● 8. The reports of the State of the Church were received from six Quarterly Meetings and a summary of these appears below:

Five of the meetings report that there is good attendance in the morning meetings and a growth in the spiritual life of the congregations, but one meeting reported that there had been losses in attendance of the regular services of church. In some there has been an increase in attendance at prayer meeting, in others a decrease.

In one meeting the associate members have been given lessons in church responsibilities and have given evidence of having accepted Christ as Savior before being received into active membership. Most of the meetings mention the helpful work of the young people—how they are participating in the work of the church and filling places of responsibility. One mentions that the work of the C.E. has increased in activity and interest.

The faithful work of the pastors in the various meetings is appreciated: they have brought messages that are timely and adapted to the needs of the churches that they are serving.

Family worship is observed in a large number of families and most of the members manifest a spirit of love toward one another. One meeting reports that they successfully dealt with differences through prayer. Another meeting expressed a desire that members show by their conversation that they are interested in spiritual things.

Churches endeavor to uphold and adhere to the doctrinal standards of Friends as held by Oregon Yearly Meeting.

● 9. The following communication from Portland Quarterly Meeting in regard to the appointment of overseers was read and referred to the representatives:

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends to be held at Newberg,



Oregon, August 16-21, 1956.

Parkrose Monthly Meeting recommends to Portland Quarterly Meeting that recommendation be made to Oregon Yearly Meeting, in session 8th month, 16th through 21st days, 1956, that the Constitution and Discipline be amended in the procedure of the appointment of overseers to the local meeting on ministry and oversight (Chap. II, Sec. II, Para. B. Number 3, p. 38.), and that it read, in effect:

"A nominating committee shall be appointed annually, three persons by the Monthly Meeting and two by the local meeting on ministry and oversight, which shall propose to the Monthly Meeting, for the stations of elder and overseer, persons, who, in their judgment, possess the proper gifts and qualifications therefor." (Chap. III, Sec. I, Para. D., p. 64f.)

It is the considered opinion of this Monthly Meeting that the distinctions between the offices of elder persons and overseers are not as acute as in former years, and that the local meeting on ministry and oversight now tends to carry on its respective functions in a united voice.

- 10. The Executive Committee made the following recommendation:

The Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting recommends that the membership of Oregon Yearly Meeting accept the challenge of raising \$20,000.00 (twenty thousand dollars) annually through the Living Endowment of the George Fox College, of which \$14,150.00 is already pledged personally in the Living Endowment, or (Twenty-five Dollar Club). This plan is to be implemented by the pledgees remitting through their respective Monthly Meeting treasurers, instead of directly to the College as heretofore.

This was left for further consideration after Milo Ross gave an explanation of the plan.

The business meeting to be held in the afternoon, with a suggestion that if so desired, one of the four meetings could be held in the evening. The ministry and oversight to meet on Thursday evening and the young people to have their C.E. rally on Sunday evening. Meeting to be held at First Friends, Vancouver, October, 1956; Oak Park, January, 1957; Cherry Grove, April, 1957; Rosemere, July, 1957.

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends to be held at Newberg, Oregon, August 16-21, 1956.

"We of the Board of Public Relations feel that our present name does not truly represent our work and we hereby recommend that our name be changed from the Board of Public Relations to the Board of Public Morals, Literature and Education."

● 30. During the devotional period Denver Headrick and the presiding clerk offered prayer. At the close the hymn: "Bless Me and Make Me a Blessing", was sung.

● 31. The minutes of Thursday sessions were accepted as read and corrected.

32. The Executive Committee recommends that the disciplinary change proposed last year and approved by the Yearly Meeting be adopted and it was accepted as it appears below:

Page 49. Change the first sub-paragraph of paragraph 2.a. to read as follows:

a. **THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM.** The board shall include the chairmen of the various Quarterly Meeting Evangelistic Committees, plus an equal number of members appointed by the Yearly Meeting. These shall be appointed on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

Page 49. Change the first sub-paragraph under paragraph 2.b. to read as follows:

b. **THE BOARD OF MISSIONS;** The board shall include the chairmen of the various Quarterly Meeting Missionary Committees, plus an equal number of members appointed by the Yearly Meeting. These shall be appointed on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

Page 49. Change the first sub-paragraph under paragraph 2.c. to read as follows:

c. **THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.** The board shall include the chairmen of the various Quarterly Meeting Christian Education Committees, plus an equal number of members, of whom one shall be the president of the Yearly Meeting Christian Endeavor Union and the remainder on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of

their number expiring each year.

Page 50. Change the first sub-paragraph under paragraph 2.d. to read as follows:

d. **THE BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE.** The board shall include the chairmen of the various Quarterly Meeting Peace and Service Committees, plus an equal number of members appointed by the Yearly Meeting. These shall be appointed on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

Page 50. Change the first sub-paragraph under paragraph 2.e. to read as follows:

e. **THE BOARD OF PUBLIC RELATIONS.** The board shall include the chairmen of the various Quarterly Meeting Public Relations Committees, plus an equal number of members appointed by the Yearly Meeting. These shall be appointed on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

Page 51. Change the first sub-paragraph under paragraph 2.f. to read as follows:

f. **THE BOARD OF FINANCE.** The board shall include the chairmen of the various Quarterly Meeting Finance Committees, plus an equal number of members. Three of those shall be members by virtue of their offices, namely, the Yearly Meeting treasurer and financial secretary and a member of the Yearly Meeting Board of trustees selected by that board. The remainder shall be appointed by the Yearly Meeting on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

Page 51. Change the first sub-paragraph under paragraph 2.h. to read as follows:

h. **THE BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP.** The board shall include the chairmen of the various Quarterly Meeting Stewardship Committees, plus an equal number of members appointed by the Yearly Meeting. These shall be appointed on nomination by the representatives for terms of three years, with the terms of approximately one-third of their number expiring each year.

(The membership of the BOARD OF PUBLICATION does not need to be changed, since there are no Quarterly Meeting representatives and therefore no problem involved.)

For the coming year there will be thirteen members on each of the boards named, due to the setting up of Inland Quarterly Meeting. Although this is a violation of the letter of the Constitution and Discipline, it is inadvertent and without intent to err. Since it would probably cause no legal complication to arise, it is recommended that it be overlooked for this year. If the proposed amendments are approved in these sessions, the membership of all boards can be increased a year from now.

(P.S. Perhaps it should be noted that under the provisions suggested above the number of members on each of these boards would be increased by two whenever the establishment of a new Quarterly Meeting is approved, and this without further amendment or change.)



Page 50. Change "d. THE BOARD OF SERVICE." to read "d. THE BOARD OF PEACE AND SERVICE." In line 4 of the first paragraph under that heading change "... Service Committees". to "... Peace and Service Committees".

Pages 94,95. Replace the entire "Section V—Service" with the following new material:

#### Section V—Peace and Service

1. THE YEARLY MEETING BOARD. The Board of Peace and Service shall bear responsibility in two realms: (a) Peace, which shall include the instilling of the principles of peace as found in the Scriptures and based on the teachings of Christ and His transforming work in human hearts, and the encouragement of young men and women to maintain a brave and consistent life and testimony as of those from whose spirits Christ has taken away all occasion for war; (b) Service, which shall comprehend all relief and other such service in the various communities and the promotion of foreign relief projects and reconstruction work. A superintendent shall be appointed by the board from among its members to have charge of each of these departments. Each superintendent shall initiate a general program and assist and encourage those with like responsibility in the subordinate meetings.

2. THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEE. Each Quarterly Meeting shall appoint a Peace and Service Committee and shall designate the chairman thereof. The committee shall include the Monthly Meeting chairmen of Peace and Service and as many others as seem advisable. The committee may appoint a superintendent for each of the two departments of work if this is deemed necessary.

The committee and its official members shall co-operate with the Yearly Meeting board and with the Monthly Meeting committees for the realization of the objectives.

3. THE MONTHLY MEETING COMMITTEE. Each Monthly Meeting shall appoint a Peace and Service Committee and shall designate the chairman thereof. It may appoint such a committee for each preparative meeting within its membership. The committee may appoint one of its members, if it seems advisable, to be responsible for each of the two departments of work. It shall be responsible to the Monthly Meeting, performing any service or project assigned to it and cooperating with those of like interest in the superior meetings.

Page 96. The phrase on peace, beginning on line 5 and ending on line 7, would be removed.

The N. A. E. asks an interest in the prayers of the people and it also asks for financial help as money is needed to carry on its various projects. Not only should the Yearly Meeting give financial support; also all Bible-believing churches should help in this way.

The following report of the board was presented:

#### Sunday School

Attendance in the Sunday schools of Oregon Yearly Meeting averaged a total of 4,857 during the past year, compared with 4,820 for the previous year, a gain of 37. There were 25 Sunday schools which showed a gain, four which remained the same, and 27 which showed a loss. There were five Sunday schools which showed a gain of 25% or more. These were Quincy, with a gain of 78%, Eugene with 46%, Cambridge with 40%, Chehalem Center with 39%, and Quilcene with 27 2/3%. Nine other Sunday schools showed a gain of more than 10%.

Teacher training classes were held in 27 meetings, compared with 16 held the year before. Two Sunday schools attained to the 3-point goal of teacher training—a teacher-training course and two books read by each teacher, one on teaching methods, and one for inspiration. These two Sunday schools, which thus rate the classification of Three-Star Sunday schools, are Holly Park and Woodland. In a number of other Sunday schools reports showed that many of the teachers read books in these fields. Four Sunday schools attained a Two-Star rating with a teacher training class and at least one book read by each teacher. These were Star, Second Friends Portland, Chehalem Center, and Ontario Heights. The increased interest in teacher training is gratifying, and we trust that the Sunday schools of the Yearly Meeting will continue to emphasize this field, which is of such great importance for the effectiveness of our Sunday school work.

The concern for winning to Christ those who come into the Sunday



school is evidence in many churches by the care shown in the selection of teachers and the concern of teachers for the salvation of those in their classes, as well as by special evangelistic emphasis. We must continue to emphasize this phase of our Sunday school work, which is of primary importance.

#### Children and Youth Work

There were 42 Vacation Bible Schools held, with a total enrollment of 2788. More than 300 children professed conversion or renewal as a result of evangelism in the Vacation Bible School.

Reports on Christian Endeavor show a total membership of 457 in Senior C.E., 233 in Intermediate, and 248 in Junior.

There are 12 Boys Clubs with 148 members and 10 Girls Clubs with 107 members.

Attendance at our boys and girls camps and youth conferences totaled over 1000. And again our camps and conferences demonstrated their worth in the evangelization and training of our youth.

A number of our churches are aware of the need of providing wholesome Christian recreation and activity for our young people. But it would seem that some meetings have not yet caught the vision of our responsibility in this field.

#### Board Activity

During the past year the Board of Christian Education has promoted teacher training in the Sunday schools. We are again sponsoring a Junior Yearly Meeting. Financial assistance for Vacation Bible School has been sent to Ashland, Pringle, and Sprague River. We have promoted the sale of the book *Lion-Hearted Quakers* by Marie Haines. Over 600 copies have been sold with the distribution covering almost every section of this country and reaching into Canada and Mexico.

#### Challenge

Future plans of the board include the promotion of standards for the Sunday school in the fields of evangelism, enlargement, education, and efficiency. This will be a five-year program designed to encourage more efficient and effective work in the Sunday schools of the Yearly Meeting.

Gerald Dillon brought a message on "A Standard of Excellence". He mentioned the following four points:

1. Evangelism—
  - (a) There must be an evangelistic emphasis in the Sunday school.
  - (b) The Sunday school students should attend the worship service of the church.
  - (c) The teachers and officers should attend the services of the church.
2. Enlargement—
  - (a) There should be a general increase in attendance of at least 10%.
  - (b) There should be a visitation program.
  - (c) An absentee follow-up program is very necessary.
3. Education—
  - (a) The Sunday school workers should have a workers' conference once a month.
  - (b) There should be a teacher training program.
  - (c) The teachers should be interested in self-improvement.

#### 4. Efficiency—

- (a) Regular attendance of teachers and officers is essential.
- (b) Classes should be properly graded.
- (c) Efficient and adequate records should be kept.

A new program is being proposed and it is hoped that the whole Yearly Meeting will not only cooperate in this program but enter into it with enthusiasm.

The whole program and report of this committee was appreciated and approved.

- 35. During the inspirational hour Wayne Piersall led the congregation in singing, "The Solid Rock". Wilmer Brown sang, "What a Friend", as a solo.

Arthur Roberts brought a message from John 9:1-41, speaking on Jesus' conversation with the man born blind. The blind man gained healing by obedience to Jesus' command and he gained courage as he went along. Blindness of unbelief is answered by experiential religion, based on Jesus Christ. Spiritual perception increases under pressure. He closed his message with prayer.

- 36. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:15 p.m.

### **Friday, 2.15 p.m.**

- 37. A number participated in prayer during the devotional period. Earl Geil closed the period with petition for the Yearly Meeting.

- 38. A visiting minute for Ernest and Temple Lee from Haviland Quarterly Meeting, Stafford Monthly Meeting, Kansas Yearly Meeting, was presented and they were introduced to the meeting.

The minute was referred to the Committee on Returning Minutes.

- 39. The representatives made the following nominations for the Board of Christian Education for three years: M. Gene Hockett, Willard Kennon.

These names were approved.

- 40. The Board of Evangelism nominated the following individuals to serve as directors of the Friends Extension Foundation: Oral Tish for one year; Clynton Crisman for two years; and Alvin Roberts for three years. The nominations were approved.

- 41. The George Fox Visiting Committee made a report which was considered by the meeting and accepted but not printed.

- 42. The Report of the General Superintendent:

#### **REPORT OF GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT**

The account of history attests the truth of the wise man of old who said, "Where there is no vision the people perish: . . ." The history of the world and its peoples has become His story of infinite power and infinite love. It is a thrilling story of man's sin and of God's redeeming grace, a story which has its ending already written, but into which the creature, man, must weave his own destiny. It is in this weaving process that the church must be forever awake and at the task. If the church falters, the fate of the unreached multitudes may be charged to her account, for every man must one day appear before God to be judged. The church has enough food to satisfy the world's spiritual hunger, and we must not fail to get the bread of life to the hungry everywhere.

Vital evangelism must always be the central program of the



church at home and abroad. We cannot delegate spiritual concern, and it is possible for an over-dependence upon the departmental ministries of the church to overshadow the central evangelistic function of the church.

#### CONCERN FOR DEPARTMENTS

The departments of the church are necessary and proper, as channels through which the church can minister, but they must always be kept in proper relationship to the central ideal of the church. In order to keep first things first in the life of the church there must be the constant presence of the Holy Spirit, as sanctifier and energizer in the hearts and lives of its members, and permeating every church concern.

Logically, then, the first concern of the church ought to be for its own condition, for if the channel be choked, how can the message be delivered?

Revival is the great and crying need of our church in this, our day. We have a wonderful feeling when our statistics show increases, but in those times we have a tendency to let down. This year, one Quarterly Meeting had enough losses in attendance at the various services of the church to make a fair-sized congregation. This condition should cause us much alarm. There were no outposts started in our Yearly Meeting this year, though we must add that considerable thought and work, on the part of several Friends, have gone into laying the groundwork for new meetings in new communities.

Progress in many areas of the church is heartening. All of the progress is not found in the new meetings but some of the older meetings are showing fine gains too.

#### NEW QUARTERLY MEETINGS

With the opening of three new churches in Eastern Washington during recent years, it was decided that there should be a new Quarterly Meeting set up in that area. Consequently, on November 12 the Inland Quarterly Meeting was set up, and is now functioning on a full schedule of activities. This new Quarterly Meeting has pledged far more than its share toward the United Budget for the coming year.

Southwestern Washington Friends are applying to the Yearly Meeting this year for Quarterly Meeting status. With this action, there will now be eight Quarterly Meetings in our Yearly Meeting.

#### CHURCHES MOVE

Ontario Heights church in Eastern Oregon has purchased a church property from another denomination in the city of Ontario and plan to move into their new quarters within a short time.

Hayden Lake Friends in Northern Idaho are moving their meeting house and parsonage into the Hayden Lake village. These moves for Ontario and Hayden Lake promise increased opportunities for service and effectiveness.

A number of churches have either started or completed new church building programs during the past year. The Yearly Meeting can be justly proud of the many fine structures that are being built this year by our people. In this group are included: Spokane, Sherwood, Timber, Metolius, East Wenatchee, Cambridge, and Eugene. Other churches have undertaken major remodeling projects which have greatly improved their facilities.

#### PASTORS MOVE

This year we are losing a number of pastors from our churches. Merrill and Anna Coffin plan to retire January 1. Carl and Minnie Miller will retire this year also. Words cannot express the deep appreciation we all feel in our hearts for these and the many others who have given their entire lives to the work of the ministry. They are not going to be willing to sit down and do nothing but are still anxious to serve God wherever they may be.

We are happy to welcome the following new pastors into the pastoral fellowship: John Retherford will assume the pastorate at First Friends in Vancouver on January 1. He with his family have served a term as missionaries in Kenya Colony, East Africa, under the American Friends Board of Missions. Herbert Sargent, student at George Fox College, will pastor Springbrook; Donald Lamm, Rosedale; Charles Seller, Cherry Grove; Richard Powell, Parkrose; and Douglas Brown, Maplewood.

#### VISITATION EVANGELISM

One of the best methods of gaining and holding new members is in the field of personal visitation. This ought to be a part of the concern of every church. The pastor should be sufficiently free from all other responsibilities in order to devote his full time to prayer, visitation and ministry of the Word. No farm would ever prosper if the farmer had to hold a full-time job elsewhere, and the fields were left untended. Neither can a church prosper if the pastor of the flock must give most of his time to other work. A pastor who receives sufficient income from the church to maintain his family should likewise be expected to devote his full time and interest to the work of the church. The pastor cannot relieve the responsibility of the church in this field, for a concerned church will also see the needs and the opportunities of going out, in the spirit of love and compassion, to bring people into the fellowship of the church. The Ministry and Oversight Body and the Christian Education Committee should feel a large share of responsibility for this great work.

Hundreds of Friends have cooperated, during the past year, to make the church move forward. A hearty thanks should be given to all who have helped in this great work. I want to mention my appreciation for the able help of Robert Morrill who served as my assistant during my absence from the home field this past spring. His work in the office of financial secretary of the Yearly Meeting has been invaluable, in publishing a monthly account of the United Budget and Fixed Expense accounts, and in keeping the people clearly informed about Yearly Meeting finances. This has been a great factor in the encouraging annual financial report of this past year. Also I want to thank all the Quarterly Meeting superintendents who took on many of my responsibilities in their respective areas during that time.

The office secretary, Beth Hockett, as well as our printing shop personnel, Ray Carter and Ralph Fletcher, with their wives, are continuing in faithful, efficient service to the Yearly Meeting. Roger and Mildred Minthorne have again given a large contribution of time and talent to the Yearly Meeting in the office of the treasurer.

During the year I have given approximately 139 messages. Fifty-nine of these were given during the course of our recent missionary journey. I have travelled about 30,000 miles in carrying out my appointments. About 14,000 miles of this was by airplane, jeep,



horseback and river canoe, during our missionary journey.

I have sought to carry out my responsibilities in the visitation of local and Quarterly Meetings as well as meeting with a great many boards and committees. I have written several articles for our church papers, edited the Outposter of church extension news, and sent out hundreds of personal and general letters.

#### TRIP TO BOLIVIA

My wife, Kathleen, and I, are deeply indebted to the Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting for the most unusual and outstanding privilege and honor which you bestowed upon us by sending us to visit our mission field in Bolivia this past spring. Our journey took us through Mexico where we briefly visited the Wycliff Bible Translators Headquarter under whose direction two of our members, Inez Butler and Margaret Morgan, labor. Then we were privileged to visit the California Friends field in Guatemala, where we were warmly received by both the missionaries and national Friends. Our journey also took us to the World Gospel Mission field in the jungle lowlands of Bolivia where we visited more Oregon Yearly Meeting Friends, the Carroll Tamplin and Harold Harriman families, besides several other missionary families. Upon our departure from Bolivia we visited the Friends mission field in the beautiful island country of Jamaica. All of these extra missionary contacts were extremely valuable to us and we thank God for them all. We were privileged to share the fellowship and company of Dr. Alvin Roberts and Dr. Otto Emig during the early part of our trip to Bolivia. These men made a valuable contribution to the missionary cause by their counsel and helpful spirit.

Our main purpose in traveling to South America was to visit our own field high in the Andes Mountains of Western Bolivia. I have made a comprehensive report of our trip to the Mission Board and we have written many articles, which have been published, concerning our experiences. Consequently, only a very brief summary of it will be contained in this report.

We did visit every station on our field while in Bolivia, and were entertained royally in every missionary home. Our ministries there included preaching at the annual meeting of the National Friends Church in La Paz, the Bible School and American School for missionary children, both at our Copajira farm, interdenominational missionary fellowship of La Paz, and many local churches scattered over our field.

#### OBSERVATIONS

Our conclusions may be summarized briefly as follows:

1. The day of our greatest opportunities for evangelism in Bolivia is upon us now. The door to this field may close sooner than we think.
2. The Nationalization of the Friends church in Bolivia has been moving ahead and there is every reason to believe the work is on its way to an eventual indigenous status.
3. The Friends Bolivian work is, by far, the fastest growing mission field which we observed anywhere. Enlargement facilities for the annual meeting in La Paz is essential, and plans are being made to build a tabernacle with future expendable possibilities to care for up to 5,000 people.
4. The greatest unreached field in all of Bolivia is at our doorstep,

on the islands and shores of great Lake Titicaca, with hundreds of communities which have never once heard the Gospel.

5. The most strategic area of our work lies in the training of Aymara youth in our Bible School, for effective and extensive evangelism can be carried on best by the Indians themselves.

6. The greatest need for increased missionary staff is for a missionary who would head up the work on Lake Titicaca. The opening of this great field is largely dependent upon missionary leadership and supervision.

7. The most urgent necessity upon the home church is for an increased spiritual burden and an increased spiritual power in prayer. We cannot expect anything greater on our foreign field than we experience ourselves. The work of successful missions is the work of the Holy Spirit. We cannot credit the miracles of development on the field to anything other than God's accomplishments through a consecrated, dedicated staff of missionaries.

#### FRIENDS WHO SERVE OTHERS

During the past five years 12 of our own young people have gone out to serve as foreign missionaries under other mission boards than our own. Eight more will take up work this fall with another missionary organization, namely, the Four Flats, quartet members and their wives, serving under World Vision. There are now 31 Oregon Yearly Meeting adults under appointment to other foreign mission fields around the world.

While there is a serious problem of adequately supporting our own mission field, and maintaining loyalty to our own church family responsibility, yet, God has chosen and set forth this great number from our midst and He is trying to show us that what we have called impossible is now being accomplished. And we are probably paying a good portion of the bill! How slow we sometimes are to launch out by faith into the leadings and openings of the Lord! Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting, let us seize this situation as an opportunity for world-wide vision of interest and concern.

#### ASSOCIATION OF EVANGELICAL FRIENDS

Of special significance to evangelical minded Friends everywhere, is the report of the fourth conference of Evangelical Friends, held this past month in Denver, Colorado. I would urge all Friends to secure the printed report, as soon as it is available, and become members of this new organization which promises much to be the channel for a strong resurgence of spiritual life and power throughout Quakerdom. Our Yearly Meeting needs, and must have, the fellowship and strengthening influence of Friends everywhere, who are not merely orthodox, but who believe and demonstrate the reality of dynamic living Christian faith and practice.

#### MORE PASTORS NEEDED

I am deeply concerned over the problem of so few of our youth responding to the challenge of full-time Christian service, especially in the field of pastoral ministry. The two institutions primarily responsible for the culture and development of the youth whom God calls, are the local church and the school that trains them. These must provide a warm spiritual atmosphere with a dynamic appeal to dedicated service. Our college is doing its best to train the youth we send to its halls and foster within them a passion for souls.



But the church must send its youth, if our school is to have a chance to prepare them for service.

#### SCOPE OF SERVICE

The church has a sufficiently wide range of avenues of service to fit almost any concern one might want to express in his Christian testimony. The fields of home and foreign missions, Christian education, church extension, radio ministry, church-related schools, youth work, social service, stewardship, publication, migrant work, peace, public morals, public education, literature, ministry to the aged; all of these, present a wonderful panorama of gracious opportunity, if we will but meet the challenge which is ours.

Let us turn ourselves to the invitation of Jesus when He said, "The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few: pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that He would send forth laborers into His harvest." (Luke 10:2)

"On behalf of the Executive Committee of the Bolivian National Friends Church, we thank Oregon Yearly Meeting for sending Gregorys to Bolivia."

● 44. The Executive Committee unanimously recommends that Dean Gregory continue to serve as general superintendent of Oregon Yearly Meeting with the continued salary of \$290.00 per month plus \$85.00 per month "house allowance" and .07¢ per mile for travel.

This was accepted with several expressions of appreciation by individuals and by a rising vote of appreciation by the meeting.

Walter P. Lee, president of the board read the following report which was accepted:

#### REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY FIELD SECRETARY

The privilege of serving as missionary field secretary for vitally spiritual, expanding missionary work is a stimulating, challenging and rich experience for which I am deeply grateful to the Lord and the Friends of Oregon Yearly Meeting. The responsibilities of this office in conjunction with the pastoral duties at Whitney meeting have been large and, due to human limitations, may not have received the fullest attention they deserve. The Friends of Whitney have been most cooperative and understanding in releasing me from time to time to present and represent the missionary work.

Correspondence in connection with the missionary program has consumed an increasing amount of time as the work has expanded both at home and abroad. Besides a large volume of correspondence and preparation of bulletins handled through a private secretary, I have personally written 233 communications, many of which have demanded much thought and time.

Besides preparing the Missionary Prayer Bulletin each month, I have written 13 articles for publication in the Northwest Friend and the Missionary Voice of Evangelical Friends. The missionary material for the Yearly Meeting Handbook claimed my time for revision and preparation for publication.

Thanks to the complimentary professional photographic services of Emil Swanson, large photographs of the missionaries families were prepared and mounted for sale. I attended to the business involved in this including the sale and mailing of the photographs.

In an effort to inform our constituency and inspire continued missionary interest, I arranged and directed eight missionary workshops in different sections of the Yearly Meeting. Leland and Iverna Hibbs and Flodene Jarvill were prominent in the program of these workshops. Dean Gregory assisted in these when possible.

It was also my privilege to conduct a class on missions in one of our summer camps and to participate in a missionary conference at George Fox College.

Representing our mission work I attended the Missionary Executive Retreat at Winona Lake, Indiana, last October and the annual meeting of the Evangelical Foreign Missions Association in connection with the National Association of Evangelicals annual convention in Cleveland, Ohio, last April. These meetings bring information and inspiration, but also responsibility as I am currently a member of the Board of Administration of the E.F.M.A.

Dean Gregory and I are members of the Publication Board of the Missionary Voice of Evangelical Friends, for which the duties of chairman have fallen upon me.

The responsibilities of field secretary have required 45 days away from home, travel in the amount of 12,000 miles and time spent in office work of more than 270 hours.



The unprecedented increase of opportunities in Bolivia, the growing needs on the field, the mounting volume of correspondence and the need for more frequent and active presentation of the missionary challenge to our home churches will demand more than part-time attention in the very near future.

The complete report of the missionary work of Oregon Yearly Meeting appears below:

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

With thankfulness to God for opportunities for service and His blessings upon our Bolivian stewardship, the Board of Missions presents this report of the twenty-sixth year of missionary endeavor among the Aymara Indians of Bolivia, South America. "Oh give thanks unto the Lord; call upon His name: make known His deeds among the people."

This twenty-sixth year of work in Bolivia seems in reality to begin an era of greater challenge and opportunity than Oregon Yearly Meeting has experienced before in Bolivia. The significance of this year has been the revelation of a tremendous spiritual harvest that has matured during the preceeding twenty-five years. We are looking out upon a harvest for which we have labored and prayed, and it is more extensive than we had anticipated.

The great increase in the number of meetings in Bolivia and in the attendance indicates the spiritual hunger of the Aymara Indian and the unlimited opportunities for the Gospel message. The number of meeting places has grown from 45 to 58 during this year and the attendance at the annual conference of approximately 1300 is an indication of the rapid increase in church attendance over the field.

The unprecedented attendance at the annual conference has made imperative plans for larger quarters to care for the increasing crowds. This has necessitated the purchase of land on the Alto in need was pressing if a place is to be ready by next annual conference in April, the price of this land was borrowed from other funds with the hope that the Lord's people will rally to the challenge. Marshal Cavit has requested the privilege of making the new tabernacle a memorial to his father and of raising the cost of about \$4500 among his friends. This is but one example of the expansion which has become necessary in the purchase of property and building of churches to meet the growing needs.

The increasing enrollment at the Helen Cammack Memorial Bible School necessitated larger quarters, so a new dining hall was built this year with funds which remained above the cost of the administration building that was erected a year ago.

The jeep used by the evangelistic secretary on the field had to be replaced this year with a new one. The cost above the sale of the old jeep was furnished from the Calendar Fund.

Through the consecration of His people the Lord has again supplied the financial needs of the work. However, extra gifts and pledges were necessary to supplement a curtailed United Budget.

The Yearly Meeting superintendent, Dean Gregory and his wife, Kathleen, were able to visit the field this year by the use of the

accumulated visitation fund and special gifts. They are reporting on the missionary work as they travel over the Yearly Meeting.

Consistent with the indigenous church plans, all of our Christian Day Schools became self-supporting. It was encouraging to note that the number of schools increased this year even though the financial support rested upon the Aymaras.

Our missionary work is still sadly under-staffed and the missionaries are draining their strength too rapidly with excess labors. The Hibbs family will be returning to Bolivia this fall following this past year's furlough. The Cavit family is moving to La Paz to handle the building program for the new tabernacle and the new churches and to assist the Jack Willcuts family in the evangelistic work. The Knight family will remain in the Yungas and the Chapman and Paul Cammack families will remain at the Bible School and farm. The Mark Roberts family is now returning home for furlough, but plans to remain in the United States for several years to study medicine with the expectation that Mark will become a licensed physician for more effective missionary service.

In the emergency need for more help at the Bible School and farm, the Forrest Cammack family have offered to go to Bolivia for a two-year term on a half-salary and half-travel expense basis. Funds for their support and expenses must be raised above the United Budget as this proposition has developed since the budget was established.

A new truck is desperately needed at the mission farm and one has been ordered. For this a number of people are making contributions, some quite large. It is hoped that the response will continue and cover the cost of this vehicle.

To stimulate missionary concern here at home the Board of Missions has continued the monthly Missionary Prayer Bulletin which goes to each meeting, prepared the Missionary Calendar, presented missionary news in "The Soul Cry of the Aymara" within the Northwest Friend four times a year, has cooperated with Ohio and Kansas Yearly Meetings in the publication of The Missionary Voice of Evangelical Friends on a quarterly basis and has prepared informational material, plans and suggestions for the Yearly Meeting Handbook. In addition to this, Leland and Iverna Hibbs have had deputation services in all of the meetings of the Yearly Meeting and the missionaries have furnished the monthly news letter entitled, "The Bolivia-O-Gram."

A retreat was held in November by the Board of Missions which proved very helpful to its members in the study of the indigenous church principles and planning for the future of the work.

In the reports from 54 of our local meetings, the average number of special missionary services per church was five, of which about 60% represented our own missionary program.

Most of the meetings reported the reading of a number of missionary books. The reported record for the Yearly Meeting of 1187 surpassed last years' report by 327.

The number of missionary prayer meetings held throughout the Yearly Meeting was 390, which was only slightly more than the previous year. These form the life-line of the missionary work and more of our meetings should join in this part of the missionary endeavor.

Oregon Yearly Meeting continues to supply missionaries for a number of the world's mission fields. Thirty-six of our members



were engaged in missionary work during this past year with only twelve of this number serving under our Board of Missions.

The Calendar project furnishes vital funds for the work on the field. The support of the project continues to increase with the Yearly Meeting treasurer reporting total receipts for this fund of \$4396.43. This is an average return of slightly more than \$3 per calendar for the 1426 calendars reported distributed. The support of the national preachers and the evangelistic program in Bolivia has been drawn from this fund. This fund has also furnished money for the purchase of the new jeep, the purchase of land and the construction of churches. Since the treasurer closed his books, expenditures for land and building have severely reduced this fund. The support of this fund calls for so little from each family and yet is so vital to the work. If 1000 calendars were to return a quarter for each missionary birthday shown, the amount received in a year would be \$8250. This would insure the possibility of meeting some very pressing needs without special campaigns.

Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting continues to return the highest average per calendar in the amount of \$4.70. South Salem has won the honor of the highest average per calendar for any single meeting with an \$11 average. Whitney and Springbrook were in second place with an average of \$6.40 per calendar. Unfortunately some of our meetings neglected the project.

We stand in the midst of a great harvest field and the laborers are too few. The missionaries are desperate for more help. Support for more missionaries is needed. There is an urgent need for another printing of the Aymara song book to sell to the nationals. The receipts from the previous issue have been eaten up by the terrific inflation which is almost beyond control. An issue of 25,000 song-books will cost about \$3000.00 for which no funds are at present available. A literacy and literature program is almost a necessity. This is the hour of opportunity in Bolivia.

"The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few: pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He would send forth laborers into His harvest."

#### Field Council

The past year has been one of liberty: the Bolivian government has allowed us complete freedom in all forms of worship and evangelistic effort and also we have seen the Holy Spirit working freely throughout the entire field by the establishment of older works and opening of many new doors.

This year, twelve missionaries have staffed four stations: La Paz, Copajira, Puerto Perez and the Yungas. In each of these stations there are now suitable living quarters for missionaries which enable us to continue to push forward more rapidly and evangelize in many unevangelized areas. The arrival of the new launch, aluminum row boat, the jeep truck and other equipment such as public address systems, colored Bible slides and smaller items has also aided greatly in the advancement of the work. The large Gospel tent and the small tent have been used extensively and have gained us entrance into many a community which has never heard the Gospel message before. The evangelistic, educational, agricultural and medical efforts have been unhampered by any governmental agencies. True, there have been problems and local difficulties in all of these efforts but we thank God that He has kept the doors open for the free, rapid advancement on all lines. The favorable settlement by the agricultural reform authorities has eased the tensions on the farm and allowed the missionaries there to enjoy peace once more. The new work in the Yungas is becoming an established field with wide open doors and a ready acceptance to the Gospel by many. The change in the system of grade school management has given us more schools and the possibility of an unlimited program. A record attendance in the Bible School shows that God is dealing with our young men and preparing large numbers of witnesses for the coming years. The national church is more established than ever and we are optimistic as to its future as we have seen God controlling the brethren and preparing them for the complete management of their own church. With church attendance of the field being near the three thousand mark we can but thank our Lord and Savior.

The Mission Council expresses its deep gratitude to the members of Oregon Yearly Meeting for sending our Yearly Meeting superintendent, Dean Gregory, with his wife, Kathleen Gregory, to make an official visit to the Bolivian field. Their ten week's visit was one of inspiration and spiritual blessing to both missionaries and nationals. Dean Gregory was evangelist for the sessions of Bolivian Yearly Meeting and for the Bible School mid-year revival. He also was able to make quite a complete visit of the entire field and become well acquainted with the work. We are certain that one fine result of this visit will be a closer union between Oregon Yearly Meeting and the Bolivian field.

The mission staff has retained the number of twelve members most of the year. The Hibbs family returned to the States for furlough in August and the Cavit family returned to the field in December. The Roberts plan to return to the States in August for furlough and we



are looking forward to the return of the Hibbs and the arrival of the Forrest Cammack family sometime this fall. We are glad to report good health on the part of all missionaries and children, there having been no serious health difficulties during the entire year.

The time proven system of a Field Council with no one person in charge of the entire field and with all members having an equal voice and vote has continued to keep excellent harmony among missionaries and enabled us to work freely as God directs us. The responsibilities this year have been as follows: Jack Willcuts served as Mission Council chairman until January, missionary representative on the council of the Bolivian National Church and as a member of the Field Evangelism Committee, in charge of the La Paz—Altiplano area. Paul Cammack served as farm secretary for the year and as field treasurer until January. Ralph Chapman has served as Bible School director and construction secretary until January. Mark Roberts has served in evangelism in charge of the area around Puerto Perez and as grade school director. Marshal Cavit has taught in the Bible School, served as a member of the Field Evangelism Committee in charge of the Copajira-Lake area and as construction secretary since January. Roscoe Knight has served as a member of the Field Evangelism Committee in charge of the Yungas area, as a member of the presiding body of the National Church and as Mission Council chairman since January. Wilma Roberts has served as medical secretary. Marie Chapman has served as teacher in the Bible School. Tina Knight has served as an aid in Yungas evangelization. Phyllis Cammack has served as field editor for three periodicals, teacher of the farm missionary children, director of the girls' school and secretary of the Mission Council until January. Geraldine Willcuts has served as La Paz hostess to our missionaries and as secretary to the Mission Council since January. Catherine Cavit has served as teacher in the Bible School and as Mission treasurer since January. Special recognition should be given to David and Daniel Cammack who have spent a good share of their time doing men's work on the farm.

The Mission Council, though not large numerically, has been enabled through God, to sustain and advance the work that would ordinarily require a much larger personnel. This is accomplished by the power of the Holy Spirit and by utilizing native help in every field and way possible. May God be praised.

#### **Evangelistic Report of Altiplano Area**

Vigorous efforts in the area of field evangelism have been continued this year. God's blessing, guidance and help is evidenced in the opening of new points and revival in established meetings. Only fragmentary results can be reported as compared to the vast potential and unreached territories under our stewardship but there is an increasing momentum in the evangelistic program of both the mission and the national church.

#### **Open Doors**

A few minutes ago a layman from an island church said in the mission office, "Can't you come to the island neighboring us soon with the tent or the boat? They say they need the Gospel". This

plea symbolizes the tremendous opening to Gospel ministry in the lake, along the frontiers, over the Altiplano and in the Indian communities before us at this moment. A great need, I feel our greatest, is another couple to "work" the large Lake Titicaca island and shore opportunities.

#### **Tent Meetings**

The tent campaign effort started 15 months ago has reached several thousand new people with the message of salvation. Sixteen separate campaigns have been held in this period, some of only a few days duration but each blessed of the Lord. These have been under the exclusive direction of national leadership. House to house visitation, ministry through the use of colored Bible slides, flannelgraph lessons, public address system, gospel records, and the folding organ have made the great gospel tent even more effective. Added large equipment including the 24 ft. launch and jeep 4-wheel drive pickup provided this year have made the tent and other evangelism more extensive in outreach.

#### **New Churches**

Eight new churches have been started this year. As usual, most of these have sprung up rather spontaneously under the Spirit's leadership.

#### **Attendance**

It is estimated 3,000 persons are in the Sunday schools of the 58 churches of our field each week. (This total number includes the Yungas work too.) Attendance at Junta anual was highest in history with 1,300 counted. Other field conferences at Pucarani, Chunavi, Ojje, Amacari, Copajira found new records in attendance as well.

#### **Our Goal**

The central goal of Oregon Friends Bolivian Mission is as always—reaching the lost and establishing the church. In this goal I am convinced that at this point of 25 years effort in Bolivia we are on the threshold, not the pinnacle of our opportunity in the Lord. While the world looks to an international "atoms for peace" plan to save us for the future, let us not be deceived by man-devised plans of salvation however attractive. As a mission staff let us join the vast fellowship of evangelistic missions around the world in the most vital and far-reaching of any endeavor in the world today. In comparison to evangelism, abroad or at home, any other line of work is merely marking time until a world destructive holocaust occurs or the Lord comes.

#### **Evangelistic Report for The Yungas**

When God opens the door no man, nor devil, can shut it. This we have experienced this past year in the opening of the new field in the Yungas. It is with but praise in our hearts that we report on God's workings here. We have received an enthusiastic welcome by many, have seen the devil working trying to destroy the faith of many, but above all have seen the Holy Spirit saving and establishing numbers of new believers in many communities.



As the work is completely new for our mission it has required a varied approach. Much personal evangelism has been done, house to house visitation, tent meetings and constant visitation and vigilance of new church groups. We have used the small 16 x 16ft. tent in many places for evangelistic services. The tent is a big help as people will come to see what's happening when they wouldn't go to a private home. We have had a ready response in all places with many professing conversion. However, catholic priests, friends, superstitions and worldly habits work hard to drag these new converts back to their former ways of life. Many have fallen, usually within the first month but in every place where we have had meetings there have arisen those who have resisted strong persecution and have become strong unshakable Christians. As we cannot by any means supply pastors to all these new places, most of these people have had only occasional visits and help by missionaries and native pastors. The Holy Spirit has been a faithful pastor, and on this assurance of His continued workings, we are continuing to enter new communities with the Gospel even though we cannot give them pastors.

We have had quite a turn-over in national workers this year. It is very difficult for the people of the high plains to become accustomed to these lower valleys and most of them are very afraid of tropical diseases. Thus, the workers who were with us in the beginning have returned to the Altiplano and the Bible School students who helped during the school vacation have either returned to school or their own homes. However, God has marvelously supplied by sending four more workers from the outside and by raising up strong leaders building the work in or near their own communities.

At present, there are four grade schools, all of them being supported completely by local people. There are regular church services being held in twelve places. In some localities where the communities are close enough together, the believers meet together on Sundays and in their own communities for week night services. Christians come to these regular services from at least twenty two different communities. It is difficult to obtain accurate records from all places but know believers from all parts would number about two hundred and twenty-five.

Construction has consisted of the building of suitable quarters for missionaries and the construction of churches. At first, the thought was that Knights would live in the rest cabin temporarily until better quarters could be found. However, it did not seem advisable to build a new home at present so the cabin was finished with a second floor, large veranda, fire place, builtins and re-finished inside and out. A new building containing four rooms; store room, servant's room, guest room and garage has also been constructed. Cleaning, leveling and terracing of the land around the cabin has made a very nice home, completely adequate for the present and which can also be used in future years for a vacation cabin. Also, at present there one church is completed, four are under construction and two are in the planning stages. Christ said, "I will build My church." This He is doing both spiritually and materially and for this, we thank Him.

## Field Report on National Church Progress

### ORGANIZATION

Three important steps have been made in National Church organization the past year: (1) Distribution of an enlarged and adapted Constitution and Discipline, (2) Establishing of four Quarterly Meetings introduced 15 months ago, (3) Naming of 4 new officers to the Executive Committee, including a new president for a three year term.

The new Discipline and Constitution form not only a much needed program for church organization but also the basis for the legal incorporation of the Bolivian National Friends Church effected in April of this year. Detailed instructions are supplied for the setting-up of Monthly and Quarterly Meetings and the duties of each officer, Sunday school organization and functioning, a completely new plan for recording and recognition of ministers and "workers", wedding ceremony, funeral service, a group of 26 Queries plus a concise outline of Friends doctrinal beliefs and historical background. The Discipline was carefully adapted from the Friends Discipline of Oregon Yearly Meeting and of Guatemala Friends Church by the Executive Committee of the Bolivian National Church and Mission Council.

It is evident the new Discipline will provide a uniformity over the field to traditional Friends practices and practical development of new churches and believers.

Twenty sessions of Quarterly Meetings, all of which I have personally attended, have been held in the four districts of the field. With few exceptions national leaders have assumed real responsibility in the direction of these Quarterly Meetings. There is an evidence of spiritual discernment which is highly commendable. To be sure certain "Aymara-isms" characterize the Quarterly Meeting sessions and immaturity and inexperience influence the business meetings. But on the whole it is being proved the Bolivian church was and is ready for this step and I am quite convinced they would continue and continue systematically if all missionary direction were withdrawn.

Vicente Yucra of this year's Bible School graduating class, member of Amacari Monthly Meeting and son of one of our oldest and most highly esteemed believers assumed the presidency of the National church on Easter Sunday this year. He is 38 years old, married and father of 2 children. Although relatively inexperienced in pastoral work and church leadership, he has an excellent Christian spirit and spiritual depth and is a man able to command the confidence and respect of his people. Fifteen months ago the Executive Committee was enlarged from 6 to 9 members which gives a wider area for representation. It is generally felt by the missionaries that God definitely led in providing one of the finest group of men to be found in the field who serve as church leaders.

One further phase of national church organization emphasized this year was in the arranging of the sessions of the Yearly Meeting. Morning business sessions were held for the first time following the "8 o'clock service" and preceding the "11 o'clock message." The Representative Body convened in this period daily to great advantage to all.



## FINANCES

Consistent with the avowed goal of our mission to establish indigenous church principles in field development, new steps have been taken this year to encourage national support of the national church. (1) An attempt was made before and during the Yearly Meeting sessions to introduce a national church budget. Somewhat different than the ordinary idea of a church budget—the plan is as follows: Each church not paying its own pastor an adequate support are to send in all tithes received to the national church treasurer who will pay the pastor. Larger meetings which may pay their own pastor will send in 10% of all tithes to the national church. The mission will pay \$50.00 monthly into this same fund to augment the amount. The three months since Easter that this plan has been in operation have been quite encouraging. For example it is estimated the national church last year was 46% self-supporting (exclusive of church construction which is estimated at 50%). The past three months the offerings have increased to make the church about 60% self-supporting. (2) To encourage scripturally taught tithing among the churches as a part of the above budget plan, an envelope system for tithers has been set up and is in operation in nearly all of the churches. A simple plan wherein each tither may keep an accurate record of his giving during the year and which envelope bears his own name is an interesting innovation for the Aymaras.

Another aid in church financing is the printing of a quantity of "Church Treasurer's Books" with simple instructions for finance records. Instructional classes for using these books have been given in the Quarterly Meetings and as a course in the Bible School. Churches have been encouraged to bring produce to help in pastoral support but so far this idea has not been very successful.

It has been decided to print in the monthly paper for pastors, "The Amigo Suyu", the amount paid in by each church each month to the national church.

## MATURITY

The program and organization, I feel, is well begun in the Bolivian Friends National Church and the future development hinges upon the capacity of nationals for church leadership. To take even a Christian Aymara from his background of centuries and place him in a place of church responsibility is a tremendous step. The future of the national church is tied very closely with the progress of the Bible School. The plan to enlarge the school curriculum to include all pastors and interested church members is of wonderful promise to national church progress. Immaturity is a basic problem to all foreign mission development and is a problem hard to comprehend by our church minded constituency at home.

The great danger facing the Bolivian National Friends Church as I see it, is not a lack of finances, nor pastors but of a failure of the church leaders to learn the Christian art of working together and learning to have confidence in each other while yet assuming spiritual responsibility. This could be also said of the church at home no doubt, but here the danger is more apparent and more pronounced. This is the message of my heart in the Quarterly Meetings and field conferences.

Consequently the great need of the national church is the heart cleansing, baptism of the Holy Ghost of historic Friends and New

Testament emphasis which experience can be realized among our precious Bolivian leaders only as we pray and you at home pray for their future.

## Helen Cammack Memorial Bible Training School

It is with an expression of sincere thanks to the Lord for His leadership during this past year that we formulate this report. Our 1955 school year closed with the usual Copajira Conference, at which time we were pleased to see five graduates receive their final diplomas. Three others of the graduating class received provisional diplomas, and two of them will be invited to present themselves at the closing exercises of the 1956 school year to receive their final diplomas.

The interval between the closing of the 1955 school year the beginning of the 1956 school year was occupied with sessions of Girls' School and Pastors' Conference sandwiched in between the usual activities of remodeling or new construction work. The big project of that time was the construction of the new building housing our school dining hall and kitchen. Needless to say we are more than thankful for the addition of this new building to our school plant.

The 1956 school year began on January 7 with 59 applicants for entry or re-entry into the school. For the first semester of the present year, we maintained an enrollment of 53 students. These represented at least 23 different points over our field. With the loss of seven students at mid-year vacation, the enrollment for the second semester has been 46, an increase of 15 students over the average maintained for the 1955 school year.

The activities of the school year have been similar to those of past years, with the added blessing of being recipients of the visit of Dean and Kathleen Gregory. Marshal Cavit was our evangelist for the special meetings during the opening week of school, and Dean Gregory for the mid-year revival meetings following the return of the students from their time of vacation. Both of these times of special spiritual efforts were blessed of the Lord. We believe they were times of soul searching, and we feel that they were a foundation for the determination on part of many of the students to do all possible to straighten up their lives in order that they might live victorious Christian lives. We are very much encouraged over the spiritual level manifest in the lives of the students in school this year.

Although mention has been made of the visit of Dean and Kathleen Gregory, we wish to join all others here and, in the name of the Bible School, express our appreciation for their visit and ministry in our midst.

There has been an active evangelistic program in the school again this year. It has not been uncommon to have as many as 35 students out in active week-end work at one given time. The evidence of the good work being done is revealed in the increase from five points regularly reached last year to around 16 points this year. The Lord is indeed opening up this entire area to us, for which we need to give Him thanks as well as express our determination to occupy.

Our Bible School was host last July to a Bible School retreat



attended by the students and faculties of five different schools in the altiplano area. It was felt that it was a time of fellowship, with a good program of spiritual, social and recreational activities.

We again wish to express our firm belief that the Lord is increasingly using the Bible School as an instrument in helping in the growth of the Bolivian Friends Church. Our graduates are occupying places of leadership over the entire field, and we readily note that the best pastors we have are those who spent time in the school. Worthy of note, too, is the fact that almost the entire group of nationals on the Executive Committee of the National Church are graduates or former students of the school. Great is the challenge before us to faithfully fulfill that ministry that has been opened up to our Bible School.

#### Bible School for Young Women

September 9-29, 1955

A successful session of the Bible School for Young Women was held for the second year at Copajira with 45 young women enrolled. Every morning the following classes were taught: memory texts, Bible study, reading and writing, music, and a general class which included hygiene, gymnastics, games, and practical aspects of living. The afternoons were devoted to manual labor in working on the farm. Evangelistic meetings were held in the evenings of the first and last weeks with good results.

There was a noticeable spirit among the girls of an awakening to the privilege and duty of evangelizing among their sinful neighbors and countrymen.

The teachers were: Marie Chapman, Geraldine Willcuts, Wilma Roberts, and Phyllis Cammack. With such eagerness and gratitude as was exhibited it was a pleasure to have a part in this work.

It seems evident that more of the parents are realizing the benefits of such a school as this, since more girls arrived for this session. Many of them coming at great sacrifice. We were convinced as the girls bade us a tearful goodbye that our work, the prayers of many interested friends, and the sacrifices of the parents and girls were all more than fully repaid as the Lord was here in real blessing on us all, and we continue to pray that these young women will be real workers throughout the field in their own communities and churches.

#### Day School Report

A short time before school closed last year it was felt that definite steps should be taken to transfer the responsibility of the Day Schools to the national church. A plan was drawn up and presented to the Council providing that there should be a school board named within the local church to contract teachers, arrange for their salary, be responsible for the school property, define any rules that should control the school, and be responsible to the constituents. The secretary of education of the national church was to assume a stronger supervisory role and with the help of missionaries assist the school boards in securing teachers and also take the responsibility for some of the legal work connected with the school. The old director was to assume the position of an advisor and inspector, rather than a general policy maker for all schools. It was felt that the status of the schools should be changed from mission schools to church schools. The church was to assume the financial responsibility for the school and the mission would give more help in the way of materials.

At examination time all schools were apprised of the coming change and all teachers were notified that they would no longer be in the employ of the mission. With the help of Jack Willcuts the new program was explained and all schools were urged to begin early to work out the change. Many people were not happy with the proposition. The complete accord of the council met with almost no accord



on the part of the national brethren. It seemed obvious that the mission no longer loved them and that they were being cruelly abandoned. The older places felt that we should not take away their support since we had once begun but rather restrict our efforts to help in new places. Once begun the schools should not be allowed to fail so that they would become the laughing stock of the unbelievers. The new places felt that we were obligated to give them the same help that the older schools had had for from five to 10 years. Thus it became necessary for some of the churches to make the painful decision of whether they would go ahead with the school or let it cease to function. In the end all churches that had schools last year but La Paz continued with them this year. The La Paz school was discontinued for lack of facilities and space rather than by the desire of the church.

Observing from this short period of time there seem to be some quite rewarding results of the new system. There is evident a greater feeling of responsibility on the part of the teachers and the constituents alike for the proper conduct of the schools. Teachers feel more keenly their obligation to the students and the parents. The people realize that they must give more help to the teacher. There are 14 schools this year as against eight last year with the total number enrolled of about 350 this year compared to 360 last year. Last year there were nine teachers and three helpers and this year there are 14 teachers and one helper. It has been possible for the mission to extend its limited program over the added schools this year whereas it would have had to limit help to some four or five schools if we had been under the old system in the present circumstances. The type of teaching staff being used this year more nearly meets our expectations than last year. Of the 14 teachers seven have graduated from our Bible School and three more have attended. Three are faithful members of our national church and one is from the Canadian Baptist Mission. Nine are pastors of the local churches or assume the leadership because there is no pastor. The student bodies are smaller and we feel that this gives opportunity for better work and greater likelihood of spiritual fruit. Many of the people who were taking unfair advantage of the schools do not now send their children knowing that they must meet obligations placed upon them by their own people.

We are confident that the Lord very definitely led the mission to take these steps and carry them through. Within the last six months there have been legal changes and changes in other circumstances that would have made our program very difficult had we continued as before. Some of our sister missions are at present suffering the above mentioned troubles. We praise the Lord that before the trouble was apparent we were led to take steps that seem at the present to have avoided it. Last year several of the graduates and students from our day schools went on into the Bible School and there is good prospect that in the coming year there will be more from our day schools that will go on into the Bible Schools. Pray that more and more the young people from our day schools will go to the Bible School to be trained in the use of the Word and in the way of Christ. This is their purpose.

## The Mission Farm Report

July 1, 1955—June 30, 1956

It is with grateful hearts that we acknowledge God's blessing and care over the farm this year. Despite a devastating hail that eliminated the possibility of saleable surpluses of potatoes, our granaries are full of saleable grain which should carry the farm and Bible School through the year. Rapid inflation of the boliviano has hurt our dollar returns since we must exchange bolivianos for dollars in this unsteady economy.

Bolivia this year is much like Egypt in one of its lean years. Already semi-famine has set in with people hunting grain, potatoes, chunos—anything to eat. We pray that our stock of grain may be sold to the hungry in a way that will save and nourish souls as well as bodies. The continued comparative high production of the Copajira farm is a constant testimony of the Gospel to all about us.

The agriculture reform to date has not taken any land from us and we have reasonable assurance that we will not be affected by the reform because of our philanthropic work and mechanization. However, in a voluntary manner we have carried out the reform by increasing the amount of land for the use of our Indians. We have given them liberty to use various plots of land unusable for tractor farming near the mountains and 100 acres of flat land which they had used on a rental basis previously. This in no way diminishes our farming operations. The Indians probably will receive titles for these additional lands in the future.

The biggest change the agriculture reform has had on us is to change our livestock raising. Since much pressure came to plow up everything and produce more, we plowed up all the permanent pastures. This took our cattle pastures; so we have sold the cows. We have eliminated raising pigs also, since grain is high priced and unprofitable used as hog feed. We have maintained about 1100 sheep and are continuing to better them by culling and good breeding.

Farm construction has included a lamb shed, an extensive new irrigation canal and reservoir. Almost all of the tillable land of the farm can be irrigated when needed now. This is an extremely dry year and we are having to irrigate in order to plow.

The best crops grown this year were the spiritual crops, including the 45 young women in a Bible training course, many of whom now are faithfully laboring for the Lord in their communities, and the crop of 46 young men who studied the Living Word so that each one could be "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth".

Several thousand dollars are urgently needed from Oregon Yearly Meeting to complete this vital structure.

#### Treasurer's Report for the Bolivian Friends Mission

July 1, 1955—July 1, 1956

Our hearts are grateful to the Lord for His rich blessings upon us here in the Bolivian work. Likewise, we thank each and every one who has had a part with us in the work here, through interest, prayers, and gifts.

1. Last year at this time the Boliviano was at around 2800 to the dollar. This year has shown a marked rise until at the present time the exchange is around 7000 to the dollar. All surplus money 40

has been kept in dollars in order to avoid undue losses by this inflationary trend.

2. With this inflation, our dollars go much farther in the work, but make it doubly hard for the nationals, who find prices rising higher and higher. It has been necessary to raise the salary scale for our pastors.

3. With the rapid advancement of the work, we have drawn heavily on our funds recently. One item was a purchase of lumber, amounting to about \$1000, which we received at a large saving, and which will be used in building wherever needed in the work. Two other items were purchases of land in Calacoto and on the Alto, La Paz, for churches, the cost of land amounting to about \$2000 for the two properties. Another item is the building of a new missionary home on the farm. When money for these projects arrives from the States, our books will show a better balance in the dollar funds.

4. Our hearts are grateful to the Lord for the good growth of the work and for His marked blessing upon the work in every way.

- 49. Thomas Rule testified that he was glad that he was a Christian and Walter Cook read the twenty-second chapter of Revelation, after which he offered prayer, which concluded the devotional period.
- 50. The minutes were accepted as read and corrected.
- 51. The caretakers asked for the following additional members: Joyce Hester, Rachel Baker, Grace Clark and Mildred Beals. The request was granted.



- 52. Forrest Cammack sent in his resignation from the Board of Trustees of Western Evangelical Seminary as he is to go to serve in Bolivia.

The resignation was accepted and the choice of another person to serve was referred to the Executive Committee.

- 53. The name of Richard Cossel was approved as an additional member of the Board of Service.

- 54. The following recommendation from the Executive Committee was approved:

The Executive Committee of the Yearly Meeting recommends that the membership of Oregon Yearly Meeting accept the challenge of raising \$20,000.00 (twenty thousand dollars) annually through the Living Endowment of the George Fox College, of which \$14,150.00 is already pledged personally in the Living Endowment, or (Twenty-five Dollar Club). This plan is to be implemented by the pledgees, remitting through their respective Monthly Meeting treasurers, instead of directly to the College, as heretofore.

- 55. The representatives recommend that the request for the division of Portland Quarterly Meeting, formulating a new Quarterly Meeting north of the Columbia, be approved.

This was approved and the representatives are asked to present names of a committee to set up this Quarterly Meeting.

- 56. The representatives approve the recommendation for the change of the nomination of overseers to correspond to the nomination of elders, as presented by Portland Quarterly Meeting, and recommend that it be referred to the Discipline Revision Committee for inclusion in the Discipline.

This was approved by the meeting.

- 57. The representatives approve the Discipline change proposed by Boise Valley Quarterly Meeting, concerning adopted children as associate members.

The meeting approved the action.

- 58. Lillie Hendricks presented the needs of Bethany church in Seattle. She requested that members of the meeting pray for their meeting and give as the Lord directs.

#### BOARD OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

- 59. Harold Ankeny, the president, presided and presented the following report:

##### Introduction:

The board submits the following report as being a cross section of our work during the past year. We have endeavored to fulfill our duties assigned to us by the Yearly Meeting.

The Department of Peace is being transferred to the Board of Service. We have enjoyed the privilege of having this phase of work within the scope of our duties.

There is much to be done. We urge each meeting to use the handbook throughout the year. The goals are outlined in the handbook, but unless it is used it will not do the job for which it is intended.

Evil is all about us and pressing in more and more, and we need to be busy, for this is part of our Father's business.

Below appears the summary of the various departments within our board.

Department of Public Morals, Howard Harmon, superintendent

Most of our meetings have some type of presentation concerning the evils of liquor, narcotics, gambling, etc., but in far too many instances it is not a planned regular program, but rather left up to the pastor to stress in his messages.

Throughout the year 63 posters stressing the importance of clean living were placed in our churches. Around 20 skits were put on in our Sunday schools, and 14 films were shown encouraging both young and old to live clean lives.

Some of the churches have been very active and have done a fine job in keeping regularly before the Sunday school and church these things. Various methods of stressing public morals were used, a few of these are: speech contest, tracts, blotters, books, Christian Endeavor lessons, church bulletins, material given to Sunday school teachers to help in preparing lessons, special speakers, discussions in various classes.

Many letters of protest were written to radio stations, newspapers, T.V. stations, and magazines protesting the many liquor advertisements, and a few letters were also written commending magazines that do not carry liquor or tobacco advertising.

Of the 44 churches reporting 204 temperance magazines are taken. In addition to the magazines many receive temperance leaflets.

I believe the most neglected part of this committee this past year, and perhaps it is the most important, is of stressing the sacredness of marriage and purity before marriage to our young people. Most of the churches report that the only thing done along this line is an occasional message on the subject. A few churches have had special lessons, and some have books to loan or give to young people. This needs some real prayer and work that our young folks may not grow up in ignorance of what the Bible teaches and God expects of His children.

Department of Literature, Ruthanna M. Hampton, superintendent

Only a little over 60% of our churches reported having libraries. We feel sure that this is not a true picture of our reading interest since a fourth of our churches didn't report at all and much reading certainly is done, using private sources of books. May we not neglect this ministry, though, of providing good literature for all ages of our congregations. Also we need to remember, that just having a library is not enough. It must be an up-to-date, cared for library to fulfill its purpose. Two hundred eighty books were added to the 35 libraries which included the 100 books added to one previously defunct library. We are glad for this show of interest in new books. We would like to have a record next year of the kinds of books being added and also what types are actually being read by you. You will hear the details of this from your local chairman soon.

New books are presented to the interested groups through reviews, posters and displays. It is these interested groups such as Sunday schools and missionary societies who often buy the books.

Very little seems to have been done regarding the "comic book situation" in the communities. We trust enough interesting material was provided for our Sunday school youngsters so that undesirable comics were not a problem.

We are thankful for the interest shown in Bible reading and that pastors, Sunday school teachers and youth leaders are encouraging this most necessary reading. Contests, points or merits given in



Sunday school or youth clubs, providing Bible reading plans, and Bible study classes have all contributed toward this emphasis.

Many Christian and church related magazines seem to be represented in every meeting—102 magazines. We urge their continued use and great care used in the choice of the secular magazines brought into the home.

As Christians we are stewards of all we have and do, including our reading time. We cannot evade the responsibility that is ours for the reading material, books or magazines, to which we expose our families. May we be good stewards in this part of our Christian living.

Department of Education, Charlton Smitherman, superintendent

This year 47 meetings reported as compared to 46 reporting a year ago. Due to the fact members and non-members were reported separately this year it is a little more difficult to make comparisons with last year's statistics.

Non-members are those who attend regularly but are not on the active church membership list.

Significant is the fact that we have a total of 1301 non-members of elementary and high-school ages who attend our churches and Sunday schools as compared with a total of 878 in the same age group who are actually members of the church.

There is a noted decrease in the number of our members of elementary and high-school age who are attending Christian day schools.

College attendance has shown a marked increase over last year with a 19% increase in the number of members attending. Approximately 20% more attended church related colleges. Records indicate that 53% more of our church members attended George Fox College than during the previous year. (That is, the number of Friends Church members attending the college was 53% over last year's number).

While reports indicate a heavy decline in the number of teachers

teaching in Christian schools there is a sizable increase in the number who are teaching in public schools.

Scholarships and some definite kind of assistance to worthy students have shown a 10% increase in the number of churches participating.

The student scholarship and financial aid programs of both George Fox College and the Greenleaf Academy have been improved and increased during the past year and a large number of young people are availing themselves of these opportunities. To date George Fox College offers scholarships under sixteen different headings, most of which are listed and explained in the new handbook for pastors, committees and workers.

Other valuable information to be found in the new handbook explains how one may become eligible for a scholarship and the exact procedure each Monthly Meeting should follow in order to help worthy students to secure the Quarterly Meeting scholarships.

Teachers interested in becoming members of a Christian teachers organization may now have the opportunity to join the National Educators Fellowship and help establish local branches within their own locality. Free literature on this organization may be secured from the superintendent of this department or by writing to the address listed in the new handbook on page 18.

In general the educational picture is encouraging over the Yearly Meeting and reports indicate we have a vast field of opportunity in which to serve.

Department of Peace, Russel Stands, superintendent

This doctrine of peace needs to begin with the individual. The matter of peace needs to begin in the home. This reaches out to the right relationship in the church and in the nation.

Among some Friends we find a strong emphasis on the doctrine of peace but no emphasis on the doctrine of holiness. Among others we find stressed the holiness doctrine but little mention of peace. It is generally true that the group that stresses holiness does not stress peace and the group that stresses peace does not stress holiness. This ought not to be. The Bible keeps them in harmony with each other. "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God. Blessed are the peacemakers for they shall be called the children of God". Matt. 5:8,9. "Follow peace with all men and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord," Heb. 12:14. Many of our holiness churches are failing to teach this vital message of peace.

From the 42 meetings reporting, we find some are working faithfully at the job of promoting peace. We feel that this report does not cover all that is being done in our Yearly Meeting in regard to peace; it only portrays a small portion of what can and is being done.

The report blanks reveal that at least 40 sermons have been preached and some lectures made. Some meetings reported "sermons" but did not give a definite number. There have been at least 20 peace talks made in Sunday school. Others report discussion periods in this department. Only four meetings reported any special study groups on this subject of peace. Three meetings reported special lessons in the Christian Endeavor.

Other activities include: distributing of tracts, bulletin board information, literature racks for peace material, books relating to peace given to church library, posters made by the Christian Endeavor, hospital work by the C. E., prayer meeting talks, two



young men doing alternate service giving their testimonies and telling about their work, essays read in meetings, pastor and young people giving talks on Friends stand on peace, pamphlets distributed during family week on "God in the Home", "Peace in the world", "Peace in this house".

The essay contest was a real success again this year. There were nine entries in the college division and three in the high school. Others reported starting but no essay finished. In these essays, we find some real thought and research on the part of our young people. The prize winners were publicly acknowledged when awards were given and essays returned to the meeting to which they belonged to be used as the meeting saw fit. The first prize winners of both divisions have been condensed for printing in the Northwest Friend and other religious periodicals. All essays written are being returned to the meeting from which the young person is a member. This is to be used as the meeting feels best.

This department asked Gervas Carey to prepare the peace article that appeared in the December issue of the Northwest Friend.

The handbook, "You and the Draft" has been completed and is now ready for distribution. This booklet has been prepared by First Friends in Portland. The price of the book is 1-9 35¢; 10-99 25¢; 100 or more 20¢.

Ruthanna M. Hampton, superintendent of the department of literature, spoke for the cause of good literature.

After this Yearly Meeting, the peace department is being transferred to the Service Board, and so Russel Stands presented to Paul Mills, who is to be the head of the peace division, this department from the Board of Public Relations.

The reports were approved.

● 60. The representatives sent in the nominations for the Board of Public Relations as follows: Harold Ankeny, Richard Powell and John Roberts for three years. Kenneth Eichenberger for one year to replace Charlton Smitherman, who has been appointed as Quarterly Meeting superintendent of Public Relations of Greenleaf Quarter. These were approved.

● 61. Gerald Dillon gave a brief report of the Evangelical Friends Conference that was held in Denver, July 11-15. It was the fourth triennial conference. The proposed constitution for the Association of Evangelical Friends, with corrections, was adopted. The objectives of the association are: fellowship, a united voice, to provide means of cooperation, and to encourage revivals. There is a state-

ment of faith and membership is open to Friends who subscribe to the statement of faith.

● 62. "Faith is the Victory" was sung at the beginning of the inspirational hour, after which Merrill and Anna Coffin sang a duet, "Oh, My Soul".

Arthur Roberts spoke on the conversation of Pilate with Jesus as found in John 18:33-38.

Pilate asked, "Art thou a king then?"

Jesus is king, is Lord of all creation and of all men. He is king of the eternal kingdom—King of kings and Lord of lords.

Pilate asked, "What is truth?" The world is seeking again the witness of truth. The center of all our knowledge is Christ. He stands at the root of every branch of knowledge. All the fulness of God is in Jesus Christ.

After prayer the meeting adjourned to meet at 2:15 p.m.

- 70. Harlow Ankeny presented his resignation from the Board of Publication because he is moving out of Oregon to work with World Vision, and would not be able to attend the meetings of the committee. His resignation was accepted.

- 71. Gerald Dillon continued his talk on the Conference of Evangelical Friends. He said the administrative board was to consist of ten members—five appointed for three years and five for six years. There are to be a chairman, assistant chairman, secretary and treasurer. This board is to carry into effect actions already decided upon and to plan for the next meeting. There are a number of things to be considered—the plan of social relief, the publication of new books, visitation teams and finances.

- 72. Marvin Mardock, a member of the faculty of Friends Bible College of Haviland, Kansas, was introduced and welcomed by the meeting.

### GREENLEAF ACADEMY

- 73. Since Charlton Smitherman, the principal of the academy, was not present, the following report was read by the reading clerk:

Principal's Annual Report to Yearly Meeting  
1955-56

Greenleaf Academy opened its 48th consecutive year of school on September 13, 1955. The total enrollment reached 70 during the school year which was about the same average attendance as of the previous year. The teaching staff consisted of seven full and part-time instructors.

The entire year was marked with evidence of spiritual, intellectual and physical growth within the student body.

In February the school and church cooperated jointly in revival effort under the ministry of Herschel Thornburg. We feel that every student received spiritual aid and many students made decisions and consecrations which only eternity will reveal. As students sensed their own need and sought spiritual help voluntarily there was positive evidence throughout the year of greater Christian stability and assuming of burden for others in need.

There was little change in the curriculum and the course of study remained about the same. Certain increases in the amount of credit in mathematics, science and social studies have been made in order to prepare students more adequately to enter college.

The school was examined in December by the accreditation inspector from the State Dept. of Education and well approved for continued accreditation.

Further work was done toward completing the gymnasium facilities as time and money would allow. The completion of the dining hall has proven a great asset for social functions of the school, church and community.

A new feature this past year was the monthly publication of the "Grizzley" the school paper. Students chose this name which corresponds with the athletic team. Effort has been made to keep this publication on a high level and one which will carry valuable news of the school and its progress. The alumni association has assumed a portion of the financial responsibility in order that other members of the alumni may receive this paper during the coming year.

Douglas Brown represented the academy in various parts of the Yearly Meeting and especially in Boise Valley. One main object of his work was to emphasize the importance of Christian education and the part the academy has played in Oregon Yearly Meeting by training young people and also serving as a valuable feeder to George Fox College and other Christian colleges. We appreciate the financial gifts which were made as he presented this concern.

Of the 16 graduates in the class of 1955, 12 continued their education, nine in Christian colleges and six of these nine attended George Fox College. Of the 18 graduates in the class of 1956, at least 13 to date, are making definite plans to attend college, 12 to Christian colleges and 11 of these plan to attend George Fox. Others plan to attend in a year from now. These figures are given to indicate that the academy is serving the entire Yearly Meeting, though perhaps indirectly. Without doubt, a smaller percent of these graduates would continue their education in Christian schools were it not for the Christian influence they have received during their high school years.

Appreciation is expressed for the faithful service of Roy Knight and Genette Mc Nichols who have served on the faculty for the past two years. Both will be entering other fields of Christian work. Too, we have appreciated the two years of alternate service rendered by Frank Engle and his contribution to the school and community. Special recognition goes to John Roberts who has labored sacrificially as chairman of the Academy Board for so many years. As he has recently retired from the board we will not soon forget his untiring interest and faithful contribution toward the schools' welfare. To the remaining faculty members and board, gratitude is felt as each one has labored faithfully to promote the work of Christian education.

Two former graduates of the academy and George Fox College have been contracted to fill teaching positions for the coming year. They are Joyce Hoover and Leta Hockett. We are grateful for the interest these young people have shown as they have consented to be with us this coming year.

School closed on Thursday, May 31, with baccalaureate being held on Sunday evening, May 27, and commencement exercises on Tuesday evening May 29. Richard Cossell delivered the baccalaureate sermon and Arthur Roberts brought the commencement address.

As the year ended it was with a feeling of satisfaction and con-



fidence among faculty, students and parents that the 1955-56 school year had been one of the best in the school's history. Prospects for the coming year have been encouraging with anticipation of a larger student body. Pray that the academy may continue to serve the Yearly Meeting in a greater way during the coming school year.

### GEORGE FOX COLLEGE ANNUAL REPORT

● 74. Milo C. Ross, president of George Fox College, read his annual report as it appears below:

I come to you with a keen sense of the Divine blessing which has attended the work of the Board of Trustees, the administration, faculty, and staff, and the student body during the last academic year. Without doubt, the college is a stronger institution now than when I presented my report a year ago. In the words of President G. Brooks Ernest of Penn College: "Today, the operation of a college or university is big business, and like most businesses, a college is primarily concerned with improving the quality and performance of its product (the students) through the increased skill of its personnel (the faculty), production techniques (educational processes), and plant improvement and expansion (classrooms and laboratories)." The operation of your college is the largest single operation with which Friends in the Northwest have a connection, and I know that you will be deeply concerned and interested in this report of operation for the year 1955-56.

For the outline of this report, I am forced to go back over the reports of previous years, both my own and of my predecessors, to guarantee that all the functions are considered, adding new salient factors, and eliminating outmoded ones.

#### NEW PROCEDURES

The improved procedures inaugurated under the deanship of Donald McNichols were continued and expanded under the able and vigorous leadership of Kenneth M. Williams. The most important of these is a full program of eligibility, both in extra-curricular and in academic activities; and the raising of standards for admission and continuance in the college. All of the preparatory work in adapting the Yale College Honor System has been accomplished during the second semester of last year; in which the administration and faculty have initiated the plan to go into effect this fall, and the student body officers and organizations are to adjust their activities in cooperation.

With the growth of the student body and the resulting large classes at the freshmen level, the administration has inaugurated an approved plan of using student assistants, most of whom are juniors or seniors. For this first year, we have set up the program in men's athletics, psychology and education, English, social studies, and physics and mathematics.

#### FACULTY AND STAFF

Especially in a small college, personalities loom large in the activities. New procedures with us mean not only cold, impersonal rules and standards, but also the assimilation of personnel. This was very pronounced last autumn, when we brought in a number of new faculty and staff.

Both Dean Kenneth M. Williams and Alex Beltz have been granted their Master's degrees—at the University of Oregon and Walla Walla College, respectively. Miss Caryl Jean Short and Miss Dilla Tucker are engaged in graduate studies at the University of Southern California and Portland State College, respectively. Carl H. Reed has been on leave of absence, working toward his doctorate at the University of Washington. A good number of our faculty and staff have participated in regional and national conventions and institutes in connection with their several disciplines.

The second faculty lecture was ably presented by Arthur O. Roberts, Ph.D., now full Professor of Philosophy and Religion, on the subject: "Judgment and the Meaning of History."

I am happy to report a very stable situation as regards the continuity of faculty and staff. We have very little turn-over. The major change affecting the academic program resulted in the resignation of the Dades who have elected to work elsewhere after five years of faithful service with us. They are most excellent Christian people. Mary Dade has brought our library to a condition of acceptance. Merrill has been a most valuable member of our faculty. Esther Mae Moor Stanfield has relinquished her position as part-time instructor in women's physical education. To replace these valuable people, we have contracted Miss Genette McNichols, formerly on the faculty at Greenleaf Academy, as librarian. Mr. Alex Beltz, M.A., has been engaged as Assistant Professor of Science, replacing Merrill Dade. Miss Charlotte Macy, M.R.E., from Asbury and formerly of our faculty, has again joined us to teach women's physical education.

This stable situation is in large measure the result of the progressive viewpoint of the Board of Trustees in guaranteeing salaries, encouraging graduate study, and developing a satisfactory rank and tenure plan. At the February, 1956, meeting of the Board, action was taken to contract the entire faculty at a higher scale.

I am realizing a change of climate in that several of our choice youth are making plans to go ahead with advanced training in order to prepare themselves for service at George Fox; while others, during the year, have offered to join our faculty and staff. This is an encouraging trend and must be considered as a direct answer to prayer.

Harlow Ankeny, public relations officer, will now leave after five years on our staff, to join the program of World Vision, Inc. He has done a monumental job in developing our publicity and journalism releases, our student prospect files and our alumni fund. These activities have resulted in great advancement for the college in students, loyalty and finance. His successor will find a very strong situation.

The only other major change in staff will be the coming of Mrs. Helen Powell, of Pueblo, Colorado, to be dorm mother at Canyon Hall.

The offerings in music are being extended in our contracting Miss Elinor Sharp, a graduate of Juillard School of Music, for violin; Alex Beltz for band, and Lauren B. Sykes, well-known organist, in that capacity.

#### THE SCHOOL YEAR

A total of 164 students were registered this last year, with 72 of



them being new to our campus. This posed many problems in that we did not enjoy the strong academic, spiritual, or social leadership of upper classmen, and we continued to feel the negative effects of the two years when the school operated without the full administration.

Dean Williams rose in stature as the year progressed, in giving most adequate leadership to the faculty and student body. The football season enjoyed greater success than for some years, while the basketball season was marked with our boys breaking three conference records. The a cappella choir, after wabbling a bit at first, came through in most excellent fashion, presenting concerts of great beauty, excellence, and blessing, under the direction of Ross Stover.

I cannot forget the steady, faithful, excellent and devoted teaching of our faculty, one and all; who sacrificially stay on and on, loving the Lord and loving our students. This is the center and core of our institution, and I wish to challenge all who hear or read this to pray for these courageous souls, your missionaries in Christian education.

Both the Fall and Spring Christian Emphasis weeks were times of great conviction and blessing, with most of our student body receiving spiritual help, with growth and response on the part of our faculty. Dr. Martin, of Pasadena College, brought the fall messages; with Dr. Torrey Johnson leading a city-wide campaign in February, with which the college cooperated. These were wonderful meetings, and only eternity will know of the results which this powerful preaching and the subsequent conviction produced.

The steady, week-by-week program of chapels, student mid-week prayer meetings, and group prayer was maintained in strength. The mid-week prayer meetings of our student body are the strong points in the devotional life of the college. We were pleased with the fine and faithful service of William Koenig who led our deputation program.

To the listing of new scholarships given a year ago, I am pleased to add the following: The Isaac and Esther Smith Missionary Scholarship, the new Athletic Scholarship, created by one of our Newberg business men; and the Leadership Scholarship, and two new music scholarships. The last three named were created by the administration and board on the occasion of announcing an increase in tuition, and have not been otherwise underwritten. Also, the policy of granting two foreign student scholarships was implemented this year in the coming of Hideo Kaneko, of Osaka, Japan, who will now be a senior; and Miss Li-Jen Tao, of Formosa, who will begin her second year with us.

A joint committee of faculty and students, led by Dr. Cecilia Martin and Mrs. Beltz, laid the groundwork for an honorary scholastic society. A chapter of Delta Psi Omega, national dramatics fraternity, was initiated, replacing the traditional Actors Club.

It is now common knowledge that our commencement season was streamlined into Friday, Saturday and Sunday, with baccalaureate and commencement occurring both on Sunday, June 3. This new plan met with overwhelming success and will no doubt now be a part of our calendar. Lloyd S. Cressman, class of '45, and President of Friends University, gave the baccalaureate; while the Honorable Don Eastvold, Attorney-General of the State of Washington, delivered the commencement address. We granted the Bachelor of Arts Degree to Robert Byrd, Joan DeZell, Roland Hartley, Joyce Hoover, Donald

Lamm, and Willis Valech; and the Bachelor of Science Degree to Mabel Valech. The first and only Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon Lloyd S. Cressman.

#### BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

The work of putting our buildings in shape and maintaining them is a constant job, and one which knows no ending. Major maintenance was done of Canyon, Music, Science, and Wood-Mar Halls, culminating at the beginning of school last fall. Room 22, commonly called the Dungeon, was completely refurbished, to the evident satisfaction of all. The furnaces in both Wood-Mar and Edwards were worked on, but our heating plant is not at all satisfactory. The most extended job of all was done in the Hester Memorial Gymnasium, when the entire ceiling was finished. Funds for this were secured through gifts and the proceeds of logging out of the canyon. We used our maintenance staff, with some donation labor by the students.

Book shelves and cabinets were installed in a number of classrooms, a study area was built adjoining one men's rest room, a Columbia hi-fi record player adds to the value of our music classes, and several hundreds of dollars went into chairs, charts, maps, and other paraphernalia. The class of 1956 donated its time and money in making its gift to the school of landscaping the central area left vacant by the removal of Hoover Hall.

#### THE ADVANCE

The Advance for added funds during the year realized a total of \$20,357.14. Breaking this down, slightly above \$8,000 came directly from members of the Alumni Association, with \$3,075 as a result of the efforts of the class representatives. The Century Club came through with 86 members. Everyone who had a part in this drive is to be highly complimented for hundreds of hours were donated to this task. It is well to note that this is the most pretentious united effort of our Alumni Association in the long history of our institution.

#### FINANCE

A copy of the General Fund of operations is submitted. The fund shows a loss of \$19,446.39. No amount of explanation can make up this loss. There are, however, reasons for this. The endowment income stands at \$9,440.74 less than a year ago, and the lowest of any year in ten years. The cost of repairs and maintenance, fuel, etc., was \$22,654.43, or \$6,768.82 more than a year ago. The Advance, field operations, mailing, secretarial, etc., cost us \$7,424.59 more.

On the sunnier side, our income increased by \$8,556.02, with tuitions and fees climbing \$5,538.84. The substantial gifts of produce from Idaho Alumni and Central Oregon Friends made possible a more economical operation of the dining hall, while at the same time, our rentals climbed to \$8,899.90, a gain of \$1,595.02. More than 400 hours of labor were donated by Friends helping in our re-conditioning program. A number of Friends either cancelled their notes or entered into life-income agreements with the college. A still larger group named the college in their wills, because of the very commendable work of Denver Headrick in the field.

The gifts from Oregon Yearly Meeting to the college are much larger this year than for some years. The \$25 Club members from the Yearly Meeting alone accounted for \$10,804.52, as against



\$10,114.93 in 1954-55. Total gifts from the Yearly Meeting added up to \$20,159.81 as against only \$15,401.81 the previous year.

A George Fox College Day in the interest of Christian education was observed in many churches of the Yearly Meeting, with several hundreds of dollars accruing to the college through offerings and messages being given on related themes.

#### ACCREDITATION

The report of the college to the Higher Commission of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools was filed on August 25, almost a year ago. This report and application was considered by the Higher Commission and I appeared before that body in Spokane on November 15, 1955. The general advices given to me at that time were two in number: first, the faculty salaries must be raised, and then the general budget operation must appear in balance. Also, Dean F. A. Gilfillan was appointed as consultant. He has spent two days on our campus. He has made no additional request, but instead has assumed a very constructive and optimistic attitude. Both he and President Lemieux of the Association have advised that we continue our approach to the Higher Commission in preparing a supplement to the previous report, and in appearing in person at the next annual meeting.

The Northwest Association also makes a requirement of all church-related colleges that we must show the strength of our constituent churches, the number of adherents, and per capita giving to the institutions involved. Statements have been made by a number of the members of the Higher Commission to the effect that 5,000 Quakers in the Northwest is not a sufficient number to adequately support a growing institution. There are but two immediate avenues for us to traverse, short of waiting for the growth of the Yearly Meeting; one is to affiliate with some other evangelical denomination, and the other is to bring in other areas of Friends for a stronger base. The latter course is being pursued.

#### THE BOARD

The Yearly Meeting should honor the 15 men who freely give of their time and energies to direct the college. They all meet at least four times a year (five this last year) with the Executive Committee on call each month. Many of them travel hundreds of miles with no remuneration. One task this year has been to continue the preparatory work to secure a loan from the Home and Housing Finance Agency of the government in order to construct a new women's dormitory. This must be considered as the most expensive single building unit in the history of the college with much involvement and with serious implications. And yet, withal, a must, as far as the growth and future of the institution is concerned.

Second, the reorganization of the board to include up to 30 members, bringing in leaders from other Yearly Meetings, and putting the election of board members into the hands of the Oregon Yearly Meeting, is no little task. This has necessitated a complete new set of articles of incorporation, plus bylaws, with the subsequent re-vamping of our faculty handbook, not yet completed.

#### PERSONAL

This last year has brought renewed happiness to me in the re-establishment of my home. I have enjoyed the continued support of faculty and staff with the respect and cooperation of the students,

together with a growing sense of the support and prayers of the Yearly Meeting. It has been a great joy to serve in the capacity of your radio speaker each Sunday. I have attended the meetings of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, the annual meet of the presidents of Friends Colleges, the American Association of Colleges, the National Holiness Association, the National Association of Evangelicals, the National Religious Broadcasters, the Five Years Meeting of Friends, and the Evangelical Friends Conference. I have attended and have served as a member of the Board of Education Television, the Christian Freedom Foundation, and the Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges.

It is my hope and prayer that the administration of George Fox College can continue to merit, under God, the confidence and support of the church and alumni, and that all of you will enjoy a greater sense of satisfaction in the progress of our college.

The George Fox College Corporation, at its annual meeting held on August 17, 1956, voted unanimously to amend the Articles of Incorporation of George Fox College to read as follows:

"The members of this corporation consists of the members of the Board of Trustees, not to exceed thirty in number, and the president of the college, all to be chosen in the manner provided by the By-laws.

The Board of Trustees of George Fox College, in regular session

of August 18, 1956 elected to amend the By-laws relative to the membership and election of Trustees as follows:

"At least 4/5 of the members of the board shall be members in good standing of the Friends Church, and of these at least 2/3 shall be members of Oregon Yearly Meeting of the Friends Church.

"At each annual meeting of the Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church, not more than ten trustees shall be elected for a three-year term.

"Of the not more than ten members of the board to be elected annually, not more than four shall be nominated by the Oregon Yearly Meeting, not more than four by the board of the college, and not more than two by the Alumni Association of the college."

The Board of Trustees respectfully submits this information to Oregon Yearly Meeting along with their hope that the Yearly Meeting will accept this responsibility to elect the members of the board in accordance with the amended charter of By-laws.

#### BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

- 83. Grace Clark, president of the board, presided and read the following report:

"Ye are not your own; ye are bought with a price." "Stewardship is one of the main ships in God's fleet, as it is the one on which all the supplies are shipped."—Basil Miller

The Board of Stewardship makes the following report: We are glad for the good work which has been done in many of the churches over the Yearly Meeting, but we realize that we have only begun to do the task which must be done in our Yearly Meeting. As the reports have come in, there is indicated a real need for more emphasis along the line of Christian Stewardship. It is our desire, as a board, to be of help to the Quarterly Meetings and to the local meetings.

A representative of the board has been over the area of the Yearly Meeting, visiting 33 meetings and five Quarterly Meetings. Three youth camps were attended; 3,366 miles were traveled in the interest of stewardship.

Arthur Roberts, of the board, and others have prepared picture slides on the family level and local meeting level. Because of this extra expense, we have encouraged the meetings to purchase tracts, books, and supplies. Three Quarterly Meetings report that this has been done. We have tried to make available books and materials for programs, helps for Sunday schools, for youth meetings, and for general church work. The stewardship handbook was sent out to all superintendents of meetings. Now we have a united handbook which will be sent to all superintendents, pastors, and workers.

Our own picture slides "Meet the Hess Family," are ready to be presented to all the meetings. It portrays the stewardship of home life, of the family altar, of the Christian home during the week working together, playing; then on the Lord's Day the joy of bringing the tithes into the storehouse—the whole family living as faithful stewards. We pray that this will be a real incentive to faithful giving as families, and also helpful to our youth of Oregon Yearly Meeting. These pictures will be available for every meeting in the very near future.

In the 57 reports which have in:  
13 meetings report actual survey "to ascertain the number of tithers;  
32 meetings report "an estimate".

120 messages have been given from the pulpit on Sunday.  
90 talks and object lessons have been given in Sunday school.  
45 talks have been given in C.E.  
22 films have been shown.

40 meetings report stewardship committees

18 meetings report a definite increase in offerings in month of October.

Number of adult tithers—1582; youth tithers—228; total—1810.

Some highlights from the meetings:

One meeting: "Stewardship? We preach it; we teach it; we live it!"

One meeting: "We paid all fixed expense, Quaker Hour, Pastor's support, and over-paid our United Budget \$100.00.

One meeting: "We have ten books on stewardship which we give out for our members to read."

One small Preparative Meeting, "As a church, we adopted the policy of tithing our own general fund. We more than doubled our United Budget pledge of \$ 75.00 (\$153.00), and put \$124.71 directly into missions; all of this besides paying our pastor \$100.00 a month, and building a church. Thank God for His increase."

One meeting: "Almost all of our members tithe, and two couples who are not members also tithe."

Please pray for us as a board. We realize that stewardship is essentially a personal relationship to Jesus Christ, and we must deepen in our heart experiences if we understand the real meaning of Christian stewardship. Remember, Dear ones, that "Christian stewardship is giving ourselves wholly to God in love."

● 97. The Committee on Discipline and Revision presented the following amendment for final action as it was considered last year and held over a year.

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends:

In 1955, Minute 77, page 48, the Yearly Meeting approved an amendment to the Constitution and Discipline to provide for voluntary surrender of position by a minister and referred it back to the Committee on Discipline Revision for one year. The committee now presents it for final action:

On page 62, between the first paragraph and C—LIBERATION OF MINISTERS insert the following paragraph.

9. VOLUNTARY SURRENDER OF POSITION AS A MINISTER. If at any time a minister, whether pastor or other, comes to feel that he has fulfilled his call and discharged all responsibilities connected with it, it is urged that he take steps on his own volition to adjust his relationship to the Yearly Meeting accordingly. This may be done by notifying the local meeting on ministry and oversight of his conclusion and returning his certificate of recording. The local meeting on ministry and oversight shall notify the Quarterly Meeting on ministry and oversight of such action, and it in turn shall notify the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Oversight. This body shall report the entire procedure to the Yearly Meeting and his name shall then be removed from all official lists of ministers.

The same course of action is urged upon any minister who may find himself at variance with the doctrinal or ethical standards of the Yearly Meeting and no longer able to measure up to the conditions which would be required of one under consideration for recording as a minister.

### WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

- 101. Marie Haines, the president of the union, presided and read the following report:

"As it is written, He that had gathered much had nothing over; and he that had gathered little had no lack."

We of the W. M. U. feel that the Lord has truly fulfilled this promise the past year. Whether we had much or little to give, the Lord knew and He blessed the effort.

Membership this year reached an all time high with 855 members in 59 unions paying dues.

An enthusiastic group of women attended the annual banquet held at Jennings Lodge this year. The 334 women gave \$453.00 to purchase a kerosene refrigerator for the mission home in La Paz. This amount will also take care of the transportation charges.

Our two main projects: support for Roscoe and Tina Knight and \$50.00 a month for the work at Quincy, Washington, were well supported by the women. We were also able to give \$200.00 towards the fare of Kathleen Gregory to Bolivia, \$150 for religious books for the library at George Fox College, \$150 to buy a sewing machine for use at Greenleaf Academy and \$600 towards the printing of Aymara song books.

Again, our own program and devotional books were compiled by Marjorie Crisman and Ruthanna Hampton. The lessons this year were written by women from other Friends Yearly Meetings.

A very successful workshop and retreat were held in September of 1955 at Redmond, Oregon. Here the Yearly Meeting officers presented plans of work and ideas for the coming year. Thirty-five women attended this meeting. Each union was allowed one representative. This year the same plan will be followed except all women may attend if they wish to pay their own expense. One representative from each union may be in the pool of funds.

Under the able leadership of the Quarterly Meeting vice-presidents, mid-year all-day rallies were held in each Quarterly Meeting.

The reading project sponsored by Betty Hockett, Literature chairman, met with good response. More women are reading more missionary and inspirational books each year. Sixty-six women received certificates of recognition for reading nine books in six designated fields. Many new books were added to church and missionary union libraries.

Ethel Cowgill, our Prayer Unit chairman, periodically sends prayer bulletins to all the unions requesting them. Twenty-one reported Prayer Units this past year. We hope to see this number increase.

As always, it is hard to choose for a report the individual unions projects during the year. Parsonages were redecorated, one union reported a parsonage mattress rebuilt. CARE packages were sent to Germany. Quilts, layettes, aprons, toys, bandages, cards, Christmas presents, sewing kits, clothing, etc., were sent to Bolivia.

Family church nights, mother-and-daughter banquets, evening

meetings with the men, Quarterly Meeting banquets and dinners were sponsored by different unions.

It is interesting to note that most of the money given by these unions is raised by thank offerings. Some make money in other ways such as, selling different articles, putting on banquets, giving music lessons, washing for others, etc.

Each year at one o'clock during the Yearly Meeting the women meet to transact business and listen to inspirational speakers. This year we were privileged to have Doris Morris and Dorothy Thomas from Africa talk to us. Dillon Mills will also present the work at Holly Park.

This is the fifteenth anniversary of the organization of our union and a birthday party was held at which time the past presidents were honored. Four past presidents were in attendance.

We must have a strong home base if we are to have a long outreach.

We had several meetings and breakfasts of the portion of the executive board on the Idaho side.

One meeting of the Oregon, Washington side of the executive board was held in Portland, Oregon. The fine spirit and cooperation of all of the executive board members has been a real source of encouragement to me.

The men attended two banquets: one at Nampa, Idaho and the other at Portland, Oregon. Dr. D. Shelby Corlett was the Nampa speaker, bringing us the thought of "sharing Christ with others". Mike Martin, Director of Kings Gardens, Incorporated, was the Portland speaker, telling us of some of the miraculous things the Lord had done and is doing for him. The presence of the Lord was so pre-dominate that we were unable to dismiss for some time. It was a most unusual banquet.

● 103. Milo C. Ross, president of George Fox College, told of the plans for a new dormitory for women. It has been decided not to ask federal aid as it was to be too expensive. There is still need for a new dormitory; \$8,000 in cash and pledges have been raised already, but much more is needed and the meeting is asked to remember this need of the college in prayer.

● 104. On Sunday evening a minute for David and Edward White, of California Yearly Meeting, was read and they were welcomed by this Yearly Meeting.

● 105. The Committee on Discipline Revision presented an amendment in regard to Supplementary Regulations concerning the Board of Publication which was approved.

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends:

In 1954, Minute 101, page 54, the Yearly Meeting gave preliminary approval to an amendment of the Supplementary Regulations concerning the Board of Publication. This took place on the last day of the Yearly Meeting sessions, and the amendment has not yet been brought forward for final action. The Committee on Discipline Revision takes the liberty of doing so at this time.

On page 98, Supplementary Regulations, Section VIII—Publication, add to paragraph 1. THE YEARLY MEETING BOARD, the following sub-paragraph:

The board is charged also with the responsibility for maintaining and directing throughout the Yearly Meeting a sustained program of publicity and promotion in harmony with the doctrinal standards and spiritual ideals of evangelical Friends. It shall utilize freely, as available, such media as newspaper releases, magazine articles, radio programs and spot announcements, and display advertising. To supervise these activities, it shall appoint one of its members or other qualified person to serve as Yearly Meeting director of publicity, and through him shall encourage appropriate activity on the part of those appointed by the subordinate meetings, providing them suggestions as to procedure and as to standards of quality in journalistic effort.

Also, in paragraph 2, delete the present wording and substitute the following:

2. REPRESENTATION IN THE SUBORDINATE MEETINGS. Each Quarterly Meeting shall appoint a director of publicity, who shall be responsible for publicizing the activities of the Quarterly Meeting in the local papers of the area, and for reporting these activities to the Yearly Meeting periodical.

Each Monthly Meeting shall appoint a director of publicity to serve in the same role locally.

To Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends:

In accordance with Minute 15, page 7, of the Minutes for 1955, the Committee on Discipline Revision submits the following plan for a uniform system of appointment and organization of the Quarterly Meeting Committees:

Page 91. Paragraph 2. THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEES. Place a comma after the first sentence, and then add

the following phrase and sentence: "to be composed of the chairman of the Monthly Meeting Evangelistic Committees and as many additional members as seem desirable. It shall designate one of these as Quarterly Meeting superintendent of evangelism and chairman of the committee."

Page 93. Paragraph 2. THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEE. (Missions) Place a comma after the first sentence, then add the following phrase and sentence: "to be composed of the chairmen of the Monthly Meeting Missionary Committees and as many additional members as seem desirable. It shall designate one of these as Quarterly Meeting superintendent of missions and chairman of the committee."

Page 93. Paragraph 2. THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEE. (Christian Education, as amended in 1954, Minute 89, page 50.) Substitute the following reading: "Each Quarterly Meeting shall appoint a Christian Education Committee, to be composed of the chairmen of the Monthly Meeting Christian Education Committees and as many additional members as seem desirable. It shall designate one of these as Quarterly Meeting superintendent of Christian Education and chairman of the committee. The Quarterly Meeting superintendent of Christian Endeavor shall be a member of the committee by virtue of his office."

Page 95. Paragraph 2. THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEE. (Peace and Service, as amended in 1955, Minute 76, page 47, and confirmed this year.) Substitute for the first two sentences the following: "Each Quarterly Meeting shall appoint a Peace and Service Committee, to be composed of the chairmen of the Monthly Meeting Peace and Service Committees and as many additional members as seem desirable. It shall designate one of these as Quarterly Meeting superintendent of Peace and Service and chairman of the committee."

Page 96. Paragraph 2. THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEE. Place a comma at the end of the first sentence, then add the following phrase and sentence: "to be composed of the chairmen of the Monthly Meeting Public Relations Committees and as many additional members as seem desirable. It shall designate one of these as Quarterly Meeting superintendent of Public Relations and chairman of the committee."

Page 97. Paragraph 2. THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEE. Place a comma after the first sentence, then add the following phrase and sentence: "to be composed of the chairmen of the Monthly Meeting Finance Committees and as many additional members as seem desirable. It shall designate one of these as Quarterly Meeting superintendent of finance and chairman of the committee."

Page 98. Paragraph 2. THE QUARTERLY MEETING COMMITTEE. (Stewardship, as approved in 1953, Minute 24, page 11.) Place a comma after the first sentence, then add the following phrase and sentence: "to be composed of the chairmen of the Monthly Meeting Stewardship Committees and as many additional members as seem desirable. It shall designate one of these as Quarterly Meeting superintendent of Stewardship and chairman of the committee."

- 111. The Trustees made the following report:  
The Trustees have executed a deed transferring the property at Holly Park Meeting, Seattle, Washington, from Oregon Yearly Meeting to the Holly Park Monthly Meeting.

During the year the Trustees met and considered some repairs of the Quaker Apartments, Portland, Oregon, and authorized a new roof and other repairs. These have been completed at a cost of \$740.00. And we recommend that the outside of the building be covered with asbestos shakes and all of the trim of the building not thus covered be painted at an estimated cost of approximately \$1800.00.

We recommend that the Trustees be authorized and empowered to borrow not to exceed \$7500.00 secured by a mortgage on the Quaker Apartments located on lot 9, Block 1, Colonial Heights addition to the City of Portland, Oregon. This amount is sufficient to retire the present loan on the property, the overdrawn account on the books of the Yearly Meeting treasurer, and pay for the repairs recommended.

Some time ago the Yearly Meeting sold on contract the property at 1818 Estes Street in Baker, Oregon, to Paul Adamson. Mr. Adamson now wishes to sell his equity in this property. The contract provides that he cannot do this without the written consent of the Yearly Meeting. The Trustees recommend that the chairman of the Trustees be authorized to give the written permission for Paul Adamson to sell his equity in the property.

The Yearly Meeting at a previous session has authorized the Trustees to sell another property in Baker, Oregon. We now recommend the Trustees sell this property to Carl C. Peterson and Mildred M. Peterson, husband and wife, for \$2250.00, of which sum \$1000.00 is to be paid on September 1, 1956, and the balance of \$1250.00 to be paid without interest on September 1, 1957, and if they cannot pay it at that time, the balance to become due on September 1, 1958 and to bear interest at 6% from September 1, 1957, until paid.

This is the fourteenth annual report of the Board of Publication of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends Church.

The responsibilities of the Board of Publication might be summed up in just two words—"publishing" and "publicizing".

The responsibility of publishing is outlined in the Discipline and the further responsibility for publicity was directed to the Board of Publication at Yearly Meeting in August of 1954 and that charge to us is found in the Supplementary Regulations, listed in the 1954 Minutes.

One of the outstanding contributions of the Board of Publication during the past year was the publishing of an article for the Portland Oregonian entitled, "Who Are the Quakers?"

On December 12 and 13 the Portland Oregonian published articles entitled, "Who Are the Quakers?" This was part of a syndicated series entitled, "Religions of our Day". The articles on Quakers were prepared by Richmond P. Miller, Field Secretary of the Philadelphia Yearly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends and contained statements on beliefs and practices that applied only to a small minority of Quakers centering mainly in the Philadelphia area.

The Portland Oregonian was flooded with mail, protesting this series of articles on Friends and as a result of this protest the Board of Publication was asked by the Portland Oregonian to prepare an article presenting the views of evangelical Friends.

This article was prepared jointly by Arthur O. Roberts and L. Dell Lamb and was seriously reviewed by the Board of Publication before being released. It dealt with the following questions:

1. Who are the Quakers?
2. Are Quakers Protestants?
3. Are the Quakers a church?
4. Do Friends have ministers?
5. How do Friends worship today?
6. Do Quakers have a creed?
7. What is the basis for membership?
8. What do Friends believe about Jesus Christ?
9. Do Friends accept the story of the virgin birth?
10. What is meant by the 'inward light'?
11. What accounts for different views about the light?
12. What do Friends believe about salvation?
13. What do Friends believe about the Bible?
14. What do Friends believe about sacraments?
15. What do Friends believe about peace?
16. Do Friends seek to make converts?
17. What do Quakers hold concerning heaven and hell?
18. Are Quakers Trinitarian or Unitarian?
19. What do Friends offer the world today?

This concluding paragraph entitled "What do Friends offer the world today" was very carefully thought out and is as follows:

- (1) Friends offer a sensitive Christian conscience in the midst of pretense.
- (2) Friends offer to the church the challenge of an evangelical peace testimony.
- (3) Friends offer simplicity in worship.
- (4) Friends offer the promise of inward peace and personal experience of salvation through simple faith in Jesus Christ.
- (5) Friends offer assurance to the Christian of the immediate guidance of the Holy Spirit, through the Scriptures and in the decisions of everyday life.

Five thousand copies of this article entitled, "Who are the Quakers?" were sent to the churches of Oregon Yearly Meeting and following this release an enlarged booklet was prepared by Arthur O. Roberts entitled, "The People Called Quakers". The first edition has already been exhausted and another edition is being

printed.

#### PUBLICIZING

Under the leadership of L. Dell Lamb, our Director of Publicity, the Friends church has been given publicity on local, regional, national and even international levels. The national and international areas of publicity were augmented by the fact that our director of publicity was also in charge of publicity for the Fourth Evangelical Friends Conference at Denver, from July 11-15, 1956.

One major problem for the Board of Publication for the coming year will be for more adequate means of implementing this work of publicity which is of such vital help to our church.

Even in competition with two political conventions people have been made aware that Friends are in annual sessions at Newberg, Oregon this August 1956.

The Oregon Yearly Meeting Publicity director during the year, in addition to the local churches' work, has served as special news correspondent to 22 northwest dailies and 26 weeklies, the UP, AP, INS, Idaho Wire, National Religious News Service, in a new record of 203 dispatches.

He has also served as display man, designer, sign, show card and chart maker, organization and program planner, statistician and research worker in the interests of the church.

The Oregon Yearly Meeting Publicity Director was called to direct the promotion for the Fourth Conference of Evangelical Friends in Denver where he supervised one of the most extensive promotional campaigns in Quaker history. To accomplish this he covered with news and features for 90 American publications direct and all national teletype wire services reaching virtually every metropolitan paper in America and the London Times and 53 Friends periodicals.

Among the goals of the Publicity and Promotion department are these:

To promote and encourage the work of the church within the Oregon Yearly Meeting.

To inform the public.

To serve as a sentinel to check against any undesirable publicity and to counsel in public relations to the best welfare of the church.

One of the largest responsibilities of the Publicity department this year was the early concern for a clear message in faithful Quakers and the carrying out of that concern in a special article in a Portland daily on "Who are the Quakers?" This article was the inspiration for the brochure, "The People Called Quakers."

Adelaide Barker read the report of the George Fox Press, and the financial statement as they appear below:

This is the twelfth report of the George Fox Press. Some have sowed, others watered but God has given the increase as we have worked together in a united effort to provide literature true to the Bible, spiritual in content and evangelistic in emphasis.

During the past year the publications went to 402 customers in 26 states. We served (to some degree) 311 Friends Sunday schools in 12 Yearly Meetings, 14 churches of other denominations, and 72 individuals, who may or may not have been connected with the churches served. Circulation figures show an increase in net gain (exclusive of general expenses), despite an increase in the size of the Teacher's Friend. During the third quarter of 1956 the circulation was as follows:

For this healthy growth we give praise only to God.

Our newest venture, The Teacher's Friend, is meeting a real need among our teachers. Because of the growing demand for graded lessons the board appointed a committee to make a study during the year 1956-57 of graded lessons (not closely graded) on the primary, junior and intermediate levels.

- 126. The Epistle Committee made the following report and presented the epistle to be sent out to other Yearly Meetings:

We have received and read twenty epistles from American Yearly Meetings and eight from groups of Friends outside the United States.

As we have perused these messages they all seem to indicate a desire on their part to fill a place in the world, but it seems to us that some are coming far short of fitting into an apostolic pattern for evangelizing a lost world. There are others, however, who have caught the vision of what Christ is expecting of His Church during this age and are earnestly seeking the guidance of the Holy Spirit, in all their activities. Time will not permit the reading of all of these so a few excerpts from them will have to suffice.

Kansas Yearly Meeting exclaims, "Oh, that Friends throughout the world would rise to the challenge of our Savior, 'Go ye!' We must evangelize or die!" They very deeply appreciated the ministry of Paul Barnett in their last Yearly Meeting.

Western reports: "Our hearts were warmed and deeply stirred by the recording of seven Friends as ministers of the Gospel. God has again been faithful in raising up leadership for His church."

Central Yearly Meeting in its concern says, "We have deeply sensed that the cause of Quakerism is lost, unless there is a definite seeking of the double cure for sin. There must be this true revival in her midst, if she is to survive as a religious body capable of helping a lost world."

Iowa writes, "Our guest speaker, Charles A. Beals, of Oregon, spoke to us on the themes, 'The Evangelistic Message and Methods of Early Friends,' 'Contemporaries of George Fox' and 'Our Present Message as Friends' based upon the book of Romans. He challenged us as Friends to feel that the ministry of zealous evangelism is in the mainstream of Quakerism."

California felt that spiritual messages of unusual depth were brought to them by our Arthur Roberts during their recent Yearly Meeting sessions. They were encouraged by the way God is raising up young ministers for their meetings.

Ohio's closing paragraph reads: "There was a time when Friends were a fast growing group of Christians. That was not because they had a lot of food to give to the hungry, although they were mindful of temporal needs, but because they gave forth the Bread of Life which satisfied. May we be as faithful in preaching Christ."

One great concern of Nebraska Yearly Meeting was for the expansion of their missionary efforts among the Navajo Indians in Arizona.

Surely the Lord has blessed the young people of Oregon Yearly Meeting this past year as together we have pressed toward the mark of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus. This theme, "I Press Toward the Mark" was a challenge and source of spiritual help as it was used in C.E. banquets, conventions, retreats and in publicity.

It is with praise to God for His constant leadership that we rejoice

in the progress made in Christian Endeavor this year.

A fall week-end retreat for the Yearly Meeting C. E. Executive Committee was held at Twin Rocks with a very excellent representation from all parts of the Yearly Meeting. This time of prayer and planning gave renewed inspiration and enthusiasm for the year's work.

C. E. retreats for inspiration and training were sponsored by several of the Quarterly Meetings. C. E.'ers from all areas of the quarter received instruction in C. E. leadership and inspiration for a deeper spiritual life. A number of young people found definite spiritual victory in these retreats.

The mid-winter C. E. convention was held at First Friends Church in Portland, with a record attendance and marked by the presence and blessing of the Holy Spirit. Interesting and helpful classes were held for both C. E. members and sponsors. The young people were responsive to the messages brought to us by Harley Adams under the anointing of God and each service saw young people kneeling and finding their needs met in Christ. One of the highlights of the convention was the "watch night" service when, seeing the old year out and the new year in, hearts were melted and many found new life in Christ.

A new venture this year were C. E. travel teams composed of both Yearly Meeting and Quarterly Meeting officers which visited local endeavors where possible. This was not carried out on a very large scale but many considered it very valuable.

This year's C. E. program was changed from the Scrapbook program to a Display system where local C. E.'s would work on one project a month and then display, in anyway they chose, what they had done. ● 136. The Board of Public Relations presented to the meeting a statement of Race Relations which was approved by the meeting and the Board of Public Relations is given permission to distribute it as they see fit.

The statement appears below:

**STATEMENT ON RACE RELATIONS**  
Prepared by Arthur O. Roberts for the  
Board of Public Relations

In view of the importance of problems of racial tension in the world today, and in view of recent Supreme Court pronouncements, it is incumbent upon the Church to restate her views, that as a prophet of God, the Church may speak to the world the Biblical position regarding race. These teachings are fundamental:

1. The universality of sin precludes any claim to native superiority on part of any class or caste. Paul declares that there is no difference, but that "all have sinned and come short of the glory of God" (Rom.3:22-23). This Christian conviction is fundamental to the highest forms of democracy, exercising a leveling influence and insisting upon checks and balances to guard against the pretensions of a superior-minded group of citizens.

2. The providences of God, in providing material blessings indiscriminately, as concerns race or nation, for He makes "the rain to fall upon the just and on the unjust", evidence a world which shows no regard for color or cultural position.

3. The universality of the atonement in Christ shows that all men are potentially sons of God, able, through Christ, to be partakers of the divine nature, and hence entitled to respect and dignity without preferential treatment because of color or class. We believe that upon every man has Christ, the light shined, so that "whosoever calls upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." (See John 1:9; 3:16; Acts 2:21).

4. The teaching and example of Jesus is a rebuke to both prejudice and discrimination. The antipathy which existed between Jew and Samaritan is roughly analogous to modern racial tensions. Jesus rebuked the prejudice of the disciples toward the Samaritans (Luke 9:54) and by His gracious dealings with the Samaritan woman (John 4) exemplified His social acceptance of all persons, without resort to sanctions of class or caste. As Christians we seek to follow Jesus in this respect.

5. The early Church swept across barriers of class and caste, first bringing into fellowship the rich and poor, Jew and Gentile, servant and master, learned and ignorant; and later, by the force of love, breaking down the discrimination of slavery and exclusive citizenship. The church seeks not social experiment, but a recog-

nition that all men are of "one blood" by birth and may be of one body by rebirth. Through the blood of Christ comes true brotherhood.

6. In regard to racial intermarriage, we recognize the social problems involved and would counsel our youth accordingly. We note, however, that these problems arise out of prejudices and cultural factors and not from inherent principles. We do not regard racial intermarriage, as such, to be unchristian; nor would we, by prejudice add to the burden society often lays upon interracial families, but would rather by our Christian fellowship seek to allay the burden.

In view of these principles, we may not exclude any from worship or membership on the basis of race. We are grieved at prejudice or discrimination on the part of our members. We believe the desegregation rulings of our Supreme Court are consonant with Christian ethics; and we pray that Christian attitudes and methods may prevail in the national adjustment to this interpretation of the Constitution. Although we recognize that racial tensions will always exist among those who seek selfish advantage over their fellows, we believe that the Church ought ever to lift up a Christian conscience and to bear witness to the truth, at whatever cost in terms of influence and popularity.

● 137. A letter from Gervas A. Carey was read and was much appreciated.

**BOARD OF EVANGELISM**

● 138. The members of the board sat on the platform.

The report of the board was read by Clare Willcuts, president of the board, as follows:

**REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM**

The past year has not been without its heartaches and obstacles, even so, there has been an overwhelming consciousness of Divine power, for which we give thanks to our Heavenly Father. We appreciate the faithful service of our general superintendent, Dean Gregory. His counsel, prayers and words of encouragement have been of unmeasured value to the board, the meetings and the pastors of the Yearly Meeting.

In an effort to keep ourselves abreast with the current needs and obligations, the board met several times this year. The first of these was in December when we met in the Medford church, one of our members preached for their revival that week. The next meeting, in February, was at Seattle Memorial church. During our stay in Puget Sound Quarter we were able to visit Holly Park, Bethany, Everett, Agnew and Quilcene as well as the host meeting. For some of us this was our first visit in that area and proved most helpful. In May we met on our college campus for consideration of our work. In connection with this meeting we participated in the "Home Missions Institute" at George Fox College, supplying speakers for four services with the student body, challenging them with the needs and opportunities in Oregon Yearly Meeting.

Your board has given financial assistance to three pastors in outpost and preparative meetings during the past year and gave substantial amounts toward the purchase of the new church in Ontario, Oregon, and property for the new location of the Hayden Lake church. In recent years the board has made provisions for church blueprints; two of our newer meetings have used these during the year, at a real



saving to them.

The Friends Church Extension Foundation, sponsored by the board, approved by the Yearly Meeting two years ago, has already had an important part in the work of extension. The primary aim of this corporation is evangelism through church extension, it is specifically concerned with providing funds for the building program of Oregon Yearly Meeting. This organization must grow in membership and finances if the expansion of the kingdom be not hindered. It may well be the lifeline of our future expansion.

We cannot speak too highly of our radio ministry with its well-styled presentation. Words are inadequate to express our sincere thanks to the Radio Committee and the staff who have worked faithfully and sacrificially during another year.

We would express our appreciation to the Friends Brotherhood for their continued support of the Holly Park project and to the Women's Missionary Union for their aid in the Quincy outpost.

We look ahead in the light of your intense interest in evangelism and extension. The board has already pledged some support to three projects for the coming year: Ontario, Oregon; Hayden, Idaho; and Maplewood in Portland. Ontario Heights expects to move to their new location in Ontario by December 1st where they have purchased a church building from the Episcopal Church, Wayne and Willa Piersall will be the pastors of this meeting. Friends at Hayden Lake have bought property in the nearby village of Hayden, Idaho, the present church building and parsonage are now being moved to the new location, Irwin and Zarilda Alger are assuming pastoral leadership here. Douglas and Marjory Brown will be the first resident pastors of the Maplewood meeting. While these are not entirely new they certainly offer new opportunities for evangelism and expansion. We will continue with assistance to Sprague River with Gerald and Elaine Cronkas pastors. Evert and Virene Tuning, after many years of faithful and consecrated service on the Klamath Reservation, are moving to Eugene. There are a number of promising fields where we hope to enter soon.

In keeping with the emphasis this year of "Visitation" the board would urge the local Committee on Evangelism to either become or promote a strong visitation committee. As redeemed men and women we cannot ignore personal responsibility for our fellow man. We believe the new handbook will be helpful to the committee.

The mother of our Lord, at the Cana marriage feast, admonished her hosts, "Whatsoever He saith unto you, do it". That is exactly what we are trying to do, obey the command of our Lord. We appeal to every member of Oregon Yearly Meeting to join with us for total evangelism in every department. Let "Outreach" be our watchword with continued evangelism and expansion, our goals.

Irwin Alger read the statistical report which will appear in the Appendix.

A brief summary of the statistical reports of the work done under the Board of Evangelism is as follows:

The Quaker Hour is being supported by 44 meetings.

Faithful work is being done in the field of extension: three Sunday schools are being sponsored by Monthly Meetings, there are seven Outposts giving hopeful promise, and there are five Preparative

Meetings that seem to be making encouraging progress.

However, in the area of actual work accomplished on the part of the majority of our meetings an inventory of the statistics of this year in comparison to those of last year indicate an alarming situation.

According to reports received there has been some gain. Thirty-two more people attended Sunday school than a year ago, and 208 more victories for Christ were recorded, but there has been a decrease of 54 in morning worship attendance, 72 in attendance at Sunday evening services, 35 at prayer meeting, and 126 less people taking an interest in the business of the church.

It is difficult to pin point actual gain or loss, but in figures it seems evident that we have lost ground to the extent of about .03 of 1%. Although this loss may seem very slight, it is certainly a woeful failure in comparison to the growth of the early church and of early Quakerism.

May we suggest that in all probability our lack of progress the past year is due to the lack of prevailing prayer, a proneness to compromise with the world and pressure of materialism, and a failure in Christian stewardship.

God grant that the coming year will mean a time of great spiritual deepening, a much greater impetus in service, and the accompanying results of revival and growth throughout the Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends.

Paul Barnett brought the following summary of the devotional meetings which were held outside the business session:

#### DEVOTIONAL SERVICES

(Not a part of the morning and afternoon sessions)

Thursday, August 16, 8:00 a.m.

Willard Kennon, presiding

Myron Goldsmith, speaking

Theme: "When the Dead shall Hear."

Scripture—John 5:24-29.

Text: "Verily, verily, I say unto you, the hour is coming, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God: and they that hear shall live."—John 5:25.

The key words in this expression of Jesus, "the dead shall hear," seem as a shocking expression, and unconventional, but provokes attention. The people to whom He spoke were well acquainted with the effects of death; no sight, no hearing, no smelling, no response to feeling. Faith was increased, however, when Jesus overcame all these and restored to life the son of the widow of Nain, resurrected the daughter of a soldier, and caused Lazarus to come forth from the tomb.

Though death remains as a present obstacle, there is another realm in which Jesus demonstrates this text. The souls and spirits of men, insensible, and dead in sin, are made alive unto God by the power of Christ. The hearing, as our response, is most important for "they that hear shall live." By this means are we to find eternal life. All hopes of good works coming from men depend on this text, that they "shall hear the voice of the Son of God." We must turn from the deadening influence of the world to hear his



voice. This is the purpose of our coming to Yearly Meeting, that we "shall hear."

Theme: "What Christ Expects of His Church".

Scripture—Mark 11:11; 15-19.

Text: "And Jesus entered into Jerusalem, and into the temple: and . . . He . . . looked round about upon all things . . . ." Mark 11:11.

This incident in the life of Jesus resulted in His cleansing the temple. A pure religion, revealed by God had become corrupted by strict commercialism, and formal sacrifices. Concern for gain, even thievery, had crowded out prayer which God intended should have been offered there. What would Christ expect of His church in this day? He expects:

1. Reverence. Instead, there can be a consuming of the Christian life by clamoring for gain, making or meeting budgets, or planning fund-raising campaigns. Reverence may be disrupted by whispering, reading, or the mental sacrilege of thinking on affairs not pertaining to worship. On all this it can be said: "The Lord looked round about."

2. Prayer. Jesus said, "My house shall be called of all nations, the house of prayer." Only by this means is there an intake for the soul. "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength."

3. A world view. Notice Jesus said, "Of all nations." The church is for "whosoever will believe." It must arise above nationalism, denominationalism, and sectarianism.

4. The ministry of the Scriptures. The Jews taught these in the home, schools, and synagogues, and expected all to know the law. Jesus called them to behold the Scripture, "Is it not written...?" Even American Quakers have become afflicted with spiritual illiteracy in our day.

5. Worship "in the beauty of holiness." (1 Chron. 16:29) What does Christ find in your church?

Text: "And Peter, fastening his eyes upon Him with John, said, "Look on us . . . Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I thee." Acts 3:4-6.

The world is beginning to look to the church, expecting help. "He gave heed unto them, expecting to receive something of them. The church should be able to present Christ for in Him only is satisfaction for the soul's need. Christ is our strength, our power, and our peace.

Even the most noble evangelistic efforts fail except we be moved to pray as did Isaiah.
