● 9. The reports of the State of Church were received from all the Quarterly Meetings and a summary of the same appears below:

All meetings report good attendance in the morning services. Some express the desire that the evening services and prayer meetings were better attended; one quarterly meeting reported that in one meeting the prayer meeting attendance had doubled. Another meeting reports that two entire families have been saved and joined the church. Another reports a decrease in attendance in the mid-week prayer meeting. On the whole there has been a moving forward and a growth in spiritual things.

All meetings report that a goodly number of families observe some form of family worship.

The conduct of the membership in relation to one another is generally marked by unity and cooperation. Many meetings express a concern for the saving of the lost and carry burdens for their salvation.

In one meeting their young people hold Saturday night services in the jail and local nursing home. A source of great encouragement in many meetings is the way in which the young people are working.

They are assuming leadership in Sunday School and Vacation Bible School work. The youth camps have been a blessing in drawing the young people closer to the Lord.

All meetings report that their pastors are faithful in preaching God's Word with all its fulness under the unction and guidance of the Holy Spirit. They uphold the doctrinal standard of Friends.

Following is a quotation from the Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting minutes of May 14, 1955:

Recommendation was brought from Entiat and Spokane Monthly Meetings uniting in the proposal to establish a new quarterly meeting on the east side of the Cascade Mountains, to be composed now of Entiat and Spokane Monthly Meetings, Quincy Outpost, East Wenatchee Preparative Meeting and Hayden Lake Outpost. This Quarterly Meeting is to be called Inland Quarterly Meeting. Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting recommends that this proposal be accepted and forwarded to the Yearly Meeting as approved by this Quarterly Meeting, and proper action should be taken.

We suggest: (1) notation be made in separate columns of data that is accurate and that which is only estimated or approximated; (2) the basis for obtaining information should be clearly defined so that the meaning of the information is the same in all meetings; (3) copies of the forms should be sent to the monthly meetings early in the year in order that each meeting can set up the proper machinery to keep accurate record of the requested data.

Dr. Everett L. Cattell, when he was presented to the meeting, brought greetings from Ohio Yearly Meeting. He said a special tribute to Calvin Choate and Merrill Coffin who had helped him so much in his spiritual life.

His topic was the "Time Element in Salvation". He read Romans 5:1-5.

He said light is shed abroad but various objects hinder its penetration to all parts. In our lives it may be jealousy, bitterness, etc. that hinder the spread of light. Now is the accepted time—now is the day of salvation. Our testimony should be up to date.

The president of the Board expressed her pleasure that two new books have been published: "Presenting Missions in Sunday School" by Esther Cammack Rand, and "Lion-Hearted Quakers" by Marie Haines.

The following report was approved:

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Attendance in the Sunday Schools of Oregon Yearly Meeting averaged 4,820 during the past year, compared with 4,523 for the previous year, a gain of 297. There were 33 Sunday Schools which showed an increase in average attendance, 20 which showed a loss, and 4 which remained the same. Five Sunday Schools in the Yearly Meeting made a gain of 25% or more. These were Springbrook, Seattle Memorial, West Chehalem, Riverside and Rose Valley. Special mention should be made of our two new Outposts, Quincy and Metolius, which started with an attendance of zero and averaged 23 for Quincy and 52 for Metolius.

In the field of evangelism statistics cannot be given. But reports indicate an increasing realization of the importance of this part of our Sunday School work. Many of the Sunday Schools report that opportunity has been given during or after the class period for pupils to find the Lord. Other means of evangelism have been special decision days in the Sunday School, evangelistic appeals in the opening or closing exercises, unified services in which the children of the Sunday School are encouraged to stay for the church service, and

evangelism in the D.V.B.S. and summer camp. One meeting made the pertinent observation that the decisions made by their young people during their revival and in Sunday night services were, they felt, the fruit of the labors of their Sunday School teachers. May the concern for the salvation of those who are reached by our Sunday Schools continue to deepen and spread.

In the field of teacher training, 16 meetings report teacher training classes held. Four Quarterly Meetings sponsored Sunday School workshops or Teacher Training courses.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH WORK

There were 41 Vacation Bible Schools held with a total enrollment of 2400 or more. Evangelistic efforts in the V.B.S. resulted in the conversion of some 375 children.

Reports on Christian Endeavor show a total membership of 434 in senior C.E., 255 in intermediate, and 276 in junior.

There are 11 Boys Clubs with 164 members, and 10 Girls Clubs with 129 members.

Attendance at all our Boys and Girls camps and Youth Conferences totaled 952. And figure can never tell of the decisions made and the lives consecrated and transformed through the work of our camps and conferences.

Other youth activities include junior choir, socials, softball, basketball, Youth for Christ, youth nights, hobby nights, and Child Evangelism classes.

BOARD ACTIVITY

During the past year the Board of Christian Education has promoted evangelism in the Sunday School with the theme of "Evangelize in '55". Junior Yearly Meeting is again sponsored by our Board. We have sent financial assistance for Vacation Bible Schools in Ashland, Sprague River and Timber. We have published, in cooperation with the Board of Missions, the book "Presenting Missions in the Sunday School" by Esther Cammack Rand. And we are at the present time in the process of publishing the book "Lion-Hearted Quakers" by Marie Haines.

CHALLENGE

For the coming year we wish to re-emphasize the three-fold program for Sunday School advancement—Enlargement, Evangelism, and Education. Special emphasis for the year will be upon Education or Teacher Training, with the following three-point goal:

1. A Teacher-Training class in every Sunday School. Recommended text: "Keys for the Sunday School Teacher," published by the Christian Education Partner Service.
2. Every teacher read one book on Sunday School Teaching Methods.
3. Every teacher read one book for inspiration. A list of recommended books will be sent out.

Each Sunday School reaching the three-point goal will be given recognition as a "Three-Star Sunday School."

Further plans for the coming year include revision of our Boys Club charter and handbook and distribution of the books, "Lion-Hearted Quakers" and "Presenting Missions in the Sunday School."

May we ever be diligent in the great task of winning and training the youth of our church.

Gerald Dillon spoke on the importance of teacher training. He said the ministry of the gospel is a ministry of teaching and that there was a great need for qualified Bible teachers. It is just as important for trained teachers in Bible schools as in public school, both are important. A trained Bible teacher should have a knowledge of the Bible, a knowledge of doctrine, a knowledge of methods and techniques and an evangelistic outreach. The quality of the teacher should be the best for Jesus Christ.

● 42. Gerald Dillon and Lela Morrill were nominated to the Board of Christian Education for a three year term.

● 43. Wayne Piersall led the singing for the inspirational hour.

Dr. Everett Cattell brought the message from Romans 8:4-11. His topic was "Sanctification of Self". He discussed the question of what is enmity against God. There is a relationship between you and God in which there is a decisiveness of surrender. He gave the illustration of the magnet and the iron filings where there are two poles drawing the filings. In our lives one pole is God and one pole, self. Self never dies, but what should die is the self that stands off from God so that there would be only one pole. Self is still alive but it wills God's will. Then our lives are free—cleansed of enmity against God. We are never ready to live until we are holy. There is a line that is drawn between self will and God's will. No one can tell where it is for another but the Holy Spirit is faithful to tell the individual if his life is hid in Christ.

He closed the message with prayer.

I have made an audit of the record of the accounts of the treasurer of the Yearly Meeting and found them kept in an excellent manner and correct, and in my opinion they are correctly reported in the report of the treasurer for the period from July 15, 1954 to July 15, 1955.

● 48. The trustees made the following report:

The painting of the exterior and the repointing of the brick of Yearly Meeting House at Newberg has been completed.

During the year the Trustees have executed deeds as follows which had been authorized by action of the Yearly Meeting: Deed selling a property in Quilcene, Washington, and Deed selling the May Wiley property in Portland.

The following transactions were authorized by the Executive Committee and have been executed by the Trustees: Deed transferring the title to the property in Spokane to Spokane Monthly Meeting; A document required by the company making a loan on a property in Eugene, Oregon.

On the sale of the May Wiley property in Portland, the Yearly Meeting received in addition to other considerations Lots 29, 30, and 31, Block 18, Fairport, in the City of Portland, Multnomah County, Oregon.

The Trustees request that the Yearly Meeting authorize the Trustees to enter into a contract to sell Lots 29, 30, and 31, Block

18, Fairport, in the City of Portland, Multnomah County, Oregon, to Richard G. Saylor and Celia J. Saylor.

Holly Park Monthly Meeting requests that the title to their church property be transferred to Holly Park Monthly Meeting. If the Yearly Meeting approves this request the Trustees request that the Yearly Meeting authorize and empower the Trustees to execute a deed, sign a warranty deed transferring the entire property of the Yearly Meeting at the corner of 43rd and Othello Streets in the City of Seattle, King County, Washington, to Holly Park Monthly Meeting.

Ontario Heights Monthly Meeting, Malheur County, Oregon, requests that the Yearly Meeting Trustees be authorized to sell their present church property consisting about 1 acre and empower the Trustees to sign a warranty for said property.

The whole report was approved.

- 49. The report of the General Superintendent was as follows:

REPORT OF GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

Time is a gift of God with which we are all equally endowed. Yet, time which has gone by, seems to have ebbed all too quickly. At best, the years of our labor for God are too few. The Bible refers to our natural life as a hand breadth, a swift ship, a vapor, a thread cut by the weaver, and as a shepherd's tent removed. The poet also had a word for it when he wrote:

"Only one life, 'twill soon be past;
Only what's done for Christ will last".

To insure the greatest good from our invested lives, there must, then, be the daily holy exercise of bearing our cross for Him who first bore it for us, and the consideration of all our earthly tasks as a sacred stewardship.

While it is true that the greatest and only real task of the church is evangelism, it is also true that God's will and purpose for the church is that it should be holy, for, "He hath chosen us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before Him in love." (Eph. 1:4)

Personal report

It is impossible, in this one brief report, to tell all the concerns, and report all the outstanding events of the church life during the past year. I have sought, by God's help, to be faithful in carrying out the duties laid upon me by the church. Where there may be evidences of progress and achievement in the life of the church, the

praise belongs only to God. Where there are failures, we must confess human inadequacy for the tasks.

It was my privilege to preach for the student revival at Friends Bible College in Kansas in the month of December. I was also called to be the evangelist for revival services at the Rose Valley meeting in March, and two of our C.E. summer conferences, Twin Lakes and Wauna Mer, during this past summer. Each of these special meetings was a time of rich blessing to my own soul and I thank God for the victories won.

I have visited almost all of our 57 churches during the year, and about 116 messages and sermons were given. My work has taken me 28,041 miles by auto and train. I represented the Yearly Meeting on the Board of Administration, and attended the convention, of the National Association of Evangelicals. While in Chicago for this convention I met with the Publication Board of the Missionary Voice magazine. In December I attended the American Yearly Meeting Superintendents' Conference in Richmond, Indiana. I have continued to publish the monthly News Flash in the interest of Outpost churches, and also have sent out a pastoral letter each month.

Scores of Friends have worked faithfully this year to make the program of Oregon Yearly Meeting succeed. We should consider ourselves fortunate to have men and women of such fine abilities and spiritual graces to lead the work of our boards and church related groups. I want to mention also the gifted and consecrated services of Beth Hockett, our Yearly Meeting Secretary, upon whom falls much of the heavy duties of the Yearly Meeting office. Mention should be made of Ray and Margaret Carter, and Ralph and Myrtle Fletcher, who are making a tremendous contribution to the Yearly Meeting in the field of publications. The Quarterly Meeting Superintendents are doing a fine work in every instance.

The Christian Endeavorers have not been able to carry their heavy financial load in supporting field workers. Laura Shook and Dorothy Barratt are still giving largely of their time, without remuneration since the first of May, to this field work. I am deeply concerned that the Yearly Meeting be more actively interested and concerned with our youth program. A vital youth program will not only provide enthusiasm and life for the church today, but will insure the future success of the church.

Quaker Hour continues to prove its worth to the church in our effort to get the message of the gospel to the world. The program is especially beneficial to the communities where new Friends meetings are springing up. Milo C. Ross and his faithful staff of workers are producing a high quality Christian radio program which is reaching an estimated 13 million listeners every year, or approximately 250,000 per week.

George Fox College belongs to Oregon Yearly Meeting. We have a great responsibility to do our share in getting behind the school in a renewed way this year. Let us all unite our prayers and our giving that our school may be maintained.

Greenleaf Academy, though owned and operated by the Greenleaf church, ought to have a much wider scope of interest and support within the Yearly Meeting. If our much needed Quaker schools of learning are to be maintained, we will all have to work together, in the spirit of sacrifice similar to that which characterized our fathers who founded these schools.

Outreach

During the past 10 years we have gained an average of 2 new churches per year. In 1945 there were 37 meetings and today we have 57. It is interesting to note that in 1936, the General Superintendent reported 23 monthly meetings and 23 outposts! This gets very near the goal of the Board of Evangelism, which is "Every Monthly Meeting a parent church." The statistics do not tell what types of outposts these all were but at least it shows something of the outpost vision of the Yearly Meeting in those days.

New Churches

This year we report 2 new churches in our family of Quaker meetings. First services for the Quincy, Washington church were held September 5, 1954. Harley and Amy Adams felt called of God to open up a work in this rapidly growing little city of the Inland Empire, and God has honored their efforts. On this past August 3, the Quincy Friends moved into their own meeting house which they recently purchased from another denomination.

On September 12, the Metolius, Oregon, church was officially set on its way, when the first sessions of Sunday School and both morning and evening services were conducted. Gene and Betty Hockett have pastored this work since its beginning. Already these Friends have purchased a parsonage and a suitable site for a new meeting house which they hope to start soon.

Outposts

We now have 7 Outposts and 5 Preparative Meetings in the Yearly Meeting. The Outposts are: Ashland, Sprague River, Pringle, Timber, Quincy, Hayden Lake, and Cambridge. The Preparative Meetings are: Eugene, Maplewood, Metolius, East Wenatchee, and Agnew.

Promotions

During the year 2 Outposts, East Wenatchee and Metolius, received the promotion to Preparative Meetings. Also, 2 Preparative Meetings, Meadows Valley and Rose Valley, were set up as full-fledged Monthly Meetings. These four meetings are to be commended on their fine records of service and growth.

With the recent development of new churches in Eastern Washington it has become evident that a new quarterly meeting for that area is essential. Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting has petitioned the Yearly Meeting to set up a new Eastern Washington Quarterly Meeting, and with the accomplishment of this another important advance in our church's history will be achieved.

Friends Church Extension Foundation

One of the chief problems in our extension work is the need for more adequate church buildings. This problem is almost too great for our new outpost groups since most of them begin with only a very few families. The Friends Church Extension Foundation has been established to assist worthy and promising young churches in their building programs. This will provide a stable business organization to handle gifts, annuities, wills, and loans for outpost building purposes.

The value of Yearly Meeting financial assistance and organizational oversight in our outpost work has been seen in such recent Yearly Meeting projects as the churches in Spokane, Eugene, and East Wenatchee.

Missions' Silver Anniversary

Words are poor vehicles of expression when it comes to evaluating accomplishments and divine blessings on occasions such as this, the 25th anniversary of our beloved Friends Bolivian Mission. Marie Haines has summed up in historic review, the past 25 years of our missionary labors among our Aymara brethren of the high plains of the Andes. All the Mission Board members, all the devoted missionaries, all the faithful National workers, and all the consecrated prayer warriors at home, past and present, present a colorful pageant of review as they march across our memory's view and even within the scope of our present observation. We bare our heads and stand in awe before God as we consider the miracles of grace which crowd themselves into the short 25 years of our open door in Bolivia.

Expansion

There is no place to level off in the work of God's kingdom. This is true in our missionary work. This past year marked the opening of a new section of our field for missionary development. We know this new part of our field as the Yungas area. The acceptance of this new territory has practically doubled the potential of our missionary opportunities in Bolivia.

A brief field survey, recently made by one of our missionaries, indicates that we have been occupying only about one-eighth of the field for which we are responsible. If this be true, we need to stir ourselves to renewed vision and strengthen our hands for the task.

Missionary Voice

A most significant step toward closer evangelical Friends cooperation was taken this past year with the publication of the Missionary Voice, a joint publication representing the foreign mission fields of Kansas, Ohio, and Oregon Yearly Meetings.

Our Stewardship

Our people have proven, during recent months, that they are willing and able to respond to the challenge of increased vision and giving. I want to thank every member who has given so generously to the Yearly Meeting program. Robert L. Morrill, Financial Secretary, has visited every Quarterly Meeting during the year in the interest of increased giving to the United Budget. He has been greatly used of the Lord in the revival of vision for our home and foreign work. E. Grace Clark, President of the Board of Stewardship, has also contributed to this reviving as she has traveled from place to place in the work of stewardship promotion.

Church-Pastor Relationship

Happy is the church where the pastor and people work together in love and harmony. I am glad to report that this is true in most of our churches. There is a growing interest in longer pastorates, and where there is mutual agreement, some churches are extending pastoral calls for 3 to 5 year periods. I feel this is a trend in the right direction.

It is interesting to note that the churches which are growing the fastest, are those where the pastor is able to spend much time in visitation, prayer and study. Every church should seek to free its pastor from responsibilities which rob him of the purpose of his call, to give himself continually to prayer and ministry of the Word.

We regret the loss of three of our fine pastors from the Yearly Meeting this year. Mahlon L. Macy has accepted a call to become

a Regional Director for the National Association of Evangelicals. Frank Haskins will move to the pastorate at Inglewood, California, and John McCracken will pastor the Tonganoxie Friends Church in Kansas. Kenneth Williams will be teaching at George Fox College, and Calvin Hull has temporarily retired from the pastorate because of his wife's health.

We are glad that we can present five pastors who will be coming in to fill these vacancies. We welcome the following new pastors: Myron Goldsmith, pastor at Piedmont; Peter Fertello, pastor at Agnew; John Fankhauser, pastor at South Salem; Walter and Gladys Cook, co-pastors at Forest Home; and Preston Mills, pastor at Everett.

During the past year a great number of our pastors or their wives have had to have hospital care, because of accident or sickness. Everyone is aware that we Friends are, in many cases, extremely slack in providing adequate pastoral support. When emergencies come, some of our pastors often face real hardship, and some do without needed medical attention because of lack of funds. Some of the churches have proven their loyalty to their pastor's family by taking care of part or even all of these heavy medical expenses. This is deeply appreciated.

I am suggesting that the Yearly Meeting consider the advisability of recommending to each meeting a hospital insurance plan for each pastor. This can be done at a very nominal cost. We provide almost nothing for the pastor when he is no longer able to serve the church. We ask him to give his entire life with only enough income for his immediate expenses. Does not the church have a moral obligation in the matter of material care for those who serve in the gospel?

Challenge

The church not only has a stewardship, but the church has a glory. Jesus prayed, "And the glory which Thou gavest me I have given them..." (John 17:22).

But when the church loses the genuine thrill of giving, we lose the glory.

When the church ceases to exist primarily for the sake of the souls of men, we lose the glory.

When the church loses the fervent expectancy in worship, we lose the glory.

When the church figures it is time to level off in missionary responsibility, we lose the glory.

When the church becomes willing to accept God's second best because of lack of consecration to fulfill the requirements for God's first best, we lose the glory.

When the church loses the holy glow, we lose the glory.

"Have your eyes caught the vision,
Has your soul felt the thrill?
To the call of the Master,
Do you answer, 'I will'?
For the conflict of the ages
Taught by prophets and by sages,
In its fury is upon us,
Is upon us today".

We dare not be satisfied with anything less than God's first and best plan for our church.

● 52. The representatives nominated Walter P. Lee and Lawrence McCracken to serve on the Board of Missions for a term of three years.

This was approved.

● 53. The following nominations by the representatives to George Fox College Corporation were approved:

Nominated to succeed themselves for term of five years: A. Clark Smith, Ernest Stephens, Clynton Crisman, Dillon W. Mills, Lenora Pemberton.

Nominated to fill vacancy left by Roy Clark, for a term of one year: Dorothy Barratt.

● 54. Hazel Ruth Tucker of Bethany Orphanage in Kentucky was introduced to the meeting.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

● 55. The members of the board and Marshal Cavit sat on the platform as Walter P. Lee, president of the board, presided.

Walter P. Lee read the following report of the missionary field secretary which was approved:

The Missionary Field Secretary work in conjunction with the pastoral work at Whitney has been a large responsibility that it is probable that neither has received the fullest attention deserved. However, I rejoice in the Lord for the privilege of serving in His vineyard and am humbly thankful to Him for Divine help and guidance.

The Friends at Whitney have been very sympathetic to the mission work and in the pastoral agreement have arranged for me to be away from the church for as much as eight weeks during the year.

The correspondence relative to the missionary work has continued to increase in volume and in order to handle it without infringing too heavily upon pastoral duties, I have employed a private secretary by the hour. I have personally written 179 communications, besides dictating approximately 250 more to the secretary.

I have prepared the Missionary Prayer Bulletin each month, written ten articles for publication in The Northwest Friend and The Missionary Voice of Evangelical Friends, as well as preparing general letters to be sent to the Monthly Meetings and special letters to the members of the Board of Missions. In the preparation of the Missionary Handbook I assisted in furnishing material and di-

rected the arrangement and publication. The historical booklet, Friends in Aymara Land, which was so ably written by Marie Haines, received my attention in the matter of suggestions, proof reading and publication arrangements. The publicity for the Junior Missionary Workbook, so excellently prepared by Flodene Jarvill, was handled through my office.

In an effort to encourage continued missionary interest among our people, I have spoken in the sessions of all but one of the quarterly meetings at least once during the year. Illness prevented my attendance at Newberg Quarterly Meeting when I was scheduled. In addition to this I have presented missions in some of the newer meetings as well as participated in a missionary conference at Entiat which included Wenatchee and Quincy.

As a representative of our missionary work, I attended the Missionary Executives' Retreat sponsored by the Evangelical Foreign Missions Association at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin last October. Roscoe Knight accompanied me and there we met Marshal Cavit. Likewise I attended the annual convention of the Evangelical Foreign Missions Association in connection with the National Association of Evangelicals' annual meeting in Chicago last April. I was elected to the Board of Administration of the E. F. M. A. for a three-year term which gives Oregon Yearly Meeting a representative on this board for the first time.

At this time Dean Gregory and I attended the meeting of the Publication Board of The Missionary Voice of Evangelical Friends where future plans and policies were formulated.

The property left by May Wiley for the use or disposal by the Board of Missions was entrusted to my care. Since my residence has not been in close proximity to the property, the aid of Harold Lund was enlisted in caring for the business. He has done this most efficiently and the property has been sold. Since there is a contract involved, not much cash has been realized and the net proceeds cannot yet be determined although the property did not prove to be as valuable as Mrs. Wiley had hoped. This will probably further delay the establishment of a missionary furlough home.

In the performance of the various responsibilities mentioned I have spent 27 days away from home, travelled approximately 17,500 miles and spent approximately 210 hours in the office besides general thought and care of the work.

The responsibilities and correspondence connected with this office have multiplied rapidly in the past two years and may soon exceed the possibility of part-time attention. The privilege of serving in this capacity has brought to me great inspiration and challenge as the Lord has so definitely revealed His approval of the missionary work.

Merrill M. Coffin read excerpts from the annual report of the Board of Missions.

The report as a whole appears below and was accepted by the meeting:

With great rejoicing and a humble thanksgiving to God, the Board of Missions presents its twenty-fifth annual report since the acceptance of the Bolivian mission field in 1930. On this Silver Anniver-

sary year at the close of the first twenty-five years of Gospel ministry among the Aymara Indians of the Bolivian altiplano, we repeat the words of the Psalmist, "Oh that men would praise the Lord for His goodness, and for His wonderful works to the children of men! For He satisfieth the longing soul, and filleth the hungry soul with goodness".

The growth of the work during these twenty-five years from a group of seventy-five believers to the number of some 2000, meeting in 45 different places is a miracle of divine grace when viewed against the background of the people, the country, and the conditions with which we have worked. A glance over the years reveals not only an increase in numbers, but a number of other important additions such as the headquarters church in La Paz, the Chester Hadley Memorial Mission Home at the headquarters, the purchase of a farm and establishment of the Helen Cammack Memorial Bible Training School with a three-year course for young men, the development of a Christian day school program, the beginning of the national church and the advance toward a small clinic with a registered nurse, and a missionary staff which has grown to the number of fourteen, twelve of whom are supported by Oregon Yearly Meeting.

This year has been one of great challenge and definite progress. The additional mission field for which we began looking two years ago has developed in Bolivia, where we have been working. Great new untouched areas have opened to us on the shores and islands of Lake Titicaca and in one of the Yungas valleys below La Paz. The field reports will tell of evangelism through tent meeting campaigns and further development in the organization of the National Church.

The Bolivian land reform program which has its effect on our mission farm as well as the rest of Bolivia was not settled during the year, but the Lord graciously answered prayer for the protection of our missionaries and property.

Again this year the Lord has blessed the productivity of the mission farm in a miraculous way. This blessing of the Lord on the farm efforts has provided for the complete expenses of the Bible School operation aside from missionary salaries and furnished \$4000 on the purchase of a \$6000 "D2" Caterpillar tractor. The remaining \$2000 came from a fund for the development of the farm given several years ago by an interested friend.

Our understaffed missionary force of a year ago was greatly strengthened by the return to the field, during the year, of the Willcuts, Chapmans and Knights. Before returning to Bolivia, the Knights visited the meetings of Oregon Yearly Meeting in deputation work.

The Marshal Cavit family, who have been loaned to our mission by the World Gospel Mission (formerly National Holiness Missionary Society) and supported by this organization, came home for furlough in August of 1954 and were in deputation for the World Gospel Mission during the winter and spring months. However, the schedule was arranged for the Cavits to do deputation throughout Oregon Yearly Meeting during the summer months of 1955. Arrangements had been made for them to visit most of our meetings, two of our summer conferences where Marshal served as evangelist and to participate in the Yearly Meeting sessions of this year. This privilege is greatly appreciated by the Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

The Lord has continued to bless the missionary program financially. There has always been sufficient on hand to meet the general expenses and the response has been good for special needs. An unexpected gift of approximately \$3800 came from outside the Yearly Meeting for the purchase of a Jeep truck, a twenty-one foot semi-cabin aluminum cruiser for use in evangelism on Lake Titicaca, a fourteen foot aluminum boat for evangelism by the national brethren along the shores of the lake and a 40 horsepower Mercury Outboard motor. There has been a good response to the appeal for funds to ship these items to Bolivia. The Jeep truck has been ordered through an agency in Bolivia and the other items will be shipped with the Cavits freight probably in November when the Cavits plan to return to Bolivia.

The new administration building for the Helen Cammack Memorial Bible Training School has been in use this year and through the gifts of a number of interested friends is a memorial to Marie McClintock, L. W. and Emma J. Heston, and I. G. and Ida J. Lee. A suitable memorial plate will be placed on the building.

The Helen Ross Memorial fund has developed this year and will be used in building our first church in the Yungas region.

The Mary Cammack Memorial fund has also been given this year and is to be used for the purchase of books for the Bible School library.

Pledges made in the 1954 Yearly Meeting missionary service have been paid in the amount of nearly \$2100 which should be nearly sufficient to build the new missionary residence in the Yungas when a suitable site is determined.

On the home front, the Board of Missions has endeavored to furnish information and suggestions for the use of the local meetings. A missionary handbook containing information and plans was prepared and distributed to the missionary chairmen and pastors of the local meetings. A missionary workbook for children, to be used in Vacation Bible School, Junior Christian Endeavor or Club work was prepared largely through the efforts of Flodene Jarvill, Missionary Superintendent of Salem Quarterly Meeting. This was made available to all of our churches. The Missionary Prayer Bulletin has been sent each month to each meeting in addition to the monthly news letter from our missionaries on the field. The Board has actively promoted and cooperated in the publication of the new missionary magazine, The Missionary Voice of Evangelical Friends published quarterly as a cooperative project of the mission boards of Ohio, Kansas and Oregon Yearly Meetings. For the twenty-fifth anniversary of our Bolivian work, the Board authorized the publication of a history of the work. We wish to express appreciation to Marie Haines, who assembled the material and wrote this booklet entitled Friends in Aymara Land which is now off the press and available.

Relative to missionary interest in our local churches, the reports from forty-seven meetings revealed an average of five special missionary services per meeting. This is an increase of one service over last year's average.

Many meetings reported the reading of missionary books for a total of 858. Last year's report indicated a larger number read.

Reports indicated that there were thirty-eight members of Oregon Yearly Meeting in foreign missionary work, although only twelve of these are serving under the direction of the Yearly Meeting.

The number of missionary prayer meetings reported was 382, which is somewhat less than the preceding year. This is an important part of the missionary work and should receive increasing attention.

The support of the calendar project continues to grow. The number of calendars used increased to 1322 and the average receipts per calendar advanced to \$3. According to the reports received the total calendar receipts amounted to \$3,786.68. However, the Yearly Meeting treasurer's books show a larger figure of \$4,194.52. Let us encourage ever increasing support of the calendar project as the entire Preacher-Teacher fund for Bolivia is dependent upon this project for the coming year. This is due to the fact that the Women's Missionary Union has transferred its support to a missionary couple. The whole program of national evangelism and day schools will receive its support from the calendar fund. The increase in average receipts per calendar is encouraging, but complete support of this project would have averaged \$7.75 per calendar. The challenge is before us.

Recognition should be given Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting again this year for the largest total amount given to the calendar project in the amount of \$954.46 and also for the highest average per calendar of \$5.92. Star Monthly Meeting still holds the record for the Yearly Meeting with an average of \$6.57 per calendar. However, there were some very close competitors.

While praising our Lord Jesus Christ for past victories and advances, we look forward to greater conquest through Him. As we stand on the threshold of the second twenty-five years, the opportunities for evangelism are unlimited. The needs on the mission field seem to increase with greater opportunities. It appears that soon our staff should be increased to include teachers for the missionary children, workers among the Aymara women and Bible School teachers to care for a fourth year course. This in turn will necessitate more buildings including houses for new missionaries, and a new kitchen and dining hall for the Bible School to release more space for dormitories.

As we view the challenge before us, may our hearts sing, "Lead on, O King Eternal."

Field Council

As this report is prepared there are twelve missionaries on the field which enables a wider outreach of endeavor than has at times been possible. This, accompanied with an unprecedented opening of doors into new areas and all but complete lack of serious political interference in mission efforts in evangelism and education has permitted the projection of various plans envisioned in the past. Some of these to further be reported: continued emphasis with the Mission launch into the islands of the lake, thrusting a real campaign into the Yungas area frontiers, attempts at mass evangelism with the gospel tent into unevangelized communities, further development of the national church through the organizing of Quarterly Meetings, an enlarged National Church executive committee, an accelerated visitation program over the field by all missionaries as they were relieved for such by an enlarged personnel.

The most serious and harrasing problem faced is still the Mission farm land reform program as yet not definitely settled. But the great volume of prayer from Oregon Yearly Meeting, with the painstaking, patient efforts of the farm missionaries in working on this problem, has held things in check and there is reason for optimism as we acknowledge God's care and direction in this matter.

During the year the Mission staff has been doubled. The Willcuts' arrived in October, Chapmans in November, and the Knights in April. Since the Hibbs' family leave in August, there will be a short period during Bible School vacation when the staff will again be depleted until the arrival of the Cavits, probably in December. It is with praise to God that we report each one in good health and all carrying a full load.

The responsibilities were shared this year as follows: Paul Cammack served as Mission Council chairman, director of the Bible School and as missionary advisor on the Council of the Bolivian National Church until January when it seemed advisable for some reorganization, when new missionaries arrived. He then took over the task of farm secretary and has continued throughout the year as field treasurer. Leland Hibbs served as farm secretary until January; has since continued to assist in farm responsibilities and been a teacher in the Bible School. Mark Roberts has served as educational secretary; Ralph Chapman, director of the Bible School since January; Jack Willcuts, as chairman of the Mission Council, missionary representative on the Council of the Bolivian National Church, and a member of the Field Evangelism Committee, since December. Roscoe Knight, a member of the Mesa Directiva of the National Church, has served as a member of the Field Evangelism Committee in charge of the Yungas area development since April. Phyllis Cammack has served as Field editor of the "Soul Cry of the Aymara" and the "Missionary Voice of Evangelical Friends", and the "Amigo Suyu" a monthly magazine for national workers, teacher in the Bible School, Secretary of the Mission Council since Decem-

ber, and also served as director of the first short term girl's school at Copajira. Iverna Hibbs was a teacher in the Bible School and Secretary of the Field Mission Council until December. Marie Chapman served as a teacher in the Bible School. Wilma Roberts was medical Secretary.

Evangelistic Report of Altiplano Area

The first few months after our arrival on the field in October were spent in trying to find and visit all the new places opened up over the field during the 3 years of our absence. Indicative of God's blessing upon our work is the observation of growth evidenced over the years. Upon our first arrival to Bolivia in 1947 we found about eight well established churches, this time there were around twenty-five, plus a number of other regular preaching points.

After a general field survey, an evangelistic program of 3 phases was approved by the Field Mission Council. (1) An effort to solidify and establish the various new groups springing up through greater emphasis on teaching of Friends practices and doctrine, more general formulation of membership lists, uniform methods of financing and local organization. This is not a task to be accomplished in one year nor five, but it is felt unless certain policies and teaching programs are pursued, there may be danger of loss of believers and churches in the future. Conservation is of equal importance with evangelism, particularly on the mission field. Consequently, membership classes and Quaker practices instruction has been given and will be continued at each Quarterly Meeting session as a preliminary step in this direction as consistent with Quaker tradition and belief—all within the framework of the National Church. (2) Development of the National Bolivian Friends Church into Quarterly Meetings and in legal incorporation as a separate entity. Four Quarterly Meetings were organized at Yearly Meeting time in April and subsequently set up over the field in the following manner: Junta Trimestral Cordillera (Cordillera Quarterly Meeting) which meets the first Friday of each of the months of May, August, November and February, rotating each time from one church to another of the Quarter. Peninsula Quarterly Meeting follows the second weekend of these months; La Paz Quarterly Meeting, the third; and Frontera Quarterly Meeting, the fourth. Quarterly Meeting officers of each area include as yet only a Quarterly Meeting superintendent and two clerks for handling the business and church reports. It is felt here that the Quarterly Meetings will provide not only spiritual blessing, but a greater solidarity and maturity to our Bolivian Friends Church and open new opportunities for evangelism. Too, because of the size and number of our churches, it is impossible for the missionaries or national secretaries to cover all the field well and by thus gathering together in Quarterly Meetings, field or local problems can be shared with the visiting Friends. Step two of the development of the National Church is the incorporation of the Bolivian Friends Church. In order to pursue this goal, it was first necessary to ready and approve the Constitution and Discipline. (Ralph Chapman is to be commended for the

great amount of work previously done on this rather monumental task). This Constitution was approved by the Yearly Meeting this year and is now in the hands of a lawyer for presentation to proper government offices. One interesting change effected this year as required by said Constitution, was the enlargement of the Mesa Directiva from 6 to 9 members. (3) Tent evangelism penetrating into new areas under the leadership of national evangelists, is the third project developed this year. At present, four national workers are working in their 7th meeting. With nightly attendance ranging from 35 to 500, it is estimated at least 3,000 new people have heard the Gospel through this means the past few months. It appears as though at least 3 new churches may be established as a direct result of this effort and possibly more. Through the use of daily house to house visitation, as well as evening services using flannelgraph, colored Bible slides, public address system, etc., these meetings are making a considerable impact on the communities visited. Too, a variety of places have been frequented along the extremities of our field, although the plan has been generally followed to visit such places as can be followed up with conservation efforts by either neighboring churches, sending out workers, or by the Bible School students.

Other activities in the evangelistic program has included extensive weekend visitation by the Bible School boys and farm based missionaries. During the vacation months of Bible School, students and graduates were placed in needy localities over the field.

The regular annual field conferences have been held this year at La Paz, Chunavi, Ojje and Copajira with Pucarani Conference scheduled for September. These, as usual, have proven times of great blessing and each has been well attended.

A pastor's conference was held at Copajira in November for all the teachers and pastors and special workers and was a time of revival and spiritual instruction.

A week's revival at the La Paz Friend's Church with Rev. Luis Forero as evangelist, was scheduled to start July 17. Mr. Forero is a converted Catholic priest.

Evangelistic Report for The Yungas

It is very evident that God had His hand over things when Oregon Yearly Meeting decided to enlarge its borders in Bolivia and enter the Yungas area. Although the work has been carried on by 2 or 3 nationals for a period of only about a year and by missionaries for just 2 months, there is already a definite response to the Gospel and doors are opening rapidly.

At present workers consist of the Roscoe Knight family and 3 nationals. Francisco Avalos, Braulio Espejo and Cipriano Copa. Knights are living temporarily at the mission rest cabin, Francisco lives near them and helps in evangelism. Braulio is pastor at Yarija and Cipriano is pastor and teacher at San Felix.

Services are held regularly at Yarija, with an average Sunday attendance of 20; at San Felix, with an average attendance of 60; and at Mina Chojila, with an average attendance of 5. There are also a few believers at Anacu, who have their own services occa-

sionally, and at Hilumaya and Suiqui. At Pichu, where the cabin is located, there are now 3 believers.

For the past month we have made an intense house-to-house campaign starting up the mountain from La Paz and going down the valley, trying to witness to every person and to leave a portion of the Scriptures in every home. As a result, many have expressed a desire to be converted and leave their sinful ways. It is extremely gratifying to see how the Holy Spirit has been preparing the hearts of these people, both among the Indians and Spanish.

As we now begin nightly revival campaigns in various central places, using both a small tent and the large Gospel tent, we definitely need the prevailing prayers of the members of Oregon Yearly Meeting, praying that hundreds will be converted and that a number of churches will be started, thus giving the opportunity to all to find eternal life in Christ Jesus.

Helen Cammack Memorial Bible Training School

Our school year for 1955 began on January 8, at which time 38 young men solicited entrance into the school. This number was reduced to 34 in the beginning weeks of school. Of that number, one boy was dismissed, and two others returned to their homes, leaving a present total of 31 in our student body, as we near the final weeks of this school year. The student body this year is made up of eight third year, nine second year, and fourteen first year boys. We again notice a wide range in the scholastic abilities of the boys in each group. This necessitates a level of studies which will challenge the more advanced, and yet not discourage those who struggle to keep up. We are thankful for a good spirit manifest by all the boys, and feel that for the most part advancement has been made in their spiritual lives during the year.

The usual pattern of revival meetings has been followed again this year, with special emphasis weeks during the first week of school, immediately following the Yearly Meeting in La Paz at Easter, and contemplated meetings the last week of school, culminating in the Copajira Conference at Commencement. Ralph Chapman was evangelist during the first week of meetings, and Harold Harriman of the World Gospel Mission—NHMS—this year's evangelist at Yearly Meeting, was our evangelist for the mid-year revival. The Lord's working in our midst was evident, and spiritual gains were made, as many received Him in saving and sanctifying faith. Daily chapel periods, Sunday morning prayer meetings and Sunday night services have been conducted all through the year, and have contributed to the spiritual growth in the lives of the students. A number of visiting friends brought inspiring messages to our group.

The boys have been very faithful in their evangelistic work. Hardly a weekend has passed without as many as fifteen or twenty boys going out to pastorates, or to evangelize in the neighboring farms and communities. Five churches of this area, in addition to the Copajira church itself, have been under the immediate supervision of our students. This evangelization has been under the direction of Leland Hibbs. A number of delegates have also been

sent to the La Paz Yearly Meeting and the conferences at Chunavi and Ojje, where they were afforded opportunity both to preach and to lead the children's meetings. A committee composed of three upper classmen, is named each month to work with the missionary advisor in making the appointments of those who go out each weekend. This has proven very satisfactory, and it has helped them to have more of a personal interest in this part of their activities.

Although reports have been made concerning the new administration building, we desire again to express our thankfulness for it. Since January it has been in constant use, even though work has continued on the building. The office has been completed, and laying flooring and putting locks on doors is the work at hand on the new wing. Windows have been installed, and the cement work on ventilation wells, window sills, door steps, etc., is progressing. Needless to say, the very presence of this building contributes to a healthier atmosphere in the school.

The school has been operated with the usual schedule of classes in the mornings from 8 until 12, and with work for the boys each afternoon. Afternoon classes on carpentry and leather work have been offered to the third and second year boys.

A few changes were made in the teaching staff of the school this year, but we are thankful for the fine manner in which our school program has operated. The system of supervision of the school through a teachers' council was maintained again, and has proven not only satisfactory, but the answer to some problems that arose in former years. The school year began with Paul Cammack as director of the school. When Paul took charge of the farm work, Ralph Chapman was named director and Leland Hibbs joined the teaching staff. Jack and Geraldine Willcuts supplied during the interval of Hibbs' vacation to Arica, and the remainder of the year completed with Leland and Iverna Hibbs, Phyllis Cammack and Marie and Ralph Chapman carrying the teaching load.

As we near the completion of another school year, we give thanks to our Lord for His hand of blessing upon the school. We believe that it is increasingly filling its place in the provision of a trained leadership for our Bolivian Friends Church. We feel that God is honoring our efforts to maintain a high standard of holiness of heart and to emphasize the doctrines held by Friends.

Day School Report

During the past year we feel there has been some improvement in the spiritual qualifications of the teachers we are using in our day schools. There is a continual effort to elevate the spiritual level of our teaching. In the last year the feeling grew in our council that the schools should be a very definite contributing factor in our spiritual program. We felt that the first prerequisite was the Christian experience of the teachers in the schools. In con-

sideration of this, we tried hard to select and employ only those whom we felt would be a help in the schools spiritually. We thank the Lord that He guided us in some cases and discouraged prospective teachers, in others, to remove some who would have been harmful to the work considering their example and experience as demonstrated after school began. We can not feel that we have yet reached the standard we would like to attain, but we can feel that some progress is being made. We have succeeded, after over a year of effort, in getting the pastors and teachers on a comparable salary scale. We felt this important in developing the realization that the ministry of teaching should be as much a calling and part of the Lord's work as being a pastor.

Examinations at the end of the school year showed some improvement over those of the year before in the educational level of the students. However, this still falls far short of what we would like. There seems to be a feeling of greater responsibility among our teachers for the standing of the students.

Last year there was a total of some two hundred fifty students in our six schools. This year there are eight schools with a total membership of about three hundred sixty students in all grades of primary. We are now using nine teachers and three helpers. There are two new schools this year; one called San Felix in the Yungas and one small one called Jawira Pampa near the farm. These are being taught by pastors who care for the churches in the same communities.

During the past year the director has traveled to each school three or more times. Spiritual training has been encouraged at all times. We tried to have all teachers attend the week of conference for preachers and teachers in which the needs of their spiritual lives may be open to the searching light of the Holy Spirit. Instruction is given in school work and methods on visits and in the conference for pastors and teachers by the director.

It is hoped that the spiritual tone of our schools may increase; that the teachers will feel an ever growing burden for the souls of students under them and make a conscious effort to win them to the Lord.

Medical Report

The medical work of this year has been largely a continuation of what was done last year. In some things less was done and some parts of the work have grown considerably in proportions. For example the vaccination program has been restricted to two trips to Puerto Perez and Chiripaca. However, the treatment of sick people in La Paz has grown considerably. There are many who come with maladies beyond our ability to help and these we must take to doctors. A great deal of time is spent in being a procurative service for the Indians. Many come not knowing there are free or very inexpensive services for them. These services are a real help to us, as well as the Indians. Many trips are made to get the Indians to these services for chest x-rays, dental attention, hospital care, vaccinations, and tests for venereal diseases. Many trips and much waiting is involved in getting the more serious

cases to doctors.

At the beginning of the Bible School year a trip was made to the farm and notations made on the physical condition of the boys. Tuberculin serum was secured and the scratch test for T. B. administered. We hope to continue the tests on larger groups such as pastors and school children. We have made an effort to secure drugs and T. B. serum through one of the public health services for use in our work. This has been in process for six months, but we hope to have these things in possession soon. A fine reception was given us by the heads of this service.

During the last year we were given a room in La Paz for clinical purposes. This was thoroughly cleaned and painted. A treatment table was made and other furniture was secured. Some was obtained from the farm and repainted. Other small things were made. Hours for this small clinic are from one to three o'clock in the afternoon, but to this date it has been rather hard to get the Indians to comply, so they come at all hours.

During the year several trips were made into the country to see seriously ill people and get some to medical aid. Numerous trips were made in La Paz for the same purpose, and many others to see or attend bed-fast patients. One trip was made to bring the father of one of our young pastors to La Paz for help. It was first necessary to convince the family that no harm would be done the old man in La Paz. It seems that some of the neighbors had told them the foreigners had some machine to remove the grease from a person's body and they were afraid this would happen to him. When we were able to see a doctor, the doctor said the old man had a serious liver condition and would soon die. The old man was taken home, given medicine and instructions on what not to eat, and almost no hope to live. Some months later he came to Junta and seemed in fair health. This is a demonstration that sometimes our help is very short and we must make known to the sick that, outside the Lord's help, their case is hopeless. In several instances, we are sure that the Lord's hand is all that has saved the life of the patient. It is our privilege to remind the people, through these instances, that the Lord is our help and our salvation and not only in the material, but also in the spiritual.

The appreciation of the Indians is demonstrated in their desire to give in return. Though they are often pitifully poor they will bring some small thing as a gift, such as a few eggs, some oranges, a few potatoes, and sometimes what they can pay in money. One man even brought a large fish he had caught.

Classes in sanitation and disease prevention were held at the conference for preachers and teachers. A health class was also held at Junta for the women. Each woman received a small amount of DDT powder and its use was demonstrated.

The tent meeting team has been supplied with simple medicines for use as they go into new areas with the gospel.

Throughout the last year, the vision of a clinical center in Puerto Perez has developed and the property there has been repaired. It is almost ready to be occupied. We are looking forward to the coming year, trusting in the Lord that as we enter this thickly populated area, the ministry of medicine may be an avenue of approach to those who otherwise would not be open to the gospel.

We are praying that the Lord will use us in winning souls in the coming year.

With the great difference in value of the boliviano, 800 bills to one dollar and now 2800 bills to one dollar, the net value of income has been reduced. The produce which has been the money crops this year are the potatoes, hogs, beardless barley, wool, and sheep. If chunos, tuntas, and the credit report (potatoes, chunos, and tuntas) were counted in the potato income, the income would be \$1763.45. If the money spent in tithe, sheep, legal services for the farm reform, machinery repair and replacement, sheep barn, feeders and corral, and Bible school cash and credit were added to the net income, there would appear over \$2100 in income and improvement.

The credit report is a list of farm produce used in the Bible school for the year, for which no money was received either by the farm or by students. Chunos, potatoes, and mutton are the large items in this list. It would take most of one person's time to purchase these items alone, if they were not furnished by the farm. The gardens are certainly a great help to the school, in giving a greater variety to the "boys'" diet. Also, the missionaries helped purchase the garden seeds and used from the school gardens this year. The gardens have produced vegetables since about the first of February.

In order to get the ewes producing at what is felt a capacity for the farm at least one or two years sooner than otherwise, a hundred marino type young ewes were purchased from another farm. They cost about \$2 a head and will produce lambs this coming season. With good feed and a steady increase in the number of ewes this year, they produced 300 lambs. About 1500 pounds of wool was sold this year, at about twenty-four cents a pound and with sheep sold and mutton used by the school, the sheep brought in another \$375 making a gross income for the sheep of \$740, plus the much needed fertilizer for potato raising.

With the purchase of the D2 "cat" the plowing and cultivating of the farm has taken on new life. Since the "cat" could plow sooner after the rainy season, the plow shares were not worn nearly so fast and less fuel and effort were used in getting the land plowed. Also sixty to seventy acres of virgin soil were plowed, which was too heavy plowing for the Farmall "M". The new John Deere 2-bottom 16-inch plow was a great aid in this work. In regular plowing it was

used with the Farmall and in heavy new land with the "cat". Drainage ditches are being put into the new land, since much of it is a bit wet in the present condition. Also, new pasture grasses are being started in an area where the ground is not suitable for general farming and can be irrigated. A large ditch was put in from the river to this new pasture area. This land had only been farmed by Indian methods before, since it is rocky land.

Again, with no serious crop damage, we feel God's hand of favor has been upon the farm this year. When the health of Leland did not permit his continuing in the farm work in February and he had to go into the school, Paul became farmer, and God's grace has been sufficient for the added burden and uncertainty of the land reform, which has not been settled. We feel that God has undertaken since the purchasing of the farm, and the reform will not affect it in any way seriously.

With grateful hearts, we thank everyone who has contributed money to this growing work.

(1) Inflation of the boliviano was the rule during the year with the value rising from 1500 bolivianos to the dollar to 2800 to the dollar. As possible, all surplus money is kept in dollars to avoid undue losses by this inflationary trend.

(2) The overall effect of inflation continues to make the dollar go farther and accomplish more.

(3) Balances:

More money came in this year and more spent in the accelerated, expanding work. With the lower-valley work definitely opened, and the Lake area before us, the surpluses on hand along with a sustained, growing vision will be needed to finance the work.

(4) In the disbursement column is included also any losses sustained for reason of the inflation of the boliviano.

Oregon Friends Church

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

We lovingly greet you in the name of our Savior Jesus Christ. In our Yearly Meeting we received your greetings through our Brother Roscoe Knight. It was a great joy to all the congregation.

We want to share with you the news of our Yearly Meeting of this year of 1955. God greatly blessed even as in past years. Some 500 believers, not counting children, were gathered from the various places in the country. With all the La Paz congregation there were a great number. The La Paz church seats only about 500 people, and with the many visitors the church was completely filled. There was not even standing room, and they were seated very closely even to the very corners of the platform, even on the platform rail and the tithing box. There was no way to call to the altar those who wanted to seek salvation. Also many other visitors we lost for lack of room. For this motive we ask help from the brethren in Oregon to add to our church by next Yearly Meeting. Brethren we do not want to lose more souls that want to hear the Word of God. We were sorry for the many who had to stay outside the church.

During the Yearly Meeting many sought salvation, others sanctification, and many others drew closer to the Lord through the preaching of the missionary Harold Harriman. He was our preacher during the Yearly Meeting, the rest of the missionaries also took part, and the missionary women also were a great blessing. ● 57. During the devotional period Charles Haworth and Gordon St. George offered prayer. At the conclusion of the period the presiding clerk brought the thought that God is a very present help now in our Yearly Meeting and then closed the devotions with prayer.

● 58. The minutes were read and approved with some additions and minor changes.

● 59. Harold Wilhite who has recently returned from missionary service in Kenya Colony, Africa, was introduced to the meeting. He said that he was glad to attend Oregon Yearly Meeting and report that God had been with them in Africa.

● 60. The Executive Committee nominated Charles A. Beals and John C. Brougher to serve on the Board of Trustees of George Fox College.

This was approved.

● 61. The Executive Committee nominated Robert L. Morrill to serve as Financial Secretary for the coming year.

This was approved and appreciation was expressed for his service this past year.

● 62. The Executive Committee made the following recommendation which was approved: The Executive Committee recommends that the salary of the Yearly Meeting Superintendent be raised from \$265.00 per month to \$290.00 per month, with the continued house allowance of \$85.00 per month. This salary totals \$4,500.00 per year.

● 63. The Executive Committee recommends that the number of appointments from the Yearly Meeting to the Board of Trustees of Western Evangelical Seminary be not increased. Refer to Minute 122, page 60 of 1954 Minutes.

This was approved.

● 64. The Board of Service made the following suggestions which were approved with the addition of the statement: "The Board of Service is the one to determine whether there is enough interest or not."

The Board of Service offers for the Yearly Meeting's consideration the following suggestions as to procedure for the establishment of a Friends Retirement Home or Homes. If these recommendations are approved in substance and if there should develop during the coming year enough interest among Friends to warrant taking steps toward establishing a home, the Board of Service desires permission to proceed in this direction.

SOME SUGGESTIONS FOR ESTABLISHING FRIENDS RETIREMENT HOMES

1. The survey by the committee reveals that there is a desire among Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting for a Home or Homes.
2. As the Yearly Meeting covers three states with great geographical distances and state laws on residence requirements for Old Age Pensions, it seems advisable for Friends of each of the states to initiate the establishment of Homes in their respective states.
3. A group desiring to start a Home could incorporate with the following provisos:
 - A. Relation to the Yearly Meeting.
 - (1) Property be held in trust by the Yearly Meeting.
 - (2) The Incorporation Articles and By-laws be approved by the Yearly Meeting.
 - (3) Yearly Meeting name 1/5 of the Board of Directors.
 - B. Corporation membership.
 - (1) All corporation members should be members of the Yearly Meeting at least at the time of admission.
 - (2) Payment of \$100.00 (or some minimum amount) which amount to be credited towards the maintenance of the donor or some person designated by him in the Home.
4. Type of buildings to be constructed should be of two kinds— and eventually three:
 - A. A one-story, fire-proof dormitory and dining unit.
 - B. Duplex and single unit cottages.
 - C. (Eventually) a nursing unit for bed-patients.
5. Financing should be by donations and advance payment on anticipated residency.
 - A. Capital investment for purchase of property and construction of buildings.
 - (1) The corporation determines in advance an amount which must be underwritten before approving the establishment of a Home or the beginning of construction.
 - (a) Until the sum is reached, money should be held in escrow by the Yearly Meeting. If the total is not reached within a given time, all sums will be refunded to donors.
 - (b) All sums paid will be credited to the payer towards support of himself or some person designated by him.
 - (2) Of sums paid in, a certain percent should be set aside for operational costs. The purpose of this will be to safeguard the contributor so that he will not find himself in the embarrassing position of having a place to live but nothing to eat.
 - (3) Construction of cottages could be financed by individuals desiring to live in the Home, with the understanding that they may live there as long as they desire, and afterwards the corporation have sole ownership and jurisdiction over them (cottages).
 - B. Operational costs to be the same as used by other church-sponsored Old People's Homes, namely, either a lump sum advanced to care for the resident the rest of his life, or a monthly payment plan.
 - (1) In view of the fact that the persons who are poor financi-

ally may have State Aid, it is not our thought that the Home be on a charity basis but that it be self-supporting.

BOARD OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

- 65. Mahlon L. Macy, president of the board, presented the following report which was accepted:

The Board of Public Relations submits the following report of the work done by the various departments for the past year. The reports are not complete but they do give a good coverage of the activities within the scope of the board.

The reports reveal a need for constant diligence on the part of each church and each church member. We are glad for gains in some areas but there is much yet to be done to stem the tide of evil and to make a definite mark for righteousness in our communities and in the northwest.

It is the hope of the board that the suggestions in the Handbook for 1955—1956 will be considered and followed in as far as possible.

Department of Peace, Russel Stands, superintendent

From the 43 meetings reporting, we find many helpful things being presented from some and others are not doing so well. We find an increasing interest and concern in this Biblical doctrine that has been stressed by the Friends Church down through the years. We find the real avenue of Peace when we find Christ as our personal Saviour and Sanctifier. This not only brings us at Peace with God but also with our fellow men.

At least 31 sermons have been preached and others have mentioned the subject of Peace in their messages, in the worship services of our churches. In the Sunday School, we find that 22 presentations have been made before our students. The Christian Endeavors have had 28 lessons with much discussion on the subject. There have been 9 study groups among others in the church and some 3 special presentations.

Five of our young people entered the Essay Contest and presented some very fine essays. This project has not only been of help to our young people participating but also to the churches which they represent. We would encourage others to enter this coming year.

Of the meetings reporting, we have 109 young men of draft age. Thirty-five of these are at present engaged in combatant service with the armed forces; 12 are in non-combatant service with the armed services; 9 are engaged in work programs as conscientious objectors; 3 have refused to co-operate with the conscription law; 50 are at present being deferred.

We find that 28 meetings are interested in Peace lessons for Juniors while 15 are not or are undecided. The committee feels that we need teaching on Peace in our Junior department.

Classes or plans for classes for young men facing the selective service are held by 9 meetings. The other churches have made no plans to work with our youth along this line.

Ten meetings feel that the lessons by First Friends Portland Peace Committee are a help and plan to use them while 32 meetings had not seen them or were not interested in them.

Twenty-one meetings are interested in materials for adult study and discussion groups while 22 are not or are undecided.

The work of the Peace Committee is dependent upon every member

of Oregon Yearly Meeting. You can help promote this work by giving a living testimony in your everyday life. Our testimony must be more than a tradition of our elders, it must be something that will touch the youth of our day that they will see the living reality that comes in serving Christ as our Lord and Saviour.

Department of Public Morals, Frank Haskins, superintendent

Most of our meetings have some emphasis upon the effects of liquor upon the body, soul and eternal destination of individuals; the harm done to the body by tobacco; the warping of the mind by improper radio and television programs and the evil associations resulting from gambling.

Problems about divorce and loose morals have not been given much attention other than by sermons by the pastors. Divorce is becoming such a social and spiritual problem that it would be well for churches to plan discussion and prayer periods for this menace to our whole moral stability.

The problems of public morals should be handled thoroughly and with facts and not just emotional or traditional emphasis. Evenings spent in searching the Bible for instructions would profit most meetings. Also try the Sunday School, church bulletin, bulletin boards, object lessons, skits and films to help get the proper teaching to the young people.

Forty-two meetings report that 210 temperance magazines come into the church or church homes. One church reports that 50 copies are taken, and another congregation takes 42, that does not leave many for the rest of us. We should strive to get the paper into more of our church homes. Many of our churches do not support a temperance organization. There are a number of good speakers among the temperance workers now days and a speaker a year should be well worth while.

With so much liquor advertising over the television programs we feel led to comment that 37 of our churches report 228 T.V. sets. One church reports 20 T.V. sets among its attenders and no temperance magazines.

A letter writing campaign designed to encourage our members to write the radio stations voicing opposition to beer and wine advertising brought forth few letters but we report these awards: Churches writing most letters compared to membership—first, Scotts Mills; second, South Salem; and third, First Friends, Portland. Best letters: Virginia Helm, Portland First Friends; Docia Trescott, Scotts Mills; and Ethel Miller, South Salem.

Literature Department, Gladys Newkirk, superintendent

All of our churches except six have libraries with a large number of books on hand. Few additions have been made this past year. We do not have a report on the actual use of these books and feel that if such information might be had it would reveal more the value of these libraries to our churches.

Presentation of new books is generally made through the Sunday Schools and Missionary groups.

Most of the churches report that nothing has been done about the comic book situation, apparently being left to the minister to speak about.

The Bible reading is encouraged through the Sunday School, American Bible Society reading records and family altar. Also

quizzes, memory contests, sermons.

The church related magazines or Christian magazines that are coming into our homes represent many Theologues. One church alone listed 37 different publications which covered a wide field of thought and work in the Christian world. One Q.M. listed 46 different publications. It is evident that we do not lack variety or quantity in the Christian reading field.

Department of Education, Charlton Smitherman, superintendent

This year 46 meetings reported as compared with 41 in 1954. Following is a statistical report on the educational status within the Yearly Meeting and a comparison with last year.

405 pre-school children as compared with 322 in 1954.

909 public elementary and secondary pupils—774 in 1954

140 college students—143 in 1954

99 attending church related colleges—73 in 1954

54 were attending George Fox College as compared with 43 in 1954

97 public school teachers—65 in 1954

41 teaching in Christian schools—27 in 1954

85 students attending Christian elementary or high schools as compared to 96 of last year.

10 meetings report financial aid in the form of tuition or scholarships. The same number reported similar help for last year.

Families and individuals have shown an increased interest in the giving of scholarships as indicated by the Heacock Family Scholarship formerly referred to as the Quarterly Meeting Scholarship, the Frank Roberts Scholarship, the Crisman Brothers Scholarship, and the Brougher pre-nursing scholarship. Individual meetings have been slow in adopting a scholarship program during the past year.

A number of incoming freshmen to George Fox College will be taking advantage of the many different scholarships offered by the College. Generally speaking the young people of the Yearly Meeting are being encouraged to attend our own church college and a goodly percent of the Greenleaf Academy graduates attend the college.

As shown by the statistical report an increased number of college students are preparing and entering the field of teaching both in public and Christian schools.

Russel Stands, superintendent of the department of peace, spoke. He said the basis of a true peace testimony is our acceptance of Jesus Christ as our personal Savior and Sanctifier. After we have accepted Christ then teach that the true way of a Christian is to refrain from all war. The doctrine of peace is a vital one for the Friends church, but back of it is a personal relationship with Christ. It must be more than just a doctrine that is taught by our church, but must be a heart-felt knowledge of Christ.

Harold Ankeny spoke for Frank Haskins, superintendent of the department of public morals. He said that public morals affects every realm of life. It is concerned with divorce, use of tobacco, intoxicating liquors, gambling, T.V. with its advertising, etc. We can help to bring about the right kind of legislation by writing letters to the public officers. We need to keep ourselves pure.

Charlton Smitherman, superintendent of the department of education, spoke on the different kinds of scholarships that are being offered students of George Fox College.

Bernhard Fedde spoke on the new military law which has just gone into effect. We need to work on our congressmen and support those who stand against military training.

Dr. Everett Cattell spoke for the peace department. He said that evangelical Friends have sounded a weak note for peace. In his own life the compelling reason for peace is the cross of Jesus Christ. On the cross when attacked by powers of evil, Christ absorbed the thrust and thus conquered evil. We are one with Him when we stand for peace.

An expression of appreciation for the work of Mahlon L. Macy, on the Board of Public Relations, was shown by a rising vote.

● 66. The representatives nominate Russel Stands and Howard E. Harmon for the Board of Public Relations for a term of three years. These were approved.

● 67. Wayne Piersall led the singing at the opening of the inspirational hour. Rosetta Ballard sang a solo, "Teach Me To Pray". Marlin Witt led in prayer.

Dr. Everett Cattell based his message on Romans 8:14 and his main topic was "Guidance of the Holy Spirit". How do we begin to learn the guidance of the Holy Spirit? It is not generally with some great dramatic episodes. It is being sensitive to the Spirit and surrendered moment by moment. The holy heart is instant in making everything right if there has been a misunderstanding. Holiness is a walk of sensitiveness to the Spirit and instant obedience. Obey His voice in the little things of life.

He closed the message with prayer.

● 68. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:15 p.m.

Saturday, 2.15 p.m.

● 69. Richard Cossel led in prayer during the devotional period.

● 70. John Frazier sent a telegram with his greetings. He stated that they had enjoyed the work and fellowship of the last few years and regret that they were unable to attend Yearly Meeting.

It is the wish of the meeting that the clerks should send a reply.

● 71. The Statistical Report was read and its contents will appear in the appendix.

● 72. The nominations for Yearly Meeting treasurer, statistician, custodian of documents, transportation secretary, and custodian of blanks were submitted by the representatives and were approved and will appear in the appendix.

● 73. The following report from the Committee on Discipline Revision in regard to the publication of a new Discipline was accepted: Acting on the instruction given it by the Yearly Meeting a year ago (page 45, minute 76) the Board of Publication recommends that we look forward to publication of a new edition of the Oregon Yearly Meeting Constitution and Discipline in 1957.

In order to make this possible and in preparation thereto, we suggest these steps:

That the Yearly Meeting boards and committees give careful consideration during the fall and winter months to any further changes that may seem desirable;

That the Committee on Discipline Revision be authorized to examine the present Constitution and Discipline minutely and to formulate such recommendations as they may feel would contribute to

smoother operation of regular procedures;

That all changes ready at that time be submitted to the Yearly Meeting Executive Committee for consideration in its mid-year sessions, and that all additions and amendments be submitted to the Yearly Meeting in session in 1956.

It may be noted that the changes accepted and approved at that time could then be held over for one year for final action in the sessions of 1957. Publication could take place at once.

● 74. The amendment to the Constitution and Discipline in regard to filling vacancies in the membership of the Yearly Meeting boards, which was held over from last year in minute 62, page 32 was approved for final adoption.

● 75. The following recommendation from the Executive Committee concerning loyalty oaths was approved with appreciation for the report:

Concerning the formulating of statement relative to the present regular forms of loyalty oaths (or affirmations), we are united in saying that:

(1) We believe that those who are sincerely and conscientiously opposed by virtue of Christian teaching and convictions should be sympathetically regarded by the church and still recognized as valuable citizens by the state. However, we believe also that extreme care should be observed that support not be given to those who are mere objectors to loyalty oaths and who are not conscientiously opposed because of staid Christian convictions, but who hide behind a cloak of religion. Thus, we feel Friends should be conscientious to avoid association with hypocrisy and the support of mere pretenders to conscientious objection.

(2) We also believe those who may be quite as conscientious by virtue of Christian teaching and convictions and may thereby freely sign a loyalty oath or affirmation should be as sympathetically regarded and that no discount be placed upon him to infer a disloyalty to the church, as he seeks to express his purpose of allegiance to our government.

(3) We still believe it proper that Friends affirm our statements of "yea, yea" and "nay, nay", and that these should be simply and willingly given even to disclaiming affiliation with any organization of subversive nature against the United States government or any other government. We maintain that as Friends we believe that by faith in Christ, the Spirit of God enables us to live a life of purity and truthfulness which is above the worldly elements of subversion, suspicion, and fear, that we may instead display openness, trustworthiness, and love to all men.

(4) We believe the government has the right to ask its citizens to state their intention of loyalty because of regrettable indications of current subversive agencies at work. We would object only if Christians with conscientious scruples should be required to sign an all-inclusive promise to action without qualification or definition, the same to be expected for an emergency. We believe the phrase, "so far as my conscience will allow", as permitted by our government, should be appreciated and consistently used.

● 76. The special committee on Discipline Revision made the

following report which was accepted and referred to the Executive Committee to be acted upon next year:

The special committee on Discipline revision was asked a year ago to formulate a satisfactory plan of combining the departments of Peace and Service. We present the following for your consideration:

Page 50. Change "d. THE BOARD OF SERVICE." to read "d. THE BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE." In line 4 of the first paragraph under that heading change "...service committees" to "...peace and service committees".

Pages 94, 95. Replace the entire "Section V—Service" with the following new material:

Section V—Peace and Service

1. **THE YEARLY MEETING BOARD.** The Board of Peace and Service shall bear responsibility in two realms: (1) Peace, which shall include the instilling of the principles of peace as found in the Scriptures and based on the teachings of Christ and His transforming work in human hearts, and the encouragement of young men and women to maintain a brave and consistent life and testimony as of those from whose spirits Christ has taken away all occasion for war; (2) Service, which shall comprehend all relief and other such service in the various communities and the promotion of foreign relief projects and reconstruction work. A superintendent shall be appointed by the board from among its members to have charge of each of these departments. Each superintendent shall initiate a general program and assist and encourage those with like responsibility in the subordinate meetings.

2. **THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEE.** Each quarterly meeting shall appoint a peace and service committee and shall designate the chairman thereof. The committee shall include the monthly meeting chairmen of peace and service and as many others as seem advisable. The committee may appoint a superintendent for each of the two departments of work if this is deemed necessary.

The committee and its official members shall co-operate with the yearly meeting board and with the monthly meeting committees for the realization of the objectives.

3. **THE MONTHLY MEETING COMMITTEE.** Each monthly meeting shall appoint a peace and service committee and shall designate the chairman thereof. It may appoint such a committee for each preparative meeting within its membership. The committee may appoint one of its members, if it seems advisable, to be responsible for each of the two departments of work. It shall be responsible to the monthly meeting, performing any service or project assigned to it and cooperating with those of like interest in the superior meetings.

Page 96. The phrase on peace, beginning on line 5 and ending on line 8, would be removed.

● 77. The committee on Discipline revision presented the follow-

ing report which was approved and referred to the Discipline Revision committee to be acted upon next year:

The Committee on Discipline Revision presents the following as a proposed amendment to the Discipline, to follow paragraph 8, which begins on page 61 and ends on page 62. This incorporates the change which was requested by the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight a year ago, as recorded in minute 130, page 63, and referred to this committee for consideration:

9. **VOLUNTARY SURRENDER OF POSITION AS A MINISTER.** If at any time a minister, whether pastor or other, comes to feel that he has fulfilled his call and discharged all responsibilities connected with it, it is urged that he take steps on his own volition to adjust his relationship to the Yearly Meeting accordingly. This may be done by notifying the local meeting on ministry and oversight of his conclusion and returning his certificate of recording. The local meeting on ministry and Oversight shall notify the quarterly meeting on ministry and Oversight of such action, and it in turn shall notify the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight. This body shall report the entire procedure to the Yearly Meeting and his name shall then be removed from all official lists of ministers.

The same course of action is urged upon any minister who may find himself at variance with the doctrinal or ethical standards of the Yearly Meeting and no longer able to measure up to the conditions which would be required of one under consideration for recording as a minister.

Since this would constitute an amendment to the Constitution and Discipline proper, it would be referred to some board or committee to be held over for one year pending final action.

● 78. The recommendation from Greenleaf Quarterly Meeting that some uniform system be adopted for keeping records of church membership in the local meetings was approved by the representatives and returned to the Yearly Meeting to decide upon the system to be used.

The meeting referred this to the Executive Committee for their consideration and action.

● 79. The representatives returned to the meeting the recommendation from Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting that the Yearly Meeting take appropriate steps to have all report blanks reviewed to the end that they be simplified if possible and clarified with the recommendation that this be referred to the Executive Committee.

This was approved by the meeting.

GREENLEAF ACADEMY

● 80. Charlton Smitherman, principal of the Academy, presided and announced the program.

Marilyn Lee and Dale Campbell sang a duet accompanied by Iverna Lyda.

The annual report of Greenleaf Academy was read and approved as it appears below:

Greenleaf Friends Academy opened on September 7, 1954, with an enrollment of 73 students. Sixteen seniors were graduated May 24, with Milo Ross delivering the commencement address.

With the exception of five students from Oregon and Washington

the student body was made up of Boise Valley and Idaho residents. Aside from one member, the faculty was new to the Academy, therefore former students found a certain amount of adjustment necessary.

In October, a school revival sponsored by the students, was held. Roscoe Knight was the speaker. His deep concern and understanding for the young people resulted in spiritual help for many. The spring revival held in the local church proved also to be a blessing to the student body. Rev. Walter Nelson of Los Angeles Pacific College brought the chapel message each morning in the school auditorium.

Some new courses were added to the curriculum in the departments of Music, Foreign language, Home Economics, and Industrial Arts. Students were thereby able to take an additional year of work in these fields. By employing a librarian who spends at least half-time in the library much improvement is taking place. New volumes have been added and many books which are no longer recognized by the Library Association are being removed. It is hoped that the library will soon meet all necessary standards. The Academy continues to be recognized, however, as an accredited high-school by the State Dept. of Education.

Several pieces of new equipment were added to the Shop, such as power tools, bench saws and an electric welder. These were partially realized through personal gifts of interested friends. The student body purchased a new auditorium sized tape recorder and installed new back-drop curtains on the stage of the auditorium. Money for these items was raised by a fall festival and dramatic productions.

The newly turfed football field provided a place for home games to be played. Many other physical improvements have been made around the campus including a new lawn, sidewalks, gymnasium bleachers and an outdoor fireplace. To the many community and church groups, organizations and individuals who have cooperated in these fund raising campaigns go our deepest appreciation and gratitude. Truly they have responded enthusiastically to almost every need.

The student body though not as large as in some previous years was not lacking in quality. Both real Christian leadership and stable living were manifest in the lives and activities of a large number of the students.

Among the extra-curricular activities—an extensive and full athletic program was carried out with good sportsmanship and much enthusiasm.

Of special significance was the student body play, a Biblical drama entitled "The Slave Maid of Israel". Both participants and audience expressed spiritual encouragement which they received from the performance.

The Choir was quite active during the spring season and was represented in all of the Friends churches of Boise Valley as well as a few other places. Smaller musical groups rendered service in Sunday Schools, churches and special week-end meetings.

Daily chapel services were held, these being planned by a student-chapel committee under advisorship of a faculty member. The local pastor, Oscar Brown, was present each Tuesday with a challenging message. A number of visitors spoke in the chapel services and special times of blessing were not uncommon.

There was a mutual concern and true harmony among the entire faculty as they labored together to provide education with a real Christian emphasis.

A good percent of the graduating class will be attending George Fox College this fall. Some will be attending other colleges and business schools. Our students are, however, encouraged to attend our own church college as much as possible. We believe there is a good relationship between the Academy and George Fox College.

We would like to make special mention of the Frank D. Roberts Memorial Scholarship which has recently been established.

This scholarship is awarded to the honor graduate of Greenleaf Academy entering George Fox College. The Roberts family have made this possible in memory of Frank Roberts who faithfully served for so many years as principal of the Academy.

There has been a growing concern in recent months that Oregon Yearly Meeting will rally to a greater recognition of Greenleaf Academy and its importance to the Church and to George Fox College. With the sudden upsurge of interdenominational Christian elementary and secondary schools all over the nation it is indeed a serious and tragic mistake for Friends to allow a decline in their support of already existing schools of their own. While we establish new churches each year, and send missionaries to foreign fields, is it possible that we are allowing Christian Education, one of the very foundations upon which our evangelizing program depends, to crumble and decay? Greenleaf Academy needs more of your support in prayer and giving. It needs more Friends who are willing to serve as teachers, then it needs the opportunity to serve the needs of your young people by providing them with a Christian education.

NOTE:

The above report is rendered for the church fiscal year and since the school year runs from September 1 to August 31, it does not show all the picture. With the receipts virtually all in for the year and salaries yet to be paid for August we need \$1353.20 to finish the year in the black. (As of Yearly Meeting time)

The proposed budget for 1955-1956 calls for expenditure of \$20,963.80. Expected receipts on the basis of last year's registration will be as follows:

This leaves a deficit of \$4,438.00. Obviously, if we can enroll more students the picture will be improved.

Our cost of educating a student last year came to \$344.00. If we could enroll 100 students the cost would drop to a little over \$200.00. The tuition rate is \$150.00 per year.

The above report does not account for the building fund which is included in the Monthly Meeting report.

In the past six years we have spent over \$100,000.00 for new building, for which we have a plant worth probably twice that by contractors estimate. We owe on the gymnasium \$16,800.00, payable \$5,600.00 per year plus interest. This, with the amount in the above budget makes Greenleaf meeting's obligation to the Academy at least \$10,400.00 per year.

● 81. Harlow Ankeny presided and spoke of his appreciation of the cooperation of Greenleaf Academy.

Ivan L. Adams, president of the Board, repeated the speech that he gave at the time that Milo C. Ross was inaugurated as president of George Fox College.

The annual report of the president of the College, Milo C. Ross, was given as follows:
Members of the Corporation of George Fox College, and my personal friends:

This is my first annual report to you. I have been connected with the College now for some eighteen months, first in student recruitment, and later as your president. Every one of my tasks has been a new task, and each decision an initial one. I am asking your indulgence in bringing the report up to date, as a matter of general interest, and not terminating it with the fiscal year of June 30.

As I look back upon these months, I cannot help but notice the evident hand of God in leadership. There has been a cordial and cooperative spirit within the faculty and united action within the Board and its committees. May I note a number of factors which seem to me to be of importance:

NEW PROCEDURES

The plans for Freshman orientation, testing, counselling, and integration, both put into effect this last year and those already agreed upon by the faculty, are, I understand from those who have been at George Fox, the most adequate and progressive in the history of our institution. We are now participants in the Tuition Plan, Inc. of New York City, which is a deferred payment plan for students and parents. Athletic finance is now handled through the school treasurer.

A convocation was held at the college church under the leadership of Charles Beals.

The Faculty Seminars Study Committee has instituted a series of seminars, by and for the faculty, in which the entire field of liberal arts has been reviewed and evaluated. Dr. Howard E. Kershner, of New York City, gave two lectures on the campus last Autumn in the field of Christian Economics. A most significant move was made in instituting a faculty lecture, upon the recommendation of the faculty and the choice of the President, in which one member is chosen to lecture at a date in the Spring on some area of his proficiency. The first such lecture was given on April 19 last by Dean Donald McNichols, Professor of English Literature, entitled "Studies in Fulfillment," considering the novels of Willa Cather.

The report of the activities of the faculty, together with their scholarly research, writing, and other pursuits, has gone to the

Board directly.

A complete rank and tenure plan, with the arrangements provided for leaves of absence and salary increment, has been provided for by the Board of Trustees, in cooperation with a special faculty committee and the Administration. I am deeply concerned that we make it possible for our choice faculty to improve their situation and gain their doctorates.

Another area of great need is in our scholarship structure, or, in other words, the payment of funds for scholarships to worthy and exceptional students. We have done what we could for several years to compete with other schools, but we have paid the bill ourselves. A year ago, we granted scholarships in the amount of \$3680, with all but \$250.00 of this amount being written off with no one underwriting the costs. This was a very unhealthy condition. It is most difficult to cut down on scholarships. Ideally, we should grant many more and in larger amounts, and in other categories of learning. Our grants-in-aid are in a better condition with limited amounts accruing from the endowment.

Therefore, an active campaign has been carried out to increase the scholarship base. At this time, we are happy to inform you of a very significant advance, including the following:

The Dr. and Mrs. John C. Brougher Pre-Nursing Scholarship.
The Singing Men Music Scholarship.

The Everett M. Heacock Quarterly Meeting Scholarships (six in number).

The Crisman Brothers Scholarship.

The Frank Roberts Memorial Scholarship for Greenleaf Academy.

The Gene and Jean Smith Honor Scholarships for Ministerial Students (two in number).

Other scholarship negotiations are pending.

EQUIPMENT

Some of the more important additions to our instructional equipment include the following: A new Baldwin Electric Organ for use in our chapel, for music students and in the production of the "Quaker Hour". This was the gift of Oregon Yearly Meeting. New radio and audio-visual equipment came to us in the amount of approximately \$3,000.00. We have added a new music library. The students especially, have appreciated the new chairs being used in two rooms of Wood-Mar Hall. A very important project was carried out by the Idaho Chapter of the Alumni Association in providing twelve excellent microscopes for our Science Department. Two additional pianos are now ours, one of which is a fine baby grand and is used in our Music Hall. Upwards of \$1800.00 was spent in new library books and periodicals. A beautiful and useful card-index cabinet for the library was the gift of the class of 1955. Four new lighting fixtures were installed there.

BUILDINGS AND CAMPUS

Visually, the most apparent change in the appearance of the campus has been the result of razing the historic Hoover Hall. This was completed during the last school year. A new roof was put on the library. The entire exterior of Woor-Mar Hall, including new roof coating, mortar pointing, and painting, was also accomplished within the last twelve months. The dining hall, both inside and out,

has been painted, complete with new wallpaper in the dining room itself. Neither the music hall, nor the science hall, had ever been painted and decorated on the inside. These two important tasks have been accomplished recently. The library exterior is now in the process of being painted.

Important and quite expensive remodelling has needed to be gone into in our housing situation. We are very thankful for the gracious and substantial assistance granted us by the Portland Chapter of the Ladies' Auxiliary, which last season made possible the lovely furniture in the living room of Canyon Hall, and this summer new floors and interior decoration for the living rooms in Edwards Hall. A number of the veterans housing units have been repaired and decorated, both for married students and for faculty families. The roofs were repaired. The most pretentious changes were undertaken in rebuilding one entire section as a dormitory for junior and senior women. The Women's Missionary Union of the Yearly Meeting made possible a guest apartment. Re-tinting dormitory rooms in both Canyon and Edwards Hall is progressing at this time.

Two attractive signs, built of yellow brick and cedar, were placed at the south-west entrance to the campus and at the River St. entrance. These were the gifts of the Classes of 1949 and 1951, respectively.

The stepped-up campus maintenance program, begun some years ago, has continued. We have been in receipt of shrubbery and trees in large amounts, the gifts of a number of near-by nursery companies. We are advised that the cost would have been in the amount of some \$3,000.00, if we had been obliged to pay the wholesale price. All of the Oregon Maples along the curbing of Meridian St. were removed and the broken side-walk replaced by a new lawn, the grass seed for which we raised on our property.

Botany students made important gains in clearing paths in the canyon and in placing the botanical marking on the campus trees.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

The regular work of the public relations office was ably carried on by Harlow Ankeny, although this year we were forced to cut down on the amount of printed materials being made available to prospective students. However, the progress of visual aids, with charts and pictures of the College life and its needs, has brought the story of our College to twenty-five of our Oregon Yearly Meeting churches already. More time has been given to perfecting and correcting the Alumni lists for active participation in the "George Fox College Advance".

FINANCE

We submit to the Yearly Meeting in session a copy of our General Fund audit. However, a College has many funds with a number of sources of revenue and many calls for expenditures. The simplest statement of receipts and disbursements will reveal \$10,063.70 more received and \$11,638.19 more paid out than a year ago.

We had a larger student body, which made for a larger tuition. Our designated gifts were in larger amounts. Endowment income was larger. Over against this, we realized \$2600 less from corporations than a year ago, and \$2500 less than two years ago. These amounts are expected from New Year's until June 30. Also, we believe that it was wise to repair and remodel our buildings in order

to save additional expense at a future date. The President's salary was an added expense. Thus, our general fund shows a deficit of \$10,839.75, but the over-all statement of valuation was maintained in excess of \$615,000.

LEAVES OF ABSENCE

In the long history of Pacific College and George Fox College, no professor or instructor has been able to finish his doctorate while in our employ. Some have finished up before their arrival, while others have left to pursue their work, never to return. This is a very serious fault. Of course, the greatest single factor is financial security. It is now the Administration's aim to make possible a better situation here. At the same time, one must recognize the serious problems arising in our endeavor to replace our faculty with personnel of high Christian ideals and academic qualifications.

We have extended a leave of absence to Carl H. Reed of our music department to work on his doctorate at the University of Washington. The same has been done to Donald McNichols, Dean of the College and Professor of English Literature. Mackey Hill, Professor of History, is commuting to the University of Oregon, and hopes to get his without loss of time from the academic year.

Miss Jean Foley, and Gerald Lemmons and Ralph Beebe, all of our physical education department have received their Master's degrees this year. Miss Helen Willcuts has attended summer sessions at Linfield College. Both Miss Rachel Aldrich and Mrs. McNichols, of our music department, have continued their private instruction in Portland.

THE SCHOOL YEAR

Out of the student body of 121, we brought in 62 who were new students. This posed many problems of upper-division leadership. The traditions were carried out. The major events of Homecoming and May Day were beautifully handled in a setting of Christian friendliness and dignity.

Dr. Arthur O. Roberts headed the night school for two terms which brought to our campus additional students, mainly adults of the surrounding territory.

The class procedures continued in good order with an evident increase of faculty optimism and student morale as the year progressed.

Our football, basketball, and baseball teams demonstrated Christian sportsmanship in these major athletics. The most significant accomplishment here was in the choice of Rolly Hartley, junior of Talent meeting, as all-conference forward in the Metropolitan League.

The a capella choir, ably directed by Carl H. Reed, used an early American theme in its 22 sacred concerts, singing in as many churches of Oregon and Washington.

A series of eight musical evenings, in which our music students were presented in concert, were attractive features of our Spring semester.

I brought the baccalaureate on the theme of "From the Severn to the Sea". Dr. John C. Riley, President of the Northwest Nazarene College, spoke to the 15 graduates on the subject of "Ceilings Unlimited". Miss Lois Burnett, of Rosemere (Vancouver) meeting was granted her bachelor's degree Magna cum laude.

NEW PERSONNEL

Perhaps there is no need for a detailed explanation of each faithful and sacrificial member of our faculty and staff, who for various reasons, has wished to change his situation for this next year. I, for one, am most thankful for every hour of loyal endeavor which has gone into this last year's list of activities. However, we are bringing into the College community the following persons, the notice of which either has been given or can now be given: Arthur and Gwendolyn Winters. He will serve as business manager and will instruct in Sociology. He has a Master's degree in Sociology. She will teach commercial subjects and act as my personal secretary. I have had no full-time secretary this last year. Miss Dilla Tucker joins the faculty as our assistant professor of Speech and Drama. Miss Caryl Jean Short, who is presently engaged in graduate study at the University of Southern California, has been contracted to teach piano and music theory. Mrs. Cecilia Martin, Ph. D., will teach Spanish. Miss Lyn Edmundson will teach our limited art offerings. Kenneth M. Williams will become acting Dean and assistant professor of Education. Ross Stover, M.A. of Westminster Choir College, will be assistant professor of Voice and direct the choir.

Denver H. Headrick has been named as field man for the "Advance". Mrs. Minnie Moore, a professional cook, will become our head cook. Wm. Koenig has been placed in charge of our deputation program. He is a graduate of the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and has been widely used in Youth for Christ circles.

RELIGIOUS EMPHASIS

Both the Fall religious emphasis week and the Spring revival season were greatly blessed of the Lord in meeting the needs of our student body. Dr. J. Edwin Orr, world-renowned college missionary spoke in the Autumn, and our own J. Earl Geil at Easter time.

The mid-week prayer times sponsored by the Student Christian Union continue to be the strongest spiritual force on the campus. The chapels, three a week which are compulsory, were well handled and with less absenteeism than for some years. The deputation program, directed by a faculty committee headed by Professor Paul Mills, readjusted its work to include musical training by Harlow Ankeny. This was felt to be more adequate than for some years. Very precious faculty prayer meetings were conducted for some weeks during the year, as were prayer meetings carried on by faculty wives.

GAINS

Some comparisons are odious. Others tend toward pride. Some, especially those having to do with Christian education, are so intangible as to make for difficulty of analysis. However, there have been gains, for which we are thankful to our Heavenly Father, and which are the result of the work of our entire Board, faculty and staff, and those who have worked before us.

We realized a gain of 20.5 per cent in our student body. The campus is increasingly beautiful. I cannot pass this off too lightly, but must recall for you the significant labors of J. D. Baker and John Davies, who have given their two years of alternative service as conscientious objectors on the campus.

Beginning last October, many days of work have gone into the co-operative development of our long-range plans for the campus and

building expansion program. This work has resulted in the Board's acceptance of the plans drawn up by the architectural firm of Edmundson and Kochendoerfer. Our most immediate plans call for one new dormitory each for men and women, and a home for the president. We have made preliminary application for a self-liquidating loan from the government's Housing and Finance Agency.

When Mrs. Mary Dade assumed the librarianship some years ago, she immediately discovered that the entire stock of books had to be re-catalogued. All accessions must of necessity be worked over. As of a week ago, she had brought the accessions up to 17,000 again with several thousands yet to work upon.

The story of our accrediting procedures is too lengthy for this report, but without doubt this is the most significant academic work of the past year. Dean Don McNichols has given five years to this preparation. The specific areas of labor this year have brought forth our preliminary application to the Executive Committee of the Higher Commission of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools. All of the faculty contributed to this. This was submitted for the May 21 meeting and was accepted. A second full self-evaluation, contained in a book of 97 pages, has come from the bindery only two weeks ago. Our plan now is to work in cooperation with Dean F. A. Gilfillan of Oregon State College, who has been appointed as our Consultant.

A faculty hand-book has now been prepared for the first time in our history.

ADVANCE

The combined Executive and Finance Committees of the Board of Trustees, meeting with me for the first time a year ago at Twin Rocks Conference, have reviewed the problems of our budget, sources of revenue, emergency costs, enrollment trends, and related subjects. And now for the better part of the intervening year, we have worked together to present before our constituency what has come to be "The George Fox College Advance". If you have not gotten the drift of this plan yet, allow me to state plainly that we are hoping to raise more money!

The first and immediate drive is for one hundred donors to subscribe to contribute at least one hundred dollars over and above their regular giving. At this time thirty-one have so signed. Next, is the drive for additional money coming through the Alumni Association. Its part of the "Advance" was fully endorsed at the Alumni Banquet in June and a committee, composed of Harlow Ankeny, Klane Robison, Elizabeth Aebischer, Charlotte Macy, and Priscilla Doble, is named for working out the details with alumni and former students. A third division will come, we hope, through the combined support of our Oregon Yearly Meeting Friends.

The total aim for the "Advance" is for \$30,000.00.

PERSONAL

I have been a freshman this last year. I readily admit I have learned more this freshman year than the one I drifted through some twenty-eight years ago. So I am now a sophomore! May I use this opportunity to thank, publicly, our God Who has given wisdom and strength for each task as it has presented itself. My relationships with the Board of Trustees, the faculty and the student body have been very congenial. I wish to thank you, too, as I realize there

have been so many who have remembered the College in prayer, and many others have contributed in time and money to the on-going of the institution.

It has been my privilege to speak and represent the College 232 times in churches, high schools and colleges, and before various service clubs and groups. I have carried on my part of the work connected with the production of "Quaker Hour".

This has been the most difficult year of my life. The emotional pressures upon me have been the greatest I have ever known. But God has given help and blessing. I hope that George Fox College will continue to merit your confidence and trust into the years to come.

- 85. The proposed constitution for the Sunday Schools of Oregon Yearly Meeting as given below was presented on Saturday, August 20, for consideration:

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION

FOR THE SUNDAY SCHOOLS OF OREGON YEARLY MEETING

Relation of the Sunday School to the Monthly Meeting

1. Each Sunday School shall be recognized as an auxiliary body of the Monthly Meeting and is responsible to, and under the jurisdiction of the local church through the Christian Education Committee. Nothing shall be taught in the Sunday School which is not in harmony with the doctrines and principles held by Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church as stated in the Constitution and Discipline.

2. The Sunday School superintendent shall be an active or affiliate member of the Friends Church. Other officers and teachers should also be members of the Friends Church; if there is any exception, it shall be approved by the Christian Education Committee and the pastor.

3. The Sunday School superintendent shall be appointed by the Monthly Meeting.

Membership

1. With the exception of the Cradle Roll and Home Departments, any person may become an active member of the Sunday School by declaring his or her desire to do so, and by attending three out of four consecutive Sunday sessions of the Sunday School. A child may be enrolled in the Cradle Roll when the department head has received the consent of the parent or guardian. Anyone making request to the Home Department shall become a member of that department.

2. Active membership in the Sunday School shall terminate after four consecutive absences without good cause.

3. When the name of a member is removed from the active membership list, it shall be placed on the inactive list. Re-enrollment shall be made according to the provision of paragraph one.

Sunday School Government

1. The Christian Education Committee shall appoint all officers and departmental superintendents of the Sunday School, with the exception of the general Sunday School superintendent.

2. Where deemed advisable a Sunday School Administrative Committee may be set up.

- A. The Sunday School Administrative Committee shall consist of the Sunday School superintendent, the assistant superintendent, the departmental superintendents, the S.S. treasurer, the pastor, and the chairman of the Christian Education Committee.
- B. The Sunday School Administrative Committee shall be directly responsible to the Christian Education Committee for all its policies and procedures.
- C. The functions of the Administrative Committee are as follows:
 - (1) To determine the Sunday School policies, subject to the approval of the Christian Education Committee, and to administer the Sunday School through the Sunday School superintendent.
 - (2) To appoint the teachers and their assistants.
 - (3) To promote such Sunday School projects as workshops, teacher training courses, enlargement programs, etc.
- D. The Administrative Committee shall meet at least once a month. It can be called into special meeting by the superintendent.
3. In smaller meetings, or where the formation of a Sunday School Administrative Committee may not be advisable, the functions of that committee, as listed in paragraph four, may be assumed by the Christian Education Committee.
4. The Sunday School superintendent shall supervise all Sunday School officers and department superintendents. The department superintendents shall supervise all teachers and their assistants. If there are no department superintendents, the Sunday School superintendent shall supervise all teachers.
5. All officers and teachers shall be appointed annually.

Recommendations

1. We recommend that all officers and teachers give evidence of having accepted Christ as their personal Saviour, and manifest their Christian life by consistent daily living, and that all teachers be eighteen years of age or older.
2. We suggest that all officers and teachers meet at least eight times a year for the presentation of inspirational and instructive materials or for the purpose of discussing Sunday School policies and improvement.
3. We further recommend that at least one teacher training course be conducted each year.

The Board of Christian Education recommended that this proposed constitution be accepted and placed in the supplementary regulations of the Discipline.

Both the proposed constitution and the recommendation were approved by the meeting.

- 86. The following report of the committee to write letters to Aged Friends was accepted:

An accurate report of the work of this committee is not available. The work has been done, however, as letters have been written and visits made to the aged and shut-ins. Visits have also been made to rest homes.

The fourth session of the Evangelical Friends Conference will meet in Denver, Colorado, next summer, July 11-15. This session will possibly be devoted to an organizational meeting in which the Evangelical Friends Conference will consider the adoption of a permanent organization. The proposed purpose of this organization is to serve as a unifying force for all Friends with a fourfold objective.

1. To provide fellowship among all Friends of Evangelical faith.
2. To make articulate the united voice of Evangelical Friends in all matters pertaining to faith and practice.
3. To provide a possible means of cooperation of Evangelical Friends in such major areas of Christian activity as missions, evangelism, relief, publication, etc.
4. To promote revival throughout the Friends Church and to encourage the speedy evangelization of the world.

There will be publicity and notice given of this conference at a later time, but plan now to put colorful Colorado on your schedule for next summer, and to enjoy the spiritual fellowship of the Evangelical Friends Conference.

The monthly meetings are to be contacted and orders are to be received without any money and when enough orders are received to warrant ordering the signs this should be done and the various meetings be sent bills for the amount ordered.

- 93. It was the will of the meeting that a telegram of sympathy should be sent to Marshal Cavit as today is the day of his father's funeral.

- 94. The representatives nominated Glen Koch to the Board of Finance for three years.

The nomination was approved.

- 96. The Financial secretary presented his report which will appear in the appendix.

This was approved by the meeting and appreciation was expressed for his work.

It would help the Financial secretary in preparing his report if all the financial reports could be in by July 15.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

- 97. Grace Clark, president of the board, presided and presented the following report which was approved:

"Ye are not your own for ye are bought with a price".

As a Stewardship Board we have endeavored during the past year to stress every phase of stewardship—life, time, talents, prayer, home influence and possessions. We want our people to realize

that when we give ourselves wholly to God in love, the matter of Christian giving to the Lord's work is the natural outflow of our lives.

We are needing a real revival of individual stewardship in Oregon Yearly Meeting—a revival that will grip our hearts and help us to be stewardship minded. We, as a Friends Church, have been given a large place in this great Northwest; we are entrusted with the management of a great work. It isn't our work, it is His work; but our Lord has placed us in charge of His affairs and we dare not fail, we must not esteem it lightly.

A representative of the Stewardship Board has visited every Quarterly Meeting at least once and some Quarterly Meetings have been visited twice. A message has been given in every Quarterly Meeting on some phase of stewardship.

Fifteen individual meetings have been visited in the interest of stewardship.

In our Quarterly Meeting visits, efforts were made to contact every committee chairman of stewardship and as far as possible a conference with these chairmen was held at the noon hour and the needs of the work discussed.

We have tried to make available books and material for stewardship programs, and helps for Sunday School and Christian Endeavor and general church work.

A total of 30 messages have been given, 3302 miles traveled and 160 letters sent out.

The following have been sent to local stewardship committees and finance committees:

Mimeographed copies of our goals

200 handbooks

2000 tracts

Financial plan for local meetings and 2000 printed statements for receipting pledges, both explaining Goal 5.

60 booklets, "Partnership with Christ".

Several articles, emphasizing the responsibility of the steward and the stewardship message and goals have appeared in the Northwest Friend.

The month of October was designated as Stewardship Month and every meeting was urged to cooperate, with messages each Sunday from the pulpit, teaching in the Sunday School to our boys and girls and instruction for our youth in the C. E.

The Stewardship Board sponsored an essay contest for teenagers—high school and grade school. The contest was won by Barbara Jansen, McKinley Avenue Friends Church. She won stamps for Wauna Mer C.E. Camp. We have emphasized teaching our youth to tithe and the results in our reports show that it has paid off.

We are glad to note that 57 reports have come in from the various meetings, and of this number there are 1794 tithers; 266 of the reported tithers are boys and girls of our churches, and this is an encouraging report. This indicates an increase in the number of tithers this year.

Nine meetings report that they have made a definite survey to obtain the number of tithers, while 34 report the number of tithers is an estimate.

Forty meetings reported participating in the program of October as stewardship month. One reported "some" and three reported

"no" results of stewardship month.

The results of the efforts of the October program were interesting. Six meetings reported the results in the offerings were good. One meeting said "no increase", one said "none apparent". Ten said "definite increase" in giving. One said previous giving had been about \$300.00, in October it was \$800.00. One said giving nearly doubled. One said enough money came in for new plumbing in the parsonage. Two said that during October the offerings were increased 50%. One meeting reported offerings were increased 150%; \$508.00 had come in. Twenty-three meetings made no report on result of stewardship month.

According to the reports stewardship was presented in Bible Schools 64 times over the Yearly Meeting. There were 95 messages from the pulpit on stewardship. It was presented in Christian Endeavor 60 times. Thirty-six churches report having a stewardship committee. Twelve churches use the envelope system, one reported partial use of the envelope system and one anticipates using it in the future. Eleven meetings reported that they have bought tracts for distribution. Eight films have been given.

Many helpful suggestions were given by local committee chairmen in their reports which will guide the Yearly Meeting Committee in planning for next year.

Do you realize that there are people that may never be reached for God and the church unless we as a Friends Church go out and reach them. In order to do this, we must be faithful stewards of our means as well as our message.

Dr. Everett Cattell spoke on behalf of stewardship. He said that some one saw the poverty of the Indian people and told them they were too poor to tithe and it took a long time to change this idea. They were being robbed of the tremendous blessing of sharing. Finally the native Indians caught the vision of tithing and there was a great upsurge of blessing. 75% of their men in their mission in India are now tithers.

He said, however, that a blessing came to him as he gave money beyond the tithe.

Appreciation was expressed for the work of Grace Clark during this past year.

● 98. The representatives nominated Hubert Armstrong and Wilbert Eichenberger as members of the Board of Stewardship for a term of three years.

● 99. Dick Cadd led the singing during the inspirational hour. Wayne Piersall sang a solo, "It Took a Miracle". Merrill M. Coffin led in prayer.

Dr. Everett Cattell, as he have his inspirational talk, said that he had appreciated the fellowship here and had felt a deep spiritual unity. He asked God's continued blessing on our Yearly Meeting. He spoke on Romans 8:17. His topic was: The Growing Edge of the Church, as he compared the church members to the structure found in a tree with the heart of the tree in the center and the outer layer the growing edge. Not all members of the church are equally productive. A new convert has lines of contact with the ungodly. Even the insulated Christians have a responsibility of witnessing. They need

to be kind, patient and loving to the new converts.

We need to practice the way of the cross, the way of the cross even if it means suffering, misunderstanding, etc. We need to enter into the fellowship of Christ's suffering.

Prayer life is needed which is confessing our helplessness before God and one that takes time; in the beginning it takes discipline.

He concluded the period with prayer.

● 100. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:15 p.m.

● 101. Clare Willcuts prayed during our devotional period that we might have strength physically, mentally and spiritually to carry on the work of the Yearly Meeting.

● 102. A Minute was received from Haviland Quarterly Meeting for Ernest and Temple Lee.

They were introduced to the meeting.

● 103. A summary of the epistles which have been received from other meetings was read.

● 104. The epistle which is to be sent to the meetings from which we have received epistles was read, also the Bolivian epistle which is to go to the Bolivian Brethren.

These were approved with a few additions.

● 105. The matter of helping the Christian Endeavor Union financially that a C. E. Field secretary may be secured was considered.

This was referred to the Executive Committee.

● 106. A letter which had been sent to the Meeting of Ministry and Oversight, was read from Gervas A. Carey, telling of his work in the Hawaiian Islands.

● 107. The following recommendation from the Yearly Meeting Ministry and Oversight was approved:

The Committee on Ministry recommended to the Meeting on Ministry and Oversight that Norval Hadley and Ronald S. Crecilius be recorded as ministers of the gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting. The meeting favored this recommendation and instructed the clerks to forward this recommendation to the Yearly Meeting for final action.

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

● 108. Marie Haines, the president of the union presided, supported by some other members of the Union.

The following report was accepted with appreciation for the work done:

There is great thanksgiving in our hearts as we present this report of the work and activities of the Women's Missionary Union of Oregon Yearly Meeting. Truly the Lord has done great things for us whereof we are glad.

We were happy to welcome a new Union at Quincy, Washington, into our number this past year. Three Unions have organized evening meetings in addition to their day meetings.

The Women's Missionary union, publish their own devotional and

program books. This past year the book was compiled by Marjorie Crisman and Ruthanna Hampton and was used by all of the Unions except one. The devotions are written by our own women.

The Prayer Unit chairman, Mona Warner, regularly sends out a sheet of prayer requests for use in unions that ask for them. Twenty-five Unions have active prayer units meeting monthly. One Union reported daily prayer for missions and one, weekly meetings. This would be our ideal.

A new project for reading was sponsored by the Literature chairman Mildred Brown. Each woman was to read three books from three fields from a choice of five making a total of nine books read during the year. The choice was from the Foreign Missionary, Home Missionary, Devotional, Stewardship, and Christian Education fields. In spite of much grumbling, 65 women completed this project. Many, many more read books and some almost made the goal. Thirty-six books were added to missionary libraries. The Missionary Union of the Yearly Meeting owns 48 books which are loaned to interested parties.

Much of the work in the Quarterly Meetings was carried on this year by the six vice-presidents. Successful all day rallies were held in five Quarterly Meetings and one held an evening rally.

The Yearly Meeting banquet is always a high light of the year. Over three hundred women attended last year and gave \$278.00 to furnish a guest home in La Paz.

Other Yearly Meeting projects included among other things, \$50.00 a month for the work at Quincy, Washington, and \$100.00 a month for the Preacher Teacher fund in Bolivia, purchase of two tape recorders for use on the mission field and at home, furnishing a guest house at George Fox College, giving of \$100.00 to Greenleaf Academy, giving \$100.00 for the Hibbs and Roberts new babies, \$362.00 to the transportation fund, and money for pulpits, benches, medical kits, tools, etc. for Bolivia.

Many and varied are the activities of the local Unions. Thousands of calls are made in the interests of the church. Puget Sound Quarterly Meeting alone reported over 1,500 calls. Clothing for needy families, dinners given to families following funerals, records for belfry chimes, work done on parsonages and churches, Christmas and Thanksgiving boxes to needy families and outpost workers, 50 pounds of grease for soap, pictures, lesson helps, pillows, blankets, lunch cloths, dresses, skirts and gowns, for missionaries are a few of the things done by our women. Time does not permit the listing of all the things done for others at home and abroad.

We are glad to note also that more and more of our money is raised by freewill offerings. Some use mite boxes and world banks and some use the penny-a-day method to raise money.

Our interest and prayers are not alone confined to Bolivia. World Gospel Missions, Central America, Africa, India, Formosa, Honduras, China, Texas, Negro Community Center, Mexican Border, City Missions, rural missions, and many other fields have been presented in different Unions during the year.

A new challenge lies before us this year in Bolivia. The Missionary Union is undertaking the support of Roscoe and Tina Knight as they begin a new work in the Yungas which is an unworked part of our field. It seems fitting that we should grow along with them.

FRIENDS BROTHERHOOD

- 110. Harvey Campbell read the following report from the Brotherhood, which was prepared by the president, David Pruitt, and which was approved:

It is with mixed emotions that I am making this report. To look back is to see many things accomplished and many things to be done. It is impossible to put down on paper the emotions that accompanied certain actions but the Lord knows with what earnest endeavor many men pushed the Brotherhood work. To say that your president did the whole job would be far from the truth but it can honestly be said that he cheered any evidence of progress, especially in the spiritual life of the men. There has been a marked increase in the interest of many men in putting money into the project this year though not as much money was raised as there was hoped would be.

This has been the first year that Holly Park was the building project. It has been a very needy field in respect to the building. The leadership and effort of the group at Holly Park has been highly commendable. There has been a spirit of much work and very little complaint. I want to thank each one who worked so well to keep the building program before the local people and did not depend on everything being handed to them.

To report on the Brotherhood organization would be to go back for the period of time in which I have been vitally connected with the men of the Yearly Meeting. Over the last three years I have served as the president I have met in at least one service with a large majority of the churches. Sometimes it would be to listen to a very good sermon and again it would be to speak of the Brotherhood with its vision and concern. Then again it would be to bring the message as the Lord would lay it upon my heart. It is with joy that we think of the two who came forward for help after such a service.

In the different Quarterly Meetings, I am glad to say, that men are at the least interested and at the most there is a program planned which makes men consider their relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ. I wish I could report that every quarter has been holding

regular monthly meetings but such is not the case but I can say that the majority have been very faithful in fulfilling the obligation which is expected of active members of the Friends Brotherhood.

How thankful we are for those men who forgot personal feelings and helped see the Brotherhood advance as a whole.

I hope personal references are excusable at this time for I feel that the Brotherhood has had much to do with my own spiritual advancement. It was with pleasure that I served as the president but it also added tremendous responsibilities such as I had never had and I found the need of closer communion with the Lord for direction. The opportunities I have had to speak lent direction to something that came to a final decision a year ago, that of preparing myself for the ministry, the highest calling anyone could want. With this in mind I am preparing to go back to school this Fall so that I can fulfill my calling more adequately.

The future of the Brotherhood is assured in its growth if we as men never forget what the object of the Brotherhood is, that of deepening the spiritual life of the men. This is primary and in their rightful order come the building of churches, help for missions, raising money for special projects, etc.

The president elected for next year is a man in whom you can have much confidence. Get behind him and may we have help from even the ladies so that a good report can be given next year.

- 111. The Ministry and Oversight sent in a recommendation from the Committee on Ministry that there should be a slight change in the method of considering candidates to be recorded as ministers of the gospel in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

This matter was referred to the Discipline Revision Committee.

- 112. The Yearly Meeting of Ministry and Oversight forwarded the following statement to the Yearly Meeting:

Your committee appointed to bring forward a statement relative to standards of the church found it impossible to meet as an entire committee. Since Arthur Roberts was not able to meet nor to review this report, the aid of Paul Barnett and Gerald Dillon was solicited. We submit the following statement for your consideration:

We as Friends still believe in the all-sufficiency of Christ's power to save from both the practice of sin and the desire to participate in that which is sinful. We believe also that if we are obedient to Him He quickens us by the power of the Holy Spirit to resist the varieties of wickedness rampant in the world and subtly infecting the church. We believe that God saves:

—from the use of alcohol, tobacco and harmful drugs;

—from the spirit of lasciviousness saturating modern society, whether expressed in the dance, in questionable standards of dress and pagan adornments, in unbecoming familiarity between the sexes, or in obscene literature;

—from patronizing worldly amusements including the theatre and the movie industry with its false and sinfully suggestive standards of life as portrayed in movies, radio and television;

—from dishonesty, gambling and all games of chance with or without legal sanction;

—from allurements of secret orders and false religions;

—from frivolity of speech, foolish jesting and speaking evil of other people including the passing of evil tales and gossiping; (simply "let your speech be always with grace seasoned with salt" Col. 4:6), remembering the words of our Lord, "that every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgment" (Matt. 12:36);

—from the spirit of bitterness and contention which brings discord among the people of God;

—from strife, hatred and condoning the system of war and military dominance of life;

—from the spirit of ease, luxury, self-indulgence, complacency and extravagance which robs God of the personnel and money needed to evangelize a lost world.

Inasmuch as Jesus said, "I have overcome the world" (John 16:33) we believe that we too shall be overcomers by the appropriation of His grace. "Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good". (Rom. 12:21)

With the rapid increase of activities and technical devices designed to entertain or claim time, we would urge that these be carefully evaluated by the individual not merely upon the basis of evident evil, but in view of time consumed which ought to be devoted to the study of the Word of God, reverent waiting upon the Lord, substantial reading and other practices of character-building and mind-developing nature.

In view of the differing concept of the implication of the term Christian by those who make such a profession, monthly meetings are urged to carefully consider applicants for membership in the light of the doctrine and standards of the church.

These shall be appointed on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

Page 49. Change the first sub-paragraph under paragraph 2.b. to read as follows:

b. THE BOARD OF MISSIONS. The board shall include the chairmen of the various quarterly meeting missionary committees, plus an equal number of members appointed by the Yearly Meeting. These shall be appointed on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

Page 49. Change the first sub-paragraph under paragraph 2.c. to read as follows:

c. THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION. The board shall include the chairmen of the various quarterly meeting Christian Education committees, plus an equal number of members, of whom one shall be the president of the Yearly Meeting Christian Endeavor Union and the remainder shall be appointed by the Yearly Meeting. These shall be appointed on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

Page 50. Change the first sub-paragraph under paragraph 2.d. to read as follows:

d. **THE BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE.** The board shall include the chairmen of the various quarterly meeting peace and service committees, plus an equal number of members appointed by the Yearly Meeting. These shall be appointed on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year. Page 50. Change the first sub-paragraph under paragraph 2.e. to read as follows:

e. **THE BOARD OF PUBLIC RELATIONS.** The board shall include the chairmen of the various quarterly meeting public relations committees, plus an equal number of members appointed by the Yearly Meeting. These shall be appointed on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year. The meeting approved the report after some clarification.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

● 121. Frederick Baker, the president of the board, presided. Correspondents who were present from the Quarterly Meetings sat on the platform.

Harlow Ankeny sang a solo, "Open My Eyes, That I May See".

Earl Barker offered prayer.

Earl Barker presented the following reports of the Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends:

The Bible School Publication Board of Evangelical Friends, whose members serve as trustees of the George Fox Press, has counted it a privilege to have its annual meeting just preceding these sessions of Oregon Yearly Meeting and on these grounds. The entertainment offered and the facilities provided have been gratefully received.

The same oneness of mind and spirit and the enjoyment of gracious Christian fellowship which have characterized the meetings of this board since its inception in 1944 were felt as we met together this year. We rejoice in the measure of success the Lord has given us and in the constant, though unspectacular, increase in circulation of our lesson helps. At the last mailing the number of copies of the Adult Friend was 12,171, over six hundred more than in the same quarter a year ago. The number of the Quaker Youth was 3,191, an increase of about seventy. The Junior Friend has reached 1,953, increasing about 125. The Quaker Leaflets totaled 4,388 sets. These figures yield a grand total of about 21,700 copies per quarter.

Special mention should be made of the newest publication, the Teacher's Friend, which was launched with the opening quarter of

this year. It has been well received and has a circulation of over 500 copies per quarter. This is not enough to make it a paying proposition, but it is a good beginning. Even though it may be necessary to produce it at a loss for some time, we feel that it will come into its own.

It might be interesting to note that 14% of the Bible schools in our Yearly Meeting use all five of the publications; 26% use four of them; almost 30% use three of them; 17% use two of them; 3 1/2% use only one; and nearly 9% use none. This is a fine record, but it is quite evident that it can stand considerable improvement. The interest and effort of the Board of Publication and the Board of Christian Education of our Yearly Meeting to increase the general acquaintance of Friends with these helps and to foster interest in using them is greatly appreciated. Similar measures are being taken in the other two yearly meetings, where the percentage of use is sometimes greater and sometimes less than our own.

Miss Elaine Andrew, our General Editor, tells us in her annual report that she has given up her position in the business office at Friends University to give her full time to this work. She feels so urgent a call to continue in it that she is willing to endeavor to maintain herself and her home with the meager remuneration we are able to pay plus other small amounts of income she may find it possible to secure. She merits our appreciation and our earnest prayers. She serves also as our treasurer, and her annual financial statement is given herewith.

Earl Barker mentioned three writers, Scott Clark, Adelaide Barker

and Sophia Townsend, who have written for the George Fox Press this past quarter.

Appreciation was expressed for the work of the George Fox Press. The president of the board read the following report:

This is the thirteenth annual report of the Board of Publication of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church and the thirteenth year of publication of the Northwest Friend as a church paper. Prior to that time there was The Friendly Endeavor publication with a church section.

Purpose of the Board of Publication is outlined in the Discipline as follows: "The Board of Publication is authorized to publish the Yearly Meeting periodical, and is responsible for the appointment of its editorial staff and for all editorial and financial responsibilities concerning it. It is further authorized to build and administer a revolving fund and to publish books, pamphlets, and other church and Bible school literature as need may arise and the board may deem wise";

In 1954 the Yearly Meeting added to the responsibilities of the Board of Publication with the following adopted Supplementary Regulations.

"The Board is charged also with the responsibility for maintaining and directing throughout the Yearly Meeting a sustained program of publicity and promotion in harmony with the doctrinal standards and spiritual ideals of evangelical Friends. It shall utilize freely, as available, such media as newspaper releases, magazine articles, radio programs and spot announcements and display advertising. To supervise these activities, it shall appoint one of its members or other qualified person to serve as Yearly Meeting director of publicity, and through him shall encourage appropriate activity on the part of those appointed by the subordinate meetings, providing them with suggestions as to procedure and as to standards of quality in journalistic effort".

"Each Quarterly Meeting shall appoint a director of publicity, who shall be responsible for publicizing the activities of the Quarterly Meeting in the local papers of the area, and for reporting these activities to the Yearly Meeting periodical. Each Monthly Meeting shall appoint a director of publicity to serve in the same role locally".

This past year, aside from the two previous major tasks of the publication of The Northwest Friend, and publication of other denominational material, the board has assumed its third major task of maintaining and directing a sustained program of publicity throughout the Yearly Meeting.

Under the leadership of L. Dell Lamb, our newly named Director of Publicity, the Friends Church in the Northwest has been given news coverage on national, regional and local levels that would represent hundreds of dollars if paid for at prevailing rates for such releases. The report of our Director of Publicity in connection with this presentation will show the importance of this phase of our work.

The report of Ray L. Carter of The Yearly Meeting Press reveals that the following work has been done during the year.

1. Editing, printing and mailing 2200 copies of the Northwest Friend for eleven months (no August issue).

2. Printing 1,600 copies of our Yearly Meeting minutes. (Please see that every family in your church gets a copy).

3. Printing of 2,000 copies of the United Budget booklet, "The Financial Challenge" (a copy for every family).
4. The Quaker Bulletin Service furnishes most of our churches with Sunday church bulletins. Over 3,000 printed weekly.
5. 2,500 letter heads for the Yearly Meeting.
6. Type all set and pages made up for book entitled, Lion-Hearted Quakers for the Board of Christian Education -- 140 pages.
7. 2,000 jackets for book Lion Hearted Quakers
8. 1,000 DVBS Pupil's work books—32 pages.
9. Posters for the Christian Education Board
10. Folders for "Stamps for camp".
11. 750 folders for Boys' camp.
12. 750 folders for Girls' camp.
13. 1,500 folders for Twin Rocks camp.
14. 1,000 folders for Quaker Hill camp.

2. To have an informed public. Now is the time to let the general public know that there is a Friends church and that it has a vital message for this day in which we live. In order to realize this goal we offer the services of the Board of Publication to every department of our church.

3. That the challenge of the printed page be brought to the attention of people. One of the most effective ways to spread the gospel is through the printed page. This year we are working on an 80% budget, as pledged through United Budget. Our budget is as follows:

5. That there be wide release of our own Publication Board material through the medium of the Better Book and Bible House, 420 S.W. Washington, Portland, and other such agencies.

Dell Lamb presented the report that appears below on Publicity and Promotion:

Quakers appreciate the words of Jesus when He said, "Ye are my friends, if ye do whatsoever I command you". These words carried with them both a sense of obligation and privilege, for Jesus said further, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature". The gospel is the good news. As we become friends with God through Jesus Christ we become possessed with a passion to tell others of this message of hope and life.

Friends have been reluctant to accept the more advanced media of promoting the message of the church and have been somewhat content to stand back on their tradition while other churches, equally endowed, have utilized progressive means to extend their work.

During the last decade, however, there has been slow but steady advance in Friends' acceptance of taking their place in a changing world that needs to hear their message of evangelical holiness through modern media.

On August 17, 1954, Oregon Yearly Meeting made provision in its governmental mechanics for direction of Publicity and Promotion on the local, Quarterly and Yearly Meeting levels under supervision of the Board of Publication.

According to this provision in the Discipline each of the 57 meetings of Oregon Yearly Meeting are charged with the responsibility of carrying on an effective program of publicity. Pastors and representatives are urged to examine their local meeting affairs to assure that a local director is duly named and properly functioning.

Although the organization was slow in getting under way in some meetings, the work is quite well established at this time. For the first time it is my privilege to announce a staff of Quarterly Meeting Directors of Publicity and Promotion as follows:

It is the goal of the Publicity Department to serve as an expediting agency to encourage, strengthen and develop the established work within the church and to serve as an observer and clarifying agency to inform the public of the developments and message which God gives through evangelical Friends. This phase of the work is strategic in this age of increasing radicalism, modernism and compromise.

There must be no compromise in giving out the message of full salvation. We must be ready and willing to do whatever we can, even if it be but little at times, to make our testimony clear and effective.

To accomplish this there must be church unity, acceptance of responsibility, a desire to move forward as God directs, much prayer and hard work.

Goals include: expediting the established work of the church, informing the constituency, and informing the public in a positive witness. Each local director is asked to maintain a calendar of church activity and to serve as a clearing house for church functions.

In its first year of activity as an official department of the church some interesting observations are made.

According to reports received all churches distribute Yearly Meeting literature as available. Just 16 publish a parish paper. Just 60% maintain a definite mailing list, and an equal number operate a public address system and maintain a church bell. All meetings promote the Quaker Hour except the several which are out of reach of the broadcast.

There have been estimated the following: Friends published pieces distributed—20,728; posters made by local churches—1,068; other notices and posters—2,865; published news releases by the churches—845; telephone calls made in the interests of the churches on a local level—31,038; visits in homes—51,019.

The Yearly Meeting Director of Publicity has mailed out 171 letters during the church year and prepared 151 news releases before this Yearly Meeting time.

For this 63rd Oregon Yearly Meeting session the Director has posted an additional 49 news releases for weekly papers and 71 releases for metropolitan dailies and the Associated Press, United Press, International News Service and the Idaho Statesman wire service. A conservative estimate places the number of persons who have read of Friends during the last week at 750,000.

Emphasis of journalistic production is upon accuracy and dispatch. A Northwest paper says, "Today it's news—Tomorrow it's history". A well known minister has a motto on his pulpit—"Pray and Hustle"!

● 123. The report of the Memorial Committee was as follows:

Memorials have been received for the following Friends:

Edward Mott has completed his life of fruitful ministry here on earth, and was laid to rest in the Friend's cemetery at Newberg,

Oregon, on June 4, 1955. He was best known to this Yearly Meeting as Presiding Clerk, which position he occupied for about 20 years. Many others remember him as president of Portland Bible Institute, as the institution was known in those days, which is now Cascade College. Edward Mott's years of service also included responsibility as pastor, teacher and writer. His firm stand for the fundamentals of the Christian faith, and his opposition to subversive teaching was well recognized throughout Quakerdom. His life continues to speak through the lives of those who came under his influence. Edward Mott was a member of Piedmont Monthly Meeting at the time of his death.

Helen Ross, wife of Milo C. Ross, faithfully served with her husband in pastorates at Rosedale, Greenleaf, Medford, Talent and Seattle Memorial churches. She shared the concern with him as he began the work of the presidency of George Fox College. Helen was a faithful wife and mother, and a sacrificing Christian. Her sweet spirit and quiet confidence during much physical suffering has left a marked impression upon the lives of all who knew her and testifies of the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit in her heart. Her departure occurred October 19, 1954. At the time of her home-going Helen was a member of Highland Monthly Meeting, Salem, Oregon.

Maude Harmon, a member of Tacoma Monthly Meeting, passed on to the heavenly kingdom on October 23, 1954. She had been a member of this church for 35 years and will be greatly missed for her faithful service in all departments of the church. "She hath done what she could" may be fittingly said of Maude Harmon and she was an inspiration to all who knew her.

Rebecca Frazier Moorman, last charter member of the Highland Avenue Friends Church, was beloved and highly esteemed by many for her faithful contributions to the life of the church in its earlier years. Her death occurred in February, 1955.

Ella Miller, the wife of Robert G. Miller, a retired minister, was a member of Highland Avenue Monthly Meeting in Salem, Oregon. Ella Miller is remembered for the quiet, consistent qualities of Christian living. Her homegoing was in June, 1955.

Martha Green, a member of Newberg Friends Church, at the time of her death, had been a member of Oregon Yearly Meeting for 34 years, coming from Kansas Yearly Meeting in 1920. Her faithful service in the church has been appreciated by all who knew her.

Irwin A. Wilhite, member of Star Monthly Meeting, passed away at his home June 21, 1955, shortly after the return of his son, Harold, who had just completed a term of service on the mission field in Kenya Colony, East Africa. He was a birthright member of the Friends Church and all his life was deeply interested in its development and growth. Irwin Wilhite held many offices in the church and will be greatly missed in his home and church.

Pauline Kellogg was a member of Everett Monthly Meeting which she joined in 1916. She departed this life November 27, 1954. Her last words were "please pray" and "thank you, Lord", which testified of her devotion and life of joyful service in the lowly tasks which were hers.

Minta Moon Schmoe, often spoken of as "Mother in Israel", at the age of 89 went to be with her Lord whom she had loved since childhood. She was a stalwart defender of her faith, spending many

long years teaching in Sunday School, giving it up only when her health began to fail. She was also a zealous worker in the W.C.T.U. and mission work. As a result of these interests she had a greater influence on more lives than she realized. She expressed her love for her Lord and the beauties of His creation in poetic verse which has been an inspiration and blessing to her family and many friends. Her testimony will live on in the hearts of the Newberg Monthly Meeting.

Whereas this amount can be obtained from the local bank, with lien on the parsonage, the deed is now held by the Yearly Meeting, and such title must be held by those in the state of Washington. It is recommended to the Yearly Meeting that the transfer of deed to Cherry Grove Monthly Meeting be approved that Friends may proceed with construction plans. The meeting plans to organize as a corporation".

- 131. Report from Discipline Revision Committee was as follows:

The following amendments to the Yearly Meeting Constitution and Discipline are presented as a response to the concern of the Committee on Ministry regarding the process of recording ministers:

Page 56. Change paragraph 3 to read as follows:

3. REPORT TO THE MONTHLY MEETING. When the local meeting on ministry and oversight is thoroughly satisfied that the person under consideration has a gift in the ministry, both by hearing him and by conferring with him as to his call, and when he has rendered (or shall have rendered by the time the Yearly Meeting sessions are next to convene) one year of service in indefinite ministry of a type which is satisfactory to the meeting, it shall send a report of its consideration and action to the Monthly Meeting.

Page 57. Change paragraph 8 to read thus:

8. INVESTIGATION BY THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY. The entire matter, with the written statement, shall then be referred to the Yearly Meeting Committee on Ministry for investigation and consideration. The committee shall, if possible, secure a personal interview with the person involved. It shall consider the evidence of a gift in the ministry and a divine call thereto, the personal qualifications and doctrinal views, and the nature of the service previously rendered. If all indications are deemed favorable, the committee shall then take his case under consideration for one year, and during that year shall help him to develop his gift in the ministry by recommending reading material and giving council along the line of his personal needs.

At the end of the year the committee shall satisfy itself that he has continued his activity in the ministry, that he has made commendable progress in the exercise of his gift, and that the service rendered has been of an acceptable type. In case of a deficiency in any of these respects, his name may be held over until all phases are satisfactory or the committee reaches a negative conclusion.

These paragraphs, if approved, would have to be referred to a standing or special committee for one year for final action.

- 132. The Executive Committee recommends to the Yearly Meeting that the matter relative to the Yearly Meeting concern for Christian Endeavor should be referred to the Board of Christian Education.

This was approved.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

- 133. Oscar Brown, the president of the board, presided.

Dean and Kathleen Gregory sang a duet, "Jesus Alone".

The president read the following report:

As we present the report of our department of the church for the year 1954-1955 we are grateful to our Heavenly Father for His blessing upon the evangelistic effort of Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Christ has called us in the words of John 15:16, "I have chosen you

and ordained you that you should go and bring forth fruit, and that your fruit should remain".

Again the words of John 20:21, "As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you".

We are called to serve in a day of prevailing materialism and worldliness. The measure in which these forces have influenced many in our churches is a matter of concern. Christ prayed for the church that it might be kept from the evil of the world. May we be challenged to a positive position of sanctified, Spirit-filled lives dedicated to all the will of God.

The tendency, too often, is to become cloistered in our churches. Wrapping our "Quaker" garb about us, we forget the man of the street or the neighbor next door.

We believe Oregon Yearly Meeting favors evangelism. We want our pastors to be evangelistic. We believe in revival meetings. We are glad when a few break the barriers and come into our churches and kneel at our altars, but are we convinced that evangelism is a vital matter for every member of Oregon Yearly Meeting to regard as a personal responsibility?

Evangelism is vital to every department of our Yearly Meeting. Evangelism gives purpose and emphasis to Christian education. Evangelism presents a positive solution to public morals issues. Evangelism puts a heart of Christian compassion in our service to the needy in our world with the goal first of all on the salvation of the soul. Evangelism gives the proper motive for stewardship in its total emphasis. In other words, evangelism is our task with these many approaches.

In 57 churches, outposts, and preparative meetings, 52 revival meetings were conducted resulting in 966 conversions, renewals, or sanctifications.

We are glad to report that two preparative meetings have become full-fledged Monthly Meetings. Meadows Valley on April 22, 1955, and Rose Valley on June 19, 1955.

Many of our newest meetings are thriving centers of spiritual life and are going ahead of some of our older meetings. Quincy meeting has purchased a church building in which they are now meeting. Metolius has recently purchased additional property on which they will begin to build a church soon. East Wenatchee has the first unit of their building almost enclosed. Eugene has secured a wonderful property and is planning soon to begin construction of their meeting house. Timber outpost is preparing for a building program. Encouraging reports come from our Indian work in Sprague River. May we prayerfully support Evert and Virena Tuning in their endeavors among the Indians of the Klamath Reservation.

We deeply appreciate the services of our Yearly Meeting Superintendent, Dean Gregory, who has given himself untiringly in travel, counsel, and promotion of the work of our board.

We would express our appreciation to the Friends Brotherhood for their support of the Holly Park project and to the Women's Missionary Union for their aid in the Quincy outpost.

To all the churches which have taken special projects in aiding our outposts and preparative meetings we express gratitude. Let me encourage the local evangelism committees in the work you are doing. May I urge you to take the leadership in your local church,

in informing and promoting the interest of church extension in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

May the coming year see Oregon Yearly Meeting move forward with a new evangelistic zeal in our personal lives, and in our churches to fulfill Christ's purpose for us here in the great Northwest.

Milo C. Ross gave a report on Quaker Hour Committee which appears below:

The Quaker Hour Committee and staff have worked faithfully and steadily throughout the last twelve months in the production of Quaker Hour. A number of serious problems faced us a year ago at this time. The Board of Evangelism went on record favoring a

change from the facilities of Rex Sound Corporation KWJJ and turning to facilities of our own and in connection with George Fox College. We also faced a debt which had hung over from the beginning of the operation. This transition period was one of extensive research and took many hours. We were advised in this by Mr. Harris Hunter of the Evangelical Advertising Agency, and others on the staff of the Electronics and Audio-Visual department of the Meier and Frank Company of Portland. Our arrangement was perfected in October in which we set up a radio studio at George Fox College with equipment of Chelhalem Recordings, the new Baldwin organ purchased on contract through an agreement with the Board of Evangelism, and eventually a new engineering room at the college auditorium. This arrangement has been increasingly satisfactory and we are in a much better situation financially, in regard to equipment, and in the cost of the production than we faced some months ago.

These several points should be considered as our formal report:

(1) The financial report is appended which shows a payment of \$832.23 to Rex Sound and which should be considered as a debt from the former fiscal year. The total operational expenses of the production is \$3285.38. We have, therefore, operated within the budget which was assigned to us by the Board of Evangelism with the exception of the unpaid balance to Rex Sound. Through very generous arrangements with Dr. Homer Hester and Chehalem Recordings, his payments have been returned to the college and the Yearly Meeting so that the following equipment has been bought, or is on contract, which will eventually make for an excellent and efficient production:

(2) After setting up the better operational procedures, the full committee has met only twice during the year, turning the plans and operation to the staff itself.

(3) We have been in conference with Mr. Harris Hunter of the Evangelical Advertising Agency on a regular schedule of once each month. This has been of inestimable help to us in perfecting our production and in arranging new outlets. This service has been at no additional cost to the Yearly Meeting.

(4) We are now on 9 stations in 7 states. Some stations have cancelled out but in each instance we have been replaced by a stronger station. The two additional stronger stations added this year are KFBI Wichita, Kansas, and KTRB of Modesto, California. The Puget Sound area is now served by KTW, the famous Presbyterian station of Seattle instead of KTAC of Tacoma.

(5) It is significant that this year no station has cancelled out for the summer season.

(6) New areas are still being worked and the trend is encouraging. There is a feeling and reaction of solidity in the program which was not evident a year ago.

(7) We continue to maintain the correspondence and fan mail, clerical work, but we are forced to do so in a very minimum arrangement. 90% of all the letters we receive are requests for messages. These are all being forwarded promptly. However, we are not able because of time, expense and limited volunteer personnel to keep up with the other responses. This is a very serious problem which we hope can be improved during this next year. No personal letters have been written by me to those who have asked for spiritual help or any other consideration within the last six months. The committee voted to institute a simple monthly news sheet of some type which would take care of our fan mail and keep in touch with interested people. We feel this to be a very important project, but as yet we have not been able to secure personnel who are willing to take on this additional task. We hope that your prayers will support this new venture during the coming year. The largest letter response has been for the message entitled, "The Blessings of Sorrow". To date nearly 3000 copies of this have been published. Also, as you know, the entire month of June was given over to request programs which we believe was a very excellent feature.

(8) The matter of the future in regard to the activities of the Four Flats and the projected recording sessions has been worked out fully with a fine response through the last months in doubling up with sessions being held every week instead of every other week. All broadcasts will have been prepared before their leaving to take care of the entire time of the Four Flats' trip to the Orient.

(9) I cannot close this report without a full consideration of the most generous, faithful and sacrificial labors of the entire staff. We hope that people increasingly are aware of the very pretentious program which reaches better than 300,000 people, we are told, and which, with the exception of a few dollars having been given for mimeographing, is all loyally donated to Christ and the Friends Church. Many hours of labor and practicing go into these programs. Hundreds of dollars of consecrated money is used by the staff in their traveling. The sessions themselves are nervously exhausting. Harlow Ankeny has ably cared for the office procedures. Dick Cadd stepped into a very difficult situation upon the resignation of Roy Clark and has done an excellent job as we all agree. Margaret Hancuff has worked in the business office. Although Dr. Homer

Hester asks for no special credit, we should not forget his consecrated labors and the very important gifts which have made possible the increase of our equipment. It is impossible to name every musician, technician, and faithful helper who has made the production possible. We are especially grateful for every prayer and gift. We hope that your continued interest will be maintained throughout the next year and Quaker Hour will become of even greater service to the glory of our Christ and the salvation of many hearts. We have believed that one of its most important contributions has, and will be in its propaganda value of eliminating misinformation and confusion in the minds of the American public and establishing an understanding of the purpose and witness of evangelical Friends.

He said the work must go forward by means of prayer. The meeting is requested to pray and help as they can.

A rising vote of appreciation was given for the work of Milo Ross and his staff.

Dr. Alvin Roberts read the following report on Friends Church Extension Foundation:

The Friends Church Extension Foundation is a corporation under the direction of the Board of Evangelism. Its primary aim is evangelism through church extension. This corporation is specifically concerned with providing funds for the building program of the Oregon Yearly Meeting.

The board of directors have met in Portland twice and have retained Bernhard Fedde for legal counsel. He has done a very fine job of setting up the corporation under the laws of the State of Oregon. The Foundation is now incorporated and is in operation: president, Dr. Alvin Roberts; vice president, Donald Edmundson; Secretary, Bernhard Fedde; and treasurer, Clynton Crisman.

With the accelerated growth of the population centers in the Northwest, we are falling behind in providing adequate church plants to care for these people. We are seeing the isms and the children of error mushrooming into every new town and community. Our message is the greatest message in Christian philosophy and theology—our responsibilities are very great.

The aims of the foundation are all geared to this concept of evangelism or outreach.

The aims are:

To obtain funds for lending to churches desiring to build or expand.

To aid in securing loans for churches unable otherwise to borrow from commercial lenders.

To encourage Friends to invest their own surplus funds in the building program of the church.

To solicit gifts, bequests, legacies, etc., to be placed in a stable revolving fund for the promotion of the church's building program.

There are some secondary benefits which are anticipated, including:

Sound architectural guidance in any and all building programs undertaken.

Prompt and rapid progress once a building is undertaken.

Available financial advice to those contemplating building.

There are, at present, funds available. The Board of Evangelism has transferred its loan funds to the Foundation. This is a total of \$9281.22. Most of which is, at present, loaned out but will be returned to the Foundation. There have been specific gifts of over \$1000.00 since last Yearly Meeting, to the Foundation.

There is a need for greatly expanding the funds available through the Foundation. To accomplish this, the Foundation will seek to expand its membership to several hundred members throughout the Yearly Meeting, and will encourage those who are interested to make regular and substantial contributions to the Foundation.

Membership in the Corporation is available to those who contribute \$50 or more. Appointments are made by the Board of Evangelism for 5 years. We hope every man and woman in Oregon Yearly Meeting will desire to become a part of this Corporation.

Commercial lending agencies have discussed the Foundations' plans and have shown considerable interest. One banker indicated that his institution would lend twice the amount of our reserves in situations approved and supported by the Foundation. This is an

opportunity to obtain \$2 by contributing \$1.

We hope that Friends will find it desirable to invest their available funds through this plan.

You will receive forms which you may fill in and give to me or to Clynton Crisman, or Oral Tish, or if you wish mail them next week to Clynton Crisman at Medford. His address will be found in the Minutes.

General Superintendent Dean Gregory made the following report: We are an isolated group of Friends and we need to fill in the gaps. Roughly speaking we have a field of 360,000 square miles and divided by 57 meetings gives an area of 60 x 100 miles for each church if we would minister in the total area. We have a big job to do to fill in the gaps between meetings. The work at home must advance with the work in the foreign field. If we continue our usual rate of increase we will not increase as rapidly as the population is increasing. The new churches are showing very interesting advance. It takes two things to start new churches, consecration and vision, and the prayers of the people. May God help us not to be satisfied until we go forward. May God increase our vision for the home field and for the foreign field.

The Board of Evangelism asks the privilege of giving the names of evangelists at a later date.

This was granted by the meeting.

Prayer was offered by Frederick B. Baker.

The reports of this board were approved.

● 134. Cecil Haworth, pastor of High Point meeting in North Carolina Yearly Meeting, was welcomed in the meeting.

● 135. The representatives nominated Irwin Alger and Alvin Roberts for a term of three years on the Board of Evangelism. These were approved.

● 136. The Christian Endeavor Union made the following report: The Christian Endeavor year of Oregon Yearly Meeting was launched at an Executive Retreat in October held at the Chapel of the Hills. Under the definite guidance of the Holy Spirit plans were laid for the entire year's program. Each officer returned to his place of responsibility with new zeal and continued to work throughout the year in excellent cooperation.

This year, as the two previous years, we chose to use the Scrapbook Program. The response to this was much better than before. The Yearly Meeting awards went to Chehalem Center, in the senior division; Star in the intermediate division; and Newberg in the junior division.

Another project for the year was the Speech and Scripture Memorization Contests. There were representatives from four Quarterly Meetings in the Speech Contest and five representatives in the Scripture Memorization Contest.

A number of Quarterly Meetings held special C. E. Retreats which provided special inspiration to carry out the Yearly Meeting program throughout the year. Officers of the Yearly Meeting Union were used as speakers and teachers in these retreats.

The yearly award to the C. E. Quarterly Meeting Superintendent who does the most outstanding job went to Ralph Cammack of Salem Quarter and the runner-up was Eric Palmer of Puget Sound.

Our fourth annual Christian Endeavor Convention was held at Salem, Oregon the first three days of January. These conventions

are becoming more and more a vital part of our Christian Endeavor program and to the lives of the Endeavorers.

Laura Shook and Dorothy Barratt served until May 1st as part time Regional Field Secretaries. Laura served the two Idaho Quarterly Meetings and the Spokane area while Dorothy had all the territory West of the Cascades.

A budget of \$2700 was set up for the year's program. This amount was raised through the year by pledges from local societies and some personal gifts. For this we are thankful. However, because of a deficit brought forward from previous years it was necessary to release the Field Secretaries for the last four months so that we might come to Yearly Meeting free from debt.

Special emphasis was put upon helping local Christian Endeavor Sponsors. The Field Secretaries held meetings and workshops on Quarterly Meeting levels throughout the Yearly Meeting.

Our theme, "I WILL" was taken from the Christian Endeavor pledge.

Text: "Forasmuch as ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things as silver and gold...but with the precious blood of Christ".

The blood of the sacrifice was given first as a token of that which was to be shed in the vicarious sacrifice of Christ. The blood was applied with hyssop on the door posts and lintel, as it were an outline of the cross. So the blood shed upon the cross by Christ must be applied to our sinful hearts. Hyssop was the most common available plant. So faith must apply the blood of Christ.

Theme: The Hireling Ministry

Scripture: John 10:7-18.

Text: "The hireling fleeth because he is an hireling and careth not for the sheep". v. 13.

The theme of the hireling does not pertain only to the ministry but to any who have chosen to portray such a spirit. He may have the hireling spirit with or without a monetary allowance. It is a matter of character and spirit.

The characters of Elisha and Gehazi afford a great contrast showing the pastor spirit and the hireling spirit. The man of God is easily discerned from the hireling. It is to be noted that the hireling in unbelief laid the staff upon the face of the dead son of the Shunamite, 92

but the prophet took a corpse into his bosom, i.e., he even loved the unlovely dead, and thus resulted the miraculous return of life. So in the life experiences of the person of God, we must love those dead in sin, if they shall know life.

The hireling, as Gehazi, seeks to collect only things, whereas the shepherd of the sheep cares for persons. May Jesus, the Good Shepherd, free us from the spirit of the hireling.

Theme: What Hurts You?

Some are inclined to allow experiences to hurt them as: lack of appreciation, personal slights, lack of attention, frustrations. Sometimes these may be imaginary, sometimes real. But God can give victory over these hindrances. The only thing to effect a hurt upon us should be failure of a person, or the church, thereby distracting from the glory of God.

Theme: The Four Periods of Missionary Endeavors

Missionary endeavors have been classified into 4 periods of evaluation: (1) Romantic concept of going to lands of wild animals and strange people; (2) The Idealistic, from whence came the slogan, "The Evangelization of the world in this generation"; (3) The Realistic Period of Missionary Work; (4) The Period of Judgment on Missions.

Many of us feel we have been working in the realistic period, doing a positive work of evangelism and building a true Christian Church. But the fourth period, that of judgment is observed to have fallen in many places as in China where Communism has descended in dominance and persecution.

Regrettably, some today have reversed the development and turned to missions for romantic experiences. Since World War II, short term missionaries became popular. Some took up Idealism, and pushed great mass meetings without being able to stay with the new converts to establish them in the faith. When Judgment descends upon our works, then the true worth of missions is portrayed in faithful converts.

Text: "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you". Acts 1:8.

If a proper attention is given to the health of the roots, a proper fruitage may be had on the tree. So if there has been the reception of the Holy Spirit, there will be a fruitage of the life. It was stated that Oregon Yearly Meeting should be happy with the spiritual productivity of its missions, and should whole heartedly support it.

Quaker educational interest must not slacken. Colleges have even influenced the revival meeting, as evidenced by the examples of Luther, Barclay, and Wesley who came forth into strong leadership from the academic ranks.

We must remember to pray for our college and our youth. So often there is a missing link in our prayers. We pray for our Sunday School children, our C. E. youth, then skip to praying for pastors and missionaries and forget our youth in college in the four most formative years of their life. Perhaps we forget to pray also for the faculty.

Four steps are necessary for our college accreditation. (1) Buildings must be provided comparable to the need. (2) Academic standards must be kept comparable to other colleges. (3) Faculty salaries must be raised to a higher rate. (4) There needs to be a strong increase of the church's support of our college to indicate to the Accreditation Committee a more permanent interest of Friends.

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AMENDMENTS

to the Constitution and Discipline
of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church

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Replace paragraph three with the following:

3. VACANCIES: Voluntary resignation of a member tendered to the appointing body, or any of the following circumstances with or without resignation, shall result in a vacancy in the membership of a board: appointment of a Yearly Meeting appointee on the board, as by a quarterly meeting or other organization, to an office by virtue of which he is a member of the board; removal of residence by a member to another yearly meeting or from the quarterly meeting which appointed him; disownment of a member by his monthly meeting or his deposition from the ministry; the death of a member.

Vacancy occurring through loss of a member appointed by a quarterly meeting or a voluntary organization shall be filled only by the body appointing. Vacancy due to the loss of a member appointed by the Yearly Meeting shall be filled by appointment of the board concerned if it occurs before the last interim meeting of that board; by the Yearly Meeting in session if it occurs after such interim meeting.

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Add as Chapter V to Supplementary Regulations the following:

CONSTITUTION

For the Sunday Schools of Oregon Yearly Meeting

RELATION OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL TO THE MONTHLY MEETING

1. Each Sunday school shall be recognized as an auxiliary body of the monthly meeting and is responsible to, and under the jurisdiction of, the local church through the Christian Education Committee. Nothing shall be taught in the Sunday school which is not in harmony with the doctrines and principles held by Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church as stated in the Constitution and Discipline.

2. The Sunday school superintendent shall be an active or affiliate member of the Friends Church. Other officers and teachers should also be members of the Friends Church; if there is any exception, it shall be approved by the Christian Education Committee and the pastor.

3. The Sunday school superintendent shall be appointed by the monthly meeting.

MEMBERSHIP

1. With the exception of the cradle roll and home departments, any person may become an active member of the Sunday school by declaring his or her desire to do so, and by attending three out of four consecutive Sunday sessions of the Sunday school. A child may be enrolled in the cradle roll when the department head has received the consent of the parent or guardian. Anyone making request to the home department shall become a member of that department.

2. Active membership in the Sunday school shall terminate after four consecutive absences without good cause.

3. When the name of a member is removed from the active membership list, it shall be placed on the inactive list. Re-enrollment shall be made according to the provision of paragraph one.

SUNDAY SCHOOL GOVERNMENT

1. The Christian Education Committee shall appoint all officers and departmental superintendents of the Sunday school, with the exception of the general Sunday school superintendent.

2. Where deemed advisable a Sunday School Administrative Committee may be set up.

a. The Sunday School Administrative Committee shall consist of the Sunday school superintendent, the assistant superintendent, the departmental superintendents, the Sunday school treasurer, the pastor, and the chairman of the Christian Education Committee.

b. The Sunday School Administrative Committee shall be directly responsible to the Christian Education Committee for all its policies and procedures.

c. The functions of the Administrative Committee are as follows:

(1) To determine the Sunday school policies, subject to the approval of the Christian Education Committee, and to administer the Sunday school through the Sunday school superintendent.

(2) To appoint the teachers and their assistants.

(3) To promote such Sunday school projects as workshops, teacher training courses, enlargement programs, etc.

(4) To authorize all Sunday school expenditures.

d. The administrative committee shall meet at least once a month. It can be called into special meeting by the superintendent.

3. In smaller meetings, or where the formation of a Sunday School Administrative Committee may not be advisable, the functions of that committee, as listed in paragraph four, may be assumed by the Christian Education Committee.

4. The Sunday school superintendent shall supervise all Sunday school officers and department superintendents.

The department superintendents shall supervise all teachers and their assistants. If there are no department superintendents, the Sunday school superintendent shall supervise all teachers.

5. All officers and teachers shall be appointed annually.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend that all officers and teachers give evidence of having accepted Christ as their personal Savior, and manifest their Christian life by consistent daily living, and that all teachers be eighteen years of age or older.

2. We suggest that all officers and teachers meet at least eight times a year for the presentation of inspirational and instructive materials or for the purpose of discussing Sunday school policies and improvement.

3. We further recommend that at least one teacher training course be conducted each year.
