. Loving interest and prayer for these young people should be a responsibility of each local missionary committee.

Of the membership of the yearly meeting, 34 are or have recently been serving in foreign missionary work in Bolivia, Honduras, the Mexican border, China, India, Africa and Japan. This is not only a cause for rejoicing but a great responsibility for intercessory prayer. One of our members, Christie Ann Bundy, has just sailed for Japan to teach Bible in a girls' school in Japan Yearly Meeting and to do missionary work as opportunity affords. She is being supported primarily by the Kirkland Preparative Meeting. This is definitely a work of faith and is in part an answer to the cry of our hearts for a part in the evangelization of Japan.

While we may well rejoice in the goodness of the Lord, we must face our own failures with humility. The most distressing feature of our situation is not people or problems, but prayerlessness. Only 17 of our meetings reported holding any missionary prayer meetings even once per month. Where are the intercessors?

The Board of Missions proposes the establishment of a missionary prayer band in each of our meetings for the purpose of united intercessory prayer for the work entrusted to Oregon Yearly Meeting. Let us say with Samuel, God forbid that I should sin against Him in ceasing to pray for you.

Paul Cammack, farm secretary, gave by wire recording the following report:

The Copa jira farm ran its course this year with little spectacular to exhibit of either animal or vegetable. However average production was attained and much knowledge was gained on how to better methods. Test seed plantings are under observation and a few new crops may find their place here. We have cut with the power mower what is probably the first grass hay ever to be harvested on this farm.

We are still harvesting potatoes and the barley is yet to be harvested. Excessive rains in growing season and an early frost held production to no more than average. Farming here has many hazards: drouth, or excessive rains, untimely frosts, robbing, worms, and poor soils. We are glad the Lord is in this business with us.

This year there were about 38 acres planted to potatoes; eight of Quinua; 55 of barley; and one-half of habas. We cannot predict the financial gains from this year's crops since harvest is still in progress. It seems probable that we will have more saleable surpluses this year than last. Each year there is a gradual increase in acreages planted, and we trust that next year even greater

gains can be made. Soils need improving. They reveal what hundreds of years of depleting agriculture can do in impoverishing the soil.

The peon flareup and settlement was the major farm crisis of the year. God protected and brought peace ultimately. The peons on the whole seem friendly and cooperative now. We praise the Lord for the great change of attitudes. We pray and trust that this friendliness may soon bring more into the services and to an acceptance of the Lord Jesus as their Saviour.

Twenty-one of the thirty-two peon families eligible for freedom have accepted the freedom plan and are working to complete it. It is possible that in six months the first peon will be freed and given title to his property under the plan.

Seven acres of land was set aside for the use of the Bolivian National Friends Society. This land was plowed and prepared for planting with our farm equipment. The brethren planted and harvested the potatoes raised on the land. The money realized will be used by the Society to promote the spread of the gospel in Bolivia.

Much prayer and thought has gone into buying machinery this year. We face the fact that with freeing the peons we cannot afford to hire hand labor for what machinery can do. We will always have much hand work. We are more convinced of that on testing out a potato digger and finding that such machines will not work satisfactorily here. This year we have bought and used: a combine, chisel, disk, hammer-mill, mower, and grain drill. In addition a shipment was received from friends in the Yearly Meeting containing among other very useful tools and machinery, an electric welder, farm wagon, grain cleaner, stationary engine, and grain sacks. We thank interested friends for the great amount of money and effort that made all this machinery, tools, animal medicines, and other needed articles available.

We have also bought farm animals. We now have seven better than average sows and a fine boar. Twelve rams of good type have been purchased. Again we thank the friends who made animal purchases possible. We had hog-cholera in epidemic form in our area and we lost most of our scrub pigs. We took it as the Lord's method to spur us on to get a new start with better pigs in place of the scrubs. Our animals now total: 38 pigs; 505 sheep; eight head of cattle; one mare with a colt; and one mule (the one Tata Cipriano used).

This year student labor is being used more in the farm work and as the peons are freed students will probably find a greater place in the farm work. Up to the present student labor has been used largely in the building program. A new farm warehouse with a shop in one end has been started and we hope that it can be completed before the rains in October.

While we face many problems, we realize the leading of the Lord and His presence in the Farm-Bible Training School project and feel that His blessing is on it for good.

Roscoe Knight, educational secretary, gave his report of Bible School and Grade Schools by wire recording:



### Bible Training School

Now in its third year of operation, the Bible Training School is becoming an important and recognized factor in our field. We have had an uphill pull and have faced a good deal of opposition in many forms, but God is greater and has been with us in a marked way.

School term last year closed the middle of September with nine students and we hoped that a fairly long vacation would enable most of the students to earn enough to buy the necessities of life and then return to school for the first of the school term this year, the first of February. But for various reasons, the chief one being a lack of consecration on the part of the students, we started with practically a new group. There is a better spirit and we feel that there is a deeper consecration among this year's student body. Enrollment started at eleven but there has been some weeding out as it is felt that a lesser number of consecrated students is better than to have some who are a hindrance to the spiritual advancement of the school.

Our schedule is practically the same as last year's. Chapel is first thing in the morning, followed by five forty-minute periods of Bible teaching. Four hours of work in the afternoon help pay for expenses in general, and two hours of study at night complete the day. Each Sunday, some of the boys make evangelistic trips or help in the services at the farm, as it is felt that practical use of their learning is necessary for their rapid advancement.

Our hearts yearn for the day when the first graduates go out into full-time Christian service. True, the road is hard and many discouragements enter, but thank the Lord, He is able, and we know that His hand is over all.

### Grade Schools

The work that is done among the children of our churches is greatly enriched by the grade schools and their teachers. Only by the schools do other children who are not believers know anything of the Gospel, since the learning of hymns and choruses, Bible reading, learning texts, prayer and other spiritual phases are definite part of the daily curriculum. Thus it is necessary that the teachers be spiritual young men who can guide the children in the right paths. This, however, is one of the big problems as spiritual teachers are at a premium and so we are continuing with fewer schools than we would like to have.

However, we are continuing with schools in different places. Amacari has over sixty students with two teachers. Ojje has around 45 students with but one teacher. La Paz has 40 students with one teacher. At the farm, only 8 students thus far have enrolled, but we feel encouraged because the strong opposition that we faced before is lessening greatly and a confidence in the Christian school is strengthening. However, it will take time to break customs of centuries and change the hearts and minds of these people, but we feel certain that the day will soon come when the farm school will be full of peon children. Achachikala is continuing with 25 students and one teacher. We are thankful for this as it appeared

that we would lose this point due to difficulties with the pastor.

Many times new works are built around the schools and older works are always strengthened by them. They rightfully hold a chief place in our work. Pray much for this very important part of the educational program.

### Annual Report of Construction Secretary

Although it seems that there is always some project under construction in some part of the field, our biggest work the past year has been on the farm with the building of a new missionary home which Cammack now occupy. Completed in less than a year with the cost about \$3000, it is a very modern home and a beautiful structure. The floors are concrete; the walls, adobe; and the roof, corrugated aluminum sheeting. It contains seven rooms and bath, numerous large windows and is finished inside and out with a white plaster, although some rooms are now calsomined in different colors.

Also on the farm during the last year, new adobe walls have been erected by the peons enclosing ground for married students homes and a machine and storage lot. Four two-room houses for married students are under construction with one practically finished. They are 8 by 21 feet in size and will house a medium-sized Indian family.

At present, farm construction is centered on a storage shed and machine shop combined. The building is 30 by 50 feet, contains five rooms for storage of farm produce, a garage for the truck and a work shop for general repairs. A concrete foundation, which extends a yard above ground, has been laid and adobe walls are now rising. This building is much needed as we are still using the church for storage and would like to finish remodeling and use it for services as soon as possible.

Building among the churches is centered at Pucarani. There the brethren are building a new church, 18 by 40 feet, and the walls are now practically finished. The property, which has been purchased by the mission, already had a house in fairly good condition which now serves as the parsonage.

The brethren at Ojje have not completed the floor for the second story of their new church, so are still using the building as both school and church. They have, however, built a small house which is for the use of the school teacher and meets a definite need.

Thank the Lord that the work is growing materially as well as spiritually. We now own a good deal of land, the buildings are rising and the Lord's work is advancing, praise His name.

Roscoe S. Knight

Ralph Chapman expressed a concern for the missionaries on the field and for the native workers, but not so much for them as for the lack of concern on the part of many members in the various meetings that they have visited. We need to be busy about our Master's business and dedicate ourselves to the task of prayer and give as liberally as possible.

Walter Lee made an impassioned appeal for renewed conse-



cration. He asked the important question, Have we lost the sense of that which is vital?

We need to wake up and face the issue.
