FACILITIES AND SCHEDULE

All classes are held at the Friends Educational Building in the center of Kotzebue.

Most classes are taught in the morning from 9 to 11:30. Where there is need for adjustment to work schedules, some classes will be scheduled in the evening from 7 to 9:30.

The credit-hour value of the classes is determined by the length of the "short-term". The formula of one credit hour for approximately 10 hours of class time will be followed.

Those registered for college credit must qualify for college admission and must pass the examinations in each course.

BIBLE SCHOOL CLASSES

During the winter months of November through February the following courses will be offered:

Christian Ethics
English Bible (poetic and prophetic books)
Techniques of Translation
Friends History
Typing

These courses are church-related and especially designed for those preparing for church vocations but are open to all who are interested. The Bible School faculty is Earl Perisho, A.B., and Abraham Bible, A.B.

REGISTRATION

Monday, October 9, registration will begin for all classes, beginning at 9 a.m. Registrants for the class in accounting may do so in the evening session at 7 p.m. Fees are payable at the time of registration.

LIBRARY AND BOOKSTORE

Some library facilities are available at the Educational Building and at the community library. Resources of the Alaska State library are available on loan.

A bookstore where school materials may be purchased is located in the Educational building. Diane Bible is director of the bookstore.

ATTENDANCE

Because of the concentrated nature of the short-term program, consistency in attendance is expected of all students. While no rigid system of attendance is enforced it is expected that those who register for classes will apply themselves to achieving the most possible. A monitored learning center for those working on courses by programmed instruction workbook is maintained during the winter months.

CREDITS AND TRANSCRIPTS

A record of all credits and grades earned at the extension center is kept on file at George Fox College and transcripts of credits are issued by the registrar. Courses taken at Kotzebue are applicable toward a college degree at George Fox College.

ORIGIN AND PURPOSE

The George Fox College extension program at Kotzebue is sponsored by the Friends churches of Alaska Yearly Meeting, comprising a dozen native churches and 2,500 members in the villages of the Kobuk area. It reflects the historic concern of Quakers for the development of the total person, intellectually and physically as well as spiritually, and was developed to provide higher educational opportunities for youth and adults in the community and surrounding area.

George Fox College, a Quaker liberal arts college in Oregon, is fully accredited by the Northwest Association of Higher Education and welcomes the opportunity to share its personnel and facilities to help provide this program.

For the past ten years the Friends Church has operated a Bible School in the Kobuk area for the training of native ministers and lay leaders. The college extension program will correlate its liberal arts curriculum with the Bible School schedule into an integrated program which will serve both the church and the community.

OBJECTIVES

The college center has two fundamental objectives in its program:

- 1 To provide accredited liberal arts college courses for those high school graduates (and high school seniors) who desire to earn credits toward a college degree.
- 2 To provide adult level education for those who desire to sharpen their skills. This may involve assistance in earming the GED equivalent to a high school diploma through self study and standard tests.

COLLEGE EXTENSION PROGRAM

Four basic educational techniques will be utilized in the college center program:

I - SHORT TERM CLASSES

Selected faculty personnel will be used for concentrated 2 to 4 week courses. In the first term, October 9 - November 3, the following classes are scheduled:

Intro. to Accounting & Bookkeeping (evening class 7-9:30pm) Consumer Economics Business Law Public Speaking Preparation & Delivery of Sermons Fundamentals of Music

Harold Wilhite, C.P.A., M.A., and Roy Clark, M.M. Ed., will teach these classes.

FEES: to cover expenses -\$15 per course for college credit \$5 per course for audit (non-cr) Books and materials extra

II - PROGRAMMED LEARNING

Self-instruction texts and workbooks are available in the following courses:

Mathematics
General Psychology
General Science
Sociology
Principles of Economics
Health Education
American History
Political Science

College credit will be given upon completion of the self-study books and passing of the examination.

III - CREDIT BY EXAMINATION

George Fox College offers the opportunity to receive up to 96 hours credit by examination, using the standard College Level Examination Program (CLEP). This involves self-study and preparation and the use of standard examinations. The following course credits are available through this program:

IV - ELECTRONIC MEDIA INSTRUCTION

Tape recordings, cassette, videotaped lectures, and the new "Slide-Sponder" technique of self-instruction will be utilized in the program as funds for equipment are made available.
