MINUTES OF OREGON YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS 1950

● 1. It is with heartfelt thanksgiving and praise to our Heavenly Father that the fifty-eighth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting is permitted to assemble August 17, 1950, at Newberg, Oregon. Our prayer is that all may be done "to the praise of His Glory."

● 2. The overshadowing presence of the Lord was felt as a number led in prayer.

The presiding clerk brought a helpful message from the text: Except the Lord build the house they labor in vain that build it. He said that the work of the Yearly Meeting is in vain except the Lord directs it. In the times in which we are living we are dependent on the glorified Christ and do not need to fear for the future.

- 8. Newberg Quarterly Meeting sent in the following communication:

To Newberg Quarterly Meeting:

Chehalem Center Meeting feels that the present definition of a "Pastoral call" is unsatisfactory. We feel that a definite contact should be made with the individuals or individual being called upon.

The present definition, a statement of November 3, 1938, taken from this year's pastoral report blank, reads thus:

"Any attempt to contact any individual at any time or at any place whether completed or not which is made in the direct interest of the church or the personal Christian experience of the individual is to be counted as a pastoral call. Any calls made upon sick persons are to be counted."

Chehalem Center Meeting prefers and recommends that the definition be amended to read as follows:

"Any contact with any individual or individuals at any time or at any place which is made in the direct interest of the church or of the personal Christian experience of the individual is to be counted as a pastoral call. Any calls made upon sick persons are to be counted."

- 10. The following communications were received from Portland Quarterly Meeting:

Portland Quarterly Meeting forwards the following recommendation to Oregon Yearly Meeting for its consideration:

That the next Yearly Meeting be planned so as to include a time for a Quaker Camp Meeting.

For these reasons:

Many have felt a need of such a spiritual time among Friends; Three Quarterly Meetings have voted to support a Quaker Camp Meeting;

It would seem wise to have a camp meeting either prior to or just following Yearly Meeting time so as to include those who come from more distant parts of the Yearly Meeting;

Other church groups have a camp meeting in connection with their business sessions and have found such a practice most successful;

With the world in such a crisis, we as a Yearly Meeting need to have a time apart from the business of the church to hear the Word, to pray and to have our hearts set aflame.

Since there has been a growing concern on the part of a great many individuals and several Quarterly Meetings that the present name of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends be changed to Northwest Yearly Meeting of Friends or another name representative of territory involved, we thereby recommend that Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting go on record as desiring that the name be changed as stated above, and such recommendation be sent to Yearly Meeting.

- 13. A summary of the state of the church as reported by the Quarterly Meetings appears below:

There is an encouraging report of spiritual growth and a growing interest and attendance in many of the meetings. A number feel the need of reaching out through personal evangelism. Some of the young people have been active in the Labor Camps. Outside prayer meetings have been held and some have received benefits from the Daily Vacation Bible Schools.

The ministry of the pastors has been spirit filled. Revivals and conferences have helped in the development of Christian character.

There seems to be a growing spirit of unity among the members. As a rule members are honest and straightforward in their dealings

with others. Some meetings report a lack of understanding and unity among its members.

Family devotions are held in the majority of homes but some let other interests crowd out this important part of family life.

All meetings attempt to uphold the doctrinal standards of Friends but a number recognize the need for more teaching along this line.

Several members spoke in regard to the various topics mentioned in the reports. Many felt the need of more Bible reading and some thought that more emphasis should be put on maintaining the family altar in all the homes. One mentioned the responsibility of the overseers in making out the reports and their duties in the meeting.

● 14. The inspirational hour began with singing Blessed Assurance. After which Lee Stevens brought a message on the topic: We have an altar. That altar is Christ. We need to offer sacrifice of continuous praise and of doing good to all men on that altar.

● 15. After a word of prayer the meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 o'clock p.m.

● 16. During the devotional period the chorus, Spirit of the Living God, was sung.

● 17. Effie Taylor, daughter of Aaron Bray, was introduced to the meeting. She told of attending the first session of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Frederic and Ethel Carter were presented to the meeting with a minute from Spring Garden Monthly Meeting, North Carolina Yearly Meeting.

● 18. Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting reported that the meeting at Ridgeview had been laid down and the members transferred to Homedale Monthly Meeting, and that a monthly meeting had been established at Caldwell.

It was also reported that the name of Camas Monthly Meeting had been changed to Oak Park Friends Church.

Board of Service

● 19. Paul Mills, president of the Board, presided. He gave a brief report of the work of the past year and presented the various projects for the next year and they appear below:

During the past 15 months several of our meetings have ministered to individuals and families in their communities who were faced with sickness or tragedy.

The interest in those who are suffering beyond the seas is mani-

fested in help sent via Care packages, clothing sent through various agencies, food gifts, clothing sent to Christie Bundy in Japan and cash gifts.

There are many doors of service beckoning us to enter. The last report from Ohio Yearly Meeting Missionary Board indicates that some of their staff are still in China and distributing much needed relief as it comes to them.

There is an opening in Germany for a couple to distribute relief and preach the gospel. There are well qualified young people with a concern to go. There are some Friends outside of Oregon Yearly Meeting who have expressed interest in helping in this work. The estimated budget would be about \$3,000 for the first year. This includes transportation and might be reduced after the first year. The board is still exploring the possibilities of this project but does not feel that the time has come to recommend any action by the Yearly Meeting.

The board has just received information regarding the possibility of sending powdered milk and eggs to Bolivia and/or Japan to be distributed by our missionaries. The need for these articles is great. If a workable plan can be made the information will be sent to the local meetings.

We recommend for immediate action the gathering of clothing for relief in Bolivia and Japan.

In Bolivia there is a great need for baby clothes. Men and boys there wear the same type of clothing that men and boys wear here. There is real need for these. Women's sweaters are acceptable. Due to difference in styles, other clothing for women and girls older than 3 or 4 years is of little service. Parcel post packages may be sent to the missionaries. Get information from your local post office. If you can declare the parcel of no commercial value, it will save customs. The board is investigating possibilities of cheaper shipment. Information will be sent out as obtained.

Christie Ann Bundy reports that the relief clothing sent to her has been a very definite help in reaching the hearts of the Japanese people for Christ. She has witnessed a great revival and we should help as best we can with relief goods. We can no longer use her A.P.O. address. Her Japanese Post Office address is in the Yearly Meeting minutes and clothing sent by foreign mail has reached her in good condition. Ask for rates for relief gift parcels. Clothing worn by children, men or women here is acceptable there. All goods should be clean and patched ready for use. Shoes are welcome. Mats for sitting on the floor are needed.

Parcels for foreign shipment should be extremely well wrapped and tied with address both inside and outside.

The situation in the Orient changes from week to week. Watch the Northwest Friend for new details concerning needs and methods of shipment.

Emmett Gulley also gave a brief report of the work done by individual members of the meeting. He said 15,000 pounds of clothing had been sent to various centers; that 150 peace addresses

had been given; that he and Laurance Skene had served in Palestine under the United Nations for 230,000 Arab refugees and in their work had travelled 70,000 miles.

He is now serving in British Columbia at the invitation of the Canadian government to help in the control of the Doukhobors who have been causing so much trouble there.

National Association of Evangelicals

● 20. Joseph Reece, who with his wife, Pearl Reece, attended the convention at Indianapolis, gave an excellent report of the extensive work being done by N.A.E. in so many different lines—radio broadcasting, research, conventions of Sunday Schools, aid given to Foreign Mission Boards, youth work, educational work, etc.

● 21. The following communication was received from the representative body in regard to a recommendation from Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting:

We recommend that action on the communication from Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting concerning changing the name of the Yearly Meeting be withheld at this time, with the recommendation that during the coming year investigation of the legal aspects of the matter be made by the trustees of the Yearly Meeting, with a report to be made to the Quarterly Meetings within six months if possible and to the Yearly Meeting at its next session.

This was accepted with the addition of the words: and to the Yearly Meeting at its next session.

● 22. Charles Beals asked to be released from the Press Committee because of his duties as chairman of the representatives.

His request was granted and no new names were added to the committee.

● 23. The meeting adjourned after a word of prayer to meet Friday, 9:30 a.m.

● 24. After a period of devotion the minutes were read and corrected.

● 25. The Epistle committee reported that two of their members were absent and asked that two new members be added.

Lela Gulley and Herbert York were named by the meeting.

● 26. An announcement was made that Esther E. Baird, a missionary to India under Ohio Yearly Meeting had passed to her reward. Carrie Wood lived and worked with her for thirty years in Nowgong, Bundelkhand, India. Her funeral was to be Friday, August 18.

● 27. The representatives have considered the communication from Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting regarding the change in the

closing of the fiscal year to June 30th and recommend that it be approved.

The meeting favored the action of the representatives with the addition of these words: including the appointment of Monthly Meeting and Quarterly Meeting officers after the words—fiscal year.

● 28. Report of the committee to write to Aged Friends:

We, your committee appointed to write to Aged Friends, wish to report that forty letters were written and in some cases personal calls were made.

The portion of the road for which vacation is asked abuts the property owned by Oregon Yearly Meeting upon which Holly Park Church is located.

Arvilla Mickelson, the President, read the ninth annual report of the Women's Missionary Union and it appears below:

The Women's Missionary Union is closing its ninth year of organized effort. We praise the Lord for the growth and for the ever increasing interest that has been shown from year to year. As we read the reports from the Bolivian Mission field and note the increased missionary activity which has been made possible by the work and contributions of our organization, we feel that the sacrifices made have been well worth while. We praise God that, "The (Aymara) people that walked in darkness have seen a great light: they that dwell in the land of the shadow of death, upon them hath the light shined."

Thirty-six missionary unions have sent in reports with a total of 595 members, and an average attendance of 12. A few new unions have been organized during the year and at least two groups have re-organized with renewed interest in missionary work.

Unions have contributed generously to the work this year. Thirty-three unions have paid their dues. They have also paid their full share of the Preacher-Teacher fund. This has enabled the treasurer to pay in full the \$100.00 pledged per month for this purpose. Approximately \$2,600.00 has been donated in labor and materials by our organization, for churches and parsonages over the Yearly Meeting.

Eight Quarterly Meeting missionary rallies have been held during the year, with much interest shown by the local unions. Seventy-six special speakers addressed the various groups during the year.

Verda Craven, Literature chairman, reports a real interest in our traveling library of missionary books.

2,863 calls made in the interest of the church by 19 unions reporting. This is a gain of 346 calls over last year's report. Many unions report flowers, cards, and gifts taken to the shut-ins of their community.

The president travelled approximately 2,500 miles in the interest of the work speaking at four of the Quarterly Meeting rallies. 400

letters and cards have been written and sent out from the office of the president.

The annual banquet this year was served in George Fox College dining hall. The theme was "Bolivian School Days," with appropriate food and decorations for the occasion. Approximately 200 women enjoyed the food and fellowship. A heart felt thanks to all who contributed in any way to make this evening a success. A total of \$351.15 has been given by the women for the Rest Home in the lowlands of Bolivia. This is a definite need for our missionaries.

It has been a real pleasure to work with the consecrated women who have made up the executive committee the past three years. Without the active cooperation of each member the success which we have enjoyed and the work that we have been able to accomplish could not possibly have been realized. My very best wishes and prayers go out to the new president and her executive committee. May God richly bless and lead in the work for the coming year.

REPORT OF PRESIDENT OF GEORGE FOX COLLEGE

* * *

Pacific College Becomes George Fox College

The school year of 1949-50 will be recorded as the one during which final action was completed to change the name from Pacific College to George Fox College. The increasing confusion of the school with Pacific University at Forest Grove or other of the numerous schools on the West Coast using the word "Pacific" in their names was such that a change of name seemed imperative. Naturally, there was much sentiment attached to the name Pacific College by the alumni, old students, faculty members and other friends of the school. However, two remarkable facts should be noted. In the first place there was an almost unanimous willingness to set aside all such sentiment in the interests of the future identification and usefulness of the school. Then secondly, the selection of the new name was made with an equal or even greater unanimity. As viewed in retrospect, the attitude of its constituency as expressed during this period of agitation and change impresses one with the divine ordering of the change and is a source of encouragement as to the future of the college.

Local Physical Improvements

Few major physical improvements on the campus were needed during the year. It was necessary to modernize the electrical supply and distribution system in Wood-Mar Hall. Numerous minor improvements were made. For the second successive year a severe winter was experienced with its many inconveniences. Some of the heating equipment was inadequate, plumbing was difficult to maintain in order while fuel and electric bill were larger than normal. Near the close of the year the boiler in the gymnasium gave out and was judged not worth repairs.

The Student Body

According to the records of the Registrar there were 162 students enrolled during the year as compared with 171 during 1948-49. Of the 162 students this year, 92 were men and 70 women. Of the men 39 were married, of the women 12. By scholastic classification, there were 51 Freshmen, 38 Sophomores, 25 Juniors, 26 Seniors, 19 Specials, and 3 Post-Graduates. There were also 52 off-campus music students.

The School Year

In retrospect the year will be reviewed with many satisfactions for scholastic attainments, religious activities, social life and athletic achievements.

The Religious Emphasis Week each Semester brought students and faculty alike face to face with the call of the Holy Spirit to Christian life and service. J. G. Bringdale conducted the services in the first semester and Charles Beals in the second. Each man made a major contribution to the spiritual life and interest of the school.

Student deputation groups were active throughout the year. A wide range of service was rendered as the gospel story was told by quartets, sextets, trios, solos, instruments, art and preaching.

The Student Christian Union maintained its weekly devotional services. The Foreign Mission Fellowship and Student Ministerial Association were active throughout the year.

The musical activities of the choir and numerous lesser groups were widely appreciated. The choir travelled extensively with trips to Idaho, Washington and southern California. Their programs were marked by a wide range of talent used in feature numbers.

The outstanding dramatic presentation was the musical drama, "Esther." This was given to appreciative audiences on two successive evenings.

In athletics, our teams demonstrated the possibilities of a small school as they won four out of eight games in football and five out of eight in the Metropolitan Basketball Conference. Outside of the Conference they won two games out of ten, evidently playing teams out of their class. The baseball team closed its season with three wins and three defeats.

Faculty

I wish to express my personal appreciation for the loyalty and cooperative spirit shown by the faculty and staff during the year. Special mention should be made of the long service of Perry D. Macy whose retirement last summer marked the close of 28 years of teaching in the college. Robert Jordan of East Whittier was secured to fill the vacancy. Also recognition is due Laurence F. Skene whose resignation this spring ended 15 years of service in the Chemistry Department, Roy Clark for his 6 years work in the Music Department, Amos C. Stanbrough for his two and a half years in the Physics Department, Oral Tish for two years in Religious Education, Charles Haworth for two years in Spanish, Barbara Sill for a year's service in the Music Department and Mildred Minthorne for her year in English.

As Dean during the past year Dr. Parker rendered valuable service. As President he will prove to be a capable leader and I recommend him as deserving the unqualified support of the Board, Yearly Meeting and general constituency of the college.

I have asked President Parker to supplement this report with a statement relative to new members of the faculty for the coming year.

Finances

The financial situation has continued to be the major problem and concern of the administration. The income from tuitions was reduced out of proportion to the loss of but nine students in statistics of the year 1949-50 as compared with 1948-49. The 1949-50 year's enrollment included a larger number of part-time students with several more who attended but one semester. By report of Auditors the actual decline in tuitions from previous year was \$4,905.26. The over-all faculty salary payments had been increased \$3,281.64. The annual audit covering thirteen months May 31, 1949 to June 30, 1950 showed a net deficit in operating expenses for stated thirteen months of \$20,138.50. The audit was delayed the extra month as made possible by later date of Yearly Meeting to include all of June, the closing month of the school year.

Perhaps it is needless to state that the financial situation which I have been forced to pass on to my successor remains my outstanding regret in regard to my administration. May I urge upon the Board and the Yearly Meeting the necessity of continued prayer and enlarged support. I recognize that many Friends have made real sacrifices on behalf of the school. It will be necessary for this to continue as well as for many who may be able to enlarge greatly their contributions if the school is to become established on any stable basis. The future of George Fox College remains in the hands and determination of its friends. More students as well as more and larger gifts are absolutely necessary.

In closing may I express my personal appreciation of the prayerful interest and continued support of Friends during the three years of my administration. These have lightened the load and given encouragement along the way. May the blessings of God rest upon George Fox College and upon its constituency in an ever increasing measure is my prayer.

REPORT OF PAUL E. PARKER, PRESIDENT

Although fewer in number than during the 1949-1950 school years, the faculty of George Fox College has been strengthened. Professors Donald McNichols, and George Kenny, respectively of the English and Physics Departments were contracted to the faculty of George Fox College more than a year ago and will begin their teaching duties here this fall. Dean of the College, Donald McNichols was formerly the Dean of Los Angeles Pacific College. For the Education and Psychology Department, succeeding Paul Parker, Professor Paul McNeely has been secured. As director of the A Cappella Choir and as teacher of Voice, Marvin Baker of Marion, Indiana is coming. Nine faculty members of last year are not returning to G.F.C.

There are seven members of the faculty who have doctor's degrees or have completed sufficient hours for the doctor's major in their respective fields. Above all this excellent preparation, for

which we are thankful, there is a growing and expressed interest among the faculty that our Evangelical message be lived sacrificially, and boldly proclaimed to a needy world.

We have been unofficially advised by members of the Northwest Accrediting Association that our financial situation remains between us and acceptance into membership by their Association.

GREENLEAF ACADEMY REPORT

● 56. The past school year finished forty-one years for Greenleaf Academy with 67 students enrolled for the 1949-50 school term. Progress has been made along several lines. The furnace has been installed in the new building, cement floors poured, plumbing partially done, partitions up and ready for the plastering, windows in, and it is hoped that the building will soon be ready for occupancy. Contributions for this new project still come almost entirely from the local meeting with about \$20,000 being given up to the present time. An additional \$20,000 will be needed between now and the first of the year.

Commencement exercises were held on May 23 with Dr. Haman of Caldwell bringing the address. The baccalaureate sermon was preached by Rev. Arnold Finkbeiner of Nampa on May 21 to a class of 16 graduates, most of whom are planning to continue their education in college.

The entire student body was inspired and deepened in spiritual life by the student revival held last fall by "Daddy" Graves, who won the students' hearts by his wit and good humor, then challenged each student to a closer walk with God. Daily chapel services during the year contribute further to the students' spiritual growth as outside speakers, including pastors of various churches, mis-

sionaries, youth workers, and evangelists, speak to the student body at different times during the year.

Outside activities continued to add interest to the student life. These activities included deputation work of various kinds. Perhaps the most outstanding and regular was the weekly jail service held in Caldwell with the pastor, John Baxter, in charge and many of the students contributing their services in song and testimony. Under the leadership of the pastor, the students have held street meetings in Caldwell, and also supported the Youth for Christ meetings by their attendance and help in special music. Students have also helped in outpost Sunday Schools and in various churches in neighboring communities. The girls' trio, composed of three academy students, has been very active in singing for numerous occasions.

The athletic program was outstandingly successful during the past year, with the teams not only coming through with a high percentage of wins, but also establishing an enviable reputation for good sportsmanship among all the other competitive schools. The athletic department was strengthened by the addition of equipment, and a strong, wholesome athletic program is anticipated for the coming year.

Other departments have also been strengthened—new books have been added to the library, two new typewriters have been purchased for the commercial department and a new mimeograph has been added. In the science department, a micro-projector and some slides for biology were a new addition.

The A Cappella choir, under the leadership of Miss Heacock, gave several concert numbers.

We solicit the prayers of Oregon Yearly Meeting and all interested friends in the progress of Greenleaf Academy and the work it is trying to do. There is no greater investment possible than that which is invested in lives of Christian youth who constitute the church of tomorrow. Greenleaf Academy is the only Friends academy in the Northwest and to see young people not only saved from the evils of our present day, but growing in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, rooted and built up in Him is worth any amount of sacrifice that it may take. Pray for Greenleaf Academy and the work it is trying to do.

By selling them through an account of the Treasurer rather than through the bank, we can save a considerable brokerage fee.

Beloved Brethren in the Faith:—

After greeting you in the love of our loved Savior, we wish to tell you that the letter we received from you has been a great blessing to us, and also the blessings which our loved Jesus always gives his followers through faith.

Our Yearly Meeting held from the 4th to the 9th of April has just ended. They have been marvelous days because of the presence of the Holy Spirit in the fulness of his love. Thanks to His chosen servant who brought us the spiritual food, a Major of the Salvation Army, John Claussen. During the meetings many came to the altar and sought salvation and some sanctification. Those attending came from 15 churches in the country. We have also had special classes prepared by the "spiritual ambassadors" from the north, of our Savior Jesus for both sexes and for the children. There were also special choruses and with band instruments so that it all has been a great joy in praises to our God. Also the students of the Bible School at Copajira, under the direction of Howard Pearson and his wife, and Ralph Chapman and his wife. Our Church in La Paz is under the leadership of the servant of God, Jack Willcuts.

We thank God for the great blessings received this year. There are two new Churches in the city, and all of these Churches are convenient places for the sinners to seek the loving Savior. It is also our desire that you may work in the vineyard of our loved Lord and Savior.

The attendance at the Yearly Meeting has considerably exceeded 600 souls and our place has been in these days like an upper room. We all received that which God had prepared for each one. Thanks to God for all this and for the Christians and leaders who have come as laborers to love us and also others, and to give us that which they have received through grace.

Also the officers of the Society of Evangelical Bolivian Friends have been chosen as the Lord permits with three Nationals and two of the missionaries. We hope that this year it may function in order to find those most lost.

Now we greet you with the 134th Psalm. May God bless you and us yet more and more that we may be in the very same Spirit by Faith. May the blessing of God be poured out on each one.

There are almost forty epistles, about half of them from foreign countries, and the rest from the United States. It, no doubt would be interesting, and probably profitable to read them all in full, but we know that would take too much time. However in no other way can we get the feeling of them, and the realization that

they come from almost all over the earth. They come from our own highly civilized land, as we feel, from other foreign lands just as highly civilized as ours, but of other languages, and at least one from a land that a generation ago was in heathen darkness, but which today has the largest Yearly Meeting of Friends in the world. It is thrilling to feel that the message and ideals of George Fox and the early Friends, have, in some measure at least, spread into so many corners of the earth. This report is submitted with the prayer that we all may find something of help and inspiration in it. Let us look for the good, and no doubt we can see it.

It was the wish of the meeting that the whole consideration of the epistles should be referred to the Executive Committee for further consideration.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

- 80. Oscar Brown presided in the place of Ray Carter who was ill.

After the song, "A Charge to Keep I Have" was sung. Edgar P. Sims offered a prayer for the work of evangelism at home and abroad.

The totals of the pastoral report were read and the complete report will appear in the Appendix.

The Evangelistic Board report was read and appears below:

Concerning the duties of the Board of Evangelism, the discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting says, in part: "Special attention shall be given to the discovery of needy fields, within or contiguous to the Yearly Meeting; and effort shall be made to meet the requirements of these by such gospel service as may, under the divine blessing, bring sinners to repentance and faith in Christ, strengthen believers, and advance the interests of God's kingdom. Special effort shall be put forth to gather the scattered membership and to establish new work wherever practicable."

This board, then, according to the outline of duties, is a home-missions board, entrusted with the same task that is committed to the Board of Foreign Missions, except that our field is among our English-speaking neighbors here at home.

This home field may be regarded as our Jerusalem. Jesus said in his great commission to the church that we are to witness in Jerusalem first. "Ye shall be witnesses unto me," said he, "both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." This is the divine order and program, and by no self-inspired logic or argument can we excuse ourselves from the responsibility of evangelizing new fields and enter-

ing new wide-open doors of service here in the home-land. Because we have failed at this point too long and too much, great areas of our home field are becoming non-Christian and almost totally pagan.

Dr. Paul Calvin Payne, chairman of the International Council of Religious Education, said only last week in his address to the quadrennial convention of the International council: "In 1927 there were 17,000,000 children and young people in America who were receiving no religious instruction of any kind. In 1947 there were 27,000,000. At this rate, the total paganization of American life is merely a problem in arithmetic."

Not only is our earnest attention to this work at home made imperative because of Christ's command, but the demands of an expanding foreign work call for a stronger and bigger work at home. It is possible for a foreign work to reach the saturation point, as far as support from the home church is concerned, unless the home church grows year by year, very definitely, in numerical strength and spiritual power. Without this, the work on the foreign field will lag. Unless we grow at home we will become atrophied, and eventually die; and the foreign work will suffer with us. The two must grow together. It is Christ's command, and our sanctified common sense tells us it is so.

But too often we are guilty of failure to maintain a proper balance between the two. When the matter of raising money to help outposts has been discussed with my fellow ministers, we have been told by some that it was easier to raise \$10.00 for foreign missions than it was to raise \$1.00 for an outpost here at home. That is not true of all meetings, but it is asserted to be true of some. This is a spiritual tragedy! It is not the loss of the money alone that hurts so much (as badly as that is needed), but this failure to give indicates a lagging of interest in our God-given task of spreading the gospel here at home.

We need not only spiritual power (we need that of course above everything else), but we need increased man-power as well. Where shall we look for this increased man-power? A study of the statistical reports each year will reveal that our older meetings are not adding much numerical strength to our Yearly Meeting. Many of our older meetings registered a loss last year. In one of our quarterly meetings more than half of the local meetings (all of them old established churches) suffered a loss in membership. It is the new meetings and the outposts that are bringing in new life blood and numerical strength to our Yearly Meeting. Last year the Whitney church in Boise, one of our new meetings, increased its membership by 41, and Talent, a new church in southern Oregon, increased its membership by 38. Less than ten years ago these meetings were mere outposts, and you were asked to help them financially in getting their work started.

At present we are undertaking a work for God in Spokane under the leadership of Clark Smith; in Hillsboro, under the leadership of Frederick Baker; and in Holly Park in Seattle, under the leadership of Ernest Fritschle. Some day, under God, we will have strong Friends meetings in all these points. In fact, Holly

Park has already, in the short space of eighteen months, made a phenomenal growth, and is bringing in children, young people and parents.

That is the way Oregon Yearly Meeting is going to grow. We dare not call a halt to our expansion.

We need wisdom, of course, and direction from God. We must not rely on human wisdom in matters of such great moment. Therefore, the members of the Board of Evangelism earnestly requests that you enter with them into a burden of prayer for this important work on our home field. Let us give it our earnest attention and interest. And when special calls are made for financial aid, you may be assured that these are issued only after much prayer, and a conviction by the board that the project is worthy of your hearty support.

Let us all get behind the program of expansion in Oregon Yearly Meeting, and extend our borders. We believe there are great things ahead if we have the vision to see it, and the courage to follow the leadership of the great Head of the Church.

Ernest Fritschle told of the work at Holly Park in Seattle. He said 5000 unchurched people in that area presented a challenge. He told of some who had been saved and are now witnessing for Christ.

Frederick Baker asked the prayers of the people that they might give no offense and that they may accomplish in Hillsboro much in the short time that is left.

Clark Smith said that there was need for him and his wife to live in Spokane and that they plan an intensive campaign in the Hayden Lake territory within the next three months.

Evert Tuning said the conditions in Sprague River were hard but he had won the victory in his own heart and that the Christians there have victory but great tribulation.

All four speakers asked the members of the Yearly Meeting to pray, pray for work in these various centers.

Edward Harmon spoke on Visitation Evangelism.

Dorothy Corlett told how successful Visitation Evangelism had been in their church at Second Friends and urged all churches to try it.

Herald Mickelson said that it worked in his church and that he had learned much from the experiment in Piedmont Church.

There is a need of a Foundation to carry on the work of the Evangelistic Board. They plan to call it Friends Church Extension Foundation and every one who gives one hundred dollars will be a member of the Foundation. Financial and prayer backing is needed.

Joseph Reece read his annual report which appears below:

REPORT OF GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

"Have mind of Him wherever you may go, and He will clear the road for you." Prov. 3:6 (Moffatt).

This is a day for action. Students of God's Word feel that the coming of our Lord is near. There seems to be an indefinable spirit of expectancy in the hearts of God's people. We do not know how much longer we will have the privilege to serve. As Wm. Culbertson says in the Moody Monthly Magazine, "But we plead that we get through with this business of playing with the things of God. If you have money to give, give it speedily. If you have work to do, do it at once." It is time to make all we do count for God. Indeed this is a day for action. Let us work this coming year as if it were the last year we had left us. Are you prayed up? Have you unsaved friends, Sunday School scholars, neighbors and loved ones? Have you given all you should? This is our day. May we give ourselves without reserve to the work of the kingdom.

The past year has been a good year in many ways. We closed the year with a cash balance of \$7,244.13. Of this sum \$6,500.00 is in the Missionary Budget. Two or three times during the year money was a bit slow in coming in, but when notices went out telling about the state of the treasury, you responded quickly. Thank God for your faithfulness.

It was on May 15, 1949 that Holly Park dedicated her beautiful little chapel. Within a year's time the chapel has been filled to the full and now they are wondering just what to do with their overflowing Sunday School.

Forest Home has been worshipping in their new meeting house for a year or more. It is not completed, but as fast as the funds come in they make improvements. They also completed some extensive repairs on the parsonage and garage and painted inside and out.

First church in Vancouver completely remodeled their building and now have a church edifice which is not only attractive but is well designed to care for a growing membership. They held a dedication service last August 28th.

The meeting at Cherry Grove, though still a preparative meeting, has completed their basement, installed a furnace and redecorated the auditorium. They have almost completed their parsonage and have their own water pressure system.

Second Friends in Portland remodeled their basement so that they now have an attractive place for church gatherings and class rooms.

The church at Boise has made a number of improvements. Heading the list is the installation of beautiful new pews.

Highland meeting has almost finished remodeling their basement. The heating system has been improved, a number of class

rooms have been added and plans are now being considered to redecorate.

The meeting at Star has remodeled their front entrance and exchanged their benches for attractive pews. They plan a dedication service next month.

Seattle Monthly Meeting has finished the outside of their building. As fast as funds permit they are working on the interior. At the moment they are remodeling the small building which they have been using for a meeting house, into a parsonage.

The meeting at Whitney has grown until they were compelled to consider a building program. As a result they bought an adjoining property and have started the erection of a structure fitted for their needs.

Caldwell, one of our youngest monthly meetings, has started the erection of a parsonage. The need was so great for class rooms that they have temporarily roofed the basement and are using it for needed Sunday School class rooms.

At Hillsboro there has been added a utility room and double garage to their very small parsonage.

N.E. Tacoma out-grew their small church building and are now building a much needed basement which will double their capacity to serve.

The Rosemere meeting enhanced their property by painting the church and reshingling and painting the parsonage.

First Church in Portland is building a Sunday School annex.

Oregon Yearly Meeting now has a headquarters at 1615 S.E. 21st Avenue in Portland. You are invited at any time to visit your property.

Time and space prevents enumerating all the improvements of property by our several meetings. Special mention should be made of two of our Sunday Schools. In a Sunday School Membership drive put on by the Boise Evangelical Fellowship, Whitney won first place in its class by an increase of 77½% in attendance and Boise also placed high on the list.

The Monthly Meeting at Ridgeview in order to conserve leadership and build a stronger Quaker meeting in that section combined with the meeting at Homedale. May God bless such a move when people are willing to submerge their own desires for the benefit of a larger group.

Caldwell became a fullfledged monthly meeting with 51 charter members.

We expect the Women's Missionary Union to do great things, but they surprised us by doing even better. They have presented a very challenging program for this year. May God bless them.

Our Brotherhood is showing new interest. We feel that the project at Spokane will take on new life as the men of the Yearly Meeting rally behind the leadership of Clark Smith and press the battle for God and righteousness in this great Inland Empire.

The third Idaho Camp Meeting was held three weeks ago. It was a great camp and means much to the Quakers in Idaho. The

annual meeting of the Ministerial Association was held last fall at Quaker Hill. It was a time of great blessing to all the pastors who could attend.

From a missionary standpoint Oregon Yearly Meeting is enjoying a special treat. Our missionary program has now reached the point where we have a missionary family at home each year on furlough. Last year we had Ralph and Marie Chapman and this year we have had Roscoe and Tina Knight in our meetings and in our homes. In a few weeks the Knights will be leaving for the field and soon we will be welcoming home Howard and Julia Pearson.

Last summer Christie Ann Bundy, who had been pastor of Kirkland for some time, felt called of God to go to Japan. Plans were completed and the money came in and she has been laboring for God in that most needy field. She has endured long and heavy trials and testing, but God has given her great victory and through her has won hundreds of Japanese to Christ.

Laura Shook, field secretary of Christian Endeavor, has faithfully worked with our youth. We commend her to each meeting. Her presence and message will be a blessing to your meeting.

● 87. The following communciation from Richard C. Kneeland was read:

As I complete my report for this my 16th year as Treasurer of Oregon Yearly Meeting, I feel that I must ask that this be the last and that for the coming year someone else be appointed. There are at this time others in the Yearly Meeting who are as able to do the work as I, and probably should be given the opportunity to do so.

I have much enjoyed the time spent in the service of our Lord and the association with other Christian people. It has been a pleasure to me and also has been to my advantage in Christian growth. I am still of the mind that my first duty is to God and that earning a living is secondary, but nevertheless I am definitely led of the Spirit to give more time this coming year to my own business and to school work, from both of which the Yearly Meeting will benefit during future years.

This recommendation was approved.

- 90. The representatives made the following report which was approved:

In regard to the communication from Portland Quarterly Meeting relative to a Quaker Camp Meeting—in view of the difficulties which would occur in a rearrangement of the Yearly Meeting schedule and in consideration of the position of the more distant Quarterly Meetings, we recommend that the Yearly Meeting be continued as at present in its program and that we encourage Portland, Newberg, and Salem Quarterly Meetings in their concern for a Quaker Camp Meeting to be arranged at the time and in the manner they consider best.

- 91. In regard to the communication on the changing of the time of Yearly Meeting, the representatives recommend that the August date for Yearly Meeting be retained for at least one more year.

This was approved.

- 92. The two suggestions in regard to the amendments to the supplementary regulations in the Discipline were read and approved as follows:

We, the Finance Board, recommend on suggestion of the committee from the Ministerial Association, that the Supplementary regulations of the Discipline in regard to the Ministers Retirement Fund be amended so that the administration of this fund be put into the hands of a committee composed of two interested ministers

nominated by the Ministerial Association and a member of the finance board. This committee to appoint one member as executive secretary to carry out the instructions on page 107, Article II.

The Finance Board recommends in addition to the suggestions made this morning, that the third sentence of Paragraph 1 under Finance Board (page 97) be amended to read:

"It shall care for the work of the department of Minister's aid (see page 106), and shall appoint one of its members to the governing committee thereof."

It was referred back to the Board for some additions and is accepted as follows:

The Board of Public Relations presents the following statement for the approval of the Yearly Meeting to be sent key Government men in Washington:

We recognize the sin of our nation and her people in regard to beverage alcohol. Its use is a blot upon the character of any people. It has been a large factor in the downfall of many nations. Science testifies to its destructiveness.

We call upon our nation and her people to turn to God in confession and repentance that we may be used of God to His honor and glory.

Under the United States Constitution certain responsibilities rest with the Federal Government. In line with this responsibility we call upon you to use your influence in favor of legislation in these two areas:

1. The elimination of interstate beverage alcohol advertising.
2. The safe guarding of our soldiers from beverage alcohol, whether used by themselves or others, and from such related evils as the brothel.

The challenge of the present hour calls for clear thinking and good judgment. We cannot afford to risk the future of our country in the hands of those who impair their thinking and judgment with beverage alcohol.

THE BOARD OF PUBLICATION

- 98. The president, Frederick Baker, read the following report:

"Because I will publish the name of the Lord: Ascribe ye greatness unto our God." Deut. 32:3.

The above text outlines the goal of the Board of Publication of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

The purpose of the Board is outlined in the Discipline as follows:

"The Board of Publication is authorized to publish the yearly meeting periodical, and is responsible for the appointment of its editorial staff and for all editorial and financial responsibilities

concerning it. It is further authorized to build and administer a revolving fund and to publish books, pamphlets, and other church and Bible school literature as need may arise and the board may deem wise."

Publication Sunday was observed on January 15 at which time 7500 copies of the pamphlet, "The Best Thing in Life," were sent out to all of our churches.

The publication of the Northwest Friend has been one of the major responsibilities of the Board.

The Quaker bulletin service has been continued during the year furnishing bulletin stock to our churches.

We have cooperated with George Fox college in printing much of its publicity material such as the annual, the bi-monthly bulletins and pamphlets.

Printing has been done for various quarterly meetings and for many of our churches.

The desire of the Board for the coming year is to be of help to our entire constituency.

We propose to make the Northwest Friend the best paper possible with the cooperation of every one of you. We need news and pictures to do this.

The Board plans release of a monthly tract or pamphlet for free distribution in all of our churches.

The "Soul Cry of the Aymara" will continue to be published five times a year in the Northwest Friend. The Missionary Calendar will again be published.

On behalf of the Board of Evangelism this year a fully illustrated book by Milo C. Ross is being printed entitled, "Church Extension Methods" which will outline the technique developed in Oregon Yearly Meeting during the past 25 years in establishing new churches. This book will be printed in form available for College class work. The first printing will be for 500 copies and will sell for \$2.00.

On behalf of the College we hope to be able to print a yearly schedule calendar for pastors and churches.

The publication board offers its services to each board and department of the Yearly Meeting in any way we can be of help.

We request that Publication Sunday this year be observed on February 18, 1951.

We appreciate the faithful work of Ray L. Carter, publisher and editor and Ralph Fletcher, his assistant. Margaret Carter and Myrtle Fletcher, too, have given many hours of time to the work.

We invite you to visit the Yearly Meeting headquarters and our fine printing plant established there.

The letter, prepared by the Board of Public Relations to be sent to key government men, referred to the Executive Committee by the Yearly Meeting was revised to read as follows:

May we take this opportunity of raising our voice against the adoption of Universal Military Training now or in the future and urge you to oppose any such program. We believe war to be contrary to the teaching, the practice and the purpose of our Savior Jesus Christ. U.M.T. is but a step toward war. It fosters the military spirit, attitude and program. "They that take the sword shall perish by the sword." This is not only God's statement but it is the verdict of history. Therefore U.M.T. would be, not a safety measure, but a step toward the destruction of this nation which we love.

We recognize communism as a real threat to the way of life which we cherish. But communism will never be stopped or destroyed by means of war. In fact, war, strife, and fear produce the most fertile soil in which communism grows.

May we submit our humble but honest conviction that safety and protection for America can be found only as we as individuals and as a nation turn to God in confession and repentance of sin and receive salvation through faith in the Son of God. The only thing that will ever destroy communism at home or abroad is the gospel of Jesus Christ.

This form of organization is separate from the appointment of members (in certain cases) to care for the different phases of the work.

The 20th Annual Report of Oregon Friends Bolivian Mission was read by Earl Barker and appears below:

The Mission Council of Oregon Friends Mission submits the following reports for the year 1949-50. The missionaries of the Bolivian field send greetings to Oregon Yearly Meeting as it meets in August. Our prayers and interest are with you and it is our hope that these reports may be used of the Lord to enlarge the knowledge of your responsibility and ours, to preach the Gospel to the Bolivian people.

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ: According as he hath chosen us in him . . . that we should be holy and without blame before him in love." Ephesians 1:3, 4.

Field Mission Council

The Mission Council has functioned during the past year with Jack Willcuts as chairman and Howard Pearson as secretary. The following appointments were directed to the Council from the Mission Board: Field Treasurer, Howard Pearson; Agricultural

Secretary, Paul Cammack; Evangelistic Secretary, Jack Willcuts; Educational and Construction Secretary until September 1949, Roscoe Knight, Jack Willcuts being named to finish out the year; Director of Bible School, Roscoe Knight, Howard and Julia Pearson being named to replace him; Editor of the "Soul Cry of the Aymara," Phyllis Cammack. Ralph and Marie Chapman and daughters were welcomed back into the missionary family in November, 1949 and immediately assumed many responsibilities in the mission work. Ralph and Marie have been occupied as instructors in the Bible School and Ralph has worked with Paul in caring for the farm. They took up residence in the house vacated by the Knights in Copajira soon after their arrival.

Yearly Meeting, 1950

During Easter week record crowds from all parts of the field gathered at the La Paz church for the regular Yearly Meeting sessions. The week day afternoon sessions were devoted to business and annual reports. Two evangelistic services were held daily with Major Juan Claussen, a German missionary in the Salvation Army serving as evangelist. His straight-forward, holiness messages were used of the Lord to the salvation of many. Each of the missionaries present directed or helped in study classes or children's meetings. Ralph Chapman served as platform manager. More than 600 persons attended on Sunday the closing day. God was manifest in a precious way throughout the Yearly Meeting, answering the prayers of those at home and here. One such answer was a highlight of the conference when more than 30 young men acknowledged their desire to attend the Bible School next year. The precious service occurred during the presentation of the Bible School on Sunday afternoon.

National Society of Bolivian Friends

This organization functioned through the year with 3 missionaries and 2 nationals serving on the executive committee. Increased responsibility was assumed by this organization in considering problems of the mission work, both spiritual and financial.

Transportation

The Mission purchased the Jeep formerly owned by Roscoe Knight, which vehicle has been stationed in La Paz for the use of the evangelistic secretary and others. This arrangement has been a most happy one as numerous trips have been made over the field in this Jeep in caring for the work and also has released the Mission truck to be used at the farm most of the time. The Pearsons and Cammacks have been very generous in the use of their vehicles in the Mission work.

Report of the Bible School written by Howard and Julia Pearson was read by J. Allen Dunbar:

As we make this report the Bible School has still one month to go before examinations. We can truly say "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us." This year the Bible School enrollment has been the largest since we began three years ago. In fact we have been somewhat crowded and for lack of adequate space to care for all the students properly. We started the school year with nineteen students. We lost five through the year and one came back to finish the year after the winter vacation. He was with us last year but left at the time of our winter vacation then. Five of the students are married, three of them are here with their families. We have one widower whose wife died during the course of the school last year. The Lord has given us a splendid group of young people and they are fairly representative of the different districts of our field. All but one church has a member studying in the School this year. They are on the average a more intelligent group than we have had heretofore and we find it easier to work with them and teach them.

All the missionaries on the farm compound have a part in teaching the classes this year. Some have only one class but it all goes to a vital interest in the school and welds our interests together as a mission body.

We did considerable remodeling in and about the school this year. An ample new classroom was built for our first year classes. The dining room and dormitories replastered and re-decorated. In the middle of the school year we vacated the little room we had been using as a print shop and made a door connecting it to the dining room and moved our kitchen into that room. Before we have had the dining room and kitchen in one room but with the enlarged enrollment the boys could not all be seated at once and had to eat standing up around the walls or squatting on their heels. Now we have room for another table in the dining room and all can be comfortably and more hygienically taken care of.

As our dormitory was not large enough to accommodate all the unmarried students we put the second year unmarried students in one of the married couples houses which was vacant. Both of the other married peoples houses are occupied as well as the gate house on the farm which has in other years served for a home for the mayordomo and his family. Paul has no mayordomo now so we put a married student there. Two of the wives of our married students have had charge of the kitchen. One went home sick in the middle of the year so we brought out a small 12 year old daughter of another married student who is now helping in the kitchen. The farm supplies the school table with mutton, potatoes, chunos, tuntas, habas and cereals. In other years we have had a school garden which supplied fresh vegetables such as onions, cabbage, lettuce, cauliflower and carrots but this year the hail destroyed most of the garden so we have had to buy most of our vegetables on the market. We also have to buy staples such as sugar, rice, red pepper, soap, coffee, tea and such items.

Once a month we have an all day of prayer in which the students each take a half hour and thus we keep the prayer circle

going throughout the day. We feel this has been a contributing factor to the spirit of the school and the boys as well as the teachers have received a blessing from it.

Many have been the consultations and meetings with the boys during the school year. Every evening finds us busy counselling, advising and helping them with their problems and lessons. Discipline has been more or less easy as we have felt the help and presence of the Holy Spirit amongst us and as we have prayed with and counselled each one of them during the year. Wednesday night is student prayer meeting led by one of their number each week. Sundays are busy days for the students as they either help here on the compound with the meetings, taking the leadership in the Sunday School, with classes and secretaryships or as they go to the surrounding points to hold meetings and put into practice what we are teaching them.

Twice during the year we have held special revival services with the students. At the beginning of the School year Rev. Samuel Lander of the Brethren Mission was with us for a week. His flannelgraph lessons and Bible slides were spiritual and timely and we began the School year with all the boys receiving new blessing and light. Again after the winter vacation Marshall Cavit gave us a week's services with emphasis on Holiness of heart and life. All the boys were at the altar at some time during the week seeking sanctification or receiving new light on their personal lives.

We are glad to say that after three years of existence of the Bible School, it is beginning to play an important part in the spiritual life of our field. The boys made a big impression during the annual conference in La Paz and have helped in our regional conferences during the year. We realize more and more that our pastors look to us to train their young people to help, our churches look to us to supply them with pastors and workers and the boys look to us to get them ready for service in the field. It is no longer necessary for us to urge them to attend but it is getting to be a privilege.

We look to the day not far distant when we can send out saved, sanctified and prepared workers into the whitened harvest fields all about us.

Report of the Evangelistic Secretary by Jack L. Willcuts was read by Lesta Bates as follows:

The statistical report is given in the accompanying chart.

Four three-day conferences were held in various of the country churches besides the Junta Annual in La Paz. These conferences served as times of revival, doctrinal instruction and consideration of field and local problems.

A month of special classes was held in July at the farm for all the pastors and workers able to attend. These classes were in conjunction with the Bible School schedule.

The Mission voted to give our work and territory in Corocoro to another Mission. This change was effected in April. This new Mission seems prepared to work the area more rapidly than we have been able to do. But we have opened up a new work in Guaqui, the town near Copajira and the prospects here are promising. Two or three other new points have been opened with workers being sent out by the established churches. We have abandoned all our work in Peru however, with the exception of the Isla Anapia near Amakari.

Considerable effort has been put into a weekly radio program sponsored by our Mission over a new Protestant radio station in La Paz. First Friends Church of Portland has paid for these broadcasts.

40,000 tracts were distributed over the field this year.

Evangelization has continued through open air meetings, distribution of tracts, special revival campaigns, conferences, radio messages, use of public address systems, and personal and public preaching.

Annual Educational Report, 1949-50.

After Roscoe Knight's departure in September, I was named to act as director of the grade schools and secretary of construction.

School was opened in January in five different localities, namely: La Paz, Hacienda Copajira, Amakari, Ojje and Achachikala. There are a total of 184 students and the 6 teachers receive their monthly salaries from the Mission. La Paz church pays part of the salary of their teacher. The lack of equipment and decent buildings for the schools is pathetic, but this is being remedied as fast as funds permit. Julia Pearson is overseeing the construction of school desks.

The week before school started this year, Julia Pearson directed a week of study for all the teachers presenting a new course of study which she had prepared.

Our teacher in Ojje was accidentally shot and killed while hunting ducks on the lake. He was replaced by a boy formerly in our Bible School and he is proving satisfactory.

Only the Amakari school this year has all the six grades taught in our courses. The other schools have no students ready for this course as many of the pupils drop out of school to help in the field and with the family support before finishing even the small amount of schooling possible. Many of the believers do not send their daughters to school as they are too useful at home. We pray the schools may maintain a spiritual testimony to the Christian homes over the field. We need trained Christian leaders in all our churches.

Annual Report of Construction Work

The new church in Pucarani is still in the process of building. They now have the building roofed with a new type of roofing here, made of asbestos and cement and is in sheet about a yard square. This building will be adequate and well located to the Pucarani meeting. The local church has shared in the expense of buying the materials and done all the work.

The church and Bible School in Copajira have received much remodelling and changes the past year and are much more attractive and useable.

The La Paz church was redecorated on the inside this year, being painted for the first time. The benches and floors were varnished and all was cleaned and repaired. This improvement is most noticeable and especially appreciated by the La Paz members as they paid for practically all the cost of the improvements and did the work.

The Young People's Society also replastered the walls in their room which makes it much cleaner and comfortable.

A Youth recreation hall and extra classroom is in the process of being built in the back patio of the Mission La Paz property. Due to lack of building materials it is going slowly, but was sufficiently ready to be used during the recent Yearly Meeting. The same patio has been leveled and is being used for a playground for the day school children.

The Mina Fabulosa church also did some remodeling, plastering and painting in their little church. It looks much more attractive and they are very proud of their improvements, which they did voluntarily and with local funds.

A great deal of building has taken place on the farm. The Copajira church was remodeled, Bible School class rooms built, homes for Bible School students, granaries, work shop, garage, hog houses and on down to guinea pig pens have been under construction. But details of these improvements will appear in other reports.

Ray Barnes read the report of the farm written by Paul Cammack.

Again as we close the church year we are made to recognize the faithfulness of God in the care of the Copajira farm.

We had one big hail that was a disaster to the crops of our peons and to neighboring Haciendas but with the exception of cutting the yield of Habas our other crops were planted out of the reach of the hail. Indians all over this section recognize that God was especially good to the Evangelicals at Copajira this year. We give God the glory and hope and pray this may have been a means of breaking down prejudices and lies given by those who say God is against us.

On the whole, crops were good. We harvested: 71 tons of potatoes (1420 sacks) or about double the tonnage of last year; 43 tons of barley grain which is four times as much as we had a year ago and of much better quality; five tons of heardless barley, an increase over an initial trial planting two years ago of four hundred pounds of seed; and three tons of guinea or about double of last year. Although hail hurt the habas badly we are hoping to have enough for seed and for the use of the school. A new trial crop for next year will be wheat.

The animals have done well. The improved rams we bought

are bringing a much better type lamb from our ordinary ewes. We now have 670 sheep. The sale of hogs this year has helped the farm income. Hog cholera is very prevalent but thanks to interested friends in O.Y.M. we have vaccine so that we haven't had a single case of hog cholera. We bought a thoroughbred Duroc Jersey boar that should improve greatly the type of hog here.

The farm warehouse and shop were completed this year and are fully occupied. A potato house was built and is in use. Hog houses and pens were built. A chuno house is under construction. With farm expansion and the Bible School adapting old storage rooms into classrooms the need for new buildings to house harvests was imperative.

A few additional items of machinery have been added. A potato planter and potato ridger were purchased this year. A farm trailer was sent to us from Oregon. A crude but effective potato grader was constructed by the personnel at the farm.

The peons have shown friendliness to us throughout the year and will listen to gospel exhortations but the greater part of them still do not attend our services. Thirteen now have been freed and are no longer called "peons" but "farmers." More of them are putting their children in our day school. We feel that God is dealing with their hearts and that there will be a day of turning if you with us intercede effectually for their souls.

Farm income this year has made it possible to repay money borrowed for farm operation two years ago. The bulk of this year's saleable farm products is still on hand.

The farm has provided sheep milk, cheese, chunes, tuntas, habas, quinoa, potatoes, and mutton for the school kitchen. The students have worked in farm labor in the afternoons.

While we who work here can always see greater possibilities for the farm, we feel that this has been a good year in our progress.

Ruth Palmer gave an interesting account of the work of Christie Ann Bundy in Japan—how the revival has progressed in the schools. Y.M.C.A. and other doors are wide open in many places to the gospel.

The report of the president, Walter Lee, was as follows:

MISSIONARY PROGRAM FOR 1950-51

Presented by the Board of Missions

The Board of Missions gives thanks to God for the gracious moving of the Holy Spirit as revealed in the most encouraging advances of the work in the Bolivian Mission Field. It is with confidence in our Lord Jesus Christ that the missionary vision of this Yearly Meeting may be projected into the future.

Policies

This basic purpose of foreign missions is evangelism, the preaching of the "Gospel of Christ which is the power of God unto salvation." Around this basic purpose all other policies and plans must gather.

It has been and is the purpose of the missionaries and the Board to develop an indigenous church, that is, a Bolivian Friends Church under national leadership and support.

In the work of evangelism and development of the indigenous church trained preachers, teachers and leaders are essential. This makes necessary the maintenance of a Bible Training School which has been established on the farm purchased for that purpose.

Although the farm consisting of about 3000 acres is viewed with much interest and may have many uses, its primary purpose is the maintenance of the Bible School, supplying work for students, introducing improved farming methods and furnishing some food supplies for the missionaries.

The operation of day schools is highly important in a mission program and is definitely helpful in evangelization and training of youth. For years, these schools, which are increasing in number as opportunity and finances are available, have been an integral part of our mission work.

For the successful promotion of the type of program mentioned and the proper execution of these policies a staff of five missionary couples should be maintained. This is the plan of the Board which is now in operation.

Upon the urgent request of our missionaries, five years ago the Board adopted the policy of building a fund for a five-year periodic visitation of our Bolivian field by a representative of the Board.

Field Program 1950-51

With the beginning of the coming school year in February, a third year will be added to the course of the Bible Training School, thus establishing a three year course as the requirement for graduation. This will increase the load on our missionary staff and perhaps necessitate some readjustment of curriculum.

A constitution has been prepared and plans have been made to present for induction the program of an indigenous church at

the next annual meeting of the Bolivian Friends held in LaPaz in April. So will be drawing nearer the accomplishment of one of our goals.

Definite plans are being made to install a water system and electric light plan for the farm and Bible School during the latter part of this year and the first of the next. Funds for this essential project have already been given by an interested Friend, and Forrest Cammack, brother of Paul Cammack who is in charge of the farm in Bolivia, plans to go to Bolivia at his own expense to help in the installation of these two needed improvements.

Howard and Julia Pearson, having served on our Bolivian field for three terms following service in Guatemala under California Yearly Meeting, will be returning home this fall and retiring from the work in the high Bolivian plains having reached the retirement age as set by the Board for that altitude. After their furlough time, they will be encouraged and assisted as possible into some service at lower altitude.

Since the National Holiness Missionary Society program has undergone some changes in recent years and that organization has no work in the high plains of Bolivia, we are fortunate to be offered the services of Marshall and Catherine Cavit who will be supported by the National Holiness Missionary Society. The Cavits have a definite call to work among the Aymara Indians and will assist Jack and Geraldine Willcuts in the work of evangelization.

For some years there has been a need for another living quarters in LaPaz for the benefit of our missionary families coming to LaPaz. With the immediate need for housing for the Cavits, who will assume their duties with us before the end of the year, plans are made to make the Chester Hadley memorial home in LaPaz into two apartments. This can be done at no great expense and give ample room for two families. Funds for this have already been promised by an interested family.

With the return of Roscoe and Tina Knight to the missionary farm and Bible School, the quarters in which the Pearsons lived will require the addition of one room. Special funds have been given which will be used for this purpose.

In view of recent requests from our missionaries and the proposed launching of the indigenous church program, the Board, having built up a field visitation fund, plans to send its President to the Bolivian field at a time which the missionaries shall designate.

Mission Program at Home

The Board feels a deep concern to encourage the establishment of a prayer band in every monthly meeting and outpost that there may be regular, earnest prayer not only for our missionary work, but for the evangelistic and church extension work, for George Fox College, for the publication work, for the Christian education program, for the public relations work, for the service work and for every need of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

A pamphlet giving the history and progress of our Bolivian mission work has been prepared by Marie Haines under the direction of a committee of the Board of Missions and will be printed and distributed during this year.

The publication of the "Soul Cry of the Aymara" will be continued as a section of the "Northwest Friend" five times per year and it is planned to send out the monthly News Flash from the office of the Yearly Meeting Superintendent.

The Board urges every meeting to have a missionary message at least once per quarter and preferably once per month. It would further urge each Quarterly Meeting to plan a missionary institute once during the year using as many Friends missionaries as are available on furlough from various fields, thus giving a wider vision of missions throughout the world.

Finances

A portion of the missionary budget, \$8968, which is composed mostly of salaries of the missionaries, is included in the United Budget of the Yearly Meeting. However, since there are a number of individuals and groups who desire special projects and since it is the preference of the Yearly Meeting Executive Committee that certain items be raised by special projects an amount of \$6020 will be raised as usual by the project method. Of this amount, \$1200.00 has already been pledged by the Yearly Meeting Women's Missionary Union for the work of the Bolivian day schools and for evangelism. Other items of the above amount are: \$1365 for evangelism by the Bolivian preachers, of which \$95 has been pledged, \$3000 for missionary transportation to Bolivia, \$350 for incorporation and construction and \$200 for the Bible Training School.

Since the Pearsons have no home here in the United States, it will be necessary for us to rent for them a furnished apartment for the year of furlough which will be in addition to the aforementioned budget.

Because the farm receipts are now paying a large portion of the expense of the Bible School, the amount placed in the list of special projects for the Bible School is quite small.

Of course, the Board cannot anticipate all possible future needs, but since it maintains no sinking fund, it will pass on to the meetings such needs for consideration and support.

In view of the urgency of the hour and the increasing pressure by the enemies of God to close mission doors, this whole Yearly Meeting should pray and support our mission work at such an increased tempo that the Holy Spirit may be able to accomplish in months what has previously taken years.

Tina Knight brought a message from the text: Open thy mouth wide and I will fill it. The Lord will bless in a spiritual way as

well as in a financial way. Ask largely in faith and expect and the Lord will fulfill his promise. Her heart is touched that the Lord has entrusted so much to them in this field.

One challenge that she leaves the people in the Yearly Meeting is that they should pray for them.

There were times when the going was hard and when they felt afraid when the peons were unfriendly but God has always been faithful.

Pray for the health of the missionaries, pray for the Bible School is her request.

"My grace is sufficient for thee," is the text she is taking back with her.

Roscoe Knight said that he has appreciated the fellowship here at home. Where there is no vision the people perish is the text that has come to him. Christ is the answer to the world's need. Sometimes the work is very discouraging and problems arise. The Lord can work out the problems and He has never failed. If we trust in God, He will care for us. He is resolved to go back to do his best for the Lord. As he has traveled around he has felt there is a need of a real vision of lost souls. We need to do something about it.

Walter Lee brought a message:

Lift up your eyes and look and the fields are already white unto harvest. The greatest opportunity for missions that there has ever been.

The Lord said, "All souls are mine." God has lost some souls and He hates to lose souls. There is a problem of consecration and of prayer. Missionaries have many problems and we need really to pray.

The reports were approved.

Gervas Carey led in a prayer to the throne.
