MINUTES OF OREGON YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS 1952

● 1. Let us be thankful and rejoice that our Heavenly Father has permitted us to meet in the sixtieth session of Oregon Yearly Meeting, this fourteenth day of August, 1952, at 9:30 a.m., at Greenleaf, Idaho.

Whatsoever ye do, do it heartily as to the Lord, and not unto men. Colossians 3:23.

● 2. The Assistant Clerk, Dorwin E. Smith, acting in the absence of the Presiding Clerk, Gervas A. Carey, welcomed the Friends to Idaho. He quoted 1st Samuel 15:22, "To obey is better than sacrifice." He said what we needed was a manifestation of God's Spirit.

- 11. The following communication was received from Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting and was referred to the Representatives for consideration:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church:

Greenleaf Monthly Meeting of Friends Church forwards the following recommendation to Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting for consideration:

That the United Budget and the Fixed Expense of the Yearly Meeting be combined in one budget and apportioned to the Monthly Meetings based on the ratio of their resident active members.

- 12. The reports of the state of the church were received from all the Quarterly Meetings, and a summary of these appears below:

Nearly all the Quarterly Meetings report an increase in attendance at all their meetings; only two or three mention a slight decrease. There was a note of real spiritual growth in most of the Quarters.

The ministry has been Bible-centered, timely and Spirit-filled. A number report definite conversions and souls at the altar seeking spiritual help and encouragement.

Family devotions have been especially emphasized in some meet-

ings, and new Christian homes have been urged to set up the family altar. Many young people are taking their places in helpful service. Opportunity is given individuals to exercise their spiritual gifts. Several have given evidence of gifts in Christian service.

There has been a real effort to meet problems between members. For the most part there is a spirit of love and fellowship in the meetings.

The needs of the world, both home and foreign, have been kept before the meetings, so that there has been a vital interest in missionary work. Some young people are definitely planning to go to the field in Bolivia soon. There is still a need for more outreach.

The doctrinal standards of Oregon Yearly Meeting are upheld by the meetings.

- 13. A number of memorials have been presented to the meeting and these were referred to the following committee, appointed by the meeting:

- 14. The following report from the committee to write letters to Aged Friends was accepted:

- 15. Oliver Weesner, the custodian of documents, made the following report which was approved:

The documents of the Yearly Meeting are being kept in a safe in the office of B. M. LeFevre, in Newberg, Oregon, and in the safety deposit vaults of the Newberg Branch of the First National Bank of Portland, Oregon.

The recommendation given below was approved:

I recommend that the Yearly Meeting authorize the Custodian of Documents to secure a metal cabinet that will meet the approval of the bank and have it placed in one of the vaults of the Newberg Branch of the First National Bank of Newberg, and deposit the documents of Yearly Meeting in this container. I have consulted the bank regarding such an arrangement and they said it could be made. Since it is for a church the charge would be nominal. It would be kept in a vault where they keep some of the bank's records. They would require that the cabinet be kept locked, and the Yearly Meeting Custodian of Documents would have access to it.

Place's Addition to Baker City, now city of Baker, according to the official plot thereof now on file and of record in the office of the County Clerk of Baker County, Oregon; also a strip of land 10 feet wide lying along the southerly side of the above described parcels of land, being that portion of East Street (now Estes Street) heretofore vacated by the city of Baker, Baker County, Oregon, as provided by that certain ordinance adopted June 18, 1901, all of the foregoing described premises lying and being in the N.E. 1/4 of the N.E. 1/4 of Section 20 and the N.W. 1/4 of the N.W. 1/4 of Section 21 in Township 9 South, Range 40 East of the Willamette Meridian, Baker County, Oregon.

Place's Addition to Baker City, now city of Baker, according to the official plot thereof now on file and of record in the office of the County Clerk of Baker County, Oregon; also a strip of land 10 feet wide lying along the southerly side of the above described parcels of land, said 10 foot strip of land being that portion of East Street (now Estes Street) heretofore vacated by the City of Baker, Baker County, Oregon, as provided by that certain ordinance adopted June 18, 1901, all of the foregoing described premises lying and being in the N.E. 1/4 of the N.E. 1/4 of Section 20 and the N.W. 1/4 of the N.W. 1/4 of Section 21 in Township 9 South, Range 40 East of the Willamette Meridian, Baker County, Oregon.

The clerks were asked to write a letter to Edward and Violet Baker thanking them for the gift of a house and the lots in Baker, which are valued at approximately \$3000.

- 17. During the inspirational hour three songs led by Roy Clark were sung. Harlow Ankeny sang a special number, "Have I Done My Best For Jesus?"

After the song service Charles E. DeVol brought greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior. He used 2 Peter the first chapter as a basis for his message. Faith is the foundation, then virtue, good moral conduct is added, after that knowledge, temperance, self control in one's own life and patience toward others, then godliness, a spirit of devotion and reverence, brotherly kindness, thinking of others, and charity—divine love for lost men. We add, but God multiplies great promises and divine power.

- 21. The following report from the auditor was approved:

We have examined as of June 30, 1952, the Yearly Meeting's records of income, expenses, Yearly Meeting cash balances of various boards, and receipts and disbursements of various boards in a manner we deemed appropriate, sufficient to determine the accuracy of the Yearly Meeting treasurer's book records.

Several minor suggestions have been made to the treasurer which may make it easier for an auditor to check the accuracy of the division of certain monies into the proper funds of the several Yearly Meeting boards.

The bank balance was reconciled for the year to and including June 30th, 1952, and found to be correct.

The auditor made the following recommendation which was referred to the Board of Finance:

Because of the many hours of hard work required by the treasurer in preparing his yearly report in time for presentation to the Yearly Meeting we feel urged to recommend to the Yearly Meeting that the books of record be closed as of the end of the church year, namely June 30th, the same as that of the Monthly Meetings of the Yearly Meeting. The treasurer's records might possibly be held open until July 15th each year, but not beyond that date. Under the present method of holding the Yearly Meeting treasurer's books open until shortly before Yearly Meeting, the treasurer is placed under great pressure and responsibility to get his books balanced and a

treasurer's report ready by Yearly Meeting time. Another reason for recommending the above is, if the Yearly Meeting desires an audit of the treasurer's books each year by an outside accounting firm, it is impossible to make that audit as of the date the treasurer closes his books by the present method. If the Yearly Meeting adopts this plan, the Monthly Meeting and Yearly Meeting fiscal year would be uniform, also making it possible to audit the treasurer's books for the complete church year.

BOARD OF SERVICE

- 24. Paul Mills, the president of the board, presided and made the following report:

Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting have responded to needs in their own communities among the poor, the handicapped and disaster victims. Foreign relief has been sent through various agencies to Europe, South America, and the Orient.

We urge continued efforts toward relief of the physical distress of the world, and recommend such agencies as: Care packages, Korean Christian Church (through N.A.E.), Japan (Christie Bundy), Bolivian Mission.

In dealing with the problems of our young men who are under the Selective Service act we recognize that a Christian conviction is a fundamental necessity for the selectee. We therefore urge full cooperation with the Public Relations Board in the teaching of the Bible doctrine of Peace.

The status of the C.O. under the Selective Service law is changing as the details of the program are worked out by Selective Service. The Service board is seeking to find qualified legal counselors in the different areas of the Yearly Meeting who are sympathetic with our position and who will give our young men up-to-date advice regarding their rights and responsibilities under the law. Bernhard Fedde, of First Friends church, Portland, is serving that area in this capacity. As persons are found to do the job in other areas announcement will be made.

The board is greatly concerned that every pastor and other youth leaders of the Yearly Meeting should take the initiative in counseling young men regarding the draft. Such help should begin before the boy reaches registration age and continue as long as needed. The counselor should acquaint himself with the main steps which the registrant must take and be able to help the boy to find competent advice when needed in areas beyond his own understanding of the

problem. It is of great importance that this help be given the boy before his papers are filled out and returned to his draft board.

- 25. George L. Ford, the Regional Director of the National Association of Evangelicals, gave a brief history of the movement and told of this year's convention in Chicago. He said the purpose of the N.A.E. was to serve the church and help them carry on their work in a more effective way.

He made two requests:

1. That the Yearly Meeting name one member on the regional board of the N.A.E.

2. That individual churches, as they are able, make contributions to the N.A.E.

Walter Lee who attended the N.A.E. convention in Chicago, gave an enthusiastic report of the convention which had as its theme, "By My Spirit." Outstanding men spoke on the relationship of the Holy Spirit to the various phases of the church and of life. He recommends that the Yearly Meeting appoint a representative to the National Council.

The three recommendations were referred to the representatives.

- 26. N. W. Nice, of North Wichita Monthly Meeting, Wichita Quarterly Meeting, Kansas Yearly Meeting, was introduced. He brought greetings from Kansas Yearly Meeting.

- 27. The meeting adjourned to meet August 15 at 9:30 a.m. Esther Rhoades offered the closing prayer.

FRIDAY, 9:30 A.M.

- 28. During the devotional period Joseph McCracken led in prayer, and a number of others followed.

- 29. The minutes were read and approved, with some additions.

- 30. The following epistle was received from the Bolivian brethren: To the brethren in the churches in the north.

Brethren in Christ:

The La Paz church, as well as the others of the field, greet you in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. It is our only desire that the brethren there have been receiving the Lord's blessings. May the Lord keep you by His power.

We are glad to inform you a little about our work in the Lord's service here in Bolivia. With God's blessing, and through the aid of your prayers as well as the constant labors and interest of each of our brethren, the work is prospering in all our extensive field. Every day there are new places from where pleas come for a pastor, a school, more help, more workers; this is truly a great encouragement to our brethren. Even so, Satan wishes to work against the truth, greatly discouraging the brethren, looking for a place to sow the seeds of evilness, seeking even the most faithful of the brethren. In all this, he has not triumphed, for the believing soul is fortified more by the leadership of the Holy Spirit and by the help of the pastors. In brief, Christ continues to triumph in our souls.

As to the church's maintenance: La Paz, for example, is meeting its own needs; other churches, such as Amacari, Ojje, find it difficult to maintain themselves. It may be a result of their extended

fields of isolation from other places that in truth they wish outside help until they become established churches. Thus they desire funds from the mission, and therefore remain weak. The central church (La Paz) as well as the others are very grateful for the untiring co-operation of the missionaries, which for our field is and will be a perpetual memory of all those that have labored together with us. At the same time, we owe our aid, in the eagerness with which we have put ourselves, toward the realization of that work which in the future depends upon this, out to a good finish. In our last Yearly Meeting, various workers were named to carry the load of shepherding our field. Then too, the order of our meetings remain more or less fixed; for example, we have the Yearly Meeting in La Paz, where, along with the special classes and a variety of teaching, we dedicate ourselves with special care to a time in which we discuss and attend to all the business of the entire field. Also, we have what we call "annual conferences," which we have established to the end that the field be evangelized. In these we have special classes in spiritual growth. In these conferences we rejoice in the excellent cooperation of Marshal Cavit, who with his tent, is always present to show pictures relative to the life of our Lord Jesus Christ. In this manner we are able to reach souls.

The workers that are placed out over our evangelistic field are: Mariano Baptista, who, as you understand, is the one who occupies the pastorate of the central church, and at the same time, has the load of the presidency of the Mesa Directiva of our organization. We say that he is a brother who is versatile and very enthusiastic. We also have the brethren Martin Perez, Martin Garnica, Maximo Loza, Feliciano Sirpa, Mariano Acero, Manuel Nina, and many others who are consecrated to the Lord's work. Day after day they demonstrate their spirit of enthusiasm in the program of their respective churches in spite of the keen-edged temptations and trials that they experience in one form or another. For all these we only desire and pray for the power of the Holy Spirit.

As to the Bible School, we note that it is of great importance, for through it are being forged and molded the workers and pastors who tomorrow shall be the leaders of the church here in our country. For them also go our daily supplications to the Creator and Christ, our Savior.

Without further report now, we greet once more the congregations in the north. We ask for your prayers and, as always, for your untiring cooperation that you give for your, and our, Lord.

This was approved.

- 34. The following communication came from Salem Quarterly Meeting:

Marion Monthly Meeting presented a growing concern about the founding, or establishment, of a home for old people. One family has offered to donate a 40-acre farm, partly under irrigation, with good buildings, if enough interest is manifested to make it a sure thing. It would seem with many old folk receiving welfare and social security, that it could almost be self-supporting, along with gifts, donations, wills, etc. It would fill an important need in our midst. This meeting approved and requested that we send this on to Yearly Meeting for your consideration.

cher, and Dean Gregory, and decided that it would not be best to sell the building and secure other quarters for the printing plant and office of the general superintendent at this time.

● 45. The Mission Board presented the following communication:

For sometime May P. Wiley, a faithful member of Oregon Yearly Meeting, and resident of Portland, Oregon, has felt a concern that a home be provided for missionaries when on furlough. Several months ago she approached the Board of Missions desiring to deed her property to Oregon Yearly Meeting with the stipulation that this property, or the proceeds from the sale of such property, shall be used for the above stated purpose.

She has executed a deed, in favor of Oregon Yearly Meeting, retaining a life estate use of the property, and this deed has been recorded in Multnomah County, Oregon.

The property consists of a well-built two-story house in good repair, located at the corner of Albina Ave. and Lombard St., in Portland, Oregon. This is a rather desirable business location, since all other corners of this intersection are now occupied by reputable business concerns. It is estimated that the property's present value is \$10,000 or more.

It is Mrs. Wiley's intention to pay the taxes and care for the building. However, since she is 80 years of age and not well physically, there is always the possibility that such expenses will fall upon the Yearly Meeting. While she is at present self-supporting, it is entirely possible she may require care necessitating financial aid from the Yearly Meeting. Such funds might be obtained by placing a mortgage upon the property. To execute a mortgage the signature of the donor and of the donee would be necessary.

The Board of Missions has studied this proposition and recommends that the Yearly Meeting accept this property upon the conditions involved, and authorize the Board of Trustees to mortgage property if necessary.

REPORT OF GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

● 46. Dean Gregory, the general superintendent, made his report as follows:

"Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended: but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." Phil. 3:13-14.

This year of 1952 marks the sixtieth anniversary of Oregon Yearly Meeting. It is well that we pause to remember and recount the blessings and providences of God through these years. We are constantly aware of those whose faith and labors still live on and into whose labors we have entered. These holy men and women again march through our memory consciousness and we bare our heads and bow our hearts in thankfulness as we review the glory crowned

procession; saints who have attained the eternal reward through much affliction and suffering, and who have left for us a great Christian heritage.

Though there is some satisfaction in reminiscing through the past, our thoughts should not dwell too long there, but after a backward glance over the shoulder we should then turn our eyes to the task at hand and to the goal ahead.

This is my first annual report, and I wish to take this opportunity to express my appreciation for the wholehearted cooperation and support which each of you has given. It has been a real thrill to be associated both with the fine group of ministers in Oregon Yearly Meeting, and also the great host of Friends who are working together for the advancement of the church. I would like to express my sincere appreciation to Beth Hockett who has served faithfully as office secretary, to Roger and Mildred Minthorne who have given liberally of a large portion of their time in the office of Yearly Meeting treasurer. The Union Pacific Railroad Company has been very kind in granting trip passes over their lines, and the Southern Pacific, and Spokane, Portland and Seattle Railway companies have granted annual passes, which courtesy is deeply appreciated.

It has been a genuine pleasure to visit every local meeting and outpost during the year. I have been gratified that among the pastors there is the fine spirit of love and unity. It is my prayer that I may merit the continued support and confidence of our constituency as we work together during the coming year.

Hundreds of letters have been written, and I have prepared the monthly News Flash which goes to each meeting. In the course of my work I have driven 21,532 miles during an eleven-month period. One hundred nineteen messages have been given, besides the constant schedule of board meetings, committees, consultations, etc.

This past year a series of United Evangelistic conferences were held, reaching to almost every local meeting. On behalf of the whole Yearly Meeting I express sincere thanks to Walter Lee, Fred Baker, and Jack Willcuts for their part in these conferences. These meetings were valuable in bringing the challenge of the home and foreign fields to each meeting, and in creating a new sense of responsibility to the total program of the Yearly Meeting.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

Twenty-two years ago we undertook a great missionary responsibility in Bolivia, and with the Holy Spirit's working it has grown until now there are well over 1,000 believers under our spiritual care. There is the Helen Cammack Memorial Bible School, the farm which supports it and gives it a home, the many day schools, and the many churches which all give evidence of God's divine approval. Last Easter, literally in the midst of one of Bolivia's bloodiest revolutions, the National Evangelical Friends Church was born. The nationalization of the church in Bolivia was perhaps the most important step since the beginning of the work there. New areas of ministry are presenting themselves faster than our missionaries are able to fill them. The task in Bolivia is far from completion. Our responsibility has not diminished but has increased. May the Lord give us a larger vision and faith for the work on the foreign field.

THE HOME FIELD

Here in the Northwest there are also growing pains. Over half

of our meetings are under 21 years of age. New fields open before us every year. There are young people who have dedicated themselves to go out to preach the gospel in these new fields, and now they wait for the church to send them.

We have prayed that the Lord would raise up young men and women to preach the gospel. He has answered our prayers. We now have more ministers and missionaries than we have places to put them; not that we lack opportunity, but it may be we have lacked vision which was necessary to establish places for new workers. We need to be spurred on to open new churches over the Northwest and extend our missionary efforts, otherwise the effect of maintaining our present level only will have a deadening influence. Some of our potential spiritual leaders are already looking to other Yearly Meetings for service because work has not opened up for them within our own borders. There are now twice as many members of Oregon Yearly Meeting serving as foreign missionaries under other boards than are serving under our own mission board! The responsibility falls squarely upon the church. Are we sufficiently concerned to make it possible for them to go?

A leading protestant denomination in America released the following information relative to the unevangelized fields in our own country.

"Judging by current standards of accessibility, more people in America are today beyond the reach of existing churches than ever before. There are more clearly definable communities and neighborhoods which are without churches than at anytime since the nation was founded."

I am happy to announce that during the past year some new work has opened up. Eugene (Oregon) Friends, now approximately six months old, is already a preparative meeting and has called Wayne and Willa Piersall as pastors. Friends in the Kennewick, Washington, area have maintained a weekly prayer meeting for several months. Friends and other concerned people at Twin Rocks, Oregon, have established a Sunday evening meeting for worship and Bible study. A new outpost has been established at Cambridge, Idaho, where Gerald and Elaine Cronk are pastors. At least ten of our existing meetings or outposts are either in the midst of a new building program or major remodeling job. Some others are preparing to begin such activity soon.

The great Inland Empire in central Washington is opening up as an unparalleled opportunity for home mission work. A ten-year irrigation development program is now under way, and by 1958 there will be an estimated 500,000 people in this project which formerly was largely desert land. I doubt if there is another area in all the United States which holds as tremendous a challenge for a missionary endeavor as this. Friends, we cannot evade our God-given responsibility in this field.

A successful home or foreign mission is made up of three phases: (1) a place where men and women are without adequate privileges to hear the full gospel. (2) Prepared men and women, called and dedicated to go into these places to preach the gospel. (3) Consecrated people to back them in going out, supporting them by faithful prayer and regular giving.

STEWARDSHIP

Remember, members of the church, that you are essential to the plan of God to evangelize the world. You have your important place in sending out the messengers of light. Last year your superintendent stated in his annual report, "This is a day when the challenge is for individuals to come onto the scene and support a pastor and a missionary personally. Some of you members of Oregon Yearly Meeting should be coming and saying, 'I want to support a pastor in some outpost point, or I want to support a missionary, in addition to what I am doing,' The pastors and missionaries are ready to go. Are you ready to make it possible?"

The church can never reach its peak of effectiveness until its members are possessed with an enthusiastic spirit of stewardship. Many of our meetings are known as tithing churches, but how we need a concentration of the tithes and offerings, and there are many more who need to be convinced that tithing is God's plan. God has given us definitely defined areas of responsibility, and we will never fulfill our own obligations by scattering our tithes and offerings. I would like to see the Yearly Meeting set up a department on stewardship and set out to challenge the church to an all-out effort in meeting the challenge before us. How we need men and women who will be willing to come to know Galatians 2:20 as a reality: "I have been crucified with Christ: and it is no longer I that live, but Christ liveth in me; and that life which I now live in the flesh, I live in faith, the faith which is in the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself up for me." Gal. 2:20 A.S.V. Holiness is more than a doctrine, it is more than an experience, it is more than a life; it is all three, divinely and beautifully bonded together in human personalities!

RADIO

There has been a growing concern among many Friends that it is time to launch a Yearly Meeting radio program, to originate in one central station, then be recorded on tape and sent throughout the northwest to be used wherever possible. Boise and Greenleaf Quarterly Meetings have conducted a successful radio ministry for several years. Another Quarterly Meeting has just recently appointed a committee to investigate the possibility of starting another local radio program. Surely we need to use every possible method to evangelize, and the field of radio seems to be the logical step for a new emphasis on evangelism.

EDUCATION

George Fox College and Greenleaf Academy are your schools. They are essential to the church, as they turn out Christian young people who are rooted and grounded in the faith, ready to go out to serve their Christ and their church in every phase of responsibility. We should remind ourselves of the fine Christian instructors in these schools who are giving their services gladly with the same kind of selfless devotion that is manifested by those who give themselves over to a definite Christian ministry. There must be a renewed sense of loyalty and responsibility toward these schools that God has entrusted to us.

CAMPS

The summer camping program has contributed an invaluable service to the church through the past 35 years. This summer there

were eleven conferences held at six camp locations with a total attendance of 1,427. We must see to it that these camps are well supported and kept evangelistic in spirit.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

The churches that are having healthful growth are those that have a strong Sunday school emphasis. We must remember that the Sunday school is the main door to the church for the people in our communities. Friends, we need to bolster this great arm of the church and make it strong. The National Sunday School Convention to be held in Portland, Oregon, October 1-4 this coming fall, will be of great help to those who will avail themselves of the opportunity to attend. I am concerned that there shall be a new emphasis upon the Sunday school. It is, without doubt, the most important agency available to the church for effective evangelism.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR

The Christian Endeavor work needs the encouragement and prayerful support of the whole church. This, more than anywhere else, is where our youth learn to shoulder their church responsibilities. Every pastor and adult member should give the C.E. his best wholehearted support.

OUR PROGRAM

Oregon Yearly Meeting, this is your program: the foreign mission, the home field, the George Fox College and Greenleaf Academy, the Christian Education department with its three-fold ministry in Sunday school, Christian Endeavor and summer conferences. Let us be aware that this is one program, not many, and the heart of it is evangelism, warmed with the personal heart-throb of ordinary people, made extra-ordinary by the living presence of Christ, ministered by the Holy Spirit, and activated by loving service.

The meeting expressed a desire that the superintendent should lift out the items that should have special attention and present them to the Executive Committee for their consideration.

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

47. Marjorie Crisman, the president, gave the following report: Each year the Women's Missionary Union of Oregon Yearly Meeting is becoming a larger group, more unified in goals and efforts, and increasingly shouldering larger financial obligations. We praise the Lord for the women of our Yearly Meeting—a group devoted to Him, who are willing to use their time, talents, and financial gifts in the support of our foreign and home missionaries.

An increase in membership was shown in many of the unions, bringing the total to 743, over 150 more than last year's total membership.

A fine staff of leaders, from the Yearly Meeting officers down to the union presidents and committee chairmen, is responsible for keeping interest high among the women, and for the new projects which have been undertaken during the past year.

Outstanding among these is the Prayer Unit organization. Feel-

ing the need for definite prayer for specific needs on the mission field, our missionaries challenged us to begin this new phase of work. Thirty unions out of the 47 responded to this challenge by establishing Prayer Units. Three have met each week, the majority once a month, and some at irregular intervals, to pray for needs on the foreign and home mission fields. Maude Harmon, Prayer Unit chairman, has been a link between the missionaries and the Prayer Units, keeping the women informed of the needs and reporting answers to prayer.

A fine devotional and program book, compiled by Marie Haines and Carol Lee, was published this year, which was much used and appreciated. Women from First Friends Women's Missionary Union in Portland wrote the devotional messages to be presented at each meeting. The program material was based on Friends missionary work throughout the world. Since it presents the history of Friends missionary work in many countries so concisely, this book has not only been of value to women of our Yearly Meeting, but has been purchased by some from other Yearly Meetings.

Again this year, we assumed the \$1200 Bolivian national teacher fund which has been paid in advance each month, the funds capably handled by Arvilla Mickelson, foreign project chairman. In addition to these many gifts, women of the unions have sent quantities of gifts to the nationals in Bolivia: aprons, layettes, bedding, Christmas cards and pictures, bandages, rugs, clothing, school supplies and sanitary kits for the Bible School students. They have sent birthday cards and Christmas gifts to the missionaries, helped outfit the Hibbs, pay partial expense for the Cammack baby, and, in addition, sent clothing, drapes, bedding and kneeling pads to Christie Bundy in Japan, financial support to the Fritschles who have gone to India, and clothing to Korea.

Our home project, working on local parsonages and church buildings, resulted in the redecorating of five church basements, ten parsonages, and partial redecorating of eleven churches. According to Edna Williams, project chairman, Christmas gifts of various kinds were given to six pastor's families. New kitchen equipment, including four electric ranges, coffee urns, dishes, silverware, and water installation was provided. Furniture and drapes for churches and parsonages were other gifts, along with \$1177.85 cash and hours of work equivalent to \$285.55. Thirty-six Christmas boxes were sent to pastors of outposts and small meetings.

Members of the Women's Missionary Union are active in their communities, having aided 37 needy families, served four dinners in times of bereavement, visited shut-ins, canned foods for others. They have sponsored seven family nights for the church and served 13 banquets or dinners.

Our treasurer, Hazel Macy, reports total receipts for foreign missions \$2,601.09, for home missions \$257.60, making a grand total of \$3,356.20 received during the year.

Again this year at Yearly Meeting we gathered for a fine banquet. Men of the Friends Brotherhood joined us for the meal. After their leaving, our program, based on the medical theme, was carried out, with an offering of over \$500 received to buy clinical supplies for use by Wilma Roberts in Bolivia. FRIENDS BROTHERHOOD

● 48. The president, Robert Nordyke, presided and read the following report which was accepted:

The past year has been one of progress and development in the work of the Friends Brotherhood. This organization came into existence about five years ago and was known for a time as the Friends Extension League. It grew out of the need for an organization that would promote the spiritual life and fellowship of the men of the Yearly Meeting and provide an avenue through which they could unite in service to the church.

The Brotherhood is vitally interested in the growth of the Yearly Meeting, especially in seeing Friends work started in new areas of the northwest. At present they are sponsoring the development of a Friends church at Spokane. This project is to be continued for the coming year. The men of the Yearly Meeting are urged to pledge \$1.00 per month for the support of the pastor and the establishment of a building fund. During the past year \$1700.00 has been paid to Clark Smith in salary, \$37.50 has been contributed to a chair fund, and \$70.35 has been contributed to the building fund.

Local and Quarterly Meeting Brotherhood units have also engaged in various projects. In Marion Monthly Meeting, the men have constructed a Sunday school addition to the church building. A gospel team from the Portland Quarter Brotherhood has traveled 5500 miles and held 27 services. An evangelistic emphasis in this Quarter has resulted in six men seeking spiritual help at the altar during Brotherhood meetings. The Idaho Brotherhoods have promoted and supported the development of a Llama herd for the mission farm in Bolivia. Various other projects have been engaged in.

Interest and concern in the Brotherhood work has grown during the past year. Objectives are becoming more clearly defined and a spirit of unity and cooperation has increased.

We thank the Lord for this blessing and look forward to a year of increasing accomplishment for God and the church.

BOARD OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

- 57. Kelsey Hinshaw, president of the board, presided and presented the following report which was accepted:

Goals for 1952-1953

Peace: Every member informed as to the statements in our Discipline on peace, and the Scriptural basis for our peace principles.

Literature: Encourage the reading of good literature and the establishment of church libraries. Educate in regard to harmful comics and objectional radio programs and advertising. Oppose obscene magazines, especially those which cannot pass through the mails.

Stewardship: Every member a tither. Stewardship of time, talents, and all of life.

Education: Every child in a Christian school. Encourage the \$25 pledge campaign for our college. Encourage our young people to attend our college. Encourage an aid fund, raised by our meetings, for deserving students.

Public Morals: Help elect and stand behind public officials who have good moral standards. Promote total abstinence from the use of alcoholic beverages and from tobacco. Promote social purity for both sexes. Seek to raise our public moral standards.

Reports indicate that many meetings have made progress, some a great deal of progress, toward reaching one or more of these goals. We feel, however, that very few meetings have made adequate effort to meet all the goals. In the field of peace particularly is there a wide divergence noted. Here the greatest, as well as perhaps the least, progress is evident in different meetings.

Some meetings have made commendable progress in the teaching and practice of stewardship. Some meetings are planning to assist financially certain of their own deserving young people to attend George Fox College, and at least one Quarterly Meeting has set up its own George Fox College scholarship. Most, if not all, of our meetings have done more or less active work in the field of public morals. In a few cases marked progress has been made in developing church libraries.

The Public Relations Board has paid for and made arrangements to have research materials relating to the alcohol problem sent to each of our meetings throughout the year. A course of study and a bibliography covering part of the field of public morals has been prepared and will be made available. Some work has been done in this direction in the field of peace.

The president recommended that the Yearly Meeting should express opposition to: 1. Universal Military Training. 2. Liquor Advertising. 3. Inter-state liquor advertising. 4. Federal government spending so much for liquor.

The meeting favored the recommendations, and the president is given authority to speak for the Yearly Meeting on these problems.

Dilla Tucker presented a challenging message on good literature. She used as a text: "How shall I go up to my father and the lad be not with me?" Genesis 44:34. She showed how important it was to know what advertising a child is seeing and what books and stories he is reading. She made some suggestion of good magazines and literature.

Kelsey Hinshaw showed how important it is for America to turn to God, as it is the only thing that can save the United States. He said there were three books that one should have and read: Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting, the Bible, the pamphlet "The Bible and War." Another book that is useful, to young parents especially was, "How to Teach Obedience."

Stewardship was another topic presented. He said we should recognize God's ownership of everything. God loves His children, and His children show their love by the gifts that they give back to

Him. The church has lost much in spirituality because it has neglected to pay the tithe.

The Yearly Meeting wished to go on record that they protest the appointment of an ambassador to the Vatican.

● 58. At the opening of the inspirational period Roy Clark led the meeting in the singing of choruses.

Charles DeVol read Psalms 121. He told of his definite call to China, and how wonderfully God cared for him and supplied his needs during the 14 months in Shanghai after Pearl Harbor, and during the months in internment camp.

● 59. Frederick Baker offered the closing prayer.

● 60. At the close of the devotional period Richard Wiles led in prayer.

● 61. Christie Bundy, who recently returned from missionary work in Japan, was introduced to the meeting. She told how helpful the various articles sent to her had been in reaching the people for Christ.

● 62. Epistles from Western Yearly Meeting, Ohio Yearly Meeting and Kansas Yearly Meeting were read.

● 63. The epistle prepared by our epistle committee to be sent to other meetings was read and approved. The meeting favored sending this epistle to other Yearly Meetings with the same conditions as before.

GREENLEAF ACADEMY

● 64. The Greenleaf Academy report was read by the principal, Arthur Winters, and was approved as it appears below:

The 1951-52 school year at Greenleaf Academy saw the highest enrollment in the history of the school—87 students, or an increase of 13 per cent over the previous year. The prospects for the coming year look even better than that, and it is expected that we will have students here from Oregon, Washington, Northern Idaho, California, Iowa, Missouri, and perhaps other states.

Those in attendance at Yearly Meeting can see the most recent addition to the physical plant of the academy in the form of a new gymnasium which, it is hoped, will be completed during the fall months of this year. Such a gymnasium does not lend an undue emphasis on the athletics program of the school, in that the building will be used for all-round purposes in the community. Clean, wholesome social life will have its center there in the form of school and class parties, programs, banquets, besides facilities for dramatization. The athletic program gives emphasis to good sportsmanship, and the influence of a Christian coach in the lives of the boys is of inestimable value. It is also worthwhile to note that the athletic program is entirely self-supporting and is not subsidized in any way.

It is quite generally known that the academy has carried off top ratings in the State Music Festival for the past two years. Music has a prominent place in the school, and smaller musical groups are organized each year in the form of quartets, sextets, etc. This use of music is of great help in the deputation work connected with the school, as various groups go to Sunday schools and churches here and there and help in gospel services.

It is the goal of the administration and the board of managers

to make every department equally strong. In some departments this has been made possible through gifts for equipment so that the physical plant will be adequate. This is especially true in the home economics department, where much of the equipment has come through donations and gifts from interested people. The commercial department has also been helped in this way to some extent. With the addition of the shop building which joins the new gym, the shop and manual arts will become much stronger this coming year.

A girls' dormitory will be opened and maintained under competent leadership for girls from out of town. This is also an expansion over previous years.

Greenleaf Academy still retains its accreditation status, and is recognized as an accredited four-year high school in the state of Idaho.

But most important of all is the emphasis on the spiritual life of the student, and the concern that each student come to a saving knowledge of our Lord and Savior, and then become established, rooted and built up in the faith. To save our youth from the evils of our present day, as found in our public high schools throughout the country, is ample justification for the existence of the academy (our only Friends secondary school in the Northwest), and we earnestly ask and desire the support of Friends everywhere, and of Oregon Yearly Meeting. It is well known that many of our students go to George Fox College upon graduating here. It may further be said that George Fox College needs Greenleaf Academy and Greenleaf Academy needs George Fox College; Oregon Yearly Meeting needs both.

The following communication was presented to the Executive Committee by Ivan Adams, president of the board of trustees of George Fox College, in behalf of said college:

Recognizing that George Fox College, Newberg, Oregon, is our own Yearly Meeting college, and that it is controlled by Oregon Yearly Meeting by its appointment of one-half the members of the college corporation and two-fifths of the members of the college board, with final approval of all other corporation and board members: and further recognizing that the basic financial support of the college is the responsibility of the members of Oregon Yearly Meeting, and since the college has for some time been attempting to secure 1000 memberships in its \$25.00 club, and further recognizing that no provision for the support of the college is included in the United Budget, we hereby recommend that monthly meetings permit and encourage college representatives under the direction of its president or administrative committee to solicit support for the college privately and in public meetings as satisfactory arrangements may be made.

The Executive Committee approved of this plan.

GEORGE FOX COLLEGE ANNUAL REPORT

66. The Four Flats sang two numbers.

Dean Donald McNichols presided and read the annual report of the president of George Fox College as it appears below:

During 1951-52 there were a total of 123 regular students enrolled in George Fox College. This included eighteen seniors, twenty-five juniors, thirty-nine sophomores, and thirty-one freshmen. Besides these there were thirty-nine special music students.

Thirteen church groups were represented as follows: Christian Missionary Alliance, one; United Missionary, one; Episcopal, one; Assembly of God, one; Inter-Denominational, two; Presbyterian, two; Methodist, two; Baptist, two; United Presbyterian, three; Congregational, three; Free Methodist, five; Evangelical United Brethren, seven; and Friends, ninety-one.

Nineteen seniors received the A.B. degree, one the B.S. and one the Th.B. degree. Some of these had formerly completed nearly all of their work and were not registered in the regular classes of this year. Following is a list of these graduates: Norma Dillon Beebe, B.A.; William Lester DeLapp, B.A.; Priscilla May Doble, B.A.; Wilbur Cyrus Field, B.A.; Ray Kenneth Fitch, B.A.; Gay Foley, B.A.; Bethlin Judd Harmon, B.A.; Howard Earl Harmon, B.A.; Wilma E. Harris, B.A.; Betty Street Hockett, B.A.; Donna Jane Jefferson, B.A.; Gerald R. Lemmons, B.A.; Elvin Ray Mardock, B.S.; William Arnett Mardock, B.A.; Paul James Puckett, B.A.; Clifton J. Ralphs, B.A.; Frank Freeman Starkey, B.A.; Hubert LaVerne Thornburg, B.A.; John Russell Williams, B.A.; Larry Edward Wyman, B.A.; Ronald St. Clair Crecelius, Th.B.

The fall revival services were held by Robert Waggoner, pastor of the First E.U.B. Church in Portland. A number of young people responded to these messages and received definite spiritual help.

Chapel attendance was required daily of all students, and an excellent list of speakers was secured for religious inspiration and academic subjects. Nearby Friends pastors contributed greatly by their chapel messages.

In February a missionary conferette was presented with an all-day Saturday meeting. This included many excellent missionaries, particularly representatives from the Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship group. In April, again the second annual George Fox College missionary conference was held. To this there was excellent response both in the college and the local church. Our vision was enlarged and the Foreign Mission Fellowship of the college has experienced the best attendance and interest of any time since its organization.

Worthy students were aided with financial help from various gifts as follows: \$1000.00 from a large corporation; just at the close of the calendar year a \$2500.00 gift was received from a Newberg business firm, thus enabling us to complete the year with all bills paid. This latter gift, however, was used in meeting general expenses of the college. \$660.00 was also raised specifically for use of student scholarships. The sum of \$1116.67 was provided for the sons and daughters of ministers. Class scholarships in the amount of \$200.00 were used by two individuals, a sophomore and a junior. \$450.00 was provided for Quarterly Meeting scholarships by the college. Three high school scholarships totalling \$450.00, were

provided for students from Greenleaf Academy, Sherwood High School, and West Linn High School. In addition to this, student aid for two foreign student scholarships brought the total expenditure for student scholarships to \$2876.67.

It was necessary, in beginning the 1951-52 school year, to install a rebuilt boiler in Canyon Hall.

The past fiscal year saw a net financial increase of \$10,846.44. The expenditures of administrative expenses show a saving of \$5,014.00 under the amount which had been budgeted for that department.

Preliminary application for accreditation in the Northwest Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools was made during the month of August 1951. In the following November a formal application for accreditation, which consisted of fifty-nine mimeographed pages and comprising a report to the Commission on Higher Schools of the Northwest Association, was made. This led to an examination of the school by a committee of three members from the accrediting association. At the annual association meeting held in Spokane, Washington, in December, George Fox College was reviewed, and we received friendly personal comment upon the many excellent advances toward the standards of accreditation. The college, however, did not come before the main body for voting, but shortly thereafter we received an encouraging critique and written request to continue our application for accreditation during the 1952-53 school year.

The gymnasium was improved by waterproofing the outside of the building. The athletic equipment debt was liquidated by excellent donations from the Newberg Women's Auxiliary, the college Student Body, and from friends. A splendid gift of new books was made possible to the college library by the Newberg Friends Meeting. All departments of the college are to be commended for their splendid contributions to the excellent functions of the school. Friends churches and others were greatly blessed by the representative ministry of our deputation teams and music groups.

The representatives recommend that the proposition from Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting relative to combining the Yearly Meeting United Budget and the Fixed Expense, with apportionment to the monthly meetings based on their resident active members, not be adopted.

However, the representative body was united in the belief that the present financial system of the Yearly Meeting is not satisfactory. Therefore, we recommend that the Yearly Meeting appoint a committee, upon nomination by a deliberative body, to study the Yearly Meeting financial structure with a mind towards a revision; such a committee to bring its findings and recommendations to our Yearly Meeting a year hence.

It was the opinion of this body that, if such a committee be appointed, it might well confer with the Executive Committee and with the Quarterly Meetings to help give it direction in these findings and recommendations.

BOARD OF FINANCE

● 72. Oliver Weesner, president of the board, presided, and read the following report which was approved:

The following report from the committee in charge of the Ministers and Missionaries Retirement Fund has been received:

During the year those eligible for the Retirement Fund membership were contacted by mail four times, three times by letter and once by card. These served the dual purpose of giving the members their financial standing and notice of payments due, and also information and promotional features for the non-member. Information was also given at Yearly Meeting to the ministers, and again at the Ministers' Conference in the spring.

Ten new members were added this year, one membership revived, and six have thus far availed themselves of the opportunity to make up delinquent payments. One member removed from the Yearly Meeting and withdrew his funds. There are twenty-three active members at present.

Many are appreciative of the effort of the Yearly Meeting in this cooperative way to provide something for the time of retirement.

For the best interests of the fund it will be necessary to keep our money loaned out. Borrowers should be encouraged to keep up their interest payments. It takes over seventeen years for \$100 to double itself at 4% interest. Many of our pastors have but little opportunity to make preparation in a financial way for the time when they are unable to carry the burdens of a pastorate.

The committee also reported the following:

Marion H. Cook of Agnew, Washington, on November 10, 1951, made application through this committee for retirement fund benefit.

The application is in order and conditions according to Articles 5 and 6, page 108, of our Discipline. This committee approves honoring the application as provided in Article 9, page 109, of our Discipline.

The Board of Finance approves the application.

The Board recommends that the Yearly Meeting treasurer's books be closed for annual audit on July 15 of each year. We also recommend that all meetings close their treasurer's books promptly on June 30 and forward at once all funds then available for the Yearly Meeting to the Quarterly Meeting treasurers, and that the Quarterly Meeting treasurers forward all Yearly Meeting funds on hand to the Yearly Meeting treasurer so as to reach him before July 15.

- 79. Dean Gregory spoke on behalf of the Western Evangelical Seminary at Jennings Lodge as Paul Petticord, the president of the institution, could not be present.

- 80. Roy Clark led the meeting in singing a number of hymns.

Charles E. DeVol brought a message on the topic: Water of Life. John 4:14. Water exists in three forms: liquid, solid, gas. As it changes from one to the other nothing is added and nothing is removed. Jesus said, "I and my Father are one; I am going but I will pray the Father, and He shall give you another Comforter, that He may abide with you forever."

Water is composed of two colorless gases, oxygen and hydrogen. In the nature of God there are two aspects: Love for the sinner, and hatred of sin. Some things cannot be taken into heaven—the greatest sin can be forgiven but the least sin cannot come into heaven. Water is absolutely essential for life, and in the spiritual realm the "water of life" satisfies everyone who will partake.

- 81. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 p.m.

The Executive Committee recommends that the representatives be requested to nominate a committee of five persons to consider the possibilities of an expanded radio program in the Yearly Meeting, with the financial burden of broadcasts to be borne on the local level, and report back.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

- 86. Due to the illness and absence of Ray Carter, president of the board, Oscar Brown presided and read the following report which was accepted:

The message of our Lord to the church in Philadelphia is apropos to Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends: "Behold, I have set before thee an open door, and no man can shut it; for thou hast a little strength."

The Board of Evangelism is challenged by the wide-open doors before us. We live in an hour of unprecedented opportunity. The Pacific Northwest is, at the present time, the fastest growing section in the United States. Vast territories are being opened up and rapidly settled. Many of the larger denominations are moving in as fast as possible, but are unable to keep pace with the growing population. As a result, there are large areas that remain wholly unchurched. These fields are wide open to Friends. If we get the vision and act, we can enter them. Like the church at Philadelphia, Oregon Yearly Meeting has "a little strength"—not as much, perhaps, as some of our larger sister denominations—but we have "a little." And the "little," if dedicated to God, can be made much under His blessing. Even five loaves and two fishes were multiplied to feed five thousand people. That would double Oregon Yearly Meeting.

To show how God's trains meet—i.e., how, when a need develops He has ready the supply for that need—many of our young people have caught the vision of these open doors. Young men and women, trained in our schools, are offering their consecrated young lives and talents for this program of church outreach. They are doing this, fully aware of the personal sacrifice involved.

Furthermore, some of our experienced pastors, moved with the challenge of our opportunities, are either going, or are offering to go, into this field of service. The pastor of one of our older churches is closing his pastorate this year, and is going to southern Oregon for the sole purpose of entering a new field and starting another Friends meeting. Another successful pastor has offered himself to the Board for outpost work if, and when, a suitable pastor can be found to fill his present position. Still another pastor is leaving an established church to take over a preparative meeting where there is splendid prospect of growth in an undeveloped field.

Then, too, many of our lay members who have moved to unchurched districts, and who see the need first-hand, have taken the initiative in getting Friends meetings started. A work in this way has spontaneously sprung up at Eugene, Oregon. Since last Yearly Meeting a few families in Eugene, seeing the need, first organized a regular mid-week prayer meeting. The interest grew. Then they organized an outpost meeting, with officers and committees; and now they have called one of our young men to come and take pastoral charge of the work. They have furthermore chosen a parcel of land which they expect to buy soon, with the prospect of building when the time seems propitious.

In Kennewick, Washington, in the Columbia River basin, a few Friends have been meeting for prayer each week. They want a Friends church in Kennewick. They are anxious to organize as an outpost, and to call a pastor. One of the group has offered to give the land on which a church may be erected.

Other points might be mentioned, where concerned Friends have gone in and organized a work, such as at Cambridge, Idaho, which was started less than a year ago by Gerald and Elaine Settle Cronk. So it goes!

As the Board of Evangelism meets from time to time to consider these open doors, and to ponder the offers of consecrated young men and women to give their time and talents to the outreach of Oregon Yearly Meeting, and to consider the offers of pastors—is it any wonder that the Board members are stirred with the challenge of it all? Like the Apostle Paul we can say, “a great door and effectual is opened unto us,” but, we must add, as did the apostle, that “there are many adversaries.” The adversary knows how to hinder; he knows how to delay, and bring frustration, and even defeat, if we are not led and inspired by the blessed Holy Spirit of God.

We ask your earnest prayers for this Board as it seeks to carry this responsibility. Pray that we may know what fields to enter, and when, and that adequate funds to carry on this work may be provided.

Pray also for our outpost and preparative meeting workers, who are in the front-line of this outreach program. Uphold their hands! Few people realize the sacrifice they are making for this work.

In conclusion, we should like to report that the Hillsboro “Call,” which was sent out this year, resulted in gifts amounting to approximately \$2500.00. For this we praise God! Hillsboro expects to begin building immediately after Yearly Meeting.

The new preparative meeting at Netarts (by the sea) is at the present time in process of erecting its new building. Much to the credit of this meeting, it is carrying on its building program without Yearly Meeting assistance. It would be a fine gesture if many of our people would extend a helping hand to Netarts in this difficult period of church construction.

We wish we had the space and time to mention the growing work at Spokane. But this is being reported elsewhere. Suffice it to say that this work is making marvelous progress, and is an example of what can be done under wise leadership and the interest and support of the Yearly Meeting.

As we come to the close of this church year, the Board of Evangelism feels as did Samuel when he “took a stone, and set it between Mizpeh and Shen, and called the name of it Ebenezer, saying, Hitherto hath the Lord helped us.”

As we enter upon the new year, we do so with the assurance that He will still help us if we follow His leadership, and seek and obtain His anointing.

He said the idea of the Yearly Meeting now is to give a man enough to move on and enough to settle on, and then let him make his own way. He told of Edward Harmon’s leading to go to Ashland.

Wayne and Willa Piersall are located in Eugene, and Willa told of the progress of the work there.

Edward Harmon told of his call to Ashland and how they are planning to make their own way and not be dependent on the Evangelistic Board.

Dean Gregory sang, “Sweet Will of God.”

Charles E. DeVol brought a message, saying this is a crisis hour, and we need the great Head of the church to direct. May God give us freshness of outlook, and help us to enter new fields. The burden belongs to all, not just to the pastor who goes out.

Paul Cammack asked God’s blessing on the work of all who are going out in His name.

The loss of forty members in one year leaves that many vacant chairs in our homes, and many vacancies in our church services.

The Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight proposes to Oregon Yearly Meeting that Chapter III, Section I, subsection B, paragraph 8 of the Constitution and Discipline, Part II, which appears on page 61 and has reference to the transfer of ministers, be amended to read:

8. TRANSFER OF MINISTERS. Every certificate of transfer of membership issued on behalf of a minister shall include a statement of his position as a minister. Transfer within the limits of the Yearly Meeting shall carry both membership and position to the meeting receiving it. One who transfers from another Yearly Meeting of Friends shall be received by certificate as a member, and, unless he has been called to serve as a pastor, his position as a

minister shall be referred to the Yearly Meeting Committee on Ministry for consideration. In such case, he shall not be listed as a minister unless the Committee reports favorably to the monthly meeting where he has been received.

It is further proposed that Part III, Chapter I, Section I, paragraph 1, which appears on page 73 and refers to application for membership, be amended by the addition of this phrase:

(comma) or to a preparative meeting through its pastor or pastoral committee.

Frederick Baker read the following report of the Board of Publication:

"... The Word of the Lord was published throughout all the region." Acts 13:49.

This is the tenth annual report of the Board of Publication of Oregon Yearly Meeting, and the tenth year of publication of "The Northwest Friend," as such.

It was in June, 1942, that the "Friendly Endeavor," official Christian Endeavor publication, was changed to a Yearly Meeting publication to be known as the "Northwest Friend."

It was also in June, 1942, that recommendation was made that a Publication Board be named by the Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting.

The report was approved and the recommendations were referred to the Executive Committee. (See page 36, Minutes of Oregon Yearly Meeting for 1942.)

In the minutes of June, 1943, the following recommendation from the Executive Committee was approved: "The Publication Board of the Northwest Friend requests that its functions be enlarged to include authorization to build up a revolving publication fund and to publish books, pamphlets, and other church and Sunday school literature as need may arise and the Board may deem wise."

This recommendation was approved. (See page 23, Minutes of 1943)

When our new discipline was adopted in 1945 the following statement was included:

"The Board of Publication is authorized to publish the Yearly Meeting periodical, and is responsible for the appointment of its editorial staff and for all editorial and financial responsibilities concerning it. It is further authorized to build and administer a revolving fund and to publish books, pamphlets, and other church and Bible school literature as need may arise and the Board may deem wise." Page 98 in the discipline.

"Publication Sunday" was observed this year on February 17 in most of our churches; on a later date in some of them.

"Publication Sunday" offerings amounted to \$305.48, for which we as a board are indeed thankful.

The publication of eleven issues of "The Northwest Friend" continues to be our major responsibility on this tenth anniversary. Over two thousand copies are now printed monthly, giving full news coverage to our constituency.

The Quaker bulletin service is now used by 30 of our churches, with a circulation of over 3,000 copies printed weekly. During the year arrangements were made with "The Layman Tithing Corporation" to have our bulletins contain some of their tithing literature.

Aside from "The Northwest Friend," the largest project this year has been the printing of the book "Outreach," written by Milo C. Ross, and published by our board on behalf of the Board of Evangelism. It seems fitting that this book should be released on the event of our sixtieth anniversary, when in a new way, Oregon Yearly Meeting has viewed the whitened harvest fields.

Five hundred copies of this book have been printed to be sold as reasonably as possible. The price of the book is \$2.00. We deem it worthy of wide circulation.

"The Soul Cry of the Aymara" has been printed during the year as a part of the Northwest Friend, giving us larger issues at these times.

The Yearly Meeting United Budget book was printed this year on behalf of the Executive Committee in order to give the Yearly Meeting factual information of its program.

Missionary calendars were again printed this year.

"The Hillsboro call" was printed for the Board of Evangelism.

A handbook was printed for the Board of Christian Education.

The Yearly Meeting printed programs were also made available this year through the Board of Publication.

Because the press is maintained we are able to serve in printing the Christian Endeavor calendars, the annuals for Greenleaf Academy and George Fox College, and much other material which various individuals and groups have had printed. This year the Yearly Meeting Minutes were printed by the press at a cost of \$650.00, saving \$197.00 over last year.

During the past year the Board has endeavored to meet every other month for prayer and planning.

We appreciate the work of our printers, Ray L. Carter and Ralph Fletcher, very much. We are thankful, too, for their wives who have so faithfully assisted them in this phase of our church work.

We feel the board is realizing its goal of being of help to every part of our Yearly Meeting work.

We request that Publication Sunday be observed this year on February 15, 1953, and that an offering be received for this phase of gospel evangelism.

For the coming year we propose:

1. To make the Northwest Friend the best church paper possible.

We need the cooperation of everyone to accomplish this goal. The Northwest Friend is supposed to be sent to every family. This goal can only be realized as membership lists are kept up to date. It is desired that every church have a correspondent, that our editor be supplied with up-to-the-minute news, and plenty of gloss pictures.

2. To have an informed constituency. In order to realize this goal we offer the services of the Board of Publication to every department of our church.

3. That the challenge of the printed page be brought to the attention of our people. One of the most effective ways to spread the gospel is through the printed page. Will you remember this work of the Board in your prayers? We invite designated gifts for the work of the Board. We suggest that the Publication Board be remembered when people make out their wills.

4. That there be developed an increased loyalty to the publications of "The George Fox Press," printers of evangelical Friends

Sunday school literature, true to the faith. Will you pray much for the Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends, its editors and board members? This is a joint project of Oregon, Kansas and Ohio Yearly Meetings.

5. That there be a wider release of our own Publication Board material through the medium of the Better Book and Bible House and other such agencies. We suggest purchase of the book "Outreach" for gifts to pastors, church libraries, and even for Christmas presents.

The remaining number shall be appointed by the Yearly Meeting on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

The board shall organize by the appointment of a president, a vice president, and a secretary. It may appoint other officers and such committees as are needed to carry on its affairs. For specific responsibilities of the board, see page 96.

On page 96, delete from the first paragraph the phrase, "stewardship, for promoting more systematic and liberal giving on the part of the members;"

On page 98, add another Section as follows:

Section IX—Stewardship

1. THE YEARLY MEETING BOARD. The Board of Stewardship shall endeavor to promote throughout the membership of the Yearly Meeting a deep sense of the importance of personal faithfulness to the trust committed to all in the form of time, talent, and money. While being careful to give proper place to each of these phases of stewardship, it shall carry on a consistent and forceful program of education and promotion in behalf of a more general practice of tithing and of giving beyond the tithe. It shall assist and encourage those in like responsibility in the subordinate meetings.

The executive committee of the board shall consist of its officers, and shall be responsible for putting into effect the program of the board as planned in its regular meetings.

2. THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEE. Each quarterly meeting shall appoint a stewardship committee. The committee shall work in cooperation with the Yearly Meeting board, of which its chairman shall be a member, by active participation in its program.

3. THE MONTHLY MEETING COMMITTEE. Each monthly meeting shall appoint a stewardship committee, and may, when advisable, appoint a committee for each preparative meeting. The committee shall be responsible to the monthly meeting for promoting the realization of the responsibilities of stewardship among its members.

Field Mission Council

The Field Mission Council is made up of the various missionaries in actual service on our field. This group has the responsibility of

overseeing and promoting the field program in collaboration with the Board of Foreign Missions. As a purely democratic group, we have experienced harmony and sensed a blessed leadership of the Spirit during the months of this past year. Ralph Chapman as chairman, and Phyllis Cammack as secretary, were the group's officials during the year. The various phases of the work were maintained under the following leadership: Evangelistic secretary, Ralph Chapman; agricultural secretary, Paul Cammack; educational secretary, Roscoe Knight with Marie Chapman in charge of day schools; construction secretary, Ralph Chapman, with the collaboration of Marshal Cavit; director of the Helen Cammack Memorial Bible Training School, Roscoe Knight; editor of the "Soul Cry of the Aymara," and the field publication "Amigo Suyu" (Your Friend), Phyllis Cammack; field treasurer, Ralph Chapman; bookkeeper, Marie Chapman.

Marshal and Catherine Cavit continue to give themselves unstintingly to the work. Their labors of love in the evangelistic program have made possible a healthy growth in this phase of our work, and they find themselves endeared to the hearts of the believers over the entire field. We also gratefully acknowledge that we are debtors to the Cavits for the constant financial assistance which they have given to needy points of the field during the past year.

We were happy to receive the Hibbses into our missionary family upon their arrival in Bolivia, in October, 1951. Previous to settling at the farm, Leland and Iverna busied themselves in language study in La Paz. Iverna taught a class in the Bible School this past year, and Leland has proven himself a very capable apprentice on the intricacies of Bolivian farming.

Bolivian Friends Church

(Iglesia Nacional Evangelica "Los Amigos")

Praise be unto God for His faithfulness in answering prayer on behalf of the organizing of the Bolivian Friends Church (INELA). During the year we made use of every opportunity to instruct the brethren concerning this important step. Repeated preaching and instruction along the lines of stewardship, church management, and the sanctified life, which is the basis for Christian living, were the order of the day. The main emphasis in the missionaries' visitation program over the field was to help the believers realize that if the work is to grow, they must meet their obligations before God in tithing and endeavoring to make the churches self-supporting. In various places we often had responses that caused us to wonder how unanimous the new step would be, but at the same time we felt certain that this was the Lord's will, and that He would hear and answer prayer. The Mesa Directiva set up at the Yearly Meeting in 1951 met monthly to assume direct charge of the evangelistic program of the field. The first meeting of church representatives to study the church's maintenance program was held in January. More constructive study was given to the program from then until the Yearly Meeting in April, 1952. It was during this meeting that the final step was taken by the church representatives to officially organize themselves in the name of the Iglesia Nacional Evangelica Los Amigos. The recommendation of the representatives was placed before the meeting at large and was adopted without a dissenting vote. Thus, on Sunday morning, April 13, 1952, the INELA or Bolivian Friends

Church was born. The many obstacles overcome give evidence of the fact that the victory won was nothing short of answer to prayer; for this we praise God. As a direct result of the new step of faith, we have not so much as lost a single church or a single worker, but rather the unity over the field is better than it has been for some time. Certainly this gives evidence that the Lord is leading. As you continue to remember the Bolivian Friends Church in prayer, do not forget to offer praise for the victories already won!

Yearly Meeting and Field Conference

In at least two ways, the Yearly Meeting in La Paz, held during Easter week in April, will long be remembered. First of all, usual preparations had been made for the meeting; the large gospel tent had been erected in the back patio; and the kitchen had been made ready for preparing the meals. Wednesday morning we awoke to the realization that we were in the midst of a revolution. It turned out to be one of the worst revolutions in Bolivian history. Naturally our Yearly Meeting plans were interrupted, and not until Saturday were we able to conduct services in the church without the noisy distractions offered by the events in the street. However, on Saturday and Sunday we endeavored to crowd in all that we had contemplated accomplishing during the entire week. The Lord was precious near and blessed every class, lesson and message, and we felt that the time spent during that week was far from being in vain.

The other memorable item concerning the past Yearly Meeting has to do with the adoption of the National Church. Since this was an important step in the Mission's history, we feel that its accomplishment, another milestone has been passed.

Apart from the Yearly Meeting in La Paz, five field conferences were held during the past year, as follows: Ojje in June, Achachikala in July, Mina Fabulosa in August, Pucarani in September, and Amacari in November. The national pastors have assumed a greater responsibility for the working out of the conference programs. One or more missionaries were usually present to aid in showing pictures and in preaching. We feel that the Lord definitely blessed the many classes and preaching of these conferences to help our believers live Christian lives.

Transportation

The mission jeep has been in constant use, and has traveled over many jolting miles of Bolivian roads in the interest of the evangelistic program. The International pick-up is used almost entirely on the farm where it is constantly needed for hauling. Occasional trips are made with it in the vicinity of the farm to transport Bible School boys on evangelistic trips. Cavits' jeep station-wagon, as well as the jeeps of the families living at the farm, have all been used in the interest of the work as a whole.

Evangelistic Report

With the increased leadership on the part of the national pastors, our work in the evangelistic field has been mainly that of church visitation and conference work. We rejoice that the brethren are assuming more responsibility. Mariano Baptista, the president of the Mesa Directiva, and Martin Perez, the national evangelistic

secretary, have both been very active in church visitation and in promoting the interests of the national church. Mariano is in charge of the conferences, and Martin devotes the major portion of his time to church visitation. We have paid visits to practically every point on our field during the past year, with the more frequent visits to those places demanding more attention.

It has been the plan developed during this past year that all church business, such as constructional work, problems concerning church maintenance, etc., must be presented to the Mesa Directiva, and not directly to the missionary council. This, together with enlarged responsibilities of specific evangelistic nature, has resulted in a notable growth in the leadership among the brethren themselves.

We have twenty-two preaching points where regular services are conducted. In addition to these are a number of new points where services are conducted with the help of workers sent out from the established congregations. All of the preaching points are taken care of by national workers except Copajira—either full-time pastors or workers who assume their duties on Sundays according to the appointments made by their churches. Many of the places conduct week-night services, even in the absence of a pastor or worker.

The monthly publication of the paper "Your Friend" has been a preaching and study aid to the pastors over the field.

The gospel tent and public address systems have been used in conferences, special meetings, and evangelistic open-air services during festivals. The several thousand tracts distributed during the year is another means employed to give out the gospel message to the lost.

The Cavits have been very active in the evangelistic work throughout the entire year. Marshal's report of their activities supplements this report.

Construction

In La Paz, the principal construction work has been the building of the Hadley Hall Annex. This is a two-story structure located between the church and Hadley Hall. The purpose of this building is to provide needed garage, office and storage space. With Hadley Hall converted into two apartments, the building of the new addition became necessary. The ground floor provides space for storage, as well as a double garage. The upper floor contains three rooms, two of these offices, with one for storage. At the present time, we have one room completed sufficiently to use it as a mission office. The other two rooms, as well as the finish on the front of the building, are not completed, due to the lack of funds. These we hope to complete as is possible to do so. In addition to this building, we added another room to the small house in the back patio, and thereby made a small, three-room apartment to help in the entertainment of the folks that come in from the farm, as well as occasional visitors. A stairway from the second floor apartment of Hadley Hall to the back patio has made possible a needed exit, and kitchen cabinets now under construction complete this type of work here.

Among the churches, the main construction has been in Chirapaca and Mina Milluni. Mina Milluni brethren have completed their church, and the building in Chirapaca is under roof. Details of these

are to be found in Marshal's report, since the Cavits have assumed the major responsibility for these constructions. Other remodeling or building of minor significance has been made in Isla Anapia, Chunavi, and Amacari.

Reports of remodeling and new construction work at Copajira will be found in the farm and Bible School reports.

Report of Mission Day Schools

"Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." Proverbs 22:6.

Christian training in the mission day schools is the thing of major emphasis, being more important than the study of the essentials of primary education.

The school year of 1951 closed in October with Roscoe Knight overseeing exams in seven schools. The 1952 school year began in February, with two schools waiting until March, due to lack of facilities or the illness of the teacher. We have eight schools with 180 students this year, with five of our own Friends boys, and four from outside, acting as teachers.

As more boys graduate from Bible School, we hope to be able to employ teachers entirely from our own churches, but as yet there are not enough boys sufficiently well trained.

We are thankful to report that school desks of fine quality, made by Marshal Cavit, were installed in the Chiripaca and Calata schools, thus relieving a desk shortage. Other equipment, such as flags, pictures of national heroes, soccer balls, etc., was also purchased for the schools as mission property.

In many ways these schools serve the communities in which they are located, and local authorities are quick to recognize their superiority over the government schools. For some children the school is their only contact with the gospel, and thus our responsibility to provide consecrated teachers is all the greater. Our prayer is that the boys and girls who attend the mission schools shall go out to be a testimony of the love of Jesus.

Helen Cammack Memorial Bible Training School

On August 1 the Bible Training School finishes its sixth year. Throughout the years it has been a definite blessing and help to many of the young men of our field. Now that we are sending forth graduates into the harvest as preachers, teachers and Christian workers, this blessing and help is expanding to all parts of the field. Through the years our numbers have been increasing until the college is now a well-known, well-recognized and well-received institution throughout our entire work.

This year has given us the largest student-body that we have had as yet. Of the 31 students who started the year, 4 dropped out, leaving us a total of 27 to finish the year. Of these, 8 are married. There are 13 first-year students, 8 second-year, and 6 third-year (seniors). Needless to say, with the increase of numbers, there has been an increase in problems, but the Lord has graciously given us wisdom and worked out the differences among the students. Courses

of study include classes with detailed study of the entire Bible, normal training courses, homiletics, doctrine, Bible geography, church history, music, memory texts, prophecy, grammar and gym. Teachers are the members of the farm missionary staff.

The farm has adequately supplied all of the material needs of the school, both in farm produce and in cash. The school garden thrived extra well until we have had to buy practically no vegetables. As the enrollment has increased, so have the expenditures, but the farm is very capably, and easily, meeting all the needs.

Emphasis has been placed on the religious program, with two series of special services having been held during the year. These were times of definite advancement on the part of almost every student. Leland and Iverna Hibbs were the evangelists during the first week's revival, and Marshal Cavit held a series of holiness services in the middle of the year. Practically every Sunday some of the students have gone into the surrounding farms and communities carrying the gospel to the homes, thus giving the gospel message to darkened hearts and practical experience to the boys. At our Yearly Meeting time the school was well represented by the student's presentation of a Bible drama, special quartet music and short talks. It was the first drama of its type that has ever been presented, and was thoroughly enjoyed and appreciated by all.

Repair and remodeling have been of minor importance this year, with only a few changes having been made in some of the rooms and houses. One big addition has been the laying of a large concrete slab which serves as an outdoor gym. Our students know only one game, soccer, so we feel that the learning of new games will be a big help to them in winning the young people in their own communities.

There are six graduates this year, who, we trust, will be taking their places as pastors and teachers in the near future. (They are: Pascual Poma, Antonio Mamani, Eugenio Espinoza, Roberto Mamani, Domingo Flores and Joaquin Mamani.) Remember these young men, together with the first and second year students, in your prayers, as they have big responsibilities ahead of them. Last year's graduates are already assuming places of leadership, and some of this year's graduates will enter definite fields of service immediately upon graduation. Certainly, prepared and consecrated leadership is the answer to the ultimate success of the indigenous church.

Farm Report 1951-1952

The most outstanding event at the farm this year was the coming of the Leland Hibbs family. In addition to language study and work with the Bible School, the Hibbses have gradually taken over the full farm management.

Based on a comparison of the harvests on farms around us, our crops were good this year. One neighbor, owner of a large farm, classed our potato crop as "phenomenal." We didn't think that way, since our potato crop was less than that of last year. This was due to a dry time in February, and an infestation of a type of leaf worm—new to us here. We harvested about 125 tons of potatoes. Sorting, grading, and chuno-tunta making are nearing completion.

Our production of beardless barley was more than that of last

year, due partly to increased plantings. We had destructive hails, which reduced yields of this grain, but did greater damage to our fields of common barley.

We harvested sufficient quinoa and habas for the use of the Bible School. These two crops are not good money-makers in this locality, so their production is confined to the needs of the Bible School.

Taken together and judged, our crops were good this year. We praise the Lord!

The sales from the big potato yield of last year, in the form of potatoes, chunos, and tuntas, have done much to stabilize farm finances. The sale of grains was appreciable with a six-hundred-dollar holdover inventory, to be sold in the next year with the new crops.

The sheep, cows, and pigs have increased well and have been profitable. Buyers come to buy at the corrals. We are getting a name for having a good class of pigs. Most of the mutton goes to the school kitchen, but we will soon have surplus to sell. The school kitchen has used eighty-four sheep this year. As a result of "crosses" with better rams we realized a better price on wool this year.

Of great interest to all are our twenty-five recently purchased alpacas, which resemble llamas greatly. They were purchased, after several arduous trips, in preference to the llama, since the alpaca is more of a wool bearer and an easier animal to care for. Another twenty-five alpacas will be purchased in December. With the flock of fifty we hope to see a rapid increase in numbers, and the beginning of some profit on our high hill land that is unsuitable for sheep and cows. The money for the alpacas, three hundred and fifty-five dollars (\$355), was given by interested friends in the Yearly Meeting, with Boise meeting members taking the lead.

We have fifteen head of cattle now, and through an offering of the Greenleaf Brotherhood we bought a good holstein bull to cross with our ordinary cows, hoping eventually to add milk to the diet of the Bible School boys.

In our relationships with the Indians, we are now at the point of legally giving those eligible (twenty-two families) titles to their lands. Along with this transaction we are trying to get our rightful liberation from taxes on the farm. It appears likely that we may be granted this liberation from taxes this time, after having tried two times before and having been refused. We are still praying and working for the salvation of our Indians. We had had some new ones saved this year, but oh, the desperate need of the many!

The Bible School again has been supported through products and cash at a cost of about fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500). The rigorous and risky type of farming here only has meaning as we can see pastors, evangelists, and teachers of the gospel trained and sent.

The Witte Diesel light system and the gravity water system installed a year ago have functioned perfectly, and are sources of constant help and physical blessing to the students and missionaries.

The farm shipment this year, although costly, brought items much needed and impossible to buy here. Many friends contributed to this shipment and deserve our hearty thanks.

The newest building, nearing completion, is a new farm warehouse, with a tile roof. This building, with the other warehouse and storage buildings already finished, should serve our needs for some

years to come. Up to this year we had used money for new buildings and other capital expenditures from the capital fund sent to us by the Board of Missions. This year the farm assumed the capital expenses since the former fund had been depleted. This was an advance step for the farm since it meant the expenditure of thirteen hundred dollars (1300) additional.

We humbly give God the glory and honor for His material and spiritual blessings on the farm work. We feel that if we are faithful the Lord will continue to bless the farm as it saves souls by sending out workers.

Walter Lee read the report of the home board which appears below:

MISSIONARY PROGRAM

Presented by the Board of Missions

The Board of Missions rejoices in the Lord for the manifestation of His concern and power in the Bolivian missionary work entrusted

to Oregon Yearly Meeting. The continued expansion of the work and the increasing number of open doors are evidence of the work of the Holy Spirit in these crisis days. May our faith and consecration enlarge to meet the challenge.

The encouragement and active support of the missionary program by Dean Gregory, our general superintendent, has aided much in the development of the work this past year.

FIELD PROGRAM

The first graduating class of four students going forth from the Helen Cammack Memorial Bible School in August, 1951, and the increased student body of 1952, point to the fulfillment of a great concern for more and better prepared national Christian preachers and teachers. This calls for increased financial assistance from Oregon Yearly Meeting to push these men into new fields of service.

Because of the increasing need for more dormitory space at the Bible School, plans are prepared for a new administration building, thus permitting the use of the old building for a dormitory and larger dining hall. It is estimated that this building will cost \$3500, but it is a cause for great rejoicing that about \$1500 is already on hand for this in the form of three memorials—the McClintock memorial, the Heston memorial and the Lee memorial.

As will be noted in the report from the field, the mission farm has been so blessed of the Lord that all student costs in the Bible School, amounting to \$1500, and new building costs amounting to about \$1300, have been met by the income from the farm. In addition to this, a sizeable balance sufficient to carry the Bible School for a year has been placed in reserve in case of a bad crop year. The success of the farm is making possible the extension of cultivation of undeveloped land.

Mark and Wilma Roberts are making preparation to go to the mission field near the last of this year. Since Wilma is a registered nurse, plans are being made to enlarge the clinical service on the field as a means of increasing the opportunities to preach the gospel. Mark, in addition to preparing for farm and Bible School work, is hoping to gain some further knowledge of the technical side of radio in order to develop short-wave communication on the field, especially between La Paz and the farm. Since there are none of the regular forms of communication available between these points, the short-wave would be a decided help.

Since for several years, the United Budget pledges have fallen short of the askings, it was felt that it would be an added challenge and blessing to the Yearly Meeting to place the Roberts' support upon the basis of personalized giving, with the expectation that someone or more meetings or individuals would feel the call to this stewardship.

Marshal and Catherine Cavit, who are working with our mission, but supported by the National Holiness Missionary Society, will be moving to the farm to teach in the Bible School in the place of the Cammacks who are home on furlough.

Our mission farm has been chosen as the location for an Aymara language school for missionaries during a three-months course, from September to December of 1952. This course is under the direction of a trained language teacher, using methods similar to the Wycliff School here in the United States.

MISSION PROGRAM AT HOME

During the past year the Board of Missions has endeavored to reach all the meetings of the Yearly Meeting through the missionaries and the president of the board. The United Evangelistic conferences which were held in cooperation with the Board of Evangelism and the Yearly Meeting superintendent appear to have given an added vision and stimulus to missionary endeavor.

For the coming year the board plans area missionary conventions, using the missionaries on furlough and those under appointment. It is anticipated that these will be an encouragement and blessing to the churches.

A series of articles to be published in the Northwest Friend have been planned, and are now appearing, featuring different phases of the work in Bolivia.

It continues to be a deep concern of the board that prayer circles for our Bolivian work be established in the meetings of Oregon Yearly Meeting for God is able to meet the needs which far exceed our ability to meet.

THE CHALLENGE BEFORE US

With the door to Bolivia so wide open to the gospel at the present, with the calls for gospel help increasing, with an increasing number of national workers ready to enter new fields, and with concerns growing for the use of every possible method of evangelizing, the members of Oregon Yearly Meeting are being challenged to a consecration for a deeper prayer life and sacrificial giving that we may not miss the day of our visitation. May we joyfully join the Great Shepherd in bringing in the "other sheep that are not of this fold."

Phyllis Cammack sang, accompanied by Marilyn Lee, while Geraldine Willcuts made a drawing to accompany the music.

Dean Gregory spoke of his satisfaction in our missionary work. He thanks the Lord for what has been done. He said there is no stopping place in the work of evangelism.

Mark Roberts gave his testimony that he knew that the Lord had called him, and that He would give sufficient grace to meet all situations. He is thankful that he has a message for these people in Bolivia.

It is a challenge to the Yearly Meeting to meet the expense of the Roberts on the personalized basis, according to Walter Lee, and he hopes that some church and churches will undertake their support.

Jack Willcuts said the missionary relationships are very precious as they do so many things together—some pleasant and some unpleasant.

Phyllis Cammack told the story of Florentina, who worked with Helen Cammack, and later with the other missionaries. She had gone with Ralph and Marie Chapman to start missionary societies, and is now the president of the Women's Union in La Paz. She sent a gift of a tari to the missionary society. She requested that the women pray for her, and Phyllis Cammack asked our prayers for her and her husband, and also for the other young people there.

Paul Cammack told how hard it was to leave the missionaries as they had all gone through so much together. He told of their experiences in the revolution, but in the midst of it all they felt God's presence and protection. We need to give them all the gospel as soon as possible. He told the story of Francisco, which showed the power of God.

Charles DeVol led in a prayer of dedication.
