MINUTES OF OREGON YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS 1953

● 11. The Yearly Meeting clerks request that new appointments to the respective Boards be presented to the Yearly Meeting from day to day, immediately following each Board's presentation of their work.

This will fix new appointments more clearly in our minds and will also avoid the rush of business at the closing session of Yearly Meeting.

This was approved by the meeting.

● 12. The reports of the State of the Church were received from all the Quarterly Meetings and a summary of the same appears below:

The general spiritual condition of all churches is for the most part good. Some churches report a lack of unity but they are striving through prayer to adjust their problems. Others report a marked spiritual growth.

All report that the ministry has been earnest and spiritual. Revival meetings and Daily Vacation Bible Schools have brought blessings to the churches where they have been held.

The meetings have emphasized the family altar and in the majority of families daily prayer and Bible reading is practiced.

In a number of meetings buildings are in progress of being built or have been completed which shows expansion.

Two new monthly meetings have been set up. Encouragement and opportunity to express spiritual gifts are given the young people. Many young people are attending Christian high schools and church colleges.

Doctrinal standards of Friends are upheld in the meetings and in one meeting Friends doctrine was studied Wednesday evenings.

● 13. A request came from Frank Haskins to be released from his term on the Board of Service as he has been appointed to serve on the Board of Public Relations.

The request was granted and the representatives are asked to fill the vacancy made by his resignation in the Board of Service.

● 14. The following communication from Greenleaf Quarterly

Meeting was referred to the Executive Committee:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church:

There is a feeling in Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting that the annual sessions of Yearly Meeting extend over too long a period.

Most travel to and from Yearly Meeting is by automobile. To those who are members of Yearly Meeting Boards the present schedule requires ten days for the trip. This is too long for a busy farmer to be away from his work at the harvest season. And much of the revenue of the Yearly Meeting comes from the farmers.

We therefore request that the matter of reducing the length of the Yearly Meeting sessions be referred to some group for study with the thought in mind that the 1954 sessions be shortened.

- 18. Oliver Weesner, the auditor, reported that he had been unable to complete his report at this time and the auditing report is to be inserted later. As far as he had worked, he had found the books to be kept in excellent condition.

- 19. Roy Clark led the meeting in singing "At the Cross" and several other hymns.

Richard Wiles spoke on the subject of Stewardship. Ye are not your own, ye are bought with a price. The purchase price—the precious blood of Christ—has been paid for all, but some have not taken advantage of it. Stewardship is a way of life. Time, personality and influence are all included in stewardship.

THURSDAY, 2:00 P.M.

- 20. After a period of silent waiting on the Lord Lela Morrill and Minnie Woodruff led in prayer.

- 21. Edward Mott was presented to the meeting and he spoke words of encouragement that the Yearly Meeting should continue to go forward.

Bernard Mott and his wife, Alma Mott, from Iowa, were also introduced.

Their son, Bernard Mott, Jr., a student at the Western Evangelical Seminary, was presented.

- 22. The treasurer's report that was read in the morning session was approved.

- 23. The Executive Committee recommends that the Yearly Meeting adopt the permanent policy of meeting the expenses of committees, requested by the Yearly Meeting to meet between Yearly Meeting sessions.

The recommendation was approved.

- 24. The Executive Committee recommends that a Yearly Meeting Board of Stewardship be established.

This was approved.

On page 51, after "g, BOARD OF PUBLICATION." add the following:

h. **THE BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP.** The board shall consist of twelve members, including in this number the chairman of the various Quarterly Meeting stewardship committees. The remaining number shall be appointed by the Yearly Meeting on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

The board shall organize by the appointment of a president, a vice president, and a secretary. It may appoint other officers and such committees as are needed to carry on its affairs. For specific responsibilities of the board, see page 96.

On page 96, delete from the first paragraph the phrase, "steward-

ship, for promoting more systematic and liberal giving on the part of the members;"

On page 98, add another Section as follows:

1. **THE YEARLY MEETING BOARD.** The Board of Stewardship shall endeavor to promote throughout the membership of the Yearly Meeting a deep sense of the importance of personal faithfulness to the trust committed to all in the form of time, talent, and money. While being careful to give proper place to each of these phases of stewardship, it shall carry on a consistent and forceful program of education and promotion in behalf of a more general practice of tithing and of giving beyond the tithe. It shall assist and encourage those in like responsibility in the subordinate meetings.

The executive committee of the board shall consist of its officers, and shall be responsible for putting into effect the program of the board as planned in its regular meetings.

2. **THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEE.** Each quarterly meeting shall appoint a stewardship committee. The committee shall work in cooperation with the Yearly Meeting board, of which its chairman shall be a member, by active participation in its program.

3. **THE MONTHLY MEETING COMMITTEE.** Each monthly meeting shall appoint a stewardship committee, and may, when advisable, appoint a committee for each preparative meeting. The committee shall be responsible to the monthly meeting for promoting the realization of the responsibilities of stewardship among its members.

BOARD OF SERVICE

- 25. Charlotte Macy, the president of the board, presided and made the following report:

Charlotte Macy, president of the board, presided at the mid-year and final board meetings (with 7 different members present at both).

1. HOME FOR AGED

Last year a tract of land was offered to Oregon Yearly Meeting for the purpose of building a home for the aged. (See 1952 Minutes No. 34 and 113.)

A three member committee was named to investigate this offer and also to visit similar Homes conducted by other denominations.

The committee reports that the property at Marion is located in quiet surroundings, has good possibilities and is a very generous offer.

The size of the property was 5 to 6 acres, which, through misunderstanding was originally reported larger.

After noting its distance from convenient shopping centers, from bus lines and like, the committee does not feel that it has reached a place of recommending any site, but would like further study.

Investigation will need to be made concerning how many want a nursing home, how many want individual dwellings or small apartments etc. Some are interested in a small farm.

The committee visited a Mennonite Home in Albany and found that its constituency seemed to compare with the number and area of Oregon Yearly Meeting. This Home was operating with apparent success. There is a recognized need and demand for some type of Home for our older people.

2. CONCERNING CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTORS

The following were named as official "Counsellors" to instruct and advise young men of draft age: Bernhard Fedde, Paul Barnett, Deane Roberts, Milo Ross, Walter Lee, Paul Mills, Arthur Winters, and Earl Geil.

Paul Mills was named as chairman of a committee to handle legal problems concerning Selective Service and conscientious objectors. Other members include Dean Gregory, Charles Beals and Bernhard Fedde.

The government recognizes CO's and the young men are given the privilege of working at many jobs which could help our Yearly Meeting.

Types of acceptable work include that on the Klamath Indian Reservation, summer camps, college maintenance, general construction on churches, and foreign service projects.

3. RELIEF

A. Foreign. By mid-year over 6,000 pounds of clothing had been shipped. Only scattered reports have been turned in since then, but they indicate that much more clothing has been sent through the N.A.E., A.F.S.C. and other agencies.

One monthly meeting has helped to process and pack about 45,000 pounds of clothing for relief through the American Friends Service Committee.

B. Home. Many items of home service have been reported. Although little credit is given publicly concerning social service, individuals and churches should do much of this type of ministry for there is much need.

The president presented Bernhard Fedde who spoke on the subject of peace. He said there were three kinds of peace. First, an inner peace that one can acquire when one is at peace with God; second, a peace we expect to have in the New Jerusalem; and third, the peace with our fellow men—human relations. He spoke also on Selective Service for C.O.'s.

Paul Mills asked the question what are we going to do with the 1-O's? Some have found employment with government agents; some want to work for the church. Opportunities are now offered in different types of work: construction and maintenance of church buildings, work on conference grounds, work on the farm in Bolivia, and similar projects. The C.O.'s have to spend two years in some kind of service. A challenge comes to Oregon Yearly Meeting to pray about it and then do something about it.

The report was approved.

- 26. The representatives recommended Waldo Hicks for assistant clerk for this session in the absence of Milo Ross.

This was approved.

- 27. The representatives presented the name of James Meireis to fill the unexpired term of Frank Haskins on the Service Board.

This was approved.

- 28. The nomination of Jack Willcuts to serve on the Press and Publicity Committee for the rest of the year was made by representatives and approved by the meeting.

- 29. The names of Milo Ross and Charles Beals to serve on the Board of Service for three years were approved.

- 30. The representatives present the following names as nominations for the Committee to write letters to Aged Friends: Mar-

guerite P. Elliott, Cora Gregory, Anna Coffin, Clara Macy, Edward Tozier.

These were approved.

- 31. The meeting adjourned to meet at 9:30 a.m. Friday morning.

FRIDAY, 9:30 A.M.

- 32. The presiding clerk emphasized the importance of doing our Father's will and not our own will.

Charles Haworth and Dorwin Smith led in prayer.

- 33. The minutes were read and approved with an addition.

- 34. Harold and Edith Selleck, pastors of Bayshore Monthly Meeting, Bacliff, Texas, were introduced to the meeting. Harold Selleck is also the recording clerk of Kansas Yearly Meeting.

It was the will of the meeting that a returning letter should be given them although they did not come with a regular minute.

- 35. The committee to write letters to Aged Friends made the following report which was approved:

We, the committee appointed to write letters to Aged Friends and shut-ins, report that a number of letters were written. Fifty-four personal calls were also reported. Expressions of gratitude were given by many for being thus remembered.

- 36. The name of Ruth Brown was approved as a member of the Christian Education Board.

- 37. There was a discussion in regard to the appointment of members to the Board during the interim between Yearly Meeting sessions.

This matter was referred to the representatives for consideration.

- 38. The Alumni of George Fox College nominated Allen Hadley to serve as a member of the Trustees of George Fox College for three years.

Richard Cadd and Floyd Watson were nominated by the Alumni to serve as Corporation members of George Fox College for five years.

These names were approved.

- 39. Jack Willcuts, who attended the convention of the National Association of Evangelicals, held at Cincinnati, Ohio, gave a very interesting report. There were thirty-six denominations represented. Among a number of outstanding speakers were Dr. Decker, Dr. Taylor, Billy Graham and Jacob DeShazer and Bob Schuler.

The theme of the convention was: "The Lord God, Omnipotent reigneth."

Dr. Cyril Steinman from the National Association of Evangelicals was introduced. He said their purpose was cooperation without compromise.

Appreciation and approval were expressed for these reports.

- 40. The appointment of some persons to attend the N.A.E. convention next year and provision for the expense of his travel was referred to the representatives.

Sherrill Wollam from Portland Quarterly Meeting, Carolann Moor from Newberg Quarterly Meeting, Carolyn Bishop from Salem Quarterly Meeting, and Wayne Taknan from Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting.

Charles Beals gave an excellent talk on the value of the Sunday School and it was the will of the meeting that it should be mimeographed so that it could be distributed to the various meetings.

Appreciation and approval was expressed for the fine report and program.

- 42. After Roy Clark led in the singing of "Come Thou Fount," Richard Wiles brought a stirring message from 1 Corinthians 4:1. He emphasized mostly the stewardship of prayer, giving illustrations from the New and the Old Testaments to show the importance of prayer. All are called to a life of intercession and ministers especially. It is required of stewards that a man be found faithful.

- 43. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:00 o'clock.

- 44. After singing "Peace, Peace, Wonderful Peace," the presiding clerk led in prayer.

- 45. Dr. Herbert Byrne from the Western Evangelical Seminary told of associations with Friends and of the work of the Seminary.

- 46. Arthur Roberts, who has come to serve as a teacher at George Fox College, was introduced to the meeting.

- 47. The following communication which was received from Salem Quarterly Meeting was referred to the representatives:

Salem Quarterly Meeting in session at Highland, August 8, 1953, prepared this request to be forwarded to Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends to be held in Newberg, Oregon, August 13-18, 1953.

That there be considered and definite steps taken for the change of Constitution and Discipline, in order that the Department of Peace (of the Board of Public Relations) and the Board of Service be united in order that overlapping and duplication of duties and procedures be avoided. See Constitution and Discipline, pg. 94, Sec. V, paragraphs 1, 2 and 3, and pg. 95, Sec. VI, paragraphs 1, 2 and 3.

- 48. The Board of Christian Education made the following recommendations which were referred to the representatives:

The Board of Christian Education recommends the following changes in the Constitution and Discipline:

On page 93, Section IV—Christian Education

1. THE YEARLY MEETING BOARD. The Board of Christian Education shall include in its responsibilities and activities the following departments: Bible School, Christian Endeavor, Vacation Bible School, Junior Church, Clubs, Camps, and other similar work. The president of the Yearly Meeting Christian Endeavor Union shall be a member ex officio of the board.

The board shall appoint from its membership a superintendent for each of the following departments: Bible School, Christian Endeavor, Vacation Bible School, and clubs. Persons so appointed shall promote the work of their department throughout the Yearly Meeting.

2. THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEE. Each Quarterly Meeting shall appoint a chairman of the Christian Education Committee. The remainder of the committee shall be composed of the Monthly Meeting chairmen of Christian Education. The chairman appointed by the Quarterly Meeting may or may not be a Monthly Meeting chairman. The Quarterly Meeting superintendent of Christian Endeavor shall be a member ex officio of the committee.

It shall be the duty of the Quarterly Meeting committee, acting in cooperation with the Yearly Meeting Board, to promote the various departments of Christian Education throughout the Quarterly Meeting.

3. THE MONTHLY MEETING COMMITTEE. Each Monthly Meeting shall appoint a Christian Education committee, and may appoint, when advisable a committee for each preparative meeting. The committee shall be responsible to the Monthly Meeting for the supervision of the work in all the departments comprehended. (See Article 1.) It may, if so desired, appoint chairmen for the various departments.

- 49. The recommendations in regard to the changes in the Discipline were accepted as they appear below:

The Executive Committee recommends the adoption of the change in the Discipline regarding the transfer of ministers as recommended by the Ministry and Oversight (Minute 97, page 41, 1951-1952 Minutes). It is recommended that Chapter III, Section I, subsection B, paragraph 8 of the Constitution and Discipline, Part II, which appears on page 61 and has reference to the transfer of ministers be amended to read thus:

"8. TRANSFER OF MINISTERS. Every certificate of transfer of membership issued on behalf of a minister shall include a statement of his position as a minister. Transfer within the limits of the Yearly Meeting shall carry both membership and position to the meeting receiving it. One who transfers from another Yearly Meeting of Friends shall be received by certificate as a member, and, unless he has been called to serve as a pastor, his position as a minister shall be referred to the Yearly Meeting Committee on Ministry for consideration. In such case, he shall not be listed as a minister unless the Committee reports favorably to the monthly meeting where he has been received." It is further recommended that the proposed change in Part III, Chapter I, Section I, paragraph 1, which appears on page 73 and refers to application for membership, be adopted. The change would add this amending phrase:

"(comma) or to a preparative meeting through its pastor or pastoral committee."

- 50. The Executive Committee recommends that Kenneth Williams and Ivan Adams serve on the Board of Trustees of George Fox College for a period of three years and that for two years Charles Beals replace the vacancy on the Board caused by Herald Mickelson's moving from the limits of this Yearly Meeting.

These recommendations were approved.

- 51. The following nominations to the George Fox College Corporation were approved:

For five years—Dorwin Smith, Paul Mills, Homer Nordyke, Arthur Winters, Dean Gregory; for four years to fill vacancy left by removal of Herald Mickelson, Wayne Roberts; for two years to fill vacancy left by Lulu Heacock by removal of membership, Ernest Stephens.

- 52. The Radio Committee made the following report which was accepted:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends:

The committee on radio, appointed at last Yearly Meeting, has attended to the object of its appointment as follows:

Shortly after being appointed, the committee met in an all-day session and drew up detailed plans for the inauguration of a network broadcast by tape release. These plans were submitted to the Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting in its mid-year session, and with its approval and authorization the program was set up beginning the first Sunday in August.

The half-hour tapes, released for weekly broadcast, are recorded in the sound studios of KWJJ in Portland. At this writing four programs have been made and released to seven outlets. Stations where

the broadcast is now heard are: KFXD, Nampa, Idaho; KXL, Portland, Oregon; KSPO, Spokane, Washington; KWSK, Pratt, Kansas.

Stations with plans for release in the future as soon as plans and arrangements can be worked out are: KTW, Seattle, Washington; KMED, Medford, Oregon; KTIL, Tillamook, Oregon.

The plan now in operation is for the cost of transcription to be underwritten by the Yearly Meeting, and the broadcast release to be financed by the churches in each local area.

- 54. Report of the General Superintendent

REPORT OF GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

The year's seasons have gone their cycle again as they have done for the centuries and we mark another milestone, one year nearer heaven and the eternal rewards awaiting the faithful. Success or failure in Spiritual endeavor is not always measured by the passing of time but by the final result, long awaited or quickly achieved. Many of us have shared the nature of the impatient James and John who would immediately call down fire from heaven in order to vindicate their rights. We need frequently bring to mind that God never gets in a hurry, but His purposes unfold surely, though often we think slowly, but they shall be accomplished. When we are tempted to impatience, we should remember Jesus' rebuke to these sons of thunder and call to mind that we are now children of light and possessors of the new law of Christ, that we should love one another.

This knowledge and confidence, that Christ will build His Church, come what may, will hold us steady and secure even in the midst of this increasingly ungodly age. It does not contradict the urgency which is upon the church, to hurry with the gospel message to all nations, but it sustains and gives endurance to those whose total energies are bent upon fulfilling Christ's insistent plea to evangelize the whole world.

Two ideologies of sharply opposite characteristics predominate the field of battle in today's world. They are godlessness and godliness. These ideologies are not always represented by nations or armies or earthly battlefields, though nations and wars are giving frightful impetus to the devil's last stand against the Church of Jesus Christ. Godless materialistic communism is surely Satan's spearhead movement to wipe out the church. It has succeeded in many countries to close all doors for missionary work as we know it. More countries are ready to fall prey to the empty and false promises of communistic propaganda. But missionary work, the kind that Jesus

commissioned, has not been stopped nor will it ever be until the Church is caught up to meet Christ in the air.

The uncertainty of the tenure of any foreign missionary enterprise ought to stir us to immediate action. What we do in this old world must be done soon. What if we don't get it done? God's purposes will still unfold, but we will be held accountable for what was in our power to do. Faith and action ought to characterize every Christian in these days. "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind." 2 Tim. 1:7.

During the past year I have endeavored to fulfill my appointed duties and to promote the general welfare of the church. During the winter months I gave my time largely to the foreign missionary conferences over the Yearly Meeting in which many others participated. These conferences were used of the Lord and plans are being made for more conferences to follow this coming year.

During the past year I have visited most of the meetings and outposts of the Yearly Meeting and have attended Quarterly Meeting sessions in each quarter. A good deal of the past summer was devoted to C.E. conferences over the Yearly Meeting. I have given 109 messages and preached in two week-end revivals. I have attended 20 conventions and conferences and have traveled approximately 37,000 miles in Yearly Meeting interests, 21,632 miles of which were by car.

My time has been spent largely in the field, answering requests for assistance or service, though I have endeavored to carry on the work of the office as well. A monthly letter has gone out to all pastors, and hundreds of personal letters have gone out from the office. The News Flash has been prepared from time to time and sent to each local meeting.

During the past few months I have given considerable thought and time to our young Quaker men in regard to their draft problems. It has been a privilege to give assistance to more than a dozen young men who have needed help in securing their proper classification. In each case thus far we have found Selective Service to be cooperative in granting the proper classification, though we are finding more and more difficulty in the matter of securing the 1-O status for our conscientious objectors.

THE SERVICE OF THE CHURCH

The Service Board has named a committee to approach the various State Selective Service headquarters with regard to employing our own conscientious objectors. I have worked with members of this committee in interviewing Oregon, Washington, and Idaho Selective Service representatives and in each case they have urged us to open jobs for our own boys. One young man has already been employed at George Fox College under this program and we are hoping that Friends will open more work opportunities for these young men.

Without the able assistance of the office secretary, Beth Hockett, my work would be considerably hindered. She is taking much of the load of responsibility for carrying on the work of the Yearly Meeting office, for which service we all are grateful. Roger and Mildred Minthorne are performing a most valuable behind-the-scenes service in the office of Yearly Meeting Treasurer. Only those with actual experience can know the many hours of work entailed each week in this office. We allow them our sincere thanks for such an excellent

service.

Our Quarterly Meeting Superintendents are all men of the highest quality and will become more and more active in their area of responsibility as the work of the Yearly Meeting grows.

The Friends of the Pacific Northwest have a sacred and holy trust. We do not seek to preach Quaker doctrine, as such, to the world, but we preach the Scriptures in the light of Friends interpretation and historic teaching. We have a peculiar trust to present a spiritual message to all men, without outward show or pretense, and without dependance upon material substance. We have a holy obligation to demonstrate to the world that love is stronger than hate, and that God's children do live peaceably with all men.

Oregon Yearly Meeting is concerned with giving service as well as doctrine. The service arms of the church support the vital program of the church. One of the fine service organizations is the Board of Publication, whose chief function is the publishing of the Northwest Friend. This paper is a "must" to the forward going of our work. Its style and content have improved through the years and is recognized generally among evangelical Friends as one of the foremost Yearly Meeting papers in America. Read it to be informed; read it to be inspired.

The Women's Missionary Union and the Friends Brotherhood are fine examples of service performed by consecrated people. Their maintenance of certain phases of our home and foreign work is worthy of commendation. Much more could be accomplished here by the addition of loyal members to these groups.

The Board of Public Relations deals primarily in educational projects. The department of Stewardship has performed a noteworthy first step project this year by producing the "Adventure in Tithing" campaign. The organization of a new Stewardship Board this year should give added emphasis and strength to the challenge of a total life of giving.

The departments of Peace, Public Morals, Literature, and Education have promoted their respective concerns, as opportunity afforded.

THE PROGRAM OF THE CHURCH

The program of the church is the central and vital task of the church. Any congregation that is not put to work at the job will soon disintegrate or grow dead and cold. A national executive in a neighbor denomination has said that a growing progressive church is always marked by an energetic and enthusiastic missionary program and a strong emphasis on the Sunday School. Evangelism and education is the strong team that pulls the heavy load, and neither is complete without the other.

Without doubt the greatest home mission field in America is right here in the Pacific Northwest. We are not always successful in our efforts to establish new churches, as is evidenced by the list of meetings which were started in past years but are unheard of today. The encouraging thing is that many have been successful, and some outstandingly so.

Three months ago the Ashland, Oregon chapel was opened by Edward and Lois Harmon, pastors who felt the divine call to rugged outpost work. Much prayer and labor is going into this new field.

Second Friends church of Portland has answered a Macedonian

call. A few weeks ago, upon the invitation of a Friends family living in Timber, Oregon, Second Friends commissioned a group of workers to open up a Sunday School and worship service there. This is a town of several hundred people who have been without a single church or Sunday School. The work is growing already and promises to become a permanent Friends meeting.

On the evening of August 5, 1953, the official board of the Maplewood Community Church in Southwest Portland, asked the Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting to assume responsibility for the work there. On the following Monday night August 10, they deeded their church property to the Yearly Meeting. This includes a meetinghouse with a small Sunday School wing of four classrooms, and two average-sized lots. Several Friends families who live in this community plan to put their efforts behind this new work. This meeting will be organized as a preparative meeting under the name of Maplewood Friends Community Church.

After several years of prayerful consideration, the Board of Evangelism of the Yearly Meeting has made definite plans to enter Wenatchee, a thriving little city of Central Washington. We trust this will open the way for further extension into the irrigation development land in the Inland Empire.

A full report of each of these new meetings will be given under the Board of Evangelism report. There are more fields asking us to come in and establish new meetings, but there is need for more adequately prepared workers for these fields.

The time which I have given in investigation of possible new fields for Friends churches and the effort put forth to see the actual development of these new fields, has been the means of making me an outpost-minded Christian. If my total time were given to this type of work, it would still be an insufficient service, for the need is beyond our imagination.

The church has not been able to keep up with the trend and increase of population. It is said that 25% of the American people will move this year. It is also known that today there are more unchurched communities in America than ever before, because of this rapid shift and fast increase in population.

God grant that Oregon Yearly Meeting may be able to open some of the 60,000 closed church doors in America and open new churches in the many, many unevangelized communities of our land.

During the past year the following meetings have been promoted from the status of Preparative Meetings to full fledged Monthly Meetings: Netarts, Oregon; Cherry Grove, Washington, Holly Park, Washington; Spokane, Washington; and Quilcene, Washington.

There are 14 of our churches which are either in new building programs or in the process of major remodeling. Two new church buildings, at Nampa, Idaho and Netarts, Oregon, have been dedicated this year.

On our Bolivian field there is much evidence that God is with us. During the past year many definite answers to prayer have been reported. First, the National Friends Church of Bolivia is slowly taking on the responsibilities of self government and self support. Second, the raising up of one of our missionaries, Tina Knight, who was near death's door, and her restoration to health came only through much prayer. Third, the granting of a permanent visa for the Roberts

family, which we trust is an indication that God is holding the door to Bolivia open a while longer. Each of these answers to prayer has a thrilling story which space forbids relating here.

The urgency of fulfilling our responsibility in Bolivia is accented by the rising trend of nationalism, with a communistic loyalty. We must pray for continued open doors in Bolivia.

The Christian Endeavor Union has undertaken a significant project which may be the means of broadening our missionary vision. They have pledged a part of the summer support of Dr. Harold and Anne Kuhn, Friends who are doing relief and gospel work in the refugee camps of West Germany. The orient has the spotlight of the religious eye in America, but the sore spot of Europe lies in a divided Germany. How great is the physical and spiritual need in that once enlightened land!

Friends are aware of the great need for Christian schools. Many children from Friends homes are attending Christian day schools where available and there has been a definite increase of interest in Christian high schools. Greenleaf Academy, operated by the Greenleaf, Idaho Friends Church, had an enrollment of 92 students last year and has recently completed a new administration and classroom building and also a new gymnasium and shop building.

George Fox College is our Yearly Meeting school. Small Christian colleges are all having a hard financial struggle in these days and only by our loyal, sacrificial giving and prayerful support can we hope to see the college succeed. Earnest prayer should be made for the board of trustees that they may find God's choice in the selection of a college president.

The Board of Christian Education has initiated a very challenging Sunday School promotional program. Their goals of Enlargement, Evangelism, and Education, have been well presented in attractive promotional material. Every church should enter wholeheartedly into this program.

Two new conferences have been added to our summer schedule this year making a total of 13 camps and conferences throughout the Northwest, meeting in 7 different locations. An adult camp was conducted at Quaker Hill this summer for the first time, and a new C.E. conference was held at our property on beautiful Twin Lakes in Northern Idaho. Several of our conference boards are making plans for more adequate facilities to care for these camps and conferences which mean so much to the spiritual and social life of our Yearly Meeting youth.

The Yearly Meeting radio program has just come into reality within recent weeks. The number of station outlets is increasing each week and we should soon have a full coverage throughout the Northwest. The Director, Roy Clark, and each member of the Quaker Hour staff have faithfully produced these programs and now it is our responsibility to pray that they will be used of God to evangelize the unsaved wherever they may be heard.

THE SPIRITUAL LIFE OF THE CHURCH

The spiritual impact of a church is just as strong as its members make it. The report on the State of the Church has been read before the Ministry and Oversight and will be condensed for reading to this Yearly Meeting. It is appropriate that we devote a time to face our spiritual needs and deficiencies without covering them over with

excuses. There is danger for us to glory in the successes of former days without humbling ourselves in acknowledging our own weaknesses and failures. If we glory, let us glory in the Lord. If we are humbled, let us remember that God uses most him that is little in his own sight.

The imperative need for the church is now, as it has ever been, a mighty baptism with the Holy Spirit, and a dedicated people who will dare to come out from the world and be a separate, holy people. Our great need is not for power, or great numbers, or great influence among men, but for God Himself to so possess us that He may be seen through us as the Way, the Truth, and the Life.

The way ahead is not impossible for with God all things are possible. The way ahead is not dark for where God is, there is light. Friends, let us put off our doubtings and believe God for greater things in the future. "But the people that do know their God shall be strong and do exploits." Daniel 11:32.

FRIENDS BROTHERHOOD

● 56. The president, David Pruitt, presided and read the following report which was approved:

The object of the Brotherhood shall be to deepen the spiritual life of the men of Oregon Yearly Meeting, with this concern it has been my privilege to see that happen.

The past year has been one of challenge to us who are most vitally concerned. Men have advanced as a group and individually to where they have become more effective in their own churches to see the Lord's work accomplished.

It has been wonderful to see how the Lord has led in an ever widening field of activity. When I took office a year ago I made the promise that I would visit as many churches in the Yearly Meeting as it was possible. This promise in its fulfillment has led me to cover 6262 miles in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

I have had the privilege of speaking twenty-five times in the different churches. This included the chapel service at George Fox College in December and one service in Gate, Oklahoma. Surely the Lord has added His blessing to the effort made.

There have been those whose attitudes and actions confirmed their testimony of spiritual growth. One of the most outstanding is my own father who has evidenced a deeper experience than he had ever shown in the many years I have known him.

Surely the Brotherhood is trying more and more to fulfill its obligations. The Quarterly Meetings have shown a trend toward deeper spiritual thinking. The regular monthly meetings which were held have tried to challenge the men to greater growth by presenting speakers or films with a definite message. The film "All That I

Have," which was shown in Greenleaf and Portland Quarterly Meetings, tells the story of a wealthy doctor who finally became convinced that all he had belonged to God and that he was merely a steward to see that it was used properly. He was finally taken to court to prove that he was mentally unbalanced when he gave large sums of money to God's work. And those who came to scoff remained to pray. Our project in Spokane has seen growth. Anyone attending a service there has left with the impression that the Lord was present. Under the able leadership of Clark Smith, who is vitally concerned with the job, there have been those at the altar who sought and received definite help in the church service.

The building program is gaining momentum. The excavation has been made and lumber is on the site. Walls and floor are to be poured in the very near future. Enough money is on hand to see that this is done. Pledges and money have been given that will guarantee more of the building and plans for the coming months include the construction of a very acceptable building. Surely God's work is advancing but this is no time to sit down and rest on our laurels. Greater fields of service are before us for the coming year. All this construction will take money which we must see sent in. The men in Spokane will be putting in long hours of work to see the building take shape, and Clark Smith will be spending more time than any of them on the job beside calling on the people of the community and taking the responsibility of the kindergarten which has been placed under his supervision. Days of tiresome monotony will come when it appears that very little progress is being made. Hours of prayer and waiting on the Lord will come but always His promises that those that wait on the Lord renew their strength, and that the race isn't to the swift or the battle to the strong but that victory is promised to the faithful, will be there to keep everyone steady who trust in Him. This coming year has much to promise us.

It promises us lots of work to do to see that our job that we have set our hand to do is done.

Each Quarterly Meeting will have its own part to fulfill. Each one in responsibility will need to see that men are contacted for their dollar per month. Quarterly Meeting programs will have to be planned to present the greatest challenge they can give. This is not a time when we can meet and have just a social time, though this part is necessary, but a time when we can search our hearts and draw closer to God.

Let's make this an outstanding year in the history of Oregon Yearly Meeting as far as we, as men of the Friends Brotherhood can do.

Presidents of the different Quarters will need to spend more time in prayer but the end of the year will show how it pays to do what God wants us to do.

As your president for the next year I will promise to visit as many of the churches in the Yearly Meeting as is possible. My special effort will be to reach those that I didn't visit last year. To the pastors I would like to say a great big "thank you" for the fine cooperation I have had with you this past year. I only hope I can be of some help in each church to help see that the men become more willing and effective workers.

My thanks also includes our General Superintendent who has helped

in advice and counsel and many ways to see that the work of the Brotherhood advanced.

May the days that are ahead show a greater spirit of unity than ever before and may we see souls saved through our efforts.

Again this year I would leave with you Romans 12:1 and 2.

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

● 57. Marjorie Crisman, the president, gave the following report which was accepted:

Again this year the Women's Missionary Union of Oregon Yearly Meeting have contributed lovingly of their time, talents, and financial gifts to the wonderful work of missions. "Let us not grow weary in well-doing" would be a fitting motto, for each year finds interest increasing and more members being added to the 46 unions making up our organization. Three groups have divided so that they now have two unions within their church. 600 members paid dues for the past year.

The devotional-program books have been used and appreciated by all unions reporting. Written by the Greenleaf women, the devotions on the theme, "Come Unto Me," were inspiring. Programs featured stories of outstanding native Christians on the Friends fields throughout the world, written by missionaries.

Twenty-five prayer units have met at least monthly, carrying to our Heavenly Father the needs of our Bolivian missionaries. Up-to-date news and prayer requests were sent out to each unit by the chairman, Maude Harmon.

A new project sponsored this year by Literature chairman, Mildred Brown, was the reading of missionary books and magazines. The 28 members of Newberg union read 36,753 pages and West Chehalem with only eight members read 10,641. Each of these groups received a book as an award. Many other groups did much missionary reading, which should inspire and increase the vision of our women toward missionary work. A similar reading contest will be conducted during the next year. Perhaps the total of 152,156 pages can be increased with next year's report.

The intense interest in our Bolivian mission field was evidenced by the quantities of materials prepared and sent: medical and surgical supplies for Wilma Roberts, baby clothing, bedding, sewing and personal kits for the Bible School, aprons, clothing for missionaries and nationals, food, cards, and pictures, and flannelgraph material. \$1473.89 was given for the Native Teacher Fund, plus money gifts for several projects as listed in the treasurer's report. Individual giving from the local unions, not going through our treasurer's hands, totaled \$314.60, given for the following items: outfits for the Roberts, and Cammacks, the Jeep, medicine, freight, and for three other missionary fields—Korea, Christie Bundy (Japan), and the Fritschles (India). Though the greatest concentration of interest is in our own field, several gifts were sent to the above works, including clothing for Korea packed by 13 unions, a box to Germany and one to the Thomases in Africa. The Cammacks have been supplied with a set of plastic pottery dishes to take back to the field.

A custom which has been carried on for several years is the send-

ing of Christmas boxes to our outpost pastors. Twenty-five such boxes were given last year, \$187.75 in cash gifts, and in addition, 2 food showers, 3 baby showers, dishes, clothing and Bible commentaries.

One of the delights of a local Women's Missionary Union is to see a need in the home church or parsonage and set about to remedy it. As a result, the home projects carried on this past year have been many and varied. The church kitchens received much attention, coffee makers having been purchased by four unions, dishes by three, utensils by three, cupboards built by two, tables furnished by two, towels by one, and one new sink installed. Remodeling or redecorating consumed many "woman-hours" of work. Four parsonages, six church buildings, three parsonage kitchens, two bathrooms, and two church kitchens received the "new look." Three unions redecorated Sunday School rooms, one provided a nursery for their church, one a church sign, and two landscaped the grounds. One served refreshments each week to men working on their church building.

Community service was given: three times in cases of fire, eleven to needy families, and four to the pastors, besides 15 showers. \$2058.21 in cash was contributed to parsonage and church projects, needy families, Greenleaf dormitory and Twin Rocks conference. Wauna Mer, Quaker Hill and Twin Rocks also received gifts of needed equipment.

Multiplying words is not necessary. Many other interesting activities have been sponsored—plays, dinners, church night programs, missionary rallies, secret pals, money-raising projects, sales, hospital aid, are only a few. 2,136 calls were made in the interest of church or missionary union.

A successful banquet was held this year at Yearly Meeting, based on the theme, "Outfitting the Cammacks." Clothing was displayed in wall and table decorations, with old shoes as offering plates. 300 enjoyed the meal and program, which featured Phyllis Cammack. She spoke on the subject, "What I'll Take Back to Bolivia." An offering of \$371.36 was given for the Cammack's outfit.

It has been a concern of several that we undertake some specific financial obligation toward our home field, as we have done for foreign work through the Native Teacher Fund. So we have undertaken a new project for the coming year, a pledge of \$50 monthly support to an outpost assigned by the Board of Evangelism.

It is a joy to know that the women of our Yearly Meeting have given themselves wholeheartedly to the task of supporting our missionary program—at home and abroad.

- 59. The presiding clerk called to our attention James 1:5. If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men, liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him.

Prayer by the recording clerk closed the devotional period.

- 60. The minutes were approved as read.

- 61. Alden Pitts, a minister of the gospel and his wife, Rolena, from Haviland Monthly Meeting, Haviland Quarterly Meeting, Kansas Yearly Meeting were introduced to the meeting.

Marian Jones of South China, Maine was introduced.

These friends are welcomed by the meeting.

- 62. The following communication from the representatives was approved:

The representatives have given consideration to the matter referred to them by the Yearly Meeting concerning board vacancies and recommend the following interpretation of the discipline:

A vacancy occurs in a board when a member serving on a board is appointed Quarterly Meeting superintendent of that department and thus by virtue of his office becomes a member of that board.

- 63. The whole question of board vacancies was referred to the discipline committee for consideration.

- 64. The following recommendations from the Finance Reconstruction Committee, altered and approved by the Executive Committee were considered by the meeting:

1. That a GENERAL BUDGET be set up embracing all the needs of the Yearly Meeting and the askings of all boards, except the Boards of Missions and Evangelism, and that the budget be assessed to the various Quarterly Meetings on the ratio of resident active membership.

2. That a BUDGET be set up covering all askings of the Boards of Missions and Evangelism, and that this amount be apportioned to the various Quarterly Meetings according to interest and ability to give. That the Board of Missions and Board of Evangelism may be authorized to hold local and regional conferences to help raise the budget.

3. That the Board of Finance receive all askings of the various boards and set up both budgets subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, which has the power to accept or alter before recommendation to the Yearly Meeting. That the Board of Finance establish the ratios for assessment of the GENERAL BUDGET and apportionment of the Missions and Evangelism Budget. This is to be presented to the Yearly Meeting by the Finance Board.

4. That all balances of funds remaining in the Yearly Meeting treasury at the end of the fiscal year shall carry over to the new year and be credited to the board for which they were budgeted. That each board shall be discouraged from withdrawing cash and holding it unused by the board. (The Board of Finance shall determine the amount of carry over allowed each board and shall act accordingly when setting up the budgets.)

5. That all church related organizations (summer conferences, etc.) submit an annual financial report of their operations to the Yearly Meeting through the Finance Board, to be included in the

Yearly Meeting Minutes.

6. That a more detailed accounting of the finances of the Yearly Meeting be furnished to the Yearly Meeting. Included in this would be the setting up of a system of books showing all properties held by the Yearly Meeting with legal descriptions given in such a way that everyone would know the location of the property, valuation of the property, date of erection of building, etc. Also included in this list would be all properties owned by meetings and organizations within the Yearly Meeting and the properties held in Bolivia including a listing of the buildings and equipment on the farm.

7. That the valuation of Quaker Apartments be ascertained and that the Yearly Meeting be furnished a detailed statement of income and disbursements each year with a statement of the outstanding obligations. Included in this might be the following items: a. Purchase price b. Capital improvements c. Source of funds used for purchase and payments on the contract d. Market value of property e. Present debt f. Enumeration of Rental and cost of maintenances. (It was approved that the investigation and report of this latter matter should be turned over to Dean Gregory and Oliver Weesner.)

After some discussion the matter was referred to the representatives.

BOARD OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

● 65. Mahlon Macy, president of the board, presided and presented the following report which was approved:

The Board of Public Relations has striven earnestly to carry out its assigned duties this past year. There has been activity and work done in every area of the Board's responsibility.

Since there was a feeling on the part of the Yearly Meeting that there should be a greater emphasis upon stewardship, the board this past year placed greater stress upon this department than upon some of the other departments.

The mid-year meeting of the board was well attended and it proved to be a time of renewed vision and progressive planning. One of the major decisions was that of putting out a handbook for the use of the local committees. Each departmental superintendent cooperated in supplying material for the handbook. The desire of the board is that this booklet will aid the local chairman in planning for the coming year and will serve as a sourcebook for ideas for presentations and activities.

When it appears that the evils of the world are pressing in on us more and more, we must be doing more than ever to stand against the evil and the evil one. The board covets the cooperation and prayers of every member of Oregon Yearly Meeting this coming year.

The following is a summary of the reports of the various departments of the Board of Public Relations:

Department of Stewardship, Jack L. Willcuts, superintendent. The Stewardship emphasis this year has been largely on tithing. To promote tithing in the Yearly Meeting, the following program was used:

10 Stewardship articles appeared in the Northwest Friend supplied by this department.

12 issues of "Your Friend" bulletins featured the subject of Christian Stewardship.

10,000 Stewardship tracts entitled "The Tithe" by Earle C. Wolf were circulated among the members of Oregon Yearly Meeting stress-

ing stewardship.

6,150 letters were sent through the mailing lists of the Northwest Friend to the membership of Oregon Yearly Meeting stressing stewardship.

57 posters were used among the churches supplied by this department.

The "15 Week Adventure in Tithing" was used in 52 churches of the Yearly Meeting. In this adventure the following response was made.

1. From the some 4,000 tithing booklets sent out, 1,210 came back listing 1,090 tithers.

2. 62 of these gained were new tithers. 57 personal letters to the Stewardship department were received plus 658 postcard responses.

3. According to the results of the Adventure, 59 1/2% of the tithers pay their tithe to the local church, 18 1/2% divide their tithe between the local meeting and another Yearly Meeting project such as college, summer conferences, outposts, etc. 13 1/2% of the tithe goes to causes outside of the Yearly Meeting such as missions, radio programs, etc. 7 1/2% of the tithers did not indicate to what place the tithe was given.

4. \$232.26 was expended in this department this year of which nearly \$130.00 was donated in personal giving to the department.

Department of Public Morals, Estel Weber, superintendent. Most meetings have been active in some way in promoting the work of this department. Many letters have been written to members of congress and state legislators and to others in official places urging them to take a stand for righteousness.

16 meetings report that they had a regular presentation on some phase of public morals in their meetings. There were 149 presentations made throughout the year on some phase of public morals. 222 temperance magazines are taken by the families of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Approximately 44 sermons were preached on this subject during the past year. Many indicated that while whole sermons were not preached on the subject, the messages touched on and emphasized various areas of public morals.

The meetings are using various methods in getting the message out to their people. Object lessons, moving pictures, skits, and speech contests have done much to get the matter before the churches of the Yearly Meeting.

The churches in the various states have cooperated with their own state agencies in matters of public morals and particularly in matters of political action. Much can be done by the local church in any area, if they will but make an earnest effort to stand against things evil.

The church needs to be more aware of the inroads that are being made in our midst. All about us the use of tobacco and alcohol is more in evidence than ever, especially among the young people. Divorce has come to be too much of an accepted thing even among church people. Many friends have failed to consider seriously the effect that television will have upon their lives and their homes. Let us think on these things!

Department of Peace, Earl Geil, superintendent. A brief statistical glance at our churches in their peace activities during 1952-1953 with 39 monthly meetings participating by reports.

1. What has the local committee done the past year to present our peace testimony? Seven monthly meetings reported any action upon their part.

2. Number of sermons preached on peace? 18 reported a total of 28 messages.

3. Number of presentations made through Sunday School? 11 churches.

4. Number of special presentations other than sermons on Sunday School. 12 churches.

Our superintendent of Peace department was a delegate from Oregon Yearly Meeting to the National Peace Conference called by Harold Chance of the A.F.S.C., and held at Pendle Hill in January of 1953.

The purpose of this conference was to share our needs, pool our methods, and attempt to formulate a more successful procedure in teaching and educating our youth in the Bible ways of peace; to inform the various Yearly Meetings of the latest legal procedure of the Selective Service system; illustration of test cases and actual experience shared that might serve to alert and help those of us who would have similar circumstances arising as our youth enter draft age, etc. The information of setting up a counselling system has been passed on to Service Board for execution as this is in their field.

Limited literature on peace and the Christian stand as interpreted by Friends is available and sources may be obtained from the chairman of the peace department or by consulting your Public Relations Board Handbook issued several weeks ago.

Department of Literature, Lois Haskins, superintendent. A questionnaire sent out to all the meetings indicates that most of the churches have libraries with an average of 115 volumes. One meeting reported a library of 500 volumes.

Most meetings reported that they have no systematic way of buying books. Some reported regular buying through their church budget, through the Sunday School, through the Missionary Union and by individual gifts.

Two thirds of the meetings reporting said nothing was being done to curb the distribution of trashy literature. One meeting reported that there was no such literature in their community. One meeting has cooperated with the city ministerial association seeking to improve people's reading habits.

Many ways have been used to encourage proper reading habits. The Missionary Union seems to be most active. Suggestions from pastor and literature displays have been of help.

Several meetings asked for suggested lists of books. These may be found in the Public Relations Handbook for this year.

Department of Education, Charleton Smitherman, superintendent. This is a report on the educational status of the members of the Yearly Meeting. Based on a report from 42 meetings.

Several reported they were providing scholarships and were help-

ing students through school.

The goals for the board are set forth in the Handbook published for this year.

Titus Frazee, executive secretary of the Oregon Temperance League spoke briefly on the need of unity in the fight against liquor.

The president of the Public Relations Board urged the members to consider what kind of literature we have in our homes. Christians should subscribe for Christian literature and protest against the trash literature that is found on so many news stands. We should continue to write letters to those in authority.

Jack Willcuts spoke on the subject of tithing. The month of October is to be new Quaker tithers' month.

Earl Geil gave a stirring message on peace. He said a conditioning process has been going on since 1938, trying to accustom our young men to the idea of killing. He said we had to be careful not to use communistic tactics in dealing with those whose loyalty is questioned. Christians should guard against hatred and should exercise sound reason and prayer.

Virginia Helm, who won the international trophy in the W.C.T.U. speaking contest, gave her winning speech: "Where There is Drink There is Danger."

Appreciation was expressed for this speech.

Appreciation and approval was given for the reports and work of this committee.

● 66. At the opening of the inspirational hour, Roy Clark led in singing, "Oh, For a Thousand Tongues to Sing," and "I Need Thee Every Hour."

Richard Wiles continued his message from 1 Corinthians 4:1 emphasizing especially that we are stewards of the mysteries of God. He showed how the gospel had been delivered to faithful men who had carried the message until we of the present day have received it and are debtors to God and to the world to deliver the message of salvation and joy to others.

The meeting closed with a prayer service.

SATURDAY, 2:00 P.M.

● 67. Roy Clark played the organ and led the meeting in singing, "Fall Fresh on Me."

Elwood Mylander closed the devotional period with prayer.

● 68. The representatives presented the names of Earl Geil and Bernhard Fedde to serve on the Board of Public Relations.

The name of Bernhard Fedde was approved.

Earl Geil asked to be excused and after some consideration the request was accepted and the representatives were asked to submit another name in the place of Earl Geil.

● 69. The Executive Committee made the following recommendations in regard to the Boards of Missions and Evangelism which were approved:

The Executive Committee recommends that permission be granted to the Evangelistic and Mission Boards to raise money throughout the Yearly Meeting, and that the Mission Board be granted the privilege of borrowing necessary funds in case of emergency. The Executive Committee further recommends that the Evangelistic Board be granted the privilege of borrowing up to \$1000.

- 70. The recommendation from the Executive Committee was accepted as follows:

The Executive Committee recommends that Dean Gregory be appointed as our general superintendent for the year 1953-1954. The committee further recommends that our general superintendent be paid a salary of \$4200. Out of this he is to provide his own residence. It is recommended that his automobile travel expense be raised to 7¢ per mile instead of the present 5¢ per mile rate.

GREENLEAF ACADEMY

- 73. The following report of Greenleaf Academy was read by Buel Hockett:

Greenleaf Academy closed the 1952-1953 school year with many evidences of the blessing of the Lord upon the school and its work. This past year saw the highest enrollment in the history of the school—92 students—and prospects are good for an increased enrollment for the next year.

The new gymnasium has added much in the way of accommodations and facilities to the school and community. It is the center of clean, wholesome social life for the school in the form of parties, programs, banquets, besides facilities for dramatization. It makes its contribution to the life of the community in the same capacity. The contri-program gives emphasis to good sportsmanship, and the influence of a Christian coach in the lives of the boys is of inestimable value. The athletic program continues to be self-supporting and is not subsidized in any way. The interior work of the gym has been completed since Yearly Meeting time last year and all that remains to be done is the completion of two dressing rooms.

It is quite generally known that the Academy has carried off top ratings in the State Music Festival for the past three years. Music has a prominent place in the school and smaller musical groups are organized each year in the form of quartets, sextets, etc. This use of music is of great help in the deputation work connected with the school as various groups go to Sunday Schools and churches here and there and help in gospel services. It is planned to give more emphasis

to band than formerly and an experienced band director is engaged to make this a stronger part of the school.

A girls' dormitory was maintained during the past year for girls from out of town and there are prospects for more girls in the dormitory this year than last.

Greenleaf Academy still retains its accreditation status and is recognized as an accredited four-year high school in the State of Idaho.

Along with the improvement of the physical plant and the strengthening of each department, there is the emphasis on the spiritual life of the student and the concern that each student come to a saving knowledge of our Lord and Savior and then become established, rooted and built up in the faith. To save our youth from the evils of our present day as found in our public high schools throughout the country is ample justification for the existence of the academy, our only Friends secondary school in the Northwest, and we earnestly ask and desire the support of Friends everywhere and of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Many of our students go to George Fox College upon graduation from the academy. George Fox College needs Greenleaf Academy and Greenleaf Academy needs George Fox College; Oregon Yearly Meeting needs both.

Support and pray for Greenleaf Academy.

GEORGE FOX COLLEGE ANNUAL REPORT

74. The following report was presented and accepted:

The responsibility for college operations during the 1952-53 school year rested upon a three-man administrative committee. This committee worked with the fullest possible harmony by conferring upon all matters in which school policy was affected, and by deferring all decisions until (1) the problem for discussion had been clearly defined, (2) all possible date illuminating the problem had been secured, and (3) consideration given in the possible solution to students, faculty, and constituency. Perhaps the remarkable aspect of this method of operation was the full support received from students and staff and the wholesome manner in which friends of the college responded to it. The unanimity thus experienced throughout the campus seemed Divinely ordered for the encouragement of all as we look to the future of the college.

PHYSICAL IMPROVEMENTS

One of the chief concerns of the administration and staff during the past year has been to give the physical plant better care, thereby lengthening the life of our facilities. The buildings have reached an inevitable condition in which restoration and improvement are necessary to prevent deterioration; consequently, a considerable sum was spent during the past year to protect the investment represented by the buildings and to render them more capable of maximum usefulness.

Wood-Mar Hall has been extensively improved on the main and basement floors. The drainage system for the building was re-laid and considerable improvement added to the heating system. Through gifts, both the Science Hall and Kitchen have received new tile floors. Dormitories, the Music Hall, Gymnasium, and Administration building all need attention and three or four summers will be required to bring these buildings to a minimum level of operating standards. The college streets, especially the one connecting on River Street and extending North to the gymnasium are in serious need of resurfacing.

THE STUDENT BODY

The registration records for the 1952-53 school year show a total registration of 109, as compared with 122 for the previous year. This figure does not include many private music students. Of the 109, there were 59 men and 50 women. Registration according to class was as follows: 33 freshmen, 23 sophomores, 30 juniors, 17 seniors, 5 special, and 1 post graduate. Statistical measures do not interpret a student body. The students

of the last school year were unusually alert and responsive.

THE SCHOOL YEAR

The school year was very rich in the satisfaction which it brought in academic achievement, religious activities, athletic accomplishments, and student life.

The Christian Emphasis Week in the fall with Dr. C. Dorr Demaray of Seattle was very inspiring and brought the consciousness of all to realize the claim of God upon human life. Our spring meeting was in conjunction with the all-city campaign with Dr. J. C. McPheeters, President of Asbury Seminary, as evangelist. Student Christian Union-sponsored weekly prayer meetings, the activities of the Foreign Mission Fellowship, deputation groups, and other religious organizations maintained a wholesome, evangelically centered atmosphere on the campus.

The A Cappella Choir of forty-five voices travelled to Southern California for their spring concert tour where they were well received. They appeared also in many of the churches of the Yearly Meeting.

Three dramatic productions were produced during the year. "A Table Set for Himself," and "Papa is All," were both given by the speech and dramatics department, during the fall and winter. The music and dramatic departments joined together to give the spring operatic production, "The Magic Flute," by Mozart.

The athletic department excelled in the majority of their competitive sports in both men and women's teams. Completion of a conditioning gymnasium that is well equipped and attractively decorated has enabled the department to increase its efficiency in student health services, and to be of service to the business men and women in the community.

A vigorous increase in academic pursuits is attested to by a 26 per cent increase in library circulation per student, above any other recent year.

THE FACULTY

We express our appreciation for the loyal support and continued devotion of the faculty to the challenging task of Christian education. The college is fortunate to have this well-trained and integrated group in its service. Two retiring staff members deserve special mention. The Homecoming banquet in November honored Professor Oliver Weesner upon his retirement after teaching forty-three consecutive years on our campus. This record is seldom duplicated and his years of service deserve a great expression of appreciation. Charles Haworth, Assistant Professor of Spanish, came to the college in 1948, after his retirement from Willamette University, and has served efficiently during this period. We regretfully announce his retirement and wish him many joyful years more for serving the Master.

GRADUATES

An insurance appraiser recently made an appraisal of the insurable value of the Yearly Meeting building and that appraisal indicates that our insurance should be increased from \$30,000.00 to \$37,600.00. The Yearly Meeting Trustees and the Newberg Monthly Meeting Trustees recommend that this increase be made, the Yearly Meeting and Newberg Monthly Meeting each paying one-half of the premium.

Kenneth Jones and Opal L. Jones, husband and wife, Scotts Mills, Oregon, requested during the past year that they be given a quit claim deed from Oregon Yearly Meeting releasing any claim of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church to Lots 5, 6, 7, 8, Easterly 125 feet of Lot 14, Block 26, and all of Lot 2, Block 27 in Scotts Mills, Oregon, arising from any violation of a provision in the dedication of the town site of Scotts Mills, Oregon, providing that if intoxicating liquors were sold or manufactured on any lot the title to such lot would revert to Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

This request was referred to the Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting. They appointed a committee to investigate the situation. Scotts Mills Monthly Meeting was consulted and they at a meeting decided it would be best to grant the request.

Mr. Jones desired to secure a loan which could not be secured if the above provision remained in force. Letters were sent each member of the Executive Committee asking them if they favored or did not favor authorizing the Trustees to sign a quit claim deed for the purpose indicated above. The replies were favorable and the Chairman of Trustees executed and delivered to Mr. Jones such a deed.

The following requests have come to the Trustees:

Netarts Monthly Meeting requests that when they become incorporated the Yearly Meeting Trustees be authorized to transfer the titles to their properties to Netarts Monthly Meeting. Netarts Meeting desires to sell their present parsonage and use the proceeds of the sale in the construction of a parsonage on the property where the church building is located.

Agnew meeting requests that the Yearly Meeting Trustees be authorized to sell and execute warranty deeds for the west portion of their property. The meeting wishes to retain about two acres where the church building is located and sell the remainder in the three tracts or lots, proceeds to be used to retire indebtedness and make improvements.

Medford Meeting requests that the Yearly Meeting Trustees be authorized to sign a note for \$2700.00 with interest at 6% per annum payable in monthly installments of \$27.00 each, and that they be authorized to execute a mortgage on the properties of the Medford Meeting to secure the payment of said note.

The item for repairs of the Yearly Meeting house has been increased. This amount together with the same amount from Newberg Monthly Meeting it is estimated will provide for the cleaning and repointing with a cement mortar the four walls of the tower and the east

wall of the building.

An appraisal of the insurable value of the Yearly Meeting house by an insurance appraiser has been made and the item for insurance has been increased to provide for the increase of the insurance from \$30,000.00 to \$37,600.00. Newberg Monthly Meeting will pay one-half of the insurance premium.

The committee in charge of providing for housing and meals for those attending Yearly Meeting this year informs us that they will not need funds from the Yearly Meeting Treasurer. Hence no item for Yearly Meeting entertainment has been placed in the budget.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

● 97. Walter P. Lee, president of the board, presented the following report which was approved:

Lights and shadows have accompanied the missionary work of Oregon Yearly Meeting during the past year. The shadows of political uncertainty, nationalism, anti-Americanism, and ill health for the missionaries have fallen across Bolivia. But in sharp contrast the light of God's loving care, His eternal promises, and His miraculous power has seldom shown more brilliantly.

The final granting of a permanent residence visa to the Mark Roberts family after repeated refusals has again shown the concern of the Lord for the lost of Bolivia and His power over the nations. The healing hand of the Great Physician which touched Tina Knight in her very critical illness and has restored Leland and Iverna Hibbs and Wilma Roberts from attacks of jaundice is continued evidence that God answers the prayers of His people.

The swing toward nationalism in Bolivia is dramatic proof that God was definitely leading us in the recent steps of the past few years toward the establishment of a national church among the Aymara Indians.

These and many other problems have but emphasized afresh the oft repeated statement that "Man's extremity is God's opportunity."

In view of the political uncertainty in Bolivia and the proposed land reform which has not yet developed it seemed wise to the Board of Missions to postpone the construction of the new Bible School unit until the settlement of some of the political problems. The funds given for this purpose are being held in reserve.

Financially this has been one of the best years which indicates increased vision and concern among the members and friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting. God is blessing His people and preparing us for the next step in His program.

On the home front nine missionary conferences were held in various sections of the Yearly Meeting with Paul Cammack, Dean Gregory and Walter P. Lee participating in all of them, assisted in several by other missionaries in the area. The response to the challenge for the support of Mark and Wilma Roberts was most gratifying and made possible their departure for Bolivia even earlier than was anticipated.

The missionary work of the Yearly Meeting was represented in two city-wide evangelical interdenominational missionary conventions by the president of the Board of Missions. These conventions, sponsored by the Evangelical Foreign Missions Association, were held in Salem and Eugene, Oregon for a week each.

The reports from the various meetings of the Yearly Meeting

indicate 221 special missionary services throughout the year which averages a little over 4 per meeting. Of course, several had more and others less than this number.

Nearly 1200 missionary books were read by interested Friends. The total number is very encouraging, but the individual reports indicate that relatively few meetings account for most of the reading. This is a challenge to the other meetings.

All meetings indicated use of the missionary calendars with the total amount given to missionary evangelism through the calendar plan as \$1,735.00. Since all do not have accurate records available, the figure is probably larger than this. This shows a definite increase of interest in the calendar project for national evangelism in Bolivia. However, it is interesting to note the wide difference in response per calendar. This ranged from \$.15 to \$6.17 per calendar. Honorable mention should be given Scotts Mills meeting, whose interest produced the latter figure. For total giving through the calendar project, Star monthly meeting heads the list with \$171.93.

Twenty meetings report the formation of prayer circles which undoubtedly accounts for the volume of prayer ascending for the mission work. Nearly all meetings reported participating in the day of prayer for the Bolivian national church.

May the past year with its advances and increased vision lead us toward broader horizons in the coming year.

Paul Cammack said his verse was Psalms 32:8 and he asked that people pray daily for them.

Geraldine Willcuts told how God had led and helped them. She said she was praying that she might be preparing to be a good missionary.

Jack Willcuts told also how God had led and that God was still calling them to Bolivia. His prayer was to find God's leading in all things.

Dean Gregory offered a prayer of dedication for Paul and Phyllis Cammack as they are soon to go back to Bolivia.

A request was made that we should continue to pray for Roscoe and Tina Knight and their family as their health is still not entirely restored.

Walter Lee spoke of the plans for the missionaries in Bolivia. He said that God had moved in a remarkable way in opening the way in Bolivia. He said the mission board felt as if we should enlarge our vision and a field in Germany seems to be opening.

Dean Gregory read a letter from Dr. Harold Kuhn in Germany and told of the work of Harold and Anne Kuhn there, especially among the refugees.

Walter Lee put the following questions to the meeting:

Should Oregon Yearly Meeting investigate this field in Germany

or some other field?

Does the meeting authorize us to make this investigation?

The meeting favored the investigation.

The reports of the field are as follows:

Oregon Friends Bolivian Mission

The missionary council sends its greetings to Oregon Yearly Meeting in its sixty-first annual session.

The many uncertainties involved in the work of the field this past year have given ample opportunity to prove the scripture text found in 2 Samuel 22:31, "As for God, His way is perfect; the word of the Lord is tried; He is a buckler to all them that trust in Him." As we labor in a land that is increasingly succumbing to Communism, we find its tentacles reaching out to put obstacles in the way of the Lord's work. However, we do praise God for the smile of His approval upon our work, and the subsequent victories and steps forward that we have been experiencing in the past months.

We pray that God will continue to bless Oregon Yearly Meeting, and through it proclaim the Good News of Salvation to the Aymaras so long as the Lord tarries.

Field Mission Council

The Field Mission Council has not met as regularly this past year as might be desired. Nevertheless, we rejoice in the fine fellowship that we have had, and, as we have labored together, God has helped us to follow His leadership in all that has been at our hands to do.

The work of the mission has been carried on this year under the following organization:

The work of the mission has been carried on this year under the following organization: Evangelistic secretary, Ralph Chapman; Agricultural secretary, Leland Hibbs; Educational secretary, Roscoe Knight; Construction secretary, Ralph Chapman; Director of Helen Cammack Memorial Bible Training School, Roscoe Knight; Editor "Soul Cry of the Aymara," Marie Chapman; Field Treasurer, Ralph Chapman; Bookkeeper, Marie Chapman; Chairman of the Mission Council, Ralph Chapman; Secretary of the Mission Council, Iverna Hibbs.

The Cavits have been laboring faithfully in Copajira. Catherine has been teaching in the Bible Training School, as well as teaching their daughter, Christine. Marshal not only has been busy in the Bible School, but also has maintained an active part in the evangelistic field. We again acknowledge that we are debtors to the Cavits for the financial aid that they continually invest in the work of our field.

Two changes were made in the personnel of our council during the past year. In August, 1952, Paul and Phyllis Cammack with their four children left our family to return to the States on furlough. The Robertses, Mark, Wilma and James, arrived in the city of La Paz in February. Since then they have been adjusting themselves to life in a new land, at a high altitude, and amidst those who speak an unknown tongue. Life in Bolivia has been uncertain for the Robertses due to a delay in securing a permanent residence visa. However,

God is able, and we believe the receipt of the desired visa will be the final step in establishing the Robertses as members of our missionary family.

Yearly Meeting and Field Conference

In spite of soaring expenses, the Yearly Meeting in La Paz housed and fed the largest group ever to attend the Yearly Meeting sessions. Although the 700 mark was not an average, all the services were well attended, and on Sunday the church was packed. Our evangelist this year was Rev. Earl Hunter, Superintendent of the Nazarene Mission here in Bolivia. Rev. Hunter brought pertinent messages to our people, and our hearts were made glad to see, among the many who sought God the goodly number of those who gained definite spiritual victories. Marshal Cavit taught the class on holiness, and other missionaries aided in classes in doctrine, discipline, music, etc. Business reports by the churches were given in the sessions for business, directed by Mariano Baptista, president of the I.N.E.L.A.

Much of the business of pastoral changes, business of the I.N.E.L.A. and the general study of the progress of the work of the field as a whole was again attended to in the sessions of the Executive committee of the I.N.E.L.A. and the church delegates. The Lord blessed in our meetings and definite progress is to be noted in the response of the executive committee to its increasing responsibility.

It is our privilege to be able to report a good Yearly Meeting, and again we say, "It was the best Yearly Meeting we have ever had."

The field conferences were held, as customary, during the past year in the following places: Achachikala (July, 1952), Mina Fabulosa (August, 1952), Pucarani (September, 1952), Amacari (October, 1952). A conference was held in Chunavi in July, 1952, on a provisional basis pending formal authorization by the Mesa Directiva. These conferences continue to be under the immediate leadership of the National Church with the missionaries aiding in preaching, classes and visual aid as the program requires.

Bolivian Friends Church

(Iglesia Nacional Evangelica "Los Amigos")

We are glad to report that the Bolivian Friends Church is growing! Before the Yearly Meeting in La Paz in April, we passed through a time of trial, but the Lord's promises are ever true. The difficulties that arose were caused by the misinterpretation on the part of one or two of the brethren on the Executive Committee of the actual value of properties in relation to the church. The nationalistic spirit emphasizing itself in other circles in the country today, influenced them in their ideas about a national church. As these problems were worked out we have come to the conclusion that the difficulties that we had were not a result of a desire of the brethren to separate themselves from the mission, but rather a fear of lack of means to maintain their work if they had no property which they might call their own. The I.N.E.L.A. is still a child. It has much ground yet to cover, and it is going to win out only because it is the Lord's work. The biggest hurdle for them yet is their financial problem. The brethren of the churches must learn to support the work if they are to have a purely national church. We continue to preach and teach along this line, but it appears that the Lord is going to allow persecution to teach them and strengthen them here as He

has permitted in other countries.

The executive committee (Mesa Directiva) of the I.N.E.L.A. is changed each year at Yearly Meeting time with two members retiring, and two new members being elected into the group. This year, due to the vacancy created by the absence of Silas Casa and the resignation of Martin Perez, four new members were elected to the executive committee. At the present time, the executive committee is composed of the following brethren: President, Pedro Guanica; Vice president, Maximo Loza; Secretary, Casemiro Cuaquera; Treasurer, Angel Tintaya; Secretary of Evangelism, Martin Garnica; Secretary of Education, Calizto Casas; Missionary Advisor, Ralph Chapman.

This group has been meeting regularly since Yearly Meeting, and now has the first draft of the church constitution drawn up. They are anxious to proceed toward securing governmental recognition, and with such be legally recognized in official capacity as a church.

Mission Day Schools

The work of our Day Schools continues normally. Last school year closed in October. Our teachers in the La Paz school acted as examiners for the country schools, and the examinations showed average work accomplished by most of the students.

This year we have 10 schools in the country in addition to the school maintained in La Paz itself. All of the schools now have been officially recognized by the government, and we are continually endeavoring to standardize our schools. This will take a lot of work yet but will permit better results from the work we are attempting to do.

As a result of entering into a contract with the owner of the large farms on Taraco Peninsula, across the valley from Copajira, we have the opportunity of operating four new schools this year. We furnish teachers and operate the schools on our standards and the owner furnished the school buildings and pays the teachers' salaries. He is required to put schools on his farms in fulfillment of the law here and we are thankful for the opportunity that has been opened up to us to work in this area. We have permission to use the same school rooms for religious services and thereby have a good opportunity for reaching out in our evangelistic efforts.

The work of the schools has been hampered some this year by the lack of adequate supplies. Desks have been made for Amacari and Chirapaca, and those for Amacari are now in use.

This part of our work is open for much development, and we trust that in the near future definite advancement can be made in this needy field.

Construction

The construction of any major status has been that of the completion of the Hadley Hall annex in La Paz and the installation of plumbing in the small apartment in the back of the La Paz property. We are already making good use of the two buildings. The mission office as well as the church office is now being used, and the added space provided by these is indeed appreciated.

Out over the field the construction work undertaken has been on a small scale. The most expense has been involved at Chirapaca. Needed materials for the completion of the church and school

facilities have been purchased although the actual work necessary is not as yet completed.

The brethren in Palcaca, Vilaqui, Isla Anapia, Pucarani, Achachikala, San Pedro Tana, and Calata have all done work of one sort or another on buildings for use either as a church or a school. The mission has helped some of these with windows, doors, or with materials for making tiles for their roofs.

The construction work on the farm continues and details of this will be included in the farm report.

Transportation

The privately owned jeeps as well as the mission vehicles have been used this past year in the interests of the work of the field.

Last November we sold the old mission jeep which has carried us many miles as we have attended to mission work. A few weeks later we were able to make the purchase of a 1951 four-wheel drive jeep station wagon. This vehicle has given very satisfactory service thus far, and in an ideal type of car for use both in the city and in trips in the country.

At present the mission International Pickup is in the garage nearing completion of an overhaul job. We trust that this work will put the pickup in good condition and permit its use in the farm work again.

Evangelistic Report

It is always a source of joy to us to learn that the brethren are continually contacting new people and reaching new places with the Gospel message; people whom we could not know otherwise, and places we would never learn about were it not for reports of evangelistic efforts of our believers. This is the desired result of saved souls reaching out to others that which has changed their own lives.

We rejoice in the fellowship that we have with the brethren of the Mesa Directiva of the INELA. They are faithfully shouldering the burden of directing the evangelistic work of the field. They know their own people; they see their own needs; they more effectively deal with the general problems that arise in the circle of the church. They realize that the time may soon be at hand when the complete burden of the work will rest upon them. They are giving more serious thought to what it means to have and maintain a national church. The Mesa Directiva is giving careful thought and attention to the work of formulating a church constitution, and we sincerely believe that, step by step, they will assume added responsibilities.

There are 25 regular preaching points of which 6 are monthly meetings. Last year Mina Milluni was placed on a preparative meeting status. Several new places have been reached, and at present the most promising of these is Mina Chojjlia. This is a tungsten mine owned and operated by Grace and Co. Mariano Baptista, former pastor of the La Paz church and president of the Mesa Directiva, has been laboring here since our Yearly Meeting in April and a fine group of believers are now meeting regularly.

The Gospel tent has been used a number of times in field conferences and has also been loaned to other missions for a special meet-

ings. Our Mission was privileged to be a participant in the large evangelistic campaign held in La Paz in October 1952, that was sponsored by the Latin American Mission under the leadership of Kenneth Strachan.

During the "Carnival" celebrations in La Paz in February of this year, we were hosts to another Holiness Campmeeting (Bolivian style) in our La Paz church. Five holiness missions in La Paz joined in this endeavor, and many were established and others strengthened in their experience of sanctification.

Helen Cammack Memorial Bible Training School

In former years many of the thoughts concerning the Bible Training School have been that someday we would see the results of our labors among the Aymara young men who have attended school. It is with great pride and thanksgiving that we can now prove that the work has not been in vain. From the graduates and former students, seven are pastors, four are teachers, two are members of the executive committee of the National Church and others are active Christian workers. On September 4, 1953, the largest graduating class that we have had as yet will leave the College to enter into Christian service. Eight capable, well prepared and consecrated young men will be available for the work that the Lord has for them. Graduating students are: Cipriano Copa, Francisco Avalos, Benjamin Balboa, Loza and Anastacio Mamani. During the vacation period before this school year, we were saddened to learn of the death of Eusebio Abendano, one of our students who would have been in the graduating class.

Twenty-three students will finish this year's courses. Of these, eleven are freshmen, four are juniors, and eight are seniors. Only three are married. We are extremely thankful for the excellent spirit that has prevailed in the studentbody with each student co-operating and working together. Two series of special services have been conducted. Marion Shields, of the Union Bible Seminary Mission, was the evangelist for a week of services at the beginning of the year, with definite spiritual messages for each one. Mid-year holiness services were held by Homer Firestone of the Church of God Holiness. Many students were deepened spiritually.

The school gardens have thrived very well this year supplying the school dining room with carrots and onions for the entire year, turnips, lettuce, cabbage, cauliflower, and broccoli for well over half of the year. These products, plus all of the other farm produce, make it necessary to purchase only a few other staples.

The general over-all schedule is the same as in other years with classes in the morning, work period in the afternoon, and study period at night. Classes in carpentry have been taught by Marshal Cavit to all students and the senior class has received additional instruction in typing and mechanics.

During the various conferences that are held in different parts of the field during the school year, we have sent or taken students to represent the school and to give them practical experience. This adds to the evangelistic program of visitation that is carried on by the students. We praise the Lord that the Bible Training School has

taken its important place in our field and that the graduates and former students are being used in definite service for God.

Farm Report 1952-1953

During this year of work at Copajira we have felt the presence of our Lord and Savior. It has been a blessing to realize He was by our side as we attempted our labors for Him there. His blessing has been very evident with the good harvest from our land, and the harvest of souls through the work of the church here at the farm. Recently a request has come for the organization of a monthly meeting here.

I will mention here only some of the interesting things of our farm and its happenings this past year.

In December the purchase of 55 alpacas was completed and they arrived at the farm New Year's Day. They pastured during the rainy season in the hill country of Copajira. There is a large portion of this hilly region under dispute and is now occupied, temporarily we hope, by Indians of another community, thus pushing our alpacas down to a smaller and lower range which is short of forage at this time. Because of skin disease and intestinal disturbance we have lost four adult and three baby alpacas. At the present the alpaca enterprise does not seem too favorable but we have a veterinarian studying the disease and if the high pasture land is retained by our farm the picture may be changed. Because the animals were young and a number had been shorn, a good half a clipping of wool was taken from the herd.

This year the sheep produced approximately 260 lambs, a good clipping of wool, which is still on hand, and around one hundred are for sale. Before beginning to butcher for the Bible School there were 1000 head of sheep on the farm. Ten new Corriedale rams were purchased this year to continue the improvement of the flock. In the process of building is a new sheep corral with cement tile roof, for protection of ewes and lambs during the rainy season.

The cows are a problem. Because of the small number of cattle it is a question whether they can support a shepherd. During the Bible School year an Indian woman is caring for them. This is an experiment to see if the cows will not produce better calves and the cows themselves be in better condition because of better care and forage.

A form of hog cholera entered our swine herd which could not be controlled by the form of vaccine which we were using. It proved necessary to vaccinate with a different vaccine purchased through the Secretary of Agriculture of Bolivia. This was effective and stopped the epidemic. A new boar was purchased from Cochobamba. The problem at present is the permit to purchase more mill run feed, which must come from the government—and proof must be furnished them that the farm does have hogs.

The gardens have furnished to date vegetables for the Bible School, with the exception of the purchase of a few onions at the beginning of school. It is possible to grow onions, carrots, cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, lettuce, and turnips for school use.

The regular barley produced very well this year, with twenty

acres producing 1190 bushel. The standby, beardless barley, produced 2000 bushel from sixty acres. New grains were experimented with this year. Oats, which were purchased near the lake, produced 175 bushel (approximately) from four acres, and rye is producing enough to furnish a good seed stock and some to sell. These two grains were planted late because of their late purchase and produced well in view of the short growing season. The Ida Ed wheat brought good returns in production, with very little yellow smut. All other types of experiment wheat failed to produce.

Because there was a bonus paid for potato picking there was an actual weight of 129 ton from twenty-eight acres, field-run potatoes. While other farms in this area had crop failures, Copajira potatoes are larger than last year and of a better quality, perhaps through the early use of insect control.

Twenty-five pounds of Peruvian alfalfa seed and a small amount of Nomad alfalfa seed was planted in the same field. At the beginning of the dry season, the stand appeared satisfactory. Because of this 150 pounds of Peruvian seed have been purchased for future seeding.

English ray grass, which Paul planted last year, has made excellent growth. Also, an experiment was made on waste land with fescue and rye grasses, but no definite decision can be made as yet.

A very profitable trip was made by Roscoe, Leland, and Iverna, to Belen, the farm experiment station of this area. It is doing a fine job of experimentation with grains and forage.

Almost one third of the farm net income has gone directly to the Bible School support. Actual net income—adding credit reports and Bible School cash and subtracting actual expenses—was 654,239, bills, at 350 exchange equals \$1869 plus.

The electric starter for the light plant is now in operation and functions perfectly—is greatly appreciated by the folk at the farm. The combination garage and boathouse is finished.

The value of the boliviano has dropped to one third of last year and the end is not yet. Because of this it is difficult to estimate the possibilities of income from this year's crops. It is just now time to begin selling again, with prices doubled over last year in bolivianos but skidding in dollars. For this reason it seems advisable to keep as much as possible of the farm income in dollars rather than in bolivianos, and later to exchange into bolivianos as needful.

With the exception of one or two families all the free Indians have received titles to their land. Only seven peon families are left.

As Yearly Meeting convenes this year the Agrarian reform is scheduled to begin. Whether it holds any changes for the farm and Bible School program remains to be seen. Pray with us that it may not hinder God's work in the salvation of souls and the upbuilding of His Kingdom in this place.

We gratefully acknowledge the help and guidance of the Lord this past year, His blessing upon the work of the farm, and His protection over all. Trusting in His grace and promises for His future work I am

To the congregation of the sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting:

Esteemed brethren in Christ,

We have the great pleasure again of greeting you in the name of our beloved Saviour.

We want to present to you the great needs of the evangelization work in Bolivia. In our field we find some places along the extremities abandoned because of lack of mobility to reach them. Because of this situation, we request another time your help, in order that we shall be able to attend to these new places. We need and ask for a pickup truck to reach these places.

Until now we have not personally received any type of vehicle directly for our own use in the work of evangelization, and we feel so strongly in our spiritual consciences that we must work in the vineyard of the Lord. We recognize that we each one are debtors to the Lord.

Actually, we always leave every Sunday for the outstations of the field in public trucks in order to carry the message. To do this we are very rushed, almost without food or rest and then we cannot get everywhere we ought and to those places which plead for our coming and attention.

In order to meet these needs we have just had a meeting of the counsel (M.&O.) of the La Paz church and the Mesa Directiva of the National Friends, including representatives from the different churches of the field and we all unite in this supplication in your presence.

Our God who is over all, knows of many other needs but now we confide to you only these petitions (above mentioned) and trust the others to the Lord. We hope that God will give love to our brethren in the North for us.

Also, our pastor Ralph Chapman who is now on his trip home with his family knows of these matters and he will inform you in detail in respect to this letter because he knows and recognizes the national work.

We know that you always pray for us and for other help too that we receive we give much thanks. May God bless you and the ministry that you do.

We send greetings to the congregation at Yearly Meeting and with great hope we await an early reply and report to your Aymara brethren

in Christ.

May God send you showers of blessings in this Yearly Meeting and to all the congregation, amen.

In order to grant a uniformity in the Yearly Meeting policy, the Executive Committee appeals to the Yearly Meeting to approve the following original recommendation for the period of one year while the matter is being more carefully considered for a more permanent recommended policy:

The Executive Committee recommends that the blanks sent out by the Yearly Meeting statistician should include a separate designation of the active resident members of the Monthly Meetings and of the outposts and preparative meetings, and that the ratios for the Yearly

Meeting Fixed Expense for the Quarterly Meetings be based upon the active membership of the established monthly meetings.

Mahlon Macy presented "Outreach" written by Milo Ross and urged the people who had not secured a copy to buy one.

The Second Sunday in February, the 14th, is favored by the Publication Board and by the Yearly Meeting as Publication Sunday.

Arthur Roberts gave a short talk on publicity.

He said that more good literature should be produced. He expressed his appreciation of the Northwest Friend.

He said the purpose of the church publication was to unite the constituency in close fellowship; to inspire the people and have an outlet to the hearts of the people.

Frederick Baker said aside from the major work of the Board their desire was to bring before the people the distinguishing views of the Friends church.

The report of the Board of Publication was as follows:

This is the eleventh annual report of the Board of Publication of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, and the eleventh year of publication of The Northwest Friend as a church paper. (For many years previous it was a Christian Endeavor publication known as the Friendly Endeavor.)

Purpose of the Board of Publication is outlined in the discipline as follows: "The Board of Publication is authorized to publish the Yearly Meeting periodical, and is responsible for the appointment of its editorial staff and for all editorial and financial responsibilities concerning it. It is further authorized to build and administer a revolving fund and to publish books, pamphlets, and other church and Bible school literature as need may arise and the Board may deem wise." Page 98 in Discipline.

Throughout the year the Board of Publication has had a two-fold purpose in mind; one purpose has been to render assistance to every phase of our church work; the other has been to liquidate an indebtedness of five years' standing.

The publication of 11 issues of "The Northwest Friend" is a major responsibility. Twenty one hundred copies are now printed. Con-

siderable effort was made during the year to bring the mailing list up to date, giving opportunity for those outside the Yearly Meeting to subscribe for the publication if they continued to desire receiving it.

The Quaker Bulletin service is now used by 30 of our churches with a circulation of 3000 copies each week.

The Handbook was again printed this year for the Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting.

Publication Sunday was designated during the year for the third Sunday of February.

Because the press is maintained, considerable work has been done for George Fox College and in printing the George Fox annual, "L'Ami."

This year we are thankful to be able to report that an indebtedness of five year's standing has been liquidated. This has been of great concern to the members of the board.

We are glad to be able to report this year that we are in the black for the first time in five years. With this goal in mind the mailing list was brought up to date, and those outside the Yearly Meeting receiving the publication and not subscribing for it were informed that subscriptions were in order if the publication was desired.

This year, aside from the publication of materials, requested by various departments of the Yearly Meeting the Board of Publication would like to especially devote itself to the printing of material emphasizing the distinguishing doctrines of the Friends church, feeling that it is conviction along these lines that engenders loyalty to our church.

We request that Board of Publication Sunday be observed this year on February 14, the second Sunday in February, that observance be made with no thought of an offering being received.

We continue to stress the five goals of the Board of Publication, held before the Yearly Meeting for a number of years.

1. To make the Northwest Friend the best church paper possible. We need the cooperation of everyone to accomplish this goal. The Northwest Friend is supposed to be sent to every family. This goal can only be realized as membership lists are kept up to date. It is desired that every church have a correspondent, that our editor be supplied with up-to-the-minute news, and plenty of gloss pictures.

2. To have an informed constituency. In order to realize this goal we offer the services of the Board of Publication to every department of our church.

3. That the challenge of the printed page be brought to the attention of our people. One of the most effective ways to spread the gospel is through the printed page. Will you remember this work of the Board in your prayers? We invite designated gifts for the work of the Board. We suggest that the Publication Board be remembered when people make out their wills.

4. That there be developed an increased loyalty to the publication of "The George Fox Press," printers of evangelical Friends Sunday school literature, true to the faith. Will you pray much for the Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends, its editors and board members? This is a joint project of Oregon, Kansas and Ohio Yearly Meetings.

5. That there be a wider release of our own Publication Board material through the medium of the Better Book and Bible House and other such agencies. We suggest purchase of the book "Outreach" for gifts to pastors, church libraries, and even for Christmas presents.

Oscar Brown, the president, presided and presented the statistical report which will appear in the Appendix.

Then he read the following report which was approved:

Our Challenge

Oregon Yearly Meeting is called to work with the Great Builder and Head of the church, Jesus Christ, who said: "I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." "We are laborers together with God. . ." Christ has called us and ordained us that we should go and bring forth fruit and that our fruit should remain."

If we are to accomplish this divine task, we must follow the divine pattern.

First of all Christ gave Himself for the church. Having received His redeeming grace it is our first duty to give ourselves in love and utter devotion to Christ and His work.

Second, giving ourselves to Him, it is His purpose to cleanse from sin and fill with His Holy Spirit and make each of us a witness of His grace. Acts 1:8, "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you."

Third, having received His cleansing and empowering, in Him we live and move and have our being. In this intimate relationship we feel with His compassion, we see with His vision and we are moved with His divine drive and imperative "I must work the works of Him that sent me while it is day, the night cometh when no man can work."

Only in this relationship with Christ can Oregon Yearly Meeting accomplish its God given task.

We are grateful for the measure of success which we have seen this past year. I wonder, however, if we do not feel a sense of guilt and embarrassment as we turn in our reports for the year to the Head Builder of the Church.

We are encouraged by the interest evidenced throughout the churches of the Yearly Meeting, in spreading the Gospel of Christ at home and abroad. The same incentive which sends our missionaries to Bolivia and the "regions beyond" also sends us to our neighbors across the street. Many of our churches have been engaged in visitation evangelism and have seen rich rewards. Several experienced pastors have offered themselves for outpost work, among whom is Herald Mickelson who left the Piedmont pastorate to go to Rose Valley. He was able to serve there only one year on account of ill health.

New doors have opened to us this year. One of these doors opened to Second Friends church in Portland to conduct a Sunday school at Timber, Oregon where within 6 weeks the attendance has reached 73.

The Lord has opened a door of opportunity at Wenatchee, Washington. Nathan and Hazel Pierson have answered this call and will take up the work there September 1. They will live at 512 Cascade St., Wenatchee, Washington.

In Maplewood, a section of West Portland, where recently a small

group constituting a community church, deeded their property to Oregon Yearly Meeting. Piedmont church in Portland will supervise this new field. Several of their substantial members live in the area of this new work. We may reasonably expect that in the near future this will become a thriving church. We gratefully acknowledge this gift of property and pray that God will bless this new venture.

The Friends church and parsonage property at Woodland, Idaho was also deeded to the Yearly Meeting by Lydia George and her children. The property had formerly been on a lease basis and this gift to the Yearly Meeting and Woodland church is gratefully acknowledged.

Many of our new meetings are engaged in building programs. At Spokane and Hillsboro, buildings are in progress and when completed will be attractive and adequate to meet the need of these growing congregations.

Reports from 44 churches show that there are 17 outposts of various types sponsored by 9 churches. These are outposts, Sunday Schools, Mission services, jail services and other meetings held regularly. 65 members are engaged in this work.

Is your church a parent church?

The Board deeply appreciates the leadership and council of Dean Gregory, our Yearly Meeting Superintendent, who has so ably led in this part of the work of our Yearly Meeting.

God has given to us a great staff of outpost workers and pastors. For each of these and their faithful devotion to the cause of building the church, we are humbly grateful.

Our Objectives

1. Our objective is total evangelism in every church in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Total evangelism is total stewardship. It is missions. It is Public Relations. It is Christian Education. It is the whole volume of our church endeavor.

Total evangelism will engage every member, every committee and department of our churches to get the Gospel to every sinner.

2. It is our objective to encourage each local evangelism committee to be a vital agency in the monthly meeting.

3. It is our desire to see every meeting become a "parent" meeting, operating some type of evangelistic endeavor in the needy areas within its reach.

Again in the words of Jesus we say, "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest."

DIGEST OF THE MEETINGS OF THE MINISTRY AND OVERSIGHT BODY

The meeting on Ministry and Oversight met at Newberg, Oregon, August 12th, 1953 at 2:00 p.m.

There were three sessions of this body during the sessions of Yearly Meeting. Thirty-five of the fifty representatives were present at the first meeting.

In the reports of the spiritual condition of the meetings there was manifest a spirit of harmony and fellowship in spiritual things but in one Monthly Meeting there were differences of opinion which had been worked out to satisfactory solutions. There is an earnest

desire to build up believers and to do all possible to convert sinners. Each meeting reported harmony with the fundamentals of Christianity as held by Friends.

The meeting felt that there were problems in the various meetings which could be brought to the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight for prayerful consideration.

There were two men recommended to the Yearly Meeting to be recorded as ministers of the Gospel.

The meeting expressed appreciation for the wide range of work being done by ministers who are not pastors.

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AMENDMENTS

to the Constitution and Discipline
of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church

Page 9—

The second paragraph, beginning about the middle of this page, is amended to read as follows:

Other types of service have not been neglected. Many of the young men of the Yearly Meeting have entered the service of their country, engaging in Civilian Public Service or in non-combatant service in the army or navy. A number of those in civilian service have found opportunity to do good to humanity by filling places of need in the state mental hospitals. Concern for the needs of those who, by the circumstances of life, have been deprived of the ordinary necessities has actuated many deeds of helpfulness, both for those of our own communities and for those of other lands.

Page 39—

Paragraph 4 is amended to read:

4. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE. A nominating committee appointed annually shall present to the monthly meeting names of persons to fill all offices except those otherwise provided for, including a chairman for each committee, and of persons to fill any vacancies occurring during the year.

Page 42—

Paragraph 2, on "OTHER COMMITTEES," beginning at the bottom of this page and completed at the top of page 43, is amended to read:

2. OTHER COMMITTEES. Each quarterly meeting shall appoint annually, on recommendation by the nominating committee, one committee to correspond to and co-operate with each of the Yearly Meeting boards except the Board of Publication, designating one member of each committee to serve as quarterly meeting superintendent of that department of work. (See pages 89-98.) He shall serve also as chairman of the committee. Other committees may be appointed as found necessary.

Page 51—

After "g. THE BOARD OF PUBLICATION" another para-

graph is added:

h. **THE BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP.** The board shall consist of twelve members, including in this number the chairmen of the various quarterly meeting stewardship committees. The remaining number shall be appointed by the Yearly Meeting on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

The board shall organize by the appointment of a president, a vice president, and a secretary. It may appoint other officers and such committees as are needed to carry on its affairs. For specific responsibilities of the board, see page 98.

Page 61—

Paragraph 8 is amended to read:

8. **TRANSFER OF MINISTERS.** Every certificate of transfer of membership issued on behalf of a minister shall include a statement of his position as a minister. Transfer within the limits of the Yearly Meeting shall carry both membership and position to the meeting receiving it. One who transfers from another Yearly Meeting of Friends shall be received by certificate as a member, and, unless he has been called to serve as a pastor, his position as a minister shall be referred to the Yearly Meeting Committee on Ministry for consideration. In such case, he shall not be listed as a minister unless the Committee reports favorably to the monthly meeting where he has been received.

Page 73—

Paragraph 1 is amended to read:

1. **APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP.** A person desiring to unite with a meeting may make application in writing or in person to the monthly meeting through the pastor or other members of the local meeting on ministry and oversight, or to a preparative meeting through its pastor or pastoral committee.

Page 89—

Paragraph 4 is amended to read as follows:

4. **ORGANIZATION OF COMMITTEES.** Each quarterly and monthly meeting committee may appoint a secretary, with such other officers as are needed, making sure that the

work does not at any time suffer for lack of initiative and direction. This form of organization is separate from the appointment of members (in certain cases) to care for the different phases of the work.

Page 95—

Paragraph 1, beginning at the bottom of this page and continuing on page 96, is changed to read:

1. THE YEARLY MEETING BOARD. The Board of Public Relations shall include in its responsibilities and activities the following departments of work: public morals, which shall broadly cover the general field with emphasis on the most current and obvious evils; peace, which shall be concerned with the instilling of the Bible teaching of the value of human life and with encouraging the members to maintain a constant and consistent peace testimony; literature, which shall foster the reading of worthy and edifying books and periodicals; education, which shall endeavor to encourage attendance at institutions of higher learning, and shall include the accurate compiling of all statistics concerning the educational status and advancement of children and youth and the educational activities of adults. A superintendent shall be appointed by the Board from among its members to have charge of each of these departments. It shall be his duty to initiate a general program, and to assist and encourage those in like responsibility in the subordinate meetings. New departments may be added to this Board as needs arise and such allocation seems appropriate.

Page 97—

Paragraph 1 is amended to read:

1. THE YEARLY MEETING BOARD. The Board of Finance shall consist of the officers named (see page 51), who shall serve ex officio for the terms of their appointment, and other members to make a total of twelve, who shall be rotated on the basis of the three-year term. The Board shall counsel and assist its various members, as need may arise, in the performance of their official responsibilities. It shall care for the work of the department of ministers' aid (see page 106), and shall appoint one of its members to the governing committee thereof. It shall act as a finance committee for the Yearly Meeting, being responsible especially for determining the fixed expense of the Yearly Meeting and for reporting the same to the annual sessions with recommendations as to its apportionment among the meetings. The board is authorized to borrow money for the Yearly Meeting when in its judgment such procedure becomes necessary.

A complete new section is added to this chapter, to read as follows:

Section IX—Stewardship

1. **THE YEARLY MEETING BOARD.** The Board of Stewardship shall endeavor to promote throughout the membership of the Yearly Meeting a deep sense of the importance of personal faithfulness to the trust committed to all in the form of time, talent, and money. While being careful to give proper place to each of these phases of stewardship, it shall carry on a consistent and forceful program of education and promotion in behalf of a more general practice of tithing and of giving beyond the tithe. It shall assist and encourage those in like responsibility in the subordinate meetings.

The executive committee of the board shall consist of its officers, and shall be responsible for putting into effect the program of the board as planned in its regular meetings.

2. **THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEE.** Each quarterly meeting shall appoint a stewardship committee. The committee shall work in cooperation with the Yearly Meeting board, of which its chairman shall be a member, by active participation in its program.

3. **THE MONTHLY MEETING COMMITTEE.** Each monthly meeting shall appoint a stewardship committee, and may, when advisable, appoint a committee for each preparative meeting. The committee shall be responsible to the monthly meeting for promoting the realization of the responsibilities of stewardship among its members.

Paragraph 2 is amended to read:

2. **THE FISCAL YEAR.** The period covered by all annual reports shall be from July 1 to the following June 30. The appointment of monthly meeting and quarterly meeting officers shall be for the same period. The fixed expense and the united budget shall cover the period from one annual session of the Yearly Meeting to that of the following year. The term of office of the members of the Yearly Meeting boards and of other Yearly Meeting officers shall begin with the annual session of the Yearly Meeting wherein they are appointed, except that the term of the General Superintendent shall begin September 1. The pastoral year shall begin September 1.

Article 2 on this page is amended to read:

Art. 2. The interests of this Fund are administered by a committee composed of two interested ministers nominated to the Yearly Meeting annually on alternate years by the Ministerial Association and a third member appointed by the Board of Finance. This governing committee shall appoint one of its members to act in the capacity of executive secretary, to serve until his successor shall have been selected and inducted into office. He shall serve without compensation, but shall receive from the Yearly Meeting an annual allowance for administrative expense. He shall promote the interests of the Fund, both by securing and maintaining memberships and by obtaining funds through gifts and bequests. He shall be answerable to the Board for the proper conduct of his office.

Page 108—

Article 4 is amended to read:

Art. 4. Applications for membership may be received by the Board at any regular, adjourned, or duly called meeting. The applicant shall state his qualifications and shall agree to pay to the Yearly Meeting treasurer quarterly during the year, as membership dues for the previous quarter, an amount equal to one dollar per month or to one per cent of his stated salary. Membership is subject to renewal year by year, the privilege of renewal being contingent on the full payment of dues for the previous year. The fiscal year dates from September 1; after a grace period of ninety days, renewals for the current year may not be accepted. Membership which is allowed to lapse may be resumed at the beginning of any year thereafter, if the applicant is still eligible, but the full privileges of membership shall not be awarded at retirement for any year whose dues are not paid in full at the time of renewal.

Page 109—

Article 7 is amended to read as follows:

Art. 7. Members who leave Oregon Yearly Meeting for employment under another Yearly Meeting, or another religious body, or who become permanently ineligible for membership for any reason whatsoever except age or disability, may upon application receive all money paid in by them as dues, plus 2% simple interest. Their years of membership will be eliminated from all calculations of retirement benefits for other members.
